As a child, I used to knit clothes for my dolls and stuffed animals with my grandmother. We would sit on the couch for hours working on our projects. We would knit little dresses, sweaters and pants out of scrap yarn, and even my grandfather's old socks could, with a few snips, be turned into doll underwear.

The time spent with my grandmother was a great joy to us both. The feeling of mutual belonging that you get when working on a project together is something very special and it is still one of my best knitting memories.

The idea behind this booklet is to inspire knitters to enjoy cozy moments with scrap yarn projects. All the patterns are miniature versions of already existing patterns of children's knitwear from PetiteKnit, so that the favorite doll can match junior. I have stated how much yarn I have used for each garment - in that way it will be easy to assess any left-over yarn is enough for a particular garment. For 10 out of the 11 projects less than one skein of yarn is needed. In addition, you will need 40 or 60 cm long, sizes 2.5 mm, 3.0 mm, 3.5 mm or 4 mm (US size 2, 3, 4 and 6) needles (and DPNs) for most patterns, a narrow elastic band and some buttons from your stash. The patterns are made for the Asi Doll (Leonora) which is 46 cm long. The doll measures approx. 38 cm around the body, the arms are approx. 12 cm long from shoulder to fingertips, the internal length of the legs including the foot is approx. 13 cm and the head circumference is 35 cm.

After working on some knitted doll clothes, I have realized that my joy of miniature knitting is alive. The big question is whether I am living out my daughter's or my own doll dreams. The answer is probably both. But one thing is for sure - new clothes in the doll wardrobe will always bring joy.

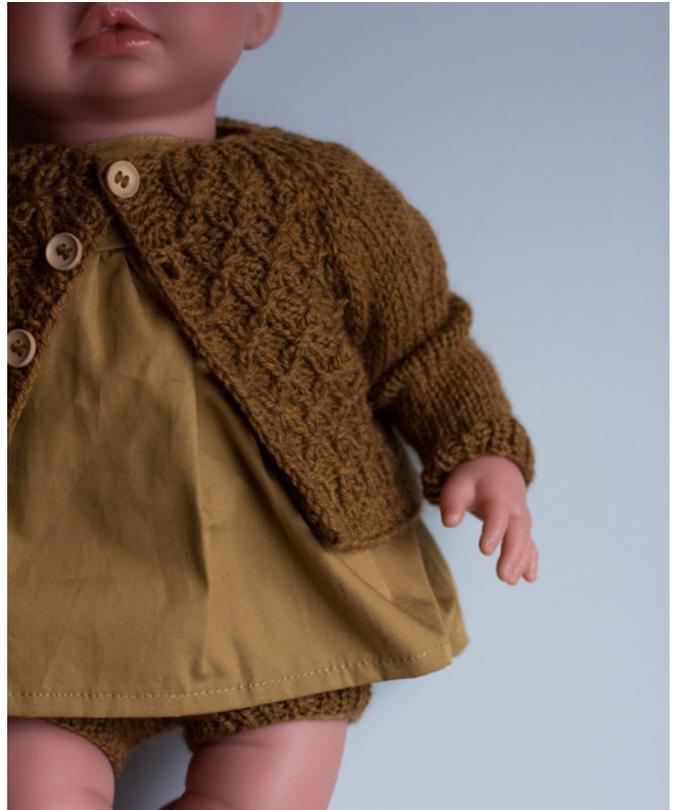

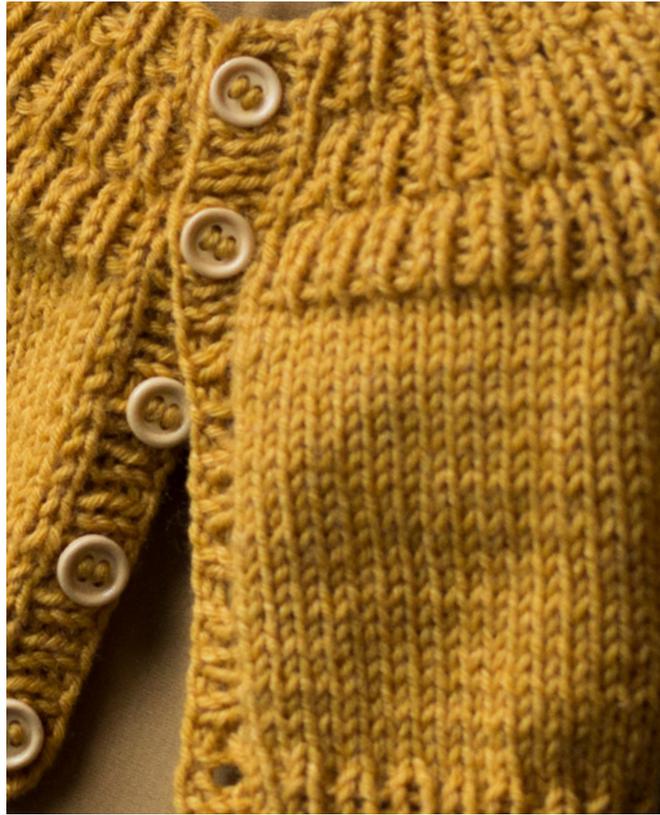

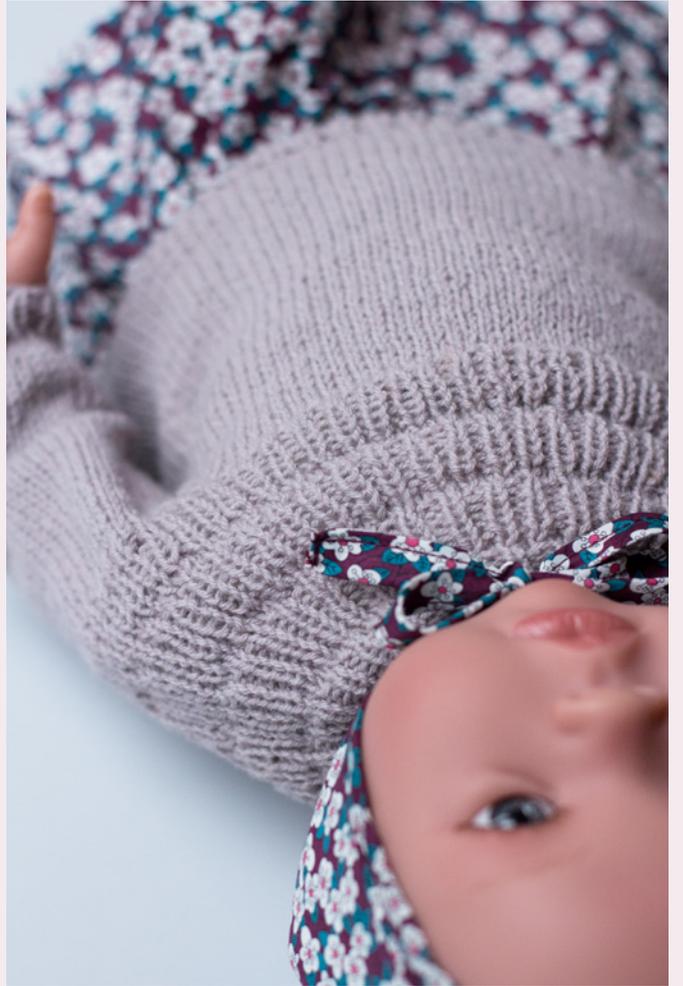

CARL'S CARDIGAN

Materials: Fingering weight yarn, 5 small buttons

Suggested yarn: 44 g of Pernilla from Filcolana (50 g = 175 m/191 yards)

Suggested needles: 3.5 mm (US size 4) / 60 cm (24 inches) circular needles, 3.5 mm (US size 4) double pointed needles

Gauge: 35 sts x 30 rows in smocking st pattern on 3.5 mm needles = 10 x 10 cm/4 x 4 inches, 23 sts x 32 rows in stockinette st on 3.5 mm needles = 10 x 10 cm/4 x 4 inches



Carl's Cardigan is worked bottom up with raglan decreases on the yoke. The body is worked in smocking st pattern, while the sleeves are worked in stockinette st.

Body

The body of Carl's Cardigan is worked flat, with back and forth rows. Cast on 130 sts on the 3.5 mm / 60 cm circular needles. Work 5 rows of rib, k 1 (k 1, p 1), k 1. You are now on the RS.

Work 4 rows of rib (k 1, p 2), k 1. Work smocking st back and forth as described below until the work measures 7 cm. Adjust so that the last row is a RS row.

1st row: K 1, * p 2, insert the right-hand needle front to back between the 4th and 5th st on the left-hand needle, pull the yarn through and place it on the left-hand needle (in front of the 1st st on the left needle), knit it together with the 1st st. The 2nd, 3rd and 4th sts are worked in established rib pattern *. Repeat from * to * until 3 sts remain on the needle, p 2, k 1.

2nd-4th row: Work in established rib pattern (k the knit sts and p the purl sts).

5th row: * Insert the right-hand needle front to back between the 4th and 5th st on the left-hand needle, pull the yarn through and place it on the left-hand needle (in front of the 1st st on the left needle), knit it together with the 1st st. The 2nd, 3rd and 4th sts are worked in established pattern, p 2 *. Repeat from * to * until 4 sts remain on the needle, pull the yarn from after the 4 last sts and place it on the left-hand needle (in front of the 1st st on the left needle), knit it together with the 1st st, p 2, k 1.

6th-8th row: Work in established rib pattern (k the knit sts and p the purl sts).

Repeat these 8 rows until work measures 7 cm, ending with a RS row. On the next row (a WS row) cast off for the armhole as follows: Work 29 sts in smocking st, cast off 4 sts, work 64 sts in smocking st, cast off 4 sts, work 29 sts in smocking st. Let all the live sts rest while knitting the sleeves.

Sleeves

The sleeves are knit in the round on 3.5 mm double pointed needles. Cast on 24 sts and join to knit in the round making sure that the cast on edge is not twisted. Place a marker to indicate the beginning of the round. Work 5 rows of rib, (k 1, p 1). Continue in the round in stockinette st until the sleeve measures 10 cm, while at the same time increasing 1 st after the first and 1 st before the last st of the round a total of 4 times every 6th round (= 32 sts). When the sleeve measures 10 cm, cast off the first and last 2 sts of the round for the armhole. Knit another sleeve identically.

Yoke

Place the live sts for the sleeves and body on the same needle (= 178

sts) and place a marker between each part (4 markers in total). Work back and forth across all sts (maintaining the smocking st pattern in the body and stockinette st in the sleeves). You are now on the RS.

Work raglan decreases on the RS rows a total of 10 times as follows (= 98 sts): * Work in pattern until 3 sts before the marker, k2togtbl, k 1, slip marker, k 1, k2tog *, repeat from * to * a total of 4 times, work in pattern until the end of the row.

Work WS rows on established pattern.

You are now on the RS. Reduce the number of sts before knitting the neck band as follows:

K 1, * k2tog, p2tog *, repeat from * to * until 1 st remains, k 1 (= 50 sts). You are now on the WS.

K 3 rows of established rib pattern. Cast off in established rib pattern on the 4th row (from the RS).

Front bands

Pick up 35 sts along the right front band. Work 4 rows of rib (k 1, p 1) k 1, cast off in established rib pattern on the 5th row (from the RS).

Knit the left front band in the same way but on the 2nd row (a RS row) work 5 buttonholes as follows:

Work 2 sts of rib, * k2tog, yo, work 5 sts of rib *, repeat from * to * until 5 sts remain, k2tog, yo, work 3 sts of rib.

Finishing

Weave in all ends. Sew 5 small buttons on the right front band, opposite to the buttonholes.



DAGMAR'S SWEATER

Materials: Fingering weight yarn, 1 button

Suggested yarn: 45 g of Arwetta from Filcolana (50 g = 210 m/230 yards)

Suggested needles: 2.5 mm and 3 mm (US size 2.5 and 2) / 40 cm (16 inches) circular needles, 2.5 mm and 3 mm double pointed needles, crochet hook

Gauge: 29 sts x 41 rows in stockinette st on 3 mm needle = 10 x 10 cm/4 x 4 inches

Dagmar's Sweater is worked top-down. The collar is knit at the end by picking up sts around the neck opening. The sweater has picot edges. It is recommended to press the edges and collar lightly with an iron on low heat for a neat finishing.

Yoke

The yoke is worked on circular needles back and forth at first to create an opening in the back. Then it is worked in the round seamlessly on circular needles. The yoke is shaped along the way with raglan increases.

When working the opening in the back make a neat edge by knitting the first st and then slipping the last st purlwise with the yarn in front on all rows.

Cast on 61 sts on the 3 mm needles. K across 1 row, p across 1 row. The next row is a RS row. Now you will start working raglan increases. Note that you will be working a raglan st between all the increases. Divide for raglan shaping as follows:

11 sts (right back), 1 raglan st, 8 sts (right sleeve), 1 raglan st, 20 sts (front), 1 raglan st, 8 sts (left sleeve), 1 raglan st, 10 sts (left back).

Work raglan increases on the RS rows as follows: * K until the raglan st, insert the left needle into the thread below from the back and k it, k the raglan st, insert the left needle into the thread below from the front and k it tbl *. Repeat from * to * 4 times and k until the end of the row. When the opening in the back measures approx. 3 cm, join the work from the RS and continue working in the round on the circular needles (upon joining, knit the first and last st of the round together, this way the back will have the same number of sts as the front). The raglan increases are now worked on every second round until you have made a total of 15 raglan increase rows / rounds (= 180 sts).

Body

The body is worked in the round in stockinette st. Let the 38 sleeve sts on each side rest while finishing the body. The raglan sts will become part of the body.

Cast on 4 new sts under each sleeve with your preferred in-row cast on method (= 112 sts). The round now starts in the middle of these 4 new sts under the right sleeve. Work 7 cm of stockinette st measured from the armhole.

Next, work the folded picot edge as follows:

(K2tog, yo) across the entire round. Switch to the 2.5 mm circular needles. K across 6 rounds. Cast off all sts loosely.

Fold the edge over at the eyelet row and sew it on the WS. Not too tightly - it is important that the edge remains stretchy.

Sleeves

The sleeves are knit in the round on 3 mm double pointed needles. Pick up 4 sts in the sts that you cast on under the sleeve (= 42 sts) and let the round start in the middle of these. Use a marker to indicate the beginning of the round. K until the sleeve measures 9 cm from the armhole, **while at the same time** decreasing two sts on every 5th round a total of 6 times as follows: K2tog after the first st of the round and k2togtbl before the last st of the round (= 30 sts). Finish the sleeve with a folded picot edge as described for the body.

Collar

The collar is worked back and forth in stockinette st and is finished with a folded picot edge. Start by picking up sts along the neckline. Pick up 60 sts along the neckline in the cast on row from the RS on the 3 mm circular needles. The next row is a WS row.

Increase the number of sts by working the next row as follows: (P 1, yo) p 1 (= 119 sts). The next row is a RS row. K across 1 row but k the yo's tbl to avoid holes. Work back and forth in stockinette st until the collar measures 3.5 cm.

Finish with a folded picot edge as described for the body.

Finishing

Crochet a loop of chain sts at the top of the opening in the back and sew a small button on the opposite side. Weave in all ends.

KAREN'S BONNET

Materials: Fingering weight yarn

Suggested yarn: 22 g of Tynn Merinoull from Sandnes Garn (50 g = 175 m/191 yards)

Suggested needles: 3 mm (US size 2.5) needles, 3 mm double pointed needles

Gauge: 38 sts x 38 rows in smocking st on 3 mm needles = 10 x 10 cm/4 x 4



inches, 28 sts x 38 rows in stockinette st on 3 mm needles = 10 x 10 cm/4 x 4 inches

Karen's Bonnet is worked back and forth in smocking st from the forehead to the back. The number of sts increases so it fits snugly around the dolls head. The back is worked on double pointed needles and the crown is shaped with decreases. At the end a casing is worked for a tie around the neck edge.

Increases

Increases (inc) are worked as follows: Pfb (purl the front and back loop of the same st)

Cast on 63 sts on the 3 mm needles. Work in rib back and forth as follows:

Row 1 (WS): K 1, * k 1, p 1 *, repeat from * to * until 2 sts remain on the needle, k 2.

Row 2 (RS): K 1, * p 1, k 1 *, repeat from * to * until 2 sts remain on the needle, p 1, k 1.

Repeat these 2 rows until you have worked a total of 7 rows of rib. You are now on the RS.

K 1, * p 1, insert the right-hand needle front to back between the 3rd and 4th st on the left-hand needle, pull the yarn through and place it on the left-hand needle (in front of the 1st st on the left-hand needle), knit it together with the 1st st on the left-hand needle, inc, k 1 * Repeat from * to * until 2 sts remain on the needle, p 1, k 1 (= 78 sts). Tip: you can find videos showing the smocking stitch technique on YouTube.

Work 3 rows in established rib pattern (k the knit sts and p the purl sts) but k the first and the last st in all rows.

K 1, inc, k 1, * p 2, insert the right-hand needle front to back between the 3rd and 4th st on the left-hand needle, pull the yarn through and place it on the left-hand needle (in front of the 1st st on the left-hand needle), knit it together with the 1st st on the left-hand needle, inc, k 1 * Repeat from * to * until 5 sts remain on the needle, p 2, k 1, inc, k 1 (= 94 sts).

Work 3 rows in established rib pattern but k the first and the last st in all rows.

Now work in smocking st as described below:

1st row: K 1, * p 2, insert the right-hand needle front to back between the 4th and 5th st on the left-hand needle, pull the yarn through and place it on the left-hand needle (in front of the 1st st on the left-hand needle), knit it together with the 1st st, p 2, k 1 *. Repeat from * to * until 3 sts remain on the needle, p 2, k 1.

2nd-4th row: Work in established rib pattern but k the first and the last st in all rows.

5th row: K 1, p 2, k 1, * p 2, insert the right-hand needle front to back between the 4th and 5th st on the left-hand needle, pull the yarn through and place it on the left-hand needle (in front of the 1st st on the left-hand needle), knit it together with the 1st st, p 2, k 1 *. Repeat from * to * until 6 sts remain on the needle, p 2, k 1, p 2, k 1.

6th-8th row: Work in established rib pattern but k the first and the last st in all rows.

Repeat these 8 rows until the work measures 10 cm. Place the sts on four size 3 mm double pointed needles and proceed to work the crown in the round from the RS. Place a marker to indicate the beginning of the round.

Crown

The crown of the bonnet is shaped by working decreases on the different rounds. It is highly recommended to keep close track of which decrease round you are in - for instance, you can check off each round you have worked, as there are many decrease rounds and they are worked differently. The crown is worked as follows:

- Work 2 rounds in established rib pattern, but on the first round lift the last st of the round over the first st (as when casting off) to join the work (= 93 sts).
- Work 1 round as follows: K 1, * p2tog, k 1, p2tog, k 1 *, repeat from * to * until 2 sts remain, p2tog (= 77 sts).
- Work 2 rounds in established rib pattern.
- Work 1 round as follows: * K 1, p 1, k 1, p2tog *, repeat from * to * until 2 sts remain, k 1, p 1 (62 sts). (You now have a k 1, p 1 rib across the entire round)
- Work 2 rounds in established rib pattern.
- Work 1 round as follows: * K2tog, k1, p1 *, repeat from * to * until 2 sts remain, k2tog (= 46 sts).
- Work 2 rounds in established rib pattern.
- Work 1 round as follows: * K 1, k2tog *, repeat from * to * until 1 st remains, k 1 (31 sts). (You now have only k sts on the round)
- K across 1 round.
- Work 1 round as follows: * K1, k2tog *, repeat from * to * until 1 st remains, k 1 (= 21 sts).
- K across 1 round.
- Work 1 round as follows: * K2tog *, repeat from * to * until 1 st remains, k 1 (= 11 sts).
- Work 1 round as follows: * K2tog *, repeat from * to * until 1 st remains, k 1 (= 6 sts).
- Pull the yarn through the remaining live sts, close tightly and weave in the end.

Casing

Pick up approx. 70 sts along the lower edge and work about 1.5 cm of stockinette st (with the RS facing out). Cast off. Fold the edge over inside and seam along the edge between the picked up sts and the smocking pattern to create a casing. Make a 3 st I-cord (approximately 10 cm) and pull it through the casing. Weave in all ends.



ANKER'S JACKET

Materials: Sport weight yarn, 5 small buttons

Suggested yarn: 45 g of Tussah Silk from Onion (50 g = 135 m/148 yards)

Suggested needles: 4 mm (US size 6) / 60 cm (24 inches) circular needles, 4 mm double pointed needles

Gauge: 22 sts x 30 rows in stockinette st on 4 mm needles = 10 x 10 cm/4 x 4 inches

Anker's Jacket is worked top-down. The yoke consists of segments of rib with increases followed by classic raglan increases.

Yoke

The yoke is worked back and forth on circular needles. The first and last st are k on all rows. These sts will be used for picking up sts for the front bands at the end.

Cast on 53 sts on the 4 mm circular needles. The first row is a WS row. Work 5 rows of rib (k 1, p 1) until 1 st remains, k 1. You are now on the RS.

(K 2, yo) until 3 sts remain on the needle, k 3 (= 78 sts). P back while purling the yo's tbl to avoid holes.

Work 4 rows of rib (k 1, p 1) until 1 st remains, k 1. You are now on the RS.

(K 3, yo) until 3 sts remain on the needle, k 3 (= 103 sts). P back while purling the yo's tbl to avoid holes.

Work 4 rows of rib (k 1, p 1) until 1 st remains, k 1. You are now on the RS and you now have 3 segments of rib on the yoke.

K across 1 row, p across 1 row. You are now on the RS.

The rest of the yoke is worked in stockinette st with raglan increases on the RS rows (remember that the first and last st are still k on all rows). Note that you will be working a raglan st between all the increases. Divide for raglan shaping as follows:

14 sts (left front), 1 raglan st, 20 sts (left sleeve), 1 raglan st, 31 sts (back), 1 raglan st, 20 sts (right sleeve), 1 raglan st, 14 sts (right front) (= 103 sts).

Work raglan increases on the RS rows as follows:

* K until the raglan st, insert the left needle into the thread below from the back and k it, k the raglan st, insert the left needle into the thread below from the front and k it tbl *. Repeat from * to * 4 times and k until the end of the row.

Work raglan increases on the RS rows a total of 4 times (= 135 sts). P across WS rows, remembering to k the first and last st.

Body

Let the 28 sleeve sts on each side rest while finishing the body. The raglan sts become part of the body.

Cast on 4 new sts under each sleeve with your preferred in-row cast on method (= 87 sts).

Work back and forth in stockinette st (k the first and last st on all WS rows as well) until the work along the fronts measures 14 cm. Work 4 rows of rib (k 1, p1) until 1 st remains, k 1. Cast off in established rib pattern from the RS.

Sleeves

The sleeves are knit in the round on 4 mm double pointed needles. Pick up 4 sts in the sts that you cast on under the sleeve (= 32 sts) and let the round start in the middle of these. Place a marker to indicate the beginning of the round.

K across all rounds until the inside length of the sleeve is 9 cm measured from the armhole, **while at the same time** decreasing two sts on every 5th round a total of 4 times as follows: K2tog after the first st of the round and k2togtbl before the last st of the round (= 24 sts). K 4 rounds of rib (k 1, p 1). Cast off in established rib pattern on the 5th round.

Front bands

Pick up 35 sts along the right front band. Work 4 rows of rib (k 1, p 1) until 1 st remains, k 1, and cast off in established rib pattern on the 5th row (from the RS). Knit the left front band in the same way but on the 2nd row (a RS row) work 5 buttonholes as follows:

Work 2 sts of rib, * k2tog, yo, work 5 sts of rib *, repeat from * to * until 5 sts remain, k2tog, yo, work 3 sts of rib.

Finishing

Weave in all ends. Sew 5 buttons on the right front band, opposite to the buttonholes.

ANKER'S BONNET

Materials: Fingering weight yarn

Suggested yarn: 21 g of Tynn Merinowull from Sandnes Garn (50 g = 175 m/191 yards).



Suggested needles: 3 mm (US size 2.5) needles, 3 mm double pointed needles.

Gauge: 36 sts x 41 rows of rib (k 1, p 1) on 3 mm needles = 10 x 10 cm/4 x 4 inches

Anker's Bonnets is worked at first back and forth in segments of rib. Then the crown is worked in stockinette st in the round on double pointed needles and shaped with decreases.

On all rows that are worked back and forth, slip the first st purlwise with the yarn in front. This will create a neater edge.

Cast on 91 sts on the 3 mm needles. The first row is a WS row. Work 1 row of rib (k 1, p 1). You are now on the RS.

* Work 6 rows of rib (k 1, p 1), k across 1 row, p across 1 row *. Repeat from * to * a total of 4 times.

The work now measures approx. 8 cm. You are now on the RS.

Tip: You can alternate starting each rib segment with a k or a p st - it gives the bonnet a nicer look.

Crown

The crown is worked in stockinette st in the round. Place the sts on three double pointed needles. K across all sts and join to work in the round by knitting the last st of the row and the first st of the row together (= 90 sts). You can place a marker to indicate the beginning of the round.

Now work decreases as follows:

* (K 7, k2tog) across the entire round. K across 1 round *. Repeat from * to *, but let there be one less st between the decreases on every decrease round [next decrease round will be (k 6, k2tog), the next one (k 5, k2tog) and so on]. Continue until 1 st remains between the decreases and k2tog across the next round. Cut the working yarn and pull the it through the remaining sts. Pull tight to close the crown and weave in the end.

Ties

With a 3 mm double pointed needle, pick up 3 sts at one corner of the bonnet. Knit a tie over the 3 sts by always knitting from the RS as follows: K3, push the sts to the other end of the needle, with the yarn in the back k 3. Continue until the desired length (for example 10 cm). You have created a 3 st I-cord. Repeat on the other corner of the bonnet.

Weave in all ends.



WILLUM'S OVERALLS

Materials: Fingering weight yarn, 2 small buttons

Suggested yarn: 50 g of Tynn Merinoull from Sandnes Garn (50 g = 175 m/191 yards)

Suggested needles: 3 mm (US size 2.5) / 80 cm (32 inches) circular needles, 2.5 mm and 3 mm (US size 2.5 and 2) double pointed needles

Gauge: 28 sts x 40 rows in stockinette st on 3 mm needles = 10 x 10 cm/4 x 4 inches

Willum's Overalls are worked from the bottom up. The legs are worked on double pointed needles and the body is worked in the round on circular needles using the magic loop technique.

Legs

Cast on 38 sts on 3 mm double pointed needles. Join to work in the round, making sure that the cast on edge is not twisted. Place a marker to indicate the beginning of the round (the inner side of the leg). Work 2 cm of rib (k 1, p 1). Now continue working in the round in stockinette st until the leg measures 12 cm from the cast on edge, **while at the same time** increasing 2 sts on every 5th round a total of 7 times (= 52 sts) as follows:

K 1, insert the left needle into the thread below from the back and k it, k until 1 st remains on the round, insert the left needle into the thread below from the front and k it tbl, k 1.

Make another identical leg.

Body

The body is worked in stockinette st on 3 mm needles. Place both legs on the 80 cm circular needles with the insides facing each other so that you can continue knitting using the magic loop technique (if you are not familiar with this technique you can google it - there are many good videos available online) (= 104 sts). Place markers to mark the sides (side markers). The marker in the left side indicates the beginning of the round. Cast on 6 sts between each leg both front and back (= 116 sts), with your preferred in-row cast on method. Place a marker (middle markers) between the 3rd and 4th sts of these, both front and back. Knit 2 rounds across all sts. Now decrease a total of 12 sts in between the legs as follows:

K until 5 sts before the middle front marker, k2togtbl, k until 3 sts after the middle front marker, k2tog. Repeat on the back (= 112 sts). K across 1 round.

K until 4 sts before the middle front marker, k2togtbl, k until 2 sts after the middle front marker, k2tog. Repeat on the back (= 108 sts). K across 1 round.

K until 3 sts before the middle front marker, k2togtbl, k until 1 st after the middle front marker, k2tog. Repeat on the back (= 104 sts). Continue in stockinette st until the body measures 12 cm from the leg joint.

Work 1.5 cm of rib (k 1, p 1).

Bib

Now, you will divide the work into front and back at the side markers. The front should start and end with a k st so include a st from the front in the sts of the back (front = 51 sts, back = 53 sts).

On the next round cast off 12 sts in established rib pattern, work 9 sts of rib (strap), cast off 11 sts in rib, work 9 sts of rib (strap), cast off 12 sts in rib. Work in rib across the front until 2 sts remain, k2tog.

Let the sts of the straps rest while working the bib back and forth in rib st (k 1, p 1) with decreases in every row as follows:

* Slip the first st purlwise with the yarn in front. Work in rib until 2 sts remain on the needle, k2tog *.

Repeat from * to * 15 times (so that 35 sts remain). At the same time on the 14th row (a RS row) work buttonholes on each side as follows: Slip the first st purlwise with the yarn in front, work 1 st in rib, k2tog, yo, work in established rib pattern until 5 sts remain on the needle, yo, k2tog, work 1 st in rib, k2tog.

Cast off 6 sts in established rib pattern, p until 7 sts remain on the needle, work 5 sts in established rib pattern, k2tog (= 28 sts).

Cast off 6 sts in rib, p the rest of the row (= 22 sts). You are now on the RS. Switch to 2.5 mm needles. Work 1.5 cm back and forth in stockinette st. Cast off all sts.

Straps

The straps are worked from the live sts resting on the back, on 2.5 mm needles. Knit the two straps one at a time in rib st (k 1, p 1) but slip the first st on each row purlwise with the yarn in front and k the last st on each row.

Make both straps 15 cm long. Cast off all sts.

Finishing

Fold the stockinette edge of the bib along the purl row and sew it on the WS with discrete and slightly loose sts. Sew a button on each strap (on the RS). The straps are crossed on the back when in use. Weave in all ends and sew together the hole between the legs.

KARLA'S DRESS

Materials: Sport weight yarn, 1 small button

Suggested yarn: 67 g of Indiecita from Filcolana (50 g = 165 m/180 yards)

Suggested needles: 2.5 mm and 3 mm (US size 2.5 and 2) / 40 cm (16 inches) circular needles, 2.5 mm and 3 mm double pointed needles, crochet hook

Gauge: 24 sts x 35 rows in stockinette st on 3 mm needles = 10 x 10 cm/4 x 4 inches



Karla's Dress is worked top-down shaping the yoke with raglan decreases. The first part of the yoke is worked back and forth to create an opening in the back. Then the yoke is worked in the round. When working the opening in the back make a neat edge by knitting the first st and then slipping the last st purlwise with the yarn in front on all rows.

Cast on 53 sts on the 3 mm needles. The first row is a WS row. Work 3 rows of rib k 1 (p 1, k 1). You are now on the RS. K across 1 row, p across 1 row.

Now work the raglan increases. Note that you will be working a raglan st between all raglan increases. Divide for raglan shaping as follows: 9 sts (right back), 1 raglan st, 8 sts (right sleeve), 1 raglan st, 16 sts (front), 1 raglan st, 8 sts (left sleeve), 1 raglan st, 8 sts (left back) (= 53 sts).

Work raglan increases on the RS rows as follows:

* K until the raglan st, insert the left needle into the thread below from the back and k it, k the raglan st, insert the left needle into the thread below from the front and k it tbl *

Repeat from * to * 4 times and k until the end of the row.

When the opening in the back measures 3 cm join the work from the RS and continue working in the round on the circular needles. The raglan increases are now worked on every 2nd round until you have made a total of 12 raglan increase row/rounds (= 148 sts).

Body

Let the 32 sleeve sts on each side rest while you continue working on the body (include the raglan sts in the sts for the body).

Cast on 4 new sts under each sleeve, with your preferred in-row cast on method (= 92 sts). The round now begins at the middle of these under the right sleeve. Work 2 cm from the armhole in stockinette st. Cast off loosely.

Skirt

In the cast-off edge of the body, with the 3 mm needles, pick up one st per each cast off st and join to knit in the round (= 92 sts). (It may seem like double work to cast off the sts and then pick them up again, but it ensures a neat transition from the body to the skirt, while adding sturdiness and stability to the fabric).

Double the number of sts by (k 1, yo) across the entire round (= 184

sts). K across the next round, while at the same time knitting the yo's tbl to avoid holes.

Continue working in the round in stockinette st until the skirt measures 14 cm. P across 1 round (folding edge). Switch to the 2.5 mm needles. Work 1.5 cm of stockinette st. Cast off loosely.

Sleeves

The sleeves are worked in the round on 3 mm double pointed needles. Pick up 4 sts in the sts that you cast on at the armhole (= 36 sts) and let the row start in the middle of these. Place a marker to indicate the beginning of the round.

Work until the inside of the sleeve measures 10 cm, while at the same time reducing the number of sts by 2 sts every 6th round a total of 5 times as follows: K2tog after the first st of the round and k2togtbl (k2tog through the back loop) before the last st of the round (= 26 sts). P across 1 round (folding edge). Switch to the 2.5 mm needles. Work 1.5 cm of stockinette st. Cast off loosely.

Knit another sleeve identically.

Finishing

Fold the bottom 1.5 cm of the skirt and the sleeves along the purl row and sew onto the WS with small, discrete sts. Crochet a loop of chain sts at the top of the opening in the back and sew a small button on the opposite side.

Weave in all ends.



NORA'S SKIRT

Materials: Light fingering weight yarn, approx. 34 cm thin elastic band, needle and thread, 2 small buttons

Suggested yarn: 42 g of Økologisk Sommeruld from CaMaRose (50 g = 230 m/251 yards)

Suggested needles: 2.5 mm and 3 mm (US size 2.5 and 2) / 40 and 60 cm (16 and 24 inches) circular needles

Gauge: 29 sts x 38 rows in stockinette st on 3 mm needles = 10 x 10 cm/4 x 4 inches

Nora's Skirt is worked top-down in stockinette st. A casing is created around the waist to place an elastic band. The straps are made separately at the end, sewn on, and are crossed when used. On the front, 2 decorative buttons are sewn.

Skirt

Cast on 100 sts on the 2.5 mm / 40 cm circular needles. Join to knit in the round, making sure that the cast on edge is not twisted. Place a marker at the beginning of the round to indicate the left side of the skirt.

K across 6 rounds. Change to the 3 mm needles and p across 1 round (top folding edge), k across 5 rounds.

(K 1, yo) across the entire round (= 200 sts).

K across the next round, making sure you k the yo's tbl (through the back loop) to avoid holes. You can now switch to longer circular needles to accommodate the bigger number of sts if necessary.

Work in the round in stockinette st until the work from the folding edge at the waist measures 13 cm. P across 1 round (bottom folding edge).

Switch to the 2.5 mm circular needles and k across 5 rounds. Cast off

all sts loosely. Leave a long tail when cutting the working yarn to sew the bottom folding edge onto the WS all the way around.

Straps

Cast on 9 sts on 2.5 mm needles. Work back and forth in rib st (k 1, p 1), but on all rows k the first st and slip the last st purlwise with the yarn in front (this will create a neater edge). Work until the strap measures approx. 24 cm. Make another identical strap.

Finishing

To create the casing around the waist seam the cast on edge along the WS (please note that the skirt has twice the number of sts as the casing, so try to adjust when seaming to one out of two sts in the skirt so that the seam will not be crumpled). Leave a hole to pull the elastic band through. Sew the elastic together at the ends with a small overlap using needle and thread. Seam the small opening left of the casing.

Sew the straps onto the skirt - on the back sew them on the WS and on the front sew them on the RS and decorate each one with a small button.

Seam the bottom folding edge along the WS with small, discrete sts. Weave in all ends.

NO FRILLS SWEATER

Materials: Fingering weight yarn + lace weight yarn, 1 small button

Suggested yarn: 27 g of Anina from Filcolana (50g = 210m/230 yards) held together with 12 g of Tilia from Filcolana (25 g = 210 m/230 yards)

Suggested needles: 3 mm and 4 mm (US size 2.5 and 6) / 40 cm (16 inches) circular needles, 3 mm and 4 mm double pointed needles, crochet hook

Gauge: 21 sts x 28 rows in stockinette st on 4 mm needles = 10 x 10 cm/4 x 4 inches



No Frills Sweater is worked top-down with raglan increases, holding the two strands of yarn together. The first part of the yoke is worked back and forth to create an opening in the back. The sleeves are then worked on double pointed needles.

Cast on 55 sts on the 3 mm needles. The first row is a WS row. Work 5 rows of rib (k 1, p 1) k 1. You are now on the RS. Switch to the 4 mm / 40 cm needles and continue working back and forth in stockinette st. Now, you will start working the raglan increases. **Note** that you will be working a raglan st between all raglan increases. Divide for raglan shaping as follows:

9 sts (right back), 1 raglan st, 9 sts (right sleeve), 1 raglan st, 16 sts (front), 1 raglan st, 9 sts (left sleeve), 1 raglan st, 8 sts (left back).

Work raglan increases on the RS rows as follows:

* K until the raglan st, insert the left needle into the thread below from the back and k it, k the raglan st, insert the left needle into the thread below from the front and k it tbl *.

Repeat from * to * 4 times and k until the end of the row.

When the opening in the back measures 3 cm, join the work from the RS and continue working in the round on the circular needles. The raglan increases are now worked on every 2nd round until you have made a total of 10 raglan increase row/rounds (= 134 sts).

Body

The body is worked in the round in stockinette st. Let the 29 sleeve sts on each side rest while finishing the body. Include the raglan sts in the sts for the body.

Cast on 4 new sts under each sleeve, with your preferred in-row cast on method (= 84 sts). The round now begins in the middle of these under the right sleeve. Work 6 cm from the armhole in stockinette st. Switch to the 3 mm circular needles. Work 4 rounds of rib (k 1, p 1). Cast off in established rib pattern on the 5th round.

Sleeves

The sleeves are worked in the round on 4 mm double pointed needles. Pick up 4 sts in the sts that you cast on at the armhole (= 33 sts) and let the row start in the middle of these. Place a marker to indicate the beginning of the round.

Work until the inside of the sleeve measures 9 cm from the armhole, **while at the same time** reducing the number of sts by 2 sts every 5th round a total of 5 times as follows: K2tog after the first st of the round and k2togtbl (k2tog through the back loop) before the last st of the round (= 23 sts). Reduce the number of sts to 22 sts. Switch to the 3 mm circular needles. Work 4 rounds of rib (k 1, p 1). Cast off in established rib pattern on the 5th round.

Finishing

Crochet a loop of chain sts at the top of the opening in the back and sew a small button on the opposite side.

Weave in all ends.

ELINOR'S BLOOMERS

Materials: Fingering weight yarn, 2 buttons, approx. 34 cm elastic band (1 cm wide)

Suggested yarn: 20 g of Pernilla from Filcolana (50 g = 175 m/191 yards) or 16 g of No. 4 from Önlng (25 g = 105 m/114 yards)



Suggested needles: 3 mm and 3.5 mm (US size 2.5 and 4) / 40 cm (16 inches) circular needles, 3 mm and 3.5 mm double pointed needles

Gauge: 23 sts x 32 rows in stockinette st on 3.5 mm needles = 10 x 10 cm/4 x 4 inches

Elinor's Bloomers are worked in the round on circular needles top-down. At the top, there will be a casing for a narrow elastic band.

Cast on 80 sts on the 3 mm / 40 cm circular needles. Join to knit in the round, making sure that the cast on edge is not twisted. Place a marker to indicate the beginning of the round and another one after 40 sts. K across 5 rounds. Switch to the 3.5 mm needles and p across 1 round (folding edge). Work 3 cm of stockinette st measured from the folding edge.

Now work short rows in the back. You can use the short row technique you prefer - I recommend using German Short Rows. From the beginning of the round, work as follows:

K 25, turn, p 10, turn. K until 5 sts after the last turn, turn, p until 5 sts after the last turn, turn. Repeat in the same way with 5 sts in between the turns until you have turned 4 times on each side. You are now on the RS.

Continue working in the round in stockinette st until the work measures 7 cm from the folding edge mid front.

K 40 (back), cast off 8 sts (left leg), k 24 (front), cast off 8 sts (right leg). Now you will finish the front and back separately. Let the sts of the front rest while working back and forth in stockinette st with decreases across the back as follows:

RS rows: K2togtbl at the beginning of the row, k2tog at the end of the row.

WS rows: P2tog at the beginning and the end of the row.

Work a total of 15 rows of decreases (= 10 sts). P across 1 row and cast off from the RS on the next row.

The front is worked in the same way with decreases on a total of 7 rows (= 10 sts). Continue in stockinette st without decreasing until the front is the same length as the back when the bloomers are lying flat. Cast off from the RS. Sew together between the legs.

Leg opening

Pick up 46 sts on the 3 mm double pointed needles at the edge of each leg opening and work 3 rounds of rib (k 1, p 1). Cast off in rib on the 4th round.

Fold the top of the bloomers over along the purl row and sew the casing with small, discrete sts. Pull the elastic band through the casing before sewing it all the way.

Sew two decorative buttons on the front. Weave in the ends.

ANKER'S SWEATER

Materials: Fingering weight yarn, 1 small button

Suggested yarn: 35 g Merino from Knitting For Olive (50 g = 250 m/273 yards)

Suggested needles: 3 mm (US size 2.5) / 40 cm (16 inches) circular needles, 3 mm double pointed needles, crochet hook

Gauge: 28 sts x 38 rows in stockinette st on 3 mm needles = 10 x 10 cm/4 x 4 inches



Anker's Sweater is worked top-down. The yoke consists of 4 segments of rib. The first part of the yoke is worked back and forth to create an opening in the back. Then the work is joined and knit seamlessly in the round on circular needles.

Cast on 61 sts on the 3 mm / 40 cm circular needles. The first row is a WS row. Work 1 row of rib (k1, p 1) k1. Now, work 6 more rows of rib back and forth in established pattern. The next row is a RS row. On the next row work 30 increases as follows: K 1, yo, * k 2, yo *, repeat from * to * until 2 sts remain on the needle, k 2 (= 91 sts). P back across the next row, while purling the yo's tbl to avoid holes. You are now on the RS.

Work 6 rows of rib (k 1, p 1) k 1.

Now you will join the work to continue knitting in the round on the circular needles. Do so by knitting the first and last st of the round together (= 90 sts). You can place a marker to indicate the beginning of the round, which now starts mid back (at the opening).

K across 1 round, making 30 increases as follows: K 1, yo, * k 3, yo *, repeat from * to * until 2 sts remain on the round, k 2 (= 120 sts). K across 1 round while knitting the yo's tbl to avoid holes.

Work 6 rounds of rib (k 1, p 1).

K across 1 round, making 30 increases as follows: K 1, yo, * k 4, yo *,

repeat from * to * until 3 sts remain on the round, k 3 (= 150 sts). K across 1 round while knitting the yo's tbl to avoid holes.

Work 6 rounds of rib (k 1, p 1).

The rest of the yoke is shaped with classic raglan increases. Note that you will be working a raglan st, between all raglan increases. Divide for raglan shaping as follows:

20 sts (right back), 1 raglan st, 33 sts (right sleeve), 1 raglan st, 40 sts (front), 1 raglan st, 33 sts (left sleeve), 1 raglan st, 20 sts (left back) (= 150 sts).

Continue in the round in stockinette st and work raglan increases on every 2nd round as follows:

* K until the raglan st, insert the left needle into the thread below from the back and k it, k the raglan st, insert the left needle into the thread below from the front and k it tbl *

Repeat from * to * 4 times and k until the end of the row.

Work raglan increases on every 2nd round a total of 3 times (= 174 sts).

Body

The body is worked seamlessly in the round in stockinette st. Let the 39 sleeve sts on each side rest and continue working on the body. Include the raglan sts in the sts for the body.

Cast on 4 new sts under each sleeve (= 104 sts). The round now begins in the middle of these 4 new sts under the right sleeve. Work 7 cm from the armhole in stockinette st. Work 5 rounds of rib (k 1, p 1). Cast off in established rib pattern on the 6th round.

Sleeves

The sleeves are worked in the round on 3 mm double pointed needles. Pick up 4 sts in the sts of the body that you cast on under the arm (= 43 sts) and let the row start in the middle of these. Place a marker to indicate the beginning of the round.

Work until the inner length of the sleeve is 9 cm measured from the armhole, **while at the same time** reducing the number of sts by 2 sts every 5th round a total of 5 times as follows: K2tog after the first st of the round and k2ogtbl (k2tog through the back loop) before the last st of the round (= 33 sts). Reduce the number of sts by 5 sts evenly distributing 5 k2tog on the next round (= 28 sts). Work 5 rounds of rib (k 1, p 1). Cast off in established ribbing pattern on the 6th round.

Finishing

Crochet a loop of chain sts at the top of the opening in the back and sew a small button on the opposite side.

Weave in all ends.

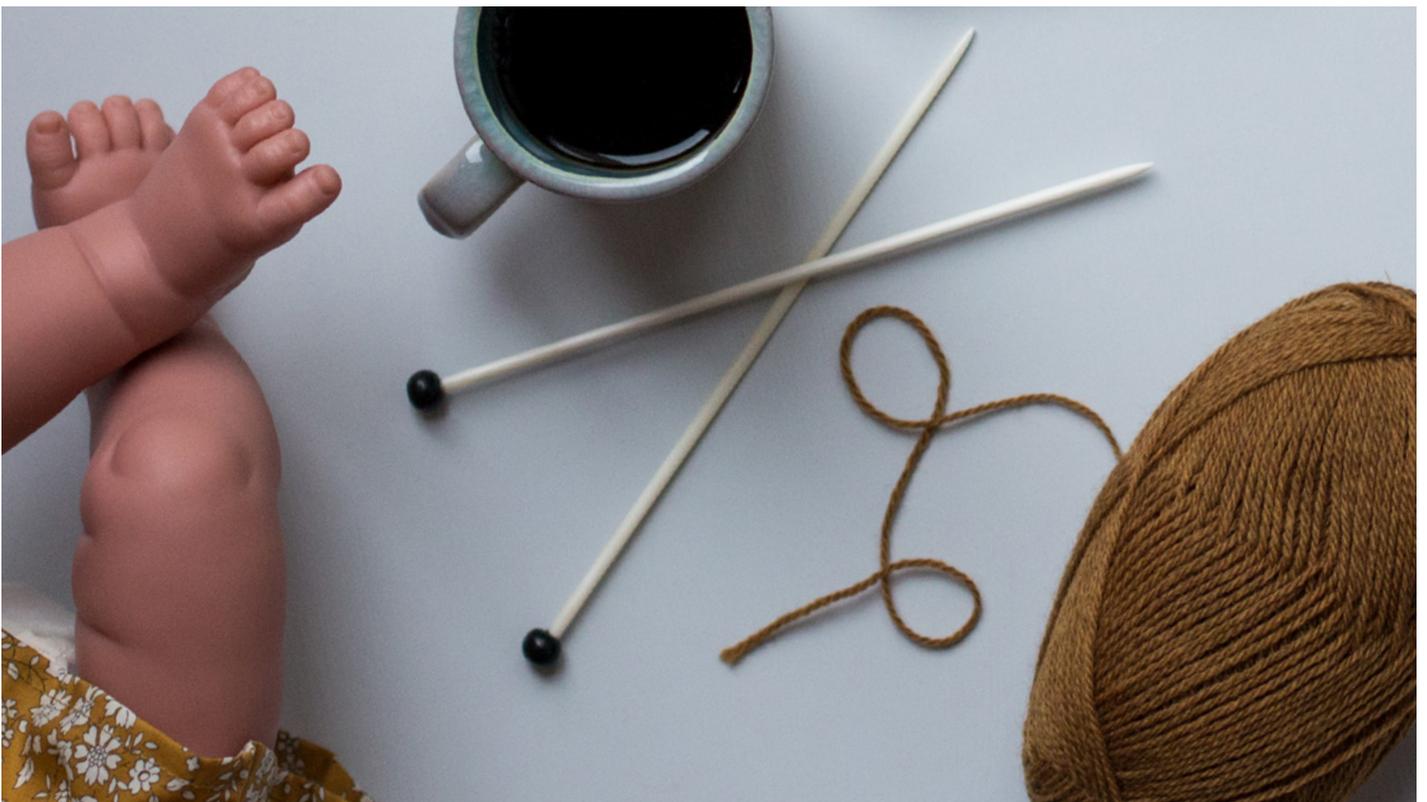
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
