Yarns Perfect for Adventure

I mainly design garments for the outdoor life meant to cater to the demands of high-altitude expeditions in the snow-clad mountains of Manitoba, the rugged coastlines of the Pacific Northwest, and the wild forests of Alaska. I exclusively work with pure wool made from Icelandic, Peruvian, Norwegian, and North American sheep breeds. Wool possesses remarkable qualities that make it an excellent choice for outdoor wear. It is self-cleaning, efficiently repelling dirt and stains, allowing your garments to stay fresh even in the harshest environments. Additionally, wool's natural water-resistance provides a layer of defense against rain and dampness, keeping you dry during your outdoor pursuits.

Let me unveil a list of yarns that captivate my adventurous spirit:

Icelandic Wool from the robust Icelandic sheep, this wool boasts an unrivaled resilience, preserving your body's warmth even in the most extreme sub-zero temperatures. It is a water-repellent sheep's wool perfect for cold weather and outdoor activities. Natural colors and rustic charm add to its appeal. It is ideal for crafting traditional garments and knitwear. Icelandic wool is the ultimate outdoor wool.

North American Wool is a diverse and abundant resource, hailing from a multitude of sheep breeds thriving in the continent's vast landscapes. Ram-bouillet, Columbia, Targhee, Shetland, Corriedale, Border Leicester, Romney, and Lincoln are just a few examples of North American wool. From the soft and delicate fibers of certain breeds to the sturdy and unyielding strands of others, this wool encompasses a wide spectrum of possibilities. Whether you seek a cozy and gentle touch for a lightweight layer or a robust and rugged yarn for outdoor exploration, North American wool offers an array of choices, ensuring that every adventurer can find their perfect match for any journey.

Peruvian Highland Wool is a premium natural fiber known for its warmth, softness, and resilience. Sourced from sheep in the high-altitude regions of Peru, this wool is highly valued in the textile industry for producing cozy and durable clothing and accessories.

Norwegian Wool The pride of Norway's sheep breeds, this wool is an embodiment of endurance and fortitude. Its natural lanolin-laden fibers enhance water resistance and shield you from the relentless assault of rain and wind while keeping you stylishly snug.



Merino Wool is known for its exceptional softness. It has excellent moisture-wicking properties, meaning it can absorb and release moisture to keep the wearer dry and comfortable. Merino wool is also renowned for its insulating capabilities, providing warmth in cold weather and staying breathable in warmer conditions. Due to its natural properties, Merino wool is well-suited for outdoor activities. It can regulate body temperature, making it comfortable to wear in various weather conditions. Additionally, it resists odors and is hypoallergenic, making it an ideal choice for those with sensitive skin.

As you enter your adventure, remember that the choice of materials can make or break your experience. With the resolute might of wool by your side, you can confidently face the elements, for my designs are crafted to withstand the test of time and enable you to conquer uncharted lands with these warm and durable comrades.

Soft and Cozy Yarn Alternatives

Outdoor wools may not be the most comfortable option for everyone due to their somewhat “scratchy” nature. If you happen to have a sensitivity, you might find Merino wool to be a preferred choice, known for its exceptional softness, durability, and inherent weather resistance. Merino fibers possess natural elasticity, making them comfortable to wear while providing ample insulation and moisture-wicking properties. In other words: Merino is perfect for outdoor garments. Additionally, it resists odors and is hypoallergenic, making it an ideal choice for those with sensitive skin.

While alpaca yarn offers luxurious softness, it may not be the most suitable choice for outdoor use due to its tendency to absorb moisture. Alpaca fibers have excellent thermal properties, but their absorption capability can lead to dampness in wet conditions, therefore I recommend alpaca yarn only for indoor garments.

If pure wool is not your fiber of choice or if you are allergic to wool, cotton yarn is a fantastic option for warm weather, and it doesn't have the scratchiness associated with some wool fibers. It's also easy to care for and can withstand the elements reasonably well. Just keep in mind that cotton doesn't provide the same insulation as wool, so it is not suitable for extremely cold conditions.

Another alternative is acrylic yarn, which is a synthetic option that is often chosen for outdoor wear due to its durability and resistance to moisture. It's also less likely to stretch or shrink when exposed to the elements. Acrylic yarn comes in a wide variety of colors and can mimic the appearance of wool, making it a versatile choice for different outdoor projects. However, it will not provide the same natural warmth as wool.

Alternatives for Gauge 13–14 stitches = 4 in (10 cm) on US 10 (6 mm) needle in stockinette stitch

Brands like Malabrigo, Woolfolk, and Blue Sky Fibers offer Merino wool yarns in Bulky or Chunky weights that can serve as excellent substitutes. These yarns provide the cozy comfort and exceptional stitch definition that you desire and are super soft.


Alternatives for Gauge 18–19 stitches = 4 in (10 cm) on US 10 (6 mm) needle in stockinette stitch

For a similar gauge and comparable qualities consider Merino wool yarns in a DK (double knitting) or worsted weight category. Brands like Malabrigo, Madelinetosh, and Brooklyn Tweed offer Merino wool yarns in DK and worsted weights, which can serve as wonderful substitutes. These yarns deliver exceptional stitch definition, warmth, and a soft hand feel, making them suitable for a wide range of projects.



Alternatives for Gauge 20–23 stitches = 4 in (10 cm) on US 6 (4 mm) needle in stockinette stitch

For a similar gauge range, look for Merino wool yarns in the fingering or sport weight categories. These weights typically align well with the specified gauge and provide a delicate yet substantial fabric. Brands such as Malabrigo, Hedgehog Fibres, and Cascade Yarns offer Merino wool yarns in fingering and sport weights that are perfect substitutes.



Gauge measurements should always be taken after blocking.





Yarns Used in this Book

Here is a list of the commonly used yarns in the patterns in this book.

Ístex Léttlopi is probably the most famous Icelandic yarn that has captured the hearts of knitting enthusiasts worldwide. Ístex Léttlopi is loosely spun, giving it a unique texture and adding a touch of character to your knitting projects. Its loose structure also enhances its insulating properties, providing a warm and cozy feel ideal for cooler climates.

Ístex Álafosslopi is Istex Léttlopi's older cousin—the ultimate yarn for cold climates! It is a bulky, thick yarn perfect for creating warm sweaters that defy winter's chill. Crafters and knitters worldwide appreciate Álafosslopi for its ability to withstand harsh conditions while keeping you comfortably warm. The colors are natural and, from the rugged volcanic terrains to the vibrant hues of the Northern Lights, this yarn captures the essence of Iceland's natural beauty.

Ístex Plötulopi is made from pure unspun Icelandic wool. Sweaters knitted with this yarn are lighter and airier than Léttlopi. Knitting with just one strand can be complicated, as unspun yarn breaks easily. Therefore, it is often a good idea to combine it with other yarns, such as lace and strands of mohair. This two-strand combination will be easier to work with and makes the overall garment softer.

Brooklyn Tweed Tones is known for its rich, intense colors which are unmatched, and its exceptional stitch definition brings colorwork to life. Sweaters knitted in this yarn are vibrant, durable, and showcase impeccable stitch work.

Brooklyn Tweed Tones can be used interchangeably with:

Brooklyn Tweed Shelter. Rustic charm meets versatile style. Made from 100% American wool, this yarn combines warmth and durability with a modern twist. Its unique woolen-spun construction delivers a lofty texture and excellent stitch definition. With a wide array of subtly heathered colors and with its high-quality fibers and impressive performance, it offers an extensive palette that adds depth and richness to every garment.

Brooklyn Tweed Quarry. Chunky, cozy, and captivating, this yarn is expertly crafted from 100% American Targhee-Columbia wool, ensuring exceptional texture and warmth for any project. Its lofty three-ply structure enhances stitch definition, creating stunning patterns with a touch of luxury. Thanks to its superb warmth-to-weight ratio, this yarn is ideal for thicker garments that offer both coziness and comfort. For added versatility, I love pairing it with two strands of Brooklyn Tweed Shelter or Tones, resulting in beautifully defined stitches and a garment that is both warm and lightweight.

Kelbourne Woolens Scout is a strong, versatile, heathered 100% wool yarn. The wool in Scout is a cross between Corriedale and Merino. It is not as soft as Merino, but it is stronger and more durable. Scout is also unique in that it is a heather, meaning multiple colors are pre-blended prior to spinning to create a shade with a lot of depth and variation. Natural is the one exception to this—it is the undyed white shade of wool.



Kelbourne Woolens Germantown is a quick-knitting 100% USA-made non-superwash worsted wool known for its softness, bounce, and stitch definition.

Kelbourne Woolens Lucky Tweed is a 100% Merino wool yarn and authentic Donegal Tweed yarn made in Donegal, Ireland. It features colorful tweed neps blended with wool fibers, creating a charming speckled effect throughout the yarn. It is known for its warmth and durability.

Malabrigo Chunky is a super-soft and bulky yarn crafted from 100% Merino wool. With its thick and plush texture, this yarn is perfect for quick and cozy projects. Its vibrant and richly dyed colors provide both warmth and style in one delightful package.

Malabrigo Worsted is a 100% Merino wool yarn hand-dyed in stunning colors, showcasing beautiful tonal variations. Its soft and squishy texture adds a cozy feel to any sweater.

Malabrigo Rios is a 100% superwash Merino wool yarn. Soft, strong, and washable, this 4-ply gem resists pilling and suits well-loved garments. This stunning yarn is a workhorse! The plies help resist pilling, and washability makes it fantastic for frequently-worn garments. It comes in an array of watercolor-multi, semi-solid, and variegated colorways.

Spincycle Plump is a bulky-weight yarn known for its stunning color transitions and rich texture. Hand-dyed and handspun in the USA, it creates mesmerizing marled effects. Every skein is like a snowflake, a fingerprint, a seashell, or the wing of a dragonfly—one-of-a-kind, like every knitted project. Versatile and visually striking, it's perfect for adding artistry to your sweaters.

Rauma Vams is made from 100% Norwegian pure new wool, which gives it a soft and natural feel. Due to its natural wool composition, Rauma Vams yarn provides warmth and insulation, making it ideal for creating cozy and comfortable pieces. It is also known for its durability, ensuring that the finished projects will stand the test of time.

Rosa Pomar Beiroa is a 100% Portuguese wool yarn known for its rustic texture and earthy colors. It's great for outdoor knitwear due to its warmth and sustainability, sourced from ethical farming practices.



Tips

Great tips for beginners or a refresher for veterans

Check Your Gauge

It's a good idea to check your gauge, especially if you're new to knitting or working with a new yarn. Yarns with different fiber content or thickness can yield different results, so adjusting your needle size accordingly is key to maintaining the pattern's desired measurements.

Testing your gauge ensures that your finished project will match the pattern's intended measurements.

To check your gauge, simply knit a swatch using the recommended needle size. If your stitches appear too tight and don't match the specified gauge, consider switching to a larger needle size. Conversely, if your stitches appear too loose, try using a smaller needle size. This simple adjustment helps you achieve the desired tension and ensures your project turns out just right.

How to Choose the Right Size

When selecting a size for your project, prioritize the stated measurements for the chest in the pattern. The pattern specifies the garment's finished measurements after blocking. Remember, the length of the garment can always be adjusted to suit your preferences. Keep in mind that some garments are designed to have a tighter fit, while others offer a looser silhouette.

To determine the ideal size for you, carefully examine the chest measurements provided in the pattern. Consider the fit you desire and compare these measurements to a sweater you already own which you believe has the desired dimensions. This comparison will help guide you in choosing the size that aligns with your preferred fit.

Yarn Alternatives

When considering yarn alternatives, it's important to pay attention to the yarn length and recommended needle sizes indicated on the yarn label. Yarn length plays a significant role in determining how many skeins will be required for your project when using an alternative yarn. By checking the yarn length and recommended needle sizes, you can make an informed decision about which alternative yarn is suitable for the pattern. This ensures that you have the correct amount of yarn needed to achieve the desired outcome.

Color Combinations

Steeking or working back and forth

When faced with the choice between steeking and working back and forth in a sweater pattern, each option presents unique advantages.

Steeking offers a seamless aesthetic with faster knitting and minimal purling, yet it may be perceived as daunting due to the additional finishing steps involved. On the other hand, opting for working back and forth simplifies the construction process, eliminating the need for steeking. However, this choice may result in visible seams, a slightly slower knitting pace, and a greater amount of purling. Ultimately, the decision hinges on individual preferences and comfort levels in navigating these techniques.

Guide to Blocking

To achieve optimal results, it's important to wash your garment once it has been knitted. Begin by gently hand-washing the garment in lukewarm water using a mild wool detergent. Allow the garment to soak for approximately 10 minutes, taking care not to rub or twist it. Give it a final rinse and, for a softer surface, consider adding a small amount of rinse aid, hair conditioner (without silicone), or apple cider vinegar to the last rinse water.


Wrap the garment in a towel and gently remove any remaining water by standing on the towel. Instead of laying the garment flat on a towel, which can lead to potential mold, opt for laying it on a plastic bag or a mesh drying rack. This allows for proper air circulation and drying. Gently shape the garment to its desired form, ensuring it is not stretched or distorted, and allow it to dry completely.

Converting a Pattern

When you come across a yarn that you absolutely adore, but the gauge doesn't quite match the pattern by 1 stitch per 4 in (10 cm), there's a simple solution. If the pattern specifies a gauge of 14 stitches, but your chosen yarn yields a gauge of 13 stitches, consider knitting one size smaller. Conversely, if the gauge would give you 15 stitches per 4 in (10 cm), knit one size larger.

By adjusting the size based on the gauge, you can ensure that your finished project maintains the intended measurements and proportions. This simple modification allows you to use the yarn you love while still achieving the desired fit.

The beauty of knitting lies in its versatility, which allows customization and personalization







The Art of Colorwork

Colorwork can be intimidating, but with just a little bit of practice you can become adept at it quickly. Here are a few tips which helped me to master the art of colorwork.

Color Dominance

To achieve clean colorwork in your knitting, it's essential to pay attention to color dominance and maintain consistency.

Keep the same color in the same position throughout your work. The dominant color should be held in your left hand, while the background color is held in your right hand.

For improved tension and neater floats, I suggest catching the floats of the non-working color when knitting three to five stitches in a different color. This technique helps to secure the floats and prevent them from becoming too loose or visible on the right side of your project.

Tension

When working colorwork, achieving the right tension is key to a successful outcome. If your colorwork appears tight and creates a fabric with a higher gauge, it may be beneficial to go up a needle size. This adjustment helps to accommodate the additional thickness and texture created by multiple strands of yarn, resulting in more balanced and visually appealing colorwork.

In situations where tension remains an issue, an alternative approach is to turn your work completely inside out and knit with the inside facing outward. This method can help alleviate tension by providing a looser and more forgiving gauge.

Color Contrast

Here's a magical tip for achieving the perfect color contrast in your sweater:

If you're uncertain whether the colors you've chosen offer enough distinction, try this simple trick. Take a photo of all the yarn skeins together and either print it as a black-and-white image or apply a black and white filter to the photo. By examining the grayscale tones, you can determine if the colors provide sufficient contrast. If the shades of gray showcase a noticeable difference, then you've found a winning combination!

Coldfoot
&
Wiseman





Inspired by two small towns nestled in the Alaskan wilderness: Coldfoot and Wiseman. Once a home for gold prospectors and adventurers, these towns now have populations smaller than a family of snow owls. Yet, their simplicity and charm make them intriguing. With this in mind I wanted to design a sweater which is classic but yet sweet and cozy just like a warm hug from a fluffy snow fox. This sweater will ensure you stay warm and won't get any "cold feet," even in the coldest of snowstorms.

Coldfoot & Wiseman



This pattern is worked seamlessly in the round from the bottom up. First, the body and sleeves are worked up separately. Then, the body and sleeves are joined to form the yoke, which is worked in the round on a circular needle and shaped with decreases. The sweater is finished with a folded neck.

Sizes

(2XS, XS, S) (M, L, XL) (2XL, 3XL, 4XL)

Recommended ease: 4 in (10 cm) positive ease

Measurements

Chest circumference:

(31.5, 33.5, 36.6) (40.2, 43.3, 46.5) (50.0, 53.2, 56.7) in/
(80, 85, 93) (102, 110, 118) (127, 135, 144) cm

Arm circumference:

(11.4, 13.0, 13.0) (13.4, 13.4, 15.0) (15.0, 16.9, 17.7) in/
(29, 33, 33) (34, 34, 38) (38, 43, 45) cm

Yarn

Rosa Pomar Beiroa; DK/light worsted weight;
100% Portuguese wool; 251 yd (230 m), 3.5 oz (100 g) per skein

C1: 685 Anthracite: (3, 4, 4) (4, 4, 5) (5, 5, 6) skeins

C2: 573 Mustard: (1, 1, 1) (1, 1, 1) (1, 1, 1) skein

C3: 570 Persimmon: (1, 1, 1) (1, 2, 2) (2, 2, 2) skeins

C4: 536 Tea Rose: (1, 1, 1) (1, 1, 1) (1, 1, 1) skein

C5: 401 Undyed White: (1, 1, 1) (1, 1, 1) (1, 1, 1) skein

C6: 688 Sea: (1, 1, 1) (1, 1, 1) (1, 2, 2) skeins

Needles

Double-pointed needles: US 4 and US 6 (3.5 mm and 4.5 mm)
(unless the magic loop technique is used)

Circular needles, 16 in (40 cm): US 4 and US 6 (3.5 mm and 4 mm)

Circular needles, 32 in (80 cm): US 4 and US 6 (3.5 mm and 4 mm)

Gauge

19 stitches and 26 rows = 4 in (10 cm) on US 6 needle in
stockinette stitch



Body

Cast on (152, 160, 176) (192, 208, 224) (240, 256, 272) stitches with C1 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round and after (76, 80, 88) (96, 104, 112) (120, 128, 136) stitches to mark the front and back pieces.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 3 in (7.5 cm).

Change to a US 6 (4 mm) circular needle. Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (12.6, 12.6, 12.6) (13.4, 14.2, 15.0) (15.0, 15.0, 15.7) in/(32, 32, 32) (34, 36, 38) (38, 38, 40) cm or desired length, allowing 4.7 in (12 cm) for Chart B.

Work Chart B.

Place the first (7, 9, 8) (8, 11, 11) (14, 18, 18) stitches of the round on a holder or waste yarn. The stitches for the other armhole will be put on holder when you start the yoke. Set the work aside and begin sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (36, 36, 36) (36, 42, 42) (42, 48, 48) stitches with C2 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 3 in (7.5 cm).

Change to size US 6 (4 mm) circular needle. Knit 1 round in C1.

Work pattern according to Chart A. Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (56, 64, 64) (64, 72, 72) (80, 88, 90) stitches.

Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (14.2, 14.2, 14.6) (15.0, 15.4, 15.7) (15.7, 16.1, 16.1) in/(36, 36, 37) (38, 39, 40) (40, 41, 41) cm or desired length, allowing 4.7 in (12 cm) for Chart B.

Work Chart B.

Place the first (8, 9, 9) (8, 12, 11) (15, 18, 19) stitches of the round on a stitch holder or waste yarn. Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Yoke

Join body and sleeves on a US 6 (4 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round at the first join. Knit over first sleeve. Work the front piece. Transfer next (7, 9, 8) (8, 11, 11) (14, 18, 18) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm. Knit over the other sleeve and back piece. You should now have (234, 252, 270) (288, 306, 324) (342, 360, 378) stitches.

Work pattern according to Chart C and decrease as directed. Change to shorter needle when necessary.

After completing chart (78, 84, 90) (96, 102, 108) (114, 120, 126) stitches remain on needles.


Neck

Change to size US 4 (3.5 mm) needle. Knit 1 round with C2, decreasing (0, 0, 2), (6, 10, 12), (14, 16, 18) stitches evenly over the round. You should now have (78, 84, 88) (90, 92, 96) (100, 104, 108) stitches on needles.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 3.2 in (8 cm). Bind off loosely.

Finishing

Graft the underarm stitches to close, then weave in all ends. Block the garment and lay it flat to dry. Finally, fold neck and sew in.






Warg Polaris

Warg Polaris is my most popular pattern, knitted and worn by knitters around the globe. This design holds a special place in the hearts of dog owners and mushers alike. Drawing inspiration from the wolf, the majestic ancestor of our faithful canine companions, Warg Polaris celebrates the deep connection between humans and these remarkable creatures.



Warg Polaris

This pattern is worked seamlessly in the round from the bottom up. First, the body and sleeves are worked up separately. Then, the body and arms are joined to form the yoke, which is worked in the round on a circular needle and shaped with decreases. The sweater is finished with a turtleneck.

Sizes

(2XS, XS, S) (M, L, XL) (2XL, 3XL, 4XL)

Recommended ease: 4 in (10 cm) positive ease

Measurements

Chest circumference:

(31.6, 36.3, 38.7) (43.8, 46.2, 49.8) (53.3, 56, 58.5) in/
(80, 92, 98) (111, 117, 126) (135, 142, 148) cm

Arm circumference:

(14.6, 15, 16.2) (16.8, 18.2, 19) (19.7, 20.5, 21.7) in/
(37, 38, 41) (43, 46, 48) (50, 52, 55) cm

Yarn

Ístex Álafosslopi; bulky weight; 100% new Icelandic wool; 109 yd
(99.5 m), 3.5 oz (100 g) per skein

C1: 0057 Grey: (4, 4, 5) (5, 5, 6) (6, 7, 7) skeins

C2: 0054 Ash: (2, 2, 2) (2, 2, 2) (3, 3, 3) skeins

C3: 0085 Oatmeal: (2, 2, 2) (2, 2, 2) (2, 2, 2) skeins

C4: 0052 Black Sheep: (1, 1, 1) (1, 1, 1) (1, 1, 1) skeins

Needles

Double-pointed needles: US 7 and US 10 (4.5 mm and 6 mm) (unless the magic loop technique is used)

Circular needles, 16 in (40 cm): US 7 and US 10 (4.5 mm and 6 mm)

Circular needles, 32 in (80 cm): US 7 and US 10 (4.5 mm and 6 mm)

Gauge

13 stitches and 18 rows = 4 in (10 cm) on US 10 (6 mm) needle in stockinette stitch



Body

Cast on (100, 120, 126) (144, 148, 160) (172, 180, 192) stitches with C2 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work “knit 2, purl 2” for 3 in (7.5 cm).

Change to size US 10 (6 mm) needle. Knit 1 round.

Work Chart A.

Knit 1 round with C1, increase (2, 0, 2) (0, 2, 2) (2, 4, 0) stitches evenly over the round. You should now have (104, 120, 128) (144, 152, 164) (176, 184, 192) stitches on needles. Place a second marker after (52, 60, 64) (72, 76, 82) (88, 92, 96) stitches to mark front and back sides.

Continue in stockinette stitch with C1 until work measures (16.6, 16.6, 16.6) (17.4, 18.2, 19) (19, 19, 19.8) in/(42, 42, 42) (44, 46, 48) (48, 48, 50) cm or desired length.

Place the first (5, 6, 6) (6, 6, 6) (7, 6, 6) and the last (5, 5, 5) (6, 6, 6) (6, 6, 6) stitches on a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (10, 11, 11) (12, 12, 12) (13, 12, 12) stitches. The stitches for the other armhole will be put on holder when you start the Yoke. Set the work aside and begin sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (36, 36, 36) (36, 36, 40) (40, 40, 40) stitches with C2 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) needles. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work “knit 2 purl 2” rib for 3 in (7.5 cm).

Change to size US 10 (6 mm) needles. Knit 1 round with C2, increasing (0, 0, 0) (0, 0, 2) (2, 2, 2) stitches evenly over the round. You should now have (36, 36, 36) (36, 36, 42) (42, 42, 42) stitches on needles.

Work Chart A.

Continue in stockinette stitch with C1 increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last stitch of the round) until you have (48, 50, 54) (56, 60, 62) (66, 68, 72) stitches.

Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (17.8, 18.2, 18.2) (19, 20.1, 20.5) (20.5, 20.5, 22.1) in/(45, 46, 46) (48, 51, 52) (52, 52, 56) cm or desired length.

Warg Polaris

Place the first (5, 6, 6) (6, 6, 6) (7, 6, 6) and the last (5, 5, 5) (6, 6, 6) (6, 6, 6) stitches onto a holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (10, 11, 11) (12, 12, 12) (13, 12, 12) stitches.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Yoke

Join body and sleeves on size US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round at the first join. Knit over first sleeve. Knit over front side. Transfer next (10, 11, 11) (12, 12, 12) (13, 12, 12) stitches onto a holder or waste yarn for underarm. Knit over the other sleeve and back side. You should now have (160, 176, 192) (208, 224, 240) (256, 272, 288) stitches.

Work pattern according to Chart B and decrease as directed. Change to shorter needle if necessary. After completing chart (60, 66, 72) (78, 84, 90) (96, 102, 108) stitches remain on needles.

Neck

Change to size US 7 (4.5 mm) needle.

Knit 1 round with C2, decreasing (0, 2, 4) (2, 4, 6) (12, 18, 20) stitches evenly over the round. You should now have (60, 64, 68) (76, 80, 84) (84, 84, 88) stitches on needles.

Work “knit 2, purl 2” rib for 8 in (20 cm). Bind off loosely.

Finishing

Graft the underarm stitches to close, then weave in all ends. Block the garment and lay it flat to dry. Finally, fold the neck.




Biboon

Rooted in my family's ties to the Anishinaabe, this design draws inspiration from a dear friend who carries the legacy of her tribe as a spokesperson. The Winter Maker, known as Biboon, is the bringer of winter. This sweater is a tribute to the rich cultural heritage and a celebration of the enduring spirit of the Anishinaabe people.

Biboon

- The Wintermaker

Starting with a ribbed hem, the body and sleeves are worked bottom up in the round and knit separately. A steek is added to the body for later arm attachment. The neck is knitted by picking up stitches from the body. The arms are knitted separately and sewn into the body afterwards.

(2XS, XS, S) (M, L, XL) (2XL, 3XL, 4XL)

Recommended ease: 4 in (10 cm) positive ease

Circular needles, 32 in (80 cm): US 4 and US 7 (3.5 mm and 4.5 mm)

Gauge

18 stitches and 26 rows = 4 in (10 cm) on US 7 needle in stockinette stitch

Body

Cast on (148, 160, 168) (180, 200, 220) (240, 260, 280) stitches with C1 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Knit 5 rounds to achieve a rolled edge.

Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib while working according to Chart A.

Change to size US 7 (4.5 mm) needle. Work 1 round while increasing (2, 0, 2) (0, 0, 0) (0, 0, 0) stitches evenly. You should now have (150, 160, 170) (180, 200, 220) (240, 260, 280) stitches. Place a second marker after (75, 80, 85) (90, 100, 110) (120, 130, 140) stitches to mark front and back sides.

Work pattern according to Chart B, starting where marked for selected size. The Chart will not go up in most sizes. Note: *By commencing at the marker, the pattern is positioned to ensure the seam appears invisible.* Continue until Body measures (14.2, 14.2, 15) (15.8, 16.6, 17.4) (17.4, 18.2, 18.2) in/(36, 36, 38) (40, 42, 44) (44, 46, 46) cm or desired length.

From here you can either choose to knit the front piece and the back piece back and forth, or add 2 extra stitches between the front piece and the back piece for steeking. Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (23.7, 23.7, 24.9) (25.7, 26.5, 26.5) (27.6, 28.4, 28.4) in/(60, 60, 63) (65, 67, 67) (70, 72, 72) cm or desired length. Place middle (45, 46, 45) (46, 48, 48) (50, 50, 50) stitches from the front piece and middle (45, 46, 45) (46, 48, 48) (50, 50, 50) stitches from the back piece on a needle.

The remaining stitches that form the shoulders are sewn together or Kitchener grafted at the end. Set the work aside and begin sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (36, 36, 40) (40, 40, 44) (44, 44, 44) stitches with C1 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle.

Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round. Knit 5 rounds to achieve a rolled edge.

Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib while working according to Chart A.

Change to US 7 (4.5 mm) size needle.

Work 1 round while increasing (14, 14, 10) (10, 10, 16) (16, 16, 16) stitches evenly.

You should now have (50, 50, 50) (50, 50, 60) (60, 60, 60) stitches. Work Chart B while increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (60, 60, 72) (72, 72, 84) (84, 96, 108) stitches. Let the increase go into the pattern. Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (18.2, 19, 19.7) (21.3, 23, 23) (23.7, 23.7, 23.7) in/ (46, 48, 50) (54, 58, 58) (60, 60, 60) cm or desired length.

Turn the piece inside out and knit 3 rounds wrong-side with C1 for covering over the cutting edge, if you choose to cut up to armhole. Bind off loosely.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

There are two options for the neck, high or short; follow the appropriate instructions below.

High Neck

Place middle (46, 45, 46) (45, 48, 48) (49, 50, 50) stitches from the front piece and middle (46, 45, 46) (45, 48, 48) (49, 50, 50) stitches from the back piece on size US 4 (3.5 mm) needle. You should now have (92, 90, 92) (90, 96, 96) (98, 100, 100) stitches.

Knit 1 round and adjust the number of stitches (if needed) to (92, 92, 92) (92, 96, 96) (100, 100, 100) stitches.

Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 8 in (20 cm). Bind off loosely. Fold the neck.

Short Neck

Place middle (46, 45, 46) (45, 48, 48) (49, 50, 50) stitches from the front piece and middle (46, 45, 46) (45, 48, 48) (49, 50, 50) stitches from the back piece on size US 4 (3.5 mm) needle. You should now have (92, 90, 92) (90, 96, 96) (98, 100, 100) stitches.

Knit 1 round and adjust the number of stitches (if needed) to (92, 92, 92) (92, 96, 96) (100, 100, 100) stitches.

Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 1.2 in (3 cm).

Knit 5 rounds for a rolled edge. Bind off loosely.



Haida

Starting with a ribbed hem, the body and sleeves are worked bottom up in the round and knit separately. A steek is added to the body for later arm attachment. The neck is knitted by picking up stitches from the body. The arms are knitted separately and sewn into the body afterwards.

Sizes

(2XS, XS, S) (M, L, XL) (2XL, 3XL, 4XL)

Recommended ease: 2–4 in (5–10 cm) positive ease

Body

Cast on (112, 128, 144) (152, 160, 176) (192, 208, 224) stitches with C1 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round and a second marker after (56, 64, 72) (76, 80, 88) (96, 104, 112) stitches to mark the front and back sides.

Work “knit 1, purl 1” rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to size US 10 (6 mm) needle. Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (15, 15.8, 15.8) (16.6, 16.6, 17.4) (17.4, 18.2, 18.2) in/(38, 40, 40) (42, 42, 44) (44, 46, 46) cm or desired length, allowing 9.8 in (25 cm) for Chart C. Follow Chart C until body measures (17, 17.8, 17.8) (18.6, 18.6, 19.3) (19.3, 20.1, 20.1) in/(43, 45, 45) (47, 47, 49) (49, 51, 51) cm.

From here you can choose to knit the front piece and the back piece back and forth, or to add 2 extra stitches in between the front piece and the back piece on each side if you prefer to knit in the round and cut (steek) the opening.

Continue knitting Chart C until row 41. Bind off 5 stitches in the middle of the front of the sweater. This will be the new beginning of the round. From here on, the yoke is knit back and forth in stockinette stitch. Finish the pattern and knit 3 more rows.

On a stitch holder set aside the middle (36, 36, 36) (40, 40, 40) (40, 44, 44) stitches ((+5 stitches) which are not included in the pattern) from the front piece and the middle (36, 36, 36) (40, 40, 40) (40, 44, 44) stitches from the back piece. The remaining stitches forming the shoulders are sewn together or Kitchener grafted at the end.

Hood

Place 1 stitch marker in the middle of the back. Knit back and forth in stockinette stitch until the hood measures 18.8 in (35 cm) or the desired length.

In the next 12 rounds, we will shape the top back side of the hood. The decreases take place on the left and right sides of the stitch marker placed at the back of the head. Decrease 1 stitch on each side of the marker every 2nd round, a total of 6 times (12 stitches decreased).

Graft the underarm stitches and the hood to close.

Hood Button Band

Pick up stitches for the button band as follows: Pick up 3 stitches, skip the 4th st, and repeat this pattern until you reach the other end of the hood.

Make sure to end up with an even number of stitches. Knit 1 row in stockinette stitch, then work the ribbing “knit 1, purl 1”

Repeat these rows until the button band measures 1.5 in (4 cm) on all sizes. If desired, knit buttonholes* on the left side of the hood; otherwise, skip this step for a hood without buttons.

Bind off and sew the bottom of the button band by laying the ends over each other.

Hide the steeked edges.

***Buttonholes:** After 0.8 in (2 cm), knit 2 stitches together and then bind off 1 stitch. Binding off 1 stitch will fit well with 0.8–0.86 in (20–22 mm) buttons. Continue until button band measures 1.5 in (4 cm) on all sizes. Bind off more stitches if you want larger buttons.

Set the work aside and begin sleeves.

For a more detailed description in how to knit a Button band see page 58.

Sleeves

Cast on (32, 32, 32) (36, 36, 36) (40, 40, 40) stitches with C1 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the start of the round.

Work “knit 1, purl 1” rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to size US 10 (6 mm) needle. Knit 1 round with C1, increasing (8, 8, 8) (4, 4, 4) (8, 8, 8) stitches evenly over the round. You should now have (40, 40, 40) (40, 40, 40) (48, 48, 48) stitches.

Work Chart A.

Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last stitch of the round) until you have (64, 64, 64) (64, 64, 80) (80, 80, 80) stitches or until work measures (14.2, 14.2, 14.6) (15.0, 15.4, 15.7) (15.7, 16.1, 16.1) in/(36, 36, 37) (38, 39, 40) (40, 41, 41) cm or desired length, allowing 4 in (10 cm) for Chart B.

Work pattern according to Chart B. Let increases run into the pattern if left.

Knit 3 more rounds in C2. Bind off loosely.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Finishing

Sew or Kitchener graft shoulders together.

If you choose to knit in a round: Sew two tight seams by hand or with a sewing machine corresponding to the width at the top of the sleeves, and then cut up between the seams. Set in sleeves.

If you choose to knit back and forth: Set in sleeves.

Afterward, add buttons, weave in all ends, block the garment, and lay it flat to dry.






The Button Band

Knitting your first button band might seem overwhelming, so here is a more detailed explanation of the process.

To create a neat button band for your hoodie, pick up stitches along the edge, skipping every fourth stitch until you reach the other end. Make sure to end up with an even number of stitches for a clean button band look.

Knit the first row in stockinette stitch. After that, establish a ribbing pattern by alternating between purling one and knitting one on each row until the button band measures 1.5 inches (4 cm).

If you want buttons, create buttonholes on the left side starting after 0.8 inches (2 cm) of knitting. Do this by first knitting 2 stitches together and binding off 1 stitch, followed by casting on 1 stitch in the following round where we have bound off to create a little hole. Adjust the number of stitches bound off based on the size of your buttons. Continue the ribbing for an additional 0.8 inches (2 cm).

Finally, bind off and sew the bottom of the button band by laying the ends over each other to achieve a folded look.

To conceal the seam inside the hood, pick up stitches along the steek, skipping every fourth stitch until you reach the other end. Knit 2 cm in stockinette stitch and fold over the seam. Sew it in place. This technique is also called a Steek Sandwich.

Instead of the Steek Sandwich, you can use a ribbon to hide the seam. Pin a ribbon into place over right front steek, beginning at the bottom edge of the button band, turning under top and bottom edges to neaten, and overlapping neck band ribbon to finish. Sew into place using a small slip stitch all around the ribbon.

When I envision winters in the park, I see the sun shining brightly on the rugged rocks, casting mesmerizing patterns over the sprawling mountains. Nature is delicately adorned with a gentle layer of snow, creating a serene and beautiful landscape. The design of Zion reflects the breathtaking beauty of the Zion National Park, capturing its essence in every stitch.



Zion

This pattern is worked seamlessly in the round from the bottom up. First, the body and sleeves are worked up separately. Then, the body and arms are joined to form the yoke, which is worked in the round on a circular needle and shaped with decreases. The sweater is finished with a turtleneck.

C1: Álafosslopi—0086 Light Beige: (4, 5, 5) (5, 6, 6) (6, 7, 7) skeins

C2: Vams—47 Petrol: (2, 2, 2) (3, 3, 3) (4, 4, 4) skeins

C3: Vams—50 Light Blue Jeans: (2, 2, 2) (3, 3, 3) (4, 4, 4) skeins

Needles

Double-pointed needles: US 7 and US 10 (4.5 mm and 6 mm)
(unless the magic loop technique is used)

Circular needles, 16 in (40 cm): US 7 and US 10 (4.5 mm and 6 mm)

Circular needles, 32 in (80 cm): US 7 and US 10 (4.5 mm and 6 mm)

Gauge

14 stitches and 20 rows = 4 in (10 cm) on US 10 needle in
stockinette stitch

Body

Cast on (90, 100, 120) (140, 160, 180) (200, 220, 240) stitches with C1 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round and after (45, 50, 60) (70, 80, 90) (100, 110, 120) stitches to mark the front and back pieces.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 3 in (7.5 cm).

Change to a US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (12.6, 12.6, 12.6) (13.4, 14.2, 15.0) (15.0, 15.0, 15.7) in/(32, 32, 32) (34, 36, 38) (38, 38, 40) cm or desired length, allowing 4 in (10 cm) for Chart B.

Work Chart B.

Place the first (5, 5, 5) (5, 10, 10) (10, 15, 15) stitches of the round on a holder or waste yarn. The stitches for the other armhole will be put on holder when you start the yoke. Set the work aside and begin sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (36, 36, 36) (36, 42, 42) (42, 48, 48) stitches with C1 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 3 in (7.5 cm).

Change to size US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Knit 1 round in C1.

Work pattern according to Chart A.

Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (60, 60, 60) (60, 70, 70) (70, 80, 80) stitches.

Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (14.2, 14.2, 14.6) (15.0, 15.4, 15.7) (15.7, 16.1, 16.1) in/(36, 36, 37) (38, 39, 40) (40, 41, 41) cm or desired length, allowing 4 in (10 cm) for Chart B.

Work Chart B.

Place the first (5, 5, 5) (5, 10, 10) (10, 15, 15) stitches of the round on a stitch holder or waste yarn. It is crucial that these first 5 stitches are set aside because they are essential for the proper alignment of the charts when you join the round.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Yoke

Join body and sleeves on a US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round at the first join.

Knit over first sleeve.

Work the front piece (40, 40, 50) (60, 60, 70) (80, 80, 90) stitches. Transfer next (5, 5, 5) (5, 10, 10) (10, 15, 15) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm. Knit over the other sleeve and back piece. You should now have (190, 200, 220) (240, 260, 280) (300, 320, 340) stitches.

Work pattern according to Chart C and decrease as directed. Change to shorter needle when necessary.

After completing chart (76, 80, 88) (96, 104, 112) (120, 128, 136) stitches remain on needles.

Knit 1 round in C2 while decreasing (20, 16, 16) (16, 16, 16) (16, 16, 16) stitches evenly over the round.

You should now have (56, 64, 72) (80, 88, 96) (104, 112, 120) stitches remaining on needles.

Knit Chart D.


Neck

Change to size US 7 (4.5 mm) needle. Knit 1 round with C1, decreasing (0, 0, 0) (4, 8, 12) (20, 24, 28) stitches evenly over the round. You should now have (56, 64, 72) (76, 80, 84) (84, 88, 92) stitches on needles.

Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 8 in (20 cm). Bind off loosely.

Finishing

Graft the underarm stitches to close, then weave in all ends. Block the garment and lay it flat to dry. Finally, fold the neck.

Waheca is named after our dog,
a stunning Red Siberian Husky with shimmering ice-blue eyes.
The name "Waheca" means "ice crystals" in the Lakota Sioux language.



Waheca

This pattern is worked seamlessly in the round from the bottom up. First, the body and sleeves are worked up separately. Then, the body and arms are joined to form the yoke, which is worked in the round on a circular needle and shaped with decreases to achieve a raglan fit. The sweater is finished with your choice of high neck, turtleneck, or hood.

Sizes

(2XS, XS, S) (M, L, XL) (2XL, 3XL, 4XL)

Recommended ease: 4 in (10 cm) positive ease

Body

Cast on (108, 120, 132) (144, 156, 168) (180, 192, 204) stitches with C1 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round and a second marker after (52, 60, 66) (72, 78, 84) (90, 96, 102) stitches to mark the front and back sides.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 3 in (7.5 cm).

Change to a US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Knit 1 round in C1.

Knit Chart A.

Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (18, 18.5, 19.25) (19.5, 19.75, 20) (20.5, 20.75, 21.25) in/(46, 47, 48) (49, 50, 51) (52, 53, 54) cm or desired length.

Place the first (3, 3, 4) (4, 5, 5) (6, 6, 7) stitches of the beginning of the round and the last (2, 3, 3) (4, 4, 5) (5, 6, 6) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (5, 6, 7) (8, 9, 10) (11, 12, 13) stitches. Set the work aside and begin sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (36, 36, 36) (38, 38, 38) (42, 42, 42) stitches with C1 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 3 in (7.5 cm).

Change to a US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Knit 1 round in C1 and increase (0, 0, 0) (10, 10, 10) (6, 6, 6) stitches over the round. You should now have (36, 36, 36) (48, 48, 48) (48, 48, 48) stitches on needles. Knit Chart A while increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (52, 54, 56) (58, 60, 62) (64, 66, 68) stitches.

Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (18.25, 18.25, 18.5) (18.75, 19.25, 19.75) (19.75, 20, 20) in/(46, 46, 47) (48, 49, 50) (50, 51, 51) cm or desired length. Place the first (3, 3, 4) (4, 5, 5) (6, 6, 7) stitches of the beginning of a round and the last (2, 3, 3) (4, 4, 5) (5, 6, 6) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (5, 6, 7) (8, 9, 10) (11, 12, 13) stitches.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Waheca

Yoke

Join body and sleeves on size US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker between every joining piece. Place an additional stitch marker at the first join to mark the start of the round = 4 (+1) markers placed. Knit over first sleeve. Knit the front. Knit over the other sleeve and back. You should now have (192, 204, 216) (228, 240, 252) (264, 276, 288) stitches. Knit first (0.4, 0.4, 0.4) (0.6, 0.6, 0.8) (0.8, 1.2, 1.2) in/ (1, 1, 1) (1.5, 1.5, 2) (2, 3, 3) cm in stockinette stitch.

From here, we will shape the raglan.

Raglan Decrease: On each side of the marked stitches, decrease 1 stitch to the left and 1 stitch to the right (2 stitches per join), a total of 8 stitches decreased per round every 2nd round. On the right side of the marker, decrease by knitting 2 stitches together through the back loops. On the left side of the marker, decrease by knitting 2 stitches together. Change to a shorter circular needle if necessary. Work to (6.3, 6.7, 7.1) (7.5, 7.9, 8.3) (8.7, 9.1, 9.4) in/(16, 17, 18) (19, 20, 21) (22, 23, 24) cm from the joining edge. Decide if you want to knit a hoodie, high neck, or turtleneck and follow the appropriate instructions below.

High Neck

Repeat decrease every other round and knit 2 in (5 cm) more or until (64, 68, 72) (68, 72, 76) (72, 76, 80) stitches remain on needles.

Knit 1 round and decrease to (64, 64, 68) (68, 68, 68) (72, 72, 76) stitches.

Change to size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 3 in (7.5 cm). Bind off loosely.

Turtleneck

Repeat decrease every other round and knit 2 in (5 cm) more or until (64, 68, 72) (68, 72, 76) (72, 76, 80) stitches remain on needles.

Change to size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 8 in (20 cm). Bind off loosely.

Hood

Bind off 5 stitches in the middle of the front of the sweater. This will be the new beginning of the round. From here on, the yoke is knit back and forth. Repeat Raglan decrease every other round and knit 2 in (5 cm) more or until (64, 68, 72) (68, 72, 76) (72, 76, 80) stitches remain on needles.

Knit 1 round and decrease to (64, 64, 64) (68, 68, 68) (72, 72, 72) stitches. Place 1 stitch marker in the middle of the back.

Knit back and forth in stockinette stitch until the hood measures 18.8 in (35 cm) or the desired length. In the next 12 rounds, we will shape the top back side of the hood. The decreases take place on the left and right sides of the stitch marker placed at the back of the head. Decrease 1 stitch on each side of the marker every 2nd round, a total of 6 times (12 stitches decreased).

Graft the underarm stitches and the hood to close.

Hood Button Band

Pick up stitches for the button band as follows: Pick up 3 stitches, skip the 4th st, and repeat this pattern until you reach the other end of the hood. Make sure to end up with an even number of stitches.

Knit 1 row in stockinette stitch, then work the ribbing as follows:

Row 1: Purl 1, knit 1.

Row 2: Knit 1, purl 1.

Repeat these rows until the button band measures 1.5 in (4 cm) on all sizes. If desired, knit buttonholes* on the left side of the hood; otherwise, skip this step for a hood without buttons.

Bind off in a contrasting color and sew the bottom of the button band by laying it over each other. Hide the steeked edges.

*Buttonholes: After 0.8 in (2 cm), knit 2 stitches together and then bind off 1 stitch. Binding off 1 stitch will fit well with 0.8–0.86 in (20–22 mm) buttons. Bind off more stitches if you want larger buttons.

For a more detailed description in how to knit a Button-band see page 58.



Graft the underarm stitches to close, then weave in all ends. Afterward, add buttons, block the garment, and lay it flat to dry.

Denali



Denali is the highest peak of North America and is one of the most iconic and majestic mountains in the world. It is located in Denali National Park and Preserve in the state of Alaska, USA. The mountain was originally called "Denali" by the Koyukon Athabaskan people and it means "The High One" or "The Great One." Inspired by the majestic Alaskan mountains, this sweater design captures the essence of one of my favorite places on Earth. It took time and careful consideration to choose a name that truly honors the wild spirit of this design, and Denali proved to be the perfect choice.

The Denali sweater is a simple design and the word Denali may sound like a simple name but for me it stands for harsh weather conditions, strong winds, extremely cold temperatures, and frequent storms.

It stands for diverse wildlife, including grizzly bears, moose, caribou, wolves, and Dall sheep.

Denali

Holding 2 strands together this pattern is worked seamlessly from the bottom up, starting with a ribbed hem and ending with a ribbed neck. The body and sleeves are worked bottom up and then joined to work the yoke in a raglan shape. The sweater can be knitted with a turtle-neck or a comfortable long neck.

Sizes

(2XS, XS, S) (M, L, XL) (2XL, 3XL, 4XL)

Recommended ease: 2–4 in (5–10 cm) positive ease

Work "knit 1, purl 2" rib for 0.8 in (2 cm).

Change to size US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Work Chart A.

Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (18, 18.5, 19.25) (19.5, 19.75, 20) (20.5, 20.75, 21.25) in/(46, 47, 48) (49, 50, 51) (52, 53, 54) cm or desired length. Place first (3, 3, 3) (3, 4, 4) (4, 5, 5) stitches and last (3, 3, 3) (4, 4, 4) (5, 5, 6) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (6, 6, 6) (7, 8, 8) (9, 10, 11) stitches. The stitches for the other armhole will be put on holder when you start the yoke.

Set the work aside and begin sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (32, 34, 34) (36, 36, 38) (38, 40, 40) stitches with C1 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work "knit 1, purl 2" rib for 0.8 in (2 cm).

Change to size US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Work Chart A.

Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (54, 55, 56) (59, 62, 63) (66, 69, 72) stitches. Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (18.25, 18.25, 18.5) (18.75, 19.25, 19.75) (19.75, 20, 20) in/(46, 46, 47) (48, 49, 50) (50, 51, 51) cm or desired length.

Place first (3, 3, 3) (3, 4, 4) (4, 5, 5) stitches and last (3, 3, 3) (4, 4, 4) (5, 5, 6) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (6, 6, 6) (7, 8, 8) (9, 10, 11) stitches.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Yoke

Join body and sleeves on size US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker between every joining piece. Place an additional stitch marker at the first join to mark the start of the round = 4 (+1) markers placed. Knit over first sleeve. Knit the front. Knit over the other sleeve and back. You should now have (204, 216, 228) (240, 252, 264) (276, 288, 300) stitches. Knit (3, 3, 4) (5, 6, 7) (8, 9, 10) rounds in stockinette stitch.

From here, we will shape the raglan.

Knit Chart B followed by Chart C while shaping the raglan. Work Chart B heightwise once, then work Chart C continuously until the neck. The stitches directly to the left and right of the marked stitches are always knit in C1.

Raglan Decrease: On each side of the marked stitches, decrease 1 stitch to the left and 1 stitch to the right (2 stitches per join), a total of 8 stitches decreased per round every 2nd round. On the right side of marker, decrease by knitting 2 stitches together through the back loops of the stitches. On the left side of the marker, decrease by knitting 2 stitches together. Change to a shorter circular needle if necessary.

Repeat decrease every other round until you have (84, 88, 92) (96, 100, 104) (108, 112, 116) stitches left.

Knit 1 round and decrease (4, 8, 6) (12, 12, 16) (16, 20, 20) stitches evenly over the round. You should now have (80, 80, 84) (84, 88, 88) (92, 92, 96) stitches on the needles.

Decide if you want to knit a long neck or turtleneck and follow the appropriate instructions.

Long Neck

Work “knit 2, purl 2” rib for 3 in (7.5 cm). Bind off loosely.

Turtleneck

Work “knit 2, purl 2” rib for 8 in (20 cm). Bind off loosely.

Finishing

Graft the underarm stitches to close, then weave in all ends. Block the garment and lay it flat to dry. Finally, fold the neck.

Once you have this ratio, use it to estimate the amount of yarn you will need for your whole sweater.

Double-pointed needles: US 4 and US 6 (3.5 mm and 4 mm) (unless the magic loop technique is used)

Circular needles, 16 in (40 cm): US 4 and US 6 (3.5 mm and 4 mm)

Circular needles, 32 in (80 cm): US 4 and US 6 (3.5 mm and 4 mm)

Gauge

19 stitches and 28 rows = 4 in (10 cm) on US 6 needle in stockinette stitch

Body

Cast on (176, 192, 208) (224, 240, 256) (272, 288, 304) stitches with Main Color using size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker at the beginning of the round and a second marker after (88, 96, 104) (112, 120, 128) (136, 144, 152) stitches to mark the front and back sides.

Work “knit1, purl 1” rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to size US 6 (4 mm) needle. Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (18, 18.5, 19.25) (19.5, 19.75, 20) (20.5, 20.75, 21.25) in/(46, 47, 48) (49, 50, 51) (52, 53, 54) cm or desired length. Place (4, 5, 6) (7, 8, 9) (10, 11, 12) stitches at the beginning of a round and the last (4, 5, 6) (7, 8, 9) (10, 11, 12) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (8, 10, 12) (14, 16, 18) (20, 22, 24) stitches. Set the work aside and begin sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (36, 38, 40) (40, 42, 42) (38, 40, 40) stitches with Main Color using size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work “knit 1, purl 1” rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to US 6 (4 mm) size needle. Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (64, 68, 72) (76, 80, 84) (88, 92, 96) stitches.

Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (18.25, 18.25, 18.5) (18.75, 19.25, 19.75) (19.75, 20, 20) in/(46, 46, 47) (48, 49, 50) (50, 51, 51) cm.

Place (4, 5, 6) (7, 8, 9) (10, 11, 12) stitches at the beginning of a round and the last (4, 5, 6) (7, 8, 9) (10, 11, 12) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (8, 10, 12) (14, 16, 18) (20, 22, 24) stitches.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Yoke

Join body and sleeves on size US 6 (4 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round at the first join. Knit over first sleeve.

Work the front, transfer next (6, 8, 10) (12, 14, 16) (18, 20, 22) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm. Knit over the other sleeve and back. You should now have (272, 288, 304) (320, 336, 352) (368, 384, 400) stitches.

Work pattern according to the charts and decrease according to the size you are knitting, as below.

Note! Always decrease in the first row of a new chart.

For example:

The pattern suggests to decrease at round 22 however your chosen chart doesn't end until row 24. Decrease at round 25 instead. If your chart ends at row 20. Decrease at row 21 instead.

2XS – 272 stitches: Chart total length: 42 rounds.

Round 22: Decrease 48 stitches evenly over the round = 224 stitches

Round 30: Decrease 56 stitches evenly over the round = 168 stitches

Choose from short neck, rolled neck, or turtleneck and follow instructions below.

Short Neck

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 3 in (7.5 cm). Bind off loosely.

Rolled Neck

Knit 5 rounds to achieve a rolled edge. Bind off loosely.

Turtleneck

Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 8 in (20 cm). Bind off loosely.

Finishing

Graft the underarm stitches to close, then weave in all ends. Block the garment and lay it flat to dry. Finally, fold the neck.

Akilak

Starting with a ribbed hem, the body and sleeves are worked bottom up in the round and knit separately. A steek is added to the body for later sleeve attachment. The neck is knitted by picking up stitches from the body. The arms are knitted separately and sewn into the body afterwards.

Cast on (112, 120, 136) (144, 152, 168) (176, 192, 200) stitches with C2 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round and after (56, 60, 68) (72, 76, 84) (88, 96, 100) stitches to mark the front and back sides.

Work “knit 1, purl 1” rib. Switch to C1 after you have knit 1 round of rib and work rib to 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to size US 10 (6 mm) needle. Continue with C1 until work measures (13.4, 13.4, 14.2) (15, 15.8, 42) (16.5, 17.3, 17.3) in/(34, 36, 36) (38, 38, 40) (40, 42, 42) cm or desired length, allowing 9.4 in (24 cm) for Chart A.

Knit following chart, starting and ending where it is marked for the selected size. Once the body measures (13.4, 13.4, 14.2) (15, 15.8, 42) (16.5, 17.3, 17.3) in/(41, 41, 41) (43, 43, 45) (45, 47, 47) cm, choose between knitting the front piece and the back piece back and forth, or adding 2 extra stitches on each side between the front and back pieces if you prefer to knit in the round and cut the opening. Continue knitting chart until complete.

Place middle (37, 37, 39) (39, 39, 39) (41, 41, 41) stitches from front piece and middle (37, 37, 39) (39, 39, 39) (41, 41, 41) stitches from back piece on a size US 7 (4.5 mm) needle. You should now have (92, 92, 92) (92, 96, 96) (100, 100, 100) stitches. The remaining stitches forming the shoulders are sewn together or Kitchener grafted at the end.

Work “knit 2, purl 2” rib for 8 in (20 cm). Bind off loosely. Set the work aside and knit sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (36, 36, 36) (38, 38, 38) (40, 40, 40) stitches with C2 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work “knit 1, purl 1” rib. Switch to C1 after you have knit one round of the rib and work rib to 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to size US 10 (6 mm) needle. Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last stitch of the round) until you

have (56, 56, 56) (64, 64, 72) (72, 80, 80) stitches or until work measures (15, 15.4, 17) (18.1, 19.3, 19.3) (19.3, 20, 20) in/(31, 33, 33) (35, 35, 37) (37, 39, 39) cm or desired length, allowing 5.5 in (14 cm) for Chart B. Work Chart B. Bind off loosely.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Finishing

Sew two tight seams by hand or with a sewing machine corresponding to the width at the top of the sleeves, and then cut up between the seams. Sew in the sleeves. Afterward, weave in all ends, block the garment, and lay it flat to dry.





Starting with a ribbed hem, the body and sleeves are worked bottom up in the round and knit separately. A steek is added to the body for later sleeve attachment. The neck is knitted by picking up stitches from the body. The arms are knitted separately and sewn into the body afterwards.

Cast on (112, 128, 144) (152, 160, 176) (192, 208, 224) stitches with C1 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round and after (56, 64, 72) (76, 80, 88) (96, 104, 112) stitches to mark the front and back side.

Work “knit 1, purl 1” rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to size US 10 (6 mm) needle. Continue with C1 until work measures (15, 15.8, 15.8) (16.5, 16.5, 17.3) (17.3, 18.1, 18.1) in/(34, 36, 36) (38, 38, 40) (40, 42, 42) cm or desired length, allowing 11.4 in (29 cm) for Chart B.

Knit following Chart B until body measures (16.5, 16.4, 16.5) (16.9, 16.9, 17.7) (17.7, 18.5, 18.5) in/(41, 41, 41) (43, 43, 45) (45, 47, 47) cm.

From here you can choose between knitting the front piece and the back piece back and forth, or adding 2 extra stitches in between the front piece and the back piece on each side if you prefer to knit in a round and cut the opening.

Continue knitting Chart B until row 41.

Bind off 5 stitches in the middle of the front of the sweater. This will be the new beginning of the round. From here on, the yoke is knit back and forth.

Finish the pattern and knit 3 more rounds. Set aside the middle (36, 36, 36) (40, 40, 40) (40, 44, 44) (+5) stitches (which are not included in the pattern) from the front piece and the middle (36, 36, 36) (40, 40, 40) (40, 44, 44) stitches from the back piece. The remaining stitches forming the shoulders are sewn together or Kitchener grafted at the end.

Hood

Place 1 stitch marker in the middle of the back. Knit back and forth in stockinette stitch until the hood measures 18.8 in (35 cm) or the desired length.

In the next 12 rounds, we will shape the top back side of the hood. The decreases take place on the left and right sides of the stitch marker placed at the back of the head. Decrease 1 stitch on each side of the marker every 2nd round, a total of 6 times (12 stitches decreased).

Graft the underarm stitches and the hood to close.

Hood Button Band

Pick up stitches for the button band as follows: Pick up 3 stitches, skip the 4th st, and repeat this pattern until you reach the other end of the hood. Make sure to end up with an even number of stitches.

Knit 1 row in stockinette stitch, then work the ribbing “knit 1, purl 1”

Repeat these rows until the button band measures 1.5 in (4 cm) on all sizes. If desired, knit buttonholes* on the left side of the hood; otherwise, skip this step for a hood without buttons.

Bind off and sew the bottom of the button band by laying the ends over each other. Hide the steeked edges.

***Buttonholes:** After 0.8 in (2 cm), knit 2 stitches together and then bind off 1 stitch. Binding off 1 stitch will fit well with 0.8–0.86 in (20–22 mm) buttons. Continue until Buttonband measures 1.5 in (4 cm) on all sizes. Bind off more stitches if you want larger buttons. Set the work aside and begin sleeves.

For a more detailed description in how to knit a button band see page 58.



Sleeves

Cast on (32, 32, 32) (36, 36, 36) (40, 40, 40) stitches with C1 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle.

Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work “knit 1, purl 1” rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to size US 10 (6 mm) needle. Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (64, 64, 64) (64, 64, 80) (80, 80, 80) stitches or until work measures (14.2, 15, 15) (15.8, 15.8, 16.6) (16.6, 17, 17) in/(36, 38, 38) (40, 40, 42) (42, 44, 44) cm or desired length, allowing 4 in (10 cm) for Chart A. Work pattern according to Chart A. Let increases run into the pattern.

Knit 3 more rounds in C2. Bind off loosely.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Finishing

Sew or Kitchener graft shoulders together.

If you choose to knit in a round: Sew two tight seams by hand or with a sewing machine corresponding to the width at the top of the sleeves, and then cut up between the seams. Set in sleeves.

If you choose to knit back and forth: Set in sleeves.

Afterward, add Buttons, weave in all ends, block the garment, and lay it flat to dry.






Starting with a ribbed hem, the body and sleeves are worked bottom up in the round and knit separately. A steek is added to the body for later sleeve attachment. The neck is knitted by picking up stitches from the body.

The sleeves are knitted separately and sewn into the body afterwards.

Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round and after (84, 90, 96) (102, 108, 114) (120, 132, 140) stitches to mark front and back sides. Knit 5 rounds to achieve a rolled edge.

Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 1.2 in (3 cm).

Change to US 6 (4 mm) size needle. Continue with C1 until work measures (15, 15.8, 15.8) (16.6, 16.6, 17.4) (17.4, 18.2, 18.2) in/(38, 40, 40) (42, 42, 44) (44, 46, 46) cm or desired length. Note: Chart C is 10.3 in (26 cm) high. Work Chart C and start and end where it is marked for the selected size.

Continue Chart C until work measures (17, 17.8, 17.8) (18.6, 18.6, 19.3) (19.3, 20.1, 20.1) in/(43, 45, 45) (47, 47, 49) (49, 51, 51) cm or desired length.

From here you can choose between knitting the front piece and the back piece back and forth, or adding 2 extra stitches in between the front piece and the back piece on each side if you prefer to knit in the round and cut the opening.

Continue knitting Chart C. Set the middle (46, 46, 46) (46, 48, 48) (50, 50, 50) stitches from the front piece and the middle (46, 46, 46) (46, 48, 48) (50, 50, 50) stitches from the back piece on a US 4 (3.5 mm) needle. You should now have (92, 92, 92) (92, 96, 96) (100, 100, 100) stitches.

Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib with C1 for 1.2 in (3 cm).

Knit 5 rounds to achieve a rolled edge. Loosely bind off. The remaining stitches that form the shoulders are sewn together or Kitchener grafted at the end. Set the work aside and knit sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (36, 36, 40) (40, 40, 44) (44, 44, 44) stitches with C1 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round. Knit 5 rounds to achieve a rolled edge. Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 1.2 in (3cm).

Change to US 6 (4 mm) size needle.

Work 1 round in C2 while increasing (14, 14, 10) (10, 10, 16) (16, 16, 16) stitches evenly over the round.

You should now have (50, 50, 50) (50, 50, 60) (60, 60, 60) stitches. Work Chart A. Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last stitch of the round) until you have (72, 72, 84) (84, 96, 96) (108, 108, 120) stitches. Let the increase stitches go into the pattern.

Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (14.2, 15, 15) (15.8, 15.8, 16.6) (16.6, 17, 17) in/(36, 38, 38) (40, 40, 42) (42, 44, 44) cm or desired length, allowing 3.4 in (9 cm) for Chart B. Work pattern according to Chart B. Bind off loosely.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Finishing

Sew or Kitchener graft shoulders together.

If you choose to knit in a round: Sew two tight seams by hand or with a sewing machine corresponding to the width at the top of the sleeves, and then cut up between the seams. Set in sleeves.

If you choose to knit back and forth: Set in sleeves.

Afterward, weave in all ends, block the garment, and lay it flat to dry

Body

Cast on (126, 144, 156) (174, 192, 204) (216, 240, 252) stitches with C5 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round and after (63, 72, 78) (87, 96, 102) (108, 120, 126) stitches to mark front and back sides.

Work 2 rounds of “knit 1, purl 1” rib and change to C3. Work “knit 1, purl 1” rib for 3 in (7.5 cm).

Change to size US 7 (4.5 mm) needle. Knit 1 round.

Work Chart A.

Continue in stockinette stitch while working Chart B until work measures (16.6, 16.6, 16.6) (17.4, 18.2, 19) (19, 19, 19.8) in/(42, 42, 42) (44, 46, 48) (48, 48, 50) cm or desired length.

Place the first (3, 5, 6) (6, 7, 7) (7, 8, 8) and the last (4, 5, 6) (7, 7, 8) (7, 8, 9) stitches on a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (7, 10, 12) (13, 14, 15) (14, 16, 17) stitches. The stitches for the other armhole will be put on holder when you start the yoke. Set the work aside and knit the sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (36, 36, 36) (42, 42, 48) (48, 48, 48) stitches with C5 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work 2 rounds of “knit 1, purl 1” rib and change to C3. Work “knit 1, purl 1” rib for 3 in (7.5 cm).

Change to size US 7 (4.5 mm) needle. Knit 1 round.

Work Chart A. Continue in stockinette stitch while working increases of 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (55, 60, 66) (67, 68, 72) (72, 72, 76) stitches.

Continue with Chart B until work measures (17.8, 18.2, 18.2) (19, 20.1, 20.5) (20.5, 20.5, 22.1) in/(45, 46, 46) (48, 51, 52) (52, 52, 56) cm or desired length.

Place the first (3, 5, 6) (6, 7, 7) (7, 8, 8) and the last (4, 5, 6) (7, 7, 8) (7, 8, 9) stitches on a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (7, 10, 12) (13, 14, 15) (14, 16, 17) stitches.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

(Note: You will not complete Chart B under the sleeves in sizes 2XS, M, L, and 4XL.)

Yoke

Join body and sleeves on size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round at the first join. Knit over first sleeve. Knit over front side. Transfer next (7, 10, 12) (13, 14, 15) (14, 16, 17) stitches onto stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm. Knit over the other sleeve and back side. You should now have (208, 224, 240) (256, 272, 288) (304, 320, 336) stitches.

Work pattern according to Chart C and decrease as directed. Change to shorter needle if necessary. After completing chart (78, 84, 90) (96, 102, 108) (114, 120, 126) stitches remain on needles.

Neck

Change to US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Work 1 round straight with C2 while at the same time decreasing (10, 14, 18) (22, 26, 30) (34, 38, 44) stitches evenly over the round. You should now have (68, 70, 72) (74, 76, 78) (80, 82, 82) stitches.

Work “knit 1, purl 1” rib for 3.2 in (8 cm).

Loosely bind off. Fold Neck.

Body

Cast on (140, 152, 168) (180, 196, 224) (236, 252, 280) stitches with C2 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Version 1: Work “knit 2, purl 2” rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Version 2: Knit 5 rounds to achieve a rolled edge.

Work “knit 2, purl 2” rib for 1.2 in (3 cm).

Change to size US 7 (4.5 mm) needle. Work 1 round while increasing (0, 2, 0) (2, 0, 0) (2, 0, 0) stitches evenly over the round. You should now have (140, 154, 168) (182, 196, 224) (238, 252, 280) stitches. Place an additional stitch marker after (70, 77, 84) (91, 98, 112) (119, 126, 140) stitches to divide the front piece and the back piece.

Choose if you prefer to work the short or longer versions of the Charts. Work pattern according to Chart A, followed by Chart B. Chart A and B are worked alternately four times in total.

Choose between knitting the front and back pieces back and forth or adding 2 extra stitches on each side between them if you prefer to knit in the round and cut the opening. Work the pattern according to Chart C, followed by one more repeat of Charts A and B. Set the work aside and knit the sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (36, 36, 40) (40, 40, 44) (44, 44, 44) stitches.

Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Version 1: Work “knit 2, purl 2” rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Version 2: Knit 5 rounds to achieve a rolled edge.

Work “knit 2, purl 2” rib for 1.2 in (3 cm).

Change to size US 7 (4.5 mm) needle. Work 1 round while increasing (14, 14, 10) (10, 10, 16) (16, 16, 16) stitches evenly over the round. You should now have (50, 50, 50) (50, 50, 60) (60, 60, 60) stitches.

Work pattern according to Chart A, followed by Chart B. Work both charts while increasing 2 stitches every 4th round until you have (70, 70, 80) (80, 80, 90) (90, 90, 90) stitches and let the increased stitches go into the pattern. Continue knitting until Chart A

has been repeated 3 times and Chart B has been repeated 2 times. Opt for either the regular or shorter length for a more tailored fit for your arms and body. Work pattern according to Chart C. Bind off loosely. Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Choose to work a high or short neck and follow the appropriate instructions below.

High Neck (Version 1)

Place the middle (46, 46, 46) (46, 48, 48) (50, 50, 50) stitches from the front piece and the middle (46, 46, 46) (46, 48, 48) (50, 50, 50) stitches from the back piece on a US 4 (3.5 mm) needle. You should now have (92, 92, 92) (92, 96, 96) (100, 100, 100) stitches. With C1 work “knit 2, purl 2” rib for 8 in (20 cm). Bind off loosely. Fold neck.

Short Neck (Version 2)

Place the middle (46, 46, 46) (46, 48, 48) (50, 50, 50) stitches from the front piece and the middle (46, 46, 46) (46, 48, 48) (50, 50, 50) stitches from the back piece on a US 4 (3.5 mm) needle. You should now have (92, 92, 92) (92, 96, 96) (100, 100, 100) stitches.

With C1 work “knit 2, purl 2” rib for 1.2 in (3 cm).

Knit 5 rounds to achieve a rolled edge. Loosely bind off.

Finishing



Honovi, a creation that took shape in the year 2020, holds a special place in my heart as it marked my discovery of Latvian braids. Inspired by the Latvian braid's ability to infuse garments with exquisite detail, I wanted to ensure that the remaining elements of the design remained elegantly simple, allowing the braid to shine and command attention without becoming overshadowed. The result of this creative pursuit became Honovi, a garment where the mesmerizing Latvian braid takes center stage, weaving its intricate patterns with grace and finesse.



Honovi

This pattern is worked seamlessly in the round from the bottom up. The body and sleeves are worked separately. Then, they are joined to form the yoke, which is shaped with decreases to achieve a raglan fit. The sweater is finished with your choice of a turtleneck, high neck, or hood.

(2XS, XS, S) (M, L, XL) (2XL, 3XL, 4XL)

Recommended ease: 2 in (5 cm) positive ease
(this sweater is meant to be close fitting)

Body

Cast on (140, 150, 160) (180, 190, 200) (210, 220, 230) stitches with C1 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round and a second marker after (70, 75, 80) (90, 95, 100) (105, 110, 115) stitches to mark the front and back sides.

Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 4 in (10 cm). Change to a US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle.

Knit 1 round in C1. Knit Chart A. Continue with C1 in stockinette stitch until work measures (11, 11, 12) (12.6, 13.8, 13.8) (13.8, 13.8, 14.2) in/(28, 28, 30) (32, 35, 35) (35, 35, 36) cm or desired length, allowing 4 in (10 cm) for Chart C.

Knit Chart C.

Place the first (2, 2, 3) (4, 4, 5) (5, 5, 6) stitches of the beginning of a round and the last (3, 2, 3) (4, 3, 4) (6, 5, 6) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (5, 4, 6) (8, 7, 9) (11, 10, 12) stitches. The stitches for the other armhole will be put on holder when you start the yoke. Set the work aside and begin sleeves

Sleeves

Cast on (36, 36, 36) (36, 36, 40) (40, 40, 40) stitches with C1 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle.

Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 4 in (10 cm).

Change to a US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Knit 1 round in C1 while increasing (4, 4, 4) (4, 4, 10) (10, 10, 10) stitches evenly over the round. You should now have (40, 40, 40) (40, 40, 50) (50, 50, 50) stitches.

Knit Chart B.

Continue in stockinette stitch with C2 while increasing 2 stitches (1 stitch after the first stitch on round and 1 stitch before the last stitch on round).

Repeat increases every 5th round. Knit (2.8, 2.8, 3.2) (3.2, 3.5, 3.5) (3.9, 3.9, 3.9) in/(7, 7, 8) (8, 9, 9) (10, 10, 10) cm (while still increasing) or desired length, allowing 4 in (10 cm) for Chart C. Knit Chart C.

Work Chart C while still increasing up to (48, 48, 54) (54, 54, 60) (66, 66, 72) stitches.

Place the first (2, 2, 3) (4, 4, 5) (5, 5, 6) stitches of the beginning of a round and the last (3, 2, 3) (4, 3, 4) (6, 5, 6) stitches onto a st holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total (5, 4, 6) (8, 7, 9) (11, 10, 12) stitches.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Raglan

Join body and sleeves with C2 on size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker between every joining piece. Place an additional stitch marker at the first join to mark the start of the round = 4 (+1) markers placed. Knit over first sleeve. Knit the front. Knit over the other sleeve and back. You should now have (208, 224, 240) (256, 272, 288) (304, 320, 336) stitches. From here, we will shape the raglan.

Raglan Decrease: On each side of the marked stitches, decrease 1 stitch to the left and 1 stitch to the right (2 stitches per join), a total of 8 stitches decreased per round every 2nd round. On the right side of marker, decrease by knitting 2 stitches together through the back loops of the stitches. On the left side of the marker, decrease by knitting 2 stitches together. Change to a shorter circular needle if necessary.

Repeat decrease every other round until you have (78, 84, 90) (96, 102, 108) (114, 120, 126) stitches left.

Choose whether you will work a turtleneck, high neck, or hood and follow the appropriate instructions that follow.



High Neck

Knit 1 round and decrease to (92, 92, 92) (92, 96, 96) (100, 100, 100) stitches. Change to size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Work “knit 2, purl 2” rib for 3 in (7.5 cm). Bind off loosely. Fold neck.

Turtleneck

Knit 1 round and decrease to (92, 92, 92) (92, 96, 96) (100, 100, 100) stitches. Change to size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Work “knit 2, purl 2” rib for 8 in (20 cm). Bind off loosely.

Hood

Knit 2 rounds. Knit 1 more round and increase by 6 stitches on all sizes. Place 1 stitch marker in the middle of the front marking the new beginning of the round. (Slip stitches in between without knitting them to get to the point. This marks also where the chart should be placed.) Knit 1 round and cast on 7 stitches at the end of the round—those are the steek stitches which will be cut later on. If you prefer, knit back and forth and ignore the steeking options.

Work Charts in the following order: X-Z-Y. Both arrows will need to face each other in the front while the Chart Pattern Z is repeated after Chart X has been knit and before starting Chart Y. For a simplified look, knit Chart Z all the way. Keep on knitting the hood for 11 in (28 cm) or the desired length.

In the next 12 rounds, shape the top backside of the hood. The decreases take place on the left and right sides from the stitch marker placed at the back of the head. Decrease 1 stitch on each side of the marker every 2nd round for a total of 6 times (12 stitches decreased). Cut the steek. Use the Kitchener stitch to close the top of the hood.

Finishing

Use Kitchener stitch to graft the underarms. Fix loose ends. Voila!






Latvian Braid

To knit the Latvian braid along the hood, pick up stitches as follows: Pick up 3 stitches, skip the 4th st, and repeat until you reach the other end of the hood. Knit the Latvian braid as follows:

Round 1: Knit 1 stitch with C3, followed by 1 stitch with C5, repeating this pattern until you reach the end of the round.

Round 2: With both C3 and C5 in the front, purl 1 stitch with C3, then bring C5 under C3 and purl 1 stitch with C5. Next, bring C3 under C5, and continue this pattern until the end of the round.

Round 3: Purl 1 stitch with C3, then bring C5 over C3 and purl 1 stitch with C3 again. Repeat this sequence, bringing C5 over C3 each time, until you complete the round.

Bind off using Tubular Bind-off by first alternately knitting 1 and slipping 1 stitch, then grafting all stitches together using a tapestry needle, resulting in a stretchy, seamless edge.





Round 1: Knit 1 stitch with C3, followed by 1 stitch with C5, repeating this pattern until you reach the end of the round.

Round 2: With both C3 and C5 in the front, purl 1 stitch with C3, then bring C5 under C3 and purl 1 stitch with C5. Next, bring C3 under C5, and continue this pattern until the end of the round.

Round 3: Purl 1 stitch with C3, then bring C5 over C3 and purl 1 stitch with C3 again. Repeat this sequence, bringing C5 over C3 each time, until you complete the round.

Bind off using Tubular Bind-off by first alternately knitting 1 and slipping 1 stitch, then grafting all stitches together using a tapestry needle, resulting in a stretchy, seamless edge.

Eldlauv is a creation that emerged from a series of challenging days and a sense of creative stagnation. It symbolizes the triumph over moments of uncertainty and the return of inspiration in the most unexpected places. During a stroll through my untamed garden, my eyes fell upon bushes of red currants. Their vibrant presence breathed new life into me. Eldlauv stands for the transformative power of nature's beauty and the resilience of creativity. It encapsulates the journey from feeling uninspired and idea-less to rediscovering the joy of creativity through the simplest yet captivating encounters.



Eldlauv

This pattern is worked seamlessly in the round from the bottom up. First, the body and sleeves are worked separately. Then, they are joined to form the yoke, which is shaped with decreases and worked in the round on a circular needle.

The sweater is finished with a rolled neck.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to US 7 (4.5 mm) size needle. Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (18, 18.5, 19.25) (19.5, 19.75, 20) (20.5, 20.75, 21.25) in/(46, 47, 48) (49, 50, 51) (52, 53, 54) cm or desired length. Place the first (2, 2, 3) (4, 4, 5) (5, 5, 6) stitches and the last (3, 2, 3) (4, 3, 4) (6, 5, 6) stitches of the round on a sleeve holder for armholes, a total of (5, 4, 6) (8, 7, 9) (11, 10, 12) stitches. The stitches for the second armhole will be put on holder when you start on the yoke. Set the work aside and knit sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (36, 36, 36) (36, 36, 40) (40, 40, 40) stitches with C1 using US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to US 7 (4.5 mm) size needle. Increase (0, 0, 0) (0, 0, 2) (2, 2, 2) stitches evenly over round = (36, 36, 36) (36, 36, 42) (42, 42, 42) stitches.

Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (48, 48, 54) (54, 54, 60) (66, 66, 72) stitches.

Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (18.25, 18.25, 18.5) (18.75, 19.25, 19.75) (19.75, 20, 20) in/(46, 46, 47) (48, 49, 50) (50, 51, 51) cm. Place the first (2, 2, 3) (4, 4, 5) (5, 5, 6) stitches and last (3, 2, 3) (4, 3, 4) (6, 5, 6) stitches of the round on a stitch holder for armholes, a total of (5, 4, 6) (8, 7, 9) (11, 10, 12) stitches.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Yoke

Join body and sleeves on size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round at the first join. Knit over first sleeve. Knit over front side. Transfer next (5, 4, 6) (8, 7, 9) (11, 10, 12) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm. Knit over the other sleeve and back side. You should now have (208, 224, 240) (256, 272, 288) (304, 320, 336) stitches.

Knit (14, 14, 16) (18, 22, 24) (26, 28, 32) rounds with C1.

Knit 1 round in stockinette stitch while at the same time decreasing (32, 32, 32) (32, 32, 32) (32, 32, 32) stitches evenly. You should now have (176, 192, 208) (224, 240, 256) (272, 288, 304) stitches.

Work pattern according to Chart and decrease as directed. Change to shorter needle if necessary. After completing chart (78, 84, 90) (96, 102, 108) (114, 120, 126) stitches remain on needles.

Neck

Change to US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. With C1 work 1 round even while at the same time decreasing (12, 12, 12) (16, 20, 20) (20, 26, 30) stitches evenly over the round. You should now have (66, 72, 78) (80, 82, 88) (94, 94, 96) stitches.


Work 5 rounds stockinette stitch in C1 to achieve rolled edge. Loosely bind off.



This pattern is worked seamlessly in the round from the bottom up. First, the body and sleeves are worked up separately. Then, the body and sleeves are joined to form the yoke, which is worked in the round on a circular needle and shaped with decreases to achieve a raglan fit.

The sweater is finished with a turtleneck or high neck.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 4 in (10 cm).

Change to a US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (16.5, 16.5, 16.5) (17.3, 18.1, 18.9) (18.9, 18.9, 19.7) in/(42, 42, 42) (44, 46, 48) (48, 48, 50) cm or desired length.

Place the first (3, 3, 4) (4, 5, 5) (6, 6, 7) stitches of the beginning of the round and the last (2, 3, 3) (4, 4, 5) (5, 6, 6) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (5, 6, 7) (8, 9, 10) (11, 12, 13) stitches. The stitches for the second armhole will be put on holder when you start on the yoke. Set the work aside and knit sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (34, 34, 34) (36, 36, 38) (40, 40, 40) stitches with C2 using a US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 4 in (10 cm).

Change to a US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (52, 54, 56) (58, 60, 62) (64, 66, 68) stitches.

Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (18.1, 18.1, 18.5) (18.9, 19.3, 19.7) (19.7, 20.1, 20.1) in/(46, 46, 47) (48, 49, 50) (50, 51, 51) cm or desired length.

Place the first (3, 3, 4) (4, 5, 5) (6, 6, 7) stitches of the beginning of the round and the last (2, 3, 3) (4, 4, 5) (5, 6, 6) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (5, 6, 7) (8, 9, 10) (11, 12, 13) stitches.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Yoke

Join body and sleeves on size US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker between every joining piece. Place an additional stitch marker at the first join to mark the start of the round = 4 (+1) markers placed. Knit over first sleeve. Knit the front. Knit over the other sleeve and back. You should now have (192, 204, 216) (228, 240, 252) (264, 276, 288) stitches. Knit first (0.4, 0.4, 0.4) (0.6, 0.6, 0.8) (0.8, 1.2, 1.2) in/(1, 1, 1) (1.5, 1.5, 2) (2, 3, 3) cm in stockinette stitch.

From here, we will shape the raglan.

Raglan Decrease: On each side of the marked stitches, decrease 1 stitch to the left and 1 stitch to the right (2 stitches per join), a total of 8 stitches decreased per round every 2nd round. On the right side of marker, decrease by knitting 2 stitches together through the back loops of the stitches. On the left side of the marker, decrease by knitting 2 stitches together. Change to a shorter circular needle if necessary. Repeat decrease every other round until you have knitted (14, 15, 16) (17, 18, 19) (20, 21, 22) rounds from joining edge.

Here we will now shape the seamless seam. Bind off the work. Now we will pick up all the stitches we just bound off. Knit 1 row by knitting through the last stitches before the bind off. I recommend using 1 needle size smaller as the stitches are very tight here. Now we have created the seam. Knit Chart, centering it in the front as it will not exactly match your stitch count as you keep on with raglan decrease.

Choose whether to work a high neck or turtleneck and follow the appropriate instructions below.



High Neck

Repeat decrease every other round and knit 2 in (5 cm) more or until (64, 68, 72) (68, 72, 76) (72, 76, 80) stitches remain on needles.

Knit 1 round and decrease to (64, 64, 68) (68, 68, 68) (72, 72, 76) stitches.

Change to size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 3 in (7.5 cm). Bind off loosely.

Turtleneck

Repeat decrease every other round and knit 2 in (5 cm) more or until (64, 68, 72) (68, 72, 76) (72, 76, 80) stitches remain on needles.



Place the first (3, 5, 7) (7, 7, 7) (7, 8, 9) and the last (4, 5, 7) (7, 7, 7) (7, 8, 9) stitches on a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (7, 10, 14) (14, 14, 14) (14, 16, 18) stitches. The stitches for the other armhole will be placed on holder when you start the yoke. Set the work aside and knit sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (32, 32, 40) (40, 40, 48) (48, 48, 48) stitches with C1 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle.

Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to US 7 (4.5 mm) size needle. Knit 1 round.

Work pattern according to Chart A.

Continue to knit in stockinette stitch using C1 increasing 2 stitches every 5th round until you have (54, 60, 68) (68, 68, 68) (72, 72, 76) stitches.

Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (18.25, 18.25, 18.5) (18.75, 19.25, 19.75) (19.75, 20, 20) in/(46, 46, 47) (48, 49, 50) (50, 51, 51) cm or desired length.

Place the first (3, 5, 7) (7, 7, 7) (7, 8, 9) stitches and the last (4, 5, 7) (7, 7, 7) (7, 8, 9) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (7, 10, 14) (14, 14, 14) (14, 16, 18) stitches.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Yoke

Join body and sleeves on a US 7 (4.5 mm) size circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round at the first join. Knit over first sleeve. Work the front piece and transfer next (7, 10, 14) (14, 14, 14) (14, 16, 18) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm. Knit over the other sleeve and back piece. You should now have (208, 224, 240) (256, 272, 288) (304, 320, 336) stitches. Work pattern according to Chart B and decrease as directed. Change to shorter needle when necessary. After completing chart (78, 84, 90) (96, 102, 108) (114, 120, 126) stitches remain on needles.

Neck

Change to size US 4 (3.5 mm) needle. Knit 1 round with C1, decreasing (6, 8, 10) (20, 20, 20) (20, 30, 30) stitches evenly over the round. You should now have (72, 76, 80) (76, 82, 88) (94, 90, 96) stitches on needles.

Knit 5 rounds to achieve a rolled edge. Bind off loosely.

Finishing

Graft underarm stitches to close. Weave in all ends. Block and lay flat to dry






Knit Chart for (2.6, 2.6, 1.7) (1.6, 1.4, 1.4) (1.2, 1.2, 0.8) in/(6, 6, 4.5) (4, 3.5, 3.5) (3, 3, 2) cm. From here you can choose between knitting the front piece and the back piece back and forth, or adding 3 extra stitches in between the front piece and the back piece on each side if you prefer to knit in the round and cut the armholes.

Continue Chart A until end.

Set middle (40, 42, 44) (48, 48, 52) (52, 55, 55) stitches from the front piece and the middle (40, 42, 44) (48, 48, 52) (52, 55, 55) stitches from the back piece on a size US 2 (3 mm) needle. You should now have (82, 86, 88) (94, 94, 106) (106, 112, 112) stitches. The remaining stitches form the shoulders and are sewn together or Kitchener grafted at the end.

Work “knit 1, purl 1” rib for 1.2 in (3 cm).

Change to C1 and knit 1 round first and then purl 1 round.

Knit 1.2 in (3 cm) in stockinette stitch and loosely bind off. Fold inwards and sew in neck. Set the work aside and knit the sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (46, 46, 48) (48, 48, 52) (52, 52, 56) stitches with C1 using size US 2 (3 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the start of the round. Work “knit 1, purl 1” rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to size US 4 (3.5 mm) needle. Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (75, 75, 91) (91, 91, 104) (104, 117, 117) stitches. Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (12.6, 12.6, 13.4) (13.4, 14.2, 14.2) (15, 15, 15) in/ (32, 32, 34) (34, 36, 36) (38, 38, 38) cm or desired length less 5.5 in (14 cm) for Chart B. Work pattern according to Chart B, letting increases run into pattern if remaining. Once the chart is finished bind off loosely.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Finishing

Sew or Kitchener graft shoulders together.

If you choose to knit in a round: Sew two tight seams by hand or with a sewing machine corresponding to the width at the top of the sleeves, and then cut up between the seams. Set in sleeves.

If you choose to knit back and forth: Set in sleeves.

Afterward, weave in all ends, block the garment, and lay it flat to dry.




Bearheart

The bear embodies noble qualities: strength, bravery, and courage. These attributes hold immense significance in facing life's battles and conquering the seemingly invincible. Life presents us with various challenges, and often it requires a resilient "bear heart" to confront and overcome them. Publishing a book is just one of them. This sweater is my personal favorite.

Bearheart

This pattern is seamlessly worked in the round from the bottom up. First, the body and sleeves are worked separately. Then, the body and sleeves are joined to form the yoke, which is shaped with decreases and worked in the round on a circular needle. The sweater is finished with a turtleneck.

(2XS, XS, S) (M, L, XL) (2XL, 3XL, 4XL)

Note: If working with Istex Plötulopi or similar weight yarn, hold two strands of yarn together throughout this pattern. Be sure to check gauge.



Body

Cast on (120, 128, 136) (144, 152, 160) (168, 176, 188) stitches with C1 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round and after (60, 64, 68) (72, 76, 80) (84, 88, 94) stitches to mark the front and back pieces.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 3 in (7.5 cm).

Change to a US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Continue in stockinette stitch with C1 until piece measures (12.6, 12.6, 12.6) (13.4, 14.2, 15.0) (15.0, 15.0, 15.7) in/(32, 32, 32) (34, 36, 38) (38, 38, 40) cm or desired length, allowing 3.5 in (9 cm) for Chart A.

Work pattern according to Chart A.

Place (6, 6, 6) (6, 6, 6) (7, 6, 6) stitches of the beginning of the round and the last (6, 6, 6) (6, 6, 6) (7, 6, 5) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (12, 12, 12) (12, 12, 12) (14, 12, 11) stitches. The stitches for the other armhole will be placed on holder when you start the yoke. Set the work aside and knit sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (32, 32, 34) (34, 36, 38) (40, 42, 44) stitches with C1 using size US 7 (4.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 3 in (7.5 cm).

Change to a US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (48, 52, 52) (56, 56, 60) (64, 68, 72) stitches.

Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (14.2, 14.2, 14.6) (15.0, 15.4, 15.7) (15.7, 16.1, 16.1) in/ (36, 36, 37) (38, 39, 40) (40, 41, 41) cm or desired length, allowing 3.5 in (9 cm) for Chart A.

Work pattern according to Chart A.

Place (6, 6, 6) (6, 6, 6) (7, 6, 6) stitches of the beginning of the round and the last (6, 6, 7) (6, 6, 6) (7, 6, 5) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (12, 12, 13) (12, 12, 11) (14, 12, 11) stitches.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Bearheart

Yoke

Join the body and sleeves on size US 10 (6 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round at the first join. Work stockinette stitch over the first sleeve. Then knit the front piece of the body and place the next (12, 12, 13) (12, 12, 11) (14, 12, 11) stitches on a stitch holder for the armholes. Knit over the other sleeve and back piece. You should now have (168, 182, 192) (208, 216, 234) (240, 264, 288) stitches.

Work the pattern according to Chart B and decrease as directed. Change to a shorter needle when needed.

Neck

Change to size US 7 (4.5 mm) needle. Knit 1 round and decrease to (68, 68, 72) (72, 80, 84) (84, 88, 92) stitches.

Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 8 in (20 cm). Bind off loosely.

Finishing

Graft underarm stitches to close. Weave in all ends. Block and lay flat to dry. Fold the neck




Waya

“Waya,” a name derived from the Cherokee language, means “wolf” and carries profound cultural significance. The wolf is often associated with protection and guidance and is seen as a guardian and teacher to the people. The wolf’s keen instincts and ability to navigate various terrains parallel the qualities we hope our son will develop as he journeys through life. It is our hope that he will grow to embody the noble characteristics attributed to the wolf, fostering resilience, compassion, and a deep connection to nature and community. By naming our son Waya, we aimed to honor our cultural roots and cherish the significance of language.



Waya



This pattern is worked seamlessly in the round from the bottom up. First, the body and sleeves are worked separately. Then, the body and sleeves are joined to form the yoke, which is worked in the round on a circular needle and shaped with decreases to achieve a raglan fit. Waya can be knitted with a turtleneck or a hood. Elbow patches are added at the end. Waya is meant to fit very oversized for that favorite sweater comfort feeling.

Recommended ease: 4–8 in (10–20 cm) positive ease

Gauge

19 stitches and 28 rows = 4 in (10 cm) on US 6 needle in stockinette stitch

Body

Cast on (176, 192, 208) (224, 240, 256) (272, 288, 304) stitches with C1 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker at the beginning of the round and a second stitch marker after (88, 96, 104) (112, 120, 128) (136, 144, 152) stitches to mark the front and back sides.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to US 6 (4 mm) size needle. Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (16.5, 16.5, 16.5) (17.3, 18.1, 18.9) (18.9, 18.9, 19.7) in/(42, 42, 42) (44, 46, 48) (48, 48, 50) cm or desired length.

Place (4, 5, 6) (7, 8, 9) (10, 11, 12) stitches at the beginning of the round and the last (4, 5, 6) (7, 8, 9) (10, 11, 12) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (8, 10, 12) (14, 16, 18) (20, 22, 24) stitches. The stitches for the other arm-hole will be placed on holder when you start the yoke. Set the work aside and knit sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (32, 34, 34) (36, 36, 38) (38, 40, 40) stitches with C1 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round. Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 2.75 in (7 cm).

Change to US 6 (4 mm) size needle. Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (64, 68, 72) (76, 80, 84) (88, 92, 96) stitches.

Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (18.1, 18.1, 18.5) (18.9, 19.3, 19.7) (19.7, 20.1, 20.1) in/(46, 46, 47) (48, 49, 50) (50, 51, 51) cm or desired length.

Place (4, 5, 6) (7, 8, 9) (10, 11, 12) stitches at the beginning of the round and the last (4, 5, 6) (7, 8, 9) (10, 11, 12) stitches onto a st holder or waste yarn for underarm, a total of (8, 10, 12) (14, 16, 18) (20, 22, 24) stitches.

Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Yoke

Join the body and sleeves on a size US 6 (4 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker between every joining piece. Also, place an additional stitch marker at the first join to mark the start of the round = total of 4 markers placed (+1). Knit over the first sleeve, then knit the front piece. Place (8, 10, 12) (14, 16, 18) (20, 22, 24) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm. Next, knit over the other sleeve and back piece. You should now have (272, 288, 304) (320, 336, 352) (368, 384, 400) stitches.

From here, we will shape the raglan.

Raglan Decrease: On each side of the marked stitches, decrease 1 stitch to the left and 1 stitch to the right (2 stitches per join), a total of 8 stitches decreased per round every 2nd round. On the right side of marker, decrease by knitting 2 stitches together through the back loops of the stitches. On the left side of the marker, decrease by knitting 2 stitches together. Change to a shorter circular needle if necessary.

Repeat decrease every other round until you have knit (6.25, 6.75, 7) (7.5, 7.75, 8.25) (8.75, 9, 9.5) in/ (16, 17, 18) (19, 20, 21) (22, 23, 24) cm from joining edge.

Decide if you want to knit a turtleneck or hood and follow the appropriate instructions below.

Turtleneck

Repeat decrease every other round for 2.25 in (6 cm) or until (72, 80, 80) (88, 88, 96) (96, 104, 104) stitches remain on needles.

Knit 1 round and decrease to (72, 80, 80) (84, 84, 88) (92, 96, 100) stitches.

Work "knit 2, purl 2" rib for 8 in (20 cm). Bind off loosely.

Hood

Bind off 7 stitches in the middle of the front of the sweater. This will be the new beginning of the round. From here on, the yoke is knit back and forth.

Repeat the decrease every other round and knit 2.25 in (6 cm) or until (72, 80, 80) (88, 88, 96) (96, 104, 104) stitches remain on the needles.

Knit 1 round and decrease to (72, 80, 80) (84, 84, 88) (92, 96, 100) stitches.

Place 1 stitch marker in the middle of the back. Knit back and forth in stockinette stitch until the hood measures 18.8 in (35 cm) or the desired length.

In the next 12 rounds, we will shape the top back side of the hood. The decreases take place on the left and right sides of the stitch marker placed at the back of the head. Decrease 1 stitch on each side of the marker every 2nd round, a total of 6 times (12 stitches decreased).

Graft the underarm stitches and the hood to close.

Hood Button Band

Pick up stitches for the button band as follows: Pick up 3 stitches, skip the 4th stitch, and repeat this pattern until you reach the other end of the hood. Make sure to end up with an even number of stitches.

Knit 1 row in stockinette stitch, then work the ribbing “knit 1, purl 1”

Repeat these rows until the button band measures 1.5 in (4 cm) on all sizes. If desired, knit buttonholes* on the left side of the hood; otherwise, skip this step for a hood without buttons.

Bind off in contrasting color and sew the bottom of the button band by laying the ends over each other. Hide the steeked edges.

*Buttonholes: After 0.8 in (2 cm), knit 2 stitches together and then bind off 1 stitch. Binding off 1 stitch will fit well with 0.8–0.86 in (20–22 mm) buttons. Continue until button band measures 1.5 in (4 cm) on all sizes. Bind off more stitches if you want larger buttons. Set the work aside and begin sleeves.

For a more detailed description in how to knit a button band see page 58.

Elbow Patches

Cast on 11 stitches using C2 on size US 6 (4 mm) needles. Do not join in a round but knit back and forth.


Follow the Chart and increase and decrease accordingly. Bind off loosely. Using C3 add an I-cord edging for a cleaner look.

Attach the patch on the elbow of the sweater. Knit 2 patches in total, one for each side.

Finishing

Weave in all ends. Finally, block the garment and lay it flat to dry.










The Ketchikan Sweater

Cast on (144, 162, 180) (198, 216, 234) (252, 270, 288) stitches with C1 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round and after (72, 81, 90) (99, 108, 117) (126, 135, 144) stitches to mark the front and back pieces.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 4 in (10 cm).

Change to a US 5 (3.75 mm) circular needle. Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (16.6, 16.6, 16.6) (17.4, 18.2, 19) (19, 19, 19.8) in/(42, 42, 42) (44, 46, 48) (48, 48, 50) cm or desired length, allowing 2 in (5 cm) for Chart A.

Work Chart A

Place the first (8, 10, 12) (14, 16, 18) (20, 22, 24) stitches of the round on a holder or waste yarn. The stitches for the other armhole will be put on holder when you start the yoke. Set the work aside and begin sleeves.

Sleeves

Cast on (36, 36, 36) (36, 42, 42) (42, 48, 48) stitches with C1 using size US 4 (3.5 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round.

Work "knit 1, purl 1" rib for 4 in (10 cm).

Change to size US 5 (3.75 mm) circular needle. Continue in stockinette stitch increasing 2 stitches every 5th round (1 stitch after the first stitch of the round, and 1 stitch before the last st of the round) until you have (54, 60, 66) (72, 78, 84) (90, 96, 102) stitches. Continue in stockinette stitch until work measures (18.25, 18.25, 18.5) (18.75, 19.25, 19.75) (19.75, 20, 20) in/(46, 46, 47) (48, 49, 50) (50, 51, 51) cm or desired length, allowing 2 in (5 cm) for Chart A.

Work Chart A.

Place the first (8, 10, 12) (14, 16, 18) (20, 22, 24) stitches of the round on a stitch holder or waste yarn. Knit the second sleeve like the first.

Yoke

Join body and sleeves on a US 5 (3.75 mm) circular needle. Place a stitch marker to mark the beginning of the round at the first join. Knit over the first sleeve. Work the front piece. Transfer next (8, 10, 12) (14, 16, 18) (20, 22, 24) stitches onto a stitch holder or waste yarn for underarm. Knit over the other sleeve and back piece. You should now have (220, 242, 264) (286, 308, 330) (352, 374, 396) stitches.

Work pattern according to Chart B and decrease as directed. Change to shorter needle when necessary.

After completing chart (98, 112, 126) (140, 154,

168) (182, 196, 210) stitches remain on needles.

Knit 1 round with C5, decreasing (14, 24, 32) (44, 50, 60) (62, 66, 76) stitches evenly over the round.

You should now have (84, 88, 94) (96, 104, 108) (120, 130, 134) stitches on needles.

Neck

Change to size US 4 (3.5 mm) needle. Use applied I-cord bind off for neckline:

Cast on 3 stitches using backward loop method.

Knit 2 stitches, then pass the first stitch over the second.

Repeat this pattern: Slip 3 stitches to the left needle, knit 2, pass the first over the second.

Keep 3 stitches on the right needle.


Use another needle to pick up a stitch from 1 row to the left.

Graft the 3 stitches on each needle together using Kitchener stitch.

Finishing

Graft the underarm stitches to close, then weave in all ends. Block the garment and lay it flat to dry.



