CROCHET PHONE CASE PATTERN

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About the pattern

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This is a variation on tapestry crochet. Instead of working single crochet stitches you work cross single crochet stitches to create a lovely imitation of cross stitching.

The pattern is worked with 2 (or more) colors at a time. You follow the graph and crochet a stitch in colorA while carrying colorB and working a stitch over it. When the graph calls for a color change, you swap the yarns and crochet a stitch in colorB while carrying colorA and working a stitch over it.

The pouch is worked in continuous rounds.

To keep the vertical lines of X stitches straight you have to insert the hook into the front loop only.

There are 2 things you need to know:

- **How to work a cross single crochet stitch** (and other stitches used in the pattern – See Techniques and Abbreviations – page 3)
- **How to read a graph.** (page 5)

Choose any **yarn** that helps to reveal the texture and a matching crochet hook. It could be your chance to use up some leftover yarn! Make sure the colors do not bleed when washed.

Cotton yarn works great for this project. (approximate weight: 100g (3.5oz) length: 210-250m (230-270 yards). For example:

Yarn ideas –Pouch size – Crochet hook

Light brown insect in dark brown background - Katia Cotton100% 25 g in total. Size 16cm x 8cm; 6.3" x 3.1". (7g light brown color #12; 18g dark brown #9) (Katia Cotton100% 100g - 240m, crochet hook #3mm; 3oz 1/2 - 262 yards, crochet hook US C2 / D3)

Light brown insect in off white background – 1.5mm macramé rope and jute 68g in total. Size 18cm x 9cm; 7" x 3.5". (macramé natural cotton twine – 100g – 107m, crochet hook #3.5mm; 3oz 1/2 – 117 yards, crochet hook US E4)

White insect in aquamarine background – Red Heart Unforgettable 100% acrylic 58g in total. Size 20cm x 12cm; 7.8" x 4.7" with 1 extra stitch added on both sides of the graph. (Red Heart Unforgettable 100% acrylic color #03960 worked with 2 strands of yarn at once and similar weight white yarn. 100g -250m crochet hook #4mm; 3oz ½ - 273 yards, crochet hook US G6)



Techniques and abbreviations

yo - yarn over - wrap the yarn over the hook (Pic1)

yu - yarn under - hook the yarn from above and keep the yarn under the hook (Pic2)

cA - color A

cB - color B

st - stitch (sts - stitches)

***...* rep 1 time - repeat**

what is between *..*

ch - chain stitch ([chain video https://youtu.be/wgnmXMJUvfw](https://youtu.be/wgnmXMJUvfw)) Hold the yarn and slip knot (Pic3). Wrap the yarn over the hook (Pic4). Pull a new loop through the loop on the hook. One chain (ch1) is made (Pic5). The loop on the hook is not counted as a chain stitch.

xsc -cross single crochet (see the video at flxsc) Insert the hook, yarn under the hook (Pic6) and pull the new loop through. Wrap the yarn over the hook (Pic7) and pull a loop through both loops on the hook. One loop remains on the hook. One cross single crochet stitch (1xsc) is made (Pic8).



2xsc into 1 - 2xsc stitches are worked one by one by inserting the hook into the same stitch.

3xsc into 1 - 3xsc stitches are worked one by one by inserting the hook into the same stitch.

5 flxsc – 1flxsc is worked into each next 5 stitches.

flxsc – front loop cross single crochet ([flxsc video https://youtu.be/Zqn_b-B5cVE](https://youtu.be/Zqn_b-B5cVE)) Insert the hook under the front loop upwards (Pic9) and work a xsc.

Carry yarn – ([Video how to carry yarn https://youtu.be/Z-8hkKnvBg](https://youtu.be/Z-8hkKnvBg)) place colorB yarn over the front loop of the previous round (Pic10) and work a flxsc stitch as usual with colorA over colorB yarn this way locking it in crochet (Pic11, Pic12).

Close a stitch in a different color- start the stitch in the color that the pattern calls for. To draw the final loop, pick the yarn that you carry and pull the final loop with the color of the next stitch (Pic13) (twist yarn A and yarn B consistently throughout the work: pick the yarn you carry from the back and push the yarn you are not going to use to close the loop to the front).

slst - slip stitch Insert the hook, wrap the yarn over the hook, and pull a new loop through both the work and the loop on the hook. One slip stitch (1slst) is made (Pic14).

Reverse single crochet (also known as crab stitch) – ([reverse single crochet video https://youtu.be/QKURgLv-O7g](https://youtu.be/QKURgLv-O7g)) As the name suggests, you work a single crochet stitch by inserting the hook against the direction of crochet. **Ch1 (rise)**, insert the hook into the previous stitch to the right (Pic15), yarn under (Pic16) and pull through the work. Make the loop a bit longer, yarn over (Pic17), and pull through both loops on the hook. 1 reverse single crochet is made.



How to read a graph

The insect design is given in the grid graph.

1 cell is 1 cross single crochet stitch which is worked in appointed color.

You read the graph from right to left and from bottom up (Pic18, full size on page16).



Close the stitch in the color that is needed for the next stitch. ([video](https://youtu.be/QlzUQU8-00w) of round 1 of the graph <https://youtu.be/QlzUQU8-00w>)

The loop on the hook belongs to the next stitch. That's the most important thing you need to remember.


(Note, you read the graph from right to left.)



In Pic19 You can see 2 white cells. That means you work 2 white flxsc stitches but you close the second stitch in dark color yarn because the next cell in the graph is dark.




Pic19 Close the second white stitch in dark because the next stitch should be dark.




Pic20 work 2 dark stitches but close the 2nd dark stitch in white because the next stitch in the graph is white.


To make the reading of the graph easier you can **cover** the top rounds and reveal only the round you are working on and the previous rounds.



You can easily **adapt the graph** to your needs.

Make it:

Wider or narrower: (Pic24)

Add an extra 1, 2 or more stitches (vertical lines) in colorA on both sides to make the pouch wider. Skip 1 stitch on both sides to make the pouch narrower.

Taller or shorter: (Pic25)

Crochet more or less rounds before or after the insect design to make the pouch smaller or taller.

One of my pouches is of exactly the same size as my phone and I decided not to add any fastening as it fits perfectly. Another pouch features a magnetic clasp attached from inside. To be able to close it I left 2 rounds of empty space at the top. To keep the graph in the center I added 1 extra round before the graph and 1 after.

You should consider how / if you are going to close your pouch. If, for instance, you are planning to sew a button, think about the size of the button and where you will position it and how much space you will need for the button so that it looks good.

Making a cover for a **specific gadget** (phone, tablet or ebook reader)?


In an ideal world you should know the gauge of your particular yarn and crochet hook. Crochet a swatch in the round in flxsc carrying a yarn, wash your swatch, block it and count how many stitches there are in a 4"x4" size swatch. Calculate the number of stitches for your project accordingly.

OR

Crochet a chain, place the chain along the bottom of your gadget and count the chain loops (Pic26). You should have an odd number of stitches. If not, add 1 to have an odd number. You should have 13, 15, 17, 19 or more stitches. The first and the last stitches of your chain will be used to build side walls. (You will work 3 stitches into 1 chain loop for the side walls.) (Pic27, full size on page 16).

If your chain is made of 17 stitches you use the first and the last chain loops for the side walls and use the remaining 15 chain loops for the front and back walls, which are the 15 sts of the graph (Pic24)

If your chain is made of 19 (or more stitches) you use the first and the last chain loops for the side walls and from the remaining 17 chain sts use 15 for the graph and add 1 (or more) st in color A at the beginning and 1 (or more) st in color A at the end of the graph (Pic24).

If your chain is made of 15 stitches and you have only 13 sts for the front / back wall, use one of the three side wall sts on both sides for the 1st and 15th sts of the graph.


If your chain is made of 13 stitches and you have only 11 sts for the front / back wall, skip the the 1st and 15th sts of the graph (Pic24) and use one of the three side wall sts on both sides for the 2nd and 14th sts of the graph.

If your chain number is less than 13 stitches, switch to a smaller hook size or look for some thinner yarn.

Check if you are happy with the size of your pouch after 2-3 rounds.

Crochet pouch step by step tutorial

Note: the photos and video you see in the tutorial are not of the actual pouch. I used 5mm rope and 10mm hook (which is huge!) to capture the detail better. The video focuses on the techniques. For the correct number of stitches follow the pattern.

Step1 Foundation chain. (See page 7 how to adapt the size for your specific gadget) [Video of Step1 - Step4 https://youtu.be/fr0RH1TuE](https://youtu.be/fr0RH1TuE) The video focuses on the techniques. For the correct number of stitches follow the pattern.

In cA **ch18** (ch17 + ch1 for the rise)

Step2 Round1 ([Video](#) Step2)

Place cB over the chain and carry it throughout (see page4) (Pic30), work in cA.

1xsc into 2nd chain loop from the hook
(Pic30 where the needle is pointing),

1xsc into next chain loop (Pic31) (place a marker but not into the loop on the hook (Pic32)),


The marker shows the beginning of the front / back wall. In this case it is the 1st stitch of the graph.


1xsc into next 14 chain loops

3xsc into 1 into last chain loop (Pic33).

Turn your work round and continue by inserting the hook into the same chain loops on your way back (Pic34)

1xsc into next chain loop (place a marker but not into the loop on the hook) (Pic35),

(36 sts in total in Round1 and the following rounds)

Step3 Double check the number of stitches. The markers show the 1st stitch of the front and back wall. In this case it is the first stitch of the graph. Between the markers there should be 15 (the graph design) +3 (side wall) stitches.

Step4 From now on work in the round; insert the hook into front loop only; move markers into the same stitch just one round up.

Round2 cA 36flxsc, carry cB (Pic37 – Pic40)




Pic40 insert the marker again into the 2nd flxsc of the round. In this case it is the 1st stitch of the graph.


Step5 Round3 – Round5 **Repeat Step4 3 times** (or as many as needed to position the graph in the center of the pouch, see page 6).

Try it on your gadget and see if you are happy with the size.

Step6 Round6 of the pouch is Round1 of the graph (Pic41, Pic42) [Video of Round1 of the graph](https://youtu.be/QLzUQU8-00w)

cA 1flxsc, (side wall st)

*Start the graph design at the marker.
(If you are making your front /back wall wider or narrower adapt the number of stitches accordingly, see p6)

Step7 Follow the graph and crochet Round2 – Round19 of the graph (Round7 – Round24 of the bag) (See page 5 how to read a graph; page 13 full written pattern, page 17 the graph)

Step8 Round25 – Round30 **Repeat Step4 5 times** (or as many times as needed to make a pouch for a particular gadget).

Step9 Crochet a strap. ([Video how to crochet a strap](https://youtu.be/HXUCjRktu_I)

[https://youtu.be/HXUCjRktu I](https://youtu.be/HXUCjRktu_I))You should have finished the last round in the 2nd st (out of the 3) of the side wall, which is the center of the side wall.

Hold cB between the hook and yourself, yarn over the hook from yourself (Pic47). Yarn cA as usual over the hook and work a chain stitch. Keep chaining this way until you reach the desired length of the strap. Keep in mind that the strap will stretch a bit.

Slip stitch into the 2nd side wall st on the opposite side. Make sure the strap is not twisted.

Step10 Reverse single crochet around the edge (See page4, [video how to reverse single crochet](https://youtu.be/QKUrgLv-O7g) <https://youtu.be/QKUrgLv-O7g>). The yarn that you carry can be used to tighten the top round if pulled slightly. **Ch1 (rise), 36 reverse sc, 1slst** in to the rise chain.

Step11 Weave in the ends in the reverse sc round (Pic48) and fasten a magnetic clasp (Pic49). Wash it carefully as the yarn label suggests or simply wet it and block it by shaping the pouch (if you have a plastic phone cover that is water resistant, you might wish to put it inside to shape the pouch).

Foundation chain (See page 7 how to adapt the size for your specific gadget)

cA **ch18** (ch17 + ch1 for the rise).

Round1 Place cB over the chain and carry it throughout, work in cA.

1xsc into 2nd chain loop from the hook,

1xsc into next chain loop (place a marker but not into the loop on the hook). The marker shows the beginning of the front / back wall. In this case it coincides with the 1st stitch of the graph.

1xsc into next 14 chain loops,

3xsc into1 into last chain loop. Turn your work round and continue by inserting the hook into the same chain loops on your way back.

1xsc into next chain loop (place a marker but not into the loop on the hook),

1xsc into next 14 sts,

2xsc into1. (36 sts in total in Round1 and the following rounds).

Double check the number of stitches. The markers show the 1st stitch of the front and back walls. In this case it is the first stitch of the

graph. Between the markers there should be 15 (the graph design) +3 (side wall) stitches.

From now on work in the round; insert the hook into front loop only; move markers into the same stitch just one round up.

Round2 **cA 36flxsc, carry cB**

Round3- Round5 rep Round2 Try the pouch on your gadget and see if you are happy with the size.

https://youtu.be/HXUCjRktu_I) You should have finished the last round in the 2nd st (out of the 3) of the side wall, which is the center of the side wall.

Hold cB between the hook and yourself, yarn over the hook from yourself. Yarn cA as usual over the hook and chain. Keep chaining this way until you reach the desired length of the strap. Keep in mind that the strap will stretch a bit.


Slip stitch into the 2nd side wall st on the opposite side. Make sure the strap is not twisted.

Finishing Round. Reverse single crochet around the edge. The yarn that you carry can be used to tighten the top round if pulled slightly. **Ch1 (rise), 36 reverse sc, 1slst** in to the rise chain.


Weave in the ends in the reverse sc round and fasten a magnetic clasp (Pic42). Wash it carefully as the yarn label suggests or simply wet it and block it by shaping the pouch.

Graph for the Fly Trail pouch

1 cell = 1 flxsc stitch in either color A or color B.
Close each stitch in the color of the next stitch.
