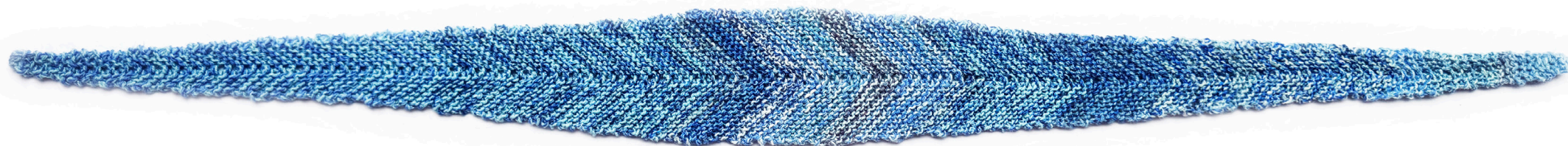

A long skinny scarf with a rustic garter stitch chevron,
inspired by a favorite song.

The scarf is worked with two strands held together.
The edges are slightly ruffled and uneven.

Knit on 5mm/US8 needles with approximately
60g/280yds/260m of leftover yarns including
Jamieson's of Shetland Spindrift and some merino
silk mixes. If you are working with one strand of a
heavier yarn, allow approximately 140yds/130m.

Dimensions:
approximately 4.75ins/12cm wide by 46ins/117cm
Gauge: approximately 19sts (measured on the
diagonal) and 22 rows (measured along the spine)
= 4ins/10cm in pattern





Notes

The double increase (abbreviated to **inc**) is worked as follows: k, yo, k into one stitch, increasing by two stitches.

I worked with relatively short lengths of yarn, splicing in a new color when necessary, generally holding a dark and light shade together, sometimes holding two darker colors together.

The pattern can also be worked in a more varied palette to use up more varied scraps.

Keep the knitting quite loose for a soft flexible fabric.

To make a longer or shorter scarf, you can make adjustments between rows 121 and 148, adding or subtracting rows as desired.

The tips of the scarf are slightly mismatched due to the asymmetrical chevron structure.

The picture on the right below shows both tips, with the CO on the right and the BO on the left.



Pattern

CO 3sts and knit 1 row (WS)

Row 1: k1, inc, k1 (5sts)

All WS rows: k all sts

Rows 3, 5, 7: k2tog, inc, ssk

Row 9: k2, inc, k2 (7sts)

Rows 11, 13, 15, 17: k2tog, k1, inc, k1, ssk

Row 19: k3, inc, k3 (9sts)

Rows 21, 23, 25, 27: k2tog, k2, inc, k2, ssk

Row 29: k4, inc, k4 (11sts)

Rows 31, 33, 35, 37: k2tog, k3, inc, k3, ssk

Row 39: k5, inc, k5 (13sts)

Rows 41, 43, 45, 47: k2tog, k4, inc, k4, ssk

Row 49: k6, inc, k6 (15sts)

Rows 51, 53, 55, 57: k2tog, k5, inc, k5, ssk

Row 59: k7, inc, k7 (17sts)

Rows 61, 63, 65, 67: k2tog, k6, inc, k6, ssk

Row 69: k8, inc, k8 (19sts)

Rows 71, 73, 75, 77: k2tog, k7, inc, k7, ssk

Row 79: k9, inc, k9 (21sts)

Rows 81, 83, 85, 87: k2tog, k8, inc, k8, ssk

Row 89: k10, inc, k10 (23sts)

Rows 91, 93, 95, 97: k2tog, k9, inc, k9, ssk

Row 99: k11, inc, k11 (25sts)

Rows 101, 103, 105, 107: k2tog, k10, inc, k10, ssk

Row 109: k12, inc, k12 (27sts)

Rows 111, 113, 115, 117: k2tog, k11, inc, k11, ssk

Row 119: k13, inc, k13 (29sts)

Rows 121, 123, 125, 127, 129, 131, 133, 135, 137,

139, 141, 143, 145, 147: k2tog, k12, inc, k12, ssk

Row 149: k2tog x 2, k10, inc, k10, ssk x 2 (27sts)

Rows 151, 153, 155, 157: k2tog, k11, inc, k11, ssk

Row 159: k2tog x 2, k9, inc, k9, ssk x 2 (25sts)

Rows 161, 163, 165, 167: k2tog, k10, inc, k10, ssk

Row 169: k2tog x 2, k8, inc, k8, ssk x 2 (23sts)

Rows 171, 173, 175, 177: k2tog, k9, inc, k9, ssk

Row 179: k2tog x 2, k7, inc, k7, ssk x 2 (21sts)

Rows 181, 183, 185, 187: k2tog, k8, inc, k8, ssk

Row 189: k2tog x 2, k6, inc, k6, ssk x 2 (19sts)

Rows 191, 193, 195, 197: k2tog, k7, inc, k7, ssk

Row 199: k2tog x 2, k5, inc, k5, ssk x 2 (17sts)

Rows 201, 203, 205, 207: k2tog, k6, inc, k6, ssk

Row 209: k2tog x 2, k4, inc, k4, ssk x 2 (15sts)

Rows 211, 213, 215, 217: k2tog, k5, inc, k5, ssk

Row 219: k2tog x 2, k3, inc, k3, ssk x 2 (13sts)

Rows 221, 223, 225, 227: k2tog, k4, inc, k4, ssk

Row 229: k2tog x 2, k2, inc, k2, ssk x 2 (11sts)

Rows 231, 233, 235, 237: k2tog, k3, inc, k3, ssk

Row 239: k2tog x 2, k1, inc, k1, ssk x 2 (9sts)

Rows 241, 243, 245, 247: k2tog, k2, inc, k2, ssk

Row 249: k2tog x 2, inc, ssk x 2 (7sts)

Rows 251, 253, 255, 257: k2tog, k1, inc, k1, ssk

Row 259: k2tog, k3, ssk (5sts)

Rows 261, 263: k5

Row 265: k2tog, kfb, ssk (4sts)

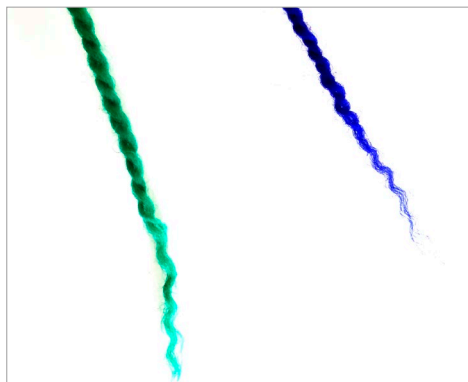
Rows 267, 269: k4

Row 271: k1, k2tog, k1 (3sts)

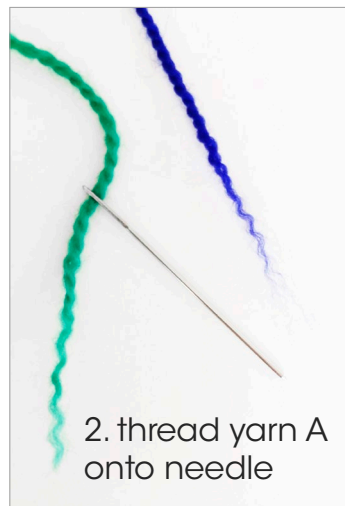
Rows 273, 275: k3

After Row 275, BO 3sts and weave in ends.

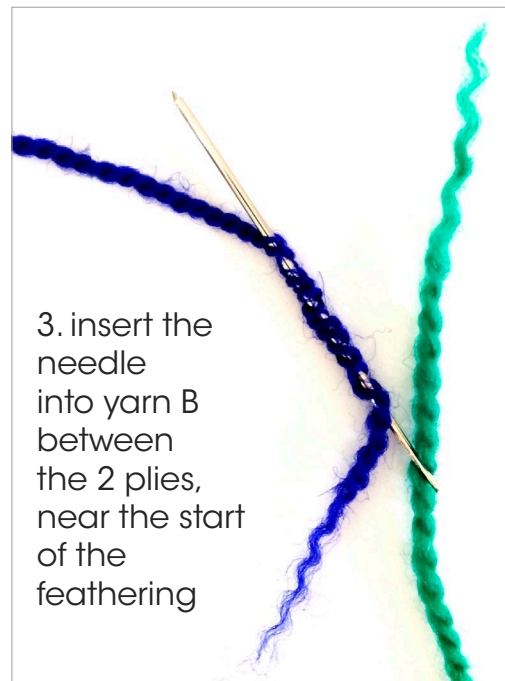
splicing yarn ends



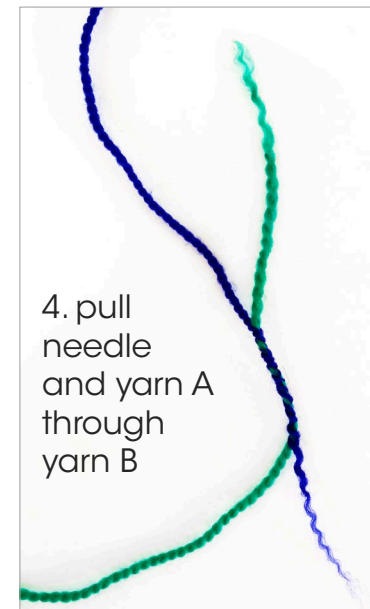
1. feather the yarn ends: unwind the plies, break them at different points, about 1 inch/2cm apart, and tease out the fibres



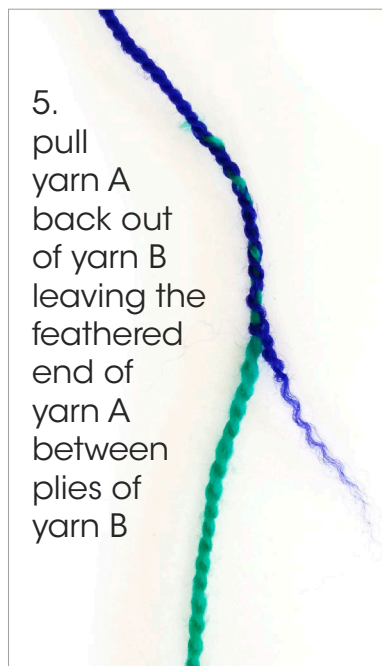
2. thread yarn A onto needle



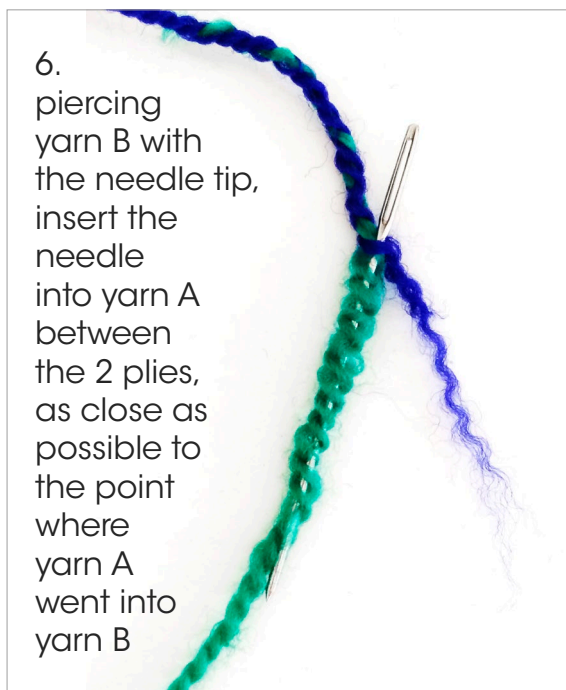
3. insert the needle into yarn B between the 2 plies, near the start of the feathering



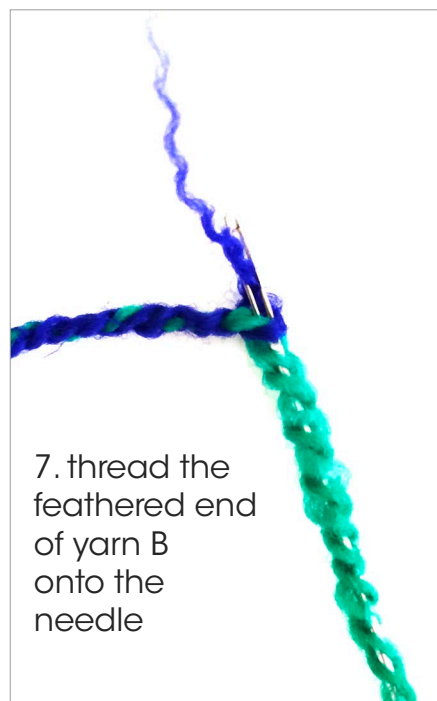
4. pull needle and yarn A through yarn B



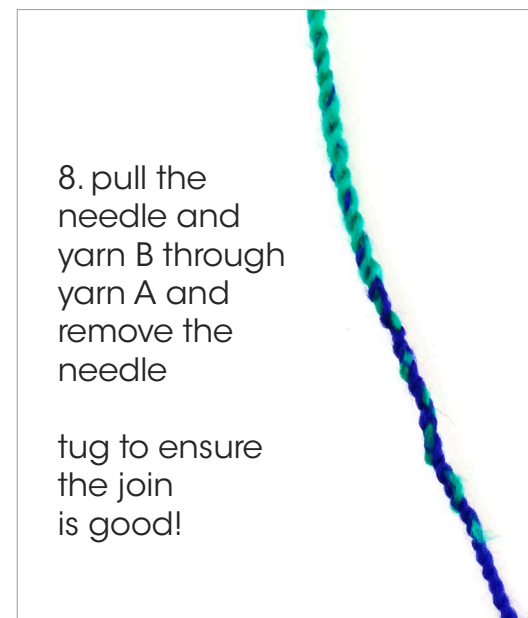
5. pull yarn A back out of yarn B leaving the feathered end of yarn A between plies of yarn B



6. piercing yarn B with the needle tip, insert the needle into yarn A between the 2 plies, as close as possible to the point where yarn A went into yarn B



7. thread the feathered end of yarn B onto the needle



8. pull the needle and yarn B through yarn A and remove the needle

tug to ensure the join is good!



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
