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# Open Shells Poncho

1 2 3 4 5 6 EASY

## FINISHED SIZES

Instructions given fit size small/medium; changes for large/X-large and 2X-large/3X-large are in ().

## FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

**Bottom circumference:** 84 (94, 106) inches

**Length:** 28 inches long

## MATERIALS

- Lion Brand Scarfie bulky (chunky) weight acrylic/wool yarn (5¼ oz/312 yds/150g per ball):  
4 (5, 6) balls #218 teal/silver
- Size K/10½/6.5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle



## GAUGE

2 shells = 4 inches; 5 shell rnds = 5 inches

Take time to check gauge.

## PATTERN NOTES

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Chain-2 at beginning of round counts as first half double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch unless otherwise indicated.

When weaving in the beginning tail, use it to sew small opening at neck together.

## SPECIAL STITCHES

**Beginning shell (beg shell):** (Ch 3, 2 dc, ch 2, 3 dc) in first st.

**Shell:** (3 dc, ch 2, 3 dc) in st indicated.

**First foundation single crochet (first foundation sc):** Ch 2, insert hook into 2nd ch from hook, yo, pull up a lp, yo,

pull through 1 lp on hook (see illustration A—ch-1 completed), yo, pull through both lps on hook (see illustrations B and C—sc completed).

## Next foundation single crochet (next foundation sc):

[Insert hook in last ch-1 made (see illustration A), yo, pull up a lp, yo, pull through 1 lp on hook (see illustration B—ch-1 completed), yo, pull through both lps on hook (see illustrations C and D—sc completed)] as indicated in instructions.

## PONCHO

**Rnd 1:** Leaving a long tail (see Pattern Notes), **first foundation sc** (see Special Stitches), **next foundation sc** (see Special Stitches) 55 (62, 69) times, **join** (see Pattern Notes) in first sc. [56 (63, 70) sc]

**Rnd 2:** Ch 2 (see Pattern Notes), hdc in each st around, join in first st.

Rep rnd 2 until piece measures 6 (8, 10) inches.

## BODY

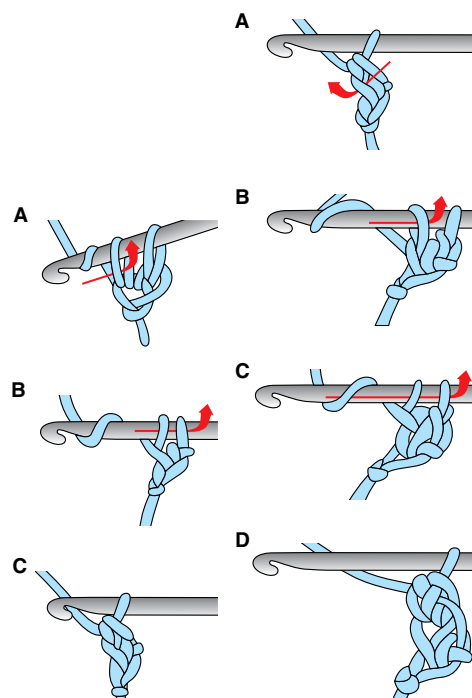
**Rnd 1:** Ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), dc in each st around, join in first st.

**Rnd 2:** Ch 3, dc in same st, work 2 dc in each rem st around, join in first st. [112 (126, 140) dc]

**Rnd 3:** Ch 3, work 2 dc in next st, \*dc in next st, 2 dc in next st, rep from \* around, join in first st. [168 (189, 210) dc]

## SIZE SMALL/MEDIUM ONLY

**Rnd 4:** Beg shell (see Special Stitches) in first st, sk next 3 sts, \*shell (see Special Stitches) in next st, sk next 3 sts, rep from \*

around, join in first st. [42 shells]

## SIZES LARGE/X-LARGE & 2X-LARGE/3X-LARGE ONLY

**Rnd (4):** Beg shell (see Special Stitches) in first st, sk next 3 sts, shell (see Special Stitches) in next st, \*sk next 3 sts, shell in next st, rep from \* around to last (4, 1) st(s), sk last (4, 1) st(s), join in first st. [(47, 53) shells]

## ALL SIZES

**Rnd 5:** Sl st across to first ch-2 sp, beg shell in same sp, shell in each rem ch-2 sp around, join in first st.

**Rnds 6–22:** Rep rnd 5.

**Rnd 23:** Sl st across to first ch-2 sp, ch 3, work 8 more dc in same sp, work 9 dc in each rem ch-2 sp around, join in first st. Fasten off. [378 (423, 477) dc] **CW**

# Waves of Color Cowl

## FINISHED SIZE

One size fits all

## FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

7¾ inches x 32 inches

## MATERIALS

- Plymouth Yarn Gina medium (worsted) weight wool yarn (1¾ oz/109 yds/50g per ball):  
2 balls #0002 red/green/copper
- Size H/8/5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Yarn needle



## GAUGE

14 sts = 4 inches; 10 rows = 4 inches

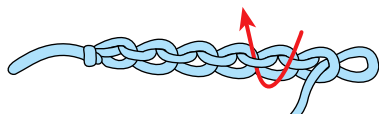
## PATTERN NOTES

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

## COWL

**Row 1:** Ch 113, working in **back bar of ch** (see illustration), sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc in next ch, [dc in next 4 chs, sc in next 4 chs] 13 times, dc in each of next 4 chs, sc in each of next 2 chs, turn. (112 sts)



Back Bar of Chain

**Row 2: Ch 3** (see Pattern Notes), dc in next sc, [sc in each of next 4 dc, dc in each of next 4 dc] 13 times, sc in each of next 4 dc, dc in each of next 2 sc, turn. (112 sts)

**Row 3:** Ch 1, sc in each of next 2 dc, [dc in each of next 4 sc, sc in each of next 4 dc] 13 times, dc in each of next 4 sc, sc in each of next 2 dc, turn. (112 sts)

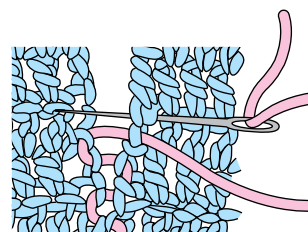
**Rows 4–19:** [Rep rows 2 and 3 alternately] 8 times.

At the end of row 19, leaving a 24-inch length, fasten off.

## FINISHING

With yarn needle and rem length, weave **invisible seam**

(see illustration), join short ends matching sts at ends of rows. **CW**

# Emerald Bloom Beret

1 2 3 4 5 6 INTERMEDIATE

## FINISHED MEASUREMENT

9½ inches in diameter

## MATERIALS

- Patons Classic Wool Worsted medium (worsted) weight wool yarn (3½ oz/ 210 yds/100g per ball):  
1 ball each #77708 emerald and #00202 Aran
- Size H/8/5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle



## GAUGE

Rnds 1–4 = 3 inches across;  
11 hdc = 3 inches

## PATTERN NOTES

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Join with slip stitch in first half double crochet as indicated unless otherwise stated.

## SPECIAL STITCHES

### Half double crochet

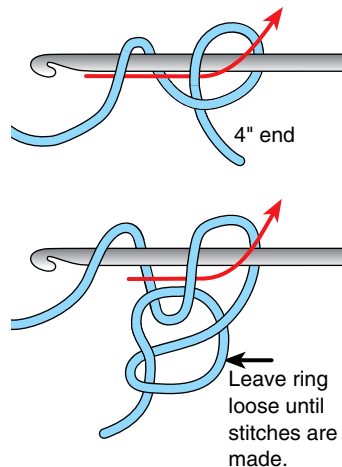
**2 together (hdc2tog):** (Yo, insert hook in next st, pull up lp) twice, yo, pull lp through all 5 lps on hook.

### Long single crochet (lg sc):

Insert hook in st of rnd 21 directly below, sk over 2 rnds, pull up lp to working height, draw new lp through both lps on hook.

**Slip ring:** Leaving 4-inch end, lap yarn over 4-inch end forming lp (see illustration), insert hook through lp from front to back, yo, pull through lp to form ring, yo, pull through lp on hook.

*The details are in the construction. Crocheted using textural post stitches to create the unique shape, this beret is felted and then embroidered with an accent color to highlight the intricate design.*

## BERET

**Rnd 1:** With emerald, make a **slip ring** (see *Special Stitches*), ch 1, work 10 hdc in ring; **join** (see *Pattern Notes*). Pull loose end of slip ring to close tightly. (10 hdc)

**Rnd 2:** (Ch 1, 2 hdc) in first st, **fpdc** (see *Stitch Guide*) around next st, (2 hdc in next st, fpdc around next st) around; **join**. (10 hdc, 5 fpdc)

**Rnd 3:** (Ch 1, hdc) in first st, hdc in next st, (hdc, fpdc, hdc)





in fpdc, [hdc in each of next 2 sts, (hdc, fpdc, hdc) in fpdc] around; join. (20 hdc, 5 fpdc)

**Rnd 4:** (Ch 1, hdc) in first st, work 1 hdc in each hdc and work (fpdc, hdc, fpdc) in each fpdc around; join. (25 hdc, 10 fpdc)

**Rnd 5:** (Ch 1, hdc) in first st, work 1 hdc in each hdc and (hdc, fpdc, hdc) in each fpdc around; join. (45 hdc, 10 fpdc)

**Rnd 6:** (Ch 1, hdc) in first st, hdc in each of next 3 sts, \*(fpdc, hdc) in fpdc, hdc in next 3 sts, (hdc, fpdc) in next fpdc\*\*, hdc in each of next 6 sts, rep from \* around, ending last rep at \*\*, hdc in last 2 sts; join. (55 hdc, 10 fpdc)

**Rnd 7:** (Ch 1, hdc) in first st, hdc in each of next 3 sts, \*(fpdc, hdc) in fpdc, hdc in next 5 sts, (hdc, fpdc) in next fpdc\*\*, hdc in next 6 sts, rep from \* around, ending last rep at \*\*, hdc in last 2 sts; join. (65 hdc, 10 fpdc)

**Rnd 8:** (Ch 1, hdc) in first st, work hdc in each hdc and fpdc around each fpdc around; join.

**Rnd 9:** (Ch 1, hdc) in first st, work hdc in each of next 2 sts, \*sk next st, (fpdc, hdc) in fpdc, hdc in next 7 sts, (hdc, fpdc) in next fpdc, sk next st\*\*, hdc in each of next 4 sts, rep from \* around, ending last rep at \*\*, hdc in last st; join.

**Rnd 10:** (Ch 1, hdc) in first st, hdc in next st, \*sk next st, (fpdc, hdc) in fpdc, hdc in next 9 sts, (hdc, fpdc) in next fpdc, sk next st\*\*, hdc in each of next 2 sts, rep from \* around, ending last rep at \*\*, join.

**Rnd 11:** (Ch 1, hdc) in first st, hdc in next st, \*(fpdc, hdc) in fpdc, (hdc in next 3 sts, 2 hdc in next st) twice, hdc in next 3 sts, (hdc, fpdc) in fpdc\*\*, hdc in next 2 sts, rep from \* around, ending last rep at \*\*, join. (85 hdc, 10 fpdc)

**Rnd 12:** Sl st into next 2 sts, ch 1, \*(fpdc, hdc) in fpdc, (hdc in next 5 sts, 2 hdc in next st) twice, hdc in next 3 sts, (hdc, fpdc) in fpdc\*\*,

sk next 2 sts, rep from \* around, ending last rep at \*\*, join. (95 hdc, 10 fpdc)

**Rnd 13:** Ch 2, [work 1 fpdc around both fpdc tog, (hdc in next 6 sts, 2 hdc in next st) twice, hdc in next 5 sts] around; join. (105 hdc, 5 fpdc)

**Rnd 14:** Ch 1, hdc in each hdc around, evenly spacing 15 inc, sk all fpdc; join. (120 hdc)

**Rnd 15:** Ch 1, hdc in each hdc around, evenly spacing 15 inc; join. (135 hdc)

**Rnd 16:** Ch 1, hdc in each hdc around; join.

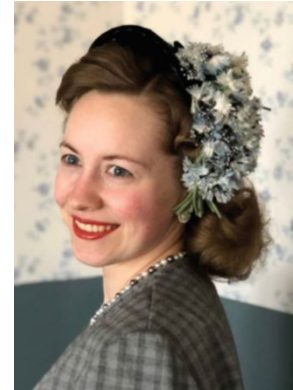
## About the Designer

### Kristen Stoltzfus Clay

A fourth generation crocheter, I have lots of crafty folks in my family. My grandma taught me my first crochet stitch when I was six years old. I picked it up again in my teen years, mostly teaching myself the basic stitches from back copies of old crochet magazines, and sold my first design when I was 19. Since then I've been designing steadily for many publications and yarn companies, even while the years brought a 2,300 mile move across the country, a marriage and an infant son. There is never enough time in the day to work up my ideas! Inspiration is everywhere.

It was very important to me to be able to work from home, and designing became both a creative outlet for a hobby I was already passionate about, and the perfect way to work at home at my own pace. Plus, I love the process—it's fun to see an intangible idea in my head take shape under my fingers and become something others can use and duplicate. My favorite kind of projects to design are jewelry and versatile women's accessories, but I do everything from garments, to home decor, to kids' wearables. I enjoy adding new techniques to my arsenal and using other elements such as beads in my crochet, but I also love playing around with combinations of the basics in countless ways. Just with color alone there are a dozen variations to every project, and the same piece can have a whole new mood! I also love reading, writing, exploring and photographing my beloved Idaho, collecting old movies and music, ranch life with my family, cooking, jewelry making and designing, vintage fashion, and sewing my clothes from vintage patterns. I've dabbled with felting crochet a few times, and after noticing how perennially popular classic felt berets are, I had to try making my own version. This one is finished after felting with one last round of single crochet, which gives you more leeway with the felting process since you can draw it in to fit your head size instead of depending on the felting shrinkage. I added embroidery to make the petal motif more noticeable (why make something plain when you can dress it up?), and love the visual appeal it adds—it's so fun to combine several fiber arts in one wearable piece!





# Autumn Hues Kitchen Rug

1 2 3 4 5 6 EASY

## FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

20 inches x 43 inches

## MATERIALS

- Lion Brand Vanna's Choice medium (worsted) weight acrylic yarn (solids: 3½ oz/170 yds/100g per skein; prints: 3 oz/145 yds/85g per skein):  
3 skeins #135 rust  
2 skeins #203 autumn print  
1 skein each #173 dusty green, #098 fisherman and #126 chocolate
- Size Q/16mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle



## GAUGE

3 dc = 2 inches; 2 rows = 2 inches

## PATTERN NOTES

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Rug is made holding 4 strands of yarn together.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

## RUG

**Row 1:** With 2 strands rust and 1 strand each chocolate and autumn print—**4 strands held tog** (see *Pattern Notes*), ch 4, 6 dc in 4th ch from hook (*sk chs count as first dc*), turn. (7 dc)

**Row 2: Ch 3** (see *Pattern Notes*), dc in same dc as beg ch-3, 2 dc in each dc across to last dc, 1 dc in last dc, turn. (13 dc)

**Row 3:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in next dc, [2 dc in next dc, dc in next dc] 5 times, dc in last dc, turn. (19 dc)

**Row 4:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in each of next 2 dc, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 2 dc] 5 times, dc in last dc, turn. (25 dc)

**Row 5:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in each of next 3 dc, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 3 dc] 5 times, dc in last dc, turn. (31 dc)

**Row 6:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in each of next 4 dc, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 4 dc] 5 times, dc in last dc, turn. (37 dc)

**Row 7:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in each of next 5 dc, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 5 dc] 5 times, dc in last dc, turn. (43 dc)

**Row 8:** Ch 3, dc in each of next 6 dc, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 6 dc] 5 times, dc in last dc, fasten off 1 strand rust, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) 1 strand of fisherman, turn. (48 dc)

**Row 9:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in each of next 6 dc, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 7 dc] 5 times, dc in last dc, fasten off chocolate strand, join dusty green strand, turn. (54 dc)

**Row 10:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in each of next 7 dc, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 8 dc] 5 times, dc in last dc, turn. (60 dc)

**Row 11:** Ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in each of next 8 dc, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 9 dc] 5 times, 2 dc in last dc, turn. (67 dc)


**Row 12:** Ch 3, dc in each of next 9 dc, 2 dc in next dc, [dc in each of next 10 dc, 2 dc in next dc] 5 times, dc in last dc, fasten off 1 strand fisherman, join 1 strand rust, turn. (73 dc)

**Row 13:** Ch 3, dc in each of next 10 dc, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 11 dc] 5 times, 2 dc in next st, dc in last st, turn. (79 dc)

**Row 14:** Ch 3, dc in each of next 11 dc, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 12 dc] 5 times, 2 dc in next st, dc in last st, turn. (85 dc)

**Row 15:** Ch 3, dc in each of next 12 dc, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 13 dc] 5 times, dc in each of last 2 sts, turn. (90 dc)

## BORDER

**Rnd 1:** Working across row 15, [ch 3, dc in same st, sk next 2 sts, sl st in next st] across, working across ends of rows, [ch 4, dc in same row, sk 1 row, sl st in next row], ending with sl st in same st as beg ch-3. Fasten off. 





***Make a rug for your kitchen in under four hours? You bet! Just hold four strands of worsted-weight yarn together in colors to match your decor and grab your size 16mm crochet hook!***



# Attic Windows Afghan

1 2 3 4 5 6 INTERMEDIATE

## FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

**Afghan:** 48 inches x 60 inches, excluding Edging

**Edging:** 1¼ inches wide

## MATERIALS

- Premier Yarns Everyday Soft Worsted Solid medium (worsted) weight acrylic yarn (4 oz/203 yds/113g per skein):
  - 4 skeins #100-12 black
  - 1 skein each #100-24 steel, #100-05 baby blue, #100-07 really red, #100-08 pine green, #100-09 royal blue, #100-10 aubergine, #100-14 caramel, #100-22 bittersweet, #100-28 mustard and #100-44 Christmas green
- Premier Yarns Everyday Soft Worsted Heathers medium (worsted) weight acrylic yarn (4 oz/203 yds/113g per skein):
  - 1 skein each #110-04 green heather, #110-09 charcoal heather, #110-11 wine heather, #110-10 oat heather and #110-13 fog heather
- Size H/8/5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Blocking supplies
- Stitch marker



## GAUGE

4 dc = 1 inch; 2 dc rows = 1 inch

## PATTERN NOTES

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

## SPECIAL STITCHES

### Yarn to front and drop:

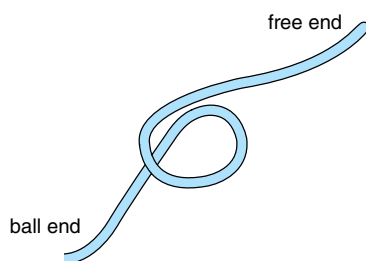
Bring working yarn from back to front of work and drop, do not fasten off.

### Loose slip stitch (loose sl st):

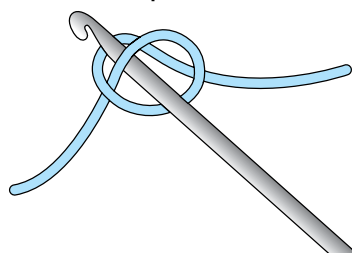
Keep loose, even tension when making sl sts to match gauge.

### Slip stitch join (sl st join):

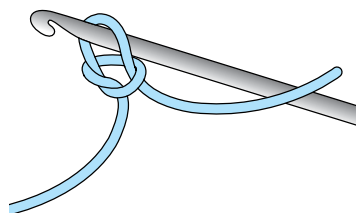
Place **slip knot** (see illustration) on hook, insert hook in indicated st, yo and draw through both lps on hook.



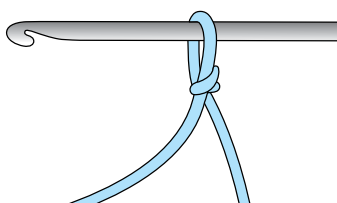

### Single crochet join (sc join):

Place slip knot on hook, insert hook in indicated st, yo, draw up lp, yo, draw through both lps on hook.

### Surface slip stitch (surface sl st):

Place slip knot on WS of work, with RS facing, insert hook between top 2 lps of indicated st from front to back of afghan, place slip knot on hook and draw lp through to front. Insert hook in next indicated st from front to back of afghan, yo, draw lp to front side and through lp on hook to complete as a surface sl st.

## SQUARE COLOR SEQUENCE

### Square A

A1 green heather

A2 oat heather

A3 mustard

### Square B

B1 royal blue

B2 baby blue

B3 aubergine

### Square C

C1 bittersweet

C2 caramel

C3 wine heather

### Square D

D1 really red

D2 charcoal heather

D3 steel

### Square E

E1 fog heather

E2 pine green

E3 Christmas green

## AFGHAN

### FIRST SQUARE

**Foundation rnd (RS):** With **A1** (see *Square Color Sequence*), ch 4, sk next 3 chs, 2 dc in 4th ch from hook (*sk chs count as first dc*), [ch 1, 3 dc in same ch as beg

dc sts] 3 times, ch 1, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in 4th ch of beg ch-4, turn. (12 dc, 4 ch-1 sps)

**Row 1 (WS):** Now working in rows, sl st in ch-1 sp, **ch 3** (see *Pattern Notes*), dc in each of next 3 sts, (2 dc, ch 2, 2 dc) in next corner ch-1 sp, dc in each of next 3 sts, dc in next ch-1 sp, turn. (12 dc)

**Row 2 (RS):** Ch 3, dc in each st across to next corner ch-2 sp, (2 dc, ch 2, 2 dc) in ch-2 sp, dc in each rem dc across, turn. (16 dc)

**Rows 3–8:** [Rep row 2] 6 times. At the end of row 8, **change color** (see *Stitch Guide*) to black, fasten off A1. (40 dc)

**Row 9:** Rep row 2, change color to A2. Fasten off black. (44 dc)

**Row 10:** Ch 3, dc in each st across to next corner ch-2 sp, (2 dc, ch 1 in ch-2 sp, **yarn to front and drop** (see *Special Stitches*), yo with A3 and draw through lp on hook to complete as 2nd ch-1, continuing with A3, 2 dc in same ch-2 sp), dc in each st across, turn. (48 dc)

**Row 11:** Ch 3, dc in each st across to next corner ch-2 sp, (2 dc, ch 1) in ch-2 sp, bring yarn to front and drop, yo with A2 and draw through lp on hook to complete as 2nd ch-1, continuing with A2, 2 dc in same ch-2 sp, dc in each st across, turn. (52 dc)

**Row 12:** Ch 3, dc in each st across to next ch-2 sp, (2 dc, ch 1) in corner ch-2 sp, bring A2

to front and drop, yo with A3 and draw through lp on hook to complete as a ch-1, continuing with A3, 2 dc in same ch-2 sp, dc in each st across, turn. (56 dc)

**Rows 13–20:** [Rep rows 11 and 12 alternately] 4 times. At the end of row 20, **do not turn**. (88 dc)

### Partial Edging

With RS facing, working in ends of rows 10–20 to left of last st made, ch 1, work 20 sc evenly sp to row 9, change color to black on last sc, \*2 sc in end of row 9\*\*, change color to A1 on last sc, work 21 sc evenly sp along ends of rows 1–8 and side edge of rnd 1 to ch-1 corner sp, (sc, ch 1, sc) in ch-1 sp, work 21 sc evenly sp along side edge of rnd 1 and in ends of rows 1–8 to row 9, change color to black on last sc, rep from \* to \*\* once, change color to A2 on last sc, work 20 sc evenly sp in ends of rows 10–20, ch 1, join to top of beg ch-3 of row 20. Fasten off. (88 sc)

### Square Edging

**Rnd 1:** Place square with RS facing on a flat surface with rnd 1 in lower right corner, using black, place sl st on hook, insert hook from front to back to front under ch-2 sp corner of rnd 8, yo, draw through lp on hook to complete as a sl st, continuing to work in ch-2 corner sps of rows 9–20, [ch 2, insert hook in same manner in next corner

ch-2 sp, yo, draw through lp on hook to complete a **loose sl st** (see *Special Stitches*)] across, ending with a sl st in ch-2 corner sp of row 20, sc in same ch-2 sp, working to left of sc just made, sc in each st across to next ch-1 corner, [(sc, ch 1 sc) in **back lp** (see *Stitch Guide*) of ch-1 corner, sc in each st across to next corner ch-1 sp] 3 times, sc in next corner ch-1 sp, ch 1, join in first sc. Fasten off black. (184 sc)

### SQUARES 2–20

Rep same as for First Square following Square Color Sequence.

### ASSEMBLY

Work favorite method to block each Square to 12 inches square and allow to dry completely.

When blocking smaller first-color section at upper left-hand corner of square, it should measure 5½ inches square.

Following Square Color Sequence Diagram, arrange squares in 5 horizontal rows of 4 squares.

### VERTICAL SEAM

**1.** With WS of any 2 squares held tog and working through both thicknesses, leaving a 10-inch length at beg, join 1 strand of black in any ch-1 corner, loose sl st in each st across and in next ch-1 corner, leaving a 10-inch length, fasten off.

**2.** With either end of seam facing, insert hook between front and back lp of first st to right of seam just completed, yo with yarn length and draw up lp, work 2 sc in end of seam, sl st in first sc to left of seam. Fasten off. Rep on opposite end working 2 sc in opposite end of seam.

**3.** Rep steps 1 and 2 to join all squares vertically and finish seams for all vertical rows.



## HORIZONTAL SEAM

**1.** With WS of rows 1 and 2 held tog and working through both thicknesses, leaving a 10-inch length at beg, matching ends of rows and all vertical seams, rep steps 1 and 2 same as for vertical seam to join and finish seams for all horizontal rows.

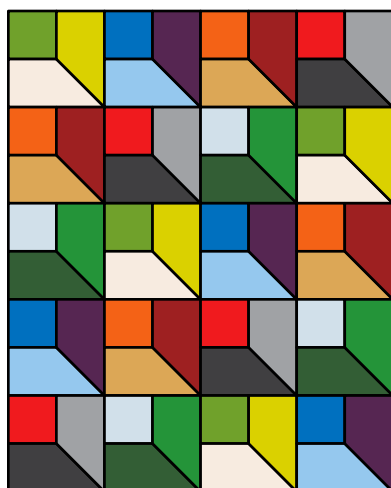

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

To change colors, work to last stitch of row, insert hook in last stitch, yarn over, draw loop through (2 loops on hook), yarn over with new color and draw through both loops on hook.

**Row 3:** With CC, ch 1, sc in each of first 2 sts, \*sc in **back lp** (see *Stitch Guide*) of next st\*\*, sc in each of next 11 sts, rep from \* across ending last rep at \*\*, sc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 4:** Ch 1, sc in each st across, change to MC in last st, turn.

**Row 5:** With MC, ch 1, sc in first st, \*shell (see *Special Stitches*)\*\*, sc in each of next 9 sts, rep from \* ending last rep at \*\*, sc in last st, turn.

**Row 6:** With MC, ch 1, sc in each st across, change to next CC in last st, turn.

**Row 7:** With CC, ch 1, sc in each of first 4 sts, \*sc in back lp of next st, sc in each of next 7 sts, sc in back lp of next st, sc in each of next 3 sts, rep from \* across, sc in last st, turn.

**Row 8:** With CC, ch 1, sc in each st across, change to MC in last st, turn.

**Row 9:** With MC, ch 1, sc in each of first 3 sts, \*shell, sc in each of next 5 sts, shell, sc in next st, rep from \* across, sc in each of last 2 sts, turn.

**Row 10:** With MC, ch 1, sc in each st across, change to next CC in last st, turn.

**Row 11:** With CC, ch 1, sc in each of first 6 sts, \*sc in back lp of next st, sc in each of next

3 sts, sc in back lp of next st\*\*, sc in each of next 7 sts, rep from \* across ending last rep at \*\*, sc in last 6 sts, turn.

**Row 12:** With CC, ch 1, sc in each st across, change to MC in last st, turn.

**Row 13:** With MC, ch 1, sc in each of first 5 sts, \*shell, sc in next st, shell, sc in each of next 5 sts, rep from \* across, turn.

**Row 14:** With MC, ch 1, sc in each st across, change to next CC in last st, turn.

**Row 15:** With CC, ch 1, sc in each of first 8 sts, \*sc in back lp of next st\*\*, sc in each of next 11 sts, rep from \* across ending last rep at \*\*, sc in each of next 8 sts, turn.

**Row 16:** With CC, ch 1, sc in each st across, change to MC in last st, turn.

**Row 17:** With MC, ch 1, sc in each of first 7 sts, \*shell\*\*, sc in each of next 9 sts, rep from \* across ending last rep at \*\*, sc in each of last 7 sts, turn.

**Row 18:** With MC, ch 1, sc in each st across, change to next CC in last st, turn.

**Rows 19 & 20:** Rep rows 11 and 12.

**Rows 21 & 22:** Rep rows 13 and 14.

**Rows 23 & 24:** Rep rows 7 and 8.

**Rows 25 & 26:** Rep rows 9 and 10.

**Rows 27–222:** (Rep rows 3–26) 8 times, then rep rows 3–6. Fasten off after last row.

## BORDER

**Rnd 1: Sc join** (see *Special Stitches*) MC in end of first row at lower right corner, 2 sc in same st, [sc in next MC row, \*sc in each of next 2 CC rows, sc in next MC row\*\*, sk next MC row,

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Scarf is worked in 2 strips which will be joined at the end. For strip 1, rotate through colors in sequence (A, B, C, D, E, F) until the end. For strip 2, rotate through colors in sequence (E, F, A, B, C, D) until the end.

## STITCH PATTERN

### Herringbone Stitch

**Row 1:** Ch 3, dc in next 11 sts, 3 dc in next st, turn.

### STRIP

**Row 1:** With first color (see

**Row 3: Join** (see *Pattern Notes*) next color in 5th st from the end of previous row, work row 1 of Herringbone Stitch pattern. (15 dc)

**Row 4:** Work row 2 of Herringbone Stitch pattern. (17 dc)

**Rows 5–82:** [Rep rows 3 and 4] 39 times.

#### ASSEMBLY

Referring to the photo for positioning, use the yarn tails to whipstitch the strips tog. The point of the protruding corner

will join the receding corner. Hold the corners and align the length and width of the adjoining sides when you join.

Weave in any rem loose ends.

Block if needed. **CW**

### Designer Tips

Mix up the color arrangement for a different look and feel. Gradient yarns make a fun twist on the same design.

Darker colors recede, so use the tail of the darker section to join the strips and weave in the other loose ends as usual.



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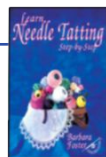

- Medium (worsted) weight yarn:  20 [22, 24] oz/1,000 [1,100, 1,200]yds/567 [624, 680]g various colors
- Size H/8/5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle

## GAUGE

7 sts = 2 inches

Take time to check gauge.

## PATTERN NOTES

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Chain-2 at beginning of row counts as first half double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

## JACKET

### LOWER BODY

**Note:** Lower Body is worked from side to side. Change color at end of every 2nd row.

**Row 1 (RS):** With color of choice, ch 31 [37, 41], hdc in 3rd ch from hook (*beg 2 sk chs count as a hdc*), hdc in each of next 14 [17, 19] chs, dc in each of next 15 [18, 20] chs, turn. (30 [36, 40] sts)

Pick her favorite colors and crochet this adorable jacket with matching hat. Worked in worsted-weight yarn, this set is a great way to use up those leftover skeins.





**Row 2:** Ch 8, 3 sc in 2nd ch from hook, 3 sc in each of rem chs (*curlicue made*), dc in each of next 15 [18, 20] sts, hdc in each of next 15 [18, 20] sts, **change color** (see *Stitch Guide*), turn.

**Row 3: Ch 2** (see *Pattern Notes*), hdc in each of next 14 [17, 29] sts, dc in each of next 15 [18, 20] sts, turn.

**Row 4:** Ch 8, 3 sc in 2nd ch from hook, 3 sc in each of rem chs (*curlicue made*), dc in each of next 15 [18, 20] sts, hdc in each of next 15 [18, 20] sts, change color, turn.

**Rows 5–80 [5–88, 5–92]:** Rep rows 3 and 4 alternately. At end of last row, do not change color. Fasten off.

**Row 81 [89, 93]:** Hold piece with RS facing and curlicues to bottom, working across end of

rows at top of piece, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) color of choice in first st, ch 2, work 79 [87, 95] hdc evenly sp across side, turn. (80 [88, 96] hdc)

**Row 82 [90, 94]:** Ch 2, hdc in each hdc across. Change to new color.

#### RIGHT FRONT YOKE

**Row 1 (RS):** Ch 1, **hdc dec** (see *Stitch Guide*) in first 2 sts, hdc in each of next 18 [20, 21] sts, leaving rem sts unworked, turn. (19 [21, 22] hdc)

**Row 2:** Ch 2, hdc in each hdc across, turn.

**Rows 3–14:** [Rep rows 1 and 2 alternately] 6 times. (13 [15, 16] hdc at end of last row)

**Row 15:** Ch 2, hdc in each hdc across, turn.

Rep row 15 until Yoke measures 5½ [6, 6½] inches. Fasten off.

#### LEFT FRONT YOKE

**Row 1 (RS):** Hold piece with RS facing, sk next 40 [44, 46] sts on last row of Lower Body from Right Front Yoke, join color of choice in next st, ch 2, hdc in each of next 17 [19, 20] sts, hdc dec in last 2 sts, turn. (19 [21, 22] hdc)

**Row 2:** Ch 2, hdc in each hdc across, turn.

**Rows 3–14:** [Rep rows 1 and 2 alternately] 6 times. (13 [15, 16] hdc at end of last row)

**Row 15:** Ch 2, hdc in each hdc across, turn.

Rep row 15 until Yoke measures 5½ [6, 6½] inches. Fasten off.

#### BACK

**Row 1:** Hold piece with RS facing, join color of choice in first sk st on last row of Lower Body from Right Front Yoke, ch 2, hdc

2 skeins each #1601 lettuce and #1207 cornsilk  
1 skein #1915 merlot
- Size K/10½/6.5mm Tunisian crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Size K/10½/6.5mm crochet hook
- Stitch markers: 4
- Tapestry needle



## GAUGE

14 sts = 4 inches; 10 rows = 4 inches

## PATTERN NOTES

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Each row in Tunisian crochet consists of 2 parts: a Forward Pass where you pick up the stitches and a Return Pass where you work the stitches off the hook.

The loop remaining on the hook at end of a Return Pass is the first stitch of the next row.

Right side of work is always facing.

Change color at the end of a Return Pass by drawing through final 2 loops with the new color.

Fasten off current color if it would need to be carried up more than 1 row.

The yarn overs between the Tunisian Simple Stitches will

create eyelets through which you will weave chain lengths for the vertical stripes.

On edging, move corner markers up with each round.

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Chain-2 at beginning of round counts as first stitch unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch in indicated stitch unless otherwise stated.

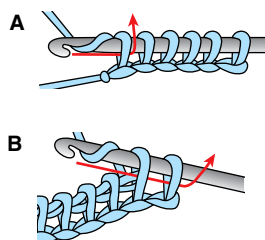
## SPECIAL STITCHES

### Tunisian Simple Stitch

(TSS): With yarn held in back, insert hook from right to left under next vertical bar, yo and draw through, keeping lp on hook.

**End stitch (end st):** Insert hook under both vertical bars of final st in row, yo, draw up a lp.

**Work loops off hook (work lps off hook):** Yo, pull through 1 lp on hook (see A of illustration), [yo, pull through 2 lps on hook (see B of illustration)] across. Last lp on hook counts as first lp of next row.



Work Loops Off Hook

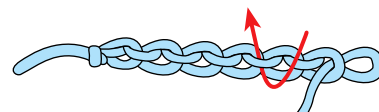
### Single crochet join (sc join):

Place slip knot on hook, insert hook in indicated st, yo and pull up a lp, yo and draw through both lps on hook.

## THROW

### BASE

**Row 1 Forward Pass:** With evergreen and Tunisian crochet hook, ch 147, working in **back bar of ch** (see illustration), yo, draw up a lp in 3rd ch from hook; \*yo, sk 1 ch, draw up a lp in next ch; rep from \* across. (147 lps on hook)



Back Bar of Chain

**Row 1 Return Pass: Work lps off hook** (see Special Stitches). (1 lp on hook)

**Row 2 Forward Pass:** \*Yo, sk next st (the st being sk will look like a diagonal line because it was created with a yo), TSS (see Special Stitches) in next st; rep from \* until 2 sts rem, yo, sk next st, **end st** (see Special Stitches). (147 lps on hook)

**Row 2 Return Pass:** Work lps off hook. (1 lp on hook)

**Rows 3–123:** Rep row 2, **changing colors** (see Pattern Notes) as needed to work the following pattern: 3 rows evergreen, [3 rows lettuce, 1 row merlot, 3 rows lettuce, 5 rows evergreen, 3 rows cornsilk, 1 row merlot, 3 rows cornsilk, 5 rows evergreen] 5 times.

**Rows 124–133:** Rep row 2 in following color sequence: 3 rows lettuce, 1 row merlot, 3 rows lettuce, 3 rows evergreen.

**Bind-off row:** With evergreen, ch 1, sl st in each st, inserting hook as if to TSS, until 1 st rem,





***Don't let the complex look of this beautiful throw fool you! Simply crochet an open-mesh fabric and weave crocheted chains through in the opposite direction to create the plaid design. Post stitches create the sophisticated border.***



sl st under both bars of final st. Fasten off.

## VERTICAL STRIPES

**Make 73 total: 31 evergreen, 18 lettuce, 6 merlot and 18 cornsilk.**

Ch 207 (or number needed to weave lengthwise through mesh of base). Fasten off.

## ASSEMBLY

Beg at right edge, from bottom to top, weave vertical stripes through the eyelets of the base in the following order: 3 evergreen, \*3 lettuce, 1 merlot, 3 lettuce, 5 evergreen, 3 cornsilk, 1 merlot, 3 cornsilk, 5 evergreen; rep from \* across, ending final rep with 3 evergreen. Placing a locking stitch marker or safety pin in final ch can help thread the stripe through the mesh.

## Edging

**Rnd 1:** With RS facing and standard crochet hook, **sc join** (see *Special Stitches*) evergreen in opposite side of final foundation ch, work 2 additional sc in same place, **mark center st** (see *Pattern Notes*) as corner, sc in unworked lps of each

foundation ch across working through ends of vertical stripes and foundation ch as needed, 3 sc in unworked lps of final ch, mark center st as corner; working in ends of rows sc in each row across, 3 sc in first bind-off st, mark center st as corner, sc in each bind-off st across working 3 sc in last bind-off st, mark center st as corner, working in ends of rows sc in each row across, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in beg sc. (147 sc between corner sts on top and bottom, 135 sc between corner sts on side edges)

**Rnd 2: Ch 3** (see *Pattern Notes*), 3 dc in corner st, dc in each st around, working 3 dc in each corner st, join in top of beg ch-3. (149 dc between corner sts on top and bottom, 137 dc between corner sts on side edges)

**Rnd 3: Ch 2** (see *Pattern Notes*), **bpdc** (see *Stitch Guide*) around the **post** (see *Stitch Guide*) of next st, \*3 dc in corner st, bpdc around the post of next st, [**fpdc** (see *Stitch Guide*) around the post of next st, bpdc around the post of next st] across to next corner st; rep from \* around, ending with bpdc around last st; join in top of beg ch-2. (151 sts

## Designer Tip

When weaving the chain through the mesh make sure you always start at the lower edge and begin with the final chain made. This will make it easier to remove extra chains if needed or to add a few chains if you have left a long enough tail.

between corner sts on top and bottom, 139 sts between corner sts on side edges)

**Rnd 4:** Ch 2, bpdc around post of next bpdc, fpdc around the post of next st, \*3 dc in next corner st, fpdc around the post of next st, [bpdc around the post of next st, fpdc around the post of next st] across to next corner st; rep from \* around, ending with bpdc around last st; join in top of beg ch-2. (153 sts between corner sts on top and bottom, 141 sts between corner sts on side edges)

**Rnd 5:** Ch 2, bpdc around the post of next bpdc, fpdc around the post of next fpdc, bpdc around next st, \*3 dc in next corner st, bpdc around the post of next st, [fpdc around the post of next st, bpdc around the post of next st] across to next corner st; rep from \* around, ending with bpdc around last st; join in top of beg ch-2. (155 sts between corner sts on top and bottom, 143 sts between corner sts on side edges)

**Rnd 6:** Ch 1, \*sc in each st across to next corner st, 3 sc in corner st; rep from \* around, ending with sc in last st; join in first sc. Fasten off. (157 sc between corner sts on top and bottom, 145 sc between corner sts on side edges)

## FINISHING

Weave in ends. Block. **CW**

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Chain-1 at beginning of row counts as first single crochet unless otherwise stated.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

## SHAWL

### BODY

**Row 1:** Ch 235, dc in 4th ch from hook (*sk 3 chs count as first dc*), [ch 1, sk 1 ch, dc in next ch] across to last ch, dc in last ch, turn. (115 ch-1 sps, 118 dc)

**Row 2:** Ch 3 (see Pattern Notes), dc in each dc and ch-1 sp across, working last dc in top of beg ch-3, turn. (233 dc)

**Row 3:** Ch 3, dc in next dc, \*[ch 1, sk 1 dc, dc in next dc] 3 times, dc in each of next 4 dc, rep from \* 22 times, dc in top of beg ch-3, turn. (69 ch-1 sps, 164 dc)

**Row 4:** Ch 3, dc in each of next 5 dc, \*[ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] 3 times\*\*, dc in each of next 4 dc, rep from \* 21 times, rep from \* to \*\* once, dc in top of beg ch-3, turn.

**Row 5:** Ch 3, dc in next dc, \*[ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] 3 times, dc in each of next 4 dc, rep from \* 22 times, dc in top of beg ch-3, turn.

**Row 6:** Rep row 4.

**Row 7:** Ch 3, dc in next (dc, ch-1 sp, dc), \*[ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] twice, ch 1, sk 1 dc\*\*, dc in next each of (next 3 dc, ch-1 sp, dc), rep from \* 21 times, rep from \* to \*\* once, dc in next 3 dc and in top of beg ch-3, turn.

**Rows 8–10:** Ch 3, dc in each of next 3 dc, \*[ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] 3 times\*\*, dc in each of next 4 dc, rep from \* 21 times, rep from \* to \*\* once, dc in each of next 2 dc and in top of beg ch-3, turn.

**Row 11:** Ch 3, dc in each of (next 3 dc, ch-1 sp, dc), \*[ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] twice, ch 1, sk 1 dc\*\*, dc in each of (next 3 dc, ch-1 sp, dc), rep from \* 21 times, rep from \* to \*\* once, dc in next dc and in top of ch-3, turn.

**Row 12:** Rep row 5.

**Row 13:** Rep row 4.

**Row 14:** Rep row 5.

**Row 15:** Ch 3, dc next dc, ch 1, sk 1 dc, dc in each of (next 3 dc, ch-1 sp, dc), \*[ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] twice, ch 1, sk 1 dc, dc in each of (next 3 dc, ch-1 sp, dc), rep from \* 21 times, [ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] twice, dc in top of beg ch-3, turn.

**Row 16:** Ch 3, dc in next dc,

[ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] twice, dc in each of next 4 dc, \*[ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] 3 times, dc in each of next 4 dc, rep from \* 21 times, ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc and in top of beg ch-3, turn.

**Row 17:** Ch 3, dc in next dc, ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in each of next 5 dc, \*[ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] 3 times, dc in each of next 4 dc, rep from \* 21 times, [ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] twice, dc in top of ch-3, turn.

**Row 18:** Rep row 16.

**Row 19:** Ch 3, dc next dc, ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc, ch 1, sk 1 dc, (dc in each of next 3 dc, ch-1 sp, and dc), \*[ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] twice, ch 1, sk 1 dc, (dc in each of next 3 dc, ch-1 sp, and dc), rep from \* 21 times, ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc and in top of beg ch-3, turn.

**Row 20:** Ch 3, dc in next dc, ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in each of next 5 dc, \*[ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] 3 times, dc in each of next 4 dc, rep from \* 21 times, [ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] twice, dc in top of beg ch-3, turn.

**Row 21:** Ch 3, dc in next dc, [ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] twice, dc in each of next 4 dc, \*[ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] 3 times, dc in each of next 4 dc, rep from \* 21 times, ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc and in top of beg ch-3, turn.

**Row 22:** Rep row 20.

**Row 23:** Ch 3, dc in next dc, \*[ch 1, sk ch-1 sp, dc in next dc] twice, ch 1, sk 1 dc, dc in each of (next 3 dc, ch-1 sp, dc), rep from \* 22 times, dc in top of beg ch-3, turn.

**Rows 24–26:** Rep rows 4–6.

**Row 27:** Rep row 2. (233 dc)

**Rows 28–30:** Ch 3, dc in each dc across, working last dc in top of beg ch-3, turn.



**Rows 31–55:** Rep rows 3–27.

**Row 56:** Ch 3, dc in next dc, [ch 1, sk 1 dc, dc in next dc] across, dc in last dc, turn. Do not fasten off. (115 ch-1 sps, 118 dc)

## BORDER

**Foundation rnd:** Ch 1 (see *Pattern Notes*), sc in each dc and ch-1 sp across, ch 1, rotate work, 2 sc in side of each row across short side of body, ch 1, rotate work, sc in unworked foundation lps of each dc and ch-1 sp across, ch 1, rotate work, 2 sc in side of each row across rem short side of body, ch 1, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in beg ch-1. Do not fasten off. (490 sc, 4 corner ch-1 sps)

## Ruffles

Turn to work on short side of body.

**Row 1:** Sl st in ch-1 sp just made, ch 3, dc in each sc across to next ch-1 sp, dc in ch-1 sp, turn. (114 dc)

**Row 2:** Ch 3, dc in **back lp** (see *Stitch Guide*) only of each dc across, dc in top of ch-3, turn.

**Row 3:** Ch 3, working in back lps only, 2 dc in next dc, [dc in next dc, 2 dc in next dc] across, working last 2 dc in top of ch-3, turn. (171 dc)

**Rows 4 & 5:** Rep row 2.

**Row 6:** Ch 3, [2 dc in next dc, dc in next dc] across, working last dc in top of ch-3, turn. (256 dc)

**Rows 7 & 8:** Rep row 2.

**Row 9:** Rep row 3. (384 dc)

**Rows 10 & 11:** Rep row 2.

**Row 12:** Ch 3, dc in next dc, 2 dc in next dc, [dc in each of next 2 dc, 2 dc in next dc] across, turn. (512 dc)

**Rows 13–15:** Rep row 2. At end of last row, fasten off.

Join yarn in ch-1 corner of other short edge of body. Rep ruffles rows 1–15.

## FINISHING

Block body to 22½ inches x 56 inches; do not block ruffles. **CW**

  - 3 skeins each #158 mustard, #130 honey and #134 terracotta
- Size N/15/10mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Locking stitch markers: at least 6



## GAUGE

11 dc = 6 inches

## PATTERN NOTES

Afghan is worked vertically from side edge to side edge in 1 piece.

Hold 2 strands together throughout.

Fasten off after each row. Work last stitch of old color completely before fastening off; chain 1 to secure.

Leave 10-inch tails throughout to be incorporated into fringes when joining and fastening off colors.

Join new color with slip stitch through both loops of first stitch of row, regardless of how the remainder of the row is worked, unless otherwise stated.

Chain-1 at beginning of row counts as first stitch unless otherwise stated.

Chain-2 at beginning of row counts as first half double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Work slip stitches in leaf rows loosely.

Do not remove markers until instructed.

## SPECIAL STITCHES

### 8-yarn over post (8-yo post):

Yo 8 times, insert hook in indicated place, yo, pull up a lp, yo, pull through 2 lps on hook, mark front of same 2 lps just slipped off hook; after placing marker, (yo, pull through 2 lps on hook) 7 times.

### 6-yarn over post (6-yo post):

Yo 6 times, insert hook in indicated place, yo, pull up a lp, yo, pull through 2 lps on hook, mark front of same 2 lps just slipped off hook; after placing marker, (yo, pull through 2 lps on hook) 5 times.

### 5-yarn over post (5-yo post):

Yo 5 times, insert hook in indicated place, yo, pull up a lp, yo, pull through 2 lps on hook, mark front of same 2 lps just slipped off hook; after placing marker, (yo, pull through 2 lps on hook) 4 times.

### 4-yarn over post (4-yo post):

Yo 4 times, insert hook in indicated place, yo, pull up a lp, yo, pull through 2 lps on hook, mark front of same 2 lps just slipped off hook; after placing marker, (yo, pull through 2 lps on hook) 3 times.

**Leaf:** Working on RS, sk next 9 sts, work **8-yo post** (see *Special Stitches*) in both lps of next st (2 lps rem on hook), work **6-yo post** (see *Special Stitches*) in the 2 marked lps of previous post

(3 lps rem on hook); inserting hook in each previous post's marked lps, work **5-yo post** (see *Special Stitches*) and 2 **4-yo posts** (see *Special Stitches*) (6 lps rem on hook, 5 posts made), yo and pull through all lps on hook (*leaf made*). Remove markers. Keep leaf on RS.

## AFGHAN

**Foundation row:** With 2 strands (see *Pattern Notes*) fern held tog and leaving **10-inch tail** (see *Pattern Notes*), ch 110 loosely.

**Row 1 (WS):** Hdc in 3rd ch from hook (2 sk chs count as first hdc) and each ch across, **fasten off leaving a 10-inch tail** (see *Pattern Notes*), turn. (109 sts)

**Row 2 (RS):** Join (see *Pattern Notes*) toffee, **ch 3** (see *Pattern Notes*), dc in **back lp** (see *Stitch Guide*) only of next and each st across, fasten off and turn.

**Row 3:** Join honey, **ch 2** (see *Pattern Notes*), hdc in **front lp** (see *Stitch Guide*) only of next and each st across, fasten off and turn.

**Row 4:** Join terracotta, ch 3, dc in back lp only of next and each st across, fasten off and turn.

**Row 5:** With fern, rep row 3.

**Row 6:** Join mustard, ch 2, hdc in back lp only of next and each st across, fasten off and turn.

**Row 7:** Join olive, **ch 1** (see *Pattern Notes*), sc in front lp only of next and each st across, fasten off and turn.

**Row 8:** Join toffee, ch 1, sc in back lp only of next and each st across, fasten off and turn.

**Row 9:** Join fern, ch 3, dc in front lp only of next and each st across, fasten off and turn.

- Sizes G/6/4mm and I/9/5.5mm crochet hooks
- Split-ring stitch markers
- 12mm solid safety eyes with plastic washers: 2
- Fiberfill
- Felt-tip marker
- DMC Color Infusions Memory Thread: #6020 black
- 1⅞-inch circle yellow felt: 2
- ¾-inch circle chartreuse felt: 2
- Fabric glue
- Tapestry needle



## GAUGE

Gauge is not important for this project.

## PATTERN NOTES

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Create tight stitches to prevent fiberfill from showing or coming out.

Do not join rounds; place stitch marker and move as work progresses.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Chain-4 at beginning of row counts as first double crochet and chain-1 unless otherwise stated.

## OWL

### BODY FEATHERS

**Row 1:** With size I hook and metropolis, ch 42, 2 dc in 5th ch from hook (*4 sk chs count as first dc, ch 1*), [ch 1, sk next 2 chs, dc in next ch, ch 1, sk next 2 chs, 2 dc in next ch] 6 times, turn. (21 dc, 13 ch-1 sps)

**Rnd 2:** Now working in rnds, ch 1, sk first dc, [5 **bpdc** (*see Stitch Guide*) around next dc top to bottom of **post** (*see Stitch Guide*), 5 dc around next dc post bottom to top of post, [sl st in next dc to secure sts, 5 bpdc around next dc top to bottom of post, 5 dc around next dc bottom to top of post] 6 times, **do not** sl st in last st, turn. (7 crocodile sts)

**Row 3:** Sl st to center of first crocodile st, **ch 4** (*see Pattern Notes*), 2 dc in next sl st, ch 1, dc in center of next crocodile st, [ch 1, 2 dc in next sl st, ch 1, dc in center of next crocodile st] 5 times, ending with 2 dc in last dc of previous rnd, turn.

**Rows 4 & 5:** Rep rows 2 and 3.

**Row 6:** Rep row 2, leaving a 12-inch length, fasten off.

### BODY

**Rnd 1:** With size I hook and metropolis, ch 2, 8 sc in 2nd ch from hook, **place marker** (*see Pattern Notes*). (8 sc)

**Rnd 2:** 2 sc in each sc around. (16 sc)

**Rnd 3:** [Sc in next sc, 2 sc in next sc] around. (24 sc)

**Rnd 4:** [Sc in each of next 2 sc, 2 sc in next sc] around. (32 sc)

**Rnd 5:** [Sc in each of next 3 sc, 2 sc in next sc] around. (40 sc)

**Rnd 6:** Sc in each sc around.

**Rnds 7–12:** Rep rnd 6.

**Rnd 13:** [Sc in each of next 3 sc, **sc dec** (*see Stitch Guide*) in next 2 sc] around. (32 sc)

**Rnd 14:** Rep rnd 6.

**Rnd 15:** [Sc in each of next 2 sc, sc dec in next 2 sc] around. (24 sc)

**Rnds 16–23:** Rep rnd 6.

### FOREHEAD FEATHERS

**Row 1:** With size I hook, **join** (*see Pattern Notes*) metropolis, to a st in rnd 2 of body, ch 1, sc in same st as beg ch-1, sc in each of next 6 sc, turn. (7 sc)

**Row 2:** Ch 1, 2 sc in first sc, sc in each of next 5 sc, 2 sc in last sc, turn. (9 sc)

**Row 3:** Ch 1, 2 sc in first sc, sc in each of next 7 sc, 2 sc in last sc, turn. (11 sc)

**Row 4:** Ch 1, 2 sc in first sc, sc in each of next 9 sc, 2 sc in last sc, turn. (13 sc)

**Row 5:** Ch 1, 2 sc in first sc, sc in each of next 11 sc, 2 sc in last sc, turn. (15 sc)

**Row 6:** Ch 1, sc in each sc across, turn.

**Row 7:** Ch 1, sc dec in next 2 sc, sc in each of next 11 sc, sc dec in next 2 sc, turn. (13 sc)

**Row 8:** Ch 1, sc dec in next 2 sc, sc in each of next 9 sc, sc dec in next 2 sc, turn. (11 sc)

**Row 9:** Ch 1, sc dec in next 2 sc, sc in each of next 7 sc, sc dec in next 2 sc, turn. (9 sc)

**Row 10:** Rep row 6.

**Row 11:** Ch 1, sc dec in next 2 sc, sc in each of next 5 sc, sc dec in next 2 sc, turn. (7 sc)



**Row 12:** Rep row 6.

**Row 13:** Ch 1, sc dec in next 2 sc, sc in each of next 3 sc, sc dec in next 2 sc, turn. (5 sc)

**Row 14:** Ch 1, sc dec in next 2 sc, sc in next sc, sc dec in next 2 sc, turn. (3 sc)

**Rows 15 & 16:** Rep row 6. At the end of row 16, leaving a 12-inch length, fasten off.

Sew last 3 sts to sts directly below in body. Weave in yarn ends and trim.

## EYES

Referring to manufacturer's instructions, prepare the 4 felt circles for attaching eyes. To create an opening large enough to insert the rod part of safety eye, cut a small X in center of the circles. Apply glue to back of chartreuse circles and place in centers of yellow circles. Insert safety eyes in felt circles.

For eye placement: The inner sides of yellow circles are next to forehead feathers and the bottom edge of circles are even with the row below the bottom of the forehead feathers. Put a mark with felt tip marker in each st that each eye will be inserted. Apply glue to backs of yellow circles, insert eyes and attach washer to back of each eye.

Stuff owl with fiberfill.

## BEAK

**Rnd 1:** With size G hook and camel, ch 2, 3 sc in 2nd ch from hook, place marker. (3 sc)

**Rnd 2:** 2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 2 sc. (4 sc)

**Rnd 3:** 2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 3 sc. (5 sc)

**Rnd 4:** 2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 4 sc, leaving a 6-inch length, fasten off. (6 sc)

**Row 1:** With size G hook and camel, ch 10, sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc in each rem ch across, turn. (9 sc)

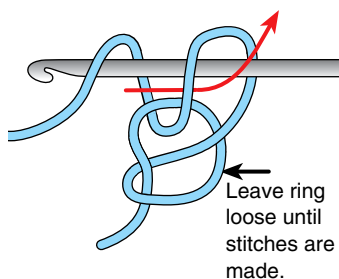
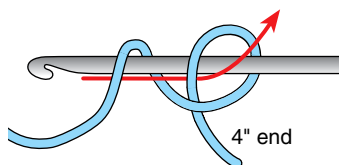

**Rnd 3:** Join garnet in any ch-3 sp, **beg V-st** (see *Special Stitches*) in same ch-3 sp, ch 1, [V-st (see *Special Stitches*) in next ch-3 sp, ch 1] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-6. (8 V-sts, 8 ch-1 sps)

**Rnd 4:** Sl st in ch-3 sp of V-st, ch 1, 4 sc in same ch-3 sp, sc in next ch-1 sp, [4 sc in next ch-3 sp, sc in next ch-1 sp] around, join in beg sc. Fasten off. (40 sc)

**Rnd 5:** Sk 4 sc in beg V-st, join harvest orange in sc directly above ch-1 sp, ch 1, (sc, ch 3, sc) in same sc as beg ch-1, ch 5, sk next 4 sc worked in V-st, [(sc, ch 3, sc) in next sc, ch 5, sk next 4 sc worked in V-st] around, join in beg sc. Fasten off. (16 sc, 8 ch-3 sps, 8 ch-5 sps)

**Rnd 6:** Join gold in any ch-5 sp, **beg shell** (see *Special Stitches*) in same ch-5 sp, ch 2, [shell (see *Special Stitches*) in next ch-5 sp, ch 2] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-3. (8 shells, 8 ch-2 sps)

**Rnd 7:** Sl st in ch-2 sp of shell, ch 1, (sc, ch 3, sc) in same ch-2 sp, ch 3, [(sc, ch 3, sc) in next ch-2 sp, ch 3] around, join in beg sc. Fasten off. (32 sc, 32 ch-3 sps)

## 1-Sided Joining

**Rnds 1–6:** Rep rnds 1–6 of first motif.


**Rnd 7:** Sl st in next ch-2 sp of shell, ch 1, (sc, ch 3, sc) in same ch-2 sp, ch 3, [(sc, ch 3, sc) in next ch-2 sp, ch 3] 11 times, [sc, ch 1 in next ch-2 sp, sl st in corresponding ch-3 sp on previous motif, ch 1, sc in same ch-2 sp on working motif, ch 3] 3 times, (sc, ch 3, sc) in next ch-2 sp, ch 3, join in beg sc. Fasten off. (32 sc, 32 ch-3 sps)

## 2-Sided Joining

**Rnds 1–6:** Rep rnds 1–6 of first motif.

**Rnd 7:** Sl st in ch-2 sp of shell, ch 1, (sc, ch 3, sc) in same ch-2 sp, ch 3, [(sc, ch 3, sc) in next ch-2 sp, ch 3] 7 times, \*[sc, ch 1 in next ch-2 sp, sl st in corresponding ch-3 sp on previous motif, ch 1, sc in same ch-2 sp on working motif, ch 3] 3 times, (sc, ch 3, sc) in next ch-2 sp, ch 3, rep from \* once, join in beg sc. Fasten off. (32 sc, 16 ch-3 sps, 16 joining ch-3 sps)

Work with 2 strands held together throughout unless otherwise stated.

Do not join rounds unless otherwise indicated. Place stitch marker and move as work progresses.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

A working yarn float is the yarn carried behind the work between color changes.

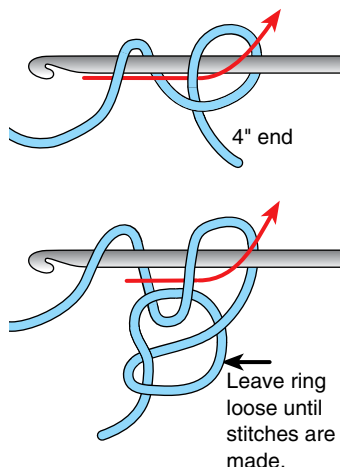
Chain-4 at beginning of rows is top edge and does not count as a stitch unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of round 2 of Leaf does not count as a stitch, but makes a more rounded top on leaf.

Rows 6–9 of sides creates 1 rib.

## SPECIAL STITCH

**Single crochet join (sc join):** Form a **slip ring** (see illustration) on hook, insert hook in indicated st, yo and draw up a lp, yo and draw through both lps on hook.

## LARGE PUMPKIN BASKET

### BASE

**Rnd 1:** With 2 strands pumpkin held tog (see Pattern Notes), ch 2, 6 sc in 2nd ch from hook, **do not join, place marker** (see Pattern Notes). (6 sc)

**Rnd 2:** 2 sc in each sc around. (12 sc)

**Rnd 3:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in next sc] around. (18 sc)

**Rnd 4:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 2 sc] around. (24 sc)

**Rnd 5:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 3 sc] around. (30 sc)

**Rnd 6:** Sc in each sc around, inc 6 sc evenly sp around. (36 sc)

**Rnds 7–15:** Rep rnd 6. At the end of rnd 15, fasten off. (90 sc)

## SIDES

**Row 1 (RS):** With 2 strands pumpkin held tog, ch 15, sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc in each rem ch across, turn. (14 sc)

**Row 2: Ch 4** (see Pattern Notes), tr in **back lp** (see Stitch Guide) of st at base of ch-4 just made, tr in back lp of each st across, turn. (14 tr)

**Row 3:** Ch 1, insert hook in back lp of first tr and unworked lp of sc at base of same tr, yo and pull up lp, yo and pull through all 3 lps on hook to complete as hdc, [insert hook in back lp of next tr and unworked lp of sc at base of same tr, yo, pull up lp, yo and complete as hdc] 13 times, turn. Remove rem lps (2 strands) from hook and place on safety pin. (14 hdc)

**Row 4:** With WS facing and 1 strand coffee, place **slip ring** (see illustration) on hook, insert hook from bottom to top under **front lp** (see Stitch Guide) of first hdc, yo, pull lp through lp on hook to complete as a sl st, loosely sl st in same manner through front lp of each st across, turn. (14 sl sts)

**Row 5:** Ch 1, inserting hook under both lps of sl sts, sc in each st across, **do not turn**. Fasten off coffee.

**Row 6:** With RS facing, insert hook from top to bottom through center top 2 lps of first st, return pumpkin lps to hook and pull up through center of st (**working yarn float**—see Pattern Notes),

turn to WS, ch 4, tr in back lp of st at base of ch-4 just made, tr in back lp of each st across, turn. (14 tr)

**Row 7:** Ch 1, insert hook in back lp of first tr and unworked lp of sc at base of same tr, yo and draw up lp, yo and draw through all 3 lps on hook to complete as hdc, [insert hook in back lp of next tr and unworked lp of sc at base of same tr, yo, draw

up lp, yo and complete as hdc] 13 times, turn. Remove pumpkin lps from hook and place on safety pin. (14 hdc)

**Row 8:** With WS facing and 1 strand coffee, place slip ring on hook, insert hook from bottom to top under front lp of first hdc, yo, draw lp through lp on hook to complete as a sl st, loosely sl st in same manner through front lp of each st across, turn. (14 sl sts)

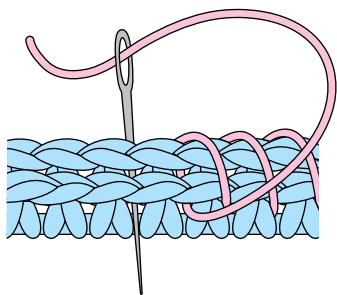
**Row 9:** Ch 1, inserting hook under both lps of sl sts, sc in each st across, **do not turn**. Fasten off coffee. (14 sc)

**Rows 10–121:** [Rep rows 6–9 consecutively] 28 times. At the end of row 121, leaving a 12-inch length of coffee, fasten off. (30 ribs—see *Pattern Notes*)



## Finishing

Overlap short ends of sides tog with RS of last row centered over WS of row 1 and working on WS of work, thread tail through needle and **whipstitch** (see illustration) through both layers to create center back seam. Turn work to RS.

## MEDIUM PUMPKIN BASKET

### BASE

**Rnds 1–6:** With 2 strands carrot held tog, rep rnds 1–6 of large pumpkin base. (36 sc)

**Rnds 7–11:** Rep rnd 6 of large pumpkin base. At the end of rnd 11, fasten off. (66 sc)

### SIDES

**Rows 1–9:** With 2 strands carrot held tog, rep rows 1–9 of large pumpkin sides. (14 sc)

**Rows 10–89:** [Rep rows 6–9 of large pumpkin sides consecutively] 20 times. At the end of row 89, leaving a 12-inch length of coffee, fasten off. (22 ribs—see *Pattern Notes*)

### Finishing

Rep finishing the same as for large pumpkin sides.

## SMALL PUMPKIN BASKET

### BASE

**Rnds 1–6:** With 2 strands orange, rep rnds 1–6 of large pumpkin base. (36 sc)

**Rnds 7 & 8:** Rep rnd 6 of large pumpkin base. At the end of rnd 8, fasten off. (48 sc)

### SIDES

**Rows 1–9:** With 2 strands orange held tog, rep rows 1–9 of large pumpkin sides.

**Rows 10–65:** [Rep rows 6–9 of large pumpkin sides consecutively] 14 times. At the end of row 65, leaving a 12-inch length of coffee, fasten off. (16 ribs—see *Pattern Notes*)

### Finishing

Rep finishing the same as for large pumpkin sides.

## BASKET EMBELLISHMENTS

### VINE

#### Make 3.

**Row 1:** With 1 strand coffee, place slip ring on hook, insert hook under chenille stem, yo, pull up lp, yo and complete as a sc, work approximately 45–50 sc to opposite end of stem. Fasten off. Wrap around finger or pencil to curl as desired.

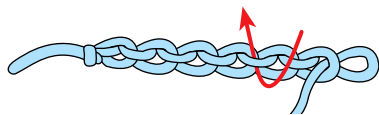




## LEAF

### Make 3.

**Rnd 1:** With coffee, ch 8, sl st in **back bar of ch** (see illustration) of 2nd ch from hook and in each of next 6 chs. Fasten off. (7 sl st)



Back Bar of Chain

**Rnd 2:** Working through back lps, insert hook in first st of last rnd, yo with thyme, draw up lp to join, **ch 3** (see Pattern Notes), 2 tr in same st as join, 2 dc in next st, hdc in each of next 2 sts, sc in each of next 2 sts, sl st in last st, ch 2, sl st in 2nd ch from hook, working on opposite side of foundation ch, sl st in next ch, sc in each of next 2 chs, hdc in each of next 2 chs, 2 dc in next ch, 2 tr in next ch, ch 3, sl st in same ch

as last tr made, **join** (see Pattern Notes) in same st as beg ch-3, leaving 8-inch length, fasten off.

## ASSEMBLY

### Top Edging

**Rnd 1:** At center back seam, with RS facing, return yarn color lps from safety pin to hook, 3 sc around **post** (see Stitch Guide) of first ch-4 to left of center back seam, [insert hook under next float, yo, draw up lp, yo and complete as sc, 2 sc around post of next tr] around, join in beg sc of rnd. Fasten off. (48, [66, 87] sc)

### Bottom Edging

**Rnd 1:** With RS facing and working around posts of first hdc st behind tr at bottom edge, **sc join** (see Special Stitch) 2 strands of yarn color used for basket around post

of first hdc to left of center back seam, 2 sc around post of same hdc, [3 sc around post of next hdc] around, join in beg sc, turn to WS. (48, [66, 87] sc)

**Rnd 2:** With WS of corresponding size base facing, positioning RS of last rnd of base to bottom edging, working through both thicknesses, ch 1, sl st in front lp of next st of base and back lp of next st on bottom edging, [sl st in same manner in next st] around, join in first st of rnd. Fasten off. Turn RS out. (48, [66, 87] sl sts)

## LEAF & VINE

Wrap yarn tails of leaf around center of vine and knot securely. Thread ends through needle and draw through any coffee row of pumpkin to WS, knot securely, weave in ends.

Rep to add leaf and vine to each basket. **CW**

- Size 6/1.80mm steel crochet hook
- Tapestry needle
- Fiberfill
- Plastic wrap
- Stainless steel pins
- Pinning board
- Fabric stiffener



## GAUGE

4 dc rnds = 1 inch

## PATTERN NOTES

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Use size 7 steel hook unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

Beginning chain-2 does not count as a stitch unless otherwise stated.

Chain-4 at beginning of round counts as first treble crochet in Wing row 5 unless otherwise stated.

Chain-4 at beginning of round counts as first double crochet and chain-1 in Halo round 2 unless otherwise stated.

3rd ch of beg ch-3, pick up dropped lp and draw through st on hook, ch 1 to lock.

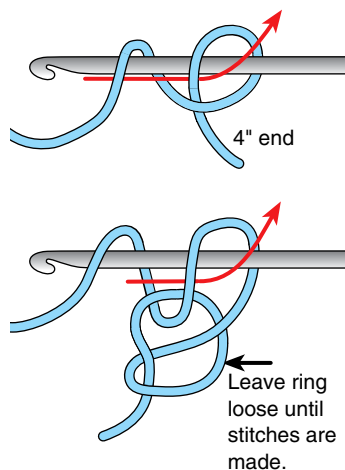

## ANGEL

### HEAD & NECK

**Rnd 1 (RS):** With white, form a **slip ring** (see illustration), ch 1, 6 sc in ring, pull rem beg length to close ring, **join** (see Pattern Notes) in beg sc. (6 sc)



Slip Ring

**Rnd 2:** Ch 1, 2 sc in each sc around, join in beg sc. (12 sc)

**Rnd 3:** Rep rnd 2. (24 sc)

**Rnd 4: Ch 2** (see Pattern Notes), dc in same st as beg ch-2, dc in each st around, join in beg dc. (24 dc)

**Rnds 5–7:** Rep rnd 4.

**Rnd 8:** Ch 1, sc in same st as beg ch-1, sc in next st, **sc dec** (see Stitch Guide) in next 2 sts, [sc in each of next 2 sts, sc dec in next 2 sts] around, join in beg sc. (18 sc)

**Rnd 9:** Ch 1, sc in same st as beg ch-1, sc in next sc, sc dec in next 2 sc, sc in each of next 2 sc, sc dec in next 3 sc, sc in each of next 2 sc, sc dec in next 2 sc, sc dec in next 3 sc, join in beg dc. (12 sc)

Stuff head with fiberfill.

**Rnd 10:** Ch 1, sc in each sc around, join in beg sc.

## DRESS

### Yoke

**Rnd 11:** Ch 2, 2 dc in same st as beg ch-2, 2 dc in each rem st around, join in beg dc. (24 dc)

**Rnd 12:** Ch 2, dc in same st as beg ch-2, 2 dc in next dc, [dc in next dc, 2 dc in next dc] around, join in beg dc. (36 dc)

**Rnd 13:** Ch 2, dc in same dc as beg ch-2, 2 dc in the next dc, [dc in next dc, 2 dc in the next dc] around, join in beg dc. Fasten off. (54 dc)

**Rnd 14:** Working in **back lp** (see Stitch Guide) this rnd only, join yellow, ch 2, dc in back lp of same st as beg ch-2, dc in each of next 13 sts, sk next 13 sts, dc in each of next 14 sts, sk next 13 sts, join in beg dc. (28 dc, 26 sk sts)

**Rnd 15:** Ch 2, dc in same st as beg ch-2, dc in each of next 3 dc, [2 dc in next dc, dc in each of next 3 dc] 6 times, join in beg dc. (34 dc)

**Rnd 16: Beg pc** (see Special Stitches) in same st as joining, ch 3, sk next dc, **lpc** (see Special Stitches) in next st, ch 3, sk next st] around, join in beg pc. (17 pcs, 17 ch-3 sps)

**Rnd 17:** Sl st in next ch-3 sp, ch 2, 3 dc in same ch-3 sp, [3 dc in next ch-3 sp] 15 times, 2 dc in last ch-3 sp, join in beg dc. (50 dc)

**Rnd 18:** Beg pc in same st as joining, ch 3, sk next dc, [pc in next dc, ch 3, sk next dc] around, join in beg pc. (25 pcs, 25 ch-3 sps)

**Rnd 19:** Sl st in ch-3 sp, ch 2, 3 dc in same ch-3 sp, [3 dc in next ch-3 sp] 23 times, 2 dc in last ch-3 sp, join in beg dc. (74 dc)

**Rnd 20:** Beg pc in same st as joining, ch 3, sk next dc, [pc in next dc, ch 3, sk next dc] around, join in beg pc. (37 pcs, 37 ch-3 sps)

**Rnd 21:** Sl st in next ch-3 sp, ch 2, 2 dc in same ch-3 sp, 2 dc in each ch-3 sp around, join in beg dc. (74 dc)

**Rnd 22:** Working in back lps only, ch 2, dc in same dc as beg ch-2, dc in each dc around, join in beg dc. Fasten off. (74 dc)

### Dress Trim

**Rnd 1:** Working in rem free lps of rnd 20, join white in any st, ch 1, sc in same st, ch 3, sk next st, [sc in next st, ch 3, sk next st] around, join in beg sc. Fasten off. (37 sc, 37 ch-3 sps)

**Rnd 2:** Working in rem sts of rnd 22, join white in any st, ch 1, sc in same st, ch 3, sk next st, [sc in next st, ch 3, sk next st] around, join in beg sc. Fasten off. (37 sc, 37 ch-3 sps)

### Sleeve

#### Make 2.

**Rnd 1:** Working in sk sts of rnd 13 of yoke and in back lps for this rnd only, join yellow in first sk st, ch 1, sc in same st as beg ch-1, dc in each of next 11 sts, sc in last st, join in beg sc. (2 sc, 11 dc)

**Rnd 2:** Ch 2, dc in same st as beg ch-2, dc in each st around, join in beg dc. (13 dc)

**Rnd 3:** Ch 2, dc in same st as beg ch-2, 2 dc in next dc, [dc in next dc, 2 dc in next dc] 5 times, dc in next dc, join in beg dc. (19 dc)

**Rnd 4:** Ch 2, dc in each dc around, join in beg dc.

**Rnd 5:** Ch 1, sc in same st as beg ch-1, [sc in next dc, ch 1] around, join in beg sc, leaving 8-inch length, fasten off.

At the end of rnd 5 on 2nd sleeve, do not leave a rem length. Fasten off. Using 8-inch rem length from first sleeve, sl through ends of each sleeve joining them tog, sl st through yolk at center in rnd 13 to secure sleeves. Fasten off.



Stuff dress with plastic wrap, saturate with fabric stiffener and pin last rnd of dress to pinning board.

## PUMPKIN

**Row 1:** With orange, ch 18, dc in 4th ch from hook, dc in each rem ch across, turn. (16 dc)

**Row 2:** Ch 3, working in back lps, dc in each st across, turn.

**Rows 3–14:** Rep row 2. At the end of row 14, leaving a 12-inch length, fasten off.

Holding opposite side of foundation ch to row 14 and working in back lps, sew edges tog, weave rem length through ends of rows along bottom of pumpkin, pull to close opening.

## Stem

**Rnd 1:** Working in top opening of pumpkin in ends of rows, join leaf green, ch 1, sc in same row as beg ch-1, sc in each of next 13 rows, join in beg sc. (14 sc)

**Rnd 2:** Ch 1, [sc dec in next 2 sc] 7 times, join in beg sc. (7 sc)

**Rnd 3:** Ch 1, sc in same sc as beg ch-1, [sc dec in next 2 sc] 3 times, join in beg sc, leaving 6-inch length, fasten off.

Weave rem length through sts of rnd 3, pull to close opening, knot to secure, fasten off.

With a length of yellow, sew pumpkin to each sleeve.

## WING

**Row 1:** With white form a slip ring, [ch 3, dc, ch 2, 2 dc, ch 2, dc, ch 3, sl st] in ring, ch 3, dc, [ch 2, 2 dc] twice in ring, pull rem beg length to close ring, do not join, turn. (12 dc, 4 ch-2 sps)

**Row 2:** Sl st in each of next 2 dc, sl st in ch-2 sp, [ch 3, dc,

(ch 3, 2 dc) twice] in same ch-2 sp, ch 2, \*(2 dc, ch 3) twice and 2 dc in next ch-2 sp, ch 2, rep from \* once in next ch-2 sp, (2 dc, ch 3) twice and 2 dc in next ch-2 sp, turn. (24 dc, 8 ch-3 sps, 3 ch-2 sps)

**Row 3:** Sl st in ch-3 sp, (ch 3, dc, ch 3, 2 dc) in same ch-3 sp as beg ch-3, ch 2, (2 dc, ch 3) twice in the next ch-3 sp, sc in next ch-2 sp, ch 3, [(2 dc, ch 3, 2 dc) in next ch-3 sp, ch 2, (2 dc, ch 3) twice in next ch-3 sp, sc in next ch-2 sp, ch 3], rep between [ ] once, (2 dc, ch 3, 2 dc) in next ch-3 sp, ch 2, (2 dc, ch 3, 2 dc) in last ch-3 sp, turn. (32 dc, 14 ch-3 sps, 4 ch-2 sps)

**Row 4:** Sl st in each of next 2 dc, sl st in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, (2 dc, ch 3, 3 dc) in same ch-3 sp, ch 3, sc in next ch-2 sp, ch 3, (3 dc, ch 3, 3 dc) in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, sc dec in next 2 ch-3 sps, ch 3, [(3 dc, ch 3, 3 dc) in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, sc in next ch-2 sp, ch 3, (3 dc, ch 3, 3 dc) in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, sc dec in next 2 ch-3 sps, ch 3], rep between [ ] once, (3 dc, ch 3, 3 dc) in next ch-3 sp, sc in next ch-2 sp, ch 3, (3 dc, ch 3, 3 dc) in next ch-3 sp, turn. (48 dc, 22 ch-3 sps)

**Row 5:** Sl st in each of next 3 dc, sl st in next ch-3 sp, **ch 4** (see *Pattern Notes*), (2 tr, ch 3, 3 tr) in same ch-3 sp, ch 3, sc dec in next 2 ch-3 sps, ch 3, \*(3 dc, ch 3, 3 dc) in next ch-3 sp, ch 3, sc dec in next 2 ch-3 sps, ch 3, rep from \* around, working (3 tr, ch 3, 3 tr) in last ch-3 sp. Fasten off. (12 tr, 36 dc, 22 ch-3 sps, 7 sc dec)

Saturate wing with fabric stiffener and pin to pinning board. When dry, remove and tack row 1 to back of angel.

## WIG

**Rnd 1:** With size 6 hook, form a slip ring with fudge, ch 1, 6 sc in ring, pull rem beg length to close, join in beg sc. (6 sc)

**Rnd 2:** Ch 1, 2 sc in same sc as beg ch-1, 2 sc in each sc around, join in beg sc. (12 sc)

**Rnd 3:** Rep rnd 2. (24 sc)

**Rnd 4:** Ch 1, 2 sc in same sc as beg ch-1, sc in each rem sc around, join in beg sc. (25 sc)

**Rnd 5:** Ch 1, sc in each sc around, join in beg sc.

**Rnds 6–9:** Rep rnd 5.

**Row 10:** Now working in rows, ch 3, dc in each of next 17 sc, leaving rem 7 sc unworked, turn. (18 dc)

**Rnd 11:** Ch 10, sl st in same st, [ch 10, sl st in next dc] across, ch 1, working up side edge (sc, ch 2, sc) over side edge of dc of rnd 10, (sc, ch 2) in each of next 6 sk sts of rnd 9, sc in next sk sc of rnd 9, working down side edge, (sc, ch 2, sc) over side edge of dc of row 10, sl st in same st as beg ch-10, leaving 8-inch length, fasten off. (18 ch-10 sps, 11 sc, 8 ch-2 sps)

Tack wig to back of Head.

## HALO

**Rnd 1:** With white, ch 5, join to form a ring, ch 1, 10 sc in ring, join in beg sc. (10 sc)

**Rnd 2:** **Ch 4** (see *Pattern Notes*), [dc in next sc, ch 1] around, join in 3rd ch of beg ch-4. (12 dc, 12 ch-1 sps)

**Rnd 3:** [Ch 3, sl st in next dc] around, join in same dc as beg ch-3. Fasten off. **cw**

1 ball each #100004 ecru, #101042 overcast, #100082 jute and #101130 warm brown
- Size H/8/5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Stitch marker



## GAUGE

3 split sc = 1 inch; 4 split sc rnds = 1 inch

## PATTERN NOTES

Work in continuous rounds. Mark last stitch of round. Do not turn or join unless otherwise stated.

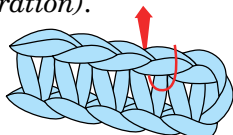

- Tapestry needle



## GAUGE

2 dc, 2 puff sts, 2 dc = 2 inches;  
4 rows = 2 inches

## PATTERN NOTES

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Chain-3 at beginning of row or round counts as first double crochet unless otherwise stated.

If wider place mat is desired, add 6 chains for each pattern repeat; for longer place mat repeat rows 2 and 3 for desired length.

## SPECIAL STITCH

**Puff stitch (puff st):** (Yo, insert hook in indicated st, yo, draw up a lp) 3 times in same st, yo, draw through all 7 lps on hook.

## PLACE MAT

**Row 1 (WS):** With apple, ch 63, sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc in next ch, [sk next ch, 3 sc in next ch, sk next ch, sc in each of next 2 chs] 12 times, turn. (62 sc)

**Row 2 (RS): Ch 3** (see *Pattern Notes*), dc in next st, [sk 1 st,

(puff st—see *Special Stitch*, ch 1, puff st) in next st, sk 1 st, dc in each of next 2 sts] across, turn. (26 dc, 24 puff sts, 12 ch-1 sps)

**Row 3:** Ch 1, sc in same st as beg ch-1, sc in next st, [sk next puff st, 3 sc in next ch-1 sp, sk next puff st, sc in each of next 2 sts] across, turn. (62 sc)

**Rows 4–25:** [Rep rows 2 and 3] 11 times.

**Rnd 26 (RS):** Now working in rnds, ch 3, dc in same st as beg ch-3, dc in each st across to last st, 3 dc in last st for corner (65 sts),

**A.** working in side edge of rows, [dc in end of sc row, 2 dc in end of dc row] across (36 dc),

**B.** working across opposite side of foundation ch, 3 dc in first ch for corner, dc in each ch across to last ch, 3 dc in last ch for corner (66 dc),

**C.** working across end of row, [dc in end of each sc row, 2 dc in end of each dc row] across, ending with dc in same st as beg ch-3 (37 dc), **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in 3rd ch of beg ch-3, **do not turn**. (204 dc)

**Rnd 27:** Ch 1, puff st in same st as beg ch-1, sc in each of next 2 sts, [puff st in next st, sc in each of next 2 sts] around, join in beg puff st. (68 puff sts, 136 sc)

**Rnd 28:** Ch 1, (sc, dc, tr, dc, sc) in top of each puff st around, join in beg sc. Fasten off. **cw**

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# Fall Scarecrow Silverware Pocket

## FINISHED MEASUREMENT

Face is approximately 4¼ inches in diameter

## MATERIALS

- Red Heart Super Saver medium (worsted) weight acrylic yarn (7 oz/364 yds/198g per skein):  
1 skein each #313 Aran, #376 burgundy, #320 cornmeal and #406 medium thyme
- Red Heart Classic medium (worsted) weight acrylic yarn (3½ oz/190 yds/100g per skein):  
1 skein each #12 black and #245 orange
- Red Heart Soft medium (worsted) weight acrylic yarn (4 oz/204 yds/113g per skein):  
1 skein #9939 jeweltone
- Size H/8/5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Fabric glue
- Sewing needle
- Black sewing thread
- ⅞-inch black buttons: 4 (2 for each pocket)
- 1¾-inch diameter silk sunflower (girl only)



## GAUGE

Rnds 1–5 = 2¼ inches in diameter  
Gauge is not critical for this project.

## PATTERN NOTES

Place marker in first stitch to mark beginning of round. Work in continuous rounds. Do not join. Move marker up as work progresses.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Use small amount of fabric glue to hold facial features in place while attaching. Use photo as

guide for placement of all facial features.

## SPECIAL STITCH

### Single crochet join (sc join):

Place slip knot on hook, insert hook in indicated st, yo and pull up a lp, yo and draw through both lps on hook.

## SILVERWARE POCKETS

### FACE

#### Make 4 (2 for each pocket).

**Rnd 1:** With Aran, ch 2, 6 sc in 2nd ch from hook, **place marker** (see *Pattern Notes*). (6 sc)

**Rnd 2:** (Sc in next sc, 2 sc in next sc) 3 times. (9 sc)

**Rnd 3:** 2 sc in each sc. (18 sc)

**Rnd 4:** Sc in each sc.

**Rnd 5:** (Sc in next 2 sc, 2 sc in next sc) around. (24 sc)

**Rnd 6:** Rep rnd 5. (32 sc)

**Rnd 7:** (Sc in next 2 sc, 2 sc in next sc) around, sc in last 2 sc. (42 sc)

**Rnd 8:** Sc in each sc around, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) to first sc, fasten off.

### Straw Hair

Join cornmeal in **front lp** (see *Stitch Guide*) of last st of row 8 of 1 face piece, ch 16, fasten off. Rep in next 2 sts to the left. Continuing to work across top of face, (join in front lp of next st, ch 3, fasten off) 8 times, forming bangs. (Join in front lp of next st, ch 16, fasten off) 3 times. Tie knot tightly in ends of all hair pieces across head, leaving very small tail. Trim all ends even.

Rep on 2nd face piece.

### NOSE

#### Make 2 (1 for each pocket).

**Row 1:** With orange, ch 4, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in next 2 chs, ch 1, turn. (3 sc)

**Row 2: Sc dec** (see *Stitch Guide*) in first 2 sc, sc in last sc, ch 1, turn. (2 sc)

**Row 3:** Sc dec in 2 sc, fasten off. (1 sc)

### HAT

#### Make 2 burgundy for boy & 2 thyme for girl.

**Row 1 (RS):** Ch 6, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, ch 1, turn. (5 sc)

**Row 2:** 2 sc in first sc, sc in each sc across, 2 sc in last sc, ch 1, turn. (7 sc)

**Row 3:** Rep row 2. (9 sc)

**Row 4:** Sc in each sc, ch 1, turn.

**Row 5:** 2 sc in first sc, sc in each sc across, 2 sc in last sc, ch 3, turn. (11 sc)

**Row 6:** Sc in 2nd ch from hook and in next ch, sc in each sc across, ch 3, turn, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in next ch, sl st in next sc, fasten off. (15 sc)

### Hat Cuff

**Row 1:** With RS facing, join in front lp of first st of row 6, ch 2, hdc in front lp of each st across, fasten off. (15 hdc)

Fold this row up over hat to form cuff.

### HAT PATCH (FOR BOY)

**Row 1:** With jeweltone, ch 4, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, ch 1, turn. (3 sc)

**Rows 2 & 3:** Sc in each sc, ch 1, turn. At end of row 3, fasten off.

#### **HATBAND (FOR GIRL)**

**Row 1:** With jeweltone, ch 11, sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across, fasten off. (10 sc)

#### **BANDANNA**

**Make 2 (1 for each pocket).**

**Row 1:** With jeweltone, sk next 5 sc on side of face to the left of last st of hair, **sc join** (see *Special Stitch*) in next sc and working in **back lps** (see *Stitch Guide*) for this row, sc in next 17 sc, ch 1, turn. (18 sc)

**Row 2:** [Sc dec in 2 sc] twice, sc in each sc across to last 4 sc, [sc dec in 2 sc] twice, ch 1, turn. (14 sc)

**Row 3:** Sc dec in first 2 sc, sc in each sc across to last 2, sc dec in last 2 sc, ch 1, turn. (12 sc)

## An Interview With Bonnie Barker Designer, Teacher & Author

Recently, I had the chance to talk with Bonnie Barker, whose latest book, *Cable Crochet Made Easy*, features her love of textured cable designs and her unique teaching style. What a joy to get to know Bonnie and catch her enthusiasm for crochet cables!

**Crochet World:** Bonnie, tell us a little bit about yourself. When did you learn to crochet?

**Bonnie Barker:** I'm a retired homeschool educator, a mother of five wonderful young adults and wife to a great guy. I learned to crochet when I was 7 years old after watching my next-door neighbors' mom crochet a huge granny square afghan—the type that is just one big square. I was mesmerized by watching her hook and yarn move. After many days of watching her progress, she sat down and started a granny square for me. I've been crocheting ever since!

**CW:** What types of projects did you first like to crochet?

**BB:** At first, I worked on that big granny square afghan, and finally finished it when I was 9. Later, I learned to read crochet patterns with the help of my best friend's mom. At that point I would make just about anything from any pattern I could get my hands on, including a granny square bikini I found in one of my *Crochet World* magazines back in the '70s! (Well, I did live in south Florida, but this is one design I promise never to model!)

**CW:** Crochet teacher or designer—which came first?

**BB:** Definitely teacher! I've been teaching crochet for decades to folks of all ages. It never entered my mind to design my own until I couldn't find the patterns I really wanted to crochet.

**CW:** You are known for your Celtic crochet. What influenced your love of cables?

**BB:** I've always loved the way cables look in knit designs, but I prefer crochet over knitting. I think that's where it started. One day I found a couple of Leisure Arts leaflets by Annie Ought, published in the late 1970s/early 1980s that created lovely crochet cabled designs. I made all the designs in those leaflets multiple times. I wanted more designs like them, but they just weren't available. This was

before the Internet, so the only patterns available were what you could find in department stores.

**CW:** Tell us about the first crochet design you ever submitted. What made you decide to submit a design for publication?

**BB:** It has a lot to do with the county fair. The first time I won "Best of Show" for one of my Aran afghans I received a call from a woman in New Jersey who had seen my afghan on display at the fair. She called me to inquire as to where she could purchase the pattern. I was flabbergasted because it was my own original design and there was not a written pattern available, at least not yet. This prompted me to photograph the afghan, along with four others and send an inquiry to Leisure Arts. To my surprise they were interested in my work!

**CW:** Tell us about your first two books. What was it like to work on a collection of patterns? Did you enjoy the process?

**BB:** They both were a LOT of hard work, but I enjoyed it very much. I was so thankful that the editor of my first book allowed me to include some photos I took of the beautiful country of Ireland, which inspired the designs. In the process, I learned a lot too—about yarns, designing, sizing, writing, editing and communicating.

**CW:** You recently self-published a third book featuring beautiful cable designs. Tell us what prompted you to self-publish this time.

**BB:** I wanted to have more creative control of this book in a few areas of the publication process. The first was in choosing the models for the designs. I wanted to include some of my friends and family, especially those whose body size was more, dare I say, "normal." True beauty comes in all shapes and sizes, and I wanted my models to reflect that. I was especially blessed that Valerie "Valley" Ennis was able to be one of my models. Valley was born with Down syndrome and has the most contagious, beautiful smile I have ever seen. Her beauty transcends what can be captured with a camera, and she is a joy in every sense of the word.

I also wanted more control over how the patterns were written, especially since they needed to correspond to the instructional videos. My two editors, Becky Barker and Christy Barker—both with excellent editing skills as writers and crocheters—did an excellent job helping me to make this possible!

**CW:** I know you do a lot of teaching videos on YouTube, so how did the idea come about to add links to your new book with step-by-step video tutorials?

**BB:** This is something I've wanted to do from the very beginning. I didn't want crocheters to be held

back from these fun stitches because of not understanding a written pattern or by the false belief that these stitches are “too hard to crochet.”

Also, I find that there are two types of crocheters: those who read patterns and those who primarily crochet using videos because they don't understand written patterns. You could say that as an educator I am on a quest to help those in the second category to become more comfortable and confident at reading patterns. However, I am finding that there are many excellent crocheters out there who don't read patterns. They will still be able to crochet every pattern in this book by following the videos.

**CW:** Give us a behind-the-scenes peek at a typical day in the life of a crochet designer and author.

**BB:** Every day starts the same, yet every day is different! I take my hubby to his bus stop early in the morning, come home, fix my tea, spend some time reading my Bible and praying. Afterward, I usually spend some time answering email, YouTube and Facebook questions, and working on social media posts. If I am facing a deadline on a design, I may spend some time writing or editing a pattern to get it ready for publication. This may include taking photographs of the design, or perhaps even filming an instructional video. Other days I spend many hours editing the videos and uploading them. So you may be wondering, “Do you ever just sit down and crochet?” Well, yes, but not as much as you would think because of all the other tasks that need to get done in this process. Of course, I have other responsibilities such as caring for my mom,

our adult children, meal preparation and caring for the home. Some days I work outside as a substitute teacher at a local school. Life is full, but very, very good! I truly love the variety.

**CW:** You just recently taught at the Crochet Guild of America conference this past July. If you had to pick your favorite, do you prefer designing, publishing or teaching?

**BB:** Wow! That's a tough question. Being a strong generalist (someone who likes to do a lot of different things rather than just one), I truly enjoy the variety of what I do in each of these roles. If I had to pick just one, I believe I enjoy designing the very best. There is something about creating a new design or even a new stitch that is very deeply satisfying. After raising and homeschooling five children, I so appreciate the solitude that designing provides at times.

**CW:** What's next?

**BB:** That's a great question. Only the Lord truly knows, but I would like to continue to work to build my *Bonnie Bay Crochet* YouTube channel and continue developing new crochet cabled designs. I would love to teach and travel on a broader scale as opportunities arise. One dream is to travel to the UK and perhaps even back to Ireland to teach cable crochet!

**CW:** And just for fun, what is the one dream project you wish you had time to crochet?

**BB:** A few years ago I really enjoyed designing/crocheting a formal tea-length dress, combining a subtle Aran/Celtic design bodice using fine merino/silk yarn, trimmed using pearls and a delicate chiffon fabric (for sleeves and skirt). I would love to do more projects like this, and perhaps even a wedding dress someday. **CW**

- King Cole Curiosity DK light (DK) weight acrylic yarn (5¼ oz/ 524 yds/150g per ball):  
1 ball #2894 sunset
- Size H/8/5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle



## GAUGE

4 [tr, 3 dc] = 3¾ inches; 7 arrow rows = 4 inches

## PATTERN NOTES

Turning chains do not count as a stitch.

Chain-2 at beginning of row does not count as a stitch.

## SCARF

**Row 1 (RS):** Ch 9, dc in 4th ch from hook (3 sk chs do not count as st), sk next 3 chs, tr in next ch, working in back of tr, dc in 3 sk chs, dc in last ch, turn. (6 sts)

**Row 2:** Ch 2 (see Pattern Notes), dc in first dc, sk next 3 sts, tr in next st, working in front of tr, dc in 3 sk sts, dc in last st, turn.

**Row 3 (inc row):** Ch 2, dc in first st, sk 3 sts, tr in next st, working behind tr, dc in 3 sk sts, dc in last st, 2 dc in turning ch, turn. (8 sts)

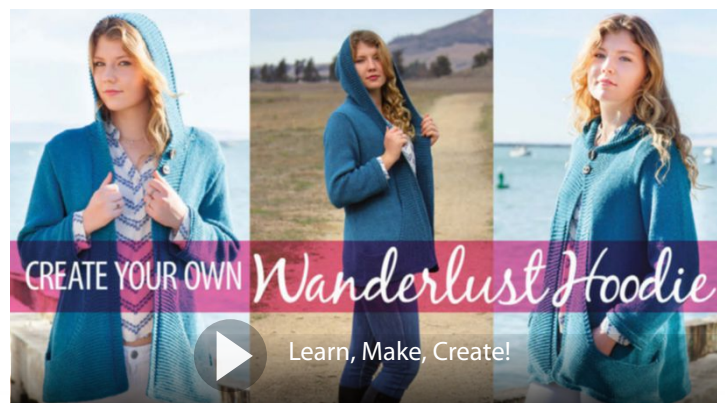

## FINISHED MEASUREMENTS

15 inches in diameter x 4¾ inches tall, excluding Ears

## MATERIALS

- Red Heart Super Saver medium (worsted) weight acrylic yarn (stripes: 5 oz/236 yds/141g per skein; solids: 7 oz/364 yds/198g per skein):
  - 6 skeins #3976 soapstone
  - 5 yds #312 black
- Size K/10½/6.5mm crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge
- Tapestry needle
- Stitch marker



## GAUGE

Rnds 1–6 = 4 inches in diameter

## PATTERN NOTES

Weave in loose ends as work progresses.

Although gauge is not critical, it is important to keep a tight tension, as that will allow sides of the Cat Basket to be firm and stand upright.

Join with slip stitch as indicated unless otherwise stated.

Cat Basket is crocheted holding 3 strands together throughout.

Pattern is worked in continuous rounds. Mark first stitch of round and move marker as work progresses.

## CAT BASKET

### BOTTOM

**Rnd 1:** With 3 strands soapstone held tog (see *Pattern Notes*), ch 4, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in 4th ch from hook to

form ring, 6 sc in ring, **place marker** (see *Pattern Notes*). (6 sc)

**Rnd 2:** 2 sc in each sc around. (12 sc)

**Rnd 3:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in next sc] around. (18 sc)

**Rnd 4:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 2 sc] around. (24 sc)

**Rnd 5:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 3 sc] around. (30 sc)

**Rnd 6:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 4 sc] around. (36 sc)

**Rnd 7:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 5 sc] around. (42 sc)

**Rnd 8:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 6 sc] around. (48 sc)

**Rnd 9:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 7 sc] around. (54 sc)

**Rnd 10:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 8 sc] around. (60 sc)

**Rnd 11:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 9 sc] around. (66 sc)

**Rnd 12:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 10 sc] around. (72 sc)

**Rnd 13:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 11 sc] around. (78 sc)

**Rnd 14:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 12 sc] around. (84 sc)

**Rnd 15:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 13 sc] around. (90 sc)

**Rnd 16:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 14 sc] around. (96 sc)

**Rnd 17:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 15 sc] around. (102 sc)

**Rnd 18:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 16 sc] around. (108 sc)

## Designer Tip

### Measuring Your Cat for a Custom-Size Cat Basket

1. Find your cat. As we all know, cats inconveniently disappear when you need to find them. Check under beds, in closets and even inside cupboards as cats have Houdini-level vanishing skills.
2. Enlist a friend for an extra set of hands. Your cat will not want to be manhandled, and you'll need the extra muscle.
3. Ply your cat generously with treats—they're not above being bribed.
4. While your helper holds your cat still, measure from top of head to base of tail. Remember to keep feeding your cat with treats and giving generous scratches and compliments. Your cat will be more amenable if he's being treated like the royal he is.
5. Once you have your cat's measurement, subtract 5–6 inches—this is the diameter of your cat basket. Though cats can assume a liquid state and fit into the tiniest of containers, this measurement will give him room to stretch while still keeping him cozy and comfy.

**Rnd 19:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 17 sc] around. (114 sc)

**Rnd 20:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 18 sc] around. (120 sc)

**Rnd 21:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 19 sc] around. (126 sc)

**Rnd 22:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 20 sc] around. (132 sc)



Even the most discerning felines will find this cozy bed to their liking! Crocheted quickly holding three strands of worsted-weight yarn together. Finish it off by adding ears and whiskers!



**Rnd 23:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 21 sc] around. (138 sc)

**Rnd 24:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 22 sc] around. (144 sc)

**Rnd 25:** [2 sc in next sc, sc in each of next 23 sc] around. (150 sc)

At end of rnd 25, join in first st of rnd, ch 1 (*does not count as st*). Now building the side of Cat Basket, turn work so you're working around outside of Cat Basket.

#### SIDE

**Rnd 1:** Ch 1, working in **back lp** (*see Stitch Guide*) of each st, sc in each st around, place marker. (150 sc)

**Rnd 2:** Sc in each sc around.

Rep rnd 2 until Side measures 4½ inches or desired height, join in beg sc. Fasten off.

#### FIRST EAR

**Row 1:** Join 3 strands soapstone with sl st in any st of last rnd of Side, ch 1, sc in same st as beg ch-1, sc in each of next 11 sc, turn. (12 sc)

**Rows 2–5:** Ch 1, **sc dec** (*see Stitch Guide*) in first 2 sc, sc in each sc across to last 2 sts, sc dec in last 2 sc, turn. (4 sc)

**Row 6:** Ch 1, [sc dec in next 2 sc] twice, turn. (2 sc)

**Row 7:** Ch 1, sc dec in next 2 sc. Fasten off. (1 sc)

#### 2ND EAR

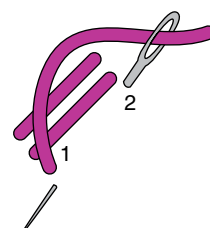
**Row 1:** Sk next 13 sc of last rnd of Side from First Ear, join

3 strands soapstone in next sc, ch 1, sc in same st as beg ch-1, sc in each of next 11 sc, turn. (12 sc)

**Rows 2–7:** Rep rows 2–7 of First Ear.

#### FACIAL FEATURES

With 1 strand black, embroider nose and whiskers with **straight stitches** (*see illustration*) as shown in photo. **cw**

in each of next 39 [43, 45] sts, turn. (40 [44, 46] hdc)

**Row 2:** Ch 2, hdc in each hdc across, turn.

Rep row 2 until piece measures same as fronts. At end of last row, fasten off.

### SLEEVE

#### Make 2.

**Note:** Use different color for each Sleeve.

**Row 1 (RS):** Ch 23 [27, 29], hdc in 3rd ch from hook (*beg 2 sk chs count as a hdc*), hdc in each rem ch across, turn. (22 [26, 28] hdc)

**Row 2:** Ch 2, hdc in each hdc across, turn.

**Row 3:** Ch 2, hdc in first hdc, hdc in each hdc across to last hdc, 2 hdc in last hdc, turn. (24 [26, 30] hdc)

**Rows 4–19 [4–19, 4–21]:** [Rep rows 2 and 3 alternately] 7 [7, 8] times. (38 [40, 46] hdc at end of last row)

**Row 20 [20, 22]:** Ch 2, hdc in each hdc across, turn.

Rep row 20 [20, 22] until piece measures 8½ [10½, 11½] inches. Fasten off.

### ASSEMBLY

Sew shoulder seams. Sew Sleeve seams. Sew in Sleeves, matching center of Sleeve to shoulder seam.

#### Sleeve Edging

**Note:** Use same color for edging as used for last 2 rows of Lower Body.

Hold 1 Sleeve with RS facing, join yarn with sc in seam, sc in each st around, join in beg sc. Fasten off. Rep on rem Sleeve.

### Front Edging & Ties

**Note:** Use same color for Edging as used for last 2 rows of Lower Body.

Hold piece with RS facing, join yarn in end of row 81 [89, 93] of Lower Body, ch 38, 3 sc in 2nd ch from hook, 3 sc in each of next 6 chs, sl st in each rem ch, working up Yoke section, work 16 [17, 18] sc evenly sp to shoulder seam, work 14 sc evenly sp across back, working down Yoke section, work 16 [17, 18] sc evenly sp to row 81 [89, 93] of Lower Body, ch 38, 3 sc in 2nd ch from hook, 3 sc in each of next 6 chs, sl st in each rem ch. Fasten off.

### HAT

**Note:** Work 2 rows each color, following same color sequence as used for Lower Body.

**Rnd 1 (RS):** Ch 60, join (see Pattern Notes) to form a ring, being careful not to twist ch, **ch 2** (see Pattern Notes), hdc in each rem ch around, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2. (60 hdc)

**Rnd 2:** Ch 2, hdc in each st around, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2.

**Rnds 3–12:** Rep rnd 2. At end of last row, fasten off.

### Crown

**Rnd 1:** Maintaining color sequence, join yarn in joining of rnd 12, ch 2, \*hdc dec (see Stitch Guide) in next 2 sts, hdc in next st, rep from \* across to last 2 sts, hdc dec in last 2 sts, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2. (40 hdc)

**Rnd 2:** Ch 1, hdc in next st, [hdc dec in next 2 sts] 19 times, join in first hdc. **Do not change color.** (20 hdc)

**Rnd 3:** Ch 2, hdc in each st around, join in 2nd ch of beg ch-2.

**Rnd 4:** Ch 1, hdc dec in first 3 sts, [hdc dec in next 3 sts] 5 times, hdc dec in next 2 sts, join in beg st. Fasten off. (7 hdc)

### CURLICUE

#### Make 7.

Following color sequence and leaving 6-inch end, join yarn in first hdc of rnd 4 of Hat, ch 12, 3 sc in 2nd ch from hook, 3 sc in each of next 7 chs, sl st in each of next 3 chs, sc in same st as joining. Rep in each rem hdc of rnd 4. Pull all ends to inside of Hat. Divide ends in 2 groups and tie in knot on inside of Hat.

### EDGING

Hold Hat with RS facing and foundation ch at top, working in unused lps of foundation ch, join same color as Jacket Edging with sc in any st, sc in each rem st around, join in joining sc. Fasten off. **CW**





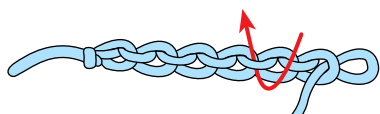

## HOT PAD

### FRONT

**Rnd 1:** With country yellow, ch 70, **join** (see *Pattern Notes*) in first ch being careful not to twist ch, ch 1, sc in first ch, working in **back bar of ch** (see *illustration*), sc in each ch around to last ch, hdc in last ch. **Place marker** (see *Pattern Notes*) in bottom of hdc as last st. (70 sts)



Back Bar of Chain

**Rnds 2 & 3:** Split sc (see *Special Stitch*) in each st around.

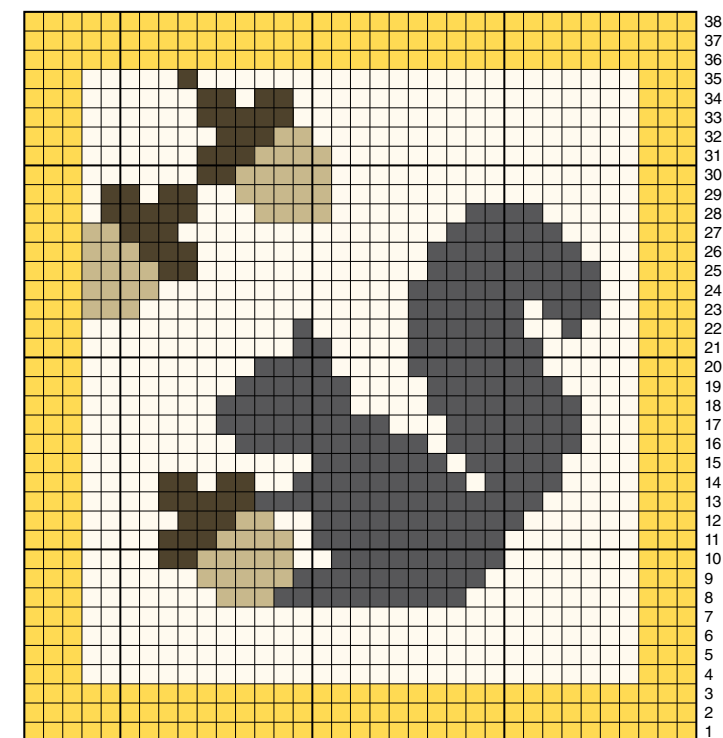
**Rnds 4–38:** Working split sc in each sc around, **change color** (see *Stitch Guide*) according to **Colorwork Chart** (see *Pattern Notes*) across first 35 sts, with country yellow split sc in each rem st around. Fasten off at end of last rnd.

### FINISHING

Block with image centered.

Working in **back lps** (see *Stitch Guide*), sew top and bottom edges closed with matching yarn. **CW**

**Row 4:** Rep row 3, ch 1, turn. (10 sc)

**Rows 5 & 6:** Sc in each sc, ch 1, turn.

**Row 7:** Rep row 3, ch 1, turn. (8 sc)

**Rows 8 & 9:** Rep row 3. (4 sc)

**Row 10:** [Sc dec in 2 sc] twice, ch 1, turn. (2 sc)

**Row 11:** Sc dec in 2 sc, fasten off. (1 sc)

### FINISHING & ASSEMBLY

**On 2 faces for fronts:** With sewing thread and needle, attach 2 buttons to face for eyes.

Using length of orange yarn, attach nose to face having point facing upward.

With black yarn, embroider mouth below nose between rnds 6 and 7 using running stitch. Use photo as guide.

**To attach hats:** With length of hat color, attach hat cuff of 1 hat (*burgundy on boy, thyme on girl*) to top of each front face, slightly covering hair. In the same manner, attach hat cuff of 1 matching hat to top of each back face. Curve hat cuffs slightly to fit curve of face pieces. St very ends of front and back hat cuff pieces tog, leaving top of hat open for pocket.

For girl, sew hatband to hat just above cuff. With fabric glue, attach sunflower to girl's hat.

For boy, sew patch turned on its end on hat.

Using length of Aran, use a st through both thicknesses to attach front and back faces tog; start right below hair on left side and continue all the way around to corresponding st on opposite side.

With slightly warm steam iron and double thickness of cloth between iron and pocket, press bandanna so that it lies flat. Be very careful to not get the iron too hot so that it will not flatten out the sts. Sew 1 bandanna to the bottom of each face. **CW**

**Row 4 (inc row):** Ch 2, sk 2 sts, tr in next st, working in front of tr, 2 dc in first sk st, 1 dc in next st, sk next 3 sts, tr in next st, working in front of tr, dc in 3 sk sts, dc in last st, turn. (9 sts)

**Row 5 (inc row):** Ch 2, dc in first st, [sk next 3 sts, tr in next st, working behind tr, dc in 3 sk sts] twice, dc in same st as tr, turn. (10 sts)

**Row 6:** Ch 2, dc in first st, [sk next 3 sts, tr in next st, working in front of tr, dc in 3 sk sts] twice, dc in last st, turn.

**Row 7 (inc row):** Ch 2, dc in first st, [sk 3 sts, tr in next st, working behind tr, dc in 3 sk sts] twice, dc in last st, 2 dc in turning ch, turn. (12 sts)

**Row 8 (inc row):** Ch 2, sk 2 sts, tr in next st, working in front of tr, 2 dc in first sk st, 1 dc in next st, [sk next 3 sts, tr in next st, working in front of tr, dc in 3 sk sts] twice, dc in last st, turn. (13 sts)

**Row 9 (inc row):** Ch 2, dc in first st, [sk next 3 sts, tr in next st, working behind tr, dc in 3 sk sts] across, dc in same st as last tr, turn. (14 sts)

**Row 10:** Ch 2, dc in first dc, [sk next 3 sts, tr in next st, working in front of tr, dc in 3 sk sts] across to last st, dc in last st, turn.

**Row 11 (inc row):** Ch 2, dc in first st, [sk 3 sts, tr in next st, working behind tr, dc in 3 sk sts] across to last st, dc in last st, 2 dc in turning ch, turn. (16 sts)

**Row 12 (inc row):** Ch 2, sk 2 sts, tr in next st, working in

front of tr, 2 dc in first sk st, 1 dc in next st, [sk next 3 sts, tr in next st, working in front of tr, dc in 3 sk sts] across to last st, dc in last st, turn. (17 sts)

**Rows 13–77:** [Rep rows 9–12] 16 times, continuing to inc through row 76, or until scarf reaches desired length. Rep row 9. Fasten off at the end of the last row. (82 sts) **CW**

**Row 10 (RS) (leaf row):** Join terracotta in back lp only of first st, ch 1, **loosely sl st** (see *Pattern Notes*) in back lps only of next 33 sts, \*sl st in both lps of next 3 sts (*stem made*), work **leaf** (see *Special Stitches*); working behind leaf, sl st in back lps only of 9 sk sts, ch 1, sk worked st\*, sl st in back lps only of next 31 sts; rep between \* once; sl st in back lps only of last 18 sts, fasten off and do not turn. (2 leaves)

**Row 11 (RS):** Work in front lps only of row 9 throughout, working in front of previous row's sl sts, join olive in front lp only of first st, ch 3, dc in next 33 sts; \*working behind stem sl sts, dc in next 2 sts, 2 dc in next st, sk next st; working in front of sl sts, dc in next 8 sts behind leaf, sk next previously worked st, 2 dc in next st\*, dc in next 30 sts; rep between \* once; dc in last 17 sts; fasten off and do not turn. (109 sts)

**Row 12 (leaf row) (RS):** Join mustard in back lp only of first st, ch 1, sl st in back lps only of next 3 sts; [\*sl st in both lps of next 3 sts, work leaf; working behind leaf, sl st in back lps only of next 9 unworked sts, ch 1, sk next previously worked st\*, sl st in back lps only of next 31 sts] twice; work between \* once; sl st in back lps only of last 4 sts, fasten off and do not turn. (3 leaves)

**Row 13 (RS):** Work in front lps only of row 11 throughout, working in front of previous row's sl sts, join honey in front lp only of first st, ch 1, sc in next 3 sts; [\*working behind stem sl sts, sc in next 2 sts, 2 sc in next st, sk next st; working in front of sl sts, sc in next 8 sts behind leaf, sk next previously worked st, 2 sc in next st\*, sc in next 30 sts]

twice; rep between \* once; sc in last 3 sts, fasten off and turn. (109 sts)

**Row 14:** With toffee, rep row 7.

**Row 15 (leaf row) (RS):** Join fern in back lp only of first st, ch 1, sl st in back lps only of next 18 sts; \*sl st in both lps of next 3 sts, work leaf; working behind leaf, sl st in back lps only of next 9 unworked sts, ch 1, sk next previously worked st\*, sl st in back lps only of next 31 sts, rep between \* once, sl st in back lps only of last 33 sts, fasten off and do not turn. (2 leaves)

**Row 16 (RS):** Work in front lps only of row 14 throughout, working in front of previous row's sl sts, join terracotta in front lp only of first st, ch 1, sc in next 18 sts; \*working behind stem sl sts, sc in next 2 sts, 2 sc in next st, sk next st; working in front of sl sts, sc in next 8 sts behind leaf, sk next previously worked st, 2 sc in next st\*, sc in next 30 sts, rep between \* once; sc in last 32 sts; turn. (109 sts)

**Row 17:** With honey, rep row 3.

**Row 18:** With mustard, rep row 6.

**Row 19:** With olive, rep row 7.

**Row 20:** With fern, rep row 4.

**Row 21:** With honey, rep row 7.

**Row 22:** With terracotta, rep row 8.

**Row 23:** With mustard, rep row 7 except do not turn.

**Row 24 (WS):** With olive, rep row 3.

[Rep rows 2–24] twice.

**Last row:** Rep row 2. Fasten off.

### FINISHING

With tapestry needle and 1 strand of matching color, taking care not to twist leaf, sew a few hidden sts through back of leaf posts to secure center of each leaf.



### Fringe

For each fringe, cut 20-inch lengths of up to 10 strands, depending on number of tails incorporated. Use matching colors plus nearby tails of any color in each fringe. Place a fringe in each corner and evenly sp (approximately 2 inches apart) between corners. Trim ends even. **CW**

### Designer Tip

For fringe, start at corners, fold afghan in half and place a fringe there; fold in half between previously placed fringes and place a fringe. Continue placing a fringe halfway between previously placed fringes until it is easy to see where to place remaining fringes.

**Rows 2–4:** Ch 1, sc in each sc across, turn. At the end of row 4, leaving a 12-inch length, fasten off.



With rem length, with ends of rows tog, sew tog to form a tube.

### Part 2

**Row 1:** With size G hook and camel, ch 4, sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc in each of next 2 chs, turn. (3 sc)

**Rows 2–4:** Ch 1, sc in each sc across, turn. At the end of row 4, leaving a 12-inch length, fasten off.

With rem length, with ends of rows tog, sew tog to form a tube.

Attach individual toe (*created in part 2*) to the 5th st of part 1.

### FINISHING

Sew Beak directly under last 3 sts of forehead.

Sew ends of rows of feathers tog. Slip on base form with sewn seam at center back. The top edge is sewn to row 2 below bottom of beak. Sew the bottom of the feathers to body form.

Ear tufts are sewn to body next to the widest part of the forehead. Fold tufts in half. Pass needle through st at opposite side of body. Sew a tuft on each side of forehead.

For talons, [cut 1½-inch length of black thread. Pass through end of a toe. Twist ends tog. Bend it around a crochet hook to create curved end for the talon] 6 times creating a talon on each toe. Sew feet to bottom of body. **cw**

**Rnd 17:** Ch 1, hdc in each hdc around, evenly spacing 15 **hdc-2tog** (see *Special Stitches*); join and fasten off. (120 hdc)

**Rnd 18:** Join Aran in **back lp** (see *Stitch Guide*) only of any st, ch 1, hdc in each hdc around; join.

**Rnd 19:** Ch 1, work hdc in each hdc around, evenly spacing 10 hdc2tog; join. (110 hdc)

**Rnds 20 & 21:** Ch 1, work hdc in each hdc around, evenly spacing 8 hdc2tog; join. (94 hdc)

**Rnd 22:** Ch 1, hdc in each hdc around; join.

**Rnd 23:** Ch 1, work hdc2tog, hdc in each rem st around; join and fasten off. (93 hdc)

**Rnd 24:** Join emerald in any st, (ch 1, sc) in same st, sc in next st, **lg sc** (see *Special Stitches*) in next st, (sc in next 2 sts, lg sc in next st) around; join and fasten off. (31 lg sc, 62 sc)

### FINISHING

#### Felting

Felt beret by washing on smallest hot/cold cycle in washing machine and drying on high heat in dryer until it meets diameter measurement across top (*opening will still*

*be too large*). You may need to wash and dry twice, or finish by hand-felting to shrink it enough. To hand-felt, fill a sink or bowl with water as hot as you can





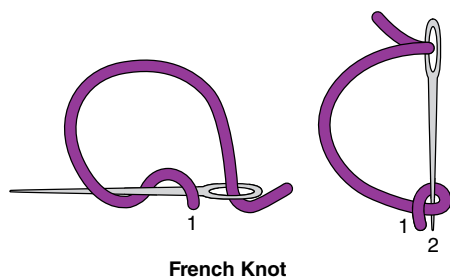
stand, soak beret in it for a few minutes, then briskly rub 2 sections of beret tog at a time, working around the surface a small piece at a time. Felt should be dense with individual sts indistinguishable. Dry in dryer on low heat, or air-dry flat.

### Edging

With emerald, work 63 sc evenly around beret opening to draw it in to head size, piercing the felted fabric with your crochet hook.

### Embroidery

With Aran, embroider each petal with straight stitches on either side of fpdc; add a **French knot** (see illustration) in the center of petals. **CW**

### 1 2 3 4 5 6 BEGINNER

Projects for first-time crocheters using basic stitches, with little or no shaping.

### 1 2 3 4 5 6 CONFIDENT BEGINNER

Projects for new crocheters who are comfortable with the beginner basic stitches and are ready to combine them into short pattern sequences. Skills include simple increasing, decreasing and minimal color changes.

### 1 2 3 4 5 6 EASY

Projects using basic stitches, repetitive stitch patterns, simple color changes and easy shaping and finishing. Simple in-the-round projects, such as coasters, hot mats, flowers, hats, neck warmers and cowls fall within this skill category, as well as the ability to read simple stitch charts and keys.

### 1 2 3 4 5 6 INTERMEDIATE

Projects that incorporate a wide variety of stitch techniques beyond the basics, such as shells, fans, popcorns, clusters, post stitches, basic cables, lace, simple intarsia, shaping and finishing. The crocheter has the ability to read more advanced stitch pattern charts, such as lace and cable charts.

### 1 2 3 4 5 6 MODERATELY CHALLENGING




Projects that utilize a wide variety of stitches and techniques such as those noted above, as well as more detailed colorwork, shaping, construction and finishing.

### 1 2 3 4 5 6 CHALLENGING

Projects that require a more intuitive understanding of a pattern or chart and that also include advanced stitches and techniques, as well as more intricate methods such as intarsia, cables, lace, stranded colorwork with numerous color changes and advanced shaping and construction techniques.
