

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BASIC WOMEN'S FAIR ISLE MITTENS

SIZE:

One size fits most.

FINISHED MEASUREMENT OF HAND:

Approximately 7 1/2 inches (19 cm) in circumference and 7 3/4 inches (19.7 cm) from bottom of cuff to top of mitten

MATERIALS:

100% Shetland Wool. (1 ounce [56 g] = approximately 150 yards [137 m].) 1 ounce (56 g) Main Color and small quantities of Contrasting Colors for chosen Stitch Pattern.

NEEDLES:

Set of 5 double-pointed Size 1 (2.25-2.5 mm)
or size to obtain gauge.

GAUGE:

32 stitches and 32 rounds = 4 inches (10 cm) using Size 1 needles in Fair Isle (stranded) knitting.

Take time to save time—check your gauge.

STITCH PATTERNS:

See Charts.

Note 1: Stitch Pattern repeats vary; it may be necessary to adjust total number of stitches after the cuff to fit the chosen Stitch Pattern; check number of stitches needed before increasing.

Note 2: When chosen Chart(s) have been completed, continue with Main Color only for remainder of mitten.

CUFF:

Using Main Color, cast on 56 stitches, distributed evenly on 4 needles. Total: 14 stitches on each needle. Place marker for beginning of round. Join, being careful not to twist stitches. Work in knit 1, purl 1 ribbing for 3 inches, increasing for chosen Stitch Pattern, on last round, if necessary.

HAND:

Change to Circular Stockinette Stitch (knit every round), and Fair Isle Stitch Pattern of choice; work even in pattern established until piece measures 2 1/2 inches (6.4 cm) above cuff. **Thumb Opening, Right Mitten:** Continuing in pattern established, work across needles 1 and 2; from needle 3, knit 2, then

knit 10 with waste yarn; return these 10 stitches to needle 3 and knit 10 in pattern, knit 2; work across needle 4 in pattern. **Thumb Opening, Left Mitten:** Continuing in pattern established, work across needle 1; from needle 2, knit 2, then knit 10 with waste yarn; return these 10 stitches to needle 2, and knit 10 in pattern, knit 2; work across needles 3 and 4 in pattern.

When piece measures approximately 4 inches (10 cm) above waste yarn for thumb, (approximately 6 1/2 inches [16.5 cm] above cuff edge), begin shaping. (**Note:** Shaping will add approximately 1 1/4 inches (3.2 cm); adjust length if desired). * Work from needles 1 and 3 as: Knit 1; decrease one stitch by working a right slanting decrease (knit 2 together); knit to end. Work from needles 2 and 4 as: Knit to last 3 stitches; decrease one stitch by working a left slanting decrease (slip slip knit); knit 1. Repeat from * every round 9 times. Total 16 stitches (8 stitches for palm, and 8 for back of hand). Break yarn, leaving a 16-inch (41 cm) tail; using tapestry needle and tail, weave remaining stitches together.

THUMB:

Remove waste yarn; with Main Color (or color of choice), pick up 10 stitches from top and 10 stitches from bottom of thumb opening and distribute evenly on double-pointed needles; pick up 1 stitch at each corner. Total: 22 stitches. Work even until thumb measures 2 inches (5 cm) or 1/4 inch (6.3 mm) less than desired length (thumb should reach to the middle of thumbnail before shaping). To shape thumb, work as for hand shaping, repeating from * 3 times. Break yarn, leaving a 12-inch (30.5 cm) tail; thread tail through remaining stitches, going through each stitch twice; gather stitches together and fasten off. Thumb measures approximately 2 1/4 inches (5.7 cm).

FINISHING:

Weave in ends neatly on reverse side. Steam block to even out stitches and obtain finished measurements.

Women's Fair Isle Mittens

Mittens for women in Shetland are a relatively new item of apparel. Traditionally, the women always wore gloves. It was during World War II that women's mittens were introduced into Shetland with the influx of Norwegian refugees. Norwegian people usually wear mittens with stars on them; gloves are less popular. Suddenly in Shetland, mitts became popular and have remained so.

Rather than making a mitten that really fits the hand well, Shetland knitters make them very long to accommodate their design preferences—they need more room on the mitts to include the double motif they're so fond of, for example, the three different star patterns we've included. With the double motif the knitters also pattern the area that connects the motifs, so there is a continuous pattern on the mitts.

To wear the mitts properly, you pull them down a ways on your arm, and they tend to flop a bit at your fingertips. Some of the patterns found on mitts today are a relatively new development. For example, the X's and O's pattern from the nineteenth century was traditionally found on sweaters. Today it's been sized down to make women's mitts as well.




Unst Flowers Variation

MAKER UNKNOWN

Shetlanders call these natural colors "fauns." The flower star pattern is typical of designs from Unst, and shows Shetland shading and palm patterning, with a plain thumb and ribbing.

After ribbing, work Rounds 1- 4 of Chart C around entire mitten; work Rounds 1-25, then Rounds 2-25 of Chart A on back of hand while working Chart B on palm in colors indicated; work Rounds 4 - 1 of Chart C around entire mitten; continue with Main Color for length.






Lerwick X's & O's

MAKER UNKNOWN

The X's & O's pattern is the oldest Shetland knitting pattern, with roots in the mid-nineteenth century. From Lerwick, here's a mitten version in traditional colors.


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Diamonds Variation

MAKER UNKNOWN

This pair of exuberant mittens from Unst is a hybrid. Its creative pattern has elements from both a star and a diamond combined in a single pattern.




Norwegian Stars in Naturals

MAKER UNKNOWN

This pair of Unst mittens shows the traditional double pattern on the back with a Shetland geometric shaded palm. It has a predominately natural fauna color scheme but with high contrasts.

After ribbing, work rounds 1-6 of Chart C around entire mitten; work rounds 1-25, then 2-25 of Chart A on back of mitten while working Chart B on palm in colors indicated. (begin round 1 of Chart B, repeat rounds 2 and 3 for length, end round 4); work rounds 6-1 of Chart C around entire mitten, then continue with Main Color for length.



After ribbing, work rounds 1-6 of Chart C around entire mitten; work rounds 1-25, then 2-25 of Chart A on back of mitten while working Chart B on palm in colors indicated. (begin round 1 of Chart B, repeat rounds 2 and 3 for length, end round 4); work rounds 6-1 of Chart C around entire mitten, then continue with Main Color for length.






Ribbing: Work *4 rounds Olive, 4 rounds White; repeat from *twice, then work 4 rounds Olive. Begin Chart A with 5 White stripes/6 Olive stripes on back of mitten and 6 White/5 Dark on palm. Work thumb gusset as shown, inserting gusset in 2nd dark stripe on palm.

These fishermen's mittens from Yell are similar to Scandinavian fishermen's mittens, and have a long international history. This is a type of mitten Shetlanders knit for their own use, not for sale. They are meant for men, although this pair will fit a woman's hands. Usually these **gloves** were knit in black and white, so this color scheme is a bit unusual.


CHART A Back of Hand

31 Stitch / 29 Round Repeat

After ribbing, work round 1 of Chart A around entire mitten; repeat rounds 2-29 of Chart A twice on back of mitten while working Chart B on palm, using colors indicated, for length. Work thumb same as palm.

This is a classic Shetland

Norwegian Star mitten, with Shetland shading and a Shetland palm. Shetland mittens tend to be quite long, flopping over a bit at the fingertips, such as this pair.

Women's Fair Isle Fingerless Gloves

Traditionally both men and women wore fingerless gloves. They were ideally suited to people who used their hands in their work. Homes in Shetland didn't have any central heating, just warmth from the hearth, so wintertime was often bitter cold, even indoors. The women wore fingerless gloves so they could continue to knit despite the cold. Fishermen wore fingerless gloves on the fishing boats to keep their fingers free for removing fishhooks. Nowadays on Shetland, only women wear fingerless gloves, not the men. But they are growing in popularity among teenagers, who enjoy the warmth the glove offers while allowing dexterity of the fingers. Another reason for the fingerless glove's popularity is that it is much easier to knit than a glove with fingers. You don't have to worry too much about the fit of the glove and it takes a lot less time to complete.



BASIC WOMEN'S FAIR ISLE FINGERLESS GLOVES

SIZE:

One size fits most.

FINISHED MEASUREMENT:

Approximately 7 inches (17.8 cm) in circumference and 4½ inches (11.4 cm) from top of cuff to beginning of finger join.

MATERIALS:

100% Shetland Wool. (1 ounce [56 g] = approximately 150 yards [137 m]), 1 ounce (56 g) Main Color and small quantities of Contrasting Colors for chosen Stitch Pattern.

NEEDLES:

Set of 5 double-pointed needles Size 0 (2mm) *or size to obtain gauge.*

GAUGE:

36 stitches and 36 rounds = 4 inches (10 cm) using Size 0 needles in Fair Isle (stranded) knitting. *Take time to save time—check your gauge.*

STITCH PATTERNS:

See Charts.

Note 1: Stitch Pattern repeats vary. It may be necessary to adjust total number of stitches after the cuff to fit the chosen Stitch Pattern; check number of stitches needed before increasing.

Note 2: When chosen Chart(s) have been completed, continue with Main Color (or color of choice) for remainder of glove.

CUFF:

Using Main Color, cast on 54 stitches, distributed evenly on 4 needles; place marker for beginning of round. Join, being careful not to twist stitches. Work in knit 1, purl 1 ribbing for 2¾ inches (7 cm), increasing 8 stitches (or number for chosen Stitch pattern) evenly on last round. Total: 62 stitches (needles 1 and 3: 15 stitches; needles 2 and 4: 16 stitches).

HAND:

Change to Circular Stockinette stitch (knit every round), and Fair Isle Stitch Pattern of choice; work even in pattern established until piece measures 2½ inches (6.4 cm) above cuff. **Thumb Opening, Right**

Glove: Continuing in pattern established, work across needles 1 and 2; from needle 3, knit 2; then knit 10 with waste yarn; return these 10 stitches to needle 3, and knit 10 in pattern; knit 2; work across needle 4 in pattern. **Thumb Opening, Left Glove:** Continuing in pattern established, work across needle 1; from needle 2, knit 4; then knit 10 with waste yarn; return these 10 stitches to needle 2 and knit 10 in pattern; knit 2; work across needles 3 and 4 in pattern.

When piece measures 2 inches (5 cm) from waste yarn for thumb, (approximately 4½ inches [11.4 cm] above cuff), place all stitches on a circular stitch holder or waste yarn, keeping marker for beginning of round in place to separate back of hand from palm.

JOIN EDGE/FINGER SECTIONS:

Work knit 1, purl 1 ribbing for ½ (1.3 cm) to 1 inch (2.5 cm) to create finger sections as follows:

Little finger: With Main Color (or color of choice), pick up from holder and place on double pointed needles 7 stitches from back of hand and 7 stitches from palm. Total: 14 stitches. Work knit 1, purl 1 ribbing to desired length; bind off loosely in pattern.

Ring, Middle and Index Fingers: Working one finger at a time, pick up 8 stitches from back of hand and 8 stitches from palm for each finger. Work as for little finger.


THUMB:

Remove waste yarn; with Main Color (or color of choice), pick up and place on double-pointed needles 10 stitches from top and 10 stitches from bottom of opening and distribute evenly on double-pointed needles; pick up one stitch at each corner. Total: 22 stitches. Work knit 1, purl 1 ribbing to desired length; bind off loosely in pattern.

FINISHING:

Weave in ends neatly on reverse side. Steam block to even out stitches and obtain finished measurements.

After working ribbing, work Chart D once around entire glove; work Chart A on back of hand while working Chart B on palm; work Chart C around entire glove.

Snowflake


These fingerless gloves from Lerwick are highly unusual. The snowflake pattern is elongated, and the palm has a unique design. In addition, the all-natural grey shading with white is quite subtle and muted.

Celtic Knotwork

Shetland had no Celtic settlements, so the Celtic knot isn't a traditional Shetland motif. And yet, even with an asymmetrical format, the design of these gloves has transformed the Celtic knot into a very typical Shetland fingerless glove, in a traditional natural color scheme.





Although done up in bright colors, these fingerless gloves from Lerwick have a dainty, conservative look. The pattern of interlocking diamonds was developed in the 1950s on Shetland. It can now be found on a variety of garments, but its home remains the fingerless glove.


Cross & Crown

MAKER UNKNOWN

This is the first pair of gloves I bought in Shetland, at the Old Haa Museum on the Island of Yell. It was 1995, the weather was miserable, my hands were terribly cold, and these gloves were a godsend. I didn't know it at the time, but it turns out all the patterns and colors are traditional.




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Banded Christmas Star

This is a typical design by Wilma Malcolmson, with one pattern band on the back only and the other pattern going around the glove. More colorful than many of Wilma's gloves, it reminds me of Christmas, so that's what I named it.




Medallions in Aurora

Heathers abound in the unusual low-contrast color scheme of these fingerless gloves. Designer Wilma Malcolmson of Cunningsburgh, Mainland, often uses colors much closer in shade than ordinarily found in a typical Shetland glove. 





These gloves from Unst show a highly creative pattern in a traditional style. Although this pair is sized for a woman's hands, such gloves used to be made only for men working on fishing boats. The extra-long fingers were fashioned so that the men's fingertips were free to remove fishhooks.

Bairns' Fair Isle Gloves & Mitts

Unlike gloves and mitts for adults, those for children are bright and cheerful. Toddlers, about age two to three years, wear mitts with two bands of color. The older children of school age wear larger mitts, with three bands of color.

It's very unusual to find bairns' gloves, such as the pair in this section, because children in Shetland usually wear mittens. Mitts, of course, are easier to knit, and more practical than gloves since kids outgrow them quickly.

My friend, knitter Margaret Peterson of Unst, obtained the projects in this section for me. Alas, the makers are unknown.



BASIC CHILDREN'S FAIR ISLE MITTENS

SIZE:

One size fits most.

FINISHED MEASUREMENT OF HAND:

Approximately 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches (19 cm) in circumference and 6 inches (15.2 cm) long.

MATERIALS:

100% Shetland Wool. (1 ounce [56 g] - approximately 150 yards [137 m].) 1 ounce (56 g) Main Color and small quantities of Contrasting Colors for chosen Stitch Pattern.

NEEDLES:

Set of 5 double-pointed Size 0 (2 mm) *or size to obtain gauge.*

GAUGE:

36 stitches and 36 rounds = 4 inches (10 cm) using Size 0 needles in Fair Isle (stranded) knitting.

Take time to save time—check your gauge.

STITCH PATTERNS:

See Charts.

Note 1: Stitch Pattern repeats vary. It may be necessary to adjust total number of stitches after the cuff to fit the chosen Stitch Pattern; check number of stitches needed before increasing.

Note 2: When chosen Chart(s) have been completed, continue with Main Color only for remainder of mitten.

CUFF:

Using Main Color, cast on 50 stitches, distributed as follows: needles 1 and 3: 12 stitches; needles 2 and 4: 13 stitches. Place marker for beginning of round. Join, being careful not to twist stitches. Work in knit 1, purl 1 ribbing for 2 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches (5.7 cm), increasing 10 stitches (or number for chosen Stitch Pattern), evenly on last round. Total: 60 stitches, 15 on each needle.

HAND:

Change to Circular Stockinette stitch (knit every round), and Fair Isle Stitch Pattern of choice; work even in pattern established until piece measures 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches (4.4 cm) above cuff. **Thumb Opening, Right Mitten:** Continuing in pattern established, work

across needles 1 and 2; from needle 3, knit 9 with waste yarn; return these 9 stitches to needle 3, and knit 9 in pattern; knit 6; work across needle 4 in pattern. **Thumb Opening, Left Mitten:** Continue in pattern established, work across needle 1; from needle 2, knit 6; then knit 9 with waste yarn, return these 9 stitches to needle 2, and knit 9 in pattern; work across needles 3 and 4 in pattern established.

When piece measures 3 inches (7.6 cm) above waste yarn for thumb, (approximately 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches [12.1 cm] above cuff edge), begin shaping. Shaping will add approximately 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches (3.2 cm); adjust length if desired. *Work from needles 1 and 3 as: Knit 1; decrease one stitch by working a right slanting decrease (knit 2 together); knit to end. Work from needles 2 and 4 as: Knit to last 3 stitches; decrease one stitch by working a left slanting decrease (slip slip knit); knit 1. Repeat from **every* round 10 times. Total: 16 stitches (8 stitches for palm, and 8 for back of hand). Break yarn, leaving a 16-inch (40.6 cm) tail; using tapestry needle and tail, weave remaining stitches together.

THUMB:

Remove waste yarn; with Main Color (or color of choice), pick up 9 stitches from top and 9 stitches from bottom of thumb opening, and distribute evenly on double-pointed needles; pick up one stitch at each corner. Total: 20 stitches for thumb. Work even until thumb measures 2 inches (5 cm) or $\frac{1}{4}$ inch (6.35 mm) less than desired length. Thumb should reach middle of thumbnail before shaping. To shape thumb, (Knit 2 together around) twice. Total: 5 stitches remaining. Break yarn, leaving a 12-inch (30.5 cm) tail; thread tail through remaining stitches, going through each stitch twice; gather stitches together and fasten off. Thumb measures approximately 2 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches (5.7 cm).

FINISHING:

Weave in ends neatly on reverse side. Steam block to even out stitches and obtain finished measurements.

X and Cross


I have never seen anything even similar to this pair of children's mitts from Unst. It is probably a rare and very old pattern. Like all mitts for older children, this one has three pattern bands.







For a child's mitten, this color scheme is subdued. This pattern is a hybrid of diamonds, deriving from the old X's & O's pattern of two centuries ago. (See the women's glove version on page 62.)

BASIC TODDLER'S FAIR ISLE MITTENS

SIZE:

One size fits most.

FINISHED MEASUREMENT OF HAND:

Approximately 5 inches (12.7 cm) in circumference and 4½ inches (11.4 cm) long.

MATERIALS:

100% Shetland Wool. (1 ounce [56 g] = approximately 150 yards [137 m].) 1 ounce (56 g) Main Color and small quantities of Contrasting Colors for chosen Stitch Pattern.

NEEDLES:

Set of 5 double-pointed Size 0 (2 mm) or size to obtain gauge.

GAUGE:

36 stitches and 36 rounds = 4 inches (10 cm) using Size 0 needles in Fair Isle (stranded) knitting. *Take time to save time—check your gauge.*

STITCH PATTERNS:

See Charts.

Note 1: Stitch Pattern repeats vary. It may be necessary to adjust total number of stitches after the cuff to fit the chosen Stitch Pattern; check number of stitches needed before increasing.

Note 2: When chosen Chart(s) have been completed, continue with Main Color only for remainder of mitten.

CUFF:

Using Main Color, cast on 52 stitches, distributed evenly on 4 needles. Total: 13 stitches on each needle. Place marker for beginning of round. Join, being careful not to twist stitches. Work in knit 2, purl 2 ribbing for 2½ inches (5.7 cm), increasing for chosen Stitch Pattern on last round, if necessary.

HAND:

Change to Circular Stockinette Stitch (knit every round), and Fair Isle Stitch. Work even in pattern established until piece measures 1½ inches (6.4 cm) above cuff. **Thumb Opening, Right Mitten:** Continuing in pattern established, work across needles 1 and 2; from needle 3, knit 8 with waste yarn; return these 8 stitches to needle 3 and knit 8 in pattern; knit 5; work across needle 4 in pattern.

Thumb Opening, Left Mitten: Continuing in pattern established, work across needle 1; from needle 2, knit 5; then knit 8 with waste yarn; return these 8 stitches to needle 2 and knit 8 in pattern; work across needles 3 and 4 in pattern.

When piece measures 1¾ inches (6.4 cm) from waste yarn for thumb (approximately 3½ inches [8.9 cm] above cuff edge), begin shaping. Shaping will add approximately 1½ inches (3.2 cm), adjust length if desired. * Work from needles 1 and 3 as: Knit 1; decrease one stitch by working a right slanting decrease (knit 2 together); knit to end. Work from needles 2 and 4 as: Knit to last 3 stitches; decrease one stitch by working a left slanting decrease (slip slip knit); knit 1. Repeat from * every round 9 times. Total: 12 stitches (6 stitches for palm, and 6 for back of hand). Break yarn, leaving a 16-inch (40.6 cm) tail; using tapestry needle and tail, weave remaining stitches together.

THUMB:

Remove waste yarn; using Main Color (or color of choice), pick up 8 stitches from top and 8 stitches from bottom of thumb opening and distribute evenly on double pointed needles; pick up 1 stitch at each corner. Total: 18 stitches for thumb. Work even until thumb measures 1½ inches (3.2 cm) or ¼ inch (6.35 mm) less than desired length. Thumb should reach middle of thumbnail before shaping. To shape thumb: Knit 2 together around twice. Break yarn, leaving a 12-inch (30.5 cm) tail; thread tail through remaining stitches, going through each stitch twice; gather stitches together and fasten off. Thumb measures approximately 1½ inches (3.8 cm).

FINISHING:

Weave in ends neatly on reverse side. Steam block to even out stitches and obtain finished measurements.




Butterflies for Bairns

MAKER UNKNOWN

This eye-dazzling mitten from Unst has a butterfly pattern that just seems to want to fly away. Bairns' mittens typically have very bright colors. (See the women's glove version on page 89.)

BASIC TODDLER'S FAIR ISLE GLOVES

SIZE:

One size fits most.

FINISHED MEASUREMENTS:

Approximately $5\frac{1}{4}$ inches (13.3 cm) in circumference and 3 inches (7.6 cm) long from cuff to beginning of fingers.

MATERIALS:

100% Shetland Wool. (1 ounce [56 g] = approximately 150 yards [137 m].) 1 ounce (56 g) Main Color and small quantities of Contrasting Colors for chosen Stitch Pattern.

NEEDLES:

Set of 5 double pointed Size 0 (2 mm) *or size to obtain gauge*.

GAUGE:

36 stitches and 36 rounds = 4 inches (10 cm) using Size 0 needles in Fair Isle (stranded) knitting.

Take time to save time—check your gauge.

STITCH PATTERNS:

See Charts.

Note 1: Stitch pattern repeats vary; it may be necessary to adjust total number of stitches after the cuff to fit the chosen Stitch Pattern; check number of stitches needed before increasing.

Note 2: When chosen Chart(s) have been completed, continue with Main Color (or color of choice) for remainder of glove.

CUFF:

Using Main Color, cast on 36 stitches, distributed evenly on 4 needles; place marker for beginning of round. Join, being careful not to twist stitches. Work in knit 1, purl 1 ribbing for $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches (4.4 cm), increasing 12 stitches (or number for chosen Stitch Pattern), evenly on last round. Total: 48 stitches, 12 on each needle.

HAND:

Change to Circular Stockinette Stitch (knit every round) and Fair Isle Stitch Pattern of choice. Work even in pattern established until piece measures $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches (3.8 cm) above cuff. **Thumb Opening, Right Glove:** Continuing in pattern established, work across needles 1 and 2; from needle 3, knit 8 with waste yarn; return these 8 stitches to needle 3; knit 8 in pattern; knit 4; work across needle 4 in pattern.

Thumb Opening, Left Glove: Continuing in pattern

established, work across needle 1; from needle 2, knit 4; then knit 8 with waste yarn; return these 8 stitches to needle 2 and knit 8 in pattern; work across needles 3 and 4 in pattern.

When piece measures $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches (3.8 cm) from waste yarn for thumb (approximately 3 inches [7.6 cm] above cuff edge), place all stitches on a circular stitch holder or waste yarn, keeping marker for beginning of round in place to separate back of hand from palm.

FINGERS:

Little finger: With Main Color (or color of choice), pick up from holder and place on double-pointed needles 6 stitches from back of hand, and 6 stitches from palm. Increase one stitch on inside of finger to join. Total: 13 stitches. Work even until little finger measures $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches (3.2 cm) or $\frac{1}{4}$ inch (6.3 mm) less than desired length. Finger should reach middle of fingernail before shaping. To shape fingertip: (Knit 2 together around) twice. Break yarn, leaving a 12-inch (30.5 cm) tail; thread tail through remaining stitches, going through each stitch twice; gather stitches together and fasten off. Little finger measures approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches (3.8 cm).

Ring finger: Working as for little finger, pick up next 6 stitches from back of hand and 6 stitches from palm. Increase one stitch at inside of finger and pick up one stitch between ring finger and little finger. Total: 14 stitches. Work as for little finger until finger measures $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches (4.4 cm) or $\frac{1}{4}$ inch (6.3 mm) less than desired length. Finger should reach middle of fingernail before shaping. Shape fingertip as for little finger. Finger measures approximately 2 inches (5 cm).

Middle and Index fingers: Work as for ring finger, omitting increase at outside of index finger.

THUMB:

Remove waste yarn; with Main Color (or color of choice), pick up 8 stitches from top and 8 stitches from bottom of opening and distribute evenly on double-pointed needles; pick up one stitch at each corner. Total: 18 stitches for thumb. Work even until thumb measures $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches (3.2 cm) or $\frac{1}{4}$ inch (6.3 mm) less than desired length. Shape as for fingers. Thumb measures approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches (3.8 cm).

FINISHING:

Weave in ends neatly on reverse side. Steam block to even out stitches and obtain finished measurements.







This is a true Cunningsburgh Star glove with all naturals colors made with yarn from undyed fleece. It shows fine contrast between light and dark in a mixture of greys and browns. The cuffs, or gauntlets, as they are known in Shetland, have a peerie hearts pattern.





Also the background color has taken the place of the pattern color.






Traditional Allover

MAKER UNKNOWN

These specialty gloves from Mainland, called allovers, have been knit in the same design for at least fifty years, and are specific to Shetland. They are usually knit in very bright colors, such as this pair in yellow and brown. It's a difficult pattern to knit because of all the color changes, which requires very detailed stitching. See another version in the next project, Earth-tones Allover Variation.



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
