
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A little love letter:

Thank you so much for purchasing my Fluffy Bouquet Blanket™ pattern! I just wanted share a few words about the blanket itself ^~^

This blanket is a modified version of my original Surprise Bouquet Blanket™, a personal passion project! It was inspired by @happycrocheta's famous food blankets that fold up into slices and Laia Crochet's morning glory flower pot coasters (after seeing @otiliacrafts make one on Instagram). I

absolutely love flowers and all things nature-related, so back in March of 2023, I dreamt up a blanket that could roll into a bouquet! Starting in late June during my summer trip, I began to work on my blanket daily. In late July and over 60 hours later, I finally finished my first Surprise Bouquet Blanket™! I was so proud to see the finished project on my couch. The blanket went viral on Tiktok and Instagram on September 24th, only six days before my birthday! So on my



birthday, I launched the very first version of my Surprise Bouquet Blanket™ pattern! Ever since then, I've crocheted 3/13 commissioned blankets and made 6,500+ pattern sales combined on my Etsy and Student Made Marquette shops! I have also made four video tutorials, along with minor and major improvements to the original pattern with the help of the community =)

I also wanted to explore different ways to improve my original pattern. So, here I am with a modified version of the original pattern. Some differences between the original and the modified version:

- Number of stems ~ The original pattern had 12 stems while this one has 10. I had originally written the pattern fully freehand, and I didn't know at the time that DC circles

tend to start with 10 DC. The additional 2 had led some people to experience bulk near the stems, so I removed them! This also means we have to do less stitches to reach the final product.

- Leaves ~ I rearranged some of the stitches on the leaf so that the outer side is the longer side, making it look somewhat pointier and more realistic. With the blanket yarn specifically, these leaves also lay flatter and curl less!
- Yarn/sizing ~ The original pattern was written for worsted yarn, which is what I had on hand at the time. This pattern is specifically written for blanket yarn, so this will be easier to follow for people using blanket yarn!



I want to thank all my friends and family who supported me through the design process of my blanket. I would also like to thank all my supporters and followers, because they are honestly so sweet and the number of times they've made me happiness-cry is part of the reason I'm still going! I would also like to thank you, dear crocheter, for giving my pattern a try

and being a part of this creative journey.

That being said, this pattern took a lot of work to make! It's a product of love <3 So I would appreciate it if you **do not repost, translate, reproduce, sell, or claim this or any part of this pattern as your own. Do not make any video tutorials without my express permission.** If you see this pattern being sold by a shop under a name other than Little Artsy Aloe, please ask the person to take it down and email me at littleartsyaloe@gmail.com. On the other hand, feel free to sell the finished blankets, but please remember to credit me (Jonalie Zamora) as the designer and make them in small quantities. If you sell them, I suggest you keep

Background Info

The following is some background information about the pattern, such as experience level, materials, terminology used, and additional notes. PLEASE read through them before contacting me with questions.

Experience Level

- Intermediate

Gauge

- 4 rounds = 8.5 inches in diameter

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Materials

- Blanket: 1320 yards of bulky (weight 6) yarn
 - I used six (6) skeins of Bernat Baby Blanket in Deep Sea
- Flowers: 440 yards of bulky yarn
 - I used one skein of Bernat Blanket: Perfect Phasing in Crimson and one skein of Bernat Blanket: Ombre in Burgundy
- Size 8mm crochet hook
- Tapestry needle
- Stitch marker (optional)

Terms (US)

Rnd/Row – Round number #

MR – magic ring

ch – chain

st – stitch

sc – single crochet

dc – double crochet

inc dc – increase/2 dc in one st

fpdc – Front post double crochet

slst – slip stitch

RIGHT LEAF – follow the instructions in the “Right Leaf” section

LEFT LEAF – follow the instructions in the “Left Leaf” section

chsp – chain space/space formed by a chain

pc – popcorn stitch - 4 dc into the same st, remove the hook and insert it into the first dc. Hook the active loop and pull through the first dc

chsp – space formed between two stitches (in this case, between dc's specifically)

pcchsp – chain space formed by popcorn sts

skip # st – skip a certain number of stitches

(...) x # – repeat a certain number of times

(...) – total number of stitches in a round when it is complete

Important Notes

- Finished dimensions will be 50 inches in diameter
- Ch's at the beginning of the round DOES NOT COUNT AS A STITCH
- A dc and fpdc in the same st is equal to one (1) inc
- When making the leaves, it helps to rotate the blanket
- **The leaves are made directly in the pattern, connected to the fpdc's! This is a no-sew pattern!**
- Expect this project to take at least 50 hours! I recommend working in small increments per day. Slow and steady wins the race ^~^

The Blanket







Rnd 1: Ch 2, 10 dc into MR, slst into top of ch 2 (10)

Rnd 2: Ch 2, Inc dc x 10, slst into top of ch 2 (20)

Note: In Rnd 3, you'll establish the first set of stems, which are composed of fpdc's. If done correctly, you will have 5 stems (one on every other increase). You should make your dc's tighter on this round to prevent bumpiness in your blanket.

Rnd 3: Ch 2, (2 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, dc, inc dc) x 5, slst into top of ch 2 (30)





Note: When you fpdc in the same st as previous dc, you are increasing your stitch count.

Rnd 4: Ch 2, (2 dc, 2 fpdc in same st, 2 dc, inc dc) x 5, slst into top of ch 2 (40)

Rnd 5: Ch 2, (3 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st, 3 dc, inc dc) x 5, slst into top of ch 2 (50)



Note: In Rnd 6, you'll establish the second set of stems and continue adding onto the first set of stems. If done correctly, you will have 10 stems. You should make your dc's tighter on this round to prevent bumpiness in your blanket.

Rnd 6: Ch 2, (4 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st, 5 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc) x 5, slst into top of ch 2 (60)



Rnd 7: Ch 2, (5 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st, 5 dc, 2 fpdc in same st) x 5, slst into top of ch 2 (70)

Rnd 8: Ch 2, (6 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2 (80)

Rnd 9: Ch 2, (7 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2 (90)



We will now start adding pairs of leaves on every other vine. Note that the leaves are worked directly into the pattern - no sewing necessary!

Rnd 10: Ch 2, (8 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, **RIGHT LEAF**, fpdc in next st, **LEFT LEAF**, 8 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 5, slst into top of ch 2 (100)



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Not coming up to the correct number of stitches after a leaf row? Try looking for these commonly missed stitches:



Rnd 11: Ch 2, (9 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2
(110)

Rnd 12: Ch 2, (10 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2
(120)

Rnd 13: Ch 2, (11 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2
(130)

Rnd 14: Ch 2, (12 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2
(140)

Rnd 15: Ch 2, (13 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2
(150)

Rnd 16: Ch 2, (14 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2
(160)

Rnd 17: Ch 2, (15 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st, 15 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, **RIGHT LEAF**, fpdc in next st, **LEFT LEAF**) x 5, slst into top of ch 2 (170)

Rnd 18: Ch 2, (16 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2 (180)

Rnd 19: Ch 2, (17 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2 (190)

Rnd 20: Ch 2, (18 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2 (200)

Rnd 21: Ch 2, (19 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2 (210)

Rnd 22: Ch 2, (20 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2 (220)

Rnd 23: Ch 2, (21 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2 (230)

Rnd 24: Ch 2, (22 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, **RIGHT LEAF**, fpdc in next st, **LEFT LEAF**, 22 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 5, slst into top of ch 2 (240)

Rnd 25: Ch 2, (23 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2 (250)

Rnd 26: Ch 2, (24 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2 (260)

Rnd 27: Ch 2, (25 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2 (270)

Rnd 28: Ch 2, (26 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2 (280)

Rnd 29: Ch 2, (27 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2
(290)

Rnd 30: Ch 2, (28 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2
(300)

Rnd 31: Ch 2, (29 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st, 29 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, **RIGHT LEAF**, fpdc in next st, **LEFT LEAF**) x 5, slst into top of ch 2 (310)

Rnd 32: Ch 2, (30 dc, fpdc in same st as previous dc, fpdc in next st) x 10, slst into top of ch 2
(320)

Leaves

Right Leaf

This is worked directly off the fpdc, no sewing required!

Row 1: Ch 6, slst in 2nd ch from the hook, hdc and dc in same st, 2 dc, hdc and slst in the same st, slst through the fpdc.

Note: For the “slst through the fpdc,” insert your hook through the left-hand side of the fpdc.


Make sure your yarn is behind the leaf and to the right of the fpdc before completing the slst.

This will hide the slst on the backside of the blanket. This applies to any time you are instructed to slst through the fpdc or multiple fpdc's.



You are now working on the other side of the ch 6.

Row 2: slst and hdc in the same st, 2 dc, dc and hdc in same st, slst.


Slst down the center of the leaf.















Left Leaf

This is worked directly off the fpdc, no sewing required!

Row 1: Ch 6, slst in 2nd ch from the hook, hdc and dc in same st, 2 dc, hdc and slst in the same st, slst through the POSTS of BOTH fpdc's.

You are now working on the other side of the ch 6.

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Row 2: slst and hdc in the same st, 2 dc, dc and hdc in same st, slst.

Slst down the center of the leaf. Slst through the POSTS of BOTH fpdc's.

Note: When completing the next dc, push the leaf under your hook so you crochet over the top of it. This will help keep it in place.

Vines




Vine Row: (sc, sc and ch 5, slst into the 3rd ch from the hook, ch 2, skip 3 sts from the base of the chain and sc, sc, **All in the same st: sc and ch3, [tr, ch 1,] x 2, tr, ch 3, sc**) x 40 (40 vines, 40 flowers)

*Note: All the **bolded instructions in the same stitch** can be referred to as a “**Flower Base.**” If you purchase any alternate flower modification guides from my shop, you can replace these instructions with the **Flower Base** instructions in your modification guides. This would allow you*

to make the alternate flowers in your Bouquet Blanket™! Alternatively, you can replace the entire **Vine Row** with the vine instructions in your modification guides!







Morning Glory Flowers

Use your Flower color(s). These morning glory flowers are no-sew!

Bud


Start in the first chsp of any **Flower Base**. Use your flower color.

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Rnd 1: Ch 2. *This counts as one (1) dc.* 4 dc into the same chsp, remove the hook and insert it into the first dc. Hook the active loop and pull through the first dc. *This is a popcorn stitch, and will be referred to as "pc."* (Pc in next chsp) x 3, slst into top of first pc (3 pchsp)








Petals

Please note: the fourth pcchsp is the gap between the first and last pc, where you joined them!

Look at the pictures for guidance =)

Rnd 1: Ch 1, (4 sc in same pcchsp) x 4, slst into top of ch 1 (16)





Rnd 2: (slst, in same st: sc, ch 1, sc) x 8 (8 petals)





Slst into the top of Ch 2 and fasten off with a short tail. Make one flower in every **Flower Base** from the **Vine Row** (40 flowers in total).

All done! Enjoy your new blanket and have a splendidferous day!
