*Eric the half a ... SEXTOPUS!!*

I made a cozy^ and put it up on Ravelry. Much to my surprise, it got tons of love from my fellow knitters. Also to my surprise, I got a lot of pattern requests. Now, I'm not a big fan of writing patterns and I'm especially not a fan of writing up boring things. So I decided I'd write up just the octopus part. Quite literally, part of an octopus.

With only half a head and 3/4s of the legs, he is the very model of a slinky semi sextopus.

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## materials

- yarn (held doubled)
- waste yarn (two pieces)
- DPNs (size for a dense firm fabric)
- crochet hook
- eye stuff. options:
  - needle felting: fibre
  - satin stitch: thread or yarn
  - beads or safety eyes

## construction

This half a ceph is knit from the mantle to the tip of the tentacles.

Aggressive increases form the rounded top of the mantle and also provide structure for the 3D bulge. Gentle decreases finish the mantle shaping. The eye bumps are formed by increases followed by decreases. Next, the body is knit, putting live stitches on waste yarn along the way. Lastly, the i-cord tentacles, starting with the two rearmost ones and working our way forwards.

Sewing suggestions are provided at the end of the pattern.

# glossary

k – knit one stitch  
p – purl one stitch

ssk – slip slip knit  
sssk – slip slip slip knit  
k2tog – knit 2 together  
k3tog – knit 3 together

WYL – waste yarn, left side  
WYR – waste yarn, right side

sl1 – slip one stitch as if to knit (RS) or to purl (WS)

m1R – make one right leaning stitch  
m1L – make one left leaning stitch  
m1S – special make one - knit through both strands of the stitch

pu1 – pick up one stitch, do NOT knit  
CO – cast on - use any method unless specified  
CO1 – cast on one stitch, same caveat as for CO

## the pattern

To keep this pattern compact, the instructions are all text with no pictures. Some parts are tricky - to help you through the rough patches, check out the **photo tutorial** (see first page for link).

### mantle increases (green)

This is the hardest part to knit. The aggressive increasing, while giving us the bulging mantle will also cause the stitches on the needles to bunch up.

Row 0 : RS – With yarn doubled, CO (long tail) 2 st, keep tail on LEFT side (this is backwards from normal)  
Row 1 : RS – m1S, m1S – ie. Knit through each single strand of yarn for both stitches (4 st)  
Row 2 : WS - sl1, purl across  
Row 3 : sl1 m1R, m1S, m1S, m1L, k1 (8 st)  
Row 4 : sl1, purl across  
Row 5 : sl1, m1R, k6, m1L, k1 (10 st)  
Row 6 : sl1, purl across  
Row 7-14 : sl1, stockinette to end (8 rows)

*Tip: Knit more rows for an elongated elegant ceph; fewer rows for a stubbie cutie.*

### mantle decreases

Row 15 : RS - sl1, ssk, k4, k2tog, k1 (8 st)  
Row 16-18 : sl1, stockinette across (3 rows)  
Row 19 : RS - sl1, ssk, k2, k2tog, k1 (6 st)  
Row 20-22 : sl1, stockinette across (3 rows)  
Row 23 : RS - sl1, ssk, k2, k1 (5 st)

*Tip: This asymmetric decrease plus the one at Row 29 help to create a slightly curved octopus. Try different decreases to get other curves!*

Row 24 : sl1, purl across

### eyes (yellow)

Row 25 : sl1, m1R, m1S, k1, m1S, m1L, k1 (9 st)  
Row 26 : sl1, purl across  
Row 27 : ssk, k3, k3tog (5 st)  
Row 28 : sl1, purl across  
Row 29 : sl1, k2tog, k2 (4 st)  
Row 30 : sl1, purl across

### body (orange)

Row 31 : sl1, knit across  
Row 32 : sl1, purl across  
Row 33 : RS - put first stitch one piece of waste yarn (WYR), k2, put last stitch on the other piece of waste yarn (WYL)  
Row 34 : CO1, p2, CO1  
Row 35-36 : repeat Row 33-34

Place leftmost two stitches on WYL (Waste Yarn Left). ie. Slip two st, put next two stitches on WYL.

The first tentacle will use these two slipped stitches.



# tentacles

All six tentacles are knit the same way: Start with a 3-stitch i-cord and taper down to a crochet chain. Picking up stitches for the i-cord is a little trickier. The instructions in setting up the tentacle below will produce a symmetrically radiating pattern and are documented in the photo tutorial. However, improvisation is highly encouraged!

As with the body, start by holding your yarn doubled.

## setting up the tentacle

After completing each step below, continue with the instructions to the right, finishing the tentacle.

*Tip: Pick up stitches from the WS purl bumps.*

### TR1 (Tentacle Right #1)

St 1-2 : Using stitches already on needle, k2  
St 3 : pul and knit.

### TR2

Prep : Put leftmost 1 st from WYR (Waste Yarn Right) on left needle  
St 1 : pul from between new leftmost stitch on WYR and stitch on left needle. Knit this picked up stitch.  
St 2 : Knit 1 st from left needle  
St 3 : pul from base of TR1 and knit

### TR3

St 1 : Put last WYR stitch on left needle and knit  
St 2 : pul from the selvedge and knit  
St 3 : pul from the base of the TR2 and knit

### TL1 (Tentacle Left #1)

St 1 : pul and knit (from base of TR1)  
St 2-3 : Put rightmost 2 st from WYL on left needle and knit.

### TL2

St 1 : pul from base of TL1. Do NOT knit  
St 2 : put rightmost st on WYL on left needle and knit  
St 3 : pul from before the next WYL st and knit

### TL3

St 1 : pul from the base of TL2 and knit  
St 2 : pul from the selvedge and knit  
St 3 : put last WYL stitch on left needle and knit



## finishing the tentacle

Row 1: knit 3 rounds of 3-stitch i-cord  
Row 4: knit 4 rounds of i-cord, tight tension  
Row 8: ssk k1 (2 st)

Row 9: knit 5 rounds of i-cord  
Row 14: knit 6 rounds of i-cord, tight tension  
Row 20: ssk (1 st)

Switch to crochet hook

Row 21: crochet (or finger knit) 7 chains

Cut one yarn, leaving longish tail  
Row 28: crochet 7 chains, somewhat loosely  
Row 35: crochet 7 chains, super tight tension

Cut yarn, leaving a long tail, and draw through.

*Tip: Leave long tails. When picking up and casting off, leave at least 6 inches for the tail. These extra bits can be used later to sew your octopus onto the base material.*

## sewing



To attach the ceph, first pin it on to your base fabric. Separate the cast on tail into two strands and start sewing down both sides of the mantle, lightly stuffing as you go. Continue around the eyes, stuff this bit, then down to where the tentacles start. Using more cast on tails, sew around the base of each tentacle (about 1/2 inch). You can choose to sew down the entire length of the tentacles or tack them down at key spots. The former will give let you shape the tentacle exactly as you want. The latter will give you stretchiness.

Sew or felt on the eyes, and you're done!
