DIFFICULTY
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DESCRIPTION

The Bruno Vest is worked from the top down in stockinette stitch. It begins with the left and right back sections, which are worked separately. After casting on stitches for the neck, the pieces are joined to work the back as one piece. Next, stitches are picked up to work the left and right fronts separately. Once the front neck stitches are cast on, the front pieces are joined and worked straight. Stitches are then picked up along the armholes to create the edges, which are worked back and forth in a 1x1 twisted rib. This ribbing is folded in half and attached on the wrong side. After this, all parts are joined to work the body in the round. Finally, stitches are picked up and knitted to work the neckline in the round in a 1x1 twisted rib, which is also folded in half and attached on the wrong side.

SIZES

XS / S / M / L / XL / 2XL / 3XL

SIZE GUIDE

The Bruno Vest has an oversized, cropped fit and is designed to have approx. 20 cm [8 in] of positive ease with slightly reduced ease in larger sizes, to ensure a more comfortable fit. This means the garment's measurements will be approx. 20 cm [8 in] larger than your actual bust circumference.

The sizes XS / S / M / L / XL / 2XL / 3XL are designed to fit a bust circumference of 80-85 / 85-90 / 90-95 / 95-100 / 100-110 / 110-120 / 120-130 cm [31½-33½ / 33½-35½ / 35½-37½ / 37½-39½ / 39½-43¼ / 43¼-47¼ / 47¼-51¼ in].

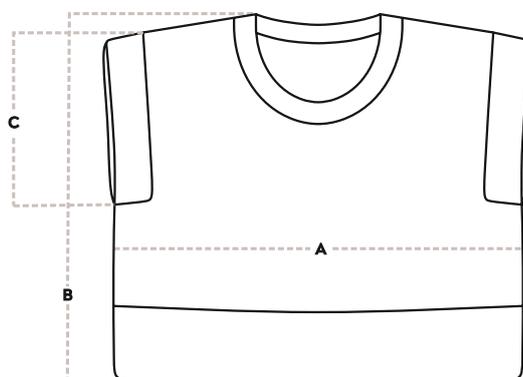
Before you begin, measure yourself to determine the right size. For example, if your bust circumference is 92 cm [36½ in], you should knit a size M. If you are between sizes, choose the size based on how loose you prefer the slipover to fit. Using the diagram with the finished garment measurements can be a helpful reference when deciding which size to select.

GAUGE**After washing and blocking:**

23 sts x 33 rows = 10 x 10cm [4 x 4 inches] in stockinette stitch on 4 mm [US 6] needles.

31 sts x 37 rows = 10 x 10cm [4 x 4 inches] in 1x1 twisted rib on 3.5 mm [US 4] needles.

34 sts x 40 rows = 10 x 10cm [4 x 4 inches] in 1x1 twisted rib on 3 mm [US 2½] needles.

Please make sure to knit a swatch. Ensure that your swatch gauge matches the given one. If you cannot achieve the required gauge using the suggested needles, adjust your needle size to reach the correct gauge.

YARN****Suggested 1:**

200 / 200 / 225 / 250 / 250 / 275 / 300 g Cashmere Classic by Cardiff Cashmere 25 g = 110 m [120 yds].

Suggested 2 (worked with two strands held together):

200 / 250 / 250 / 300 / 300 / 350 / 350 g Anina by Filcolana 50 g = 210 m [230 yds] **held together with** 100 / 100 / 100 / 125 / 125 / 150 / 150 g Tilia by Filcolana 25 g = 210 m [230 yds].

Stitch markers, extra yarn or stitch holders, thin and smooth contrast color yarn approx. 10 m [11 yds], tapestry needle.

LEFT BACK

The left back (positioning as worn) is worked back and forth in stockinette stitch using **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles.

Cast on 24/26/27/28/30/32/34 sts on **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles using a Long-Tail Cast-On technique.

Work in the **German Short rows technique** to shape the shoulder slope.

When the instructions say 'Turn', this indicates that you should turn your work around, slip the first stitch purlwise, and create a double stitch at the turning point. The term '**Work number of sts after the last turn**' means that you should work up to the double stitch created during the previous row's turn, work this stitch, and then proceed to work the specified number of stitches following it.

Row 1 (WS): P5/6/7/6/7/6/7. Turn.

Row 2 (RS): Knit to the end.

Now, continue working in the **German Short Rows technique** while simultaneously making **purl increases** along the neckline:

Row 1 (WS): P3, M1PR, P to the last turn, P5/5/5/6/6/7/7 Turn. (1st increased).

Row 2 (RS): Knit to the end.

Work rows 1-2 a total of 3 times (your last turn is 4/5/5/4/5/5/6 sts before the end of the WS row). Finish with the RS row. The short rows are now complete.

Purl 1 row.

Now you have 27/29/30/31/33/35/37 sts on the needles and worked 1 row (if counting along the armhole side).

Break the yarn and place the sts on hold to continue working on them later.

RIGHT BACK

The right back (positioning as worn) is worked back and forth in stockinette stitch using **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles.

Cast on 24/26/27/28/30/32/34 sts on **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles using a **Reverse Long-Tail Cast-On technique**.

Work in the **German Short rows technique** to shape the shoulder slope:

Row 1 (RS): K5/6/7/6/7/6/7. Turn.

Row 2 (WS): Purl to the end.

Now, continue working in the **German Short Rows technique** while simultaneously making **increases** along the neckline:

Row 1 (RS): K3, **MIL**, K to the last turn, K5/5/5/6/6/7/7 after it. Turn. (1 st increased).

Row 2 (WS): Purl to the end.

Work rows 1–2 a total of 3 times (your last turn is 4/5/5/4/5/5/6 sts before the end of the RS row). Finish with the WS row. The short rows are now complete.

Knit 1 row.

Now you have 27/29/30/31/33/35/37 sts on the needles and worked 1 row (if counting along the armhole side).

Do not break the yarn to continue joining the back from here.

BACK

The back is worked back and forth in stockinette stitch using **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles.

Join the back as follows:

With the WS facing, purl across the right back (27/29/30/31/33/35/37 stitches). Then, cast on 36/36/38/38/40/41/42 stitches in an extension of the right back stitches using the **backward loop method**. Finally, purl across the left back (27/29/30/31/33/35/37 stitches).

Now you have 90/94/98/100/106/111/116 sts on the needles and worked 2 rows (if counting along the armhole side).

Work straight in stockinette stitch:

Row 1 (RS): Knit all sts.

Row 2 (WS): Purl all sts.

Work rows 1–2 a total of 30/29/29/29/29/29/29 times. Finish with the WS row.

Now you have 90/94/98/100/106/111/116 sts on the needles and worked 62/60/60/60/60/60/60 rows (if counting along the armhole side).

Now work with **increases** to shape the armholes:

Row 1 (RS): K5, **MIL**, work until the last 5 sts of the row, **MIR**, K5. (2 sts increased).

Row 2 (WS): Purl all sts.

Row 3 (RS): Knit all sts.

Row 4 (WS): Purl all sts.

Work rows 1–4 a total of 5/6/7/8/9/10/11 times. Finish with the WS row.

Now you have 100/106/112/116/124/131/138 sts on the needles and worked 82/84/88/92/96/100/104 rows (if counted along armhole sides).

Break the yarn and place the sts on hold to continue working with them later.

RIGHT FRONT

The right front (positioning as worn) is worked back and forth in stockinette stitch using **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles.

With the RS facing pick up and knit a total of 24/26/27/28/30/32/34 stitches along the right shoulder slope using **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles. This corresponds to picking up and knitting one stitch in each stitch of the shoulder slope.

Note: Ensure that the stitches picked up and knit mirror the stitches along the shoulder to create a symmetrical appearance. The first stitch should be picked up and knit into the very first available stitch at the edge; the last stitch should be picked up and knit into the very last available stitch at the edge.

Work in the **German Short rows technique** to shape the shoulder slope:

Row 1 (WS): P5/6/7/6/7/6/7. Turn.

Row 2 (RS): Knit to the end.

Row 3 (WS): Purl to the last turn, P5/5/5/6/6/7/7 after the last turn. Turn.

Row 4 (RS): Knit to the end.

Work rows 3-4 a total of 3 times (your last turn is 4/5/5/4/5/5/6 sts before the end of the WS row). Finish with the RS row. The short rows are now complete.

Work straight in stockinette stitch:

Row 1 (WS): Purl all sts.

Row 2 (RS): Knit all sts.

Work rows 1-2 a total of 12/12/13/13/13/14 times. Finish with the RS row.

Now you have 24/26/27/28/30/32/34 sts on the needles and worked 24/24/26/26/26/26/28 rows (if counting along the armhole side).

Now work with **purl increases** to shape the neck:

Row 1 (WS): P5, MIPR, purl to the end of the row. (1 st increased).

Row 2 (RS): Knit all sts.

Work rows 1 - 2 a total of 7/7/7/7/8/8/8 times. Finish with the WS row with the last of the 7/7/7/7/8/8/8 increases.

Now you have 31/33/34/35/38/40/42 sts on the needles and worked 37/37/39/39/41/41/43 rows (if counting along the armhole side).

Break the yarn.

LEFT FRONT

The left front (positioning as worn) is worked back and forth in stockinette stitch using **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles.

With the RS facing, leave a yarn tail on the left that is approximately 3.5 times the length of the slope edge. Ensure the working yarn remains on your right side of the edge so you can start knitting from there later. Using that yarn tail, pick up and knit a total of 24/26/27/28/30/32/34 stitches along the left shoulder slope using **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles. This corresponds to picking up and knitting one stitch in each stitch of the shoulder slope.

Note: Ensure that the stitches picked up and knit mirror the stitches along the shoulder to create a symmetrical appearance. The first stitch should be picked up and knit into the very first available stitch at the edge; the last stitch should be picked up and knit into the very last available stitch at the edge.

Work in the **German Short rows technique** to shape the shoulder slope:

Row 1 (RS): K5/6/7/6/7/6/7. Turn.

Row 2 (WS): Purl to the end.

Row 3 (RS): Knit to the last turn, K5/5/5/6/6/7/7 after the last turn. Turn.

Row 4 (WS): Purl to the end.

Work rows 3-4 a total of 3 times (your last turn is 4/5/5/4/5/5/6 sts before the end of the RS row). Finish with the WS row. The short rows are now complete.

Work straight in stockinette stitch:

Row 1 (RS): Knit all sts.

Row 2 (WS): Purl all sts.

Work rows 1-2 a total of 12/12/13/13/13/13/14 times. Finish with the WS row.

Now you have 24/26/27/28/30/32/34 sts on the needles and worked 24/24/26/26/26/26/28 rows (if counting along the armhole side).

Now work with **increases** to shape the neck:

Row 1 (RS): K5, **M1L**, knit to the end of the row. (1 st increased).

Row 2 (WS): Purl all sts.

Work rows 1-2 a total of 7/7/7/7/8/8/8 times. Finish with the WS row.

Now you have 31/33/34/35/38/40/42 sts on the needles and worked 38/38/40/40/42/42/44 rows (if counting along the armhole side).

Do not break the yarn to continue joining the front from here.

FRONT

The front is worked back and forth in stockinette stitch using **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles.

Join the front as follows:

With the WS facing, cast on 28/28/30/30/30/31/32 stitches in an extension of the left front stitches using the **backward loop method**. Next, purl across the right front (31/33/34/35/38/40/42 stitches).

Now you have 90/94/98/100/106/111/116 sts on the needles and worked 38/38/40/40/42/42/44 rows (if counting along each armhole side).

Work straight in stockinette stitch:

Row 1 (RS): Knit all sts.

Row 2 (WS): Purl all sts.

Work rows 1-2 a total of 12/11/10/10/9/9/8 times. Finish with the WS row.

Now you have 90/94/98/100/106/111/116 sts on the needles and worked 62/60/60/60/60/60/60 rows (if counting along the armhole side).

Now work with **increases** to shape the armholes:

Row 1 (RS): K5, **MIL**, work until the last 5 sts of the row, **MIR**, K5. (2 sts increased).

Row 2 (WS): Purl all sts.

Row 3 (RS): Knit all sts.

Row 4 (WS): Purl all sts

Work rows 1-4 a total of 5/6/7/8/9/10/11 times. Finish with the WS row.

Now you have 100/106/112/116/124/131/138 sts on the needles and worked 82/84/88/92/96/100/104 rows (if counted along armhole sides).

Break the yarn and place the sts on hold to continue working with them later.

ARMHOLE EDGES

The armhole edges are worked back and forth in 1x1 twisted rib with selvage edge stitches using **3 mm [US 2½] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles, then folded inward and attached.

Note: Ensure that your gauge for the twisted rib matches the given gauge for 3 mm [US 2½] needles. If not, adjust the needle size. It's important to work all stitches, both knit and purl, through the back loop. This will help the ribbing maintain its shape and prevent waves in the armhole edge.

When picking up stitches, use **5 mm [US 8] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles (or needles that are **1 size larger** than those used for stockinette stitch) and both the main yarn and a contrasting color yarn. Hold two strands together—one of the main color and one of the contrast color—as you pick up and knit the stitches. This technique highlights the stitches of the first row, making it easier to spot the purl bumps on the wrong side, which are essential for attaching the armhole. It's normal for the first row to be loose; that's how it should be.

With the RS facing join two strands of yarn—one main and one contrasting color. Using **5 mm [US 8] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles, pick up and knit 165/169/177/185/193/201/209 stitches along the armhole edge. This is equivalent to picking up and knitting one stitch for each row and an additional 1 stitch for the shoulder seam.

Work as follows:

Begin by picking up and knitting 82/84/88/92/96/100/104 stitches along the first armhole side. Next, pick up and knit 1 stitch in the shoulder seam. Finally, pick up and knit until you have another 82/84/88/92/96/100/104 stitches along the second armhole side. Break the contrast color yarn.

Switch to **3 mm [US 2½] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles and work 19/19/19/21/21/23/25 rows of 1x1 twisted rib:

Row 1 (WS): SL1 (edge st), * P1 tbl, K1 tbl *; repeat from * to the last 2 sts of the row, end with P1 tbl, P1 (edge st).

Row 2 (RS): SL1 (edge st), * K1 tbl, P1 tbl *; repeat from * to the last 2 sts of the row, end with K1 tbl, P1 (edge st).

Work rows 1–2 until you have worked 19/19/19/21/21/23/25 rows. Finish with the WS row.

Next work 3 rows of double knitting for a neatly folded edge:

Row 1 (RS): SL1 (edge st), * K1 tbl, SL1 purlwise wyif *; repeat from * to the last 2 sts of the row, end with K1 tbl, P1 (edge st).

Row 2 (WS): SL1 (edge st), * P1 tbl, SL1 purlwise wyib *; repeat from * to the last 2 sts of the row, end with P1 tbl, P1 (edge st).

Row 3 (RS): As row 1.

Note: Make sure the 'stripes' are visible only on the RS of the armhole and are positioned in front of the purl stitches with the RS facing.

Then work 17/17/17/19/19/21/23 more rows of 1x1 twisted rib:

Row 1 (WS): SL1PW (edge st), * P1 tbl, K1 tbl *; repeat from * to the last 2 sts of the row, end with P1 tbl, P1 (edge st).

Row 2 (RS): SL1PW (edge st), * K1 tbl, P1 tbl *; repeat from * to the last 2 sts of the row, end with K1 tbl, P1 (edge st).

Work rows 1–2 until you have worked 17/17/17/19/19/21/23 rows. Finish with the WS row.

Finally, break the yarn, leaving a 10–15 cm tail.

Now fold the armhole in half towards the WS and **join the live stitches to the purl bumps** from the first row.

Work as follows:

Slip the first stitch knitwise to the right-hand needle, then pick up the first purl bump (inserting the needle from front to back) and pass this stitch over the bump. Slip the next stitch knitwise to the RH needle, pick up the next purl bump, and pass the stitch over the bump.

Repeat these steps until all live stitches have been joined with their corresponding purl bumps.

Note: Before binding off, remove the contrasting color yarn.

Bind off the stitches as follows:

Slip two stitches from the left-hand needle to the right-hand needle and pass the first stitch over the second. Then, slip the next stitch from the left-hand needle to the right-hand needle and pass the previous stitch over it. Continue this process until all stitches are bound off, except for the last one.

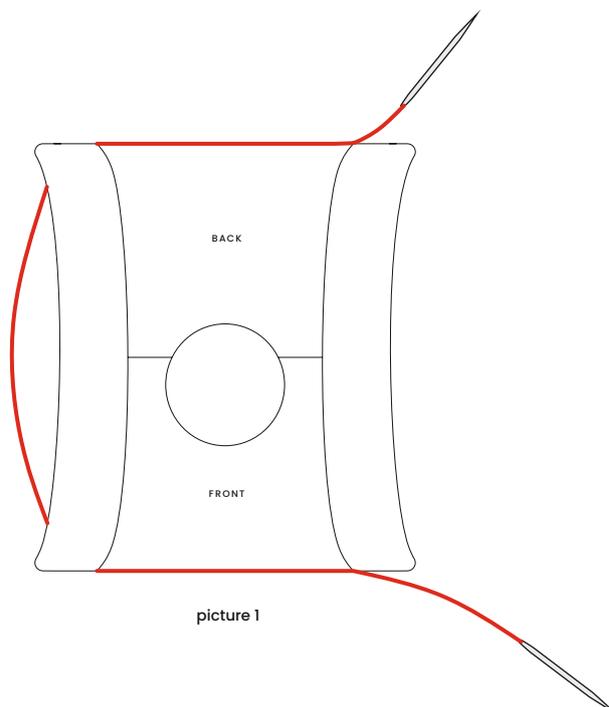
To finish, use a tapestry needle and the remaining tail. First, remove the knitting needles. Then, insert the tapestry needle from bottom to top into the last stitch and pull the yarn through.

The second armhole edge is worked the same way.

BODY

The body is worked in the round in stockinette stitch using **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles.

Transfer all stitches to **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles as shown in picture 1.

[BODY: JOINING]

Join the yarn with the RS facing, and starting from the edge of the left front armhole, **join the knitting in the round** as follows:

Pick up and knit 10/10/10/11/11/12/13 stitches along the double edge of the left front armhole, picking up 1 stitch from each edge stitch through both folded edges together. Then, pick up and knit 10/10/10/11/11/12/13 stitches along the double edge of the left back armhole. Next, knit 100/106/112/116/124/131/138 stitches of the back. After that, pick up and knit 10/10/10/11/11/12/13 stitches along the double edge of the right back armhole in the same way. Then, pick up and knit 10/10/10/11/11/12/13 stitches along the double edge of the right front armhole, and knit 100/106/112/116/124/131/138 stitches of the front.

Place a stitch marker to indicate BOR.

Now you have 240/252/264/276/292/310/328 sts on the needles.

Work in the round in stockinette stitch until the slipover measures 40/41/42/42/44/45/47 cm [15¾/16¼/16½/16½/17¼/17¼/18½ in] from the highest point of the shoulder seam.

Try on and check the garment length before you begin working the rib.

Note: extending the length of the garment in your knitting may require additional yarn.

Switch to circular needles **3.5 mm [US 4] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** and work 1 round in stockinette stitch with **increases** as follows: *K9, **MIL***, repeat from * to * a total of 26/28/28/30/32/34/36 times, next knit to the end of round.

Now you have 266/280/292/306/324/344/364 sts on the needles.

Note: Ensure that your gauge for the twisted rib matches the given gauge for 3.5 mm [US 4] needles. If not, adjust the needle size. It's important to work all stitches, both knit and purl, through the back loop. This will help the ribbing maintain its shape and prevent waves in the edge.

Work 9/9/9/10/10/11/11 cm [3½/3½/3½/4/4/4¼/4¼ in] of 1x1 twisted rib (K1 tbl, P1 tbl).

Work double knitting before binding off using the Italian bind-off technique as follows:

Round 1: * K1 tbl, S1 l purlwise wyif *, repeat from * to * to end of round.

Round 2: * S1 l purlwise wyib, P1 tbl *, repeat from * to * to end of round.

Bind off using the **Italian bind-off technique**. Not to tightly.

NECKLINE

The neckline is worked in the round in 1x1 twisted rib using **3 mm [US 2½] 40 cm [16 in]** circular needles, then folded inward and attached.

Note: Ensure that your gauge for the twisted rib matches the given gauge for 3 mm [US 2½] needles. If not, adjust the needle size. It's important to work all stitches, both knit and purl, through the back loop. This will help the ribbing maintain its shape and prevent waves in the neckline.

When picking up stitches, use **5 mm [US 8] 40 cm [16 in]** circular needles (or needles that are **1 size larger** than those used for stockinette stitch) and both the main yarn and a contrasting color yarn. Hold two strands together—one of the main color and one of the contrast color—as you pick up and knit the stitches. This technique highlights the stitches of the first row, making it easier to spot the purl bumps on the wrong side, which are essential for attaching the neckline. It's normal for the first row to be loose; that's how it should be.

With the RS facing, begin at the right shoulder seam of the back. Join two strands of yarn—one main and one contrasting color—and using **5 mm [US 8] 40 cm [16 in]** circular needles, pick up and knit 178/178/186/186/192/194/200 stitches. This includes picking up 1 stitch for each stitch along the horizontal sides and 1 stitch for each row along the vertical and sloped sides, with an additional stitch at each corner of the neckline.

Back Neck: Start by picking up and knitting 9 stitches along the sloped side of the right back, then pick up 1 stitch at the corner, followed by 36/36/38/38/40/41/42 stitches along the horizontal side of the back. Continue by picking up 1 stitch at the next corner, then 9 stitches along the sloped side of the left back.

Front Neck: Proceed by picking up and knitting 46/46/48/48/50/50/52 stitches along the vertical and sloped side of the left front. Pick up 1 stitch at the corner, followed by 28/28/30/30/30/31/32 stitches along the horizontal side. Then, pick up 1 stitch at the next corner and finish by picking up 46/46/48/48/50/50/52 stitches along the sloped and vertical side of the right front.

Break the contrast color yarn. Place a stitch marker to indicate a BOR.

Switch to **3 mm [US 2½] 40 cm [16 in]** circular needles and work 14/14/14/15/15/16/16 rounds of 1x1 twisted rib (K1 tbl, P1 tbl).

Next, tightly work 3 rounds of double knitting for a neatly folded edge as follows:

Rounds 1-3: * K1 tbl, SL1 purlwise wyif *, repeat from * to * to the end of the round.

Then work the following 13/13/13/14/14/15/15 rounds of 1x1 twisted rib (K1 tbl, P1 tbl).

Finally, break the yarn, leaving a 10–15 cm tail.

Now fold the neckline in half towards the WS and **join the live stitches to the purl bumps from the first row.**

Slip the first live stitch knitwise to the right-hand needle, then pick up the first purl bump (inserting the needle from front to back) and pass the live stitch over the bump. Slip the next stitch knitwise to the RH needle, pick up the next purl bump, and pass the live stitch over the bump.

Repeat these steps until all live stitches have been joined with their corresponding purl bumps.

Note: Before binding off, remove the contrasting color yarn.

Bind off the stitches as follows:

Slip two stitches from the left-hand needle to the right-hand needle and pass the first stitch over the second. Then, slip the next stitch from the left-hand needle to the right-hand needle and pass the previous stitch over it. Continue this process until all stitches are bound off, except for the last one.

To invisibly finish, use a tapestry needle and the remaining tail. First, remove the knitting needles. Then, insert the tapestry needle from bottom to top into the last stitch and pull the yarn through. Next, insert the needle under both legs of the first bound-off stitch from bottom to top and pull the yarn through. Finally, insert the needle back into the center of the last stitch and pull the yarn through.

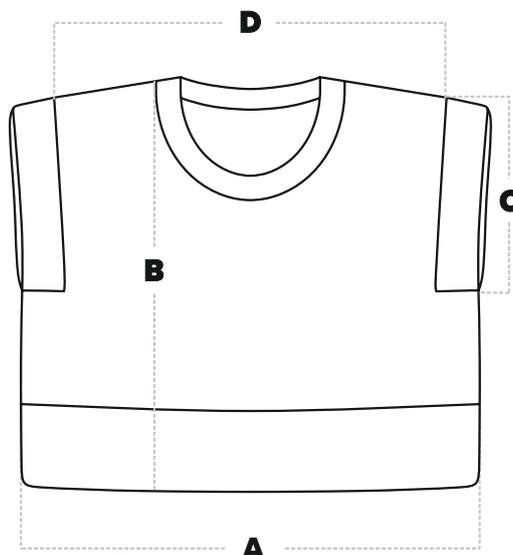
To avoid stretching, **seam the point under the arm** where the armholes meet using a tapestry needle. Weave in the ends and wash your slipover. Block it according to the dimensions specified in the diagram. Pay special attention to blocking the armholes to the correct height. If necessary, stretch the armhole ribbing downwards, as well as the edge ribbing to the required width.
