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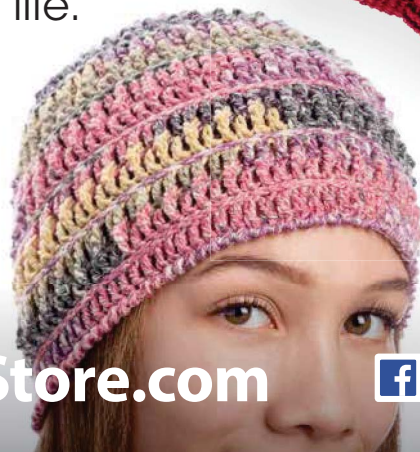


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A Note From the Editor

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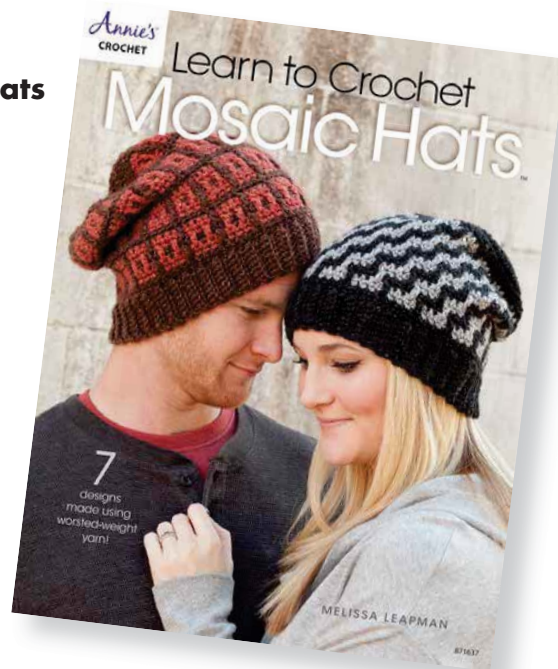

Book Review

Learn to Crochet Mosaic Hats

By Melissa Leapman
(Annie's, 2016, 24 pages, \$8.99)

Don't wait to learn mosaic color work! If you want to learn mosaic crochet but have been hesitant to try a large project, *Learn to Crochet Mosaic Hats* is the answer. Designer Melissa Leapman uses a simple colorwork technique to create seven dramatic hats. The patterns look difficult but are easily stitched using one color per row and a second row worked into the rows below to give the illusion of great intricacy. Clear instructions and photos will help you to make quick work of mosaic hats! The hats are written for three sizes each so they can accommodate the whole family. The Zigzag hat is especially stunning and would look amazing in multiple color schemes for either men or women.



Celtic Cable Crochet

By Bonnie Barker (Interweave, 2016, 128 pages, \$24.99)

Be inspired to create amazingly textured and rich projects with Bonnie Barker's latest book, *Celtic Cable Crochet*. This cable collection is the follow-up to Barker's previous book of Irish-inspired projects, *Contemporary Celtic Crochet*. In *Celtic Cable Crochet*, Barker thoroughly explores a wide variety of cable patterns in all projects from scarves and cowls to sweaters and wraps. In the past crochet cable projects had to achieve elegant drape with fingering- and DK-weight yarns. Barker pushes the limit and includes those smaller gauge projects as well as worsted- and bulky-weight yarns in eye-catching patterns. The volume includes full text instructions, symbol diagrams and 30 pages of process photos of cable techniques. This collection includes 18 projects with garments featuring techniques such as top-down round yoke and set-in sleeve construction. There is a large range of accessories, including hats, cowls, mitts, shawls, a shrug, a tote and more. Especially of interest are the luxurious Tic-Tac-Toe Messenger Bag and the stunning Blue Moon Shawl using Malabrigo Sock yarn.

Product Review

Knit and Crochet Now! Season 8 Is on Air

Exciting news! Get your crochet hooks ready for season eight of *Knit and Crochet Now!* Each week is packed with projects, tips, techniques and free patterns.

Thirteen brand new episodes will air on local PBS stations beginning mid-September and on Create TV mid-December of this year. Each episode will feature new crochet and knit projects—that's 26 new patterns!

We thought it would be fun to spend some time with Lena Skvagerson, associate producer, and learn a bit more about the TV show.

CI: What brought you to Annie's?

Lena: For five years I contributed to Annie's publications as a freelance knitwear designer. In 2014, Annie's offered me a job working part time as the coproducer of the *Knit and Crochet Now!* TV show, with my remaining time as the in-house designer for the Annie's Signature Designs collection.

CI: Give us a behind-the-scenes glimpse. How do you get ready for the show?

Lena: Work on a new season starts long before we start taping. Months before, we start planning the projects, writing patterns, stitching the sample projects and creating all the step-outs! That is a full-time job all by itself. Each project has to be made in stages, so when we tape, we can move from one step to another quickly.

When we tape the show, we arrive very early in the morning at the studio. The crochet and knit experts who will appear on camera meet up in the back room to arrange the projects and make sure we know all techniques involved. We then get our makeup and hair done by professional makeup

artists that work their magic to make us look our best!

CI: Do you tape one show a week?

Lena: Oh no, we tape the whole season in just a few days. Several episodes are taped each day. We take a short break for lunch, and oftentimes end up staying late if we need to do retakes—the pace is intense, but fun!

CI: You have a new role for the 2017 season. Tell us about your new job and what that involves.

Lena: I am now the associate producer overseeing the major stages of the *Knit and Crochet Now!* TV show, from the beginning planning stages all the way to the final production. I work with Connie Ellison, the new editor of *Crochet!* magazine, and together we come up with the themes and the projects, work with the yarn companies, select the guests, design the studio set and other numerous tasks—too many to even mention!

CI: Will you still be on camera?

Lena: Yes, this season I will continue to demonstrate projects and techniques, plus cohost the show with Connie.

CI: What types of projects and topics will be covered this season?

Lena: The show is divided into knit and crochet projects, and we'll also share a new technique each episode. We will talk about a wide variety of projects; everything from baby blankets, to cardigans, shawls, toys, slippers, hats and more.

CI: Can you share who the other guests will be on season eight?

Lena: Yes of course. We have returning guest Jenny King, and of course, you, Ellen. New this year is Meredith Crawford, One Sheepish Girl; Vanessa Wilson, The Crafty Gemini; Kristen Mangus, GoodKnitKisses; and Melissa Leapman.

CI: Thanks Lena! Can't wait to watch this season!

Take a simple stitch pattern and show off the yarn to its best potential. With the same lovely worsted-weight combination of 70% baby alpaca and 30% merino wool as the Eco Duo, the Color Duo adds an exciting range of colors that will accent any wardrobe. With Color Duo you will notice the softness of alpaca as well as the memory of merino, a must have for knitting or crocheting. Color Duo comes in 12 sophisticated colors.



King Cole Alpaca DK

Baby alpaca yarn is always on the front lines of luxury. King Cole Alpaca DK is a beautifully spun yarn from the first cut of the baby alpaca's coat. Soft and elegant, this yarn is perfect for cozy accessories and special occasion baby items. With 21 colors to choose from, the yarn comes in a nice variety of muted and sophisticated hues. Crochet with a recommended G/6/4mm hook for excellent drape and stitch definition. **C!**

EDITOR'S TOP 5 T!PS

TIPS FOR GREAT TUNISIAN PROJECTS:

1. After the forward pass, count the loops on the hook to maintain stitch count.
2. One forward pass and one return pass equal one complete row.
3. Take care not to lift up the hook too high on the first stitch of the forward pass so that one edge of the fabric is not taller than the other.
4. Fabric curling can be fixed with blocking if it is worked in a natural fiber.
5. Fabric curling can be helped by using a traditional crochet edging. **C!**

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Trellis Beanie

DESIGN BY AMY NIEZUR

A quick-to-crochet cap that works up from a single skein of yarn!

1 2 3 4 5 6 **CONFIDENT
BEGINNER**

FINISHED MEASUREMENT

19 inches in circumference at brim (stretches to fit various sizes)

MATERIALS

- Cascade Yarns Sunseeker Shade light (DK) weight cotton/acrylic yarn (3½ oz/246 yds/100g per hank):
1 hank #03 sparkling grape
- Size E/4/3.5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Stitch marker



GAUGE

Rnds 1–3 = 2 inches

PATTERN NOTES

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Work in continuous rounds. Do not join or turn rounds unless otherwise stated. Mark first stitch of each round.

Chain-3 at beginning of round does not count as a stitch unless otherwise stated.

BEANIE

Ch 4, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in first ch to form a ring.

Rnd 1: [Ch 3 (see *Pattern Notes*), sc in ring] 6 times. (6 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 2: [Ch 3, sc in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, sc in next sc] 6 times. (12 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 3: *Ch 3, sc in next ch-3 sp; rep from * around.

Rnds 4 & 5: Rep rnd 3. (12 sc, 12 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 6: *[Ch 3, sc in next ch-3 sp] 4 times, ch 3, sc in next sc; rep from * around. (15 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 7: Rep rnd 3. (15 sc, 15 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 8: *[Ch 3, sc in next ch-3 sp] 5 times, ch 3, sc in next sc; rep from * around. (18 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 9: Rep rnd 3. (18 sc, 18 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 10: *[Ch 3, sc in next ch-3 sp] 6 times, ch 3, sc in next sc; rep from * around. (21 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 11: Rep rnd 3. (21 sc, 21 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 12: *[Ch 3, sc in next ch-3 sp] 7 times, ch 3, sc in next sc; rep from * around. (24 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 13: Rep rnd 3. (24 sc, 24 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 14: *[Ch 3, sc in next ch-3 sp] 8 times, ch 3, sc in next sc; rep from * around. (27 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 15: Rep rnd 3. (27 sc, 27 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 16: *[Ch 3, sc in next ch-3 sp] 9 times, ch 3, sc in next sc; rep from * around. (30 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 17: Rep rnd 3. (30 sc, 30 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 18: *[Ch 3, sc in next ch-3 sp] 10 times, ch 3, sc in next sc; rep from * around. (33 ch-3 sps)

Rnds 19–26: Rep rnd 3. (33 sc, 33 ch-3 sps)

Rnd 27: *2 sc in next ch-3 sp, sk next sc, 2 sc in next ch-3 sp, sc in next sc; rep from * around, ending 2 sc in last ch-3 sp, sk last sc. (85 sc)

Rnds 28–31: Sc in each sc around. At end of last rnd, join in beg sc.

Rnd 32: *Ch 3, sl st in base of ch-3 (*picot made*), sl st in next 2 sts; rep from * around, join with sl st in base of first picot. Fasten off.

FINISHING

Block. **C!**



Aspen Gold Afghan

The interplay of gold, rust and light green woven with bands of dark blue mimics the flutter of aspen leaves in the wind.

1 2 3 4 5 6 **EASY**

FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

62 inches wide x 40 inches long,
excluding Fringes

MATERIALS

- Cascade Yarns Cascade 220 Heathers medium (worsted) weight wool yarn (3½ oz/220 yds/100g per hank):
4 hanks each #9449 midnight heather and #9564 birch heather
3 hanks #2429 Irelande
2 hanks #2453 pumpkin spice
- Size G/6/4mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle

GAUGE

6 shells = 4 inches; 12 pattern rows = 4 inches

PATTERN NOTES

Afghan is worked lengthwise from one side to the other with right side facing at all times.

4-inch tails at beginning and end of each row will become Fringe.

Work treble crochet stitches around tails at beginning and end of previous row to encase them.

SPECIAL STITCHES

Single crochet join (sc join): Place slip knot on hook, insert hook in indicated st, yo and pull up a lp, yo and draw through both lps on hook.

Treble crochet join (tr join): Place slip knot on hook, yo 2 times, insert hook in indicated st, yo and pull up a lp, [yo and draw through 2 lps] twice, yo and draw through rem 2 lps.

Shell: 3 dc in indicated ch-2 sp.

COLOR SEQUENCE

Row 6: Birch heather.

Row 7: Midnight heather.

Row 8: Birch heather.

Row 9: Irelande.

Rows 10–13: [Rep rows 8 and 9 alternately] twice.

Row 14: Midnight heather.

Row 15: Irelande.

Row 16: Pumpkin spice.

Row 17: Irelande.

Rows 18 & 19: Rep rows 14 and 15.

Rows 20–23: [Rep rows 8 and 9 alternately] twice.

Rows 24–31: [Rep rows 6 and 7 alternately] 4 times.

Row 32: Irelande.

Row 33: Birch heather.

Rows 34–37: [Rep rows 32 and 33 alternately] twice.

Row 38: Pumpkin spice.

Row 39–41: Rep rows 6–8.

Row 42: Pumpkin spice.

Rows 43–48: [Rep rows 8 and 9 alternately] 3 times.

Rows 49–56: [Rep rows 7 and 8 alternately] 4 times.

Row 57: Pumpkin spice.

Row 58: Birch heather.

Rows 59 & 60: Rep rows 57 and 58.

Row 61: Pumpkin spice.

Row 62: Midnight heather.

Rows 63 & 64: Rep rows 16 and 17.

Rows 65 & 66: Rep rows 61 and 62.

Rows 67–72: [Rep rows 57 and 58 alternately] 3 times.

Rows 73–78: [Rep rows 7 and 8 alternately] 3 times.

Row 79: Midnight heather.

Rows 80–104: Rep rows 32–56.

Rows 105–108: [Rep rows 32 and 33 alternately] twice.

Row 109: Irelande.

Rows 110–127: Rep rows 14–31.

AFGHAN

Row 1: With midnight heather and leaving a 4-inch tail (see *Pattern Notes*), ch 278, dc in 5th ch from hook (*beg sk chs count as first dc*) and in each ch across. Leaving a 4-inch tail, fasten off. (275 dc)

Row 2: With RS facing, sk first 2 dc, leaving a 4-inch tail, **sc join** (see *Special Stitches*) birch heather in next dc, *ch 2, sk 2 dc, sc in next dc, rep from * across, leave last 2 dc unworked. Leaving a 4-inch tail, fasten off. (91 sc and 90 ch-2 sps)

Row 3: With RS facing, leaving a 4-inch tail and **encasing beg tail** (see *Pattern Notes*) of previous row in first 2 sts, **tr join** (see *Special Stitches*) midnight heather in first dc 2 rows

below, tr in next dc 2 rows below, **shell** (see *Special Stitches*) in each ch-2 sp across, encasing tail of previous row in each of last 2 sts, tr in each of last 2 dc 2 rows below. Leaving a 4-inch tail, fasten off. (4 tr and 90 shells)

Row 4: With RS facing, sk first 2 tr, leaving a 4-inch tail, sc join birch heather in sp between tr and first shell of previous row, *ch 2, sc in sp between next 2 shells, rep from * across, working last sc in sp between last shell and next tr, leave last 2 tr unworked. Leaving a 4-inch tail, fasten off. (91 sc and 90 ch-2 sps)

Row 5: With RS facing, leaving a 4-inch tail and encasing beg tail of previous row in first 2 sts, tr join midnight heather in first tr 2 rows

below, tr in next tr 2 rows below, shell in each ch-2 sp across, encasing tail of previous row in each of last 2 sts, tr in each of last 2 tr 2 rows below. Leaving a 4-inch tail, fasten off. (4 tr and 90 shells)

Rows 6–127: [Rep rows 4 and 5 alternately] 61 times following Color Sequence.

FINISHING

Block to measurements.

Fringe

Cut 5 9-inch-long strands of midnight heather.

Fold 1 strand in half. Insert hook from WS to RS between first 2 sts of any corner, pull fold through to form a lp, pull ends including any beg or end tail through lp and tighten.

Rep to add Fringe between first 2 sts at each corner, pulling any beg or end tail through lp.

Rep to add Fringe to top of beg ch-4 of row 1, omitting reference to beg or end tail.

Beg with last Fringe made and tail of row 2, at the end of each row, tie each pair of tails tog with an overhand knot.

Trim ends evenly. **C!**

LEARN TUNISIAN CROCHET

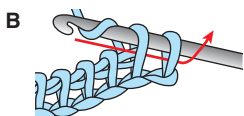
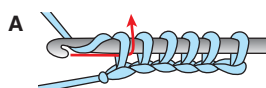
Stitches & Techniques

Learn Tunisian lace with this easy-to-follow tutorial.

Tunisian crochet can add so much to our crochet vocabulary, allowing us to explore many different stitches and create a variety of fabrics suitable for home items as well as garments of all kinds. Today I want to introduce three of my favorite Tunisian stitches.

To review the basics of Tunisian crochet: There are two “passes” required for each row of Tunisian—the forward pass and the return pass. On the forward pass, we “pick up” loops in the row, leaving one loop on the hook for each stitch made. On the return pass, we “work off the loops” (*see illustration*) that are on the hook. In fact, the return pass is actually a series of chains running through the loops on the hook. The forward pass creates vertical bars on the work’s surface, one in front and one just behind it. The return pass creates a long horizontal bar that runs all along the row.

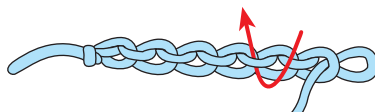


Work Loops Off Hook

The curious thing about Tunisian crochet is that we can get different looks on the fabric surface by inserting the hook in various ways on the forward pass. That’s why it’s important to

understand what’s meant by front and back vertical bar. In Tunisian simple stitch the hook is inserted in the front vertical bar, and in Tunisian Knit Stitch the hook is inserted between the front and back vertical bar.

In most cases the very first row in Tunisian is a set-up row where you pull up a loop in each chain of the foundation chain. I prefer to pull up the back bar in each chain (*see illustration*) just as I do in regular crochet. Some people like to pull up that loop in the back bump instead; neither way is better than the other, it’s just a preference. Try them both and see which you like better! Unlike regular crochet, there is no turning chain in Tunisian, so you always make the number of chains equal to the number of stitches needed in your first row.

The Tunisian baby blanket I designed for this issue uses the basket-weave stitch, which some people know from regular crochet. Basket weave, whatever technique one is using, depends upon contrast on the surface. If we arrange these contrasting surfaces one above the other, it results in the “woven” look. On this swatch, the contrast is achieved by

using Tunisian Knit Stitch and Tunisian Purl Stitch, alternating them in small squares. As you can see, it appears that the knit squares are woven under and over the purl squares. On the blanket the squares are larger, but the principle is the same. Before making this swatch (or the blanket), some practice with these two stitches is in order—each has their little quirks.

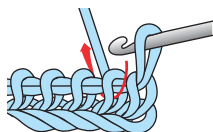
A crucial factor in any Tunisian work is to choose the right size hook—a large one! Tunisian crochet has a tendency to create dense fabric, and the best way to counter that tendency is to use a larger hook than you use in regular crochet. So, for example, if you are working with a worsted-weight yarn and usually use an I/9/5.5mm hook, go up two hook sizes when doing Tunisian crochet to a K/10½/6.5mm hook. If you normally choose an F/5/3.75mm hook for sock yarn, use an H/8/5mm when working it in Tunisian. This will greatly improve your fabric, lending it the desirable quality we call drape.

The three swatches shown on page 16 are all made with Berroco Weekend, which is a worsted-weight yarn. On the basket-weave swatch I used a size I hook, and for the other two a size J. Consequently, the first swatch has denser fabric, just right for a blanket, while the other two are more fluid and would work beautifully for a garment.

Tunisian Knit Stitch (**TKS**) is one of the most popular because of its

resemblance to knitting, but the Tunisian stitch creates fabric that is substantially thicker than actual knit fabric. It's the return row in Tunisian crochet that adds the extra layer absent in knitting. When we make Tunisian Knit Stitches, inserting the hook between the front and back vertical bar of the stitch, we push that whole return row to the back of the work. This not only makes the fabric thicker, but as there is more fabric on the back than on the front, the fabric tends to curl. But don't worry, there is a cure!

To make the Tunisian Knit Stitch, insert your hook between the front and back vertical bar of the next stitch, yarn over and pull yarn through (see illustration). That loop you just made will tend to fall in front of the work, but I recommend you pull it up, nice and loose, so that it sits atop the row before, not in front of it.

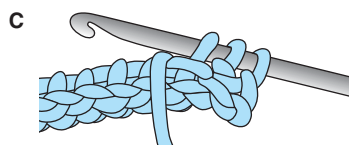
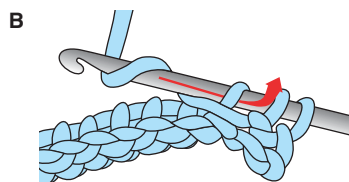
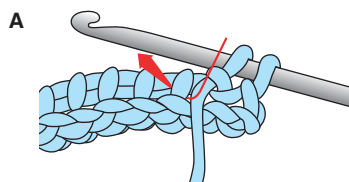


Tunisian Knit Stitch

Do this for each Tunisian Knit Stitch you make. When working the return pass, it's equally important to work loosely. As mentioned earlier, these are chains that create a horizontal bar through the loops on your hook. Rather than making each chain tight around the hook, pull each one out a bit. Working loosely on both passes is the best way to ensure you end up with relaxed, fluid fabric.

For Tunisian Purl Stitch (**TPS**), the yarn is brought to the front of the work instead of behind, unlike the usual position in crochet. Bring your hook behind the yarn and insert it in the front vertical bar of the next stitch (see illustration). For the yarn over, the yarn should come from behind and over the top of the hook, toward you. After making the yarn over, pull the yarn through the front vertical bar. If that

pull-through is difficult, it's helpful to hold the yarn in place with the thumb of the yarn-holding hand.

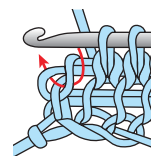


Tunisian Purl Stitch

While Tunisian Knit Stitch tends to be tight, the purl wants to be loose—a dilemma! But remember, you are in control of the tension on all your stitches and can tighten or loosen up accordingly as you work. As you make your purl stitches, give a little tug on the yarn after working each stitch—but not too much! Tug just enough to make the stitch look neat. If you tighten up these purl stitches too much, they will not match the size of the Tunisian Knit Stitches.

Remember that in Tunisian crochet, the loop on your hook at the end of the return pass is the first stitch of the next forward pass. That means you never actually make the first stitch, it already exists. This loop that starts each row has a tendency to enlarge, which in turn can make the whole right edge of your work a bit too big. To avoid that, give a little tug on the yarn before moving on to the next stitch on the forward pass. At the end of the forward pass, always insert your hook under two loops at the edge of the work (see illustration).

You can see them best by turning the left edge toward you and finding two loops that cross each other. Insert your hook just to the right of these two loops. Lefties will, of course, look at the right edge and insert the hook to the left of the two loops. The purpose of doing the last stitch this way is to create a firm and stable edge. If, however, you find this confusing or difficult, it's not crucial, so please don't fret. Once you become more adept with Tunisian crochet, you can always add this element of finesse.



Tunisian Stitch

Here are instructions for a Tunisian basket-weave swatch. Please don't worry too much about even stitches when you begin, but as you continue, you will see how much tension is required for the two stitches and how best to make them match in size. Another point to consider: You may find that it's hard to keep track of how many rows you've made, especially because the way you insert on the working row is creating the knit or purl on the row below. In this swatch we start with a set-up row, then work 5 rows beginning with Tunisian Knit Stitches, then the next 5 rows beginning with Tunisian purls. Mark the start of the new sequence with a stitch marker or short length of yarn at the starting edge to help you stay on track.

On all the swatches here, for the very last row of work we make Tunisian slip stitches to create a nice finish at the top edge. To remain in pattern, we insert the hook in the same way we did in the previous row, but as we pull up a loop for each stitch, instead of leaving it on the hook, we pull the loop through the next stitch and the loop on the hook. In this way we work off all the loops on the hook on the forward pass and don't need a return pass.

Try these stitches, and if you like them, experiment with different yarns and hooks to see how they affect the look of the stitches. It's amazing how different a stitch can look when worked with thinner yarn or different fibers. Unlock the great potential of Tunisian crochet with a little experimenting!

Basket-Weave Tunisian



TKS: Insert hook between the front and back vertical bars, yo and pull up a lp leaving lp on hook.

TPS: Bring yarn to front of work, insert hook in next front vertical bar, yo and pull up a lp leaving lp on hook.

Ch 25.

Row 1 (set-up row):

A. Pull up lp in the back bar of 2nd and each rem ch across;

B. return row—work lps off hook as follows: Yo, pull through 1 lp, *yo, pull through 2 lps, rep from * across. (25 sts)

From here on, all return rows are done as in row 1.

Row 2:

A. TKS in next 4 sts, *TPS in next 5 sts, TKS in next 5 sts, rep from * across to last 5 sts, TPS in next 4 sts, work last st under 2 lps;

B. work lps off hook.

Rows 3–6: Rep row 2.

Rows 7–11:

A. TPS in next 4 sts, *TKS in next 5 sts, TPS in next 5 sts, rep from * across, TKS in next 4 sts, work last st under 2 lps;

B. work lps off hook.

Rows 12–20: Rep rows 2–10.

Last row: Inserting in the same manner as last row worked, pull each yo through the next st and immediately through the lp on hook. Fasten off.

Tunisian Knit Stitch With Crossed Stitches



This stitch, which combines Tunisian Knit Stitches with crossed stitches, is one of my favorites. Use the same loose tension as discussed earlier when working each stitch, both on the forward and return pass. For the crossed stitches, we skip the next stitch, insert the hook in the front vertical bar (just like in Tunisian simple stitch) of the following stitch, then insert the hook in the front vertical bar of the skipped stitch, hence the cross. Here, too, if you work too tightly, you will find it hard to work into these stitches on the next row. Instead, as you create these loops, pull up on each one to make sure it's relaxed, not tight. Here, too, you might want to mark the starting edge to

help keep track of how many rows of TKS have been worked before making a row of crossed stitches.

Ch 20.

Row 1 (set-up row):

A. Pull up lp in the back bar of 2nd and each rem ch across;

B. return row—work lps off hook as follows: Yo, pull through 1 lp, *yo, pull through 2 lps, rep from * across. (20 sts)

From here on, all return rows are done as in row 1.

Rows 2–4: TKS across.

Row 5:

A. *Sk next st, insert hook in next front vertical bar, yo and pull up lp, insert hook in sk st, yo and pull up lp, rep from * across, work last st under 2 lps;

B. work lps off hook.

Rows 6–9: TKS across.

Row 10: Rep row 5.

Rows 11–14: Rep rows 6–9.

Last row: Inserting as to TKS, pull each lp through st and immediately through lp on hook in each st across. Fasten off.

You may find that this swatch tends to have a slant, and that is one of the peculiarities of Tunisian crochet. The repeated pulling in one direction on the return row is the culprit. The best way to correct this tendency is to wet block your work and pin it to eliminate the slant.

Little Fans



Our third swatch introduces another technique in Tunisian crochet, which involves doing something a little differently on the return row. Up to this point we've always worked the return row the same way, making a chain through each loop on the hook. To create the little upside-down fans you see on this swatch, we have to gather three of those loops together by pulling yarn through three loops on the hook at once. (Note that the instructions say pull through four loops because we also count the chain just made in the return pass as a loop). We don't want to change the number of stitches in that row, so what do we do? As you'll see in the return row instruction, we will put one chain on each side of those gathered stitches to maintain the correct count. Then on the next forward pass, we will insert the hook in the space below those chains; that is, under the horizontal bar, yarn over and pull up a

loop. We'll also pull up a loop just behind the three gathered stitches—you should be able to find a "back bump" behind them under which you insert your hook to pull up a loop.

To make a better finish on the top edge, instead of inserting the hook under the horizontal bar I inserted in the chains on each side of the little fans.

Ch 19.

Row 1:

A. Pull up lp in back bar of each ch across;

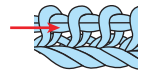
B. yo, pull through 1 lp, yo, pull through 2 lps, *ch 1, yo, pull through 4 lps, ch 1**, [yo, pull through 2 lps] 3 times, rep from * across ending last rep at **, [yo, pull through 2 lps] twice.

All return rows are worked as in row 1.

Row 2:

A. TSS in next st, *inserting hook under **horizontal bar** (see illustration) yo and pull

up lp, inserting hook in the bump behind gathered sts, yo and pull up a lp, inserting hook under horizontal bar, yo and pull up lp**, TSS in next 3 sts, rep from * across, ending last rep at ** to last 2 sts, TSS in next st, work last st under 2 lps;

B. rep as in row 1.

Rows 3–13: Rep row 2.

Last row: TSS in next st pulling lp through st and lp on hook, *inserting hook in next ch, yo and pull lp through ch and lp on hook, yo and pull lp through back bump and lp on hook, inserting hook in next ch, yo and pull lp through next ch and lp on hook, TSS in next 3 sts pulling lps through st and lp on hook, rep from * across to last 2 sts, TSS pulling lp through st and lp on hook, work last st under 2 lps and pull through lp on hook. Fasten off. **C!**

- Size J/10/6mm Tunisian crochet hook with cable or size needed to obtain gauge
- Size H/8/5mm standard crochet hook
- Tapestry needle



GAUGE

In stitch pattern with size J Tunisian

hook: 16 sts = 4¼ inches; 16 rows = 3½ inches

PATTERN NOTES

Weave in ends as work progresses.

Each Tunisian row is worked in 2 steps: the forward pass and the return pass to work loops off hook.

Each vertical bar of row 1 counts as a stitch. First loop on hook is counted as a stitch unless otherwise stated.

The working row always determines the look of the row before. When you see 8 rows of the pattern repeat on the work, make one more row in the same manner before changing to the alternate pattern.

You may find it easier to count rows from wrong side of work.

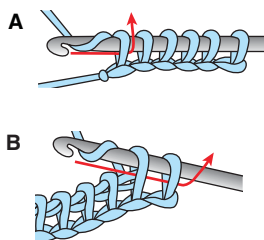

Rnd 1: With regular size H hook, ch 2, dc in next st as if to work TKS, [ch 2, **s-puff** (see *Special Stitches*), sk 1 st] across to corner, [ch 2, s-puff, working dc part of st in same st at corner] 3 times, rotate to work along side of

Blanket into row ends, *ch 2, s-puff, sk 1 row end, ch 2, s-puff, sk 2 row ends, rep from * to next corner, [ch 2, s-puff, working dc part of st in same st at corner] 3 times, rotate Blanket to work across opposite side of foundation ch, [ch 2, s-puff, sk 1 st] across to next corner, rep from * to starting corner, work 2 s-puff in same st as starting corner, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in top of beg ch-2. tip To maintain even gauge, pull up the TKS stitches loosely and tighten each TPS a little. When transitioning from TPS to TKS in the forward pass, keep first TKS a bit tightened.

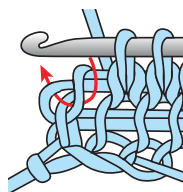
PATTERN NOTES

When counting stitches it is best to count loops on the hook before working the return pass.

Standard Return Pass is **work loops off hook** (see *Special Stitches*) and is used every row unless otherwise stated.

First stitch on hook counts as first Tunisian knit stitch in stitch counts, but is not referred to in the instructions.

The last stitch of every row should be worked as a Tunisian knit stitch, inserting the hook under 2 outer strands of yarn to back of work, and then pulling up the final loop (see *illustration*).



Last Stitch of Row

Shawl is worked in one piece from tip to tip. Tunisian Lace Diamond Pattern is worked along right side of shawl, while a crescent Tunisian simple stitch section shaped with increases and decreases is worked at the left side of shawl. A stitch marker separates the diamond lace border from the crescent increase section and is moved up with each row. Once pattern is established, marker may be removed if desired.

Bands of 2 Tunisian knit stitches with yarn-over spaces beside them separate design elements throughout this pattern. Tunisian knit stitches

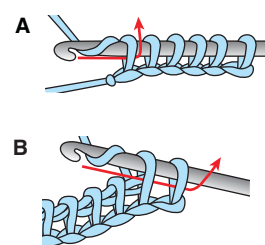
are always worked into those of the row below and the yarn-over spaces beside align atop each other. At the 4-stitch right-cross cable, the Tunisian knit stitch bands cross.

Wet blocking is essential to the final appearance of this piece both for gauge and to open the lace.

SPECIAL STITCHES

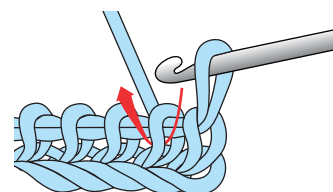
Work loops off hook (work lps off hook):

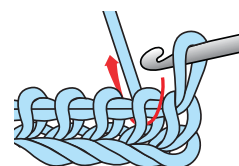

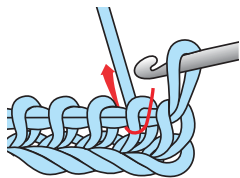

Back bar increase (BBinc): TSS in back vertical bar of st, TSS again in front vertical bar of same st (as in standard TSS), 1 st increased.

Triple Increase (TRPinc): TSS in back vertical bar of stitch, insert hook under back bump of horizontal bar above same stitch, yo, pull up lp, TSS again in front vertical bar of same stitch (as in standard TSS), 2 sts increased.

4-st Right Cross Cable (4RC): Forward pass:

Using helper hook, TKS in next TKS in next 2 sts, hold sts to back of work, sk next st (see note below), using main Tunisian hook, TKS in next TKS in next 2 sts, slide sts on helper hook to end of hook, and off onto Tunisian hook in front of 2 sts just made, 4 sts crossed.

Note: In Set-up row 2 only, DO NOT sk a st.

Row 5: TKS, yo, sk next st, TSS, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts, yo, sk next st, BBinc, TSS in next 3 sts, BBinc, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts, yo, sk next st, TSS2tog, TSS in next 2 sts, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts. (25 sts)

When working the row after a crossing row, it can be difficult to see where to put the hook. Pulling up on the return pass chain in this area will help to separate the stitches. Do not worry if pulling these stitches up stretches them out of shape—they will even back out.

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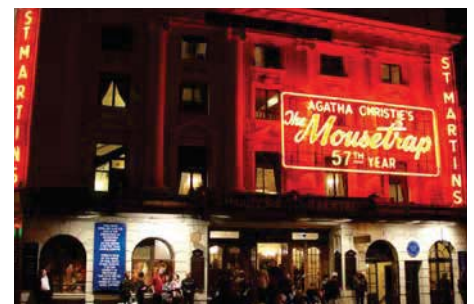

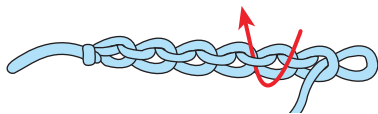

At the same time, to left of marker:

Row 3: Work BBinc in last st. (2 sts)

Note: St counts given to left of first marker.

Row 4: Yo, TKS in next 2 sts. (3 sts)

Row 5: Yo, TFS, yo, TKS in next 2 sts. (5 sts)

Row 6: Yo, sk next st, BBinc, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts. (6 sts)

Row 7: Yo, sk next st, BBinc, TSS, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts. (7 sts)

Row 8: Yo, sk next st, BBinc, TSS in next 2 sts, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts. (8 sts)

Row 9: Yo, sk next st, BBinc, TSS in next st, TSS2tog, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts.

Row 10: Yo, sk next st, BBinc, 2 TSS, TSS2tog next 2 sts, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts.

Place 2nd marker around return pass ch after TSS2tog and before yo space st. Move marker up in this position with each row.

Row 11: Yo, sk next st, BBinc, work TSS across to marker, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts. (9 sts)

Row 12: Yo, sk next st, BBinc, work TSS across to 2 sts before marker, TSS2tog next 2 TSS, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts. (9 sts)

Row 47: Yo, sk next st, BBinc, work TSS across to marker, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts. (19 sts)

Row 50: Yo, sk next st, BBinc, work TSS across to 2 sts before marker, TSS2tog next 2 TSS, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts.

Rows 51–74: [Rep rows 45–50] 4 times. (23 sts)

Rows 75–77: Rep row 17.

Row 78: Yo, sk next st, BBinc, work TSS across to marker, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts. (24 sts)

Row 82: Yo, sk next st, BBinc, work TSS across to 2 sts before marker, TSS2tog next 2 TSS, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts.

Rows 83–90: Rep rows 75–82. (25 sts)

Rows 91–96: Rep row 17.

Row 97: Yo, sk next st, TSS2tog, work TSS across to 1 st before marker, BBinc in next st, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts.

Rows 98–100: Rep row 17.

Row 101: Yo, sk next st, TSS2tog, work TSS across to marker, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts. (24 sts)

Rows 102–104: Rep row 17.

Rows 105–112: Rep rows 97–104. (23 sts)

Row 113: Yo, sk next st, TSS2tog, work TSS across to 1 st before marker, BBinc in next st, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts.

Rows 114 & 115: Rep row 17.

Row 116: Yo, sk next st, TSS2tog, work TSS across to marker, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts. (22 sts)

Rows 117 & 118: Rep row 17.

Rows 119–142: [Rep rows 113–118] 4 times. (18 sts)

Row 143: Yo, sk next st, TSS2tog, work TSS across to 1 st before marker, BBinc in next st, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts.

t!p When counting stitches, it is recommended to count the number of loops on the hook before working the return pass.

Row 144: Rep row 17.

Row 145: Yo, sk next st, TSS2tog, work TSS across to marker, yo, sk next st, TKS in next 2 sts. (17 sts)

Row 5: Ch 1, sc in each of first 4 dc, *working over both ch-1 sps, bobble in sk st 3 rows below, sc in next dc, ch 1, sk next dc, sc in next dc, working over both ch-1 sps, bobble in sk st 3 rows below, sc in each of next 3 dc, rep from * across to last st, sc in last st, turn.

Row 6: Ch 3, dc in each of next 5 sts, *ch 1, dc in each of next 3 sts, ch 1**, dc in each of next 7 sts, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, dc in each of last 6 sts, turn.

Row 7: Ch 1, sc in each of first 6 dc, *working over both ch-1 sps, bobble in sk st 3 rows below, sc in next dc, ch 1, sk next dc, sc in next dc, working over both ch-1 sps, bobble in sk st 3 rows below**, sc in each of next 7 dc, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, sc in each of last 6 dc, turn.

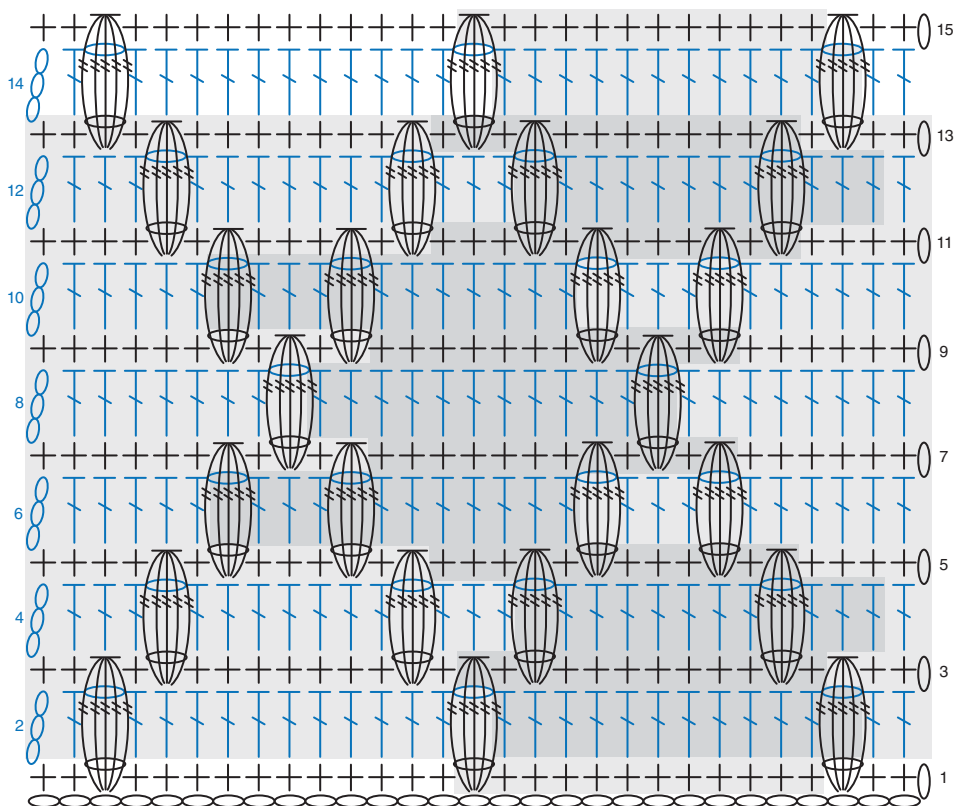

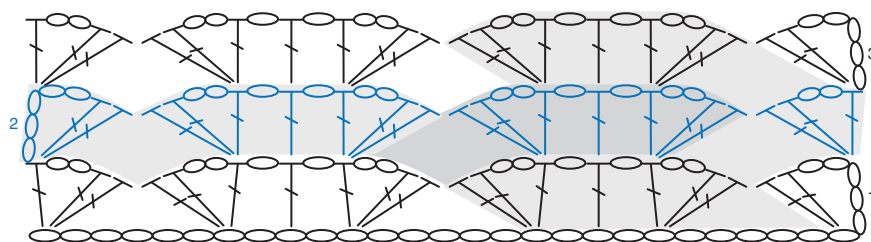

- Universal Yarn Bamboo Pop light (DK) weight cotton/bamboo yarn (3½ oz/292 yds/100g per ball):
5 [6, 7, 9, 9, 10, 10, 11, 11, 12] balls
#120 graphite
- Size F/5/3.75mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- ¼–½-inch decorative buttons: 4
- Tapestry needle



GAUGE

16 tr = 4 inches; 4 shells = 4 inches; 7 shell rows = 4 inches

PATTERN NOTES

Garment is worked from the top down by working front and back separately in two pieces down to the beginning of the body part. The body is worked in the round joining front piece to back piece as you work. Length can be adjusted by eliminating or adding rows to Body section.

Sleeves can be sewn shut on top if desired; add more buttons to sleeve opening if desired.

Chain-3 at beginning of rows counts as first treble crochet unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch where indicated unless otherwise stated.

SPECIAL STITCHES

Shell: (2 tr, ch 1, 2 tr) in indicated st or sp.

V-stitch (V-st): (tr, ch 1, tr) in indicated st or sp.

TUNIC

BACK BODICE

Row 1: Loosely ch 115 [123, 131, 139, 147, 155, 163, 171, 179, 187]. Use a larger hook if needed. Tr in 4th ch from hook (*this counts as first and 2nd tr*), tr in each ch across. (113 [121, 129, 137, 145, 153, 161, 169, 177, 185] tr)

Row 2: Ch 3 (see *Pattern Notes*), turn, tr in same st, *sk next 3 sts**, **shell** (see *Special Stitches*) in next st, rep from * across, ending final rep at **, 2 tr in last st. (27 [29, 31, 33, 35, 37, 39, 41, 43, 45] shells, 4 tr)

Row 3: Ch 3, turn, tr in same st, *shell in ch-1 sp of next shell; rep from * across, ending with 2 tr in last st.

Rep row 3 until piece measures 8 [8½, 9, 9½, 10, 10½, 11, 11½, 12, 12½] inches from starting ch. Fasten off.

FRONT BODICE

Work as for Back Bodice.

BODY

Working in the round, you will be joining the Front Bodice to the Back as you work.

Rnd 1: With RS of Front Bodice facing, sk 6 shells, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in ch sp of 7th

shell, ch 3, (tr, ch 1, 2 tr) in same sp, shell in each ch sp of next 15 [17, 19, 21, 23, 25, 27, 29, 31, 33] shells, with RS of Back Bodice facing, sk first 6 shells on Back, shell in each ch sp of next 15 [17, 19, 21, 23, 25, 27, 29, 31, 33] shells, join in beg ch-3 to complete rnd. (30 [34, 38, 42, 46, 50, 54, 58, 62, 66] shells)

Rnd 2: Turn, sl st in ch-1 sp of first shell, ch 3, (tr, ch 1, 2 tr) in same sp, shell in each shell sp around, join in top of beg ch-3.

Rnds 3–5: Rep rnd 2.

Rnd 6: Turn, sl st in ch-1 sp of first shell, ch 3, (tr, ch 1, 2 tr) in same sp, tr in gap between current shell and next shell, *shell in next shell sp, tr in gap between current shell and next shell, rep from * around, join in top of beg ch-3. (30 [34, 38, 42, 46, 50, 54, 58, 62, 66] shells, 30 [34, 38, 42, 46, 50, 54, 58, 62, 66] tr)

Rnd 7: Turn, sl st in first tr, ch 4 (*counts as tr, ch 1*), tr in same st, shell in next shell sp, ***V-st** (see *Special Stitches*) in next tr, shell in shell; rep from * around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-4. (30 [34, 38, 42, 46, 50, 54, 58, 62, 66] shells, 30 [34, 38, 42, 46, 50, 54, 58, 62, 66] V-sts)

Rnd 8: Turn, (sl st, ch 3, tr, ch 1, 2 tr) in first ch sp, V-st in next V-st sp, *shell in next shell sp, V-st in next V-st, rep from * around, join in top of beg ch-3.

Rnd 9: Turn, (sl st, ch 4, tr) in first ch sp, shell in next shell, *V-st in next V-st sp, shell in next shell sp, rep from * around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-4.

Rep rnds 8 and 9 until piece measures 31 [32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40] inches from

starting ch, ending with a rnd 9. Adjust length here if needed by eliminating or adding rnds, the bottom edge will add 1 inch to the final length.

Bottom Edge

Rnd 1: Turn, (sl st, ch 3, 7 tr) in first ch sp, sc in next V-st sp, *8 tr in next shell sp, sc in next V-st sp, rep from * around, join in top of beg ch-3.

Rnd 2: Turn, (sl st, ch 4) in first tr, [tr in next tr, ch 1] 6 times, tr in next tr, *[tr in next tr, ch 1] 7 times, tr in next tr, rep from * around, join in top of beg ch-3.

Rnd 3: Turn, sl st in next tr, sl st in next ch sp, ch 1, sc in same ch sp, [ch 1, sc in next ch sp] 5 times, sk next 2 tr, *[sc in next ch sp, ch 1] 5 times, sc in next ch sp, sk next 2 tr, rep from * around, join in first sc. Fasten off.

FINISHING

Sew underarm sleeve seam from outside edge to first set of shells.

Buttons

Sew tog the outer edge of each sleeve with a $\frac{1}{4}$ – $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch seam in from edge depending on the size buttons you are using. Measure $7\frac{1}{2}$ [8, 9, $9\frac{1}{2}$, $9\frac{1}{2}$, 10, 10, $10\frac{1}{2}$, $10\frac{1}{2}$] inches from outer sleeve edge toward center of neck and sew tog Front and Back with a $\frac{1}{4}$ – $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch seam. Additional Buttons can be added between these two spots as desired.

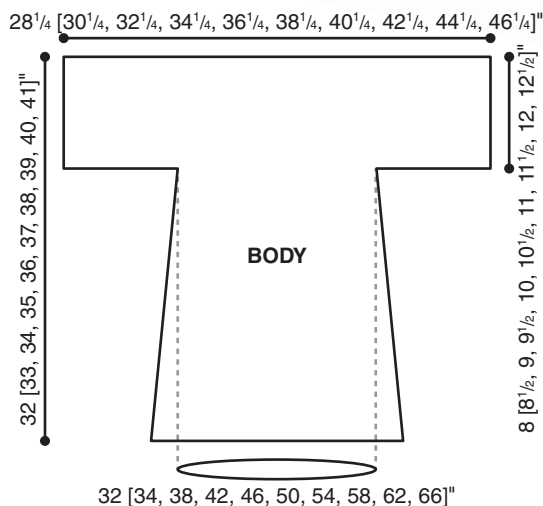

Next rows: Work in Pattern Stitch until piece measures 1 inch from beg. Place locking st marker on right edge of piece to indicate where Armhole Shaping will be worked.

Shape Waist

Next row: Dec 1 st at Armhole edge every 6th row once, then every 4th row once. (30 [34, 38, 42, 46] hdc at end of last row)

Next rows: Continue to work even in Pattern Stitch until piece measures 7 inches from beg, ending with WS row.

Shape Bust

Next row: Inc 1 st at Armhole edge every 4th row once, then every 6th row once. (32 [36, 40, 44, 48] hdc)

Next rows: Work even in Pattern Stitch until piece measures 15½ inches from beg,

ending with a WS row. Marker should be on right edge for RS row.

Armhole Shaping

Next row (RS): Sl st in each of first 5 [6, 7, 9, 10] sts, ch 2, work in Pattern Stitch across, turn. (28 [31, 34, 36, 39] hdc)

Next row: Work in Pattern Stitch across, leaving last 2 [2, 3, 3, 4] sts unworked, turn. (26 [29, 31, 33, 35] hdc)

Next rows: Dec 1 st at Armhole edge every row 1 [3, 4, 5, 6] time(s). (25 [26, 27, 28, 29] hdc at end of last row)

Next rows: Work even in Pattern Stitch until piece measures 19½ [20, 20½, 21, 21½] inches from beg, ending with a RS row.

Neck Shaping

Next row: Sl st in each of first 7 sts, ch 2, work in Pattern Stitch across, turn. (19 [20, 21, 22, 23] hdc)

Next row: Work in Pattern Stitch across, leaving last 3 sts unworked, turn. (16 [17, 18, 19, 20] hdc)



Next row: Sl st in each of first 4 sts, ch 2, work in Pattern Stitch across, turn. (13 [14, 15, 16, 17] hdc)

Next rows: Dec 1 st at neck edge every row 3 times. (10 [11, 12, 13, 14] hdc at end of last row)

Next rows: Work even until piece measures same as Back to shoulders. At end of last row, fasten off.

Right Front

Work same as Left Front except reverse all shaping.

Sleeve Make 2.

Left-Side Cuff

Row 1: With size H hook, ch 23 [25, 25, 27, 27], work row 1 of Pattern Stitch. (22 [24, 24, 26, 26] hdc)

Row 2: Work even in Pattern Stitch.

Row 3: Work in Pattern Stitch across to last 3 sts, hdc dec in next 2 sts, hdc in last st, turn. (21 [23, 23, 25, 25] hdc)

Row 4: Ch 2, hdc dec in next 2 sts, work in Pattern Stitch across, turn. (20 [22, 22, 24, 24] hdc)

Rows 5 & 6: Rep rows 3 and 4. (18 [20, 20, 22, 22] hdc)

Row 7: Rep row 3. Fasten off. (17 [19, 19, 21, 21] hdc)

Right-Side Cuff

Work same as Left-Side Cuff except reverse all shaping.

Joining Cuffs

With RS of both Cuffs facing, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in first st, work in Pattern Stitch across first Cuff, ch 1 tightly, work in Pattern Stitch across 2nd Cuff, turn. (35 [38, 38, 42, 42] hdc)

Sleeve Body

Next rows: Sk ch 1 on first row, work in Pattern Stitch and *at same time*, inc 1 st on each end of every other row 0 [0, 0, 2, 6] times, every 4th row 1 [4, 7, 6, 4] time(s) and then every 6th row 4 [2, 0, 0, 0] times. (45 [49, 51, 55, 59] hdc at end of last row)

Next rows: Work even in Pattern Stitch until piece measures 12½ inches from beg, ending with WS row.

Shape Cap

Next row: Sl st in each of first 5 [6, 7, 8, 9] sts, ch 2, work in Pattern Stitch across, leaving last 4 [5, 6, 7, 8] sts unworked, turn. (37 [39, 39, 41, 43] hdc)

Next row: Dec 1 st at each end of every other row 3 [4, 5, 6, 6] times, then every row 6 [6, 5, 5, 6] times. (19 [19, 19, 19] hdc at end of last row)

Next row: Sl st in each of first 3 sts, ch 2, work in Pattern Stitch across, leaving last 2 sts unworked, turn. (15 [15, 15, 15] hdc)

Next row: Rep last row. Fasten off.

FINISHING

Sew shoulder seams, leaving center 24 sts open for back neck opening.

Neckband

Row 1: With RS facing and size G hook, join with sc to Right Front neck edge, evenly sp 67 [69, 71, 73, 75] sc across to opposite neck edge, turn.

Next rows: Work in Pattern Stitch until Neckband measures 4 inches from beg. At end of last row, fasten off.

Fold Neckband in half with WS tog, loosely sew in place on WS.

Front Edging

Row 1: With RS facing and size G hook, evenly sp sc along Left Front edge, working through both thicknesses of Neckband, do not turn.

Row 2: Ch 1, working from left to right, **reverse sc** (see *Stitch Guide*) in each st across. Fasten off.

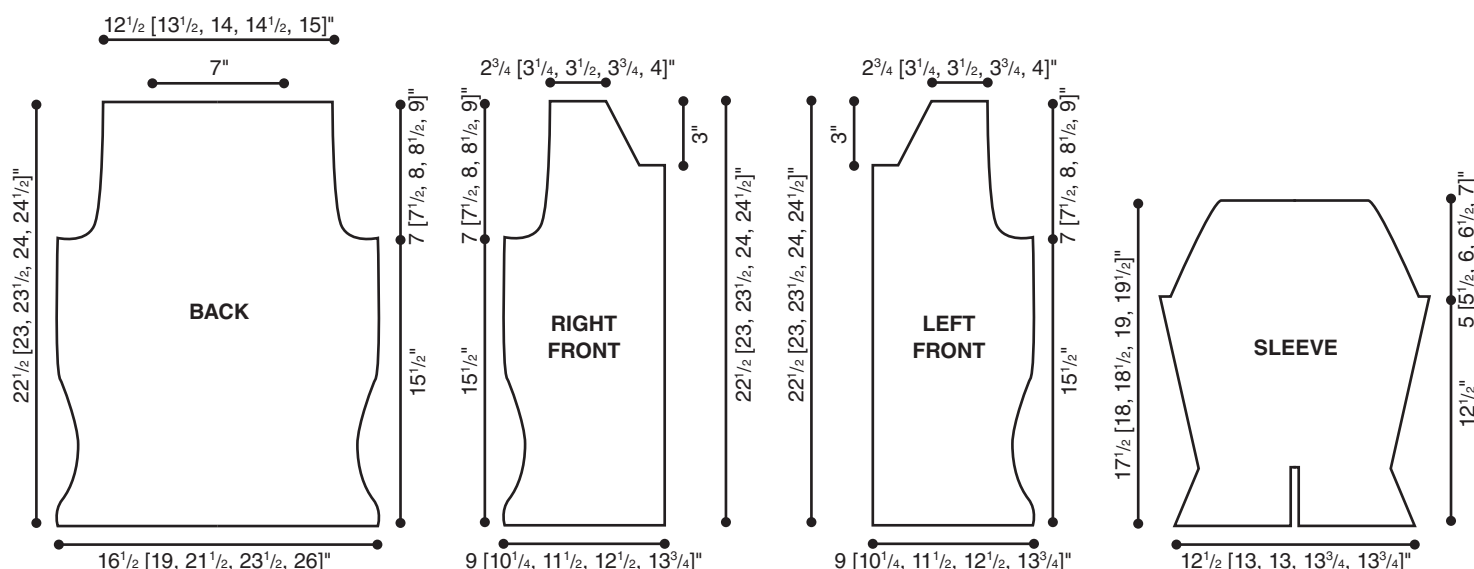

GAUGE

In pattern: 16 sts = 3¾ inches; 10 rows = 4 inches

Take time to check gauge.

PATTERN NOTES

Weave in ends as work progresses.

Chain-2 at beginning of row does not count as first stitch unless otherwise stated.

Last stitch of each row is worked between beginning chain-2 and second-to-last stitch.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

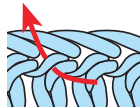

Back

Row 1 (RS): Ch 72 [80, 88, 96, 104], hdc in 3rd ch from hook and in each ch across, turn. (70, [78, 86, 94, 102] sts)

Place marker between 2 center sts of row 1 to indicate center Back.

Row 2: Ch 2 (see Pattern Notes), dc in lower horizontal bar (see illustration) of each st across, ending with dc in gap between last hdc and beg ch-2 (see Pattern Notes), turn.

Row 3: Ch 2, hdc in each st across, ending with hdc in gap between last dc and beg ch-2, turn.

Row 4: Ch 2, dc in lower horizontal bar in each st across, ending with dc in gap between last hdc and beg ch-2, turn.

Rep rows 3 and 4 until Back measures 18½ [20¼, 22, 24½, 26] inches, ending with a row 3. Fasten off.

Fronts & Collar

Row 1: Ch 59 [61, 61, 63, 65], sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, turn. (58 [60, 60, 62, 64] sts)

Row 2: Ch 2, hdc in each st across, turn.

Row 3: Ch 2, dc in lower horizontal bar in each st across, ending with dc in gap between last st and beg ch-2, turn.

Row 4: Ch 2, hdc in each st across, ending with hdc in gap between last st and beg ch-2, turn.

Row 5: Ch 2, dc in lower horizontal bar in each st across, ending with dc in gap between last st and beg ch-2, turn.

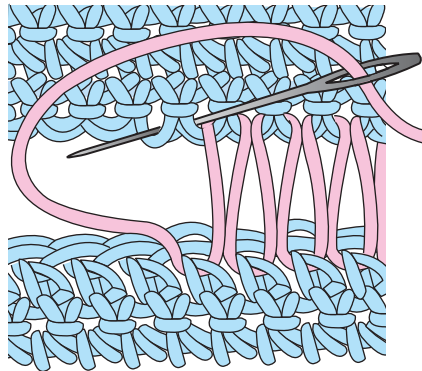
Row 6: Ch 1, sc in each st across, ending with sc in top of beg ch-2, turn.

Rep rows 2–5 until work measures approximately 53¾ [59¼, 64½, 71½, 76½] inches, ending with a row of sc. Fasten off.

Mark the middle row with a stitch marker to indicate center of back Collar.

ASSEMBLY

Line up center stitch marker from Fronts and Back; use stitch markers to evenly secure in place and sew tog with **invisible seam** (see illustration) using tapestry needle.



Invisible Seam

Mark the Back and corresponding edge of Front leaving 6½ [7, 7½, 8, 8½] inches from top seam to mark the underarm on each side. Line up the side edge to Back and secure with markers, using the tapestry needle to seam sides tog.



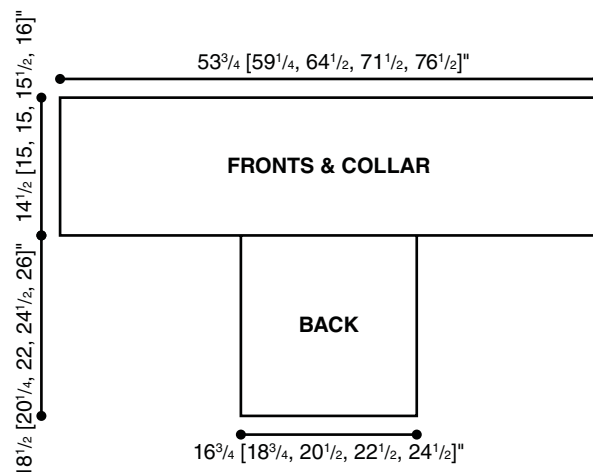
Edging

Row 1: With WS facing, **join** (see Pattern Notes) in bottom corner of Front, ch 2, hdc evenly in each st across, turn.

Treble crochet 2 together (tr2tog): [Yo twice, insert hook in st indicated, yo, pull up lp, {yo, draw through 2 lps} twice] twice, yo, draw through 3 lps on hook.

Medium shell (med shell): (3 dc, ch 3, 3 dc) as indicated in instructions.

Large shell (lg shell): (3 dc, ch 5, 3 dc) as indicated in instructions.

PATTERN STITCH Pattern

Row 1 (RS): Beg shell in first dc, sk next 2 dc, *fptr (see *Stitch Guide*) around next tr**, sk next 3 dc, **shell** in next ch-2 sp, sk next 3 dc, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, sk next 2 dc, end shell in 3rd ch of beg ch-3, turn.

Row 2 (WS): Beg shell in first dc, sk next 2 dc, *bprr around next tr**, sk next 3 dc, shell in next ch-2 sp, sk next 3 dc, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, sk next 2 dc, end shell in 3rd ch of beg ch-3, turn.

UPPER BACK

Row 1 (RS): Ch 40 [40, 40, 52, 52, 52], **2 dc in 4th ch from hook** (see *Pattern Notes*), *sk next 2 chs, sc in next ch, sk next 2 chs**, **shell** (see *Special Stitches*) in next ch, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, **end shell** (see *Special Stitches*) in last ch, turn. (5 [5, 5, 7, 7, 7] shells, 2 half-shells)

Row 2: Beg shell (see *Special Stitches*) in first dc, sk next 2 dc, *bprr (see *Stitch Guide*) around next sc**, sk next 3 dc, shell in next ch-2 sp, sk next 3 dc, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, sk next 2 dc, end shell in 3rd ch of beg ch-3, turn.

Rows 3–6 [3–6, 3–6, 3–8, 3–8, 3–8]: [Work **Pattern Rows 1 and 2** (see *Pattern Stitch*) alternately] 2 [2, 2, 3, 3, 3] times.

Row 7 [7, 7, 9, 9, 9]: (Beg shell, ch 2, 3 dc) in first dc (see *Pattern Notes*), work in established pattern to last st, shell in 3rd ch of beg ch-3, fasten off. (7 [7, 7, 9, 9, 9] shells)

Back Neckline

Row 1: On RS, working along opposite edge of foundation ch, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in first ch, beg shell in first ch, *sk next 2 chs, fprr around next Upper Back row 1 sc, sk next 2 chs**, shell in next ch, rep from * across, ending last rep at **, end shell in last ch, turn. (5 [5, 5, 7, 7, 7] shells, 2 half-shells)

Left Shoulder

Row 1 (WS): Beg shell in first dc, sk next 2 dc, [*bprr around next tr, sk next 3 dc*, shell in next ch-2 sp, sk next 3 dc] 1 [1, 1, 2, 2, 2] time(s), rep between * once, end shell in next ch-2 sp, turn. (1 [1, 1, 2, 2, 2] shells, 2 half-shells)

Rows 2-7 [2-7, 2-7, 2-9, 2-9, 2-9]:

[Work Pattern Rows 1 and 2 alternately] 3 [3, 3, 4, 4, 4] times.

Row 8 [8, 8, 10, 10, 10]: (Beg shell, ch 2, 3 dc) in first dc, work in established pattern to last st, shell in 3rd ch of beg ch-3, fasten off.

(3 [3, 3, 4, 4, 4] shells)

Right Shoulder

Row 1 (WS): On WS of Back Neckline, sk 1 unworked ch-2 sp from Left Shoulder, join in next ch-2 sp, beg shell in same ch-2 sp, work in established pattern across. (1 [1, 1, 2, 2, 2] shell(s), 2 half-shells)

Rows 2-8 [2-8, 2-8, 2-10, 2-10, 2-10]: Rep instructions for Left Shoulder. At end of last row, turn, do not fasten off. (3 [3, 3, 4, 4, 4] shells)

Row 1: Ch 4 (see Pattern Notes), sk next 2 dc, shell in next ch-2 sp, *continue working Pattern Row 2 across to last 3 dc, sk next 2 dc*, **tr2tog** (see Special Stitches) in 3rd ch of beg ch-3 and first dc on WS of Upper Back, rep from * to * once, tr2tog in 3rd ch of beg ch-3 and first dc on WS of Left Shoulder, rep from * to * once, tr in 3rd ch of beg ch-3, turn. (13 shells)

Row 2: (Beg shell, tr) in first tr, work Pattern Row 1 across to last st, (tr, end shell) in 4th ch of beg ch-4, turn. (13 shells, 2 half-shells)

([13, 13, 17, 17] shells)

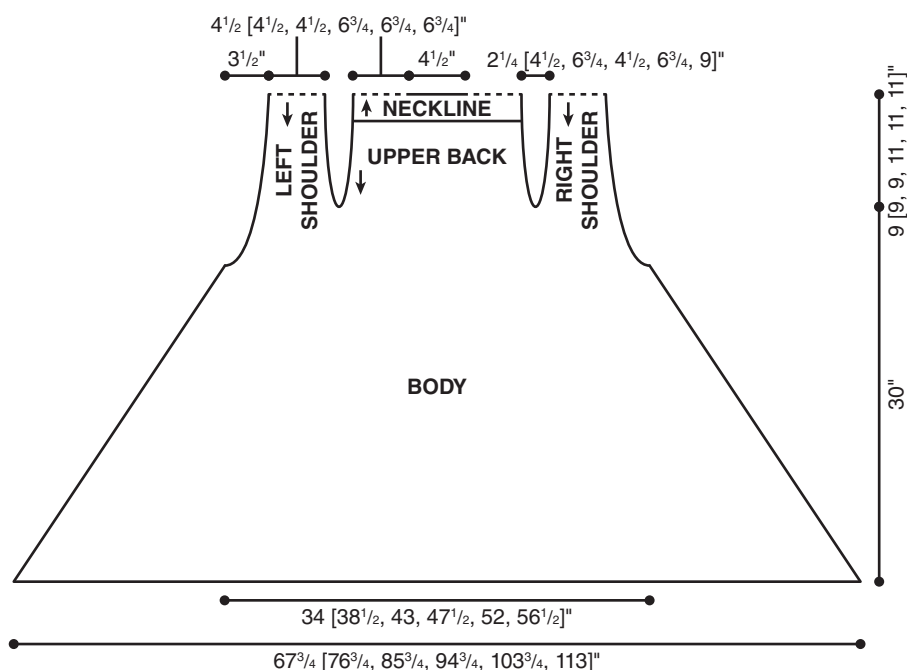

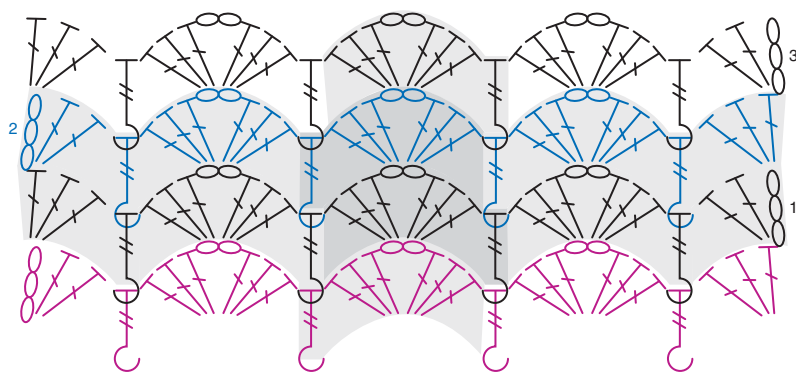

Row 42 [42, 45, 45, 49, 49, 53, 53, 53]: Sl st in each of first 7 [7, 7, 9, 9, 11, 11, 13] sts, work row 2 of Pattern across, leaving last 6 [6, 6, 8, 8, 8, 10, 10, 12] sts unworked, turn. (50 [54, 62, 64, 72, 80, 84, 92, 94] sts)

Rows 43–64 [43–66, 46–69, 46–71, 50–75, 50–77, 54–81, 54–83, 54–83]: Work row 2 of Pattern.

First Shoulder

Row 1: Work row 2 of Pattern across first 16 [18, 20, 20, 24, 26, 26, 30, 30] sts, leaving rem sts unworked, turn. (16 [18, 20, 20, 24, 26, 26, 30, 30] sts)

Rows 2 & 3: Work row 2 of Pattern. Fasten off at end of last row.

2nd Shoulder

Row 1: Sk next 18 [18, 22, 24, 24, 28, 32, 32, 34] sts on last row of Back, join in next st, ch 3, sc in next st, *dc in next st, sc in next st, rep from * across, turn. (16 [18, 20, 20, 24, 26, 26, 30, 30] sts)

Rows 2 & 3: Work row 2 of Pattern. Fasten off at end of last row.

LEFT FRONT

Row 1: Ch 18 [20, 22, 26, 28, 30, 32, 36, 38], work row 1 of Pattern. (16 [18, 20, 24, 26, 28, 30, 34, 36] sts)

Row 2: Ch 1, (sc, dc) in first st, work in Pattern across, turn. (17 [19, 21, 25, 27, 29, 31, 35, 37] sts)

Row 3: Work in Pattern across to last st, (dc, sc) in last st, turn. (18 [20, 22, 26, 28, 30, 32, 36, 38] sts)

Row 2: Work in Pattern across to last 2 sts, **sc dec** (*see Stitch Guide*) in last 2 sts, turn. (19 [23, 35, 39, 41] sts)

Row 3: Ch 3 (*see Pattern Notes*), sc dec in next 2 sts, work in Pattern across, turn. (18 [22, 34, 38, 40] sts)

Medium, Large, X-Large & 2X-Large Sizes Only

Row [1]: Sl st in each of first [6, 8, 8, 8] sts, work in Pattern across, turn. ([26, 28, 32, 34] sts)

Row 2: Ch 3, sc dec in next 2 sts, work in Pattern across, turn. ([19 [21, 35, 39, 41] sts)



Row 3: Work in Pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (18 [22, 34, 38, 40] sts)

Medium, Large, X-Large & 2X-Large Sizes Only

Row [1]: Work in Pattern across to last [6, 8, 8, 8] sts, leaving rem sts unworked, turn. ([26, 28, 32, 34] sts)

Rows 4–19 [4–21, 4–21, 4–23, 4–25, 4–25, 4–27, 4–27, 4–29]: [Rep rows 2 and 3 alternately] 8 [9, 9, 10, 11, 11, 12, 12, 13] times. (66 [70, 70, 78, 84, 86, 92, 96, 104] sts at end of last row)

Row 20 [22, 22, 24, 26, 26, 28, 28, 30]: Work in Pattern across.

X-Small, Small & Medium Sizes Only

Row 21 [23, 23]: Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, work in Pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (64 [68, 68] sts)

Rows 22 & 23 [24 & 25, 24 & 25]: Work in Pattern across.

Rows 24–61 [26–67, 26–67]: [Rep rows 21–23 consecutively] 13 [14, 14] times. (38 [40, 40] sts at end of last row)

Large, X-Large, 2X-Large, 3X-Large, 4X-Large & 5X-Large Sizes Only

Row [24, 26, 26, 28, 28, 30]: Ch 1, sc dec in first 2 sts, work in Pattern across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sts, turn. ([76, 82, 84, 90, 94, 102] sts)

Row [25, 27, 27, 29, 29, 31]: Work in Pattern across.

Rows [26–59, 28–65, 28–65, 30–73, 30–75, 32–85]: Rep rows [24 & 25, 26 & 27, 26 & 27, 28 & 29, 28 & 29, 30 & 31 alternately] [17, 19, 19, 23, 24, 27] times. ([42, 44, 46, 44, 46, 48] sts)

Next rows: Work in Pattern for 11 [9, 11, 19, 16, 19, 13, 12, 4] rows.

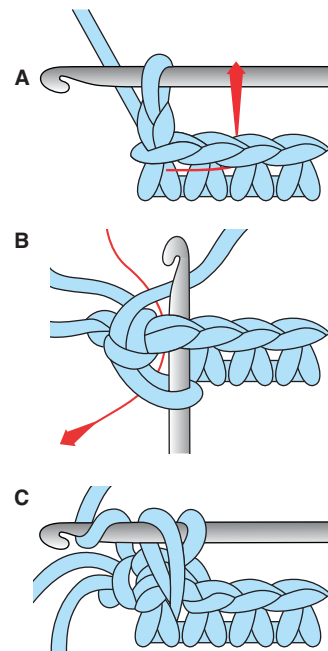

Make a statement with this eye-catching bag made with cotton worsted-weight yarn.

FINISHED SIZE

Approximately 14 inches wide x 10 inches high x 2 inches deep

MATERIALS

- Berroco Modern Cotton worsted (medium) weight yarn (3½ oz/ 209 yds/100g per ball):
3 balls #1651 Narragansett
- Sizes G/6/4mm and I/9/5.5mm crochet hooks or sizes needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Stitch markers



GAUGE

Size G hook: 14 sc = 4 inches

Size I hook in pattern: 3 sts = 4 inches

SPECIAL STITCH

Front post treble crochet (fp_{tr}): Yo twice, insert hook **from front to back to front around post** (see *Stitch Guide*) of st indicated, draw lp through, [yo, draw through 2 lps on hook] 3 times.

FRONT

Foundation row (WS): With size G hook, ch 44; sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each rem ch, turn. (43 sc)



Row 1 (RS): Ch 1, sc in first sc, 2 sc in next sc; sc in each sc to last 2 sc; 2 sc in next sc; sc in last sc, turn. (45 sc)

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in each sc, turn.

Row 3: Rep row 1. (47 sc)

Row 4: Rep row 2.

Row 5: Rep row 1. (49 sc)

Rep row 2 until piece measures approximately 10 inches from beg.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

BACK

Work same as Front until piece measures same as Front. Do not fasten off.

FLAP

Row 1: Ch 1, sc in next 3 sc; [sc dec (see *Stitch Guide*) in next 2 sc; sc in next 6 sc] twice; sc dec in next 2 sc; sc in next 5 sc; [sc dec in next 2 sc, sc in next 6 sc] twice; sc dec in next 2 sc; sc in last 3 sc, turn. (43 sc)

Note: Mark first and last st to indicate beg of Flap.

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in each sc, turn.

Rep row 2 until piece measures approximately 2 inches from beg, ending with a WS row. Change to I hook.

BORDER

Row 1 (RS): Ch 3 (counts as a dc on this and following rows), dc in each rem sc, turn.

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in each dc and in 3rd ch of turning ch-3, turn.

Row 3: Ch 3, *fptr (see *Special Stitch*) around next dc on 2nd row below; on working row, sk sc behind fptr, dc in next sc; rep from * across, turn.

Row 4: Ch 1, sc in each st and in 3rd ch of turning ch-3.

Row 5: Ch 3; *dc in next sc, fptr around next st on 2nd row below; on working row, sk sc behind fptr; rep from * to last 2 sc; dc in last 2 sc, turn.

Border Shaping

Row 1 (WS): Ch 1, sc in first 31 sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked.

Row 2: Ch 1, *fptr around next dc on 2nd row below; on working row, sk sc behind fptr, dc in next sc; rep from * across, turn.

Row 3: Ch 1, sc in first 21 sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked.

Row 4: Ch 1; *dc in next sc, fptr around next st on 2nd row below, on working row, sk sc behind fptr; rep from * to last 2 sc; dc in last 2 sc, turn.

Row 5: Ch 1, sc in first 13 sts, turn, leaving rem sts unworked.

Row 6: Rep row 2.

Row 7: Ch 1; sc in each st to ch-1 turning ch; sc in sp formed by turning ch-1, hdc in same st on row 4 as last sc of row 5 made, sc in each rem unworked st on row 5 to turning ch-1; sc in sp formed by turning ch-1, hdc in same st on row 2 as last sc of row 3 made, sc in each rem unworked st on to turning ch-1; sc in sp formed by turning ch-1, hdc in same st on row

5 of Border as last sc of row 1 made, sc in each rem unworked st on row 5.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

GUSSET/STRAP

Row 1 (RS): With size G hook, ch 253; sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each rem ch, turn. (252 sc)

Row 2: Ch 1, sc in each sc, turn.

Rep row 2 until piece measures approximately 2 inches wide. Fasten off, leaving a 10-inch end. Weave in other end.

ASSEMBLY

Sew short ends of Gusset/Strap tog. Placing seam at center bottom of Bag, pin edge of Gusset/Strap to lower and side edges of Front. With RS of Front facing you and with size G hook, sc Front to edge of Gusset/Strap. Pin rem edge of Gusset/Strap to Back between markers. With RS of Back facing you, sc Back to edge of Gusset/Strap; continuing on Flap only, sc evenly spaced along edges of flap.

Fasten off and weave in ends. **C!**

FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

Width: 32 inches

Length: 43 inches

MATERIALS

- Rowan Kidsilk Haze lace (lace) weight mohair/silk yarn ($\frac{3}{4}$ oz/229 yds/25g per skein):
1 skein each #632 hurricane, #597 jelly, #639 anthracite, #599 wicked
- Size J/10/6mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Size F/5/3.75mm crochet hook
- Matching sewing thread and sewing needle
- 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch wooden button: 1
- $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch wooden button: 1
- Magnetic clasp smaller than small wooden button: 1
- Tapestry needle



GAUGE

Filet lace: 8 rows = 4 inches

Solomon's knot lace: 4 rows = 4 inches

PATTERN NOTES

Weave in ends as work progresses.

Shawl is made as a simple rectangular block of double Solomon's knots and Filet lace. Maintain even tension over the Solomon's knots so they align with the Filet lace boundaries.

The edging technique has frequent changes in direction and uses a number of stitch patterns.

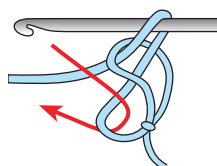
Chain-2 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of edging rows counts as first double crochet and chain-1.

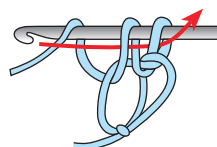
Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

SPECIAL STITCHES

Solomon's knot (s-k): Pull up a long lp on the hook to measure $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch, ch 1 through the long lp (see below), sc in back strand of long lp (see illustration).

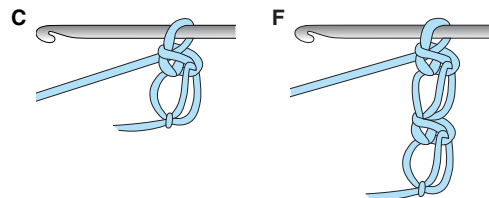
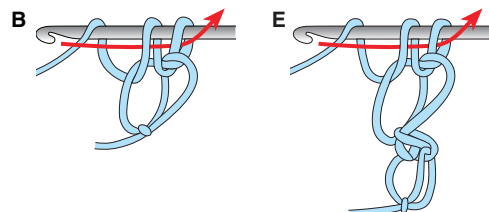
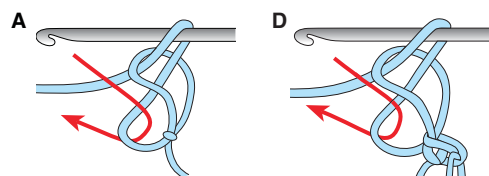

3-ch picot: Ch 3, sc in 3rd ch from hook.

WRAP

Row 1: With J hook and single strand of hurricane, ch 91, turn.

Row 2: Ds-k (see Special Stitches), sk 1 ch, sc in next ch, [ds-k, sk next 3 chs, sc in next ch] across, turn. (69 sts)

Row 3: 3 s-k (see Special Stitches), sc in center sc of next ds-k, [ds-k, sc in center of next ds-k] across, turn. (70 sts)

Rows 4–9: Rep row 3, finishing with 1 extra s-k at end of row 9, turn. (71 sts)

Row 10: Ch 2 (counts as first sc and ch-1), sc in center of next ds-k, [ch 3, sc in center of next ds-k] across, turn. (91 sts)

Row 11: Ch 2 (see Pattern Notes), [ch 1, dc in next ch-3 sp, ch 1, dc in next sc] to last 2 sts, ch 1, dc in last sc, turn. (91 sts)

Row 12: Ch 2, [ch 1, dc in next dc] across, turn. (91 sts)

Rows 13 & 14: Rep 12th row, turn. (91 sts)

Row 15: Ds-k, sc in next dc, [ds-k, sk 1 dc, sc in next dc] across, turn.

Rows 16 & 17: Rep row 3. **Change color** (see *Stitch Guide*) to jelly in last st of row 17.

Rows 18–25: Rep row 3. Change color to anthracite in last st of row 25.

Row 26: Rep row 3, finishing with 1 extra s-k at end of row 26, turn.

Row 27: Rep row 10, turn. (91 sts)

Row 28: Rep row 11, turn.

Row 29: Ch 3, dc in next dc, [ch 2, sc in next dc, ch 2, dc in next dc, ch 3, sk 1 dc, dc in next dc] across, turn. (113 sts)

Row 30: Ch 2, [ch 2, sc in next ch-3 sp, ch 2, dc in next dc, ch 3, dc in next dc] to last 2 sts, ch 1, dc in last dc, turn.

Row 31: Ch 3, dc in next dc, [ch 2, sc in next ch-3 sp, ch 2, dc in next dc, ch 3, dc in next dc] across, turn.

Rows 32 & 33: Rep rows 30 and 31, turn.

Row 34: Ch 2, [ch 1, dc in next ch-3 sp, ch 1, dc in next dc, ch 1, dc in next sc, ch 1, dc in next dc] to last 2 sts, ch 1, dc in last dc, turn. (91 sts)

Row 35: Rep row 15, turn, changing color to hurricane in last st.

Rows 36–38: Rep row 3. (70 sts) Change color to wicked in last st of row 38.

Rows 39–43: Rep row 3, finishing with 1 extra s-k at end of 43rd row, turn. (71 sts)

Rows 44–47: Rep rows 27–30 (omitting color changes), turn.

Row 48: Ch 2, ch 1, dc in next dc, [ch 1, dc in next ch-3 sp, ch 1, dc in next dc, ch 1, dc in next sc, ch 1, dc in next dc] across. Do not fasten off. Rotate 90 degrees for edging side A.

EDGING

Edging direction changes frequently. Each side of the shawl will be noted as A, B, C and D as per Assembly Diagram to direct each row.

Row 1: To work side A, start at corner E, **ch 3** (see *Pattern Notes*), dc in same place as last dc

of row 48, ch 1, dc end of row 46, ch 1, dc in end of row 45, ch 1, dc in end of row 44, [ch 1, dc under 2 strands of next **long-lp** (see *Special Stitches*), ch 1, dc in next sc] 9 times, ch 1, dc in end of row 33, [ch 1, dc in end of next row] 6 times, [ch 1, dc under 2 strands of next long-lp, ch 1, dc in next sc] 12 times, ch 1, dc in end of row 13, [ch 1, dc in end of next row] 3 times, [ch 1, dc under 2 strands of next long-lp, ch 1, dc in next sc] 8 times, rotate 90 degrees to work side B. (147 sts)

Row 2: At corner F, ch 3, dc in same st as last dc to turn corner, [ch 1, sk 1 ch, dc in next ch] across, turn. (93 sts)

Row 3 (side B): Ch 3, dc in next dc, [ch 2, sc in next dc, ch 2, dc in next dc, ch 3, sk next dc, dc in next dc] to last 2 sts, ch 1, dc in last 2nd ch of beg ch-3, change to anthracite in last st, turn. (115 sts)

Row 4 (side B): Ch 3, dc in next dc, [ch 2, sc in next ch-3 sp, ch 2, dc in next dc, ch 3, dc in next dc] to last 2 sts, ch 1, dc in 2nd ch of beg ch-3, rotate 90 degrees for side C.

Row 5 (side C): Ch 3, dc in same st as last dc to turn corner, ch 1, work row of [dc, ch 1] 75 times in similar fashion as Row 1, finishing with dc in end of row 48 of main body, change to color wicked in last st, turn. (153 sts)

Row 6 (side C): Ch 2, [ch 1, dc in next dc] twice, [ch 2, sc in next dc, ch 2, dc in next dc, ch 3, sk 1 dc, dc in next dc] to last 4 sts, [ch 1, dc in next dc] twice, turn. (189 sts)

Rows 7–9 (side C): Rep row 6, changing to color jelly in last st of row 9, turn.

Row 10 (side C): Ch 2, [ch 1, dc in next dc] twice, [ch 1, dc in next ch-3 sp, ch 1, dc in next dc, ch 1, dc in next sc, ch 1, dc in next dc] to last 4 sts, [ch 1, dc in next dc] twice. Fasten off.

Row 11 (side B): With jelly, join at corner F in 2nd ch of row 4, ch 3, dc in next dc, [ch 1, dc in next sc, ch 1, dc in next dc, ch 1, dc in next ch-3 sp, ch 1, dc in next dc] to last 14 sts, [ch 1, dc in next dc] across, change color to hurricane in last st, rotate 90 degrees for side C. (105 sts)

Row 12 (side C): Ch 3, dc in same st to turn the corner, [ch 1, dc in next dc] across, turn. (155 sts)

Row 13 (side C): [Ch 6, sk 1 dc, sc in next dc] to last 2 sts, ch 6, sc in last dc, turn. (273 sts)

Row 14 (side C): Ch 1, [(3 hdc, 3-ch picot—see *Special Stitches*, 3 hdc) in next ch-6 sp] across, rotate 90 degrees for side D. (274 sts)

Row 15 (side D): Ch 2, 3-ch picot, [(ch 1, dc in next dc) 4 times, 3-ch picot] to last 2 dc, ch 1, dc in next dc, ch 1, [dc, ch 1, dc, 3-ch picot, ch 1, dc] in last st, ch 1, change color to wicked in last st, rotate 90 degrees for side A. (130 sts)

Row 16 (side A): Ch 3, sc to 2nd ch of Edging Row 1, side A, ch 4, sk 1 dc, sc in next dc Edging Row 1 side A, ch 3, turn, dc in first ch made, ch 5, dc in first ch made, turn, ch 4, [(4 dtr—see *Stitch Guide*, ch 5, sc in 3rd ch from hook, ch 2) in ch-5 sp] twice, (4 dtr, ch 3, 4 dtr) in same ch-5 sp, ch 2, dtr in last sc made into edging row, sk 1 dc, sc in next dc of Edging Row 1 side A, **ch 4, sk next dc, sc in next dc Edging Row 1 side A, ch 3, turn, dc in ch-3 sp of previous motif, ch 5, dc in same ch-3 sp, turn, ch 4, [(4 dtr, ch 5, sc in 3rd ch from hook, ch 2) in ch-5 sp] twice, (4 dtr, ch 3, 4 dtr) in same ch-5 sp, ch 2, dtr in last sc made into edging row, sk 1 dc, sc in next dc Edging Row 1 side A, rep from ** 19 times across, change color to jelly in last sc made in 2nd ch of Edging Row 11 Side B, rotate 90 degrees for side B. (20 leafy motifs)

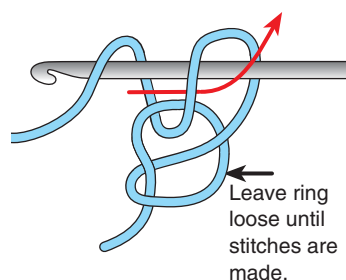
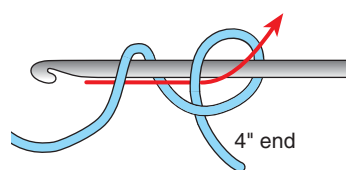

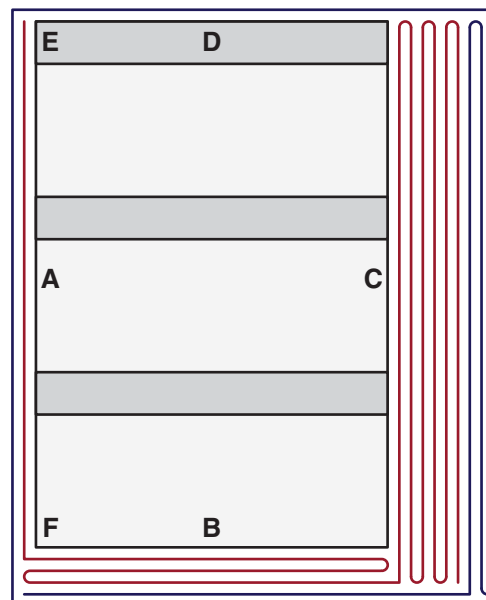

A. Ch 1, *sl next st onto hook, TDC (see *Special Stitches*) in next st; rep from * across,

Row 3:

A. TPS (see *Special Stitches*) in each st across,

B. change color to mushroom, work lps off hook.

Row 4:

A. *Insert hook in horizontal top bar of next st, yo and pull up a lp, sl next st onto hook; rep from * across, TSS in last st,

B. change color to terra, work off lps as normal.

Next Rows: [Rep rows 2–4] 28 times total or to desired length.

Next Rows: Rep rows 2 and 3.

Last Row: Sl st in horizontal top bar of each st across, fasten off.

Edging

Rnd 1: With RS facing and size H crochet hook, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) mushroom in corner of cowl, *sc evenly along edge of cowl, working 3 sc in corner, rep from * around, join in first sc, turn.

Rnd 2: Ch 1, *sc in each sc across to corner, 3 sc in corner, rep from * around, join in first sc, turn.

Rnd 3: Sl st in each sc around, do not turn.

Rnd 4 (optional): Sl st in each sc around on rnd 1 as follows: hold yarn to back of work and sl st through fabric. This will embroider a 2nd line of sts around cowl.

Fasten off.

FINISHING

Pin cowl to finished measurements, spray with water and allow to dry. Sew buttons evenly along 1 short edge. Place a pin in opposite short edge to mark placement for toggles.

Toggles

Join mushroom 1½ inches away from edge of fabric by holding yarn on underside, **surface sl st** (see *Special Stitches*) in straight line to edge of cowl, ch 7, surface sl st back to 1 st away from first surface sl st, turn, working in sts just made, sl st in each sl st and ch across. Fasten off. **C!**

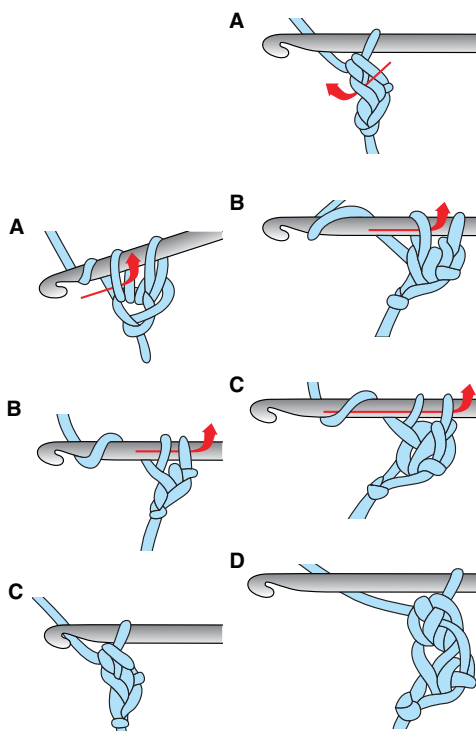

Rnd 1: Ch 3 (*see Pattern Notes*), dc in next st, [ch 2, sk 2 sts, dc in next st, ch 2, sk 2 sts, dc in each of next 3 sts] 37 times, ch 2, sk 2 sts, dc in next st, ch 2, sk 2 sts, dc in final st, join in top of beg ch-3, turn. (152 dc, 76 ch-2 sps)

Rnds 2 & 3: Ch 3, dc in each dc, ch 2 above each ch-2 sp, join in top of beg ch-3, turn.

Rnd 4: Ch 3, dc in each dc, ch 2 above each ch-2 sp, join in top of beg ch-3, sl st in next dc, turn.

Rnd 5: Beg cl (see *Special Stitches*) in next 2 dc, [ch 2, **V-st** (see *Special Stitches*) in next dc, ch 2, **cl** (see *Special Stitches*) in next 3 dc] 37 times, ch 2, V-st in next dc, ch 2, join in top of beg cl, sl st in next ch-2 sp, turn. (38 cls, 38 V-sts, 76 ch-2 sps)

Rnd 6: Beg cl in first cl and next ch-2 sp, [ch 2, V-st in ch-2 sp of next V-st, ch 2, cl in next ch-2 sp, next cl, and next ch-2 sp] 37 times, ch 2, V-st in ch-2 sp of next V-st, ch 2, join in top of beg cl, turn.

Rnd 7: Ch 1, sc in same st as joining, *ch 2, **lg V-st** (see *Special Stitches*) in ch-2 sp of next V-st, ch 2**, sc in next cl, rep from * around, ending last rep at **, join in beg sc. Fasten off. (38 sc, 38 lg V-sts)

Rnd 8 (RS): With RS facing, join natural in same st as joining of Rnd 7, *working in next lg V-st, [ch 1, **sm cl** (see *Special Stitches*)] twice in first ch-2 sp, ch 1, sm cl in next dc, [ch 1, sm cl] twice in last ch-2 sp, rep from * around, ch 1, join in beg sl st, turn. (190 sm cl, 191 ch-1 sps)

Rnd 3: Ch 5, [dc in next ch sp, ch 2] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-5. (66 [71, 74, 76] sps)

Rnd 4: Ch 3, 3 [2, 2, 3] dc in first sp, 3 dc in each of next 0 [1, 1, 0] sp(s), [2 dc in next sp, 3 dc in each of next 4 {2, 2, 2} sps] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (186 [190, 198, 204] dc)

Circle measures approximately 18 [19, 19½, 20½] inches in diameter.

Rnd 6: Ch 1, 1 sc in each of next 22 [21, 24, 26] sts, {dc in each of next 14 [15, 15, 15] dc, 2 dc in next dc} 10 times, 1 sc in each of rem 23 [22, 25, 27] sts, join in first ch at beg of rnd. (206 [214, 220, 224] sts)

Rnd 7: Ch 1, 1 sc in each of next 27 [26, 29, 31] sts, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 14 [15, 15, 15] dc] 10 times, 1 sc in each of rem 28 [27, 30, 32] sts, join in first ch at beg of rnd. (216 [224, 230, 234] sts)

Size 4 ends here.

Rnd [8]: Ch 1, 1 sc in each of next [31, 34, 36] sts, [dc in each of next [15, 15, 16] dc, 2 dc in next dc] 10 times, 1 sc in each of rem [32, 35, 37] sts, join in first ch at beg of rnd. ([234, 240, 244] sts)

Size 6 ends here.

Rnd [9]: Ch 1, 1 sc in each of next 41 sts, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 12 dc] 12 times, 1 sc in each of rem 42 sts, join in first ch at beg of rnd. ([252] dc)

Rnd [9]: Ch 1, 1 sc in each of next 41 sts, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 15 dc] 10 times, 1 sc in each of rem 42 sts, join in first ch at beg of rnd. ([254] dc)

Rnd [10]: Ch 1, 1 sc in each of next 46 sts, [dc in each of next 15 dc, 2 dc in next dc] 10 times, 1 sc in each of rem 47 sts, join in first ch at beg of rnd. ([264] dc)

EDGING

Rnd 1: Ch 8, sk 5 dc, dc in next dc, [ch 5, sk 5 dc, dc in next dc] around to last 5 dc, ch 2, dc in 3rd ch of beg ch-8. (36 [39, 42, 44] ch-5 sps)

Rnd 2: Ch 4, [work (2 dc, ch 5, 2 dc, ch 1) in 3rd ch in next ch-5 sp] around to last sp, in the same st as first ch in last sp work (2 dc, ch 5, 1 dc), join in 3rd ch of beg ch-4. (144, [156, 168, 176] dc)

Rnd 3: Ch 1, [work (3 dc, ch 2, 3 dc) in next ch-5 sp, sk 2 dc, 1 sc in ch-1 sp before next 2 dc] around to last ch-5 sp, work (3 dc, ch 2, 3 dc) in last ch-5 sp, join in first ch at beg of rnd. (36 [39, 42, 44] petals)

Fasten off.

SLEEVES

Rnd 1: Beg at bottom of 1 armhole opening, join in side of dc at bottom, ch 3, dc in each st up to top of armhole, dc in side of dc at top, dc in each st to end of rnd, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (34 [36, 40, 44] dc)

Rnds 2 & 3: Ch 3, dc in each dc around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3.

Rnd 4: Ch 3, dc dec (see *Stitch Guide*) in next 2 dc, dc in each dc around to last 2 dc, dc dec in last 2 dc, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (32 [34, 38, 42] dc)

Rep [rnds 2–4] 4 [4, 4, 5] times. (24 [26, 30, 32] dc)

[Rep rnd 2] until Sleeve measures 8½ [9½, 10½, 11½] inches.

Next rnd: Rep rnd 2 but adjust number of dc on rnd to a total of 24 [24, 30, 30] dc.

Cuff

Rnd 1: Ch 8, 2 dc in the same st as first ch, ch 1, [sk 5 dc, in next dc work (2 dc, ch 5, 2 dc, ch 1)] around, dc in the same st as first ch on rnd, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-8. (4 [4, 5, 5] pattern reps)

Rnd 2: Sl st in first sp, ch 3, in same sp work (2 dc, ch 2, 3 dc), sk 2 dc, 1 sc in ch-1 sp before next 2 dc [in next ch-5 sp work (3 dc, ch 2, 3 dc), sk 2 dc, 1 sc in ch-1 sp before next 2 dc] around, join in 3rd ch at beg of rnd. (4 [4, 5, 5] petals)

Fasten off.

Rep Sleeve in 2nd Armhole opening.

TASSEL TIES

Cut a 2-yd long strand and fold double. Holding the two strands tog twist string until it resists. Fold string double and let twist tog, and tie a knot approximately 12–13 inches from the end of strip, leaving long tails after the knot.

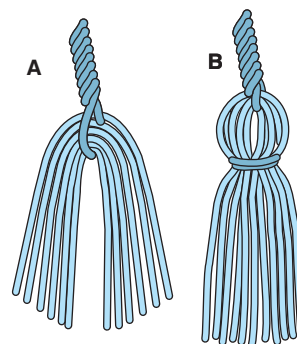
Pull 2 of the tails through a ch-2 sp at mid Front

and tie tog with the other 2 tails. Make a tight knot and weave in the tails along the edge.

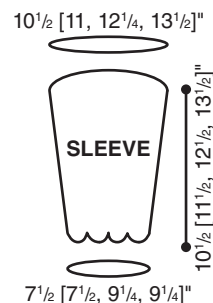
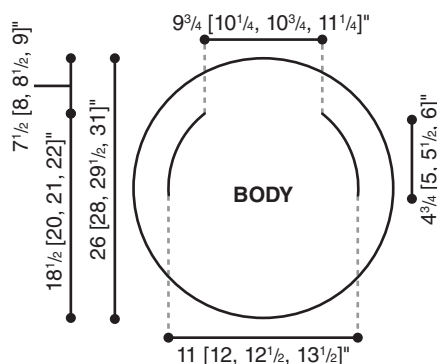

Length: 13¼ inches (size 2) [16½ inches (size 4), 18¼ inches (size 6), 22¼ inches (size 8)]

MATERIALS

- Spud & Chloe Sweater medium (worsted) weight wool/cotton yarn (3½ oz/160 yds/100g per skein):
1 [1, 2, 2] skein(s) #7524 chocolate milk
1 [1, 2, 2] skein(s) #7504 lake
- Sizes G/6/4mm and H/8/5mm crochet hooks or sizes needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle



GAUGE

Size G hook: 14 dc = 4 inches; 7 dc rows = 4 inches

Size H hook in shell pattern: 3 shells = 4½ inches; 5 rows = 4 inches

Take time to check gauge.



PATTERN NOTES

Weave in ends as work progresses.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Chain-4 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet and chain-1 unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of round in Waistband counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of round in Shell Pattern counts as first single crochet and chain-2 unless otherwise stated.

SPECIAL STITCHES

First foundation single crochet (first foundation sc): Ch 2, insert hook in 2nd ch from hook, yo, pull up 1p, yo, pull through 1 lp on hook (see illustration A—ch-1 completed), yo, pull through both lps on hook (see illustrations B and C—sc completed).

Next foundation single crochet (next foundation sc): [Insert hook in last ch-1 made (see illustration A), yo, pull up 1p, yo, pull through 1 lp on hook (see illustration B—ch-1 completed), yo, pull through both lps on hook (see illustrations C and D—sc completed)] **A** as indicated.

V-stitch (V-st): (Sc, ch 2, sc) in indicated st.

Shell: 5 dc in indicated st or ch-sp of indicated V-st.

SKIRT**Waistband**

With size G hook and chocolate milk, **first foundation sc** (see *Special Stitches*), work 69 [73, 77, 81] **next foundation sc** (see *Special Stitches*), **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in first st being careful not to twist. (70 [74, 78, 82] sts)

Rnd 1: Ch 4 (see *Pattern Notes*), *sk 1, dc in next st, ch 1, rep from * to last st, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-4.

Rnds 2–7: Ch 3 (see *Pattern Notes*), dc in each st around, join in top of beg ch-3.

Sizes 6 & 8 Only

Rnds [8 & 9]: Rep rnd 2.

All Sizes

Next rnd: Ch 3, dc in st at base of ch-3, dc in each st around, join in top of beg ch-3. (71 [75, 79, 83] sts)

Next rnd: Rep last rnd, **changing color** (see *Stitch Guide*) to lake in last dc, join top of beg ch-3. (72 [76, 80, 84] sts)

Shell Pattern

Rnd 1: With size H hook, ch 1, sc in same st as join, *sk next st, **shell** (see *Special Stitches*) in next st, sk next st, sc in next st*, rep from * to last 3 sts, sk next st, shell in next st, join in first sc. (18 [19, 20, 21] shells, 18 [19, 20, 21] sc)

Rnd 2: With chocolate milk, **ch 3** (see *Pattern Notes*), sc in same st as join, *ch 2, sk next 2 dc, sc in next dc, ch 2, sk next 2 dc, **V-st** (see *Special Stitches*) in next sc, rep from * to last shell, ch 2, sk next 2 dc, sc in next dc, ch 2, join in first ch in beg ch-3.

Rnd 3: With lake, ch 1, sc in last sc, *shell in next V-st, sc in next sc, rep from * to last V-st, shell in last V-st, join in first sc.

[Rep rnds 2 and 3] 8 [10, 12, 14] times. Fasten off.

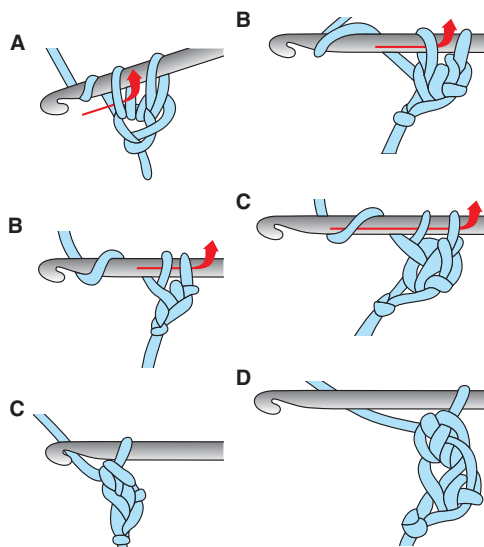
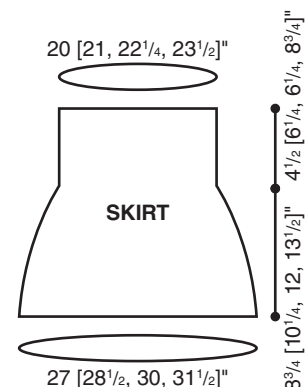

Rnds 1–4 = 3¾ inches in diameter

PATTERN NOTES

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Chain-5 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet and chain-2 space unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

SPECIAL STITCHES

Beginning V-stitch (beg V-st): Ch 5 (see *Pattern Notes*), dc in indicated sp.

V-stitch (V-st): (Dc, ch 2, dc) in indicated sp.

Beginning shell (beg shell): Ch 3 (see *Pattern Notes*), (dc, ch 2, 2 dc) in indicated sp.

Shell: (2 dc, ch 2, 2 dc) in indicated sp.

THROW

Rnd 1: With wild raspberry heather, ch 8, join (see *Pattern Notes*) in first ch to form ring, ch 1, sc in ring, [ch 8, sc in ring] 5 times, ch 4, join with tr in first sc (*counts as ch-8 sp*). (6 ch-8 sps)

Rnd 2: Ch 1, sc in sp formed by joining tr, [ch 8, sc in next ch-8 sp] around, ch 4, join with tr in first sc. (6 ch-8 sps)

Rnd 3: Ch 1, (sc, ch 5, sc) in sp formed by joining tr, *ch 5, (sc, ch 5, sc) in next ch-8 sp, rep from * around, ch 2, join with dc in first sc. (12 ch sps)

Rnd 4: Ch 1, (sc, ch 5, sc) in sp formed by joining dc, ch 5, *(sc, ch 5, sc) in next ch sp, ch 5, rep from * around, join in beg sc. Fasten off. (24 ch sps)

Rnd 5: Join boysenberry heather with sc in any ch sp, [ch 6, sc in next ch sp] around, ch 3, join with dc in first sc. (24 ch sps)

Rnd 6: Beg V-st (see *Special Stitches*) in sp formed by joining dc, ch 1, [V-st (see *Special Stitches*) in next ch sp, ch 1] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-5. (24 V-sts, 24 ch sps)

Rnd 7: Sl st in next ch sp, **beg shell** (see *Special Stitches*), V-st in ch-2 sp of next V-st, [shell (see *Special Stitches*) in ch-2 sp of next V-st, V-st in ch-2 sp of next V-st] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (12 shells, 12 V-sts)

Rnd 8: Sl st in next st, sl st in next ch-2 sp, beg shell in same sp, ch 1, V-st in ch-2 sp of next V-st, ch 1, [shell in ch-2 sp of next shell, ch 1, V-st in ch-2 sp of next V-st, ch 1] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (24 ch sps, 12 shells, 12 V-sts)

Rnd 9: Sl st in next st, sl st in next ch-2 sp, beg shell in same sp, ch 2, V-st in next V-st, ch 2, [shell in next shell, ch 2, V-st in next V-st, ch 2] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3.

Rnd 10: Sl st in next st, sl st in next ch-2 sp, beg shell in same sp, ch 3, V-st in next V-st, ch 3, [shell in next shell, ch 3, V-st in next V-st, ch 3] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3.

Rnd 11: Sl st in next st, sl st in next ch sp, beg shell in same sp, ch 4, V-st in next V-st, ch 4, [shell in next shell, ch 4, V-st in next V-st, ch 4] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3.

Rnd 12: Sl st in next st, sl st in next ch-2 sp, beg shell in same sp, ch 5, V-st in next V-st, ch 5, [shell in next shell, ch 5, V-st in next V-st, ch 5] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3.

Rnd 34: Sl st in next st, sl st in next ch sp, beg shell in same sp, ch 4, 3 dc in sp between next 2 dc, ch 4, [shell in next shell, ch 4, 3 dc in sp between next 2 dc, ch 4] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (144 dc, 96 ch sps, 48 shells)

Rnd 35: Sl st in next st, sl st in next ch sp, beg shell in same sp, ch 4, 4 dc in center st of next 3-dc group, ch 4, [shell in next shell, ch 4, 4 dc in center st of next 3-dc group, ch 4] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (192 dc, 96 ch sps, 48 shells)

Rnds 36–38: Sl st in next st, sl st in next ch sp, beg shell in same sp, ch 3, 4 dc in sp between 2nd and 3rd sts of next 4-dc group, ch 3, [shell in next shell, ch 3, 4 dc in between 2nd and 3rd sts of next 4-dc group, ch 3] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (96 ch sps, 48 4-dc groups, 48 shells)

Rnd 39: Sl st in next st, sl st in next ch sp, beg shell in same sp, ch 3, (dc, ch 3, dc) in sp between 2nd and 3rd sts of next 4-dc group,

ch 3, [shell in next shell, ch 3, (dc, ch 3, dc) in sp between 2nd and 3rd sts of next 4-dc group, ch 3] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (144 ch sps, 96 dc, 48 shells)

Rnd 40: Sl st in next st, sl st in next ch sp, beg shell in same sp, ch 3, sk next ch sp, (dc, {ch 3, dc} twice) in next ch sp, ch 3, sk next ch sp, [shell in next shell, ch 3, sk next ch sp, (dc, {ch 3, dc} twice) in next ch sp, ch 3, sk next ch sp] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (192 ch sps, 144 dc, 48 shells)

Rnd 41: Sl st in next st, sl st in next ch sp, beg shell in same sp, ch 2, sk next ch sp, (dc, ch 3, dc) in each of next 2 ch sps, ch 2, sk next ch sp, [shell in next shell, ch 2, sk next ch sp, (dc, ch 3, dc) in each of next 2 ch sps, ch 2, sk next ch sp] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (192 dc, 192 ch sps, 48 shells)

Rnd 42: Sl st in next st, sl st in next ch sp, beg shell in same sp, *ch 2, sk next ch sp, (dc, ch 3, dc) in next ch sp, dc in sp between next 2 dc, (dc, ch 3, dc) in next ch sp, ch 2, sk next ch sp**, shell in next shell, rep from * around, ending last rep at **, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (240 dc, 192 ch sps, 48 shells)



Rnds 43–48: Sl st in next st, sl st in next ch sp, beg shell in same sp, *ch 2, sk next ch sp, (dc, ch 3, dc) in next ch sp, sk next dc, dc in next dc, (dc, ch 3, dc) in next ch sp, ch 2, sk next ch sp**, shell in next shell, rep from * around, ending last rep at **, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. At end of last row, fasten off.

Rnd 49: Join wild raspberry heather in ch-2 sp of first shell, beg shell in same sp, *ch 2, sk next ch sp, (dc, ch 3, dc) in next ch sp, sk next dc, dc in next dc, (dc, ch 3, dc) in next ch sp, ch 2, sk next ch sp**, shell in next shell, rep from * around, ending last rep at **, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. Fasten off.

Trim

Join wild raspberry heather with sc in ch-2 sp of any shell on rnd 49, ch 4, sc in same sp, *ch 4, sc in next ch sp on rnd 49, ch 4, sc in next ch sp on rnd before last between next 2 dc on last rnd, [ch 4, sc in corresponding sp on rnd below] 9 times, ch 4, sc in sp between 2nd and 3rd dc of 4-dc group on rnd below, ch 4, sk next dc on rnd above, sc in next ch sp, [ch 4, sc in corresponding sp on rnd above] 9 times, ch 4, sc in next sp on rnd 49 above, ch 4**, (sc, ch 4, sc) in ch-2 sp of next shell, rep from * around, ending last rep at **, join in beg sc. Fasten off. **C!**

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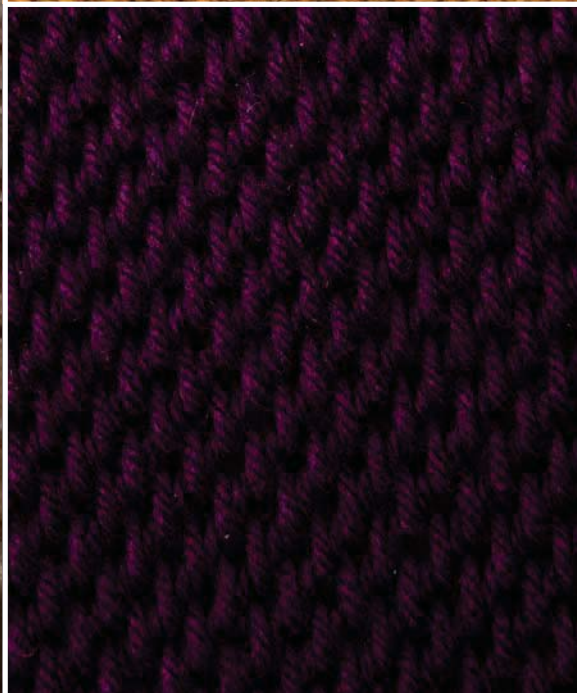

Numerous Tunisian crochet stitches and textures create a thick, cozy afghan perfect for cuddling under while watching your favorite movie. It is worked in one piece so no sewing is required.

FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

Width: 55 inches

Length: 57 inches

MATERIALS

- Premier Yarns Deborah Norville Collection medium (worsted) weight acrylic yarn (4 oz/203 yds/113g per skein):
 - 7 skeins each #10 aubergine, #14 caramel, #02 cream
- Size J/10/6mm Tunisian crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Size K/10½/6.5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle



GAUGE

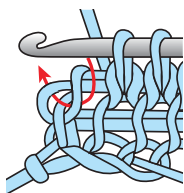
14 sts = 4 inches; 16 rows = 4 inches

PATTERN NOTES

When counting stitches it is best to count loops on the hook before working the return pass.

First stitch on hook is included in stitch counts, but is not referred to in the row by row instructions.

The last stitch of every row should be worked as a Tunisian knit stitch, inserting the hook under 2 outer strands of yarn to back of work, and then pulling up the final loop (see illustration).

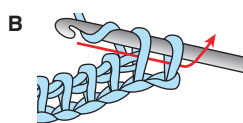
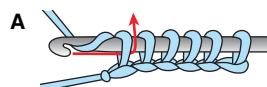

SPECIAL STITCHES

Subsequent Foundation Row: With indicated color and size K hook, sl st in corner ch of previous stripe and loosely work indicated number of chs.

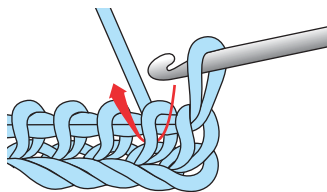
First stripe work loops off hook (work lps off hook): Yo, pull through 1 lp on hook (see A of illustration), [yo, pull through 2 lps on hook (see B of illustration)] across until 1 lp rem on hook. Last lp on hook counts as first st of next row.



Work Loops Off Hook

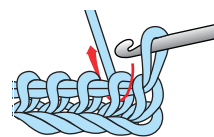

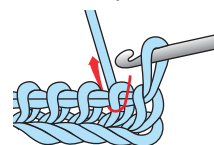

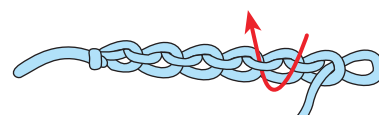

WAFFLE STRIPE

First Foundation Row: With aubergine and size K crochet hook, loosely ch 23.

A. Do not sk first ch, pull up a lp in back bump (see illustration) of each ch across (24 lps on hook),

B. work lps off hook (see *Special Stitches*).

Row 1:

A. TFS (see *Special Stitches*) under horizontal strands in first sp before first vertical bar, [TFS in each sp before next vertical bar] across, to last 2 sts, sk next sp, **work last st** (see *Pattern Notes*),

B. work lps off hook.

Row 2:

A. Sk first sp, [TFS in each sp before next vertical bar] across, to last st, work last st,

B. work lps off hook.

Rep Rows 1 and 2 until piece measures 62 inches (243 rows) or desired length.

Sl st in each st across as if to **TKS** (see *Special Stitches*).

TUNISIAN SIMPLE STITCH & MARGUERITE STRIPE

Row 1: With caramel and K hook, work **Subsequent Foundation Row** (see *Special Stitches*) with 32 chs.

A. Sk first ch, pull up a lp in back bump of 2nd and next chs across, lift lp from ch edge of corresponding row of previous stripe, (33 lps on hook)

B. work add stripe ret (see *Special Stitches*).

Rows 2–5:

A. TSS (see *Special Stitches*) across, lift lp from ch edge of corresponding row of previous stripe,

B. work add stripe ret.

Row 6: (Can be worked with standard hook if desired.) Ch 2, draw up lp in 2nd ch from hook, draw up lp from each of next 3 vertical bars (5 lps on hook), yo, draw through all lps on hook, *ch 1, (creates “eye” at base of ch), insert hook in eye, yo, draw up lp, insert hook under same vertical bar as last vertical bar and draw up lp, draw up lp from each of next 2 vertical bars (5 lps on hook), yo, draw through all lps on hook, rep from * across, ending with 5th lp of last rep drawn through next st in side of previous stripe, yo, draw through all 5 lps, turn.

Row 7: Ch 1, 2 hdc in each eye across, hdc in last st. (31 sts)

Row 8:

A. Draw up lp in first st at base of lp on hook, draw up 30 lps evenly across, draw lp through in next st in side of previous stripe, (33 lps on hook)

B. work add stripe ret.

Rep rows 2–8 until current stripe measures the same as previous one.

Last Row: Sl st in each st across as if to TSS.

TUNISIAN KNIT STITCH & PUFF STRIPE

Row 1: With cream and K hook, work **Subsequent Foundation Row** with 30 chs.

A. Sk first ch, pull up a lp in back bump of 2nd and next chs across, lift lp under ch edge of corresponding row of previous stripe, (31 lps on hook)

B. work add stripe ret.

Rows 2–5:

A. TKS across, draw lp from ch edge of corresponding row of previous stripe,

B. work add stripe ret.

Row 6:

A. *5 TKS, 1 **puff st** (see *Special Stitches*), rep from * across, ending with 5 TKS, lift

lp from ch edge of corresponding row of previous stripe,

B. work add stripe ret.

Row 7:

A. TKS across with TKS in ch-1 sp on top of puff sts from previous row, lift lp from ch edge of corresponding row of previous stripe,

B. work add stripe ret.

Rows 8–11: Rep row 2.

Row 12:

A. 2 TKS, 1 puff st, *5 tks, 1 puff st, rep from * across, ending with 1 puff st, 2 TKS, lift lp from ch edge of corresponding row of previous stripe,

B. work add stripe ret.

Row 13:

Rep rows 2–13 until current stripe measures the same as previous one.

Last Row: Sl st in each st across as if to TKS.

NEXT STRIPES

Waffle Stripe

Row 1: With aubergine and K hook, work **Subsequent Foundation Row** with 23 chs.

A. Sk first ch, pull up a lp in back bump of 2nd and next chs across, lift lp under ch edge of corresponding row previous stripe, (24 lps on hook)

B. Work add stripe ret.

Rem rows: Work as for first Waffle Stripe.

With caramel, make another TSS and Marguerite Stripe.

With cream, make another TKS and Puff Stripe
With aubergine, make another Waffle Stripe.

EDGING

Rnd 1: With RS facing, aubergine, and K crochet hook, sc evenly around with 3 sc in each corner. Sl st in first sc, turn.

Rnd 2: With WS facing, work **reverse sc** (See *Stitch Guide*) in each sc, sl st in first sl st. Fasten off. Weave in ends. **C**

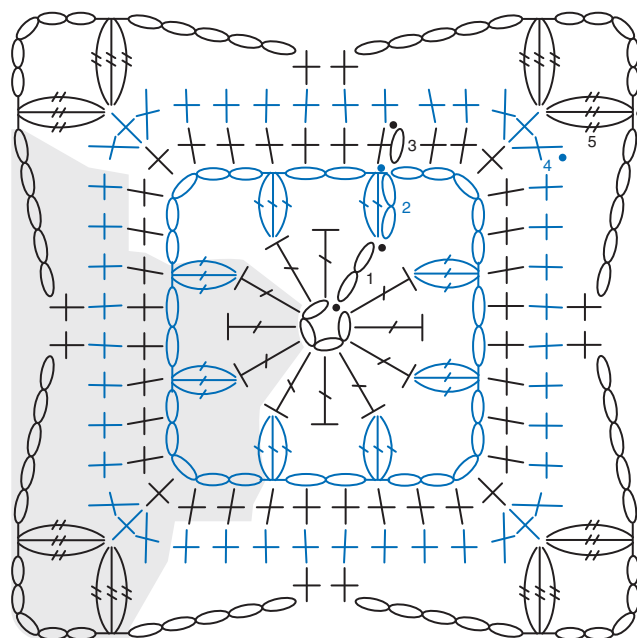

Row 10: Rep row 8.

Rows 11–86: [Rep rows 7–10 consecutively] 19 times.

Rows 87–89: Rep rows 7–9.

Row 90: Ch 2, [fpc around next st, bpc around next st] 5 times, bpc around each st across to ribbing, removing markers as work progresses, [fpc around next st, bpc around next st] 5 times, hdc in top of beg ch-2, turn.

Ribbing Band

Rows 91–95: [Rep row 2] 5 times. Fasten off.

FINISHING

Weave in ends. Block lightly, if desired. **C!**
