# Dictionary

**st(s)** // stitch(es)

**r** // row

**rnd(s)** // round(s)

**BOR** // beginning of round/row

**k** // knit

**p** // purl

**k tbl** // knit through back loop

**p tbl** // purl through back loop

**sl st** // slip st

**s1wyif** // slip 1 st with yarn held in front

**pssso** // pass the slipped st over

**k2tog** // knit 2 sts together

**k2tog tbl** // knit 2 sts together through the back loop

**p2tog** // purl 2 sts together

**p2tog tbl** // purl 2 sts together through the back loop

**dec** // decrease

**inc** // increase

**yo** // yarn over

**m1L** // make 1 left inc, knitwise

**m1R** // make 1 right inc, knitwise

## About

**Size:** 35 cm in diameter x 6,5 cm in width.

**Gauge:** The wreath has one gauge, whilst the bow has another:

- *Wreath:* 26 sts x 38 rows = 10 x 10 cm in Stockinette Stitch, at needle size 3 mm (after washing).
- *Bow:* 16 sts x 26 rows = 10 x 10 cm in Stockinette Stitch, at needle size 5 mm (after washing).

**Needle sizes:** One needle size is used for the wreath, and another is used for the bow:

- *Wreath (if Magic Loop is used):* 2 sets of circular needles 3 mm (length 60 cm is recommended).
- *Wreath (if double pointed needles are used):* 1 set of double pointed needles 3 mm.
- *Bow:* 2 sets of circular needles 5 mm (length 80 cm is recommended).

**Yarn:** The green wreath is knitted with 2 threads held together, whilst the bow is knitted with 4 threads held together:

- *Colour A (wreath), 1st thread:* "Alpaca 2", in colour "Thyme", Isager (250 m per 50g).
- *Colour A (wreath), 2nd thread:* "Silk mohair", in colour "68", Isager (212 m per 25g).
- *Colour B (bow), 1st + 2nd thread:* "Alpaca 2", in colour "21", Isager (250 m per 50g).
- *Colour B (bow), 3rd + 4th thread:* "Silk Mohair", in colour "32", Isager (212 m per 25g).

**Amount:** The following amounts of yarn are used for the wreath and bow:

- *Colour A (wreath), 1st thread:* 50g.
- *Colour A (wreath), 2nd thread:* 25g.
- *Colour B (bow), 1st + 2nd thread:* 50g in total.
- *Colour B (bow), 3rd + 4th thread:* 50g in total.

**Materials:** The following materials must be used, to create the holiday wreath (*see photo 1*):

- 1 styrofoam wreath, 35 cm x 6,5 cm ([link](#)).
- 60 pins ([link](#)).
- 30 Baroque freshwater pearls, approx 10-12 mm in diameter ([link](#)).
- 30 Baroque freshwater pearls, approx 4-5 mm in diameter ([link](#)).

**Tools:** The following tools must be used, to create the holiday wreath:

- Darning needle.
- scissors.
- Stanley knife.
- Marker.

**Method:** The holiday wreath is created by following these steps:

- *Step 1:* The green wreath is made.
- *Step 2:* The red bow is knitted.
- *Step 3:* The bow is joined to the wreath.
- *Step 4:* The baroque pearls are added to the wreath.

## Pattern

### Step 1 - The green wreath is made

First, the styrofoam wreath must be prepared - this is done in the following way:

Using a marker, draw a straight line around the width of the wreath (*see photo 2*).

Now, using a stanley knife, cut the styrofoam wreath all the way through, following the drawn line (*see photo 3*).

Now, the green cylinder, which coats the styrofoam wreath, must be knitted:



With *colour A* and 2 sets of circular needles 3 mm, cast on 80 sts, using the method *Judy's Magic Cast On* - 40 sts on each of the needles.

Now, k the first 40 sts (needle 1), and then place the following 40 sts (needle 2) on a thread to rest - the resting sts must later be used, when the ends of the cylinder is sewn together.

Over the 40 sts which are left on the needle, continue to knit in the rnd in the following way:

Join the work in the rnd, and place a M between the first and last st = sM1 and *End A* - let this M follow up along the work.

Also, place a marking thread between the first and last st after the first knitted rnd, and let it rest in the work, whilst the cylinder is being knitted = sM2 and *End B*.

Now, k in the rnd, until the cylinder measures 102 cm in total.

(It is recommended, to test the length on the styrofoam wreath, throughout the knitting of the cylinder, as it is important, that it sits tight around the wreath, and doesn't become too long - otherwise it will sit loosely around the wreath, and wrinkle).

The cylinder has now been knitted.

Let sM1 and sM2 stay in the work, until the cylinder has been sewn together on the styrofoam wreath.

Break the yarn, by letting the end thread measure 40-50 cm, so that it can be used, when the ends of the cylinder is sewn together.

Now, place the 40 sts of *End A* on a thread to rest, whilst the cylinder is being prepared to be mounted onto the styrofoam wreath.

Then, continue in the following way:

Turn the WS of the cylinder to the RS - the purl sts are now at the RS.

Steam or rinse the cylinder in luke warm water, place it into shape, and let it dry laying flat.

When the cylinder has dried, the resting sts in each end, must separately be placed back onto a set of circular needles - this is done in the following way:

Starting at sM1 from the RS, place the 40 sts of *End A* on a 3 mm circular needle.

Starting at sM2 from the RS, place the 40 sts of *End B* on a new 3 mm circular needle.

Now, the cylinder must be mounted onto the styrofoam wreath:

Start, by lightly separating the ends of the styrofoam wreath (no more than 1-2 cm) where it was previously cut, to create a gap from where the cylinder can be added onto the wreath.

Continue, by pulling the knitted cylinder down along the whole styrofoam wreath (*see photo 4*).

When the whole wreath has been coated by the cylinder, let *End A* and *B* meet 10 cm to the right of the cutting line/gap of the wreath.

Now, *End A* and *B* of the cylinder must be sewn together:

Starting at sM1 and sM2, sew together the 1st st of *End A* together with the 1st st of *End B*, by using the method "Kitchener Stitch". Then, sew together the 2nd st of each end together, and continue in this way, until all 40 sts of each end has been joined (*see photo 5*).



(Note: if you are familiar with the technique “3-needle bind off”, you can also use this method to knit together the to ends).

Break the yarn, and weave in the end.

The wreath is now completed, and the bow must now be knitted (*see photo 6*).

### **Step 2 - The red bow is knitted**

With *colour B* and 2 sets of circular needles 5 mm, cast on 600 sts, using the method Judy’s Magic Cast On - 300 sts on each of the needles.

Now, k the first 300 sts (needle 1), and then place the following 300 sts (needle 2) on a thread to rest - the resting sts must later be used, when the ends of the ribbon are knitted together.

Over the 300 sts which are left on the needle, continue to knit in the rnd in the following way:

Join the work in the rnd, and place a M between the first and last st = sM1 and BOR.

Also, place a M after the 150th st = sM2.

Let sM1 and sM2 follow up along the work.

Now, 2 additional sM’s must be placed - let these 2 rest in the work, whilst the ribbon is being knitted.

Place a M between the first and last st = sM3.

Also, place a M after the 150th st = sM4.

*1st rnd:* k2tog, k until 2 sts before sM2, slip 2 sts knitwise and place them back onto the left-side needle, k2tog tbl, slip sM2 onto the right-side needle, k2tog, k until 2 sts before sM1, slip 2 sts knitwise and place them back onto the leftside needle, k2tog tbl.

Repeat the *1st rnd* in a total of 15 times.

There are now 240 sts on the needle.

The first end of the ribbon must now be knitted together, using the 3-needle bind off method. Continue in the following way:

Starting at sM1, place the first 120 sts of the rnd on a new set of circular needle 5 mm.

Let the remaining 120 sts stay on the set of circular needle 5 mm, which was used to knit the ribbon.

Place the 2 needles with their WS facing each other, so that the ribbon will be knitted together from the RS.

Now, knit together the top edge of the ribbon, whilst at the same time binding off the sts:

k2tog (1 st from each of the 2 needle sets) \*k2tog, bind off 1 st\*, and repeat \*-\* throughout the row, without binding off too tightly.

Break the yarn.

The first edge of the ribbon has now been knitted together.

Now, the bottom edge of the ribbon must be knitted together:



Starting at sM3 from the RS, place the first of the 150 resting sts on a 5 mm circular needle.  
Starting at sM4 from the RS, place the next 150 resting sts on a new set of 5 mm circular needles.

Place the 2 needles with their WS facing each other, so that the ribbon will be knitted together from the RS.

Now, join colour B to the work, and knit together the bottom edge of the ribbon, whilst at the same time binding off the sts:

p2tog (1 st from each of the 2 needle sets) \*p2tog, bind off 1 st\*, and repeat \*-\* throughout the row, without binding off too tightly.

Break the yarn.

The ribbon has now been knitted (*see photo 7*).

Now, the bow must be shaped.

This is done in the following way:

*Step 1:* Place the ribbon into shape, as illustrated at *photo 8*.

*Step 2:* Cut a 30 cm long strand of colour B, and place it as illustrated at *photo 9*.

*Step 3:* With the ends of the strand, bind a centered knot, and tighten, so that the tips of the bow are shaped - *see photo 10*.

*Step 4:* Turn the ribbon to the backside, and place the ends of the thread as illustrated at *photo 11*.

*Step 5:* With the ends of the strand, bind a centered knot, and tighten, so that the ears of the bow are shaped - see *photo 12*.

The bow has now gotten its shape.

Weave in the ends of the strand, at the backside of the bow.

A small i-cord ribbon must now be knitted, to cover the centered jointment at the bow:

With *colour B* and 2 sets of circular needles 5 mm, cast on 10 sts, using the method Judy's Magic Cast On - 5 sts on each of the needles.

Now, k the first 5 sts (needle 1), and then place the following 5 sts (needle 2) on a thread to rest - the resting sts must later be used, when the ends of the i-cord is knitted together.

Over the 5 sts which are left on the needle, continue to knit the i-cord only from the RS in the following way:

Knit \*k 5, place the 5 sts back onto the leftside needle\*, and repeat \*-\* until the i-cord measures 7 cm.

The i-cord ribbon must now be added to the bow.

Start, by placing the 5 resting sts onto a new set of 5 mm circular needles.

Then, place the i-cord ribbon on the center of the bow, so that the ends will be knitted together at the backside of the bow (*see photo 13*).

The ends of the i-cord ribbon must now be knitted together:

Place the 2 needles with their WS facing each other, so that the ribbon will be knitted together from the RS.



Then knit k2tog (1 st from each of the 2 needle sets) \*k2tog, bind off 1 st\*, and repeat \*-\* throughout the row, without binding off too tightly.

Break the yarn, and weave in the ends.

The bow has now been knitted (*see photo 14*).

### **Step 3 - The bow is joined to the wreath**

Now, the bow must be joined to the wreath.

To do this, an i-cord ribbon must be knitted to cover the bind off seam at the wreath:

With *colour B* and 2 sets of circular needles 5 mm, cast on 12 sts, using the method Judy's Magic Cast On - 6 sts on each of the needles.

Now, k the first 6 sts (needle 1), and then place the following 6 sts (needle 2) on a thread to rest - the resting sts must later be used, when the ends of the i-cord is knitted together.

Over the 6 sts which are left on the needle, continue to knit the i-cord only from the RS in the following way:

Knit \*k 6, place the 6 sts back onto the leftside needle\*, and repeat \*-\* until the i-cord measures 20 cm.

Now, let the 6 sts rest on the needle.

The bow must now be sewn onto the i-cord ribbon, before the ribbon is attached to the wreath. This is done in the following way:

From the RS, and starting at the cast on row of the i-cord, measure out 4 cm down along the i-cord ribbon, and place a M (M1) in the row of the measured length (*see picture 15*).

Now, sew the backside of the bow onto the RS of the i-cord at M1, by securely fastening it with a strand of *colour B* - make sure to fasten it at the center point of the bow, to get the right centred placement at the i-cord ribbon (*see photo 16*).

Weave in the ends.

The i-cord ribbon, which now has the bow attached, must now be joined to the wreath:

Start, by placing the 6 resting sts onto a new set of 5 mm circular needles.

Place the i-cord ribbon over the sewn seam of the wreath, letting its 2 ends meet at the top point of the wreath (*see photo 17*).

The ends of the i-cord ribbon must now be knitted together:

Place the 2 needles with their WS facing each other, so that the ribbon will be knitted together from the RS.

Then knit k2tog (1 st from each of the 2 needle sets) \*k2tog\*, and repeat \*-\* throughout the row.

There are now a total of 6 sts left on the needle.



To create the hanging ribbons for the wreath, 2 separate i-cords must now be knitted, using the 6 remaining sts.

This is done in the following way:

Starting at the RS, place the first 3 sts of the row on a thread to rest, and let the 3 remaining sts stay on the needle.

Now, over the 3 sts which are left on the needle, continue to knit the 1st i-cord ribbon only from the RS in the following way:

Knit \*k 3, place the 3 sts back onto the leftside needle\*, and repeat \*-\* until the i-cord measures 20 cm.

On the next row, k3tog, break the yarn, pull the thread through the remaining st, and tighten.

The 1st ribbon has now been knitted.

Place the 3 resting sts on a 5 mm circular needle, and join *colour b* to the work. Then, knit the 2nd ribbon in the same way as the 1st.

Weave in the ends (*see photo 18*).

The wreath, with its bow and ribbons, has now been knitted (*see photo 19*).

To keep the bow in shape, place a few pins in each end and ear of the bow (*see photo 20-21*).

#### **Step 4 - the baroque pearls are added to the wreath**

Now, 60 baroque freshwater pearls must be evenly attached to the wreath.

1 pearl is attached in the following way:

Pass 1 pin through the hole of 1 pearl, then push the end of the pin into the styrofoam at the desired location on the wreath (*see photo 22*).

Make sure to evenly spread the placement of the pearls throughout the front, inside and outside of the wreath - it is not necessary to pin any pearls to the backside of the wreath (*see photo 23*).

When all 60 pearls have been placed, the wreath is completed (*see photo 24*).






