




Pattern Whale Oliver

Materials:

- yarn: YarnArt Baby 50 g (color № 3072)
- needles: double pointed 3.0 mm
- stitchmarker
- sewing needle
- toy eyes 5-6 mm
- filler for toy
- yarn for sweater Alize Cashmira 100 g (color №56)



Abbreviations:

k - knit.

p- purl.

k2tog - knit 2 stitches together for the front of the loop.

st - stitch.

kfb - knit into the front and back of a stitch, an increase.

ch - chain (air loop)




Whale Oliver measures 17 cm. Depending on the yarn and needle size, you may have a larger or smaller whale.





Attention:

1. The stitches are visually divided into 3 sections while knitting. (As from the very beginning of knitting, the stitches are equally divided into 3 needles.) Knit in the round.
2. Try to knit tightly. If the stitches are not tight, try using smaller needles.
3. If your toy is intended for a child under 3 years old, use safety eyelets or you can embroider them with thread.



Let's start knitting:

Cast on 45 stitches on double pointed needles.

Divide the 45 stitches into three needles ($45:3=15$)

with 15 stitches per needle.



Knit 16 rounds. 1-16 rounds: knit 45 stitches.



For comfort, mark the beginning or end of a row with a stitchmarker.

Round 17: k6, k2tog., k28, k2tog, k7 (43 st)

Round 18: k43

Round 19: k5, k2tog, k27, k2tog, k7 (41st)

Round 20: k41

Round 21: k4, k2tog, k7, k2tog, k11, k2tog, k4, k2tog, k7 (37 st)

Round 22: k37

Round 23: k4, k2tog, k6, k2tog, k9, k2tog, k4, k2tog, k6 (33 st)

Round 24 - 28: k33 (5 rounds)





At this stage, turn out our knitted fabric up to row 28 and sew using a mattress stitch.



Attantion:

Sew in halves so that our first points of the cut in the process will be the eyelets (as in the photo).



Round 29: k4, k2tog, k9, k2tog, k9, k2tog, k5 (30 st)

Round 30-31: k30 (2 rounds)

Round 32: k4, k2tog, k18, k2tog, k4. (28 st)

Round 33-37: k28 (5 rounds)

Round 38: k13, k2tog, k13 (27 st)

Round 39-40: k27 (2 rounds)

Round 41: k4, k2tog, k16, k2tog, k3 (25 st)

Round 42-44: k25 (3 rounds)

Round 45: k3, k2tog, k15, k2tog, k3 (23 st)

Round 46-47: k23 (2 rounds)

Round 48: k10, k2tog, k11 (22st)

Round 49: k2tog, k3, k2tog, k2tog, k4, k2tog, k2tog, k3,
k2tog (16 st)

Round 50: k2tog, k1, k2tog, k2tog, k2, k2tog, k2tog, k1,
k2tog (10 st)





Now we have 10 stitches on three needles. (Two needles have 3 stitches and one has 4 stitches). We need to divide the stitches in such a way that there are two needles with 5 stitches on them. On those needles where there are 3 stitches we threw 2 stitches from the needle where there are 4 stitches and we have 2 needles with 5 stitches on each.





Attention:



At this stage, fill the whale with filler. Not too tight, but not too weak, so that it holds its shape. Distribute the filling evenly so that there are no lumps or depressions.



Now we're going to knit the tail.

Tail knit with turning rows (work with 5 stitches per needle at the moment):

Note: Start knitting on the wrong side of the fabric.

Row 1:- k1, p4 (5 st)

Row 2: k1, kfb, k3 (6 st)

Row 3: k1, p5 (6 st)

Row 4: k1, kfb, k1, kfb, k1

Row 5: k1, p7 (8 st)

Row 6: k2, kfb, k2, kfb, k2 (10 st)

Row 7: k1, p9 (10 st)

Row 8: k10 (10 st)

Row 9: k1, p9 (10 st)

Row 10: k2tog (3 times), k4 (7 st)

Row 11: k1, p6 (7 st)

Row 12: k2tog (2 times) k3 (5 st)

Row 13: k1, p4 (5 st)

Row 14: Close all stitches



Cut the yarn and hide end.

Knit the second part of the tail
in the same way as the first.



Sew our tail at the base, closing the
hole through which you filled the
whale, trim it and hide the thread.



Side fin :



Cast on 6 stitches onto the needles. Place the stitches on the 3 needles. (3 needles with 2 stitches each).

Note:

Knit tightly so that our fin holds its shape.



Round 1: k6

Round 2: k1, kfb, k1, kfb, k1, kfb (9 st)

Round 3: k9

Round 4: k2, kfb, k5, kfb (11 st)

Round 5-10: k11 (6 rounds)

Round 11: k3, kfb, k6, kfb (13 st)

Round 12: k13

Round 13: k4, kfb, k7, kfb (15 st)

Round 14-16: k15

Close all stitches!





The second fin knit in the same way as the first.
Sew the fins onto Oliver's belly.



Begin with the eyes.
Make a bracket at
the first point (as in
the photo).



Pull the thread
through just once,
pulling it out on both
sides. Tighten a little
and you have a
tightening effect.





Then sew or glue in the duckbill for our eye.

Next, use double thread to shape the eyelids as in the photo. First form the upper eyelid and then the lower eyelid.



Pattern of the Oliver's sweater



Cast on 48 stitches on a needle and divide them into 2 other two needles, so that we have 3 needles and 16 stitches on each needle.
($48:3=16$).



Work 3 rounds of 1x1 ribbing.



Round 4-5: k48 л. (2 rounds)

Round 6: k6, k2tog, k14, k2tog, k14, k2tog, k8

Round 7: k45

Round 8: k3, close 6 st, k11, k2tog, k13, close 6 st (32 st)

Round 9: k3, ch6, k12, k2tog, k12, ch6, k3 (43 st)



Round 10: k43

Round 11: k20, k2tog, k21 (42 st)

Round 12: k6, k2tog, k11, k2tog, k12, k2tog, k7 (39 st)

Round 13: k6, k2tog, k11, k2tog, k10, k2tog, k6 (36 st)

Round 14: k5, k2tog, k10, k2tog, k10, k2tog, k5 (33 st)

Round 15: k33

Round 16: k5, k2tog, k8, k2tog, k9, k2tog, k5 (30 st)

Round 17: k30

Round 18: close all stitches.



This is the cutest little jumper we have with slits for the fins.


If you like, you can decorate it with a jacquard pattern, applique or just a pretty pendant. It all depends on your imagination.
