



## BOKO-BOKO COWL

ボコボコ - bumpy

Inspired by several of my previous designs, this cowl comes as a representation of my continuous fascination with textures. Exploration and application of it in knitwear, while making them wearable and easily transforming them into statement pieces for anyone's wardrobe.

Available in 3 sizes, you can create your own but make sure to preserve the spiked texture by selecting to carry a single strand of steel fiber yarn together with the working yarn.

#### SKILL LEVEL

Beginner Intermediate

#### FINISHED MEASUREMENTS (UNSTRETCHED)

17.5 (24.5, 35)" circumference

7.5 (7.5, 12.5)" tall

#### YARN

About 375 (575, 1000) yards of fingering weight yarn

#### *Smallest Version shown in*

Jill Draper Esopus (100% US grown wool), 500yds/457m per 113g/3.99oz;

1 skein in color Bone

*held together with*

Neighborhood Fiber Co Chromium (69% Silk Noil, 31% Stainless Steel) 413 yards per 28g/1oz;

1 skein in color Charles Centre

#### *Largest Version shown in*

Jill Draper Esopus (100% US grown wool), 500yds/457m per 113g/3.99oz;

2 skeins in color Graphite

#### NEEDLE

US 4 (3.5 mm) circular, 24" long

OR USE NEEDLE TO OBTAIN GAUGE

#### GAUGE

1 pattern repeat (42 sts wide and 28 rnds tall) measures 3.5" wide and 2.5" long (unblocked and unstretched)

#### NOTIONS

Crochet hook size D/3.25mm

Stitch markers

Tapestry needle

Row counter (optional)

#### NOTES

This cowl is worked in the round. The stitch pattern is a repeat of 42 sts and 28 rounds. We recommend placing markers between each 42-st repeat for ease of working, with a different colored marker for the beginning of the round.

Choose natural fiber yarns that have a tighter twist to help preserve the 3-D texture while wearing. You can choose to use a different weight of yarn for this accessory. Heavier (dk, worsted) weights will produce a larger, more substantial size accessory while lighter (lace) weight will produce a smaller, more ethereal accessory.

In the smaller cowl shown, two yarns are held together throughout.

## TECHNIQUES

## Crochet Chain Cast On

With crochet hook, make a slip knot loop. Holding the knitting needle in your left hand, and the crochet hook in your right hand, bring the yarn behind the needle. \*With the crochet hook in front of the needle, wrap the yarn over the needle and the hook, and pull loop through. 1 st has been cast on the needle. Bring the yarn back between the needle and hook and repeat from \* until you have cast on the required number of stitches less one. For the final stitch, transfer the loop from the crochet hook to the needle.

## Boko-Boko Stitch Pattern (multiple of 42 sts)

Rounds 1 - 13: \*K1, [ssk, yo, p1] 6 times, ssk, yo, k1, [yo, k2tog, p1] 6 times, yo, k2tog; rep from \* to end.

Round 14: \*K1, [yo, ssk, p1] 6 times, yo, ssk, k1, [k2tog, yo, p1] 6 times, k2tog, yo; rep from \* to end.

Rounds 15 - 27: \*K1, [yo, k2tog, p1] 6 times, yo, k2tog, k1, [ssk, yo, p1] 6 times, ssk, yo; rep from \* to end.

Round 28: \*K1, [k2tog, yo, p1] 6 times, k2tog, yo, k1, [yo, ssk, p1] 6 times, yo, ssk; rep from \* to end.

Repeat Rounds 1-28 for pattern.

## ABBREVIATIONS

BO - bind off

CO - cast on

k - knit

k2tog - knit 2 stitches together (right leaning decrease)

m - marker

p - purl

pm - place marker

rem - remain/s/ing

rep - repeat

rnd(s) - round/s

ssk - slip, slip, knit 2 slipped sts together (left leaning decrease)

yo - yarn over

## DIRECTIONS

Using the Crochet Chain method, CO 210 (294, 420) sts onto circular needle.

Join to work in the round, pm for beginning of round.

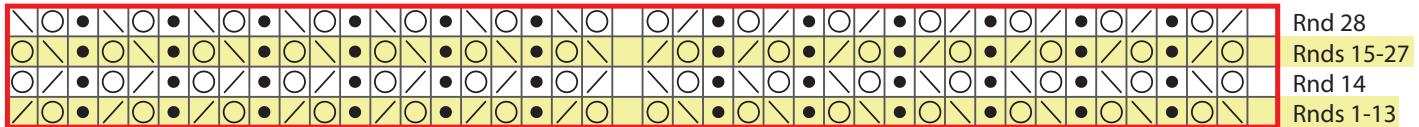
Work Rounds 1-28 of the Boko-Boko Stitch Pattern 2 (2, 4) times (placing a marker after each 42-st repeat on the first round), then work Rounds 1-27 again.

Loosely BO all sts in the pattern of the last worked round (i.e. bind off while repeating Round 27).

## FINISHING

Weave in ends. To avoid flattening the pattern, do not wash or block.

The chart shows the stitch pattern in a condensed form, as there are many identical rows. The highlighted rows are each worked a total of 13 times.
