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SEGEL (SAIL) – PUFF-SLEEVE TOP

Big puff sleeves and picot edgings, a fine and feminine summer top worked from the bottom up.

This easy design can be worn for any occasion – work, leisure time, and parties.

YARN Alpaca Solo (100% alpaca, 183 yd/167 m / 50 g)

YARN ALTERNATIVES

Llama Silk (70% baby llama, 30% mulberry silk, 180 yd/165m / 50 g)

Junior (70% premium acrylic, 30% polyamide, 183 yd/168 m / 50 g)

GAUGE Approx. 24 sts x 32 rows/rnds in stockinette on larger size needles = 4 x 4 in / 10 x 10 cm.

Adjust needle size to obtain correct gauge if necessary.

SIZES XXS (XS, S, M, L, XL, 2XL, 3XL, 4XL)

GARMENT CHEST Approx. 33½ (35½, 37½, 39½, 42¼, 45, 47¾, 50½, 53¼) in / 85 (90, 95, 100, 107, 114, 121, 128, 135) cm

GARMENT LENGTH Approx. 24¼ (24¾, 22, 22¾, 23¾, 24½, 25¼, 26, 26¾) in / 54 (55, 56, 58, 60, 62, 64, 66, 68) cm

GARMENT SLEEVE LENGTH Approx. 2¾ (2¾, 2½, 2½, 2¾, 2¾, 3, 3, 3¼) in / 6 (6, 6.5, 6.5, 7, 7, 7.5, 7.5, 8) cm

YARN AMOUNTS AND COLORS

Approx. 250 (250, 300, 300, 350, 350, 400, 400, 450) g (color 29142, Spring Blue)

NEEDLES U. S. sizes 2.5 and 4 / 3 and 3.5 mm: 32 in / 80 cm circulars

NOTIONS stitch markers

LEVEL OF DIFFICULTY Intermediate

DESIGNER Stine Hoelgaard

STITCHES AND TECHNIQUES

M1R = make 1 right: With left needle, lift strand between 2 sts from back to front and knit into front loop = right-leaning increase.

CDD = Sl 2 tog knitwise (as if to knit together), k1, pass the 2 slipped sts over (= 2 sts decreased with a centered double decrease = CDD).

BODY

With smaller size circular, CO 204 (216, 228, 240, 256, 274, 290, 306, 324) sts. Join, being careful not to twist cast-on row; pm for beginning of rnd. Work around in stockinette until piece measures 1½ (1½, 1½, 1½, 1½, 1¾, 1¾, 1¾, 1¾) in / 3 (3, 3, 3, 3, 3.5, 3.5, 3.5, 3.5) cm.

Eyelet Rnd: *K2tog, yo*; rep *-* around (= picot foldline).

Continue around in stockinette for another 1½ (1½, 1½, 1½, 1½, 1¾, 1¾, 1¾, 1¾) in / 3 (3, 3, 3, 3, 3.5, 3.5, 3.5, 3.5) cm.

Joining Rnd: Join live sts to cast-on row. Fold piece at eyelet rnd so cast-on edge is behind rnd of live sts. K2 tog around, joining 1 live st to 1 cast-on st. Make sure the sts align as you work around.

Pm at side with sts divided evenly for front and back.

Change to larger size circular and knit around in stockinette until body measures 11 (11½, 11½, 11¾, 11¾, 12¼, 12¼, 12¾, 12¾) in / 28 (29, 29, 30, 30, 31, 31, 32, 32) cm, ending last rnd 5 (5, 5, 6, 6, 6, 7, 7, 7) sts before end of rnd.

Shape underarms

To shape underarms, BO 10 (10, 10, 12, 12, 12, 14, 14, 14) sts at each side as follows:

BO the last 5 (5, 5, 6, 6, 6, 7, 7, 7) sts of rnd you just worked + the first 5 (5, 5, 6, 6, 6, 7, 7, 7) sts of next rnd; knit until 5 (5, 5, 6, 6, 6, 7, 7, 7) sts before marker on opposite side, BO 10 (10, 10, 12, 12, 12, 14, 14, 14) sts, knit to end of rnd = 184 (196, 208, 216, 232, 250, 262, 278, 296) sts rem. Set body aside while you knit sleeves.

SLEEVES

With smaller size circular, CO 80 (82, 84, 86, 88, 90, 92, 94, 96) sts. Join, being careful not to twist cast-on row; pm for beginning of rnd. Work around in stockinette until piece measures 1½ (1½, 1½, 1½, 1½, 1¾, 1¾, 1¾) in / 3 (3, 3, 3, 3, 3.5, 3.5, 3.5, 3.5) cm.



Eyelet Rnd: *K2tog, yo*; rep *-* around (= picot foldline).

Continue around in stockinette for another 1½ (1½, 1½, 1½, 1½, 1½, 1½, 1½) in / 3 (3, 3, 3, 3, 3.5, 3.5, 3.5, 3.5) cm.

Joining Rnd: Join live sts to cast-on row. Fold piece at eyelet rnd so cast-on edge is behind rnd of live sts. K2 tog around, joining 1 live st to 1 cast-on st. Make sure the sts align as you work around

Change to larger size circular and knit around in stockinette, increasing with M1R between each st on the first rnd = 160 (164, 168, 172, 176, 180, 184, 188, 192) sts.

Continue around in stockinette until sleeve measures 2¾ (2¾, 2½, 2½, 2¾, 2¾, 3, 3, 3¼) in / 6 (6, 6.5, 6.5, 7, 7, 7.5, 7.5, 8) cm, ending last rnd 5 (5, 5, 6, 6, 6, 7, 7, 7) sts before end of rnd.

Shape underarm

To shape underarm, BO 10 (10, 10, 12, 12, 12, 14, 14, 14) sts as follows:

BO the last 5 (5, 5, 6, 6, 6, 7, 7) sts of rnd you just worked + the first 5 (5, 5, 6, 6, 6, 7, 7) sts of next rnd, knit to end of rnd = 150 (154, 158, 160, 164, 168, 170, 174, 178) sts rem. Set sleeve aside while you knit second sleeve the same way.

YOKE

Join all the pieces onto larger size circular: Knit left sleeve, then front, right sleeve, and back = 484 (504, 524, 536, 560, 586, 602, 626, 652) sts total. The rnd now begins on the back side of the left sleeve.

Knit 1 rnd, with k2tog at each intersection of body and sleeve for the raglan lines = 480 (500, 520, 532, 556, 582, 598, 622, 648) sts rem. Pm at each raglan line st.

Knit 2 rnds (all sizes), and, on the last rnd, stop 1 st before marker for beginning of rnd.

Begin the raglan shaping on next rnd:

NOTE At the first raglan decrease on the back of left sleeve, decrease right away, using last st of previous rnd.

Decrease Rnd: *Knit until 1 st rem before next marker, decrease with CDD*; rep *-* 3 more times, knit to end of rnd = 8 sts decreased around.

Knit 3 rnds. Work 2nd decrease rnd as before.

Now decrease on every other rnd 20 (21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28) times – 304 (316, 328, 332, 348, 366, 374, 390, 408) sts rem.

Each sleeve should now have 104 (106, 108, 108, 110, 114, 114, 116, 118, 112, 112, 114, 116) sts. and 96 (104, 112, 116, 128, 142, 150, 162, 176) sts rem on body.

Change to smaller size circular, knit 1 rnd, decreasing to shape puff sleeves as follows.

Knit the single raglan st at back of left sleeve, working tightly, k4tog across sleeve, knitting any extra sts at end, knit raglan st on left sleeve, knit sts across front, knit raglan st on right sleeve, tightly k4tog across right sleeve (knit any leftover sts), knit raglan st on back right sleeve, knit across back

Continue to neckband:

Pm on rnd the circular is on. Knit around in stockinette until neckband measures 1½ (1½, 1½, 1½, 1½, 1½, 1½, 1½, 1½) in / 3 (3, 3, 3, 3, 3.5, 3.5, 3.5, 3.5) cm.

Eyelet Rnd: *K2tog, yo*; rep *-* around (= picot foldline).

Continue around in stockinette for another 1½ (1½, 1½, 1½, 1½, 1½, 1½, 1½) in / 3 (3, 3, 3, 3, 3.5, 3.5, 3.5, 3.5) cm. BO rather loosely knitwise.

FINISHING

Seam underarms.

Fold neckband at eyelet rnd with bound-off edge to WS. Sew down with overhand sts to marked rnd.

Weave in all ends neatly on WS.

Wash carefully by hand or machine-wash on wool/gentle program. Pat out sweater to finished measurements and leave flat until completely dry.

A ≈ 33½ (35½, 37½, 39½, 42¼, 45, 47¾, 50½, 53¼) in / 85 (90, 95, 100, 107, 114, 121, 128, 135) cm

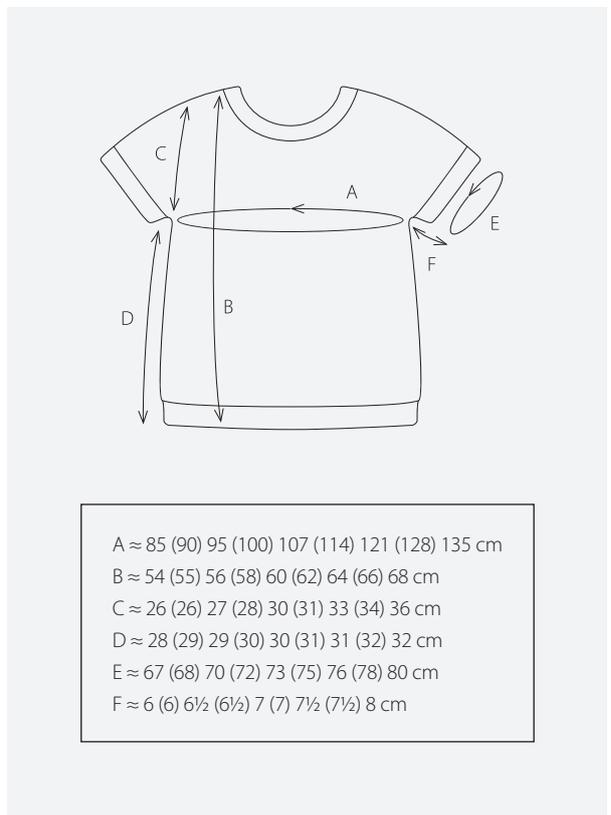
B ≈ 24¼ (24¾, 22, 22¾, 23¾, 24½, 25¼, 26, 26¾) in / 54 (55, 56, 58, 60, 62, 64, 66, 68) cm

C ≈ 10¼ (10¼, 10¾, 11, 11¾, 12¼, 13, 13½, 14¼) in / 26 (26, 27, 28, 30, 31, 33, 34, 36) cm

D ≈ 11 (11½, 11½, 11¾, 11¾, 12¼, 12¼, 12¾, 12¾) in / 28 (29, 29, 30, 30, 31, 31, 32, 32) cm

E ≈ 26½ (26¾, 27½, 28¼, 28¾, 29½, 30, 30¾, 31½) in / 67 (68, 70, 72, 73, 75, 76, 78, 80) cm

F ≈ 2¾ (2¾, 2½, 2½, 2¾, 2¾, 3, 3, 3¼) in / 6 (6, 6.5, 6.5, 7, 7, 7.5, 7.5, 8) cm





TIPS & SHORTCUTS

To avoid questions: Before you begin knitting, read through the pattern.

Stitch count: Always knit or crochet a gauge swatch as recommended in the pattern. If your stitch count doesn't match the gauge given in the pattern, try again with larger or smaller needles or hook. If your gauge doesn't match that in the pattern, your item will not be the correct size or shape.

Highlight the size you will knit or crochet throughout the pattern to make it easier to follow the instructions.

Charts: It will be easier to follow a chart if you mark your row with a ruler and magnetic board or sticky note.

Ease: The amount of ease included in our garments varies depending on the type and shape of the garment. To determine the right size, we recommend that you first measure your body. Then you can calculate the garment size depending on how much ease you want the garment to have. The schematics for each piece show all the garment measurements.

Two-color stranded knitting: When knitting more than 3-4 stitches of the same color, twist the color strands around each other on the wrong side to avoid long strands or "floats" on the back. If the yarns need to be twisted on several rows/rounds, make sure you do not stack the twists in the same place to prevent the yarns from showing through on the right side.

Tips för hand dyed yarn: Make sure you have enough yarn to complete your project. The colors may vary from time to time. To get a smooth color mix, you can alternate between two skeins: knit two rows from one and two rows from another skein.

BO = bind off, **cn** = cable needle, **CO** = cast on, **dpn(s)** = double-pointed needles, **g st** = garter stitch, **k1f&b** = knit in front and back loop of same stitch, **k** = knit (stitch), **k2tog** = knit two stitches together, **kw** = knitwise, **LH** = left hand needle, **p** = purl (stitch), **pw** = purlwise, **RH** = right hand needle, **ssk** = slip, slip, knit, **St st** = stockinette/stocking stitch, **wyib** = with yarn in back, **wyif** = with yarn in front

CROCHETING

ch = chain stitch, **dc** = double crochet, **dtr** = double treble crochet, **hdc** = half double crochet, **htr** = half treble crochet, **sc** = single crochet, **sl st** = slip stitch, **tr** = treble crochet, **tr tr** = triple treble crochet

DIFFICULTY

Beginner: Anyone with no experience knitting/crocheting. Easy techniques and clear explanations.

Adventurous Beginner: For a beginner ready to take the next step. Clear explanations so you can try some new techniques.

Intermediate: Anyone who has knitted/crocheted for a while but who wants a challenge. More advanced techniques and two steps occur at the same time.

Experienced: For experienced knitters/crocheters who have already tried many techniques and methods. Advanced/uncommon techniques and several steps occur simultaneously.
