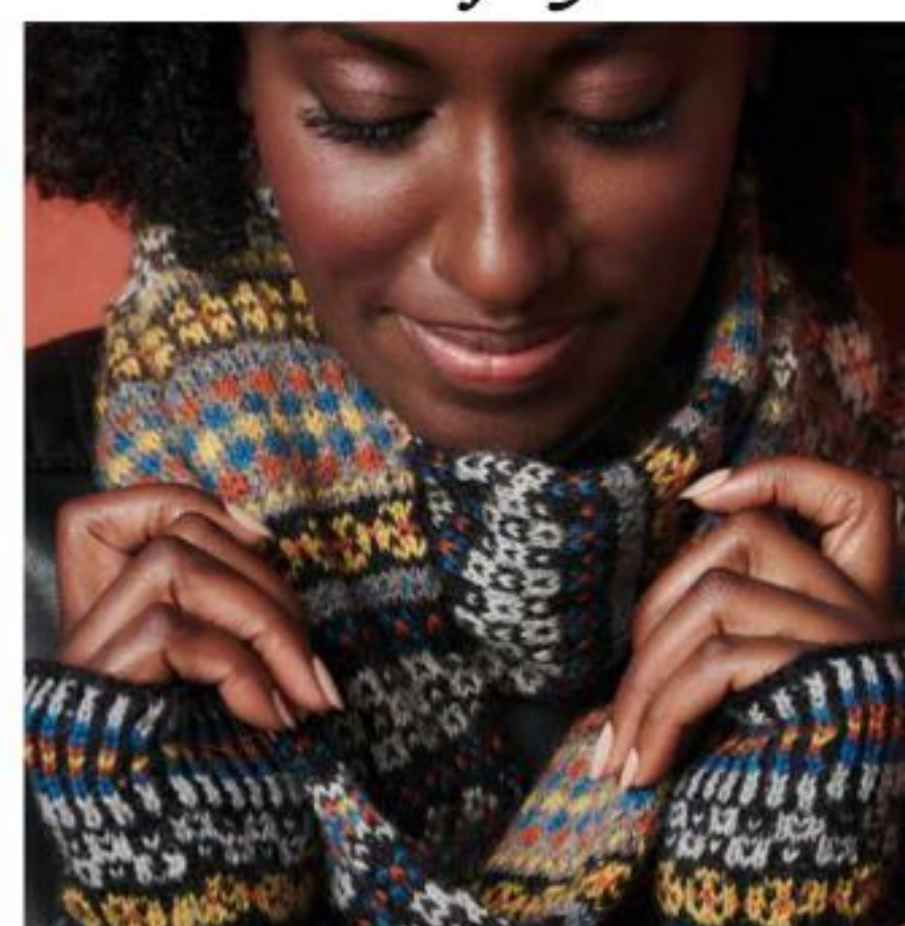

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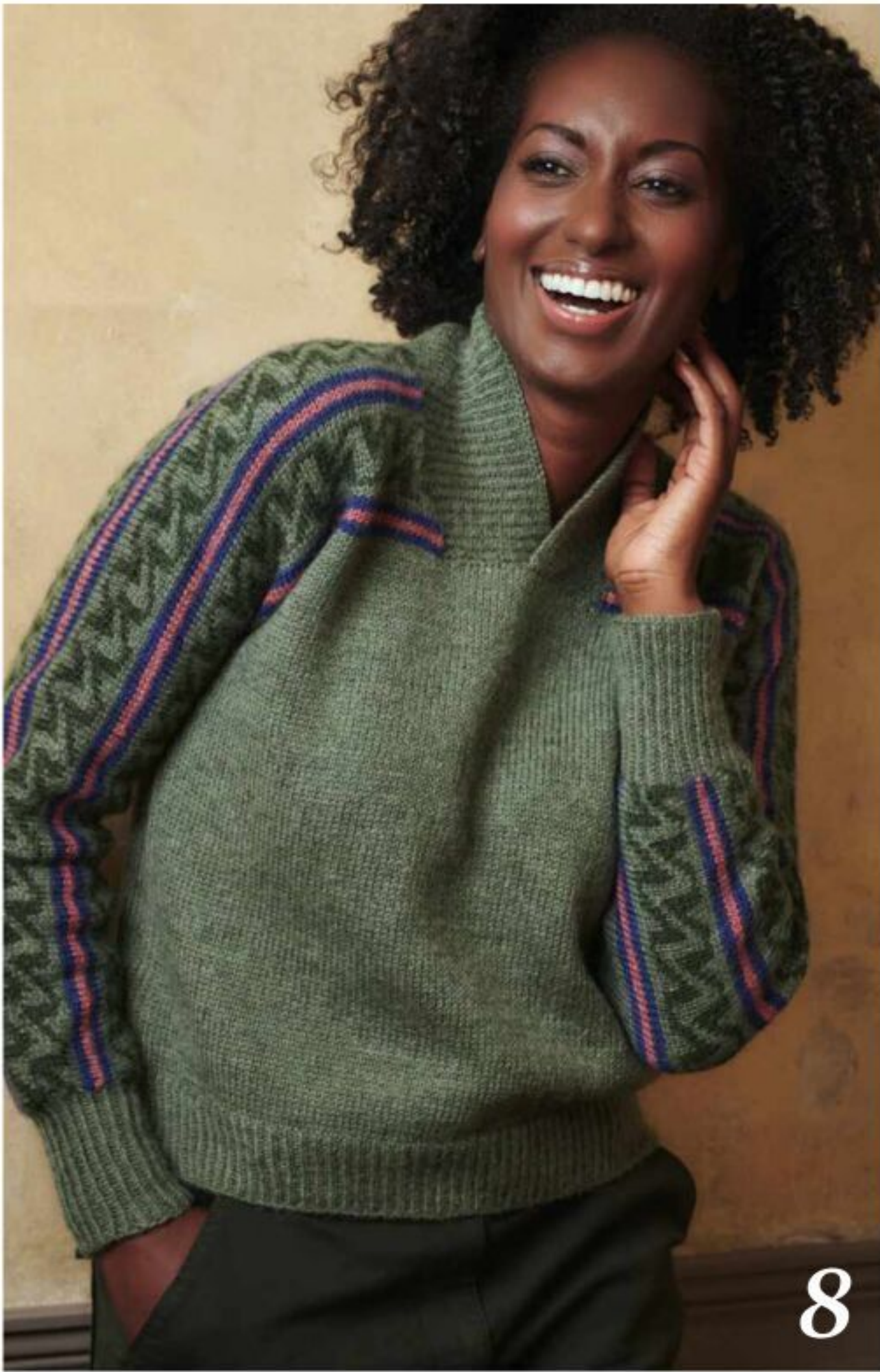
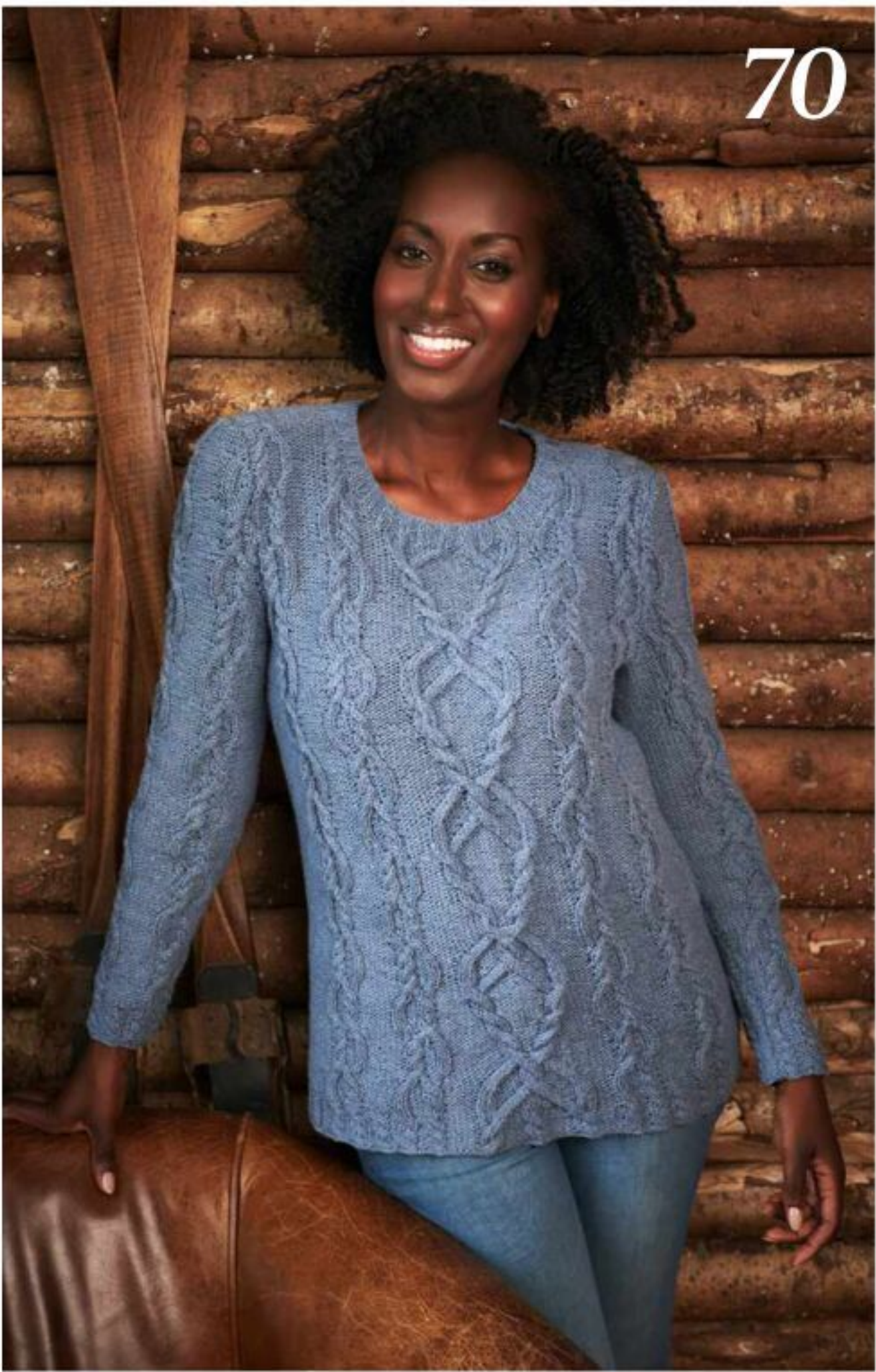

## Sleepless Night

“**THIS VINTAGE-INSPIRED** design has a petite shawl collar,” says Francesca Hughes. “A stripe and colourwork strip is worked from the right cuff, all the way over the shoulders and neck to the left cuff. The length can be easily modified to create an androgynous piece. It’s designed to be worn with 5–20cm (2in–8in) of positive ease. The colour combination and the name of this jumper are based on the stunning artwork *Nuit Blanche* by Jean Lurçat.”

### PATTERN TIPS

Use stitch markers to keep track of side seams and where shoulders should match. Read ahead to see how the garment is constructed. Have confidence working short rows to help understand the sleeve shaping. Use Jeny’s Stretchy Slipknot Cast-On when casting on for the sleeves, as it provides a sturdy and flexible seam. The body is worked in the round from the bottom up; gussets are created for the

**John Arbon Textiles** Devonian DK (DK weight; 50% Exmoor Blueface wool, 30% Bluefaced Leicester wool, 20% West Country Lustre Breeds wool; 233m/255yds per 100g skein)

underarms, where stitches are cast on for the right front sleeve first, and worked as short rows to shape the sleeve. Stitches are put on hold and then stitches are picked up across the right sleeve seam, across the back and stitches are cast on for the left back sleeve. The whole wingspan is worked, then leaving stitches on hold. Stitches are picked up across the right sleeve seam and short rows shape sleeves. Neck shaping is worked after the sleeve shaping is complete on both front pieces. colourwork is worked after all short row shaping is complete. The tops of sleeves and shoulders are joined using the three-needle cast-off method.

### BODY

Using 3.5mm needles, yarn A and Jeny’s Stretchy Cast-On (see Pattern Tips), cast on 102 (120:126:144:162:172:184:196) sts, pm (left seam mrk), cast on 102 (120:126:144:162:172:184:196) sts, pm (right seam mrk) and join to work in the round, being careful not to twist sts. 204 (240:252:288:324:344:368:392) sts. **Rib rnd:** (K1tbl, P1) to end. Rep rib rnd until work meas 5 (6½:6½:7½:7½:7½:9:9) cm from cast-on edge.

Change to 4mm needles.

**Next rnd:** (P1, K1) 5 times, P1, pm, K81 (99:105:123:141:151:163:175) across front, pm, (P1, K1) 5 times, slm, P1, (K1, P1) 5 times, pm, K81 (99:105:123:141:151:163:175) across back, pm, (P1, K1) 5 times, slm.

Work in pattern as set until Body meas 34½ (36:37½:37½:38:38:39½:39½) cm from cast-on edge.

#### **Increase rnd (to create armpit gusset):**

P1, M1, (K1, P1) to mrk, slm, K to mrk, slm, (P1, K1) to mrk, M1, slm, P1, M1, (K1, P1) to mrk, slm, K to mrk, slm, (P1, K1) to mrk, M1, slm. 4 sts inc’d.

**Next rnd:** Knit.

Rep last 2 rnds another 3 times, bringing new sts into rib patt. 220 (256:268:304:340:360:384:408) sts.

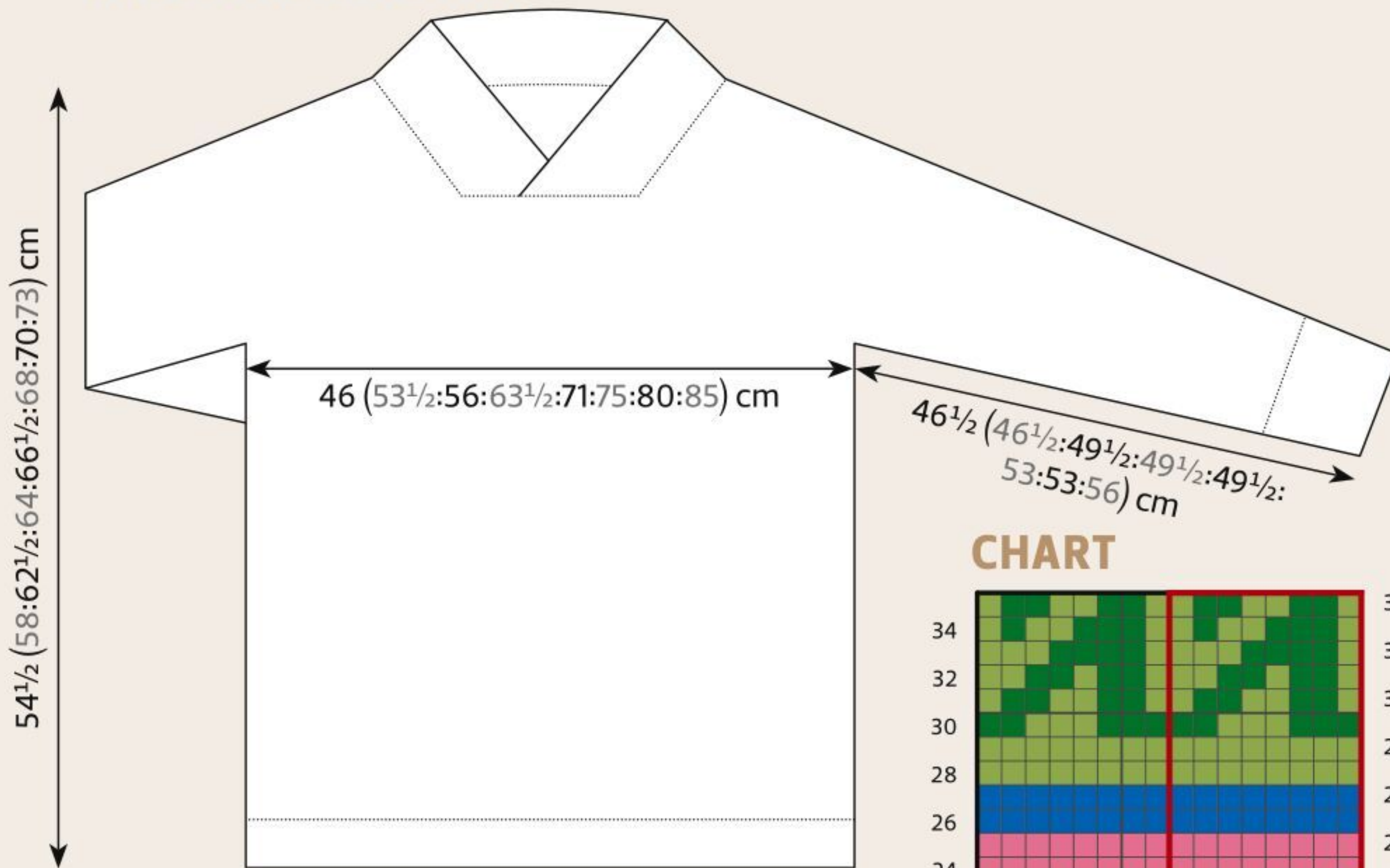
#### **FRONT AND SLEEVE FRONT**

**Next row (RS):** Knit to first mrk, remove mrk, slm, knit across front of jumper to mrk, remove mrk, knit to side Right seam mrk, put back sts on a holder or waste yarn. Using Jeny’s Stretchy Slipknot Cast-On and yarn A, cast on 88 (88:96:96:96:104:104:112) sts, turn work, purl back to

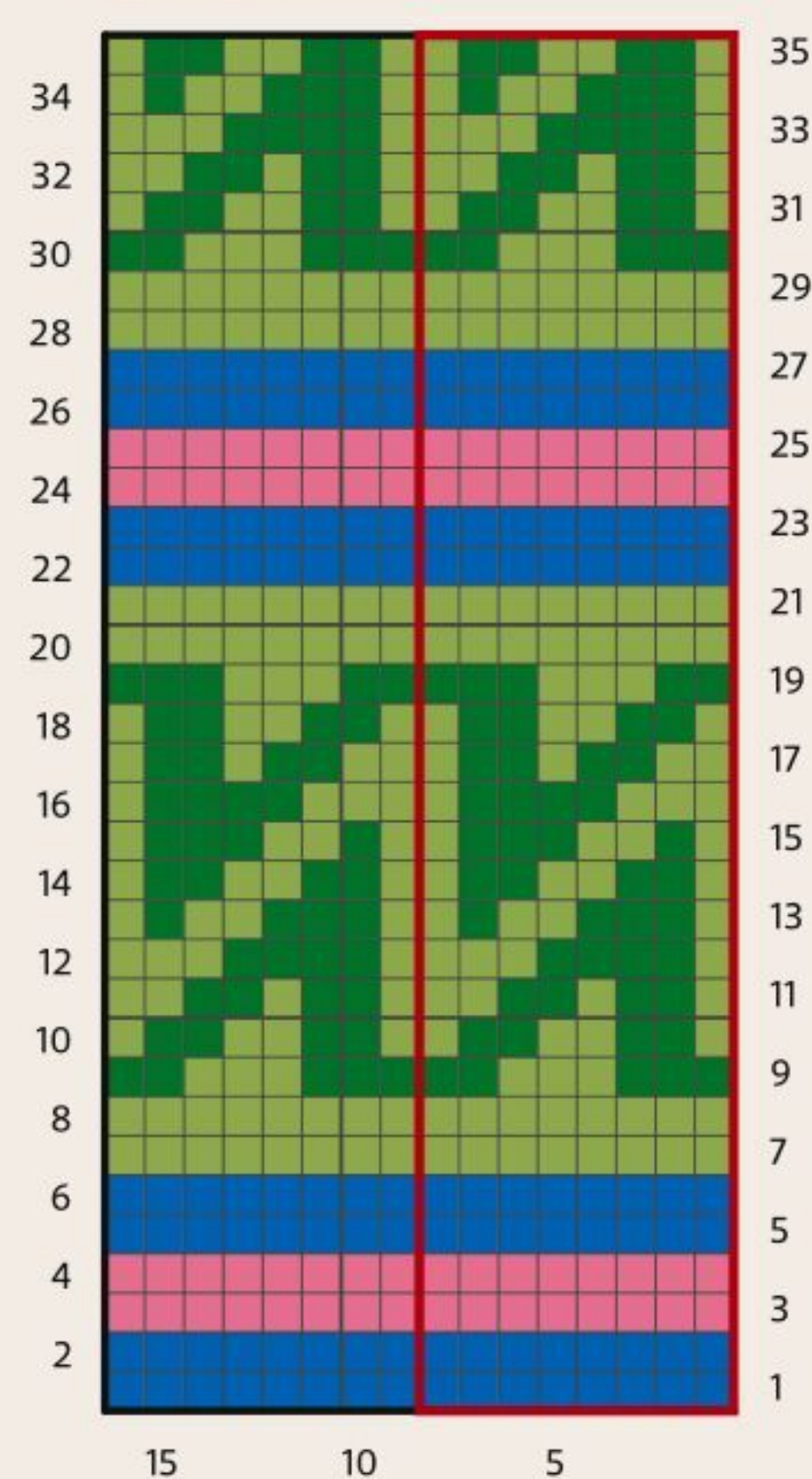

## SHAPE LEFT NECK

With WS facing, rejoin yarn A to left neck  
on the WS and purl 1 row. Break yarn A.  
Join yarn B, and set Chart and AT THE  
SAME TIME shape neck as follows:  
Beg first row with stitch 6 (1:6:1:8:7:1:7)  
of Chart and ending first row with stitch  
5 (8:5:8:7:8:8:6), work 2 rows straight over  
Chart to establish pattern. Keep the  
colourwork pattern correctly aligned thus  
throughout, as the fronts need to match the  
back at the top shoulder.

**Next row (RS dec):** Patt to last 3 sts, K2tog,  
K1. 1 st dec'd.

**Next row:** Patt to cuff.

Rep last two rows another 8 (10:8:8:8:  
7:10:12) times.

119 (125:135:143:151:161:165:179) sts.

Continue working in colourwork pattern  
for 15 (11:15:15:15:15:11:7) rows to complete  
Chart.

Break yarn and leave work on a holder.

## RIGHT BACK SLEEVE, CROSS BACK AND LEFT BACK SLEEVE

With WS of right sleeve facing, using 4mm  
needles and yarn A, from the right cuff,  
pick up and knit 88 (88:96:96:96:104:  
104:112) sts down Right underarm seam,  
pm, put 110 (128:134:152:170:180:192:204)  
sts back on working needle for back,  
and purl across, pm, pick up and knit  
88 (88:96:96:96:104:104:112) sts along the  
underarm seam of the Left sleeve.  
286 (304:326:344:362:388:400:428) sts.  
Turn work.

**Next row (WS):** P to mrk, slm, P to mrk,  
slm, P to end.

## SHORT-ROW SHAPING FOR BACK SLEEVES

**Short row 1 (RS):** Knit to 10 (8:6:6:5:5:5:5)  
sts past Left underarm mrk, w&t.

**Short row 2:** Purl to 10 (8:6:6:5:5:5:5) sts  
past Right underarm mrk, w&t. ►

Left seam mrk, cast on 88 (88:96:96:96:  
104:104:112) sts, turn work.  
286 (304:326:344:362:388:400:428) sts.

**Short row 1 (RS):** Knit to Right seam mrk,  
slm, knit to 10 (8:6:6:5:5:5:5) sts past right  
underarm mrk, w&t.

**Short row 2:** Purl to 10 (8:6:6:5:5:5:5) sts  
past left underarm mrk, w&t.

**Short row 3:** Knit to 10 (8:6:6:5:5:5:5) sts  
past last wrapped st, w&t.

**Short row 4:** Purl to 10 (8:6:6:5:5:5:5) sts  
past last wrapped st, w&t.  
Repeat last two rows, working 10 (8:6:6:5:  
5:5:5) sts further every time until  
8 (8:12:6:11:19:14:12) sts haven't been  
worked.

**Next row (RS):** Knit all sts to right cuff.

Work 1 (3:5:7:9:13:15:19) further rows  
across all sts in st st, ending with a WS row.

## SHAPE RIGHT NECK

**Next row (RS):** Using yarn A, starting at  
left cuff, knit across 128 (136:144:152:160:  
170:176:192) sts, cast off 30 (32:38:40:42:  
48:48:44) sts for neck, knit to end.

Purl to end of first set of 128 (136:144:152:160:  
170:176:192) sts for right sleeve front and  
body sts. Break yarn A.

Join yarn B, and set Chart and AT THE  
SAME TIME shape neck as follows:  
Beg first row with stitch 4 (1:4:1:2:1:1:3) of  
Chart and ending first row with stitch  
3 (8:3:8:1:2:8:2), work 2 rows straight over  
Chart to establish pattern. Keep the  
colourwork pattern correctly aligned thus  
throughout, as the fronts need to match



# Sleepless Night

Repeat these two rows, working 10 (8:6:6:5:5:5:5) sts further every time until 8 (8:12:6:11:19:14:12) sts haven't been worked.

**Next row (RS):** Knit all sts to left cuff.

Work 3 (5:7:9:11:15:17:21) rows in st st across all sts, ending with a WS row.

Work Chart once in full, beginning each row with stitch 6 (1:6:1:8:7:1:7) of Chart and ending with stitch 3 (8:3:8:1:2:8:2). Keep the colourwork pattern correctly aligned thus throughout, as the fronts need to match the back at the top shoulder.

Put all sts back on needles.

Turning garment inside out, starting at the right back sleeve cuff, with WS facing you, and the right sides touching, use the three-needle cast-off method to join the front and back sleeve together, removing mrk, cast off the back and front together until you come to the neck edge, cast off 48 (54:56:58:60:66:70:70) sts for back neck, bringing the front of the left body and sleeve and back of left body and sleeve together, work a three-needle cast-off to the end.

## SHAWL COLLAR

Using 3.5mm needles and yarn A, pick up and knit 24 sts up right neck, pick up and knit 48 (54:56:58:60:66:70:70) across back neck, pick up and knit 24 sts down left neck. 96 (102:104:106:108:114:118:118) sts.

Work back and forth over picked-up sts.

**Row 1 (WS):** (K1tbl, P1) to end.

**Row 2:** (K1tbl, P1) to end.

Rep these 2 rows until collar meas 8.25cm.

Cast off using a stretchy cast-off method.

Sew the sides of the shawl collar onto the neck edge, overlapping the left with the right.

## CUFFS

With RS facing, using 3.75mm needles and yarn A, pick up and knit 48 (54:56:58:60:66:68:68) sts around lower edge of cuff.

Pm and join to work in the round.

**Rib rnd:** (K1tbl, P1) to end.

Rep rib rnd until cuff meas 10cm.

Cast off using a stretchy cast-off method.

## TO MAKE UP

Weave in ends. Block gently to measurements, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band. ☼

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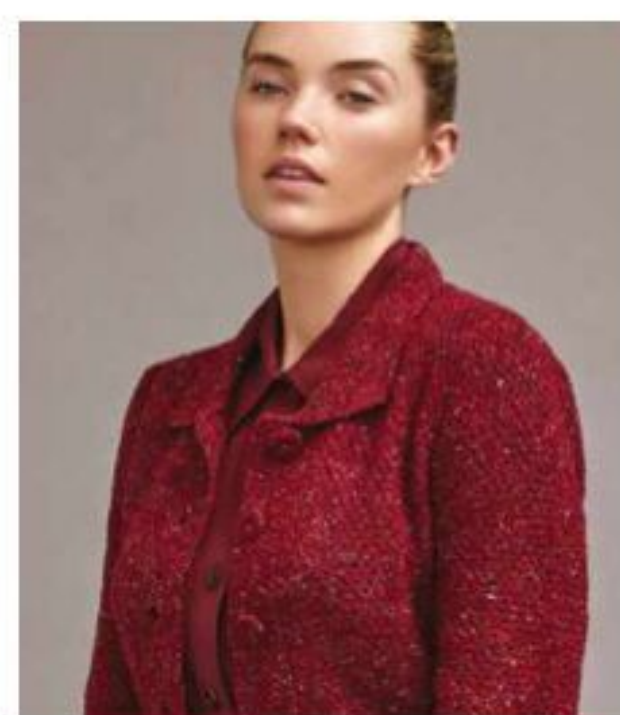
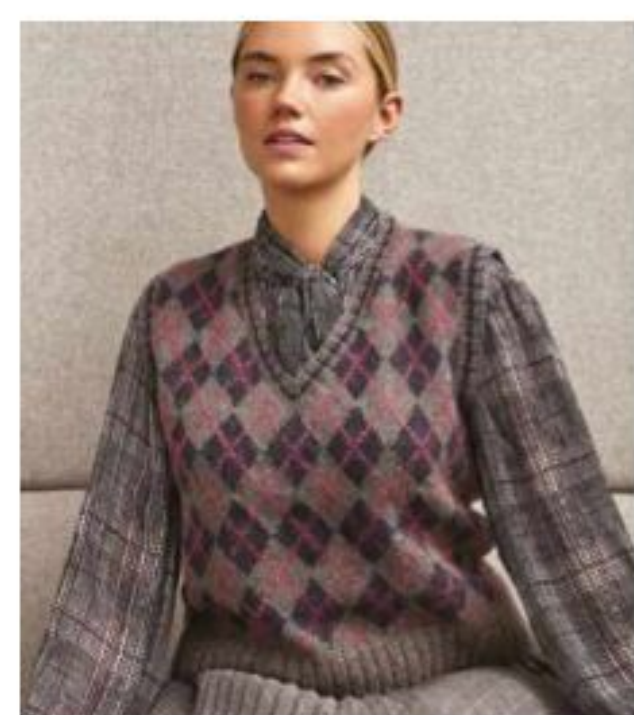
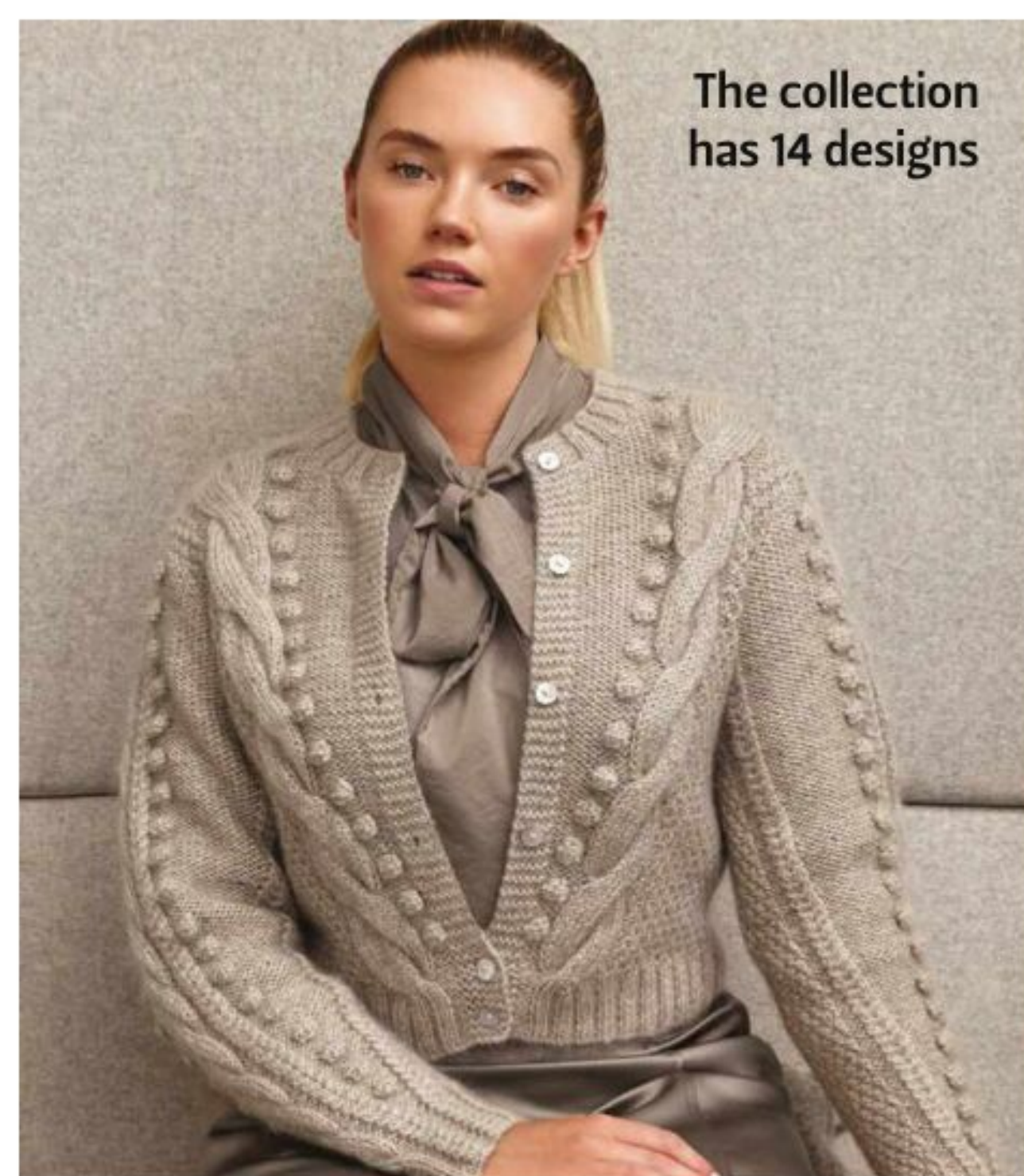
Designer Kim Hargreaves' latest capsule collection, *Fall No. 14*, offers wearable, comfortable essentials with sophisticated details. She has created 14 layering pieces for women, in sizes XS to 4XL.

Many of the projects pay homage to classic British wardrobe pieces, such as the 'Byron' argyle-patterned colourwork tank top, and the tailored, tweed-effect 'Heather' jacket. 'Taylor' brings a contemporary twist to Aran sweater traditions, with its cropped raglan silhouette and feminine panel shapes.

More modern designs include a striped cowl-neck jumper, a wrap cardigan knitted in Rowan's Kidsilk Haze, an oversized turtleneck sweater with deep side splits, and a mohair jumper with ombre-effect stripes. For winter warmth, there's a bouclé sweater, a hoody with pockets, and a long, swingy fringed cardigan in Rowan's Brushed Fleece yarn.

Kim has used elegant cables and bobbles on the cropped 'Royal' cardigan, while the neat 'Tweed' jacket features a smart moss stitch fabric and cabled details.

## Felted Tweed Collection

Lisa Richardson has curated this fabulous capsule collection of women's designs using Rowan's hugely popular Felted Tweed yarn. It contains six garment projects sized to fit busts of 28in-62in, and one lace scarf design.

Showcasing the gorgeous shade palette of Felted Tweed, Lisa has created three intricate colourwork designs, including 'Bessie', a drop-sleeve sweater with modern, graphic motifs, and 'Ethel', a V-neck cardigan with more classic Fair Isle patterning. 'Bertha',

a tank top with a deep V neckline, is covered with multi-coloured diamonds. Two contrasting shades are used for the 'Rose' colourblock cardigan with patch pockets.

'Maude' is a belted wrap cardigan with in a simple ladder stitch texture, while 'Pearl' is a rollneck sweater knitted using two colours of Felted Tweed held together to create a thicker fabric with a marled effect.

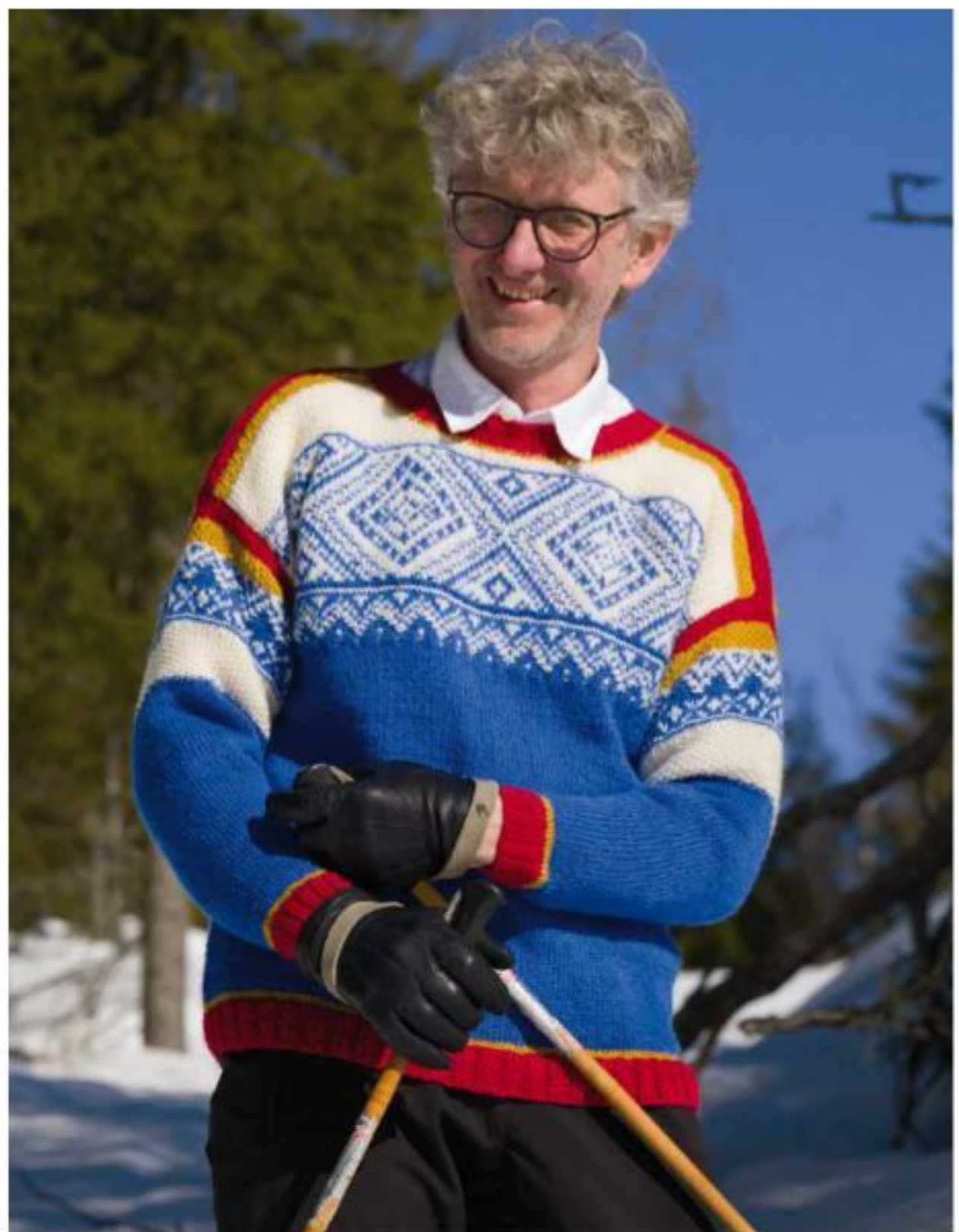

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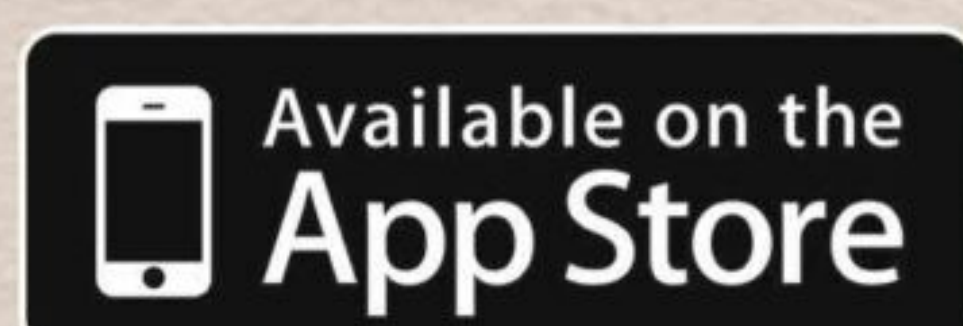

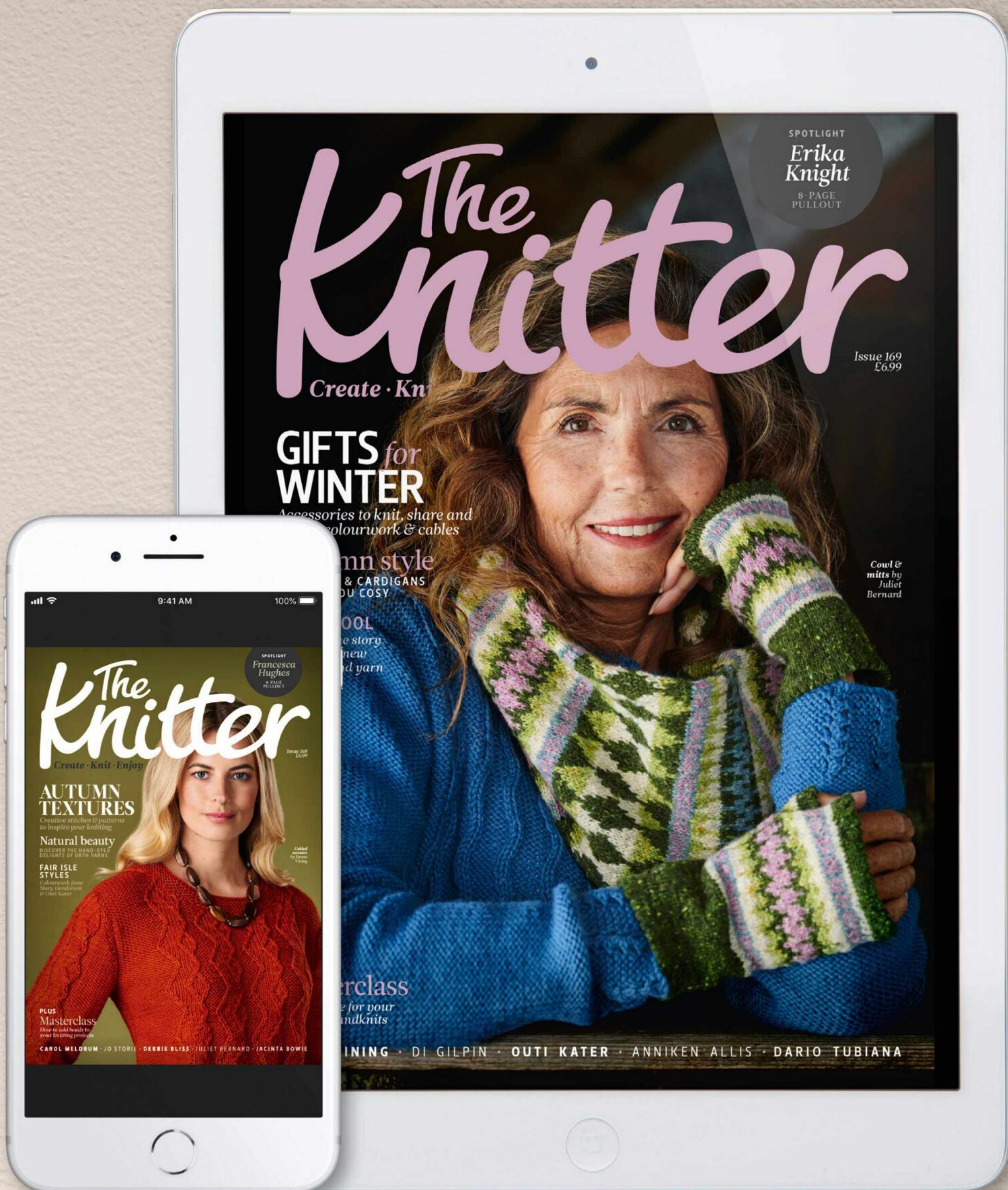

**TWO BRITISH** breed wools – Wensleydale and Bluefaced Leicester – are blended with alpaca to produce the wonderful Longcroft Longwools DK yarn. It knits up into a soft, draping and lustrous fabric, which suits Jo Allport's cabled cowl design perfectly.

## COWL

Using 3.5mm needles, cast on 162 sts.

**Next row (WS):** Purl.

**Next row (RS):** Knit.

**Next row:** Purl.

## BOTTOM RIBBING

**Rib row 1 (RS):** \*K1, P1; rep from \* to end.

**Rib row 2 (WS):** \*K1, P1; rep from \* to end.

Rep these 2 rows until ribbing meas 4cm, ending after a WS row.

## MAIN PATTERN

Change to 4mm needles.

Working 20-st rep 8 times around, work Rows 1–24 of Main Pattern from chart or written instructions as follows:

**Row 1 (RS):** K1, \*P6, K8, P6; rep from \* to last st, K1.

**Row 2 (WS):** P1, \*K6, P8, K6; rep from \* to last st, P1.

**Row 3:** K1, \*P4, T6B, T6F, P4; rep from \* to last st, K1.

**Row 4:** P1, \*(K4, P4) twice, K4; rep from \* to last st, P1.

**Row 5:** K1, \*(P4, K4) twice, P4; rep from \* to last st, K1.

**Row 6:** Rep Row 4.

**Row 7:** K1, \*P2, T6B, P4, T6F, P2; rep from \* to last st, K1.

**Row 8:** P1, \*K2, P4, K8, P4, K2; rep from \* to

last st, P1.

**Row 9:** K1, \*P2, K4, P8, K4, P2; rep from \* to last st, K1.

**Row 10:** Rep Row 8.

**Row 11:** K1, \*T6B, P8, T6F; rep from \* to last st, K1.

**Row 12:** P1, \*P4, K12, P4; rep from \* to last st, P1.

**Row 13:** K1, \*K4, P12, K4; rep from \* to last st, K1.

**Row 14:** P1, \*P4, K12, P4; rep from \* to last st, P1.

**Row 15:** K1, \*T6F, P8, T6B; rep from \* to last st, K1.

**Rows 16–17:** Rep Rows 8–9.

**Row 18:** Rep Row 8.

**Row 19:** K1, \*P2, T6F, P4, T6B, P2; rep from \* to last st, K1.

**Rows 20–21:** Rep Rows 4–5.

**Row 22:** Rep Row 4.

**Row 23:** K1, \*P4, T6F, T6B, P4; rep from \* to last st, K1.

**Row 24:** Rep Row 2.

Rep Rows 1–24 once more.

## TOP RIBBING

Change to 3.5mm needles.

Work in rib patt as for Bottom Ribbing until ribbing meas 4cm, ending after a WS row.

**Next row (RS):** Knit.

**Next row (WS):** Purl.

**Next row:** Knit.

Cast off.

## TO MAKE UP

Sew back seam. Weave in ends and block to measurements, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band. ➤



## SIZE

Circumference: 57cm (22½in)

Depth: 23cm (9in)

## YARN

**Longcroft Longwools** DK (DK weight; 45% Wensleydale wool, 30% Bluefaced Leicester wool, 25% alpaca; 75m/82yds per 50g skeins)  
Jonquil; 3 x 50g skeins

Helen has used a miniskein in a complementary shade for the cuffs, heels and toes, so this is a great opportunity to use up some leftover sock yarn from your stash.

## CHART PATTERN

(written instructions)

**Rounds 1-4:** Knit.

**Round 5:** \*K2, K2tog, K2, yo; rep from \* to end of round.

**Round 6:** Knit.

**Round 7:** \*K1, K2tog, K2, yo, K1; rep from \* to end of round.

**Round 8:** Knit.

**Round 9:** \*K2tog, K2, yo, K2; rep from \* to end of round.

## SOCKS

### CUFF

Using 2.5mm needles and yarn B, cast on 54 (60:66) sts.

Pm and join to work in the round, taking care not to twist sts.

**Rib round:** \*K1tbl, P1; rep from \* to end of round.

Work 9 further rounds in rib.

Change to yarn A.

### LEG

Using yarn A, repeating sts 9 (10:11) times

Cut yarn A.

### HEEL FLAP

Turn work to WS. The heel flap is worked back and forth over the last 28 (30:34) sts that have just been worked. Leave rem sts on hold for instep.

Join yarn B.

**Row 1 (WS):** Sl1, P27 (29:33), turn.

28 (30:34) heel sts.

**Row 2 (RS):** \*Sl1, K1; rep from \* to end, turn.

Rep these 2 rows a further 13 (14:16) times.

### HEEL TURN

**Row 1 (WS):** Sl1, P15 (16:18), P2tog, P1, turn.

**Row 2 (RS):** Sl1, K5, SSK, K1, turn.

**Row 3:** Sl1, purl to 1 st before gap, P2tog, P1, turn.

## NEEDLES & ACCESSORIES

1 set 2.5mm (UK 12-13/US 1-2) double-pointed needles (DPNs) or 2.5mm circular needles, 60cm long, for Magic Loop method  
Stitch markers

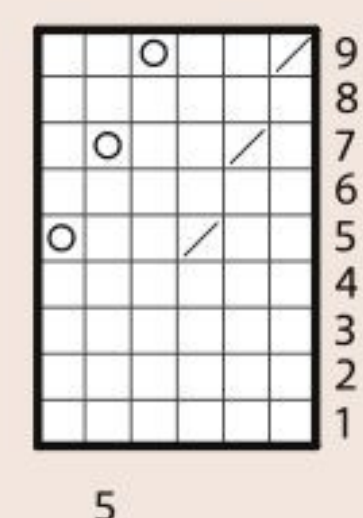

### All sizes

15 (18:19) heel sts.

Cut yarn B.

### GUSSET

Note: Read ahead; shaping and pattern are worked AT THE SAME TIME.



The toes, cuffs and heels are knitted in a different shade



Using yarn A, pick up and knit 14 (15:17) sts down side of heel flap, pm, starting with Round 3 work in patt as set across 27 (30:33) instep sts, pm, pick up and knit 14 (15:17) stitches up the side of the heel flap, then K15 (18:19) heel sts and pm for beg of round. 70 (78:86) sts.

## Sizes S and L only

Note that Main Pattern on the instep is worked as set previously on the leg, so the foll rounds are worked between the instep mrks as:

**Round 5:** K2, \*K2, K2tog, K2, yo; rep from \* to 1 st before mrk, K1.

**Round 7:** K2, \*K1, K2tog, K2, yo, K1; rep from \* to 1 st before mrk, K1.

**Round 9:** K2, \*K2tog, K2, yo, K2; rep from \* to 1 st before mrk, K1.

AT THE SAME TIME as shaping the gusset.

## Size M only

Cont to follow Main patt for instep between mrks as set on the leg, which is the same as previously instructed AT THE SAME TIME as shaping the gusset.

## All sizes

**Round 1:** K to 3 sts before mrk, K2tog, K1, slm, work in patt across instep to next mrk, slm, K1, SSK, knit to end of round. 2 sts dec'd.

**Round 2:** K to mrk, slm, work in patt across instep to next mrk, slm, knit to end of round.

Rep Rounds 1-2 until 54 (60:66) sts remain.

Cont as set until foot meas 4 (4½:5) cm less than desired length, ending after a Round 1, 2, 3 or 4 of Main Patt. If needed, work a few plain rounds of st st.

Cut yarn A.

## TOE

Join yarn B.

**Round 1:** (Knit to 3 sts before mrk, K2tog, K1, slm, K1, SSK) twice, knit to end of round. 4 sts dec'd.

**Round 2:** Knit.

Rep these 2 rounds until 22 (24:26) sts remain.

Cut yarn, leaving a long tail. Divide rem sts between two needles and graft sts together using Kitchener stitch.

## FINISHING

Weave in ends. Block gently to measurements, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band. ☹

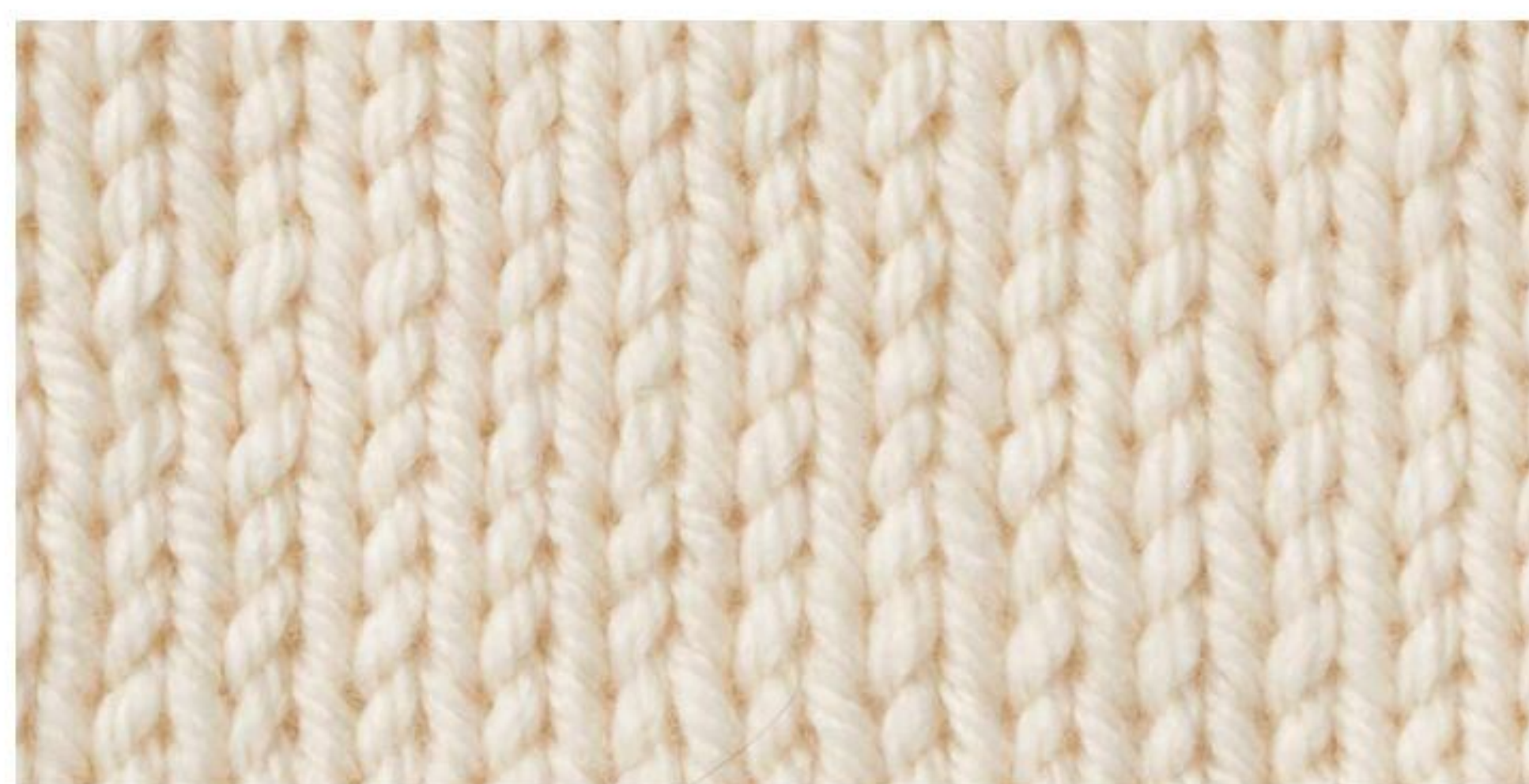

# Great reads

This book is filled with accessories and homewares inspired by the knitting traditions of Scotland, Ireland and Scandinavia

## KNITS FROM NORTHERN LANDS

by Jenny Fennell

**JENNY FENNELL** is a designer based in Nova Scotia, Canada, and her work is inspired by the knitting traditions of countries including the Scottish Isles, Ireland and Scandinavia. For this book, she has designed 20 garment, accessory and homeware projects which showcase many beautiful styles and stitches from across the Northern Hemisphere.

The collection includes a number of simple projects which will be ideal for novice knitters or as quick-knit gifts. These include a ribbed scarf, hat and mitts in a super-chunky yarn, and the little 'Lace of Unst' bookmark, which is a sweet introduction to Shetland lace knitting.

For the home, there is a beautiful blanket with a lace pattern of birch leaves, and a large, intricately cabled blanket inspired by Aran sweaters. 'Skies of Sweden' is a colourwork cushion in heathered pink and cream, whose patterning evokes a pine forest in winter. The 'Dream in Danish Throw Cushion' features knit-and-purl textures influenced by Danish traditions.

Our favourite projects in the book are the colourwork accessories, such as the pretty Fair Isle wristwarmers called 'A Slow Day in Shetland', and the chic twisted headband which has blue and white motifs depicting Finland's national flower, the lily of the valley.

There's a cosy honeycomb cable shawl, a neat hat and scarf with delicate floral colourwork inspired by Scandinavian textiles, and a pair of classic Nordic mittens featuring the Selbu rose motif. The 'White Heather Shawl' combines a pretty lace and bobble stitch pattern with a chunky yarn.

Knitters can try working with Icelandic lopi wool with the 'Fire and Ice' cowl and mittens, which have a simple, geometric colourwork pattern to depict the volcanic landscapes of Iceland. There is one garment project in the book: a chunky Aran-style cabled sweater, which has been designed with minimal shaping and basic seaming to make it a great choice for your first Aran jumper project. It's sized to fit chests of approximately 36in to 62in.

Jenny provides illustrated walkthroughs for many of the techniques used in the patterns, such as mattress stitch, twist seaming, and cabling techniques. 🧶

## Switch Cardigan

**THIS CLEVER** design by Soraya García is a customisable garment that consists of three sections: two right parts, and one left part. Each of the parts consists of a half front, a sleeve, and a half back. Each of the parts is worked separately and flat, and fastened with buttons. The three parts are interchangeable, giving you two different garments. Soraya has used Socks Yeah! 4ply-weight yarn from CoopKnits, in two zingy shades.

### PATTERN NOTES

The construction of each of the parts is symmetrical for the right and left sides of the garment. Both sides are worked starting at the top of the corresponding shoulder and generating the front and back V-neckline by increasing, while working the raglan shaping.

Each piece is worked flat and separately in stocking stitch. The hem and cuffs are worked in 1x1 rib.

Begin with Piece A (Right Front, Sleeve and Back). Then knit Piece B (Left Front, Sleeve and Back) and Piece C (Left Front, Sleeve and Back).

We recommend reading the full pattern before you start knitting, to familiarise yourself with the construction.

### CARDIGAN

#### NECK FLAP

Using 3.25mm needles and yarn A, and the long-tail method, cast on 10 sts.

Pm and turn the work 90 degrees clockwise. Using the working yarn, pick up and knit 3 sts along one side of the short (sleeve) edge, pm, pick up and knit 3 sts, pm, pick up and knit 3 sts, pm, turn the work 90 degrees again. Then pick up and knit 10 sts from the cast-on edge. Pick up last st from corner and Sl 1 wyif. Turn. 30 sts.

#### SHAPE RAGLAN

**Pieces A (Right Front, Sleeve and Back) and B (Left Front, Sleeve and Back) only**

Following raglan increases as given below, change to yarn B after 20 rows.

**Piece C (Left Front, Sleeve and Back) only**

Following raglan increases as given below, change to yarn B after 16 rows and change to yarn A after another 4 rows.

**Row 1 (WS):** K1tbl, \*P1, K1; rep from \* another 4 times, slm, purl to last mrk, slm, \*K1, P1; rep from \* another 3 times, K1, Sl 1 wyif.

**Row 2 (RS inc):** K1tbl, \*P1, K1; rep from \* another 3 times, P1, \*slm, K1, M1L, knit to 1 st before mrk, M1R, K1; rep from \* twice more, slm, \*P1, K1; rep from \* another 4 times, Sl 1 wyif.

Rep rows 1 and 2 another 23 (26:29:32:35:38:41:44:48:49) more times, then repeat

row 1 once more.

174 (192:210:228:246:264:282:300:324:330) sts. Each section between mrks has 51 (57:63:69:75:81:87:93:101:103) sts.

#### SEPARATE SLEEVES AND BODY

Work Pieces A, B and C as foll:

**Row 1 (RS):** K1tbl, \*P1, K1; rep from \* another 3 times, P1, slm, knit to mrk, remove mrk, slip the next 51 (57:63:69:75:81:87:93:101:103) sleeve sts onto a holder, cast on 14 (14:16:16:18:18:18:24:24:30) sts for the underarm, remove mrk, knit to mrk, slm, \*P1, K1; rep from \* another 4 times, Sl 1 wyif.

**Row 2 (WS):** K1tbl, \*P1, K1; rep from \* another 4 times, slm, purl to last mrk, slm,



The raglan design is knitted from the top down

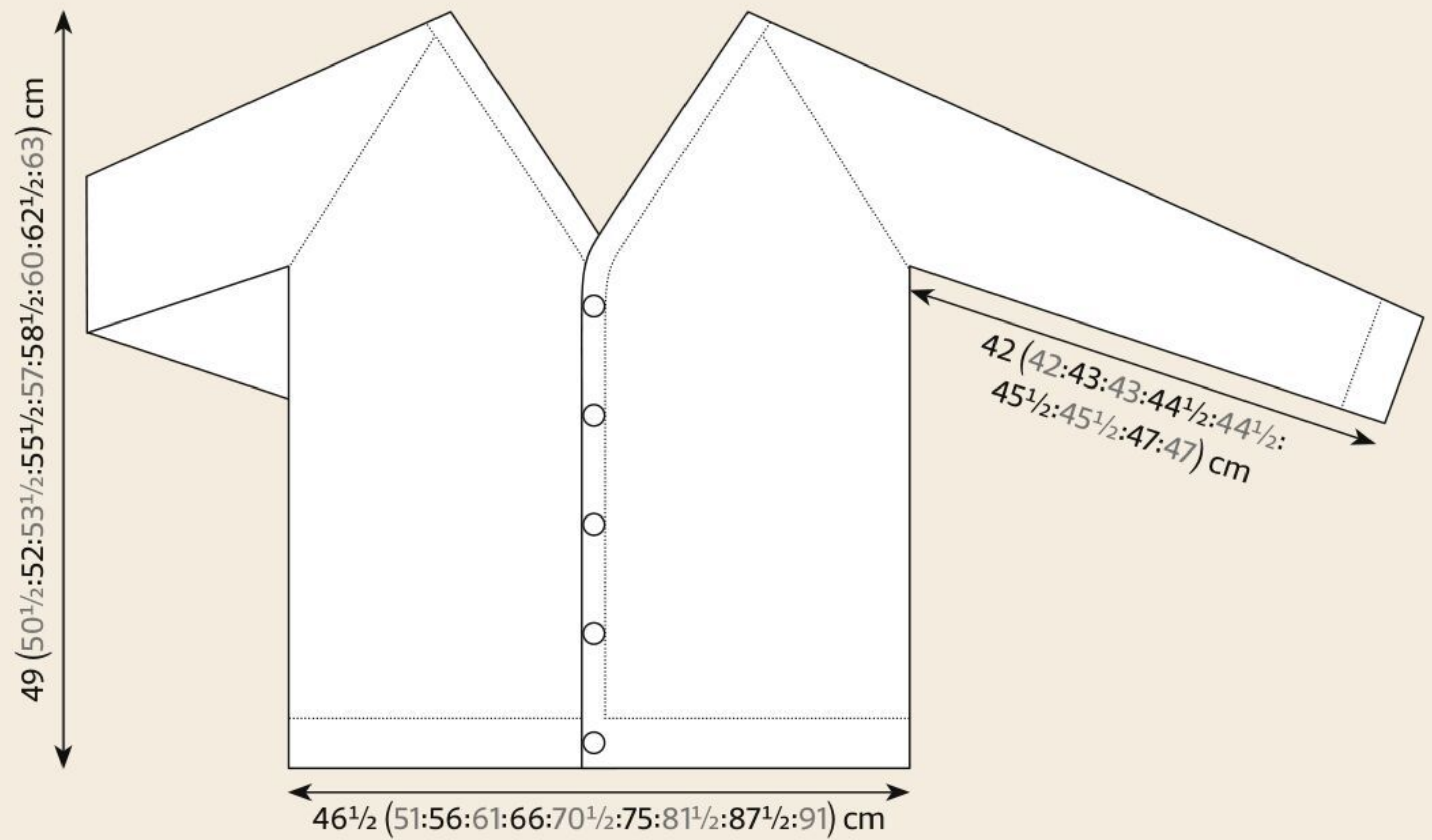

**Row 10 (WS):** K1tbl, P1, (K1, P1) twice, K1 into double yo from last row, (K1, P1) twice, K1, slm, purl to last mrk, slm, K1, (P1, K1) twice, K1 into double yo from last row, (P1, K1) twice, Sl1 wyif.

**Row 11 (RS):** K1tbl, P1, K1, P1, K2tog, (P1, K1) twice, P1, slm, knit to mrk, slm, (P1, K1) twice, P1, K2tog, (P1, K1) twice, Sl1 wyif.

**Row 12 (WS):** K1tbl, \*P1, K1; rep from \* another 4 times, slm, purl to mrk, slm, \*K1, P1; rep from \* another 3 times, K1, Sl1 wyif.

Rep rows 1 and 2 another 4 times.

Rep last 20 rows until you have placed a total of 5 buttonholes, and then continue straight until body meas approx. 30cm from underarm or 5cm less than desired length.

## HEM

### Piece A (Right Front, Sleeve and Back) only

Work 20 rows in 1x1 rib.

Cast off all stitches loosely in rib.

### Pieces B and C (Left Front, Sleeve and Back) only

Work 8 rows in 1x1 rib.

Work Buttonhole rows 9–12, working 1x1 rib between mrks.

Work 8 rows in 1x1 rib.

Cast off all stitches loosely in rib.

## SLEEVES

Note: Sleeves are worked alike except where stated in pattern.

Continue changing colours as established for each piece.

Slip held sleeve sts back onto working needles.

**Set-up round:** Rejoin yarn at centre of underarm, pick up and knit 7 (7:8:8:9:9:9:12:12:15) sts, K51 (57:63:69:75:81:87:93:101:103) sleeve sts, pick up and knit 7 (7:8:8:9:9:9:12:12:15) sts, pm for beg of round.

65 (71:79:85:93:99:105:117:125:133) sts. If desired you can pick up 1 extra st each side of the underarm, and knit them together with underarm sts to avoid gaps when working the set-up.

Work in st st in the round, changing colours as established in body, decreasing for sleeve shaping as foll:

**Dec round:** K1, K2tog, knit to 3 sts before mrk, SSK, K1. 2 sts dec'd.

Work 19 (19:12:10:8:8:7:6:5:5) rounds straight in st st.

Rep dec round. 2 sts dec'd.

Cont decreasing every 20 (20:13:11:9:9:8:7:6:6) rounds as set, another 5 (5:9:11:15:15:17:20:24:24) times. 51 (57:57:61:63:65:67:67:73:81) sts.

Cont straight in st st until sleeve meas 37 (37:38:38:39½:39½:40½:40½:42:42) cm, or 5cm less than desired total length, decreasing 0 (0:0:0:0:0:1:1:1:0) st or increasing 0 (0:0:1:1:1:0:0:0:0) st at end of last round.

51 (57:57:60:60:66:66:72:72:81) sts.

## CUFFS

### Pieces A and B only

Change to yarn B.

**Cuff set-up round 1:** Knit to mrk.

### All pieces

**Cuff set-up round 2:** \*K2tog, K1; rep from \* to end.

34 (38:38:40:40:44:44:48:48:54) sts.

Work 19 rounds in 1x1 rib.

Cast off loosely in rib.

## FINISHING

Weave in all ends.

Block garment gently to measurements, following any yarn care instructions on the yarn label.

Sew on buttons opposite buttonholes. ☹

# Colours of sea, sky & hedgerow

Taking inspiration from the landscapes of the Pembrokeshire coastline, Karen Morgan of FelinFach produces gorgeous, natural hand-dyed yarns



**FELINFACH IS** a natural textiles company based at a 200-year-old former flour mill in the Preseli Mountains area of Pembrokeshire. Owner and founder Karen Morgan

offers a selection of Welsh tapestry blankets and Welsh tartan scarves, yarn bowls, handmade candles and soap, and also a range of hand-dyed yarns which Karen produces herself using natural dyes.

Having recently renovated and upgraded the FelinFach Dye Studio facilities, Karen is looking forward to running workshops on hand dyeing with natural dyes this autumn. We caught up with Karen to find out more about the background to

FelinFach, the hand-dyed yarns she produces, and her colour inspirations.

**When did you first try your hand at dyeing yarn?**

"I started my yarn and fabric journey a long time ago, and as my life changed with the arrival of my children, and my career in the finance sector taking more of my time, it was set aside but revisited many times. We relocated from Cardiff to our current home in Pembrokeshire some ten years ago, and I was in the lucky position of being able to take up my journey once more. I could spend time designing Welsh blankets and hand-dyeing yarn, and delving into the world of natural dyes – something I had wanted to do for some time."

**Can you remember the first colourway you ever created?**

"I bought extracts and mordants online to see how hard natural dyeing would be! The first colours I created were purple, rose pink, yellow and red using logwood, lac, goldenrod and madder. But me being me, I played around with some modifiers and mordants to change the colours – and I was hooked! I still have my first samples and the records for this first attempt."

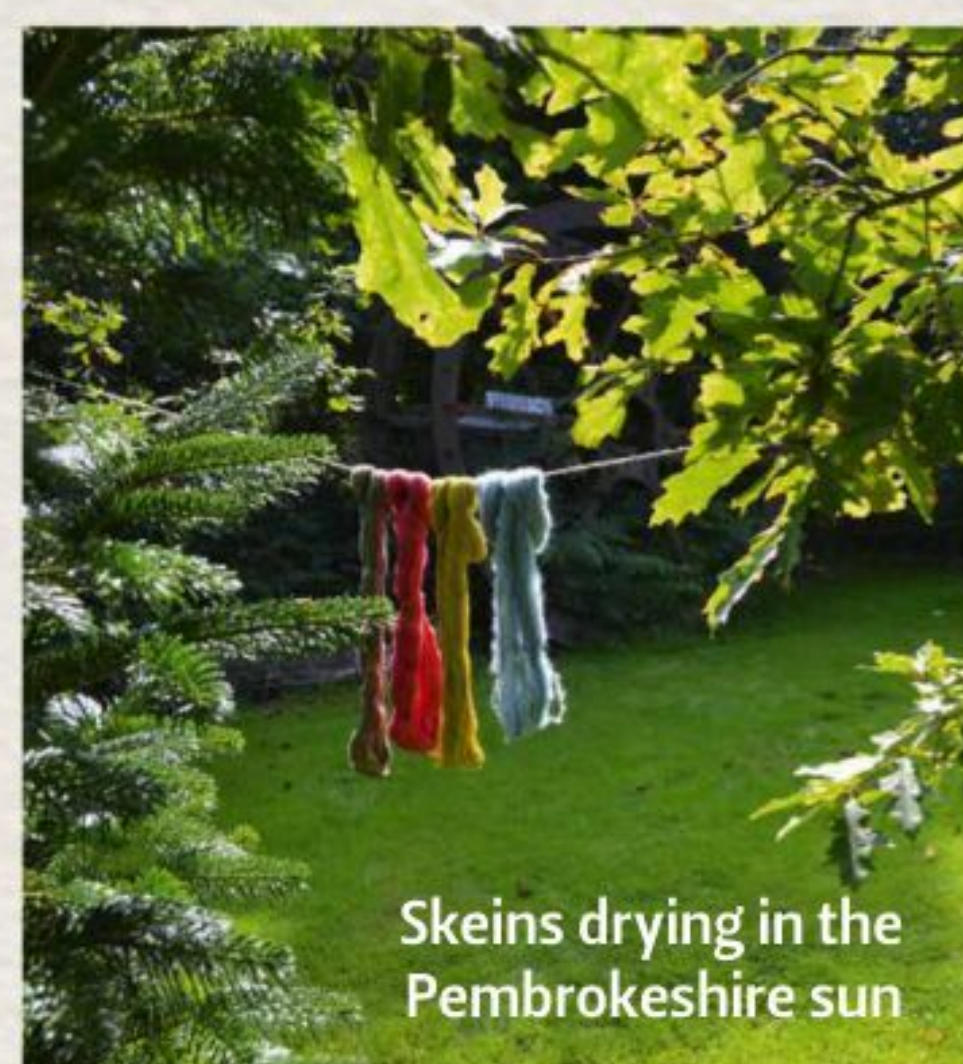
**Where do you source your yarns from?**

"The source of our yarn is important. I like to work with suppliers who have the same values as FelinFach and source their fibre from farms with the best farming practices. All our yarn is sourced from the

UK and some from smallholdings in West Wales. The Welsh yarns are spun locally; fleece to yarn in a Welsh weaving mill. The UK yarns are sourced from a spinning mill in England. I also source the more exotic fibres, like yak, from a UK supplier. I could source yarns at a lower cost from overseas suppliers, but I do not want to compromise on our values."

## What dyeing processes do you use?

"It depends on the yarn that I want to produce and the technique I would like to use. It could be a solid colour, variegated colour or hand-painted. I would be extracting the dye liquid from the raw material such as roots, bark or insect. I also use ethically sourced extracts. Some of the processes are dyeing in one pot on a heat source, or it could be an indigo vat or even both, or hand-painted. These are the main processes, but I do like to experiment with new or different techniques."

## Do you have a favourite colourway from your current range?

"Our Hydref (meaning 'autumn' in Welsh) Yak Sock 4ply is my favourite out of the current range. Autumn is my favourite season, and the colours can be spectacular, so this colourway is berries, turning leaves, heather and autumn sky. These were the colours I was thinking of, and I am happy with the way they turned out."

## As well as your own hand-dyed yarns, what other products does FelinFach sell?

"I hand dye scarves in silk, cotton and wool, and I stock a range of books and accessories including hand-thrown yarn bowls. My original interest was and still is weaving. I enjoy designing Welsh blankets and throws, and having the iconic Welsh tapestry design woven in new contemporary colourways. These are woven on Dobcross looms in the few remaining Welsh mills."

## What would you say are the particular highlights and challenges involved in running an artisan yarn business?

"It's entralling to look at the colours from that day's dye pots and think 'wow, I produced that', and knowing that all the colours come from nature. It's also amazing and humbling to read customers' reviews (especially when they are good ones!)."

"As it's only me hand-dyeing yarn, there are never enough hours in the day to do as much as I would like. The upgrading of my FelinFach Dye Studio will allow me to have more pots on at the same time, and I'll have more space for the whole process."

## Where do you find colour inspiration?

"The Pembrokeshire coastline is the only coastal National Park in the UK and is truly spectacular and inspirational. The colours of the sea and landscape are so varied."

Barafundle is my favourite beach, and a walk there one autumn inspired my Barafundle hand-dyed scarf. The Strumble (Pen Caer) area and lighthouse, another favourite thinking place of mine, inspired the Hydref yarn collection."

## What has been your proudest achievement?

"I had dreamed of turning my hobby of hand-dyeing into a viable business for a long, long time, and making that a reality is something I am proud of. Also, the first time I took my yarn to a major UK show in London, I was staggered by the generous praise from the customers, many of whom said that surely the yarn couldn't have been dyed using natural dyes."

## What's the best piece of advice you've been given by another dyer or weaver?

"Two things: first, always keep a journal of what you have done to record and monitor your progress. And second, don't be afraid to experiment - if isn't what you expected, don't see it as a failure, but 'just a learning experience'!"

## Are you a knitter or crocheter yourself?

"I am a knitter but not a fast knitter and so I have lots of work in progress! Weaving is faster, so if I want something knitted in my yarn, I ask my sister." ☺

# Malin

This Nordic-inspired intarsia scarf showcases  
a new Norwegian wool yarn



**USING ROWAN'S** brand-new Norwegian Wool, Scandinavian designers Arne & Carlos have created a collection of patterns reflecting their Nordic heritage. Among them is 'Malin', a cosy scarf with an intarsia pattern of stylised flowers and leaves, and moss stitch edgings.

## SCARF

Using 3.75mm needles and yarn B, cast on 100 sts.

**Row 1 (RS):** \*K1, P1; rep from \* to end.

**Row 2:** \*P1, K1; rep from \* to end.

These 2 rows form moss st.

Rep these 2 rows twice more.

**Next row (RS):** (K1, P1) twice, K4, M1, (K6, M1) 14 times, K to last 4 sts, (K1, P1) twice. 115 sts.

**Next row:** (P1, K1) twice, P to last 4 sts, (P1, K1) twice.

**Next row:** (K1, P1) twice, K to last 4 sts, (K1, P1) twice.

**Next row:** (P1, K1) twice, P to last 4 sts, (P1, K1) twice.

Rep last 2 rows 3 more times.

## PLACE CHART

NOTE: All yarn B sts are worked in st st and all other sts are worked in reverse st st on the chart (shown overleaf).

**Next row (RS):** (K1, P1) twice, work next 107 sts as row 1 of chart, (K1, P1) twice.

**Next row:** (P1, K1) twice, work next 107 sts as row 2 of chart, (P1, K1) twice.

These 2 rows set the sts – centre 107 sts in patt from chart, with 4 sts at each edge still in moss st and yarn B.

Cont as set until chart row 120 has been completed, then work rows 121 to 268 twice and then work chart rows 269 to 290 once.

Cut all yarns except yarn B.

**Next row (RS):** (K1, P1) twice, K to last 4 sts, (K1, P1) twice.

**Next row:** (P1, K1) twice, P to last 4 sts, (P1, K1) twice.

Rep last 2 rows 4 more times, then the first of these 2 rows once.

**Next row (WS):** (P1, K1) twice, P4, P2tog, (P5, P2tog) 14 times, P to last 4 sts, (P1, K1) twice. 100 sts.

Work 6 rows in moss st as given for beg of scarf.

Cast off.

## MAKING UP

Weave in ends and block gently to measurements, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band. ☼

53cm (20¾ in) wide and 168cm (66¼ in) long

**Rowan** Norwegian Wool (DK weight; 100% wool; 125m/137yds per 50g ball)

**A** Cloud Dancer (014); 1 x 50g ball

**D** Golden Nugget (012); 1 x 50g ball

**E** Ribbon Red (018); 1 x 50g ball

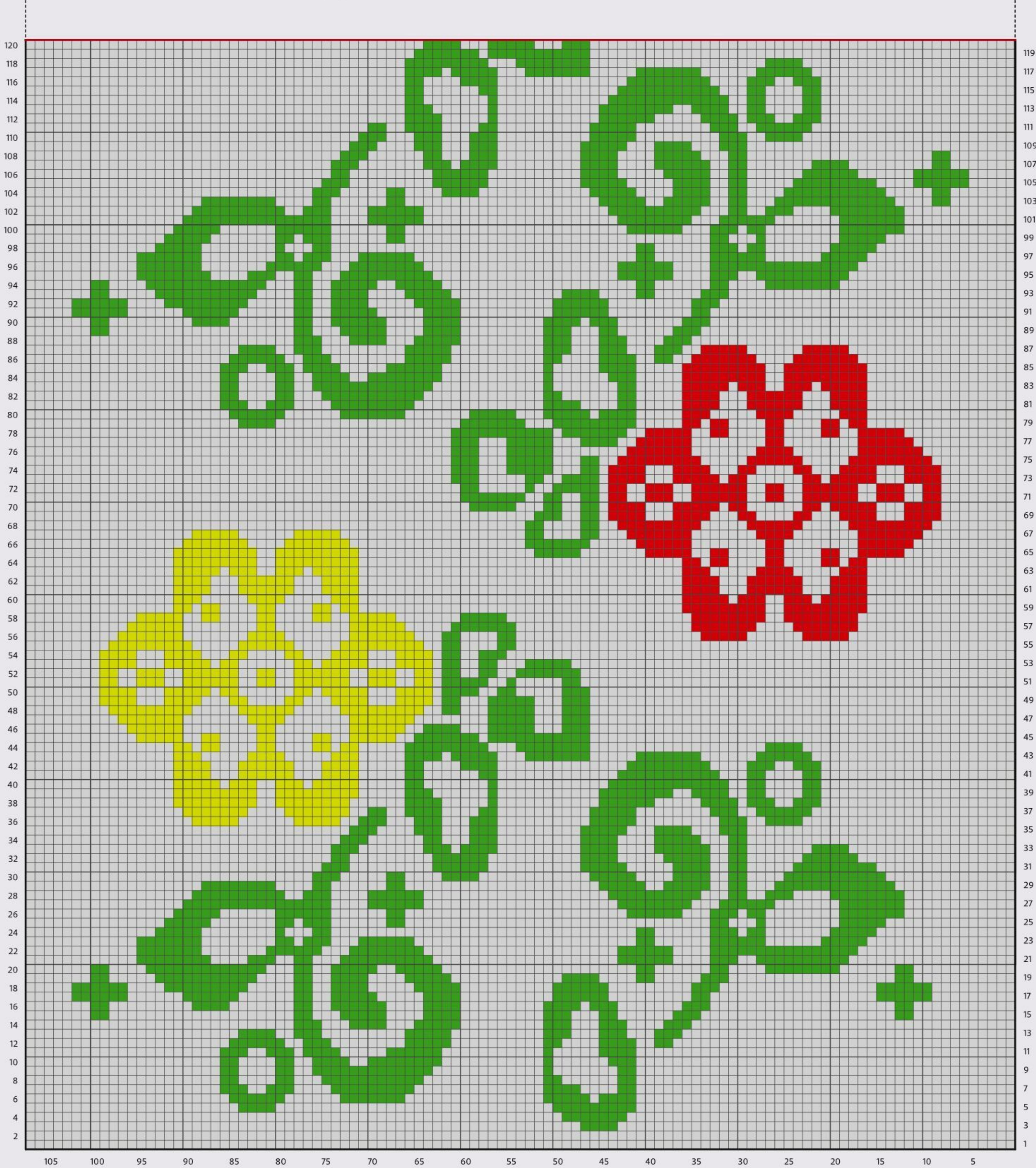

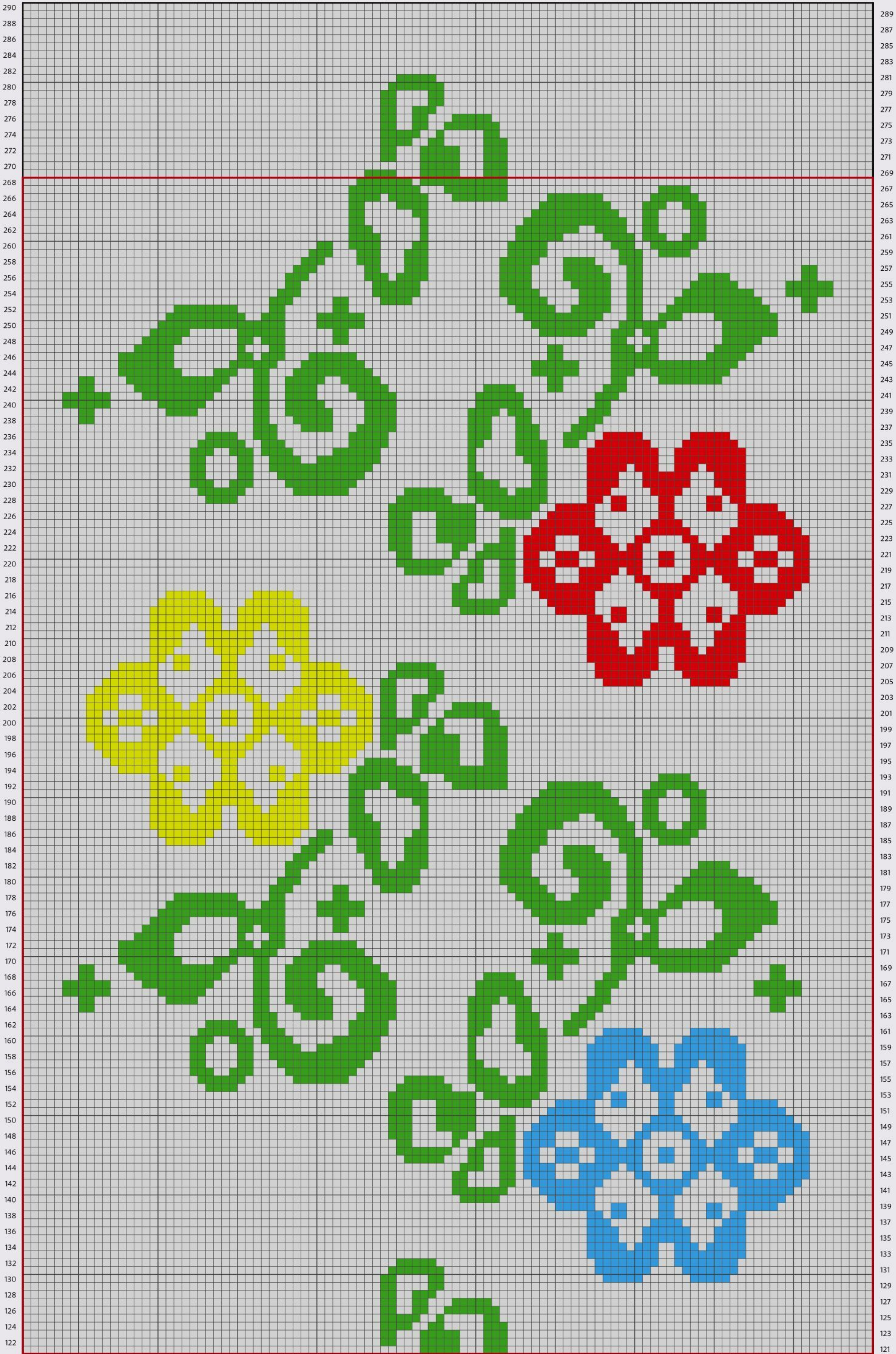

## Seraph

**DESIGNER NICOLA** Diggins takes inspiration from the Arts & Crafts movement, and this sweater was influenced by the rich colours used inside Watts Chapel in Surrey. Nicola's intricate colourwork patterning is knitted in eight shades of Jamieson & Smith's 2ply Jumper Weight wool. The sweater has contrast-colour cast-ons, and garter stitch edgings.

### PATTERN NOTES

Use the long-tail method for casting on.

#### THREE-NEEDLE CAST-OFF FOR SHOULDER SEAMS

Place two matching shoulder seams back on the 3.25mm needles with the RS together and the needle points facing the same way. Hold the needles parallel, and with a third needle knit together one stitch from the front and one stitch from the back needle. Repeat for the next stitch on both needles. Pass the first stitch worked over the second to cast it off in the normal way. Repeat until all the stitches are cast off.

#### CHARTS

All charts are worked in stocking stitch. Read all charts from right to left when knitting in the round or on RS rows. Read from left to right on WS rows.

### SPECIAL STITCHES

#### GARTER STITCH

(worked in the round)

**Round 1:** Knit.

**Round 2:** Purl.

Repeat these 2 rnds for pattern.

Work even in patt for 39 (39:39:39:43) rows.

### SHAPE RIGHT BACK NECK

**Next row (RS):** Patt 27 (29:30:32:34) sts, turn, leaving rem 78 (84:91:97:103) sts on a holder.

Cont in patt, casting off 3 sts at beg of next two WS rows.  
 Break yarn and place rem 21 (23:24:26:28) sts on a holder.

### SHAPE LEFT BACK NECK

With RS facing, return 78 (84:91:97:103) held sts to 3.25mm needles. Join yarn A and cast off 51 (55:61:65:69) sts, patt to end.

Cast off 3 sts at beg of next 2 RS rows.  
 Break yarn and place rem 21 (23:24:26:28) sts on holder.

## SLEEVES

Using 2.25mm needles and yarn C, cast on 61 (61:65:67:71) sts.

**Round 1:** Starting with stitch 6 (6:4:3:1), work Round 1 of Chart C to last st, ending after stitch 1 (1:3:4:6), P1.

This round sets the patt of Chart C, with last st of each round worked as a P1 in background colour of chart.  
 Work even in patt for 9 rnds.

### SHAPE SLEEVE

Note: Read ahead; sleeve shaping is worked AT THE SAME TIME as pattern changes.

Beg on Round 11 of Chart C, inc 1 st at each end of every round on next round, then every foll 8th (6th:5th:4th:4th) round another 14 (10:14:18:22) times, then every foll 0 (8th:6th:7th:5th) round 0 (6:5:4:4) times, working inc sts into chart patt.

AT THE SAME TIME, once Round 68 of Chart C has been completed, beg Chart D as foll:

**Round 1:** Starting with stitch 28 (26:22:18:16), work Round 1 of Chart D to last st, ending after stitch 7 (9:13:17:19), P1 in background colour of chart.

Cont in Chart D as set, working inc sts into patt, until Round 57 of Chart D has been completed and all increases have been worked.  
 91 (95:105:113:125) sts.

### BEGIN CHART E

**Round 1:** Starting with stitch 5 (3:30:26:20), work Round 1 of Chart E to last stitch, ending after stitch 30 (32:5:9:15), P1 in background colour of chart. ►



# Seraph

Work even in patt as set until Round 13 of Chart has been completed.

**Round 14:** Patt to last 2 sts, K2tog.  
90 (94:104:112:124) sts.

## SHAPE SLEEVE CAP

**Round 15:** Cast off 4 (6:6:6:8) sts, patt to end. Turn and cont to work back and forth.  
86 (88:98:106:116) sts.

**Row 16 (WS):** Cast off 4 (6:6:6:8) sts, patt to end.  
82 (82:92:100:108) sts.

Cont in patt, cast off 3 sts at beg of next 2 (2:2:2:4) rows, then 2 sts at beg of next 6 (2:2:2:0) rows.  
64 (72:82:90:96) sts.

Dec 1 st at each end of next 0 (0:2:4:4) rows, then each end every foll alt row 12 (16:18:20:20) times.  
40 (40:42:42:48) sts.

Work 1 WS row even in patt.

Cast off 2 sts at beg of next 2 rows, then 3 sts at beg of next 4 rows.

Cast off rem 24 (24:26:26:32) sts.

## MAKING UP

Join shoulder seams using a three-needle cast-off.

## NECKBAND

Using 2.5mm circular needles and yarn B, starting at right back shoulder, pick up and knit 6 sts down right back neck, 51 (55:61:65:69) across back neck cast-off, 6 sts up left back neck, pick up and knit 23 (23:24:25:27) sts down left front neck, 33 (35:37:39:41) sts across centre front cast-off, and 23 (23:24:25:27) sts up right front neck. Join to work in the round.  
142 (148:158:166:176) sts.

Work 8 rounds in garter st.

Cut yarn B. Join yarn C and cast off knitwise.

## FINISHING

Weave in ends.

Ease sleeve into armhole and sew in using mattress stitch.

Block garment gently to measurements, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band. ☺

# BEAKER BUTTON

Jen Best's inspirational craft store in Hampshire is filled with her beautiful hand-dyed yarns and her kits for making traditional Dorset buttons, as Penny Batchelor discovers



**JEN BEST** is a leading expert in the art of making traditional Dorset buttons, which are made by weaving yarn in intricate patterns around a metal ring. Her enthusiasm for

this tradition has been shared with many people through her workshops, online tutorials and books. Jen has a passion for many other crafts, too, including knitting, hand-dyeing, weaving and felting, and this love of handicrafts led her to set up her own shop, Beaker Button.

Based in Weyhill, Hampshire, the Beaker Button shop is filled with Dorset button kits, tools for knitting and spinning, felting essentials, books and patterns, fabric and haberdashery. Jen stocks hand-knitting yarns from around the world, including Manos del Uruguay, Malabrigo, Third Vault Yarns, Jamieson & Smith, Fyberspates, West Yorkshire Spinners, Urth Yarns, Regia and Opal.

She also sells her own hand-dyed Beaker Button yarn range, and choices include a Bluefaced Leicester aran, a Falklands wool-mulberry silk laceweight, Yak Sock, and a merino-cashmere which comes in extra-large skeins that are enough to knit a cowl or a pair of mittens.

Jen's love of handicrafts was nurtured by her grandmother. "My Gran was my main inspiration," Jen says. "I was one of those children who was incapable of sitting still without something in my hands. I would follow her around and learn whatever she felt like teaching me. We knitted, crocheted (I made miles of crochet chain), made Dorset buttons, embroidered and made clothes. I loved it all. My Mum taught me to spin in my early 30s, and I learnt to weave, wet felt and needle felt once I'd opened Beaker Button. Did I mention I'm not very good at being bored?!"

It was a trip to Orkney in 2010, however, which inspired Jen to begin her own crafts

business. "I fell in love with the island, the people, the history and the craft scene. On a visit to the fossil museum, we got chatting to a lady who was knitting shawls in between serving customers, and I thought 'I could do that'. I decided to get a job where I could knit between customers, and the idea for Beaker Button was born. In November 2011 I opened my tiny yarn shop, selling a small mix of predominately natural fibres, tools and yarns, and running workshops."

## Ethical produce

Jen offers a carefully curated range of yarns for discerning knitters who care about the provenance of the products they use. "The yarns I choose to sell have to feel nice, of course, but they also have to be environmentally friendly where possible, and ethically sourced, either British or supporting a small business if I can," Jen explains. "I don't want to have to feel bad about what I'm crafting with. I would rather have quality and pay a little more, and my customer base feels much the same."

"I have noticed among my customers that there has been a definite shift towards more planet-friendly yarns, and British yarns are becoming more popular. From a tool perspective we love Fleece Loved Products, which are made in the next village over to us. Their range of knitting, crochet, spinning and weaving tools are becoming more and more popular, with orders going out all over the world."

Jen's online shop is the premier destination for anyone interested in Dorset button making, and she offers both in-person and online Zoom workshops. Her Dorset button kits are also an excellent way to try out the craft, and contain rings, hand-dyed threads, a tapestry needle and full instructions. There's a wide choice of styles and colours, and also kits to make necklaces, brooches, bracelets and shawl pins from Dorset buttons.

"The button kits are designed and produced by me, along with writing the Dorset button books," says Jen. "I'll have an idea, usually while I'm out walking, or making something else perhaps. I'll make a sample and photograph every stage of the project. If I like what I design, then the photographs become the basis for the instructions and a new kit is made. I make limited-edition runs of some of my colours for the kits, so for each new colour I have to dye and produce new samples."

"The most popular kit is the Multiple Style Dorset button kit. Shooting up the sales chart at the moment is the Angel Dorset button brooch, especially the rainbow version. We're raising money for NHS Charities Together with each sale of this kit."

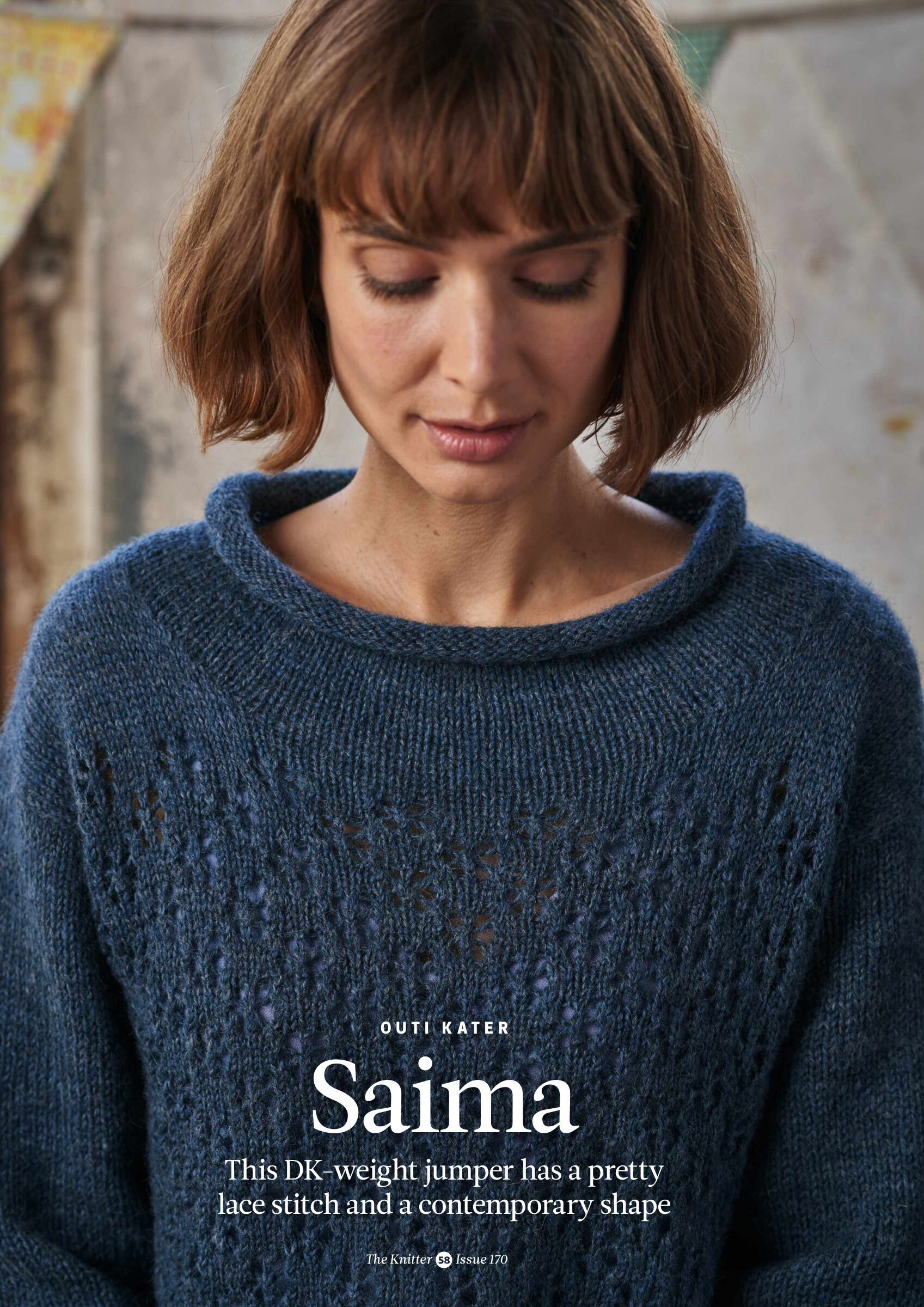
Jen recognises how important crafting is for her customers: "People are becoming more aware of the health benefits of crafting, especially after going through lockdown. I know lots of my customers only really sit down and relax if they're crafting, and craft is essential for them to take time out to chill."

Jen herself spends much of her free time crafting: "I enjoy anything that challenges me and that I can learn from. I embroider, crochet, make buttons, weave, spin, felt and hand-sew. I also love reading, writing books, walking and cold-water swimming, and I have a passion for history, the gorier the better."

So what does the future hold for this busy crafter and entrepreneur? "I want to develop the textile art side of things, so I've started a new side business called Jen Best Textile Art," Jen tells us. "I'll be running a range of textile-based group workshops, expanding my hand-dyed materials range, and generally getting my arty on! I've also got plans for a textile book involving hand stitching." ☺

“**THIS CROPPED** sweater is knitted in the round, from the bottom up, using Novita’s 100% wool DK yarn, Suomivilla,” explains Outi Kater. “The body has panels of a delicate eyelet pattern, which is repeated above the cuffs. In the upper part of the sweater, the front and back are worked separately in openwork. Shaped shoulders are joined with a three-needle cast-off.” Suomivilla comes in a range of warm colours inspired by Finnish landscapes.

## EYELET PATTERN

(written instructions)  
(worked over multiple of 8 sts + 5)

**Rounds 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11:** Knit.

**Round 2:** K4, \*SSK, yo, K1, yo, K2tog, K3; rep from \* to last st, K1.

**Round 4:** K4, \*K1, yo, s2kpo, yo, K4; rep from \* to last st, K1.

**Round 6:** Repeat round 2.

**Round 8:** SSK, yo, K1, yo, K2tog, \*K3, SSK, yo, K1, yo, K2tog; rep from \* to end.

**Round 10:** K1, yo, s2kpo, yo, K1, \*K4, yo, s2kpo, yo, K1; rep from \* to end.

**Round 12:** Repeat round 8.

Repeat last 12 rounds for pattern.

## BODY

Using 4mm circular needles, cast on 176 (192:208:232:248:264) sts.

Pm and join to work in the round, taking care not to twists sts.

**Round 1:** K89 (97:105:117:125:133), pm, K to end.

Work 19 more rounds in st st.

**Round 2:** K2 (2:2:4:4:4), work Round 2 of Eyelet Patt to 2 (2:2:4:4:4) sts before mrk, K2 (2:2:4:4:4), slm, K1 (1:1:3:3:3), work round 2 of Eyelet Patt to 1 (1:1:3:3:3) sts before mrk, K1 (1:1:3:3:3).

Cont in Eyelet Patt and st st as set for another 82 rounds, ending after round 12 of patt.

### ARMHOLE SET-UP

**Round 1:** Knit.

**Round 2:** K10 (10:10:12:12:20), work Round 2 of Eyelet Patt to 10 (10:10:12:12:20) sts before mrk, K to mrk, slm, K9 (9:9:11:11:19), work Round 2 of Eyelet Patt to 9 (9:9:11:11:19) sts before mrk, K to mrk.

**Round 3:** Knit.

**Round 4:** K10 (10:10:12:12:20), work Round 4 of Eyelet Patt to 10 (10:10:12:12:20) sts before mrk, K to mrk, slm, K9 (9:9:11:11:19), work Round 4 of Eyelet Patt to 9 (9:9:11:11:19) sts before mrk, K to mrk.

Break yarn. Place the first 7 (7:7:8:8:8) sts and the last 6 (6:6:7:7:7) sts of the round on a holder for left underarm. Turn work so WS is facing.

## BACK

**Row 1 (WS):** Cast off 1 (2:4:4:5:5) sts pwise,

patt to 6 (6:6:7:7:7) sts before mrk. Place next 13 (13:13:15:15:15) sts on a holder for right underarm. Turn and cont on these 74 (81:87:97:104:112) sts for Back.

**\*\*Row 2 (RS):** Cast off 1 (2:4:4:5:5) sts kwise, patt to end.  
73 (79:83:93:99:107) sts.

Work even in st st and Eyelet Patt as set for 32 (32:32:38:38:38) rows.

Change to 4mm needles.\*\*\*

Work 17 (21:25:23:25:29) rows in st st, beginning with a purl row and ending with a purl row.

### SHAPE RIGHT BACK NECK AND SHOULDER

**Row 1 (RS):** K21 (24:25:29:32:35). Turn and cont with these 21 (24:25:29:32:35) sts only.

**Row 2 (WS):** P2tog, P13 (15:16:18:20:22), w&t.

**Rows 3 and 5 (RS):** Knit to end.

**Row 4 (WS):** P2tog, P6 (7:8:8:9:10), w&t.

**Row 6 (WS):** P2tog, purl to end, working wraps together with wrapped sts.  
18 (21:22:26:29:32) sts.

Break yarn and leave sts on a holder.

### SHAPE LEFT BACK NECK AND SHOULDER

Join yarn to rem Back sts with WS facing and P21 (24:25:29:32:35), turn, leaving rem 31 (31:33:35:35:37) sts on a holder for back neck.

**Row 1 (RS):** SSK, K13 (15:16:18:20:22), w&t.

**Rows 2 and 4 (WS):** Purl to end.

**Row 3 (RS):** SSK, K6 (7:8:8:9:10), w&t.

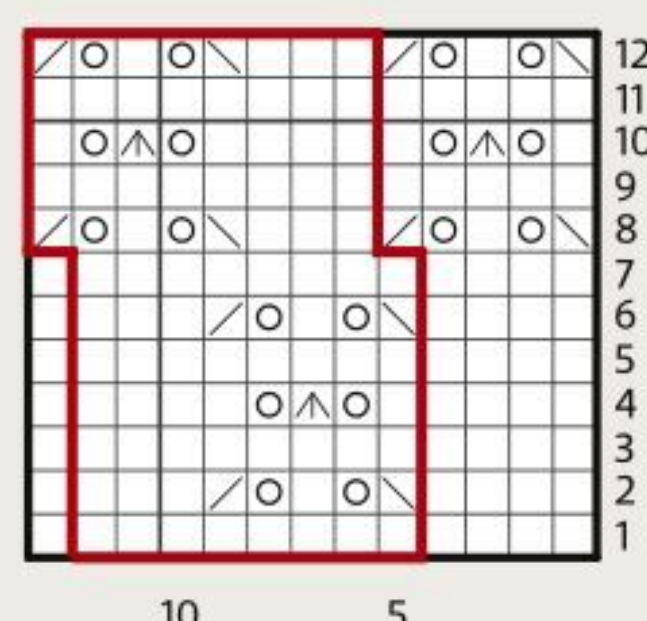

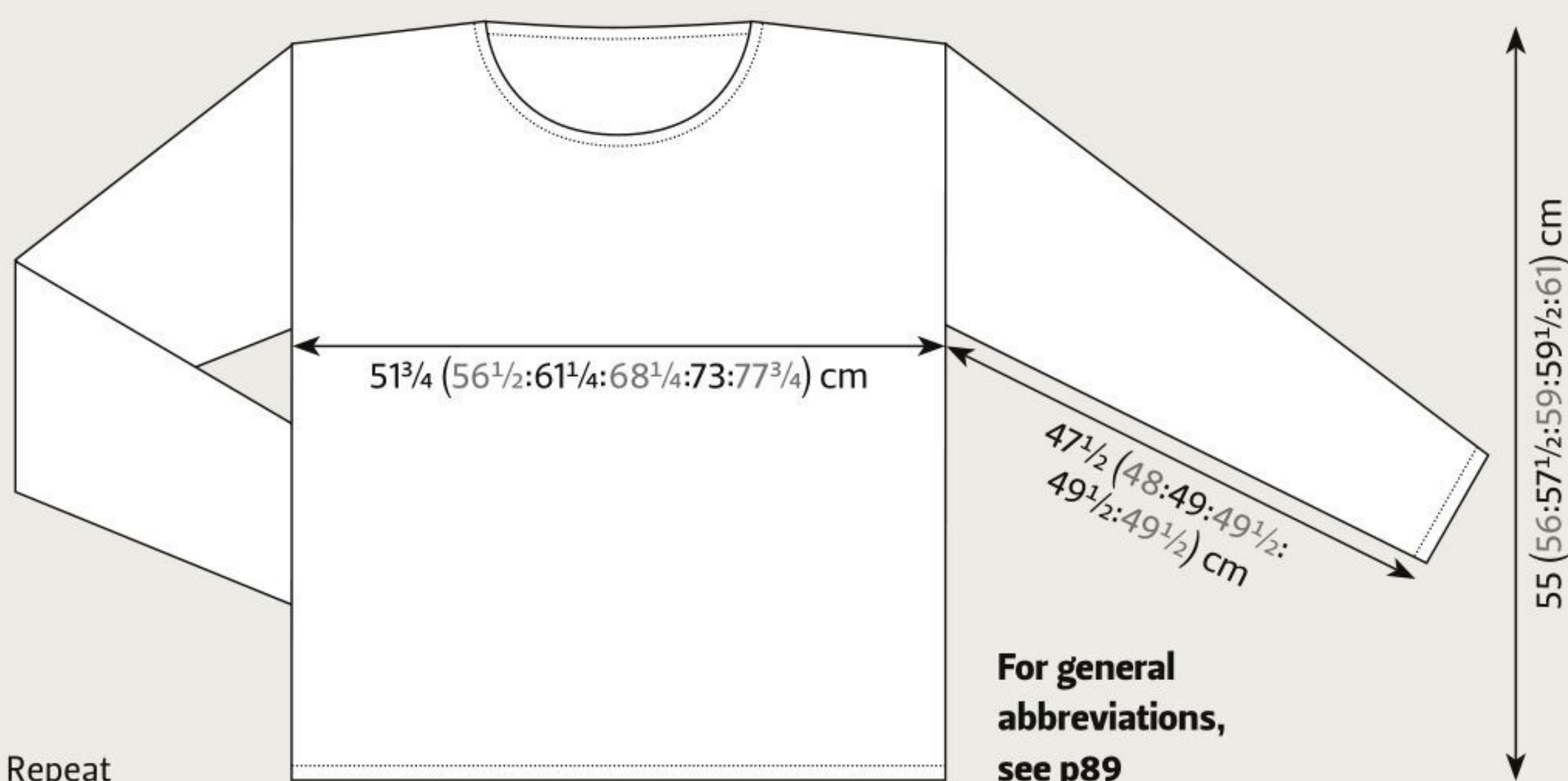

Work 3 (3:1:1:1:1) rows even in st st.

**SHAPE LEFT FRONT SHOULDER**

**Next row (WS):** P2tog, P11 (13:14:16:18:20), w&t.

**Next row (RS):** Knit to end.

**Next row (WS):** P7 (8:9:9:10:11), w&t.

**Next row (RS):** Knit to end.

**Next row (WS):** Purl to end, working wraps with wrapped sts.

18 (21:22:26:29:32) sts.  
Break yarn and leave sts on a holder.

**SHAPE RIGHT FRONT NECK**

With WS facing, rejoin yarn to rem sts for Right Front Neck and Shoulder.

**Next row (WS):** P24 (27:29:33:36:39), turn and cont with these 24 (27:29:33:36:39) sts only.

Cont in st st, dec 1 st at neck edge of every RS row 4 times, then every 4th row 1 (1:2:2:2:2) times.  
19 (22:23:27:30:33) sts.  
Work 3 (3:1:1:1:1) rows even in st st.

**SHAPE RIGHT FRONT SHOULDER**

**Next row (RS):** SSK, K11 (13:14:16:18:20), w&t.

**Next row (WS):** Purl to end.

**Next row (RS):** K7 (8:9:9:10:11), w&t.

**Next row (WS):** Purl to end.

**Next row (RS):** Knit to end, working wraps together with wrapped sts.

18 (21:22:26:29:32) sts.  
Break yarn and leave sts on a holder.

**NECKBAND**

With RS together, join Back and Front shoulders using a three-needle cast-off.

Using 4mm DPNs and beginning at left shoulder seam, pick up and knit 20 (20:22:22:22:22) sts down left front neck, knit 25 (25:25:27:27:29) across held front neck sts, pick up and knit 20 (20:22:22:22:22) sts to shoulder seam, pick up and knit 5 sts from right side of back of neck, knit 31 (31:33:35:35:37) across held back neck sts, then pick up and knit 5 sts to

shoulder seam.  
106 (106:112:116:116:120) sts.

Work 30 rounds in st st.  
Cast off knitwise very loosely.

**SLEEVES**

(both alike)  
Using 4mm DPNs and, knit last 7 (7:7:8:8:8) underarm sts from holder, pick up and knit 31 (35:39:42:46:46) sts to shoulder seam (approx 2 sts every 3 rows), pick up and knit 31 (35:39:42:46:46) sts to underarm, knit 6 (6:6:7:7:7) rem sts from holder.  
75 (83:91:99:107:107) sts.

**Dec round:** K1, K2tog, K to 3 sts before mrk, SSK, K1, slm. 2 sts dec'd.

Cont in st st, rep Dec round every foll 5th (4th:4th:4th:4th:4th) round 14 (18:18:22:22:18) times more.  
45 (45:53:53:61:69) sts.

Work 12 (12:14:0:0:16) rounds even in st st.

Change to 3.5mm needles.

**BEGIN EYELET PATTERN**

Work in Eyelet Patt for 36 rounds.

Change to 4mm needles.  
Work 20 rounds in st st.  
Cast off very loosely in knit.

**FINISHING**

Weave in ends and block garment to measurements, following any yarn care instructions on ball band. ☺

“**MY DESIGN** has a combination of OXO and peerie motifs, with natural shades giving background structure, and the three bright colours bringing focus to the patterning” says Mary Henderson. “Knitters can have fun playing with the charts, repeating some more than others as well as rearranging the colours.”

### PATTERN NOTES

Use the long-tail cast-on for all items. When working decreases on the beanie and tam, you can work them as K2tog or SSK depending on your preferred prominence of the pattern motif. The scarf is knitted in the round as a tube. It can be worn loose as a scarf, buttoned and worn wrapped around the neck as a cowl, or even twisted then buttoned to create a moebius cowl.

### SCARF

Using 3mm circular needles and yarn A, cast on 108 sts.  
Knit 1 row, then pm and join to work in the round, taking care not to twist sts.

#### WORK SCARF CHART PATTERNS

Join and cut yarns as needed.  
Work Rnds 1–10 of Checkerboard Chart A.  
Work Rnds 1–55 of Chart 1.  
Work Rnds 1–10 of Checkerboard Chart B.  
Work Rnds 1–55 of Chart 1a.  
Work Rnds 1–10 of Checkerboard Chart B.  
Work Rnds 1–90 of Chart 2.  
Work Rnds 1–10 of Checkerboard Chart B.  
Work Rnds 1–55 of Chart 1a.  
Work Rnds 1–10 of Checkerboard Chart B.  
Work Rnds 1–55 of Chart 1.  
Work Rnds 1–10 of Checkerboard Chart B.

### SIZE

#### Scarf

Width: 18cm (7in)  
Length: 152cm (60in)

#### Wristwarmers

Circumference: 18 (24) cm [7 (9½) in]  
Length: 22cm (8¾in)

#### Tam

Circumference at band: 48cm (19in)  
Length from top of crown: 21cm (8¼in)

#### Beanie

Circumference at band: 48 (56) cm [19 (22) in]

Work Rnds 1–90 of Chart 2.  
Work Rnds 1–10 of Checkerboard Chart B.  
Work Rnds 1–10 of Last Motif Chart.  
Cut yarns, but do not cast off.  
Carefully turn scarf inside out to weave in ends and secure all tails.

#### BUTTONHOLE BAND

Turn scarf RS out again.  
Using 3mm needles and yarn A, divide sts onto 2 needles with 54 sts on each needle. With wrong sides together, using a third 3mm needle as your RH needle, work as follows: \*insert RH needle into first st on front needle and first st on back needle, knit these 2 sts tog; rep from \* to end. 54 sts. Now work back and forth on two 3mm needles as foll:  
Knit 2 rows.  
**Buttonhole row:** K1, \*P2tog, yo; rep to last 3 sts, yo, P2tog, K1.  
Knit 3 rows.  
Cast off kwise.

Gently block the scarf to a flat tube, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band.

#### FINISHING

Using yarn A, join cast-on edge tog with mattress stitch. Attach buttons to fit buttonholes.

### WRISTWARMERS

Using 2.75mm needles and yarn G, cast on 54 (72) sts.  
Pm and join to work in the round, taking care not to twist sts.

#### BOTTOM CUFF

Join and cut yarns as needed.

### NEEDLES & ACCESSORIES

2.75mm (UK 12/US 2) circular needles, 40cm long, for Beanie and Tam  
Set of 2.75mm (UK 12/US 2) double-pointed needles (DPNs) for Wristwarmers  
3mm (UK 11/US 2–3) circular needles, at least 40cm long, for Scarf  
3mm (UK 11/US 2–3) circular needles, 60cm long, for Tam  
Set of 3mm (UK 11/US 2–3) double-pointed needles (DPNs) for Wristwarmers and buttonhole band on Scarf  
3mm (UK 11/US C/2) crochet hook and 2m of smooth yarn for provisional cast-on for Tam  
Stitch markers  
4 x 15mm buttons

Work Rnds 1–14 of Wristwarmers  
Corrugated Rib Chart.

#### MAIN BODY

Change to 3mm needles.  
Work Rnds 1–44 of Wristwarmers Main Chart.

#### TOP CUFF

Work Rnds 2–14 of Wristwarmers  
Corrugated Rib Chart.  
Cut all yarns except yarn G.

With yarn G, knit 1 round.

Cast off using the i-cord method as foll:  
\*K1, K2tog tbl, slip 2 sts back onto LH needle; rep from \* until 2 sts remain, cast off rem 2 sts as usual, leaving a 5cm tail. Pull tail through last loop and use tail to join to beg of cast-off round.

#### FINISHING

Weave in ends and block lightly to measurements, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band.

### TAM

Using a 3mm crochet hook and smooth waste yarn, chain 150 sts. Using 2.75mm needles and yarn G, pick up and knit 144 sts through the back bumps of the chains. Pm and join to work in the round taking care not to twist the sts.

#### BRIM

Knit 9 rounds.  
Purl 1 round for fold line.

Change to 3mm needles.  
Join yarn D.



## TENSION

30 sts and 32 rounds to 10cm over colourwork on 3mm needles.

## YARN

**Baa Ram Ewe** Pip Colourwork (4ply weight; 100% British wool; 116m/126yds per 25g ball)

**A** Plumpton; 2 x 25g balls

**B** Runswick; 2 x 25g balls

**C** Harewood; 1 x 25g ball

**D** Nostell; 1 x 25g ball

**E** York Grey; 2 x 25g balls

**F** Kettleness; 2 x 25g balls

**G** Whitby Jet; 4 x 25g balls

**H** Viking; 2 x 25g balls

**J** Filey; 2 x 25g balls

Fold along the purl ridge with lining sts at the back and motif sts facing RS, \*knit together 1 st from front and 1 st from

cast-on; rep from \* until end of round. 144 sts.

**Rnd 7 (inc):** Using yarn G, \*K2, M1; rep from \* to end of round. 216 sts.

### CONTINUE CHART

Join and cut yarns as needed.

Work Rnds 8-37 of Wristwarmers Main Chart.

Work Rnds 38-48 of Main Tam Chart 1.

**Rnd 49 (dec):** Using yarn G, \*K2, K2tog; rep from \* to end of round. 162 sts.

**Rnds 50-52:** Work Rnds 1-3 of Main Tam Chart 2.

**Rnd 53:** Using yarn G, knit.

**Rnd 54 (dec):** Using yarn G, \*K1, K2tog; rep from \* to end of round. 108 sts.

Work Rnds 55-60 of Main Tam Chart 3.

**Rnd 61 (dec):** Using yarn G, \*K2tog; rep from \* to end of round. 54 sts.

**Rnds 62-64:** Work Rnds 1-3 of Main Tam Chart 2.

Break all yarns except yarn G. ►



# Grizedale

**Rnd 65:** \*K2tog; rep from \* to end of round. 27 sts.

**Rnd 66:** Knit.

**Rnd 67:** \*S2kpo; rep from \* to end of round. 9 sts.

Cut yarn leaving a 10cm tail, thread through rem sts, then thread through rem sts once again and secure.

## BRIM EDGE

Using 3mm circular needles and yarn G, working through the purl ridge, pick up and knit 144 sts.

Pm and join to work in the round.

Knit 1 round.

Using the cable cast-on method, cast on 2 sts. Work i-cord trim as follows: \*K2, K2tog, slip 3 sts back to LH needle; rep from \* until 3 sts rem, cast off rem 3 sts as usual, leaving a 5cm tail. Pull tail through last loop and use tail to join to beginning of cast-off round.

## FINISHING

Weave in ends. Dampen and block over a dinner plate, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band.

## BEANIE

Using 2.75mm circular needles and yarn A, cast on 128 (144) sts.

## BRIM

Join and cut yarns as needed.

Work Rnds 1-12 of Beanie Corrugated Rib Chart.

## MAIN HAT

Change to 3mm needles.

**Next round (inc):** With yarn A, \*K8 (6), M1; rep to end of round. This is Rnd 1 of Main Beanie Chart. 144 (168) sts.

Join and cut yarns as needed.

Repeating sts 6 (7) times around and changing to DPNs or other method for working small circumferences as needed, work Rnds 2-54 of Main Beanie Chart. 12 (14) sts.

**Next round:** \*K2tog; rep from \* to end of round.

6 (7) sts.

Cut yarn leaving a 10cm tail, thread through rem sts and secure.

## FINISHING

Weave in ends and block lightly to measurements, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band. To get a flat crown, block over a 15cm saucer, balanced on an upturned bowl. ☹

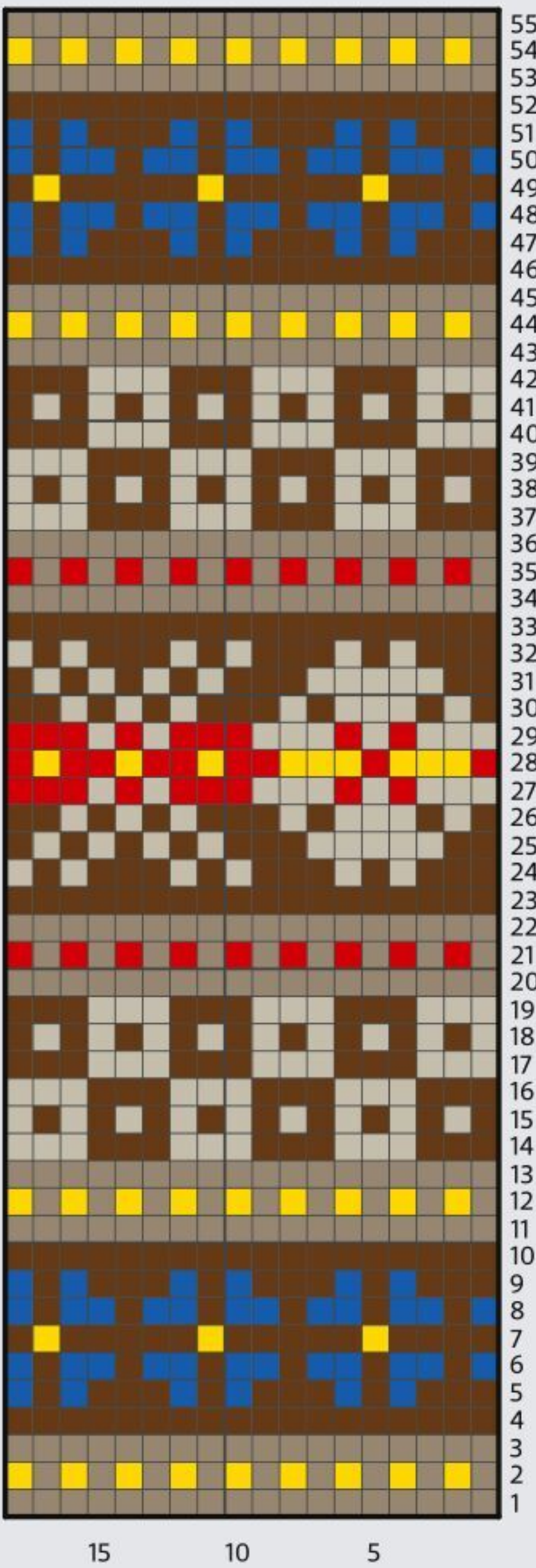

**Rib row 5:** K2 (0:2:0), (P2, K2) 3 (5:6:8) times, (P2, K4) 5 times, P4, K6, P5, K6, P5, K6, P4, (P2, K4) 5 times, (K2, P2) 3 (5:6:8) times, K2 (0:2:0).

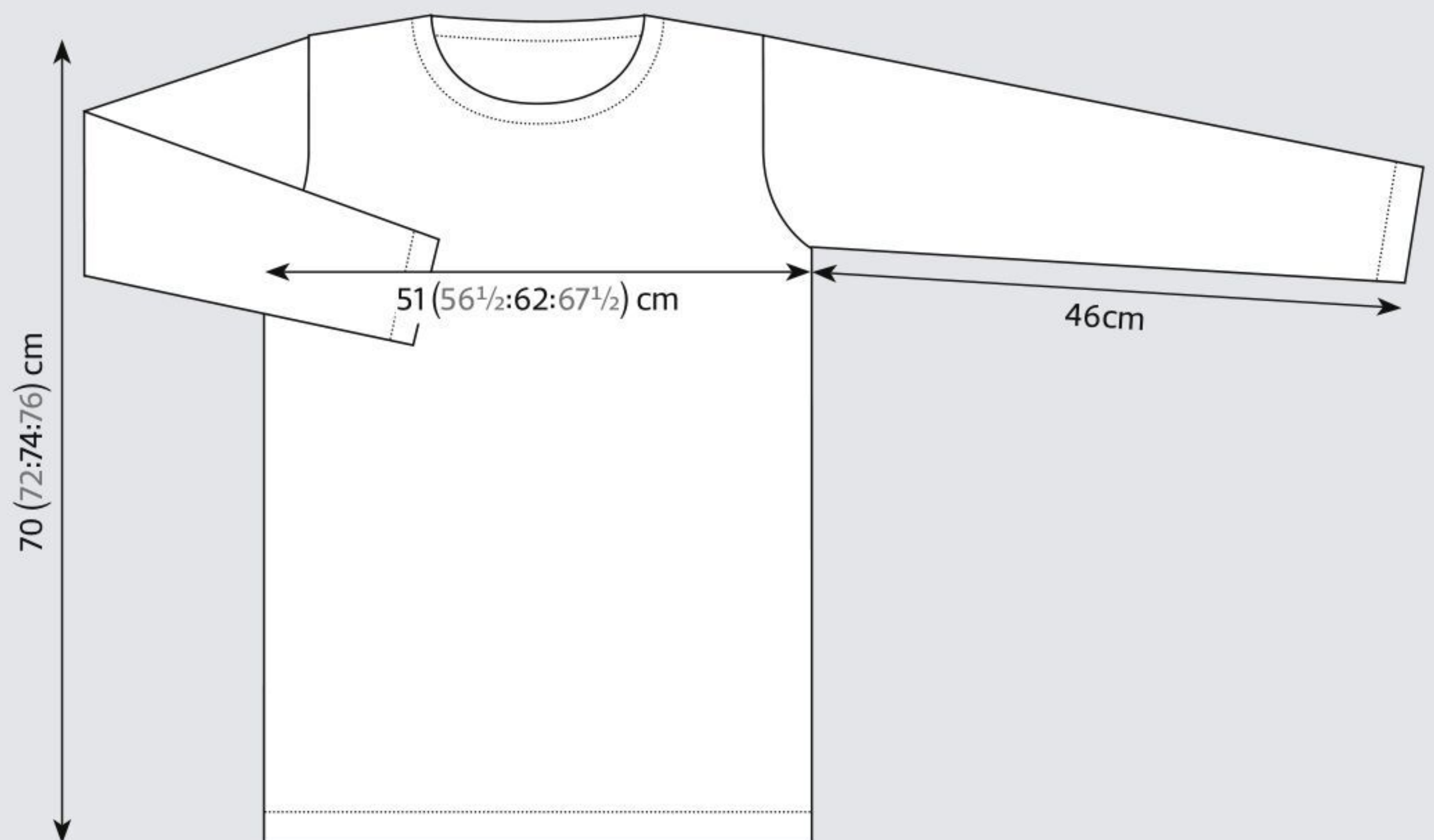

**WORKED IN** black on a snow-white background, the colourwork pattern on this jumper stands out beautifully. It has been designed by Sari Nordlund for Novita, and is knitted in the round from the top down using Muumitalo, which is a DK-weight mix of superwash wool and polyamide. This comes in a range of 12 solid colours inspired by the artwork of *Moomin* author Tove Jansson.

### PATTERN NOTES

Begin with smaller circumference circular needles, and change to longer ones when needed.

See our masterclass on page 82 for more guidance on working German short rows.

### YOKE

Using 3.5mm circular needles, 40cm long, and yarn A, cast on 104 (110:114:114:120) sts loosely.

Pm and join to work in the round, taking care not to twist sts. The beginning of the round is at the back centre.

**Rib round:** \*K1, P1; rep from \* to end. Work ribbing as set until piece meas 7cm.

**Next round:** \*K17 (11:7:7:6), M1; rep from \* to last 2 (0:2:2:0) sts, K2 (0:2:2:0). 110 (120:130:130:140) sts.

**Next round:** Begin working from row 1

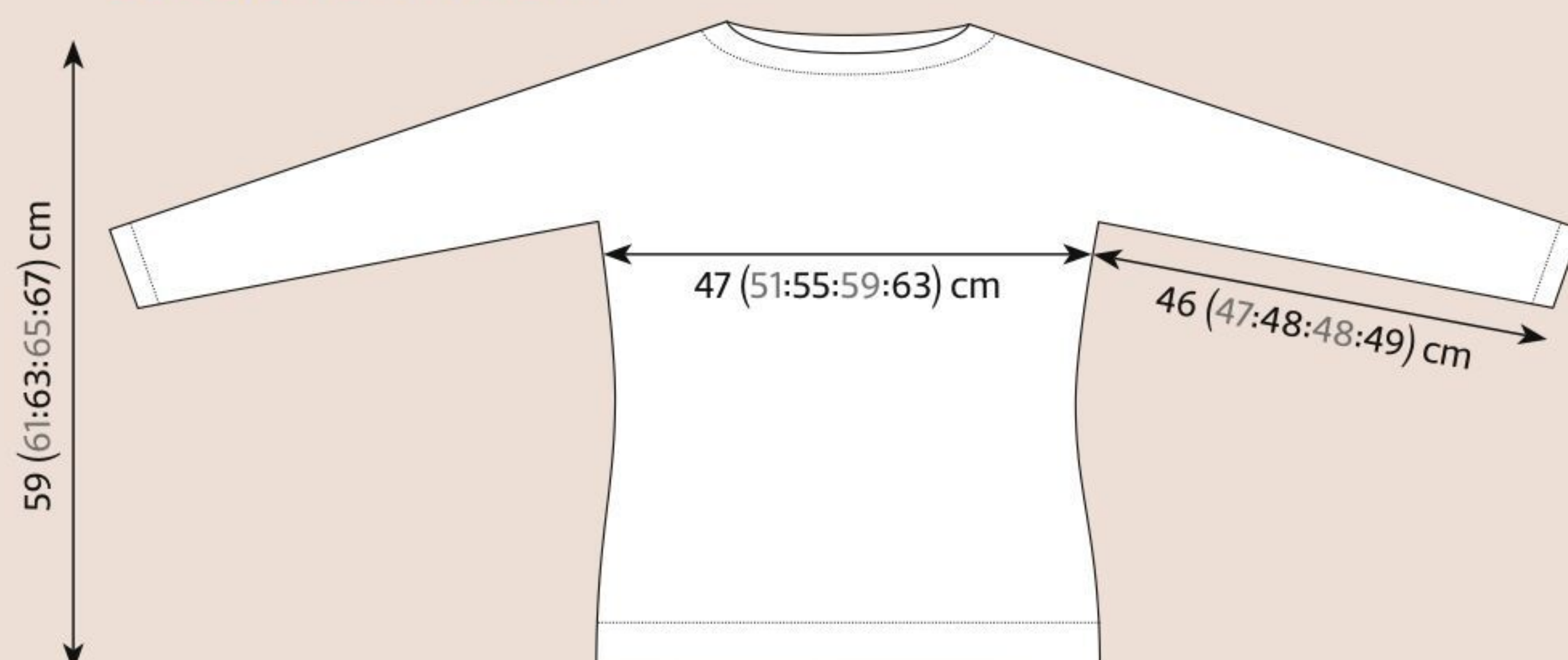

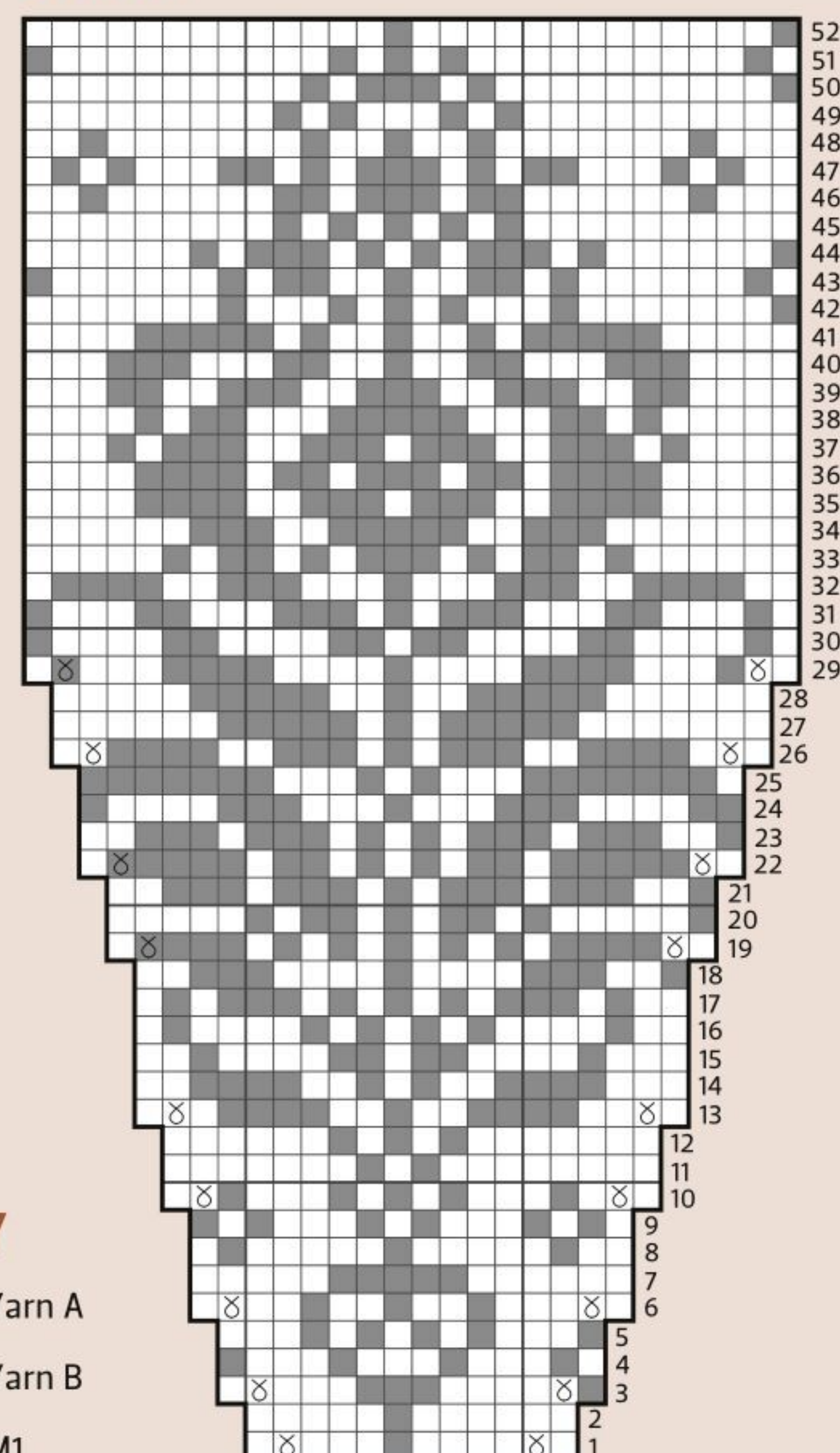

Repeat dec round every 9 (8:8:6:6) rows another 12 (14:15:18:20) times.

52 (54:56:56:58) sts.

Cont in st st until Sleeve meas 41 (42:43:43:44) cm from the underarm.

**Rib round:** \*K1, P1; rep from \* to end. Work rib as set for 5 cm. Loosely cast off in pattern.

Repeat for second sleeve.

## FINISHING

Fold the neck ribbing and sew the edge to the inside.

With garment inside out, pin to measurements and mist with water, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band. Steam gently, or allow to dry. ☹

The neckline is folded and stitched to the inside

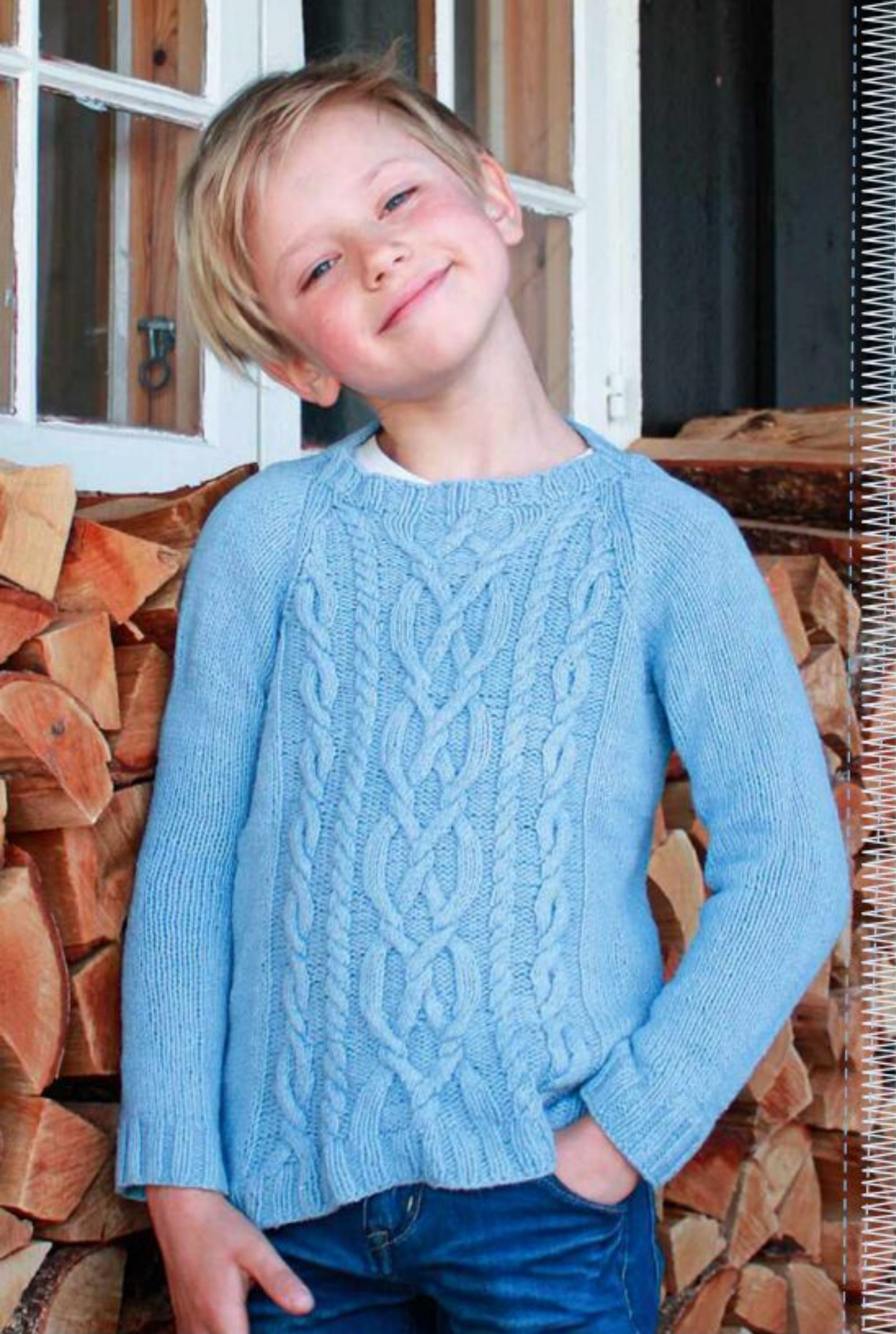

**THIS CABLED** sweater for children is worked in the round to the armholes, then joined with the sleeves to work the yoke section. It's knitted in Karisma, a wool yarn from DROPS Design, which comes in a huge choice of colours.

## BODY

Using 3mm circular needles, 60cm long, cast on 158 (166:174:182:190) sts. Pm and join to work in the round, taking care not to twist sts.

Knit 1 round.

**Rib rnd:** \*P2, K2; rep from \* another 4 times, K2, then rep from \* to end of rnd. Rep Rib rnd until piece measures 5cm.

Change to 4mm circular needles, 60cm long.

**Next rnd:** P2, K1, yo, K1, PFB twice, K1, yo, K1, P2, KFB twice, P2, K1, yo, K1, PFB twice, K1, yo, K2, yo, K1, PFB twice, K1, yo, K1, P2, KFB twice, P2, K1, yo, K1, PFB twice, K1, yo, K1, P2, then work the rest of round as foll:

### Size 5-6 years only

K1, \*K2tog, K4, K2tog, K5; rep from \* to end.

### Size 7-8 years only

\*K2tog, K5; rep from \* to end.

### Size 9-10 years only

K8, \*K2tog, K5; rep from \* to end.

### All sizes

160 (168:176:184:192) sts.

Work Charts in order over the first 60 sts (i.e. Chart A over the first 14 sts, Chart B over the next 4 sts, Chart C over the next 24 sts, Chart D over the next 4 sts, and Chart E over the last 14 sts), K14 (16:18:20:22), pm, work to 14 (16:18:20:22) sts before next mrk, pm, knit to end of rnd.

Work in patt as set until piece meas

24 (27:30:33:34) cm.

**Next rnd:** \*Patt to 3 sts before mrk, cast off 3 sts, remove mrk, cast off 3 sts; rep from \* one more time, patt to end of rnd.

148 (156:164:172:180) sts.

Put piece aside and work the sleeves.

## SLEEVES

Using 3mm DPNs or circular needles, 40cm long, cast on 40 (44:44:48:48) sts. Pm and join to work in the round, taking care not to twist sts.

Knit 1 round.

**Rib round:** \*K2, P2; rep from \* to end.

Work rib until piece meas 5cm.

Change to 4mm DPNs or circular needles, 40cm long.

**Next round:** K1, pm, K to end of rnd.

This mrk is placed at centre of underarm. Cont in st st until Sleeve meas 8 (8:9:9:10) cm.

**Inc rnd:** K to 1 st before mrk, yo, K1, slm, K1, yo, K to end of rnd. 2 sts inc'd. On the next rnd, knit each yo through the back loop to avoid holes.

Rep inc rnd every 8 (10:8:10:8) rows another 6 (6:8:8:10) times.  
54 (58:62:66:70) sts.

Work straight until piece meas  
33 (37:40:44:47) cm.

**Next rnd:** K to 3 sts before mrk, cast off 3 sts, remove mrk, cast off 3 sts, K to end.  
48 (52:56:60:64) sts.

Work second sleeve the same way.

## YOKE

### JOIN SLEEVES TO BODY

\*Slip body sts until armhole cast-off, pm, slip sts for first sleeve on to the needle, pm; rep from \* once more, then slip body sts until you reach beginning of rnd mrk.  
244 (260:276:292:308) sts.

Note: READ AHEAD. Begin neck decrease before all decreases for raglan are done, **Next rnd:** Work Charts and st st as set to end, working 1 st in st st on either side of each mrk.

**Next rnd:** Patt Charts A and B, slip all 17 rem sts for Chart C onto a holder for front neck, patt as set to end of rnd, working raglan decreases if necessary, remove beg of rnd mrk.

Work back and forth on rem sts, working raglan decreases where necessary and AT THE SAME TIME, shape neck as foll: Cast off 2 sts at beg of next 4 rows, then cast off 1 st at beg of next 4 rows.

After all decreases for raglan and cast-offs

for neck, there are 56 (56:56:64:64) sts on needles: 10 (10:10:12:12) sts for each sleeve, 28 (28:28:30:30) sts across back, and 4 (4:4:5:5) sts on either side of front neck.

## NECK

Change to 3mm DPNs or circular needles, 40cm long.  
Pick up and knit 6 sts along left neck decs, slip 17 sts from front neck holder back onto needle, pick up and knit 6 sts along right neck decs. Pm for new beg of rnd.  
85 (85:85:93:93) sts.

## Size 5-6 years only

**Next rnd:** K to 2 sts before mrk, K2tog, slm, K2tog, K to 2 sts before mrk, K2tog, slm, K3tog, K to 3 sts before mrk, K3tog, slm, K2tog, K to 2 sts before mrk, K2tog, slm, K2tog, K to end of rnd.  
8 sts for each sleeve, 24 (24:24:24) sts over back, and 35 (35:35:35) sts over front.

**Next rnd:** K to 2 sts before mrk, K2tog, slm, K2tog, K to 2 sts before mrk, K2tog, slm, K to mrk, slm, K2tog, K to 2 sts before mrk, K2tog, slm, K2tog, K to end of rnd.  
8 sts for each sleeve, - (28:28:28) sts over back, and - (35:35:35) sts over front.  
- (79:79:79) sts.

## Sizes 11-12 years and 13-14 years only

**Next rnd:** K to mrk, M1, slm, K3tog, K to 3 sts before mrk, K3tog, slm, M1, K3tog, K to 3 sts before mrk, K3tog, slm, M1, K6, M1, K17, M1, K to end of rnd.  
8 sts for each sleeve, - (32:32:32) sts over back, and - (43:43:43) sts over front.  
- (91:91:91) sts.

## All sizes

### NECKBAND

Work rib in the rnd as follows: Continue the 2 sts from the raglan line as K2, then P2, K2, K2 over each sleeve, work sts on back piece into P2, K2. Work 17 front neck sts as foll: P 2, K3, P2, K3, P2, K3, P2, working rem sts on each side into K2, P2. When neckband meas 2 (2:2:2:3) cm, cast off in patt.

## MAKING UP

Sew openings under the sleeves together. Weave in ends. Block gently, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band. ☺

# GERMAN SHORT ROWS

This nifty technique is a great alternative to the classic wrap-and-turn short row, as Helen Spedding explains

**SHORT ROWS** are often used to shape pieces of knitting – instead of working to the end of every row, you work back and forth over small areas to add extra fabric. This technique can be used to give more height at the back neck of sweaters, or to create shaped hems; to add three-dimensional bust shaping and sock heels; or to create shaping or colourwork effects in shawls.

The wrap-and-turn method is perhaps the most familiar method of short-row shaping, but many of our designers are increasingly choosing the German short-row method, as it is easy to work and remember, and can be less visible in the finished fabric. Our walk-through below explains how to work this method.

We've concentrated on the English method of knitting and purling, so if you prefer using the Continental method or Norwegian purl, we recommend watching the excellent video produced by Anniken Allis at [bit.ly/annikengermansr](http://bit.ly/annikengermansr)

## INSTRUCTIONS

❶ Work in pattern until the point at which the pattern says turn, then turn your work, leaving the remaining stitches unworked on your right-hand needle.

### On a purl row

❷ Slip the first stitch on the left needle, purlwise with the yarn in front, from the left needle to the right needle.

❸ Pull the working yarn firmly up and

away from you towards the back of the work. This will pull up and tighten the slipped stitch, and give it a double 'leg' – it will now look like a strange double stitch. The abbreviation DS is typically used to describe this 'double stitch' in knitting pattern instructions, and is counted as one stitch.

❹ Maintaining a firm tension on the yarn, bring the yarn back between the needles and purl the next stitch. It will look like there are three loops – the initial slipped stitch, and the first purlled stitch. Continue to purl to the end of the row.

### On a knit row

❺ Bring the yarn between the needles to the front of the work.

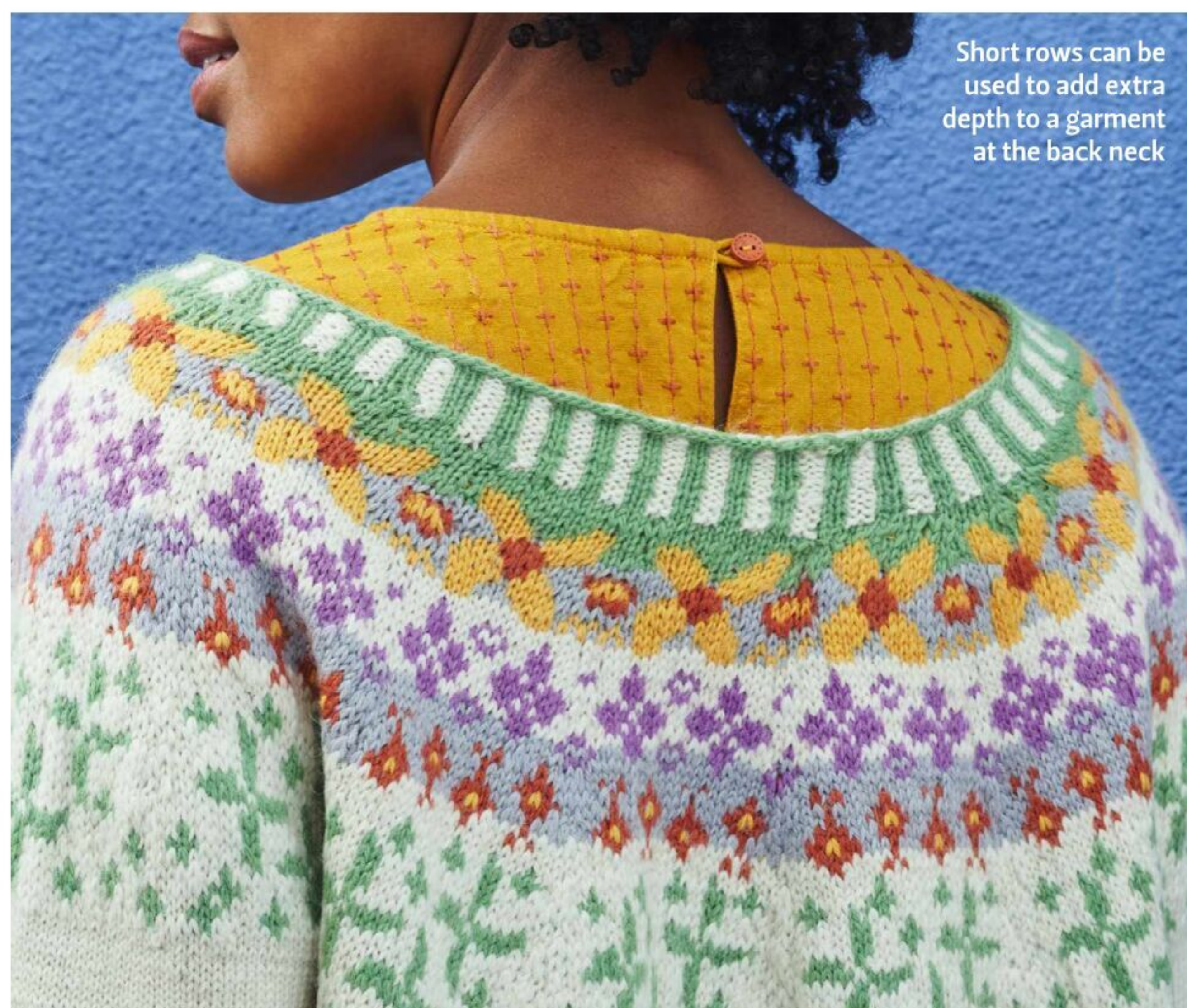
❻ Slip the first stitch on the left needle, purlwise with the yarn in front, from the left needle to the right needle.

❼ Pull the working yarn firmly up and away from you towards the back of the work. This will pull up and tighten the stitch, and give it a double 'leg' (DS).

❽ Maintaining a high tension on the yarn, knit the next stitch. It will look like there are three loops – the initial slipped stitch, and the first knitted stitch. Continue to knit to the end of the row.

### Resolving the double stitches

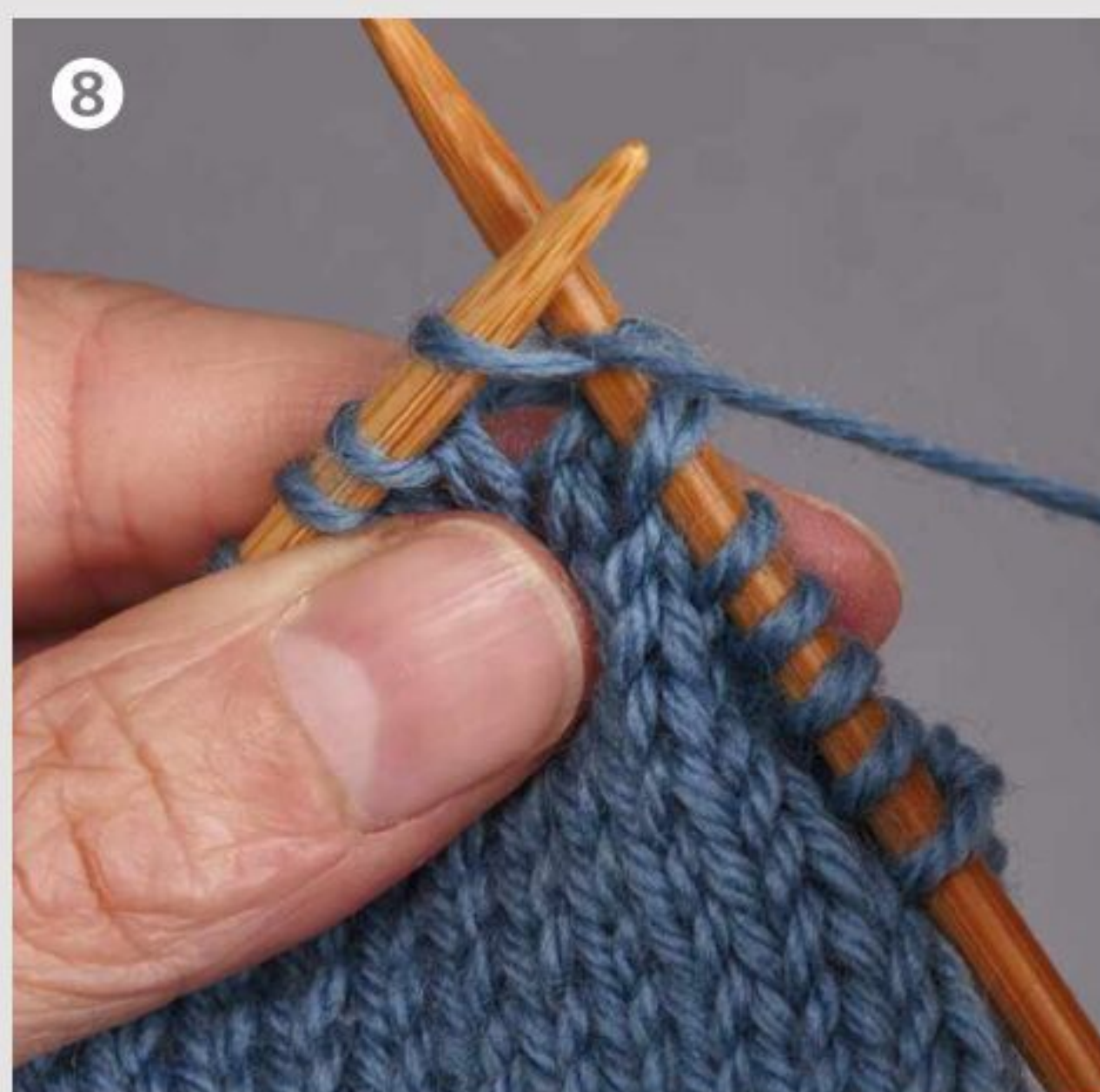
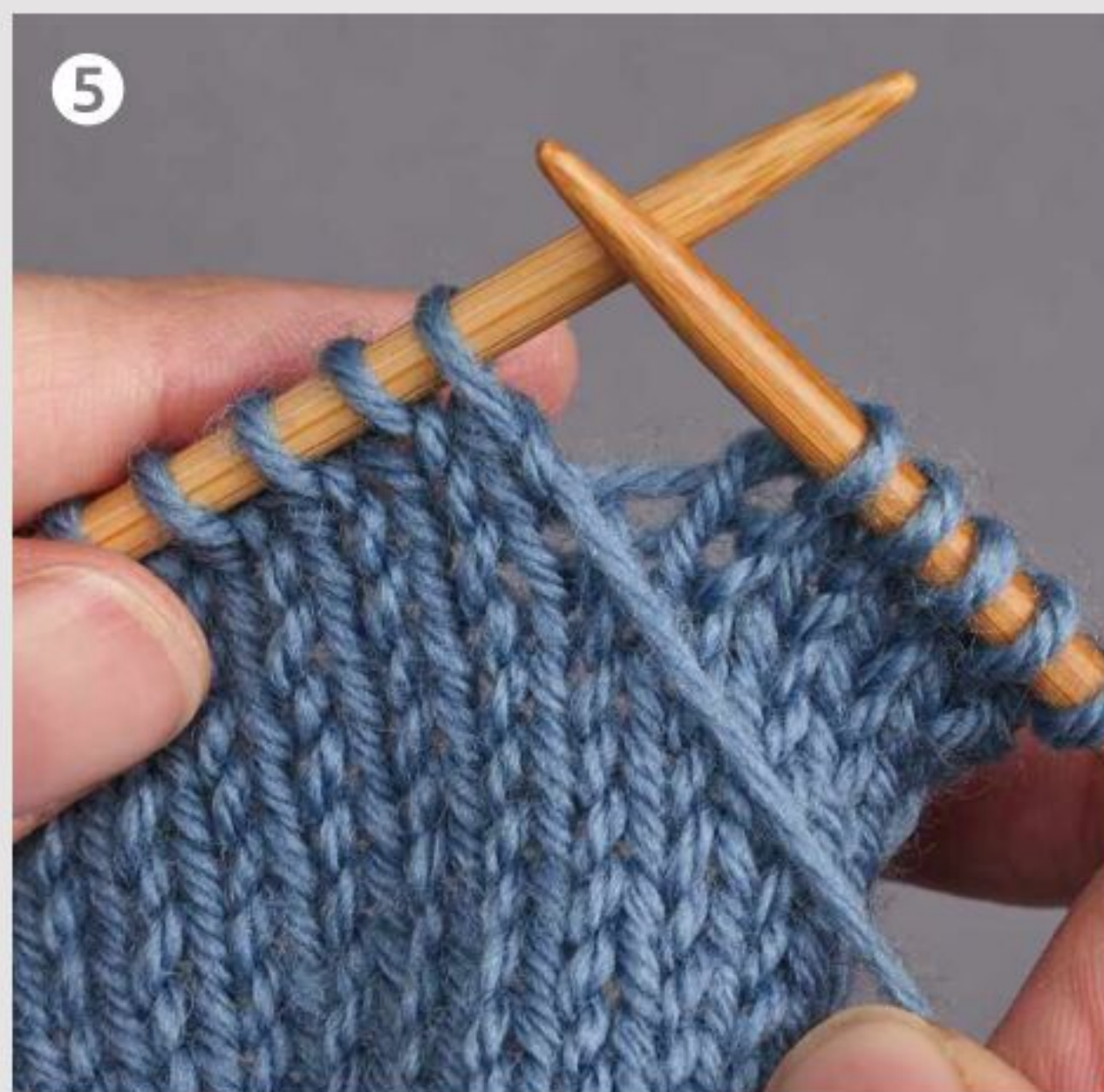
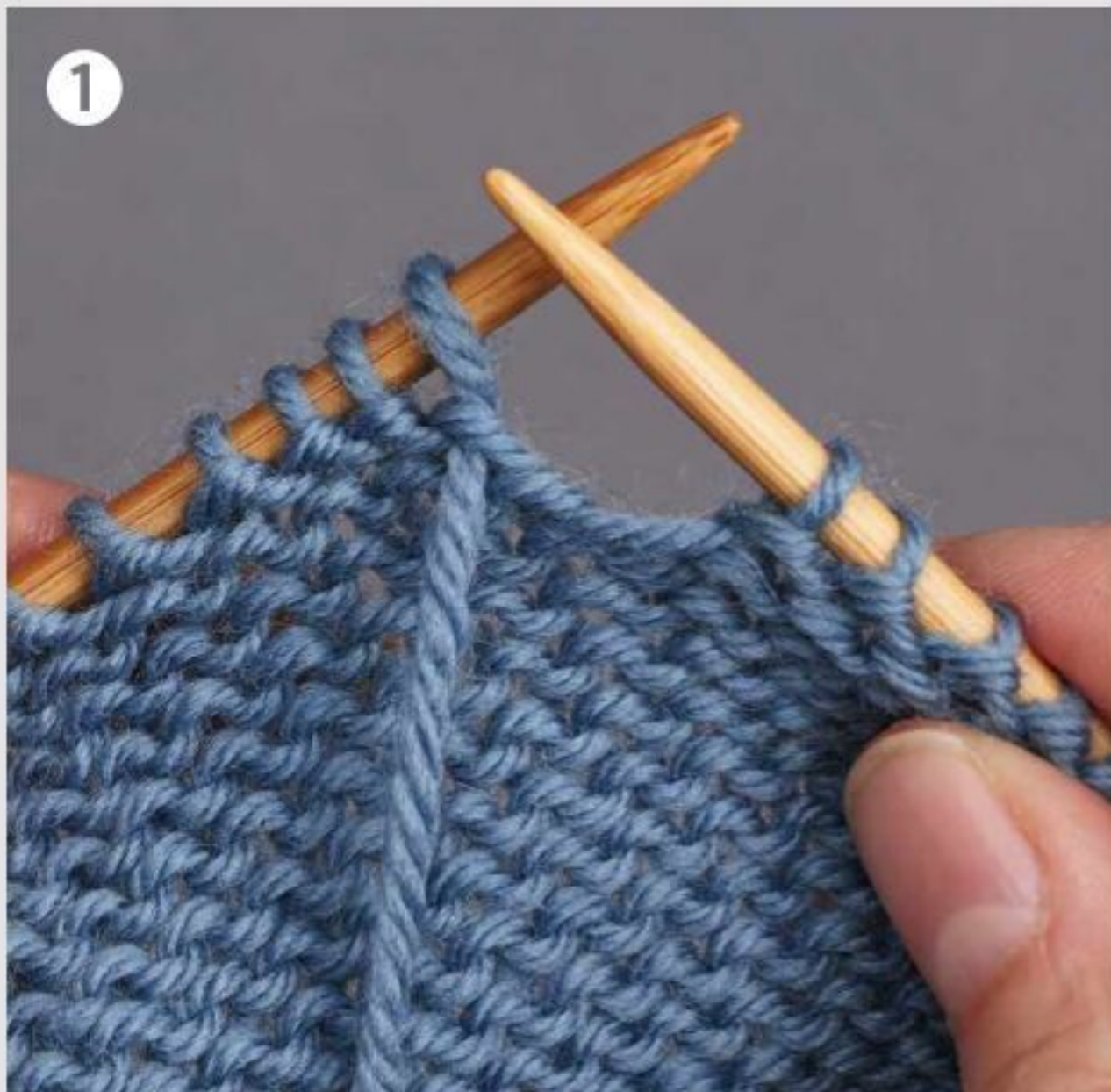
When working a row that has a DS on it, or if your pattern instructions tell you to work to within a certain number of stitches of the last DS, you will be able to spot where the DS is as there will be a slightly bigger gap to the left of it, and the slipped stitch will look like a double stitch (❾). When you come to work a double stitch (DS), treat it as a single stitch and either purl both legs of the double stitch together (❿) or knit them together (⓫) as indicated in the pattern. ☺



Short rows can be used to add extra depth to a garment at the back neck

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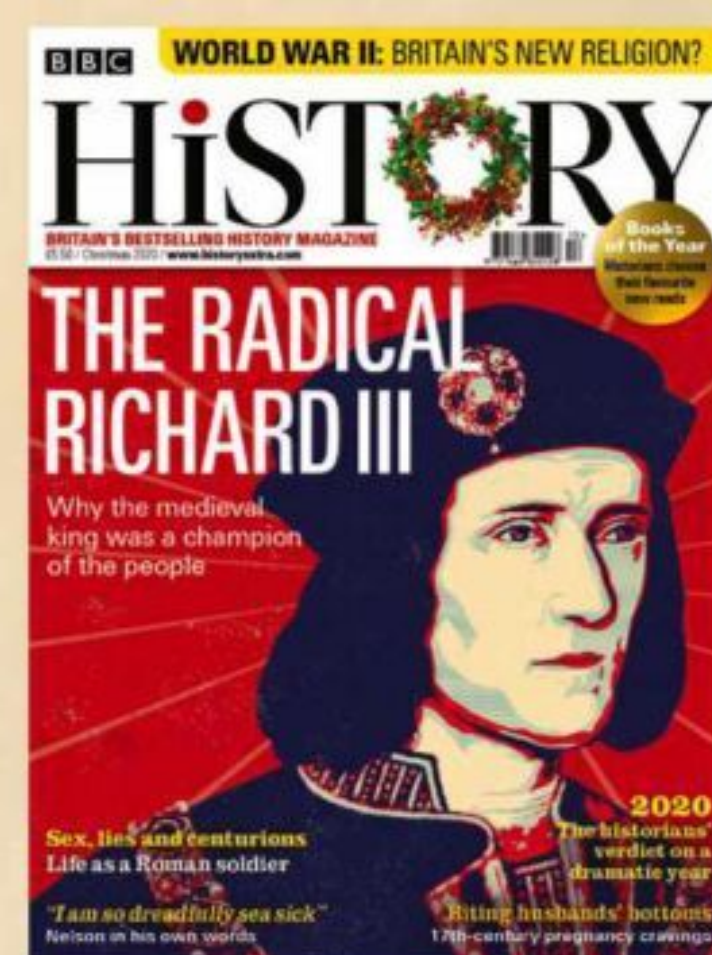

# The new wool year

Graeme Bethune explains how he must start planning now to make sure next year's wool crop is at its very best



**MY WOOL** year starts between the weaning and sale of the lambs in August and the cast ewe sales in September. It's not a fixed date, but a change in my mind from the summer's business

of lamb care, to the preparation of the sheep for the coming year.

Autumn is a time for thinking about the previous year's events, leaning into what worked and changing what did not. This year, I have made a choice to lower the age of the ewes I am selling onwards from six years to five. The older ewes' wool has always been borderline for the best yarns, as they spend more of their energy in their lamb production and are slower in their recovery to top condition. They have years of good life ahead of them as breeding stock, but their wool is coarsening and getting hairier – no good for making top yarns.

Autumn is also the season for investing in stock. Recently I bought in new bloodlines from great Highland flocks: breeding ewes from John Scott in the Black Isle, and tups from North Sutherland. Both sources are places of the very highest sheep quality and care, whose new blood has provided a real boost to my flock's wool quality.

Once I have a settled number of sheep to care for, I can start to plan in earnest for the

coming months. First is a farm spending budget, laying out when the farm spends money and when it will get paid. One of the most difficult things about sheep farming is that almost all income comes in during August and September. It takes real self-restraint and careful planning to make this money last through the following year.

More importantly for the sheep and their wool, I have a food budget. I work out the dietary needs of the sheep through to the following summer, getting both a daily figure and a yearly total. I then take that average multiplied by the number of sheep, plus a margin for safety, and place that against a separate calculation of the food available from grazing. This is a figure you get by measuring the daily growth of the sward in the fields with lab-tested samples throughout the year. This gives me a pretty reliable figure for the potential food the farm is growing.

I can then buy in hay and ewe nuts to make sure I can feed the girls enough every day to keep them in top condition. The ewe nuts are a commercial product derived from distillery waste. I buy hay from farms who grow hay commercially and pay for their very best. I then get that hay tested at the Government Vet lab to know what the girls will be eating. All this allows me to buy early enough to save some money, as the prices of feed of all kinds rise steadily

from harvest onwards, and in many years it runs out in late winter!

Inside the food budget is a plan for supplements for the girls – mineral and vitamin additions to what they can get through grazing. I strongly believe in better, more natural grazing, but there are periods when a helping hand is needed. Five or six years ago, I did a series of blood tests on the sheep and lambs over a six-month period covering the autumn and early winter. This flagged up a total deficiency in copper and a need for extra selenium and phosphorus.

The girls get an oral drench of minerals and multivitamins in August and again in September, to help their recovery from the exertions of lamb bearing and rearing. And by late October they are fat and sleek again. They then get a bolus, which is a long duration method of delivering small daily doses of supplements. It's expensive, at £1 per girl, but it ensures each gets enough key minerals for the next six months. This aids lamb conception rates, the future health of those lambs, and most important for me the quality of the fleece the sheep sets in autumn and retains through the winter. It means their fleece will be filling out, and they will be ready to breed and start the sheep year again. ☺

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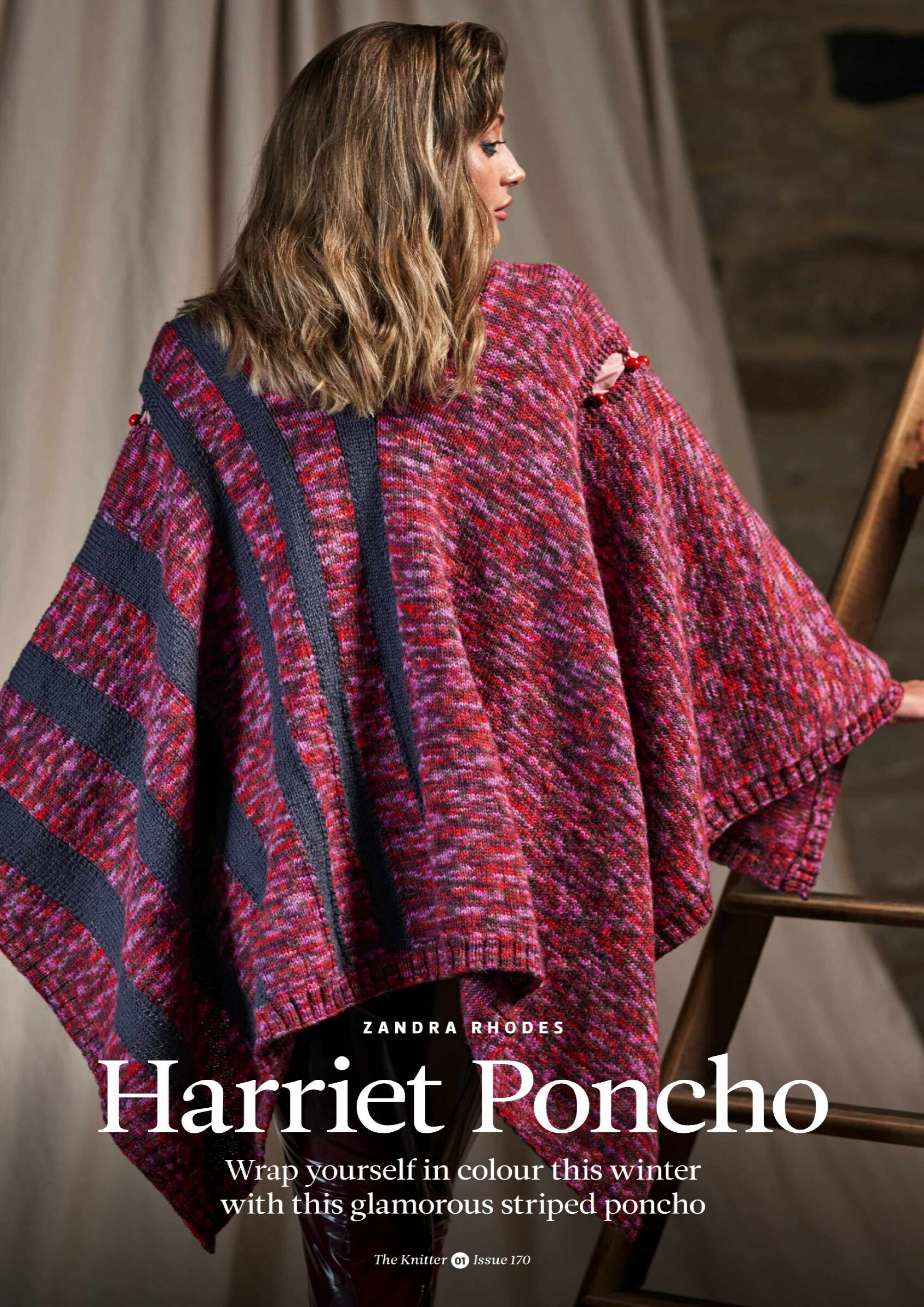

**THIS PONCHO** from iconic fashion designer Zandra Rhodes is worked in one piece, and features side splits stretching across each shoulder. These are fastened with buttons and button loops. The design showcases one of the vibrant new shades developed for West Yorkshire Spinners' ColourLab yarn range.

## PATTERN NOTES

### INTARSIA TECHNIQUE

When working with more than one colour, twist the yarn about to be used around the colour just used, to link the yarns together and avoid holes.

### BODY

(worked in one piece from front to back)  
Using 3.25mm needles and yarn A, cast on 300 sts.

**Row 1 (RS):** P1, \*K2, P2; rep from \* to last 3 sts, K2, P1.

**Row 2:** K1, P2, \*K2, P2; rep from \* to last st, K1.

These 2 rows set 2x2 rib.  
Work 9 rows more in rib.

**Row 12 (WS):** Rib 2, rib2tog, (rib 6, rib2tog, rib 5, rib2tog) 19 times, rib 6, rib2tog, rib 3.  
260 sts.

Change to 4mm needles.

Beg with a knit row, work in st st in vertical stripes as foll:

**Row 1 (RS):** Using yarn A, K10, using yarn B, K10, (using yarn A, K18, using yarn B, K10) twice, using yarn A, K18, (using yarn B, K6, using yarn A, K9) twice, using yarn B, K6, using yarn A, knit to end.

## SIZE

One size.

Width: 126cm (49½in)

Length: 66cm (26in)

## YARN

**West Yorkshire Spinners** ColourLab DK (DK weight; 100% British wool; 225m/245yds per 100g ball)

**A** Botanical Bloom (1030); 9 x 100g balls

**B** Stormy Grey (373); 3 x 100g balls

**Row 2:** Using yarn A, P130, using yarn B, P6, (using yarn A, P9, using yarn B, P6) twice, using yarn A, P18, (using yarn B, P10, using yarn A, P18) twice, using yarn B, P10, using yarn A, P10. These 2 rows set st st and position of vertical stripes.

Keeping continuity of patt as set, cont until work measures 39cm from cast-on edge, ending with RS facing for next row.

### DIVIDE FOR SPLIT

**Next row (RS):** Patt 94 sts, turn, leave rem 166 sts on needle.

Working on these 94 sts for the Left Front only, proceed as foll:

**Next row (WS):** Sl 1, K3, patt to end.

**Next row:** Patt.

**Next row:** Sl 1, K3, patt to end.

These last 2 rows set split with garter stitch border.

Keeping continuity of patt work 67 rows more.

Break off yarn and leave these 94 sts on a holder.

With RS facing, rejoin appropriate yarn to rem 166 sts left on needle and proceed as foll:

**Next row (RS):** Sl 1, patt 71, turn and leave rem 94 sts on needle.

Working on these 72 sts for the Centre Front only, proceed as foll:

**Next row (WS):** Sl 1, K3, patt to last 4 sts, K4.

**Next row:** Sl 1, K3, patt to last 4 sts, K4.

**Next row:** Sl 1, K3, patt to last 4 sts, K4.

These last 2 rows set garter stitch Borders and Shoulder Split.

Work 6 rows more.

## NEEDLES & ACCESSORIES

1 pair 4mm (UK 8/US 6) knitting needles

1 pair 3.25mm (UK 10/US 3) knitting needles

4mm (UK 8/US 6) circular needles, 100cm long

3.25mm (UK 10/US 3) circular needles, 100cm long

Stitch holders

8 buttons

### DIVIDE FOR NECK SPLIT

**Next row:** Sl 1, K3, patt 28, K4 and leave rem 130 sts on needle.

Working on these 36 sts for Left Centre only, proceed as foll:

**Next row (WS):** Sl 1, K3, patt 28, K4.

**Next row:** Sl 1, K3, patt 28, K4.

**Next row:** Sl 1, K3, patt 28, K4.

These last 2 rows set garter stitch border for Shoulder Split.

Work 57 rows more.

Leave these 36 sts on a holder.

With RS facing, rejoin appropriate yarn to 130 Right Front sts left on needle and proceed as foll:

**Next row (RS):** Sl 1, K35, turn, leave rem 94 sts on needle.

Working on these 36 Right Centre sts only, proceed as foll:

**Next row (WS):** Sl 1, K3, P28, K4.

**Next row:** Sl 1, knit to end.

**Next row:** Sl 1, K3, purl to last 3 sts, K3.

These last 2 rows set garter stitch border for Neck and Shoulder Split.

Work 57 rows more.

Leave these 36 sts on a holder.

With RS facing, rejoin appropriate yarn to rem 94 sts for Right Front and proceed as foll:

**Next row (RS):** Sl 1, knit to end.

**Next row:** Purl to last 4 sts, K4.

These 2 rows set st st and garter stitch Border at shoulder split.

Work 69 rows more.

**Next row (WS):** Purl across 94 sts for Right Front, then work across 36 held Right Centre sts as foll:  
P32, K4, turn, leave rem 130 sts on needle.

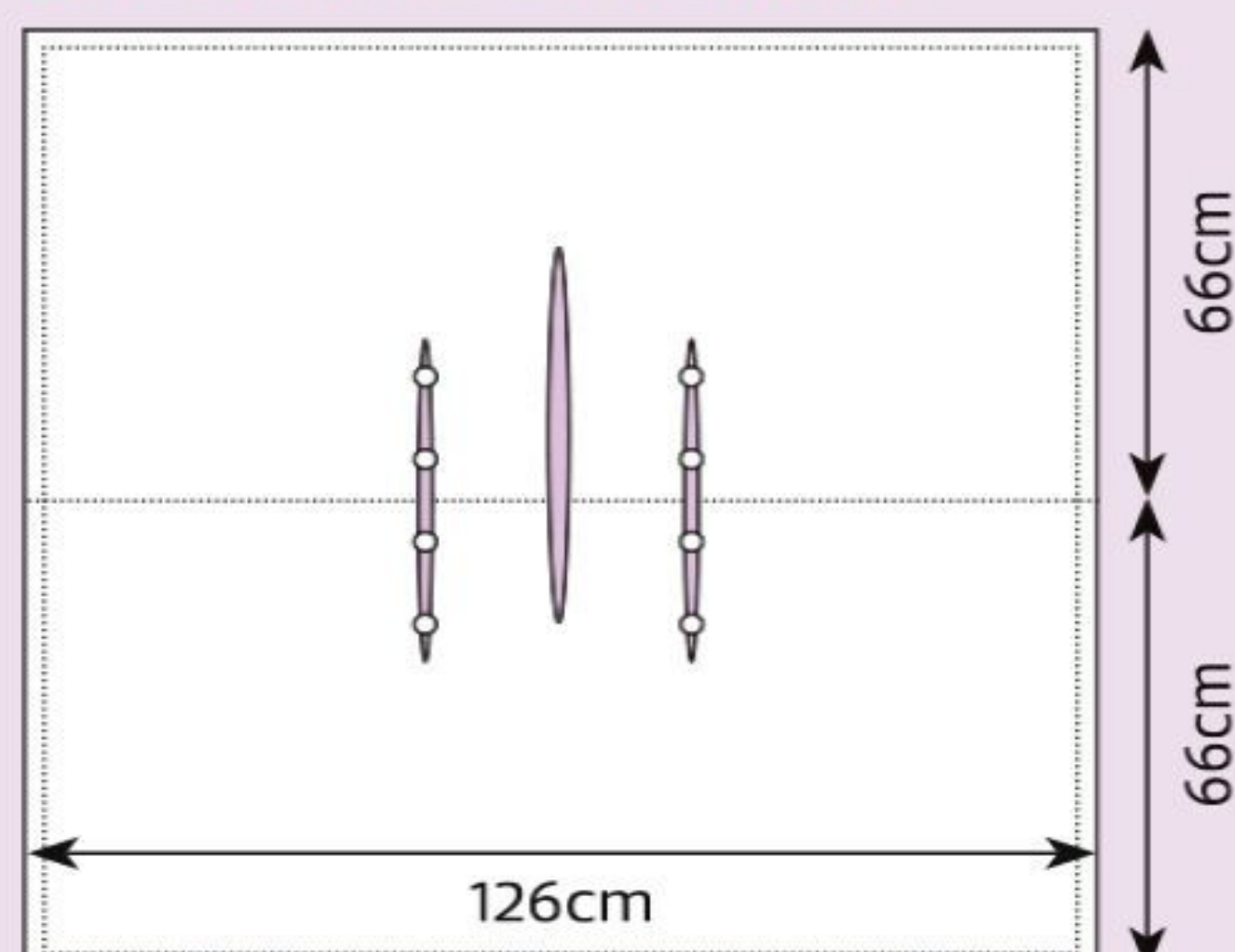
## SPECIAL ABBREVIATIONS

**K3tog:** Knit 3 sts together.

**Rib2tog:** Knit or purl 2 sts together.

## BLOCKING DIAGRAM



This project is taken from the *Make a Statement* collection by Zandra Rhodes for West Yorkshire

Spinners, which has 15 patterns for women. To order a copy for £16.95, or to find your nearest stockist, call **01535 664500** or visit **[www.wyspinners.com](http://www.wyspinners.com)**.

Working on 130 Right Front sts only, proceed as foll:

**Next row (RS):** Sl1, knit to end.

**Next row:** Purl to last 4 sts, K4.

These 2 rows set st st and garter stitch Border at neck edge.

Work 20 rows more.

Leave these sts on needle.

With WS facing and keeping continuity of garter stitch as set, work across 130 held Left Front sts as foll:

K4, P32, purl across 94 sts.

130 sts.

Working on these 130 sts only, proceed as foll:

**Next row (RS):** Sl1, knit to end.

**Next row:** Sl1, K3, purl to end.

These 2 rows set st st and garter stitch Border at neck edge.

Work 20 rows more.

**Next row:** Patt across 130 Left Front sts, then with RS facing knit across 130 Right Front sts rem on holder. 260 sts.

Cont until Back measures same as Front (63cm) ending with WS facing for next row.

Break off yarn B.

Change to 3.25mm needles and yarn A.

**Next row:** P3, M1, (P7, M1, P6, M1) 19 times, P7, M1, P3. 300 sts.

**Next row:** P1, \*K2, P2; rep from \* to last 3 sts, K2, P1.

**Next row:** K1, P2, \*K2, P2; rep from \* to last st, K1.

These 2 rows set 2x2 rib.

Work 9 rows more in rib.

Cast off in rib.

## SIDE BORDERS

(both alike)

With RS facing, using 3.25mm needles and yarn A, beginning at cast-on/cast-off edge of rib, pick up and knit 10 sts evenly along purl stitch of rib, 272 sts evenly along side edge to rib, and 10 sts evenly along purl stitch of rib.

292 sts.

**Next row (WS):** Sl1, P2, \*K2, P2; rep from \* to last st, K1.

**Next row:** Sl1, \*K2, P2; rep from \* to last 3 sts, K3.

These 2 rows set 2x2 rib.

Work 9 rows more in rib.

Cast off in rib.

## MAKING UP

Overstitch start and finish of shoulder and neck splits to reinforce and avoid pulling.

## BUTTON LOOPS

Place markers for four button loops along both shoulder split openings, on the edge nearest the neck.

Place the first marker 4cm down from top of the split, and the fourth marker 4cm up from start of the split, then space the other two evenly in between.

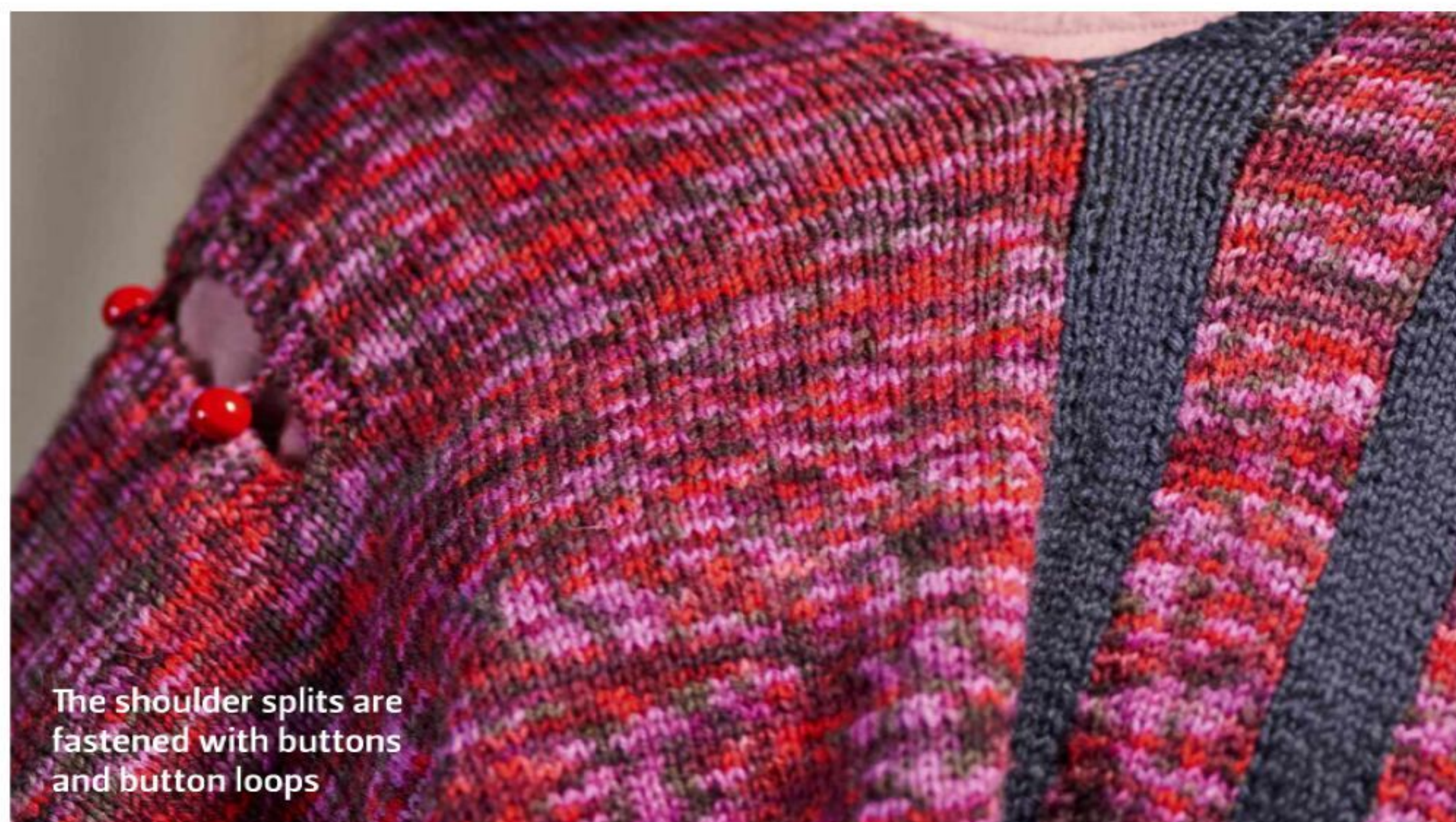
Using two strands of yarn B, make a button loop by securing yarn to marked position. Make a loop to desired length and secure at base of loop. Now work buttonhole stitch around loop until it is reinforced. Fasten off.

Repeat for other button loops.

Sew on buttons to other side of split corresponding with button loops.

## TO FINISH

Pin the garment out to measurements, cover with a damp cloth and leave to dry, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band. ☺

# Celebrating COLOUR

Janine Sterland speaks to renowned fashion designer Zandra Rhodes about her exciting new collection of yarns and patterns for West Yorkshire Spinners



**THE BRITISH** designer Zandra Rhodes has had a huge influence on the world of fashion during a career

spanning 50 years. Famous for her exuberant colour combinations and innovative silhouettes (and for her iconic pink hair!), Zandra has long had a love of knitwear, having been taught to knit by her grandmother.

This year, she has teamed up with British yarn company West Yorkshire Spinners to develop six brand-new colourways for its most popular and versatile yarns, Signature 4ply and ColourLab DK range. These include six unique, vibrant and variegated colourways, including 'Zandra's

Rainbow', 'Forest Stripes', and 'Sunset Bouquet'.

Zandra has also created a collection of wearable, colourful handknit patterns showcasing these new colourways, in the pattern book *Make A Statement*. The book contains 15 designs for women, including chic sweaters and cardigans, glamorous shawls and ponchos, and bright accessories.

We caught up with Zandra to gain an insight into the inspiration behind her striking new collection of yarns and patterns.

**Have you always had a passion for knitwear and hand knitting?**

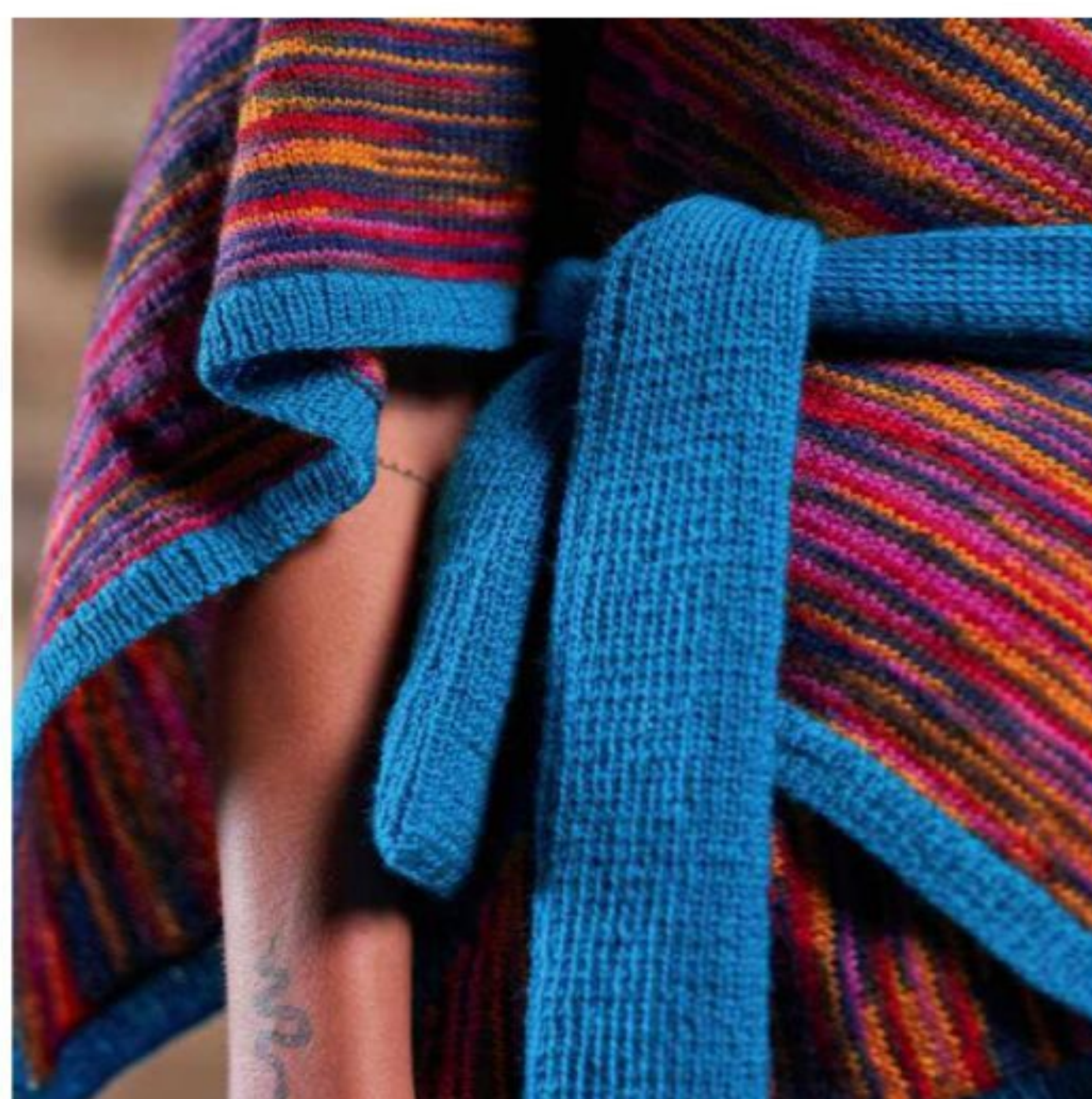
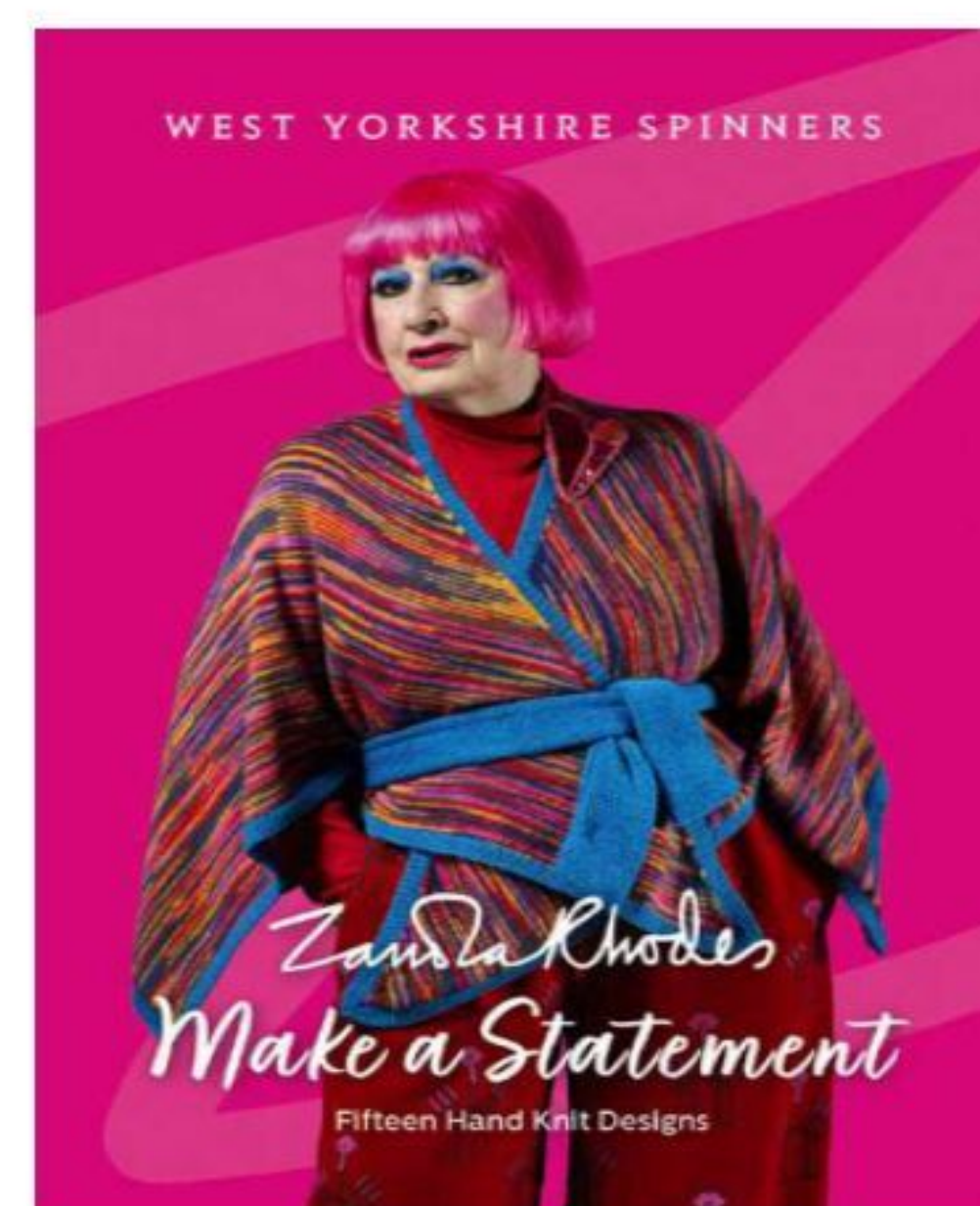
"Just in 2019, before we had even heard of Covid-19, I was asked to open

a knitting show in San Francisco – it made me so aware of all of the knitting techniques and trends! And then came Covid; this increased the time I had available to get back into hobbies and ancient crafts. I think the pandemic has made us all so aware of the handicrafts and things we can do – there is nothing more rewarding than using your own hands and creating. There is a beautiful rebirth of DIY traditions – arts and crafts are back, and bigger than ever!"

**How did you become aware of the yarn company West Yorkshire Spinners, and what started your collaboration with them?**

"I had seen West Yorkshire Spinners' professional catalogues, and I loved





that they concentrated on and promoted fabulous British product. Through Instagram I learnt about their use of British wool and how they spin all their yarns themselves at their Yorkshire mill. The collaboration came as a natural decision – a British product infused with a British designer. What could be better!”

**How long did the design development process take for the yarn collection and *Make A Statement* pattern collection, where did it take place, and what stages were involved in terms of pattern and colour?**

“Everything took place within the peace of the lockdown, but online. It was a completely new way of working – we were thoroughly talked through the design process and colour processes that West Yorkshire Spinners work with, including their different techniques such as spray, stripe and merging stripes. Colour

combinations are what I like to think the Zandra Rhodes brand does so well. So, once we understood how everything worked, we really started to put together some special combinations – Covid just got a whole lot brighter!”

**What is your design philosophy behind this collection, and can you describe the inspiration behind the garment silhouettes and patterns?**

“What was wonderful was to work with a totally UK-made product; this made me think of the *Flower Fairies* poems by Cicely Mary Barker, and the great British countryside. Also, thinking of fabulous walks wearing the jumpers and cardigans inspired by woodlands, wild flowers and the inspirational magical effects that can be created just using this wool – such as the rainbow space-dye effect.

“The inspiration for the silhouettes came from my existing wardrobe and what I wanted to wear, such as my

favourite puffed-sleeve jumper that I love, the shawl – always an essential in cold weather – and above all the long rainbow-stripe scarf. I look forward to going on my autumnal walks in all of these fabulous pieces.”

**In comparison to your collections which include cut and sew garments, how did the techniques and processes involved in this knitwear collection determine the shapes of the designs?**

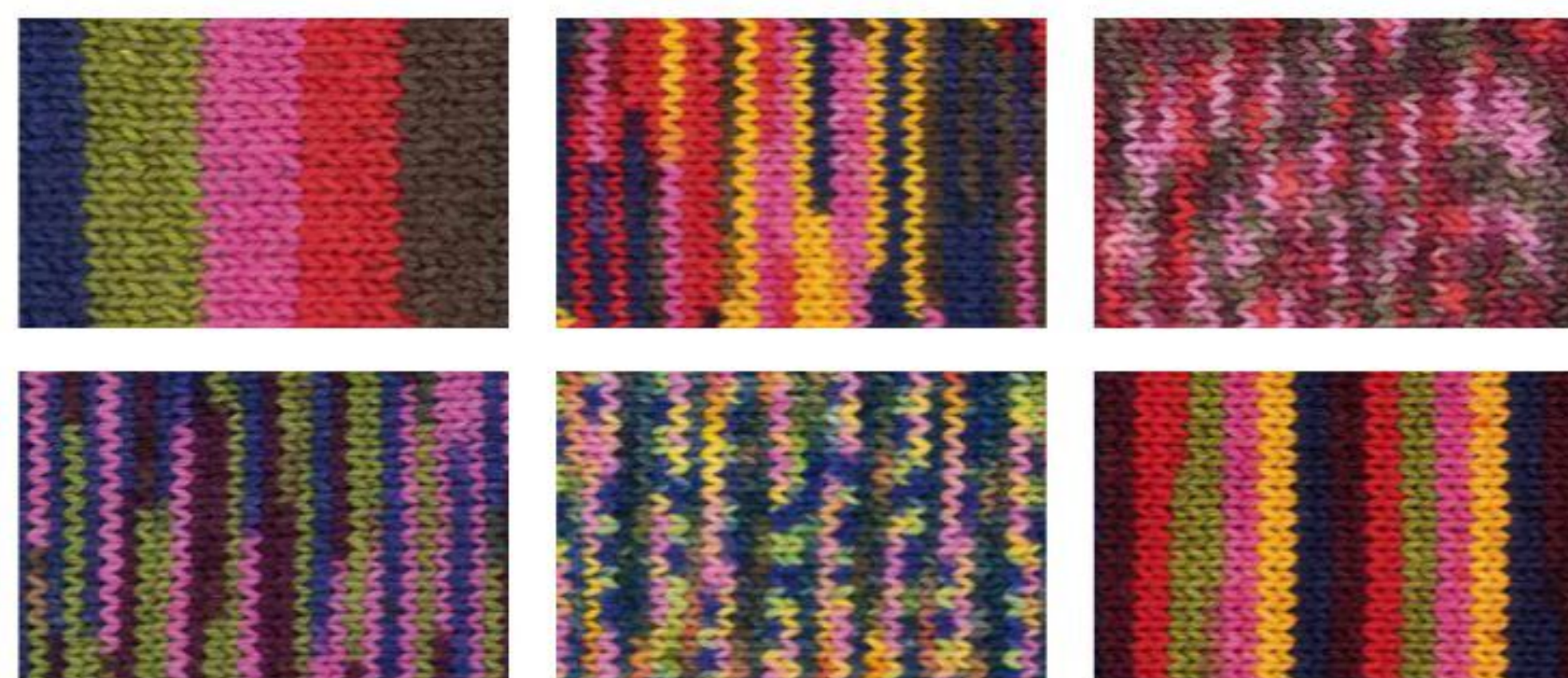
“What is so exciting about a knitwear collection is the inspirational feel and look of the yarn. Knitting is such a tactile craft, and even more exciting because of the way this yarn has been dyed. Sometimes I had to knit a section first in order to think of what I could design with it. When I saw how beautifully the pattern and colours looked, I could then work out shapes that featured what the knitted wool would look like. For example, knitting and crocheting the pompoms of the hats to the size I saw fit, making

them bigger and adapting them to the hat."

**Can you explain how you developed the unique colourways for these yarns?**

"I started with a core palette of seven shades which reflect my love of nature. I then experimented with different colour combinations, using a digital painting technique and applying them to West Yorkshire Spinners' fabulous prints. It all came together very organically and poetically."

**How did you select the colour combinations and decide on the placement of colour within each garment design?**

"I started off how I usually start my colour processes when designing a garment, by putting different colours together on paper in a freeform way. I then started to think what shapes would work with the colours, and the pool of colour really gave me the feel of the British countryside."

"Once the colour combinations were solidified, I could then visualise where they could go on the garments. For example, the rainbow stripe on the puff sleeve of the cardigan would pop against a colourblock body. It really was dependent on the placement and the style of the garment."

**As the most popular yarns in the West Yorkshire Spinners range, do you have any thoughts regarding Signature 4ply and ColourLab?**

"The colours on the Signature 4ply and the ColourLab are so vibrant and striking! I was in awe of not only the colours, but the quality of the yarn. Also as this collection features the variegated and striped yarns, I was able to include an experimentation of my all-time favourite colours."

**What do you hope people will feel when creating and then wearing these knitwear designs?**

"They will be creating their own Zandra

Rhodes work of art! It will feel extra rewarding as they will be wearing something that has been made by them with love! As for me, I can't wait for the colder days so I can wear my puffed sleeved jumper and pompom hats and go out for walks - my friends across the globe are all looking forward to knitting my things."

**What has been the most rewarding part of this project?**

"The final collection looks so happy and joyful - just what we need after coming out of lockdowns. It's what the world needs right now, and the joy it will bring is the most rewarding part of it all!" ☺
