

Juniper Breeze Scarf



Experience the enchanting allure of nature with the Juniper Breeze Scarf, a stunning knitting project inspired by the rugged elegance of juniper branches. Crafted from 1 skein of CaMaRose Lovetand yarn, this scarf features a stitch design that mimics the rough yet beautiful appearance of juniper foliage. The Lovetand yarn's initial stiffness mirrors the texture of juniper branches, but like the juniper's transformation with time, it softens to a supple and cozy feel after washing, making it a joy to wear.

The Juniper Breeze Scarf pattern is designed to showcase the yarn's unique qualities while also celebrating the healing properties associated with juniper berries. As you work through the stitches, you'll feel a sense of connection to the natural world, as if each knit and purl brings you closer to the essence of the juniper itself.

The pattern incorporates basic knitting techniques, making it suitable for intermediate-level knitters and a rewarding project for experienced ones. With its rhythmic pattern, the Juniper Breeze Scarf is an engaging knit that lets you immerse yourself in the soothing act of creating.

Size:

- Length 114 cm / 45"
- Width 18 cm / 7"

Yarn:

1 skein CaMaRose Lovetand 50gm

Needles:

3.75 mm / US 5 needles

Gauge:

17 sts and 21 rows = 10 cm / 4 inches of pattern, after blocking

Notions:

- stitch markers (optional)
- Blocking tools
- Sewing needles (for weaving in ends)

Beginning Rows

CO 3 sts with a long tail cast on method.

Set up:

Row 1 (rs): K1, p1, k1

Row 2 (ws): K1, p1, k1

Row 3 (rs): K1, in the next stitch (p1 & p1 tbl), k1 (4 st)

Row 4 (ws): K1, in the next stitch (p1 & k1 tbl), p1, k1 (5 st)

Row 5 (rs): K1, p1, k1, p1, k1

Row 6 (ws): K1, p1, in the next stitch (k1 & k1 tbl), p1, k1 (6 st)

Tip: I find it helps to make the rs with a removable marker when getting started.

Continue to Part 1 chart.


Abbreviations	
BO	Bind off
CO	Cast on
K	Knit
K2 tog	Knit two stitches together
M1, right leaning	Make 1 right leaning
P	Purl
P2 tog	Purl two stitches together
Sl1, k1, pss0	Slip 1, k1, pass slipped stitch over
Tbl	Thru the back loop
Yo	Yarn over

Part 1: Seed stitch boarder = K1, p1, k1
 (3 stitches before beggin chart and
 finish with same three stitches on every
 row. You may want to place markers after
 the first 3 stitch and before the last 3
 stitches.


Work this chart once and move to the next chart.

Key

- RS: knit
 WS: purl
- RS: purl
 WS: knit
- yo
- RS: k2tog
 WS: p2tog
- RS: sl1, k1, pss0
 WS: ssp
- RS: m1 right leaning
 WS: m1 purlwise right leaning
- grey no stitch


Part 3

Begin decreasing at the beginning of every other odd row, starting with row 5 (5, 9, 13, 17, 21, and so forth).

Row 5: K1, p1, k2 tog, then work the chart row as shown.

On all other rows continue with k1, p1, k1.

If you placed a marker after the 3 seed stitches, you will want to move the marker to after the first 2 seed stitches.



Part 4:

Continue with decrease every other odd row (5, 9, 13, 17, 21, and so forth) and complete all the chart rows before moving on the Final Rows below.

Final Rows

Row 1 (ws): K1, p1, k2 tog, k1, p1, k1 (6 st)

Row 2: K1, p1, k2, p1, k1

Row 3: K1, p1, k2 tog, p1, k1 (5 st)

Row 4: K1, p1, k1, p1, k1

Row 5: K1, p1, k2 tog, k1 (4 st)

Row 6: K1, p2 tog, k1 (3 st)

Row 7: K1, sl1, k1, pass over slipped st (2 st)

Row 8: K2 tog

Cut yarn and pull thru loop (last st).

Weave in ends and block.
