



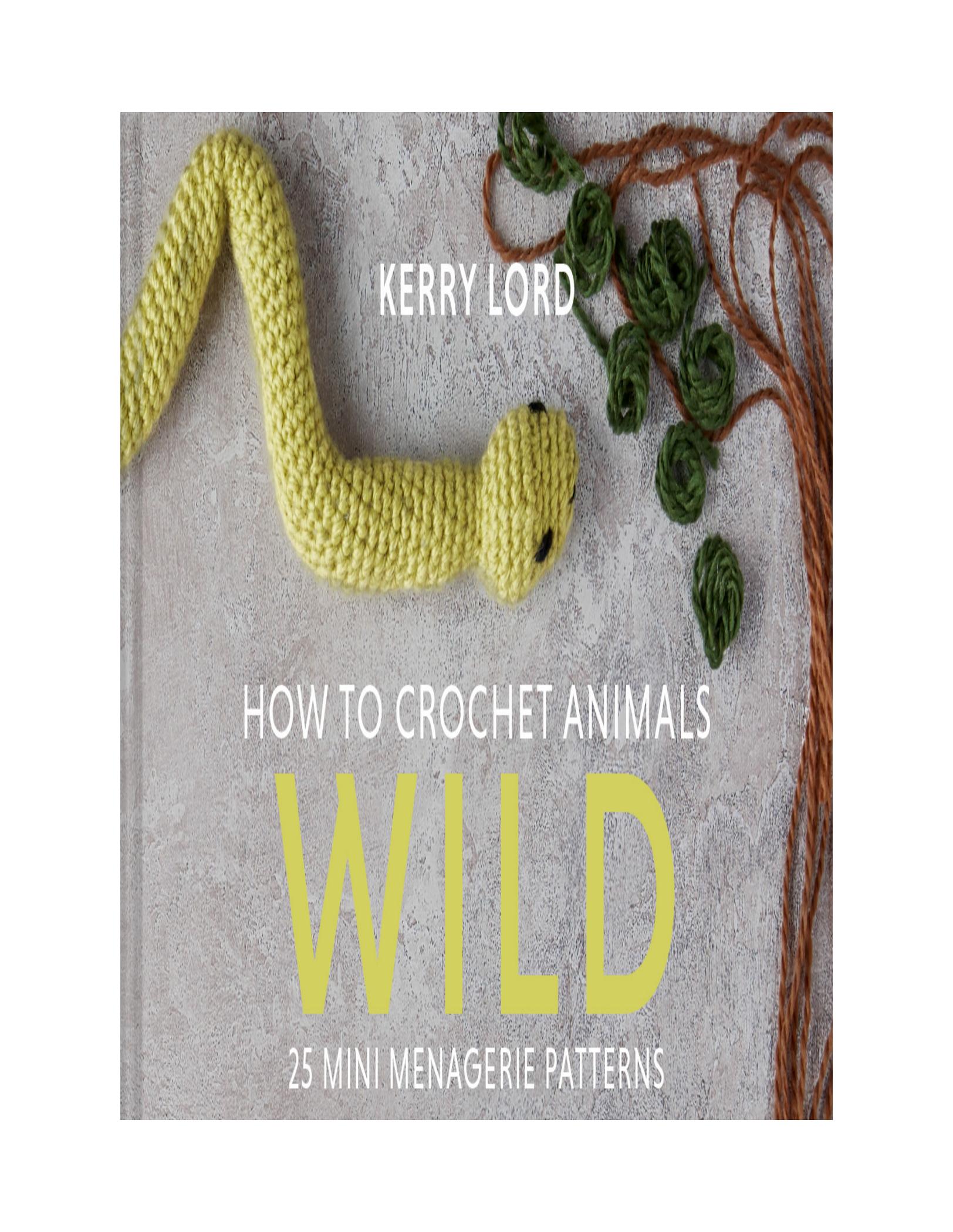

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INTRODUCTION



I hope this book will be a brilliant introduction to crochet for anyone picking up a hook for the first time, but also give a lot of enjoyment to anyone already familiar with the double crochet stitch. I believe learning to crochet is something that should be done with the clear motivation of a pattern to master and the resulting feeling of accomplishment when that project is complete. These quick and easy crochet animals are a great way to start to learn a range of basic and more advanced crochet techniques, and the variety of projects and progression of difficulty across the twenty-five patterns should keep even a seasoned maker entertained and challenged.

I learned to crochet from a video that taught me the British double crochet stitch (US single crochet). Like with anything new, to begin with holding a hook and yarn felt awkward and unfamiliar, but even after just a few hours of perseverance I found my way of holding the hook and working the stitches and discovered how much fun you could have with just one simple technique. This book is a gathering together of all of my experience learning to crochet and teaching people to crochet over the last eight years. I am completely humbled by the idea that through

the Edward's Menagerie pattern series I have been able to teach not only thousands of people face to face to crochet through workshops and events, but have also inspired millions of people worldwide with all my books and TOFT video tutorials. Learning to crochet completely changed my life, and I hope I can share out the happiness mastering this hobby has brought me as far and wide as possible.

TOFT is a company I started fourteen years ago with no idea what it would grow to become. Our vision is to enrich the lives of as many people as possible with our shared love of craft, and our mission is to be as creative and original as possible making products to inspire that in others. We specialise in luxury natural yarns and quality long-lasting tools that come together in your hands to give you pleasure as you savour the feeling of making the stitches, and spread happiness with the results of your time.

Within these pages some of the planet's most popular animals such as the elephant and bear sit alongside some lesser-known species such as the oryx and sugar glider. I hope you enjoy a little journey around the world and discover some new favourites as you hook your way through the collection. This book of mini patterns forms part of a series also including OCEAN, FARM and PETS, so once you've enjoyed crocheting a sloth or hippo a few times you might want to turn your hands to a turtle or maybe a sheep or two.

It allows me to feel creative after a long day that might have otherwise felt very mundane, and these mini animals make brilliant gifts for friends and family without being too much of a materials or time investment. Although it may be slower when you are starting out, once you've got a couple under your belt, these mini patterns are the perfect size to make in an evening. So, when you've got a craft itch to scratch, grab a hook, a handful of your favourite yarn and carve out a few hours to relax and enjoy the mindfulness of the double crochet stitch and the focus and rewards it brings.

HOW TO USE THIS BOOK



The projects in this book are arranged in order of difficulty, with their corresponding techniques and progressive skills detailed when they are introduced.

If you are learning to crochet, then start at the beginning and turn each page, reading all the tips and trying a few of the exercises to get you used to holding your hook and yarn before you dive into working your first project.

If you are already a confident crocheter, then start with whatever takes your fancy and dip in and out of the projects. If you hit an abbreviation or instruction you are unsure of and would like to refresh your understanding, then use the technique index on [here](#) to find the full step-by-step breakdown.

All the standard stuffing and sewing up details can be found on [here](#); follow these guidelines unless instructed otherwise. Unless otherwise stated in the pattern, once you have worked the last round of each pattern piece, gather the stitches when fastening off a part using the technique detailed on [here](#).

I have used British English crochet terms throughout. 'Double crochet' (dc) is the same as the American English 'single crochet' (sc). For clarification of which stitch this refers to, please see the basic instruction for the dc stitch on [here](#).



TOFT

All the projects in this book are created using TOFT pure wool double knitting yarn on a 3mm aluminium hook with a pure wool stuffing. I have had the pleasure of selecting, designing and manufacturing luxury yarns for the past fourteen years as the founder of the TOFT brand, and Edward's Menagerie has been inspired by this range of yarns. TOFT yarns are luxury, quality, natural fibres manufactured to my distinctive specifications here in the UK. When crocheted in TOFT yarns, the projects in this book are supple and soft but with a closed fabric to hide the stuffing inside.

Using natural fibres is not only better for the environment, but also ensures a beautiful finish, assures you that these animals will only get better over time, and guarantees each stitch is a pleasure to make.

TOFT is here to help if you are new to crochet and not sure where to begin, and the brand is based in a real place called Toft in Warwickshire, England. In addition to our yarns, TOFT now designs and manufactures a whole range of tools and accessories to accompany the Edward's Menagerie crochet range. Video help is on-hand if you are struggling at any point with the techniques in this book. All materials,

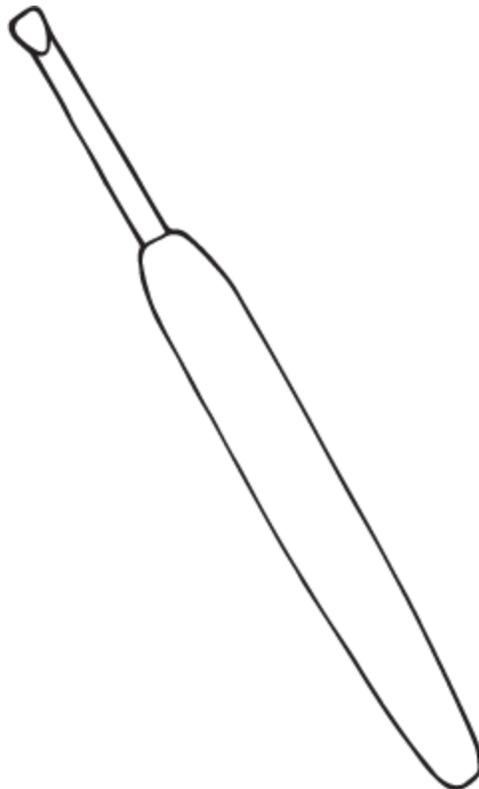

ESSENTIAL TOOLS



HOOK

Choose the right sized hook to match your yarn and create the correct tension (see [here](#)). If you're buying a hook for the first time, get a good-quality one with a comfortable handle as it also doubles as the perfect tool for teasing the toy stuffing inside small parts.



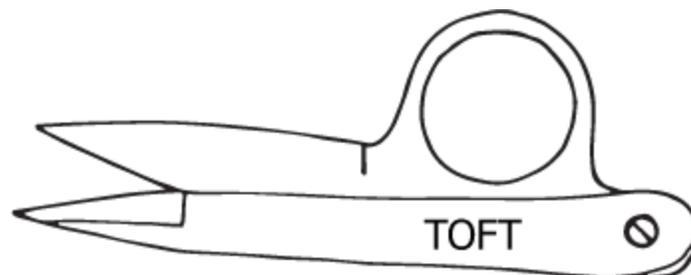
STITCH MARKER

Marking the start or end of your rounds when working this style of crochet is essential. I recommend using a piece of contrast yarn, approximately 15cm long, positioned in the last stitch of Round 2. As you return back around to your marker, pull it forwards or backwards through or between your stitches to mark the end of the round you have just finished to help you keep track of where you are in the pattern. The marker will weave up the fabric with you, and you can simply pull it free to remove it at the end. Should you ever need to abandon your crochet halfway through a round of instruction, or if you simply lose your place when counting, you will be able to return to your marker and thus never have to do a total restart.



SCISSORS

Sharper scissors may be required for cutting the all-over loop stitch on the orangutan.



STUFFING

You can use a natural or man-made stuffing material inside your animals. Using polyester stuffing will make them easier to wash by hand or in a cool cycle in the machine.

SEWING NEEDLE

Ensure your sewing needle has a big enough eye to make it easy to thread with your chosen yarn.



CONTRAST YARN OR SAFETY EYES

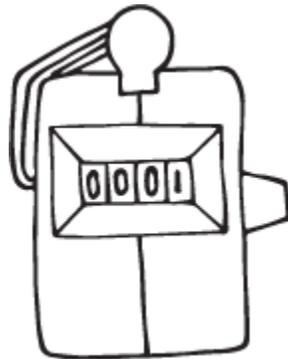
I have used black yarn to sew on all of the animals' eyes and noses. Although safety eyes could be added before sewing up, please be aware that these should not be used on a toy for a child under five years of age.

EXTRA TOOLS



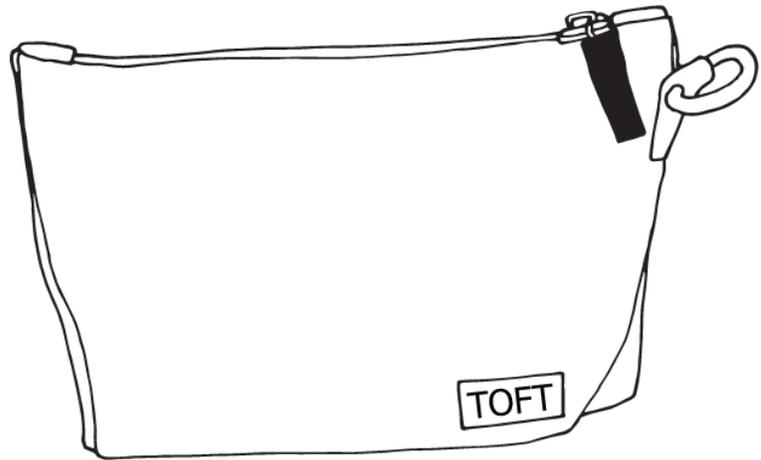
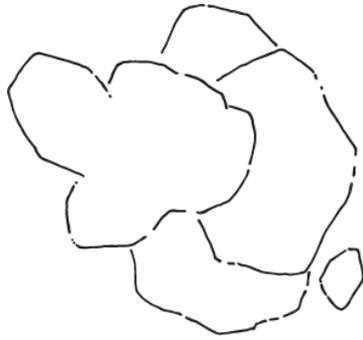
ROW COUNTER

Use a row counter if following a pattern is a new discipline for you. It may make it easier to keep track of the pattern if you do not wish to mark your place in the book.



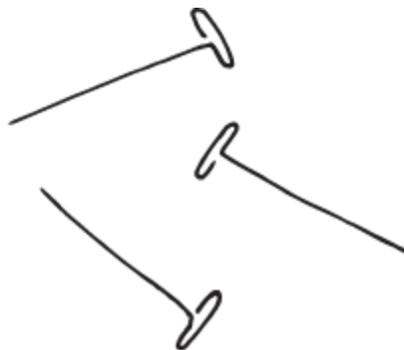
PROJECT BAG

Although not essential, a project bag can be very handy to keep your latest make safe and in order, especially if you are transporting your crochet with you on a commute or to make the most of your lunch break.



PINS FOR SEWING UP

If you are new to making 3D crochet, then pins might help you position all the parts before sewing them together. While not essential, they can come in handy if you know that sewing eyes and ears onto the faces poses a challenge for your perfectionism.



YARN

I was inspired to learn to crochet and make these patterns by TOFT yarn, and all of the animals in this book have been created in TOFT's pure wool double knitting (DK) yarn using a 3mm hook. Each animal takes around 18–22g of TOFT yarn and the finished height is 10cm. TOFT DK pure wool yarn comes in a spectrum of twelve natural colours (opposite) and twelve brights. From the top, they are Ruby, Orange, Yellow, Lime, Green, Teal, Turquoise, Blue, Sapphire, Amethyst, Magenta and Pink.



The quantity of yarn needed for the projects is based on using TOFT yarns. If using other brands of yarn, the quantities may vary significantly, depending on the fibre composition and spinning specifications of the yarn. Parts that use loop stitch or upon which you work chain loops or

spines will take considerably more yarn than others – for example, don't skimp when starting the orangutan!

TENSION

If you are seeing holes in your fabric when working the patterns, swap your hook size down half a millimetre. Likewise, if your work is too solid and you are finding the stitches hard to work, then swap your hook size up half a millimetre. The legs shown here were made using TOFT double knitting yarn and a 3mm hook. The standard tension of TOFT DK yarn on a 3mm hook is 3 x 3cm = 6 sts x 7 rnds.

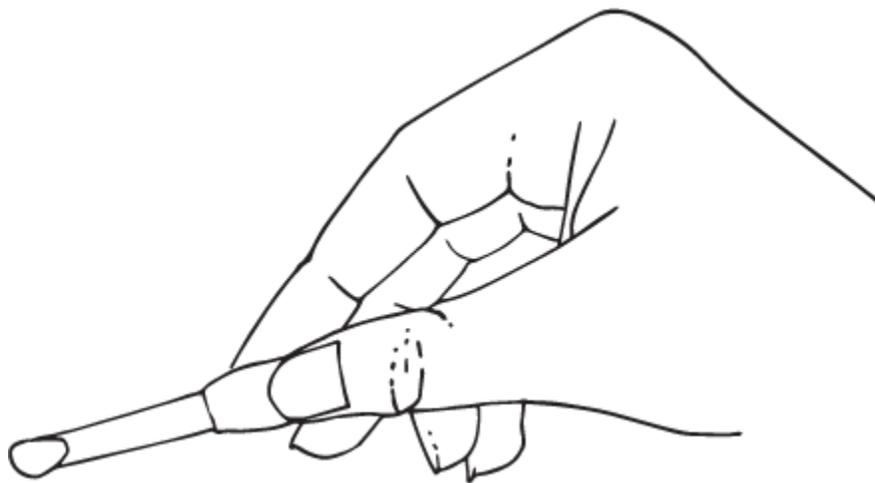

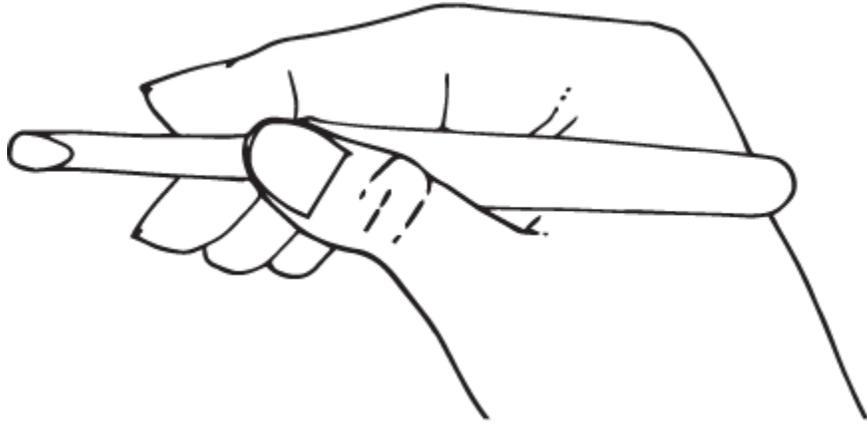
HOLDING YOUR HOOK



There are two principal ways of holding your crochet hook, one similar to holding a knife and the other to holding a pencil. If you are totally new to crochet, I would recommend the knife hold as easier to get comfortable with and maintain control and a good tension, but if you already use the pencil hold successfully, then do not alter it. Even within these two holds there are lots of subtle variants on how to hold your hook and there is no wrong or right way. Do what is most comfortable for you.



Knife hold



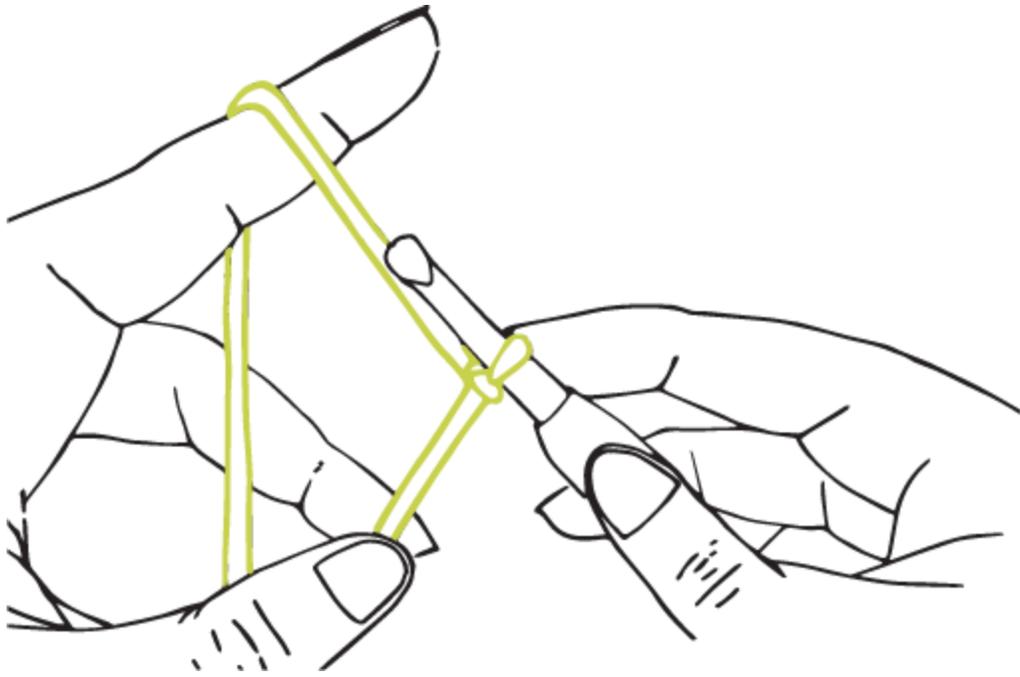
Pencil hold

HOLDING YOUR YARN

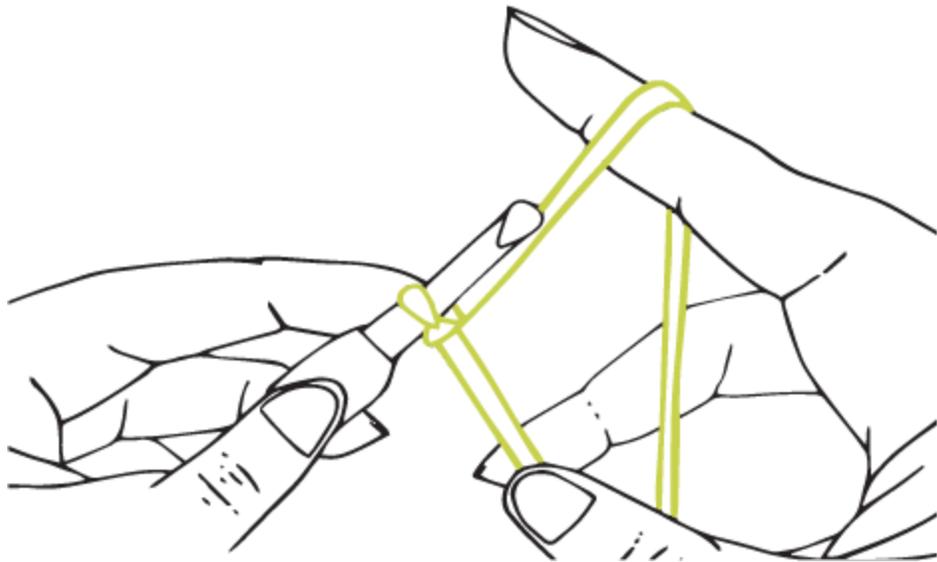


Every crocheter I meet holds their yarn in a slightly different way, so use these illustrations as a rough guide and then experiment with what's most comfortable for you. Only adjust your hand position if you think the way you hold the yarn is causing a problem: loose stitches can be caused by not putting tension onto the yarn coming off the ball by wrapping it around your finger, but the opposite problem of the yarn not moving freely can often be worse and you will feel like you are fighting the stitches and creating a very tight tension.

If you are left-handed, there are no special changes you need to make as none of the patterns in this book refers to left and right.



Right-handed hold



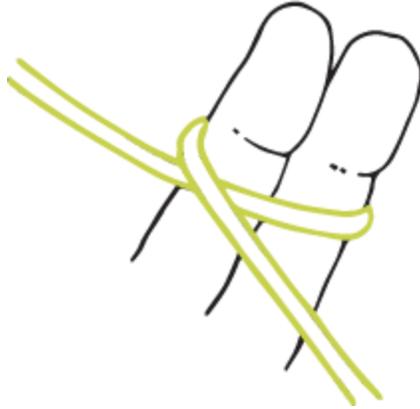

LEARNING TO CROCHET

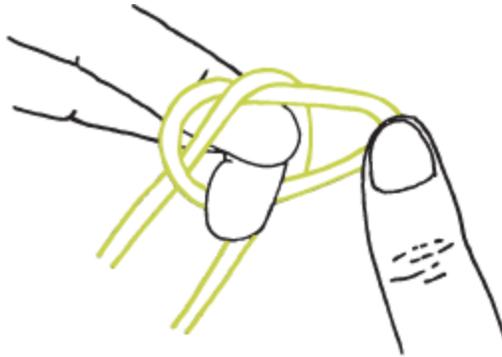


Practise your hook and hand positions from the previous pages by working a long chain length. It will get you used to coordinating both hands and find what works best for you. If you are comfortable working the stitches and achieving the correct tension, there is no wrong or right.

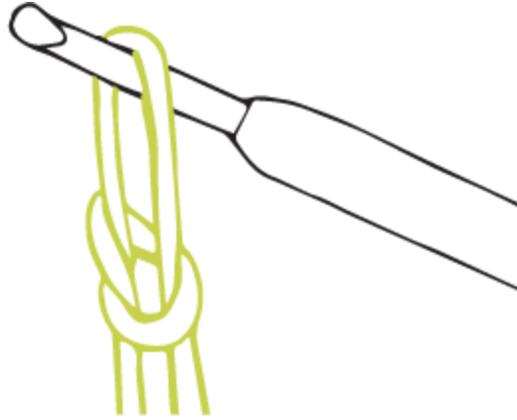
SLIP KNOT



- 1 Wrap the yarn around your fingers.

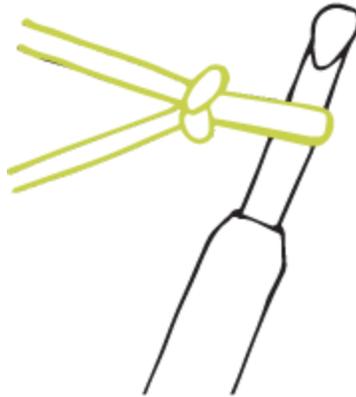


- 2 Pull the tail end of the yarn through the wrap to make a loop.

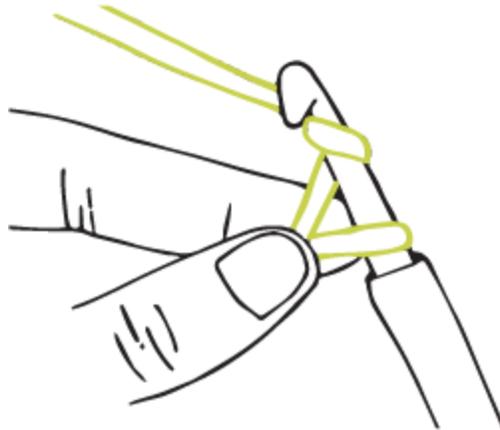


- 3 Place your hook through the loop and tighten, ensuring that it is the tail end of the yarn (not the ball end) that controls the opening and closing of the knot.

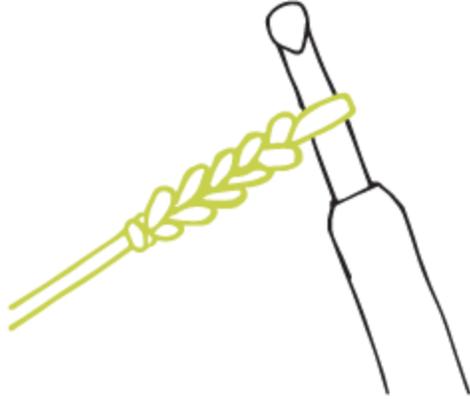
CHAIN (CH)



- 1 Make a slip knot.

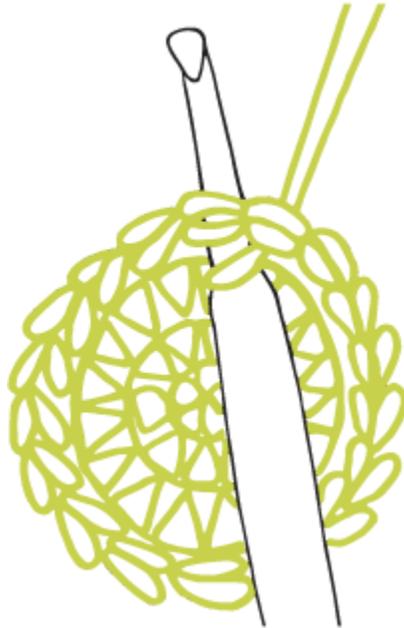


- 2 Wrap the yarn over the hook (yarn over) and pull it through the loop on the hook.

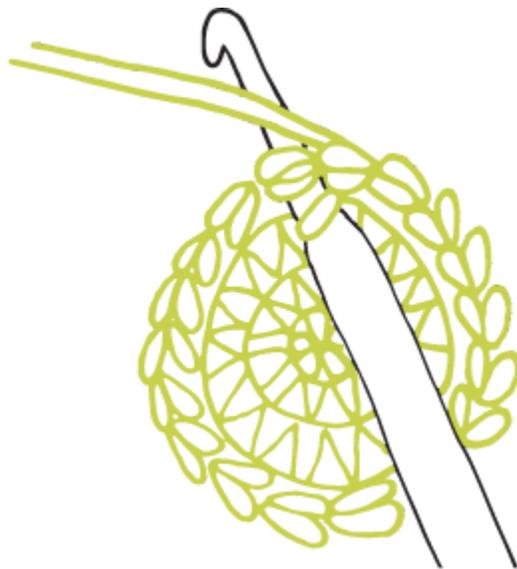


3 Repeat until desired length.

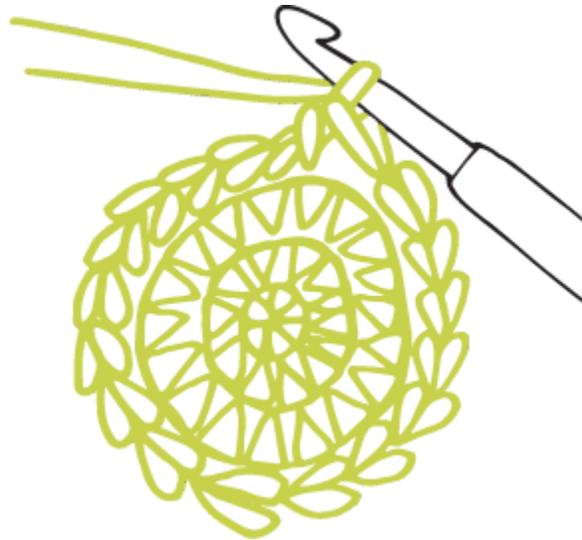
DOUBLE CROCHET STITCH (DC)



- 1 Insert the hook through the 'V' unless otherwise stated.

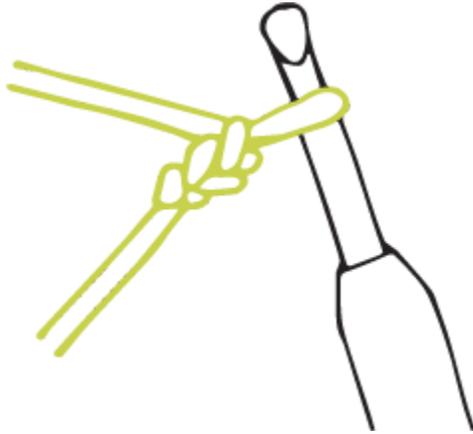


- 2 Yarn over, rotate hook head, and pull through the stitch (two loops on hook).

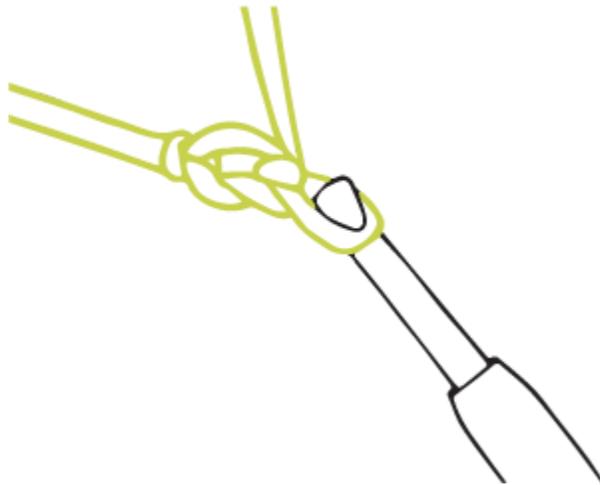


- 3 Yarn over again and pull through both loops on the hook to end with one loop on the hook (one double crochet stitch made).

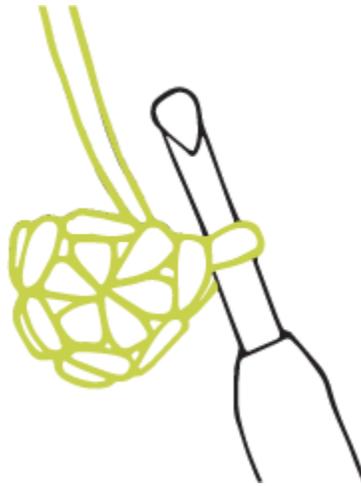
DC6 INTO RING (MAGIC CIRCLE)



- 1 Make a slipknot and chain two stitches.

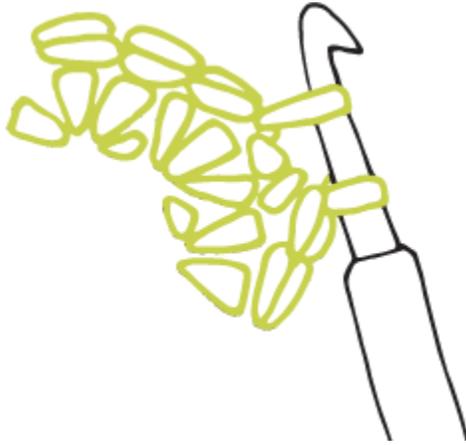


- 2 Insert the hook into the first chain stitch made and work a double crochet six times into this same stitch.



- 3 Pull tightly on the tail of the yarn to close the centre of the ring and form a neat circle.

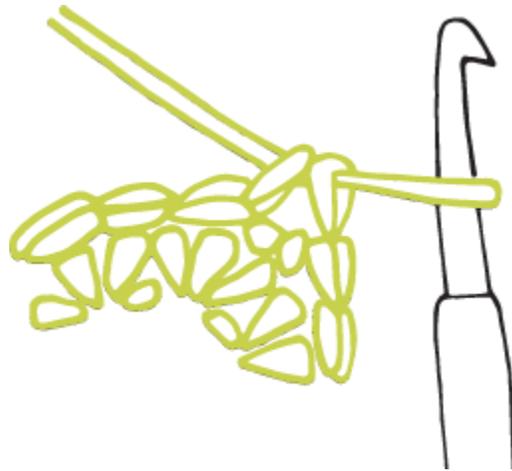
DECREASING (DC2TOG)



- 1 Insert the hook under the front loop only of the next stitch (two loops on hook).



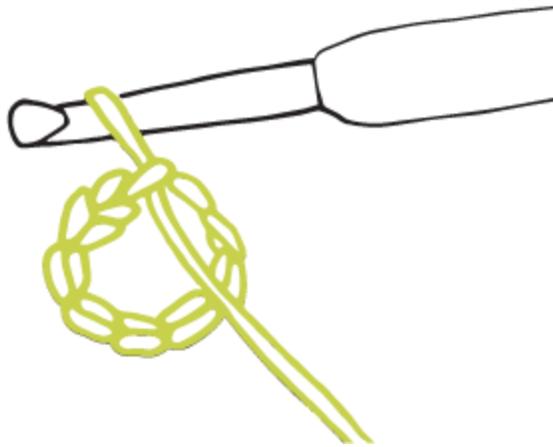
- 2 In the same motion insert the hook through the front loop only of the following stitch (three loops on hook).



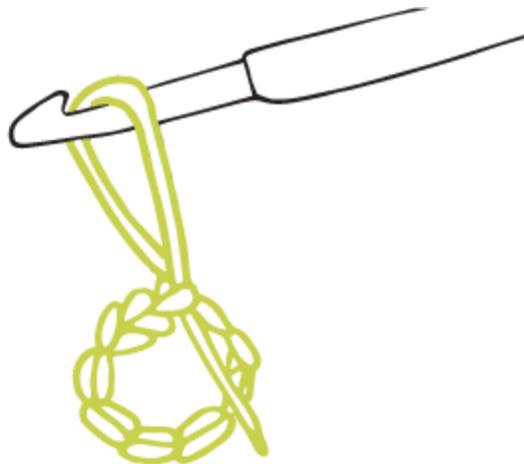
- 3 Yarn over and pull through the first two loops on the hook, then yarn over and pull through both remaining loops to complete the double crochet decrease. See [here](#) for the completed stitch.

FASTENING OFF

Once you have finished a piece, you'll need to fasten off the yarn to secure it so the stitch does not unravel.



- 1 When finishing the last st of any rnd simply cut the yarn leaving 8–10cm for sewing up.



- 2 Pull your hook upwards away from your work until the end goes through the loop on hook.



3 Pull to tighten.

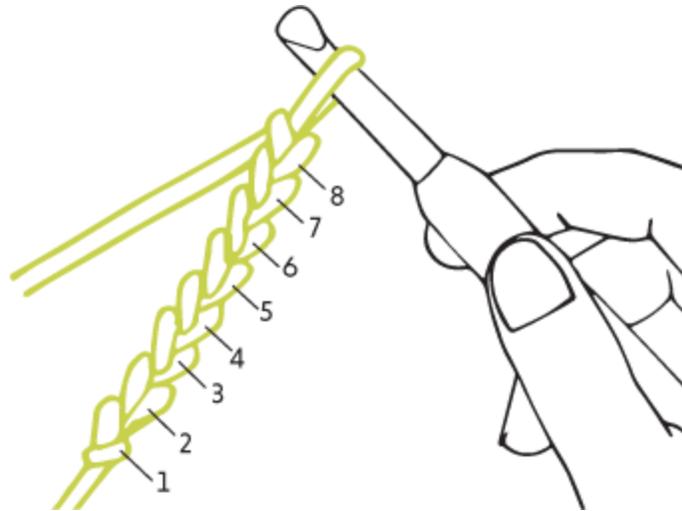
COUNTING YOUR STITCHES



An essential skill to keep yourself on track and able to follow the pattern accurately is knowing how to count the number of stitches you have in a round. While learning, count your stitches in a round after each line of pattern that involves increasing or decreasing. The number in brackets at the end of a line of pattern indicates the number of stitches you should have once it is completed. If you complete a round and this number is wrong, then pull back your work to the beginning of the round and redo it until you have the correct number of stitches before you progress – this is much easier with a stitch marker (see [here](#)).

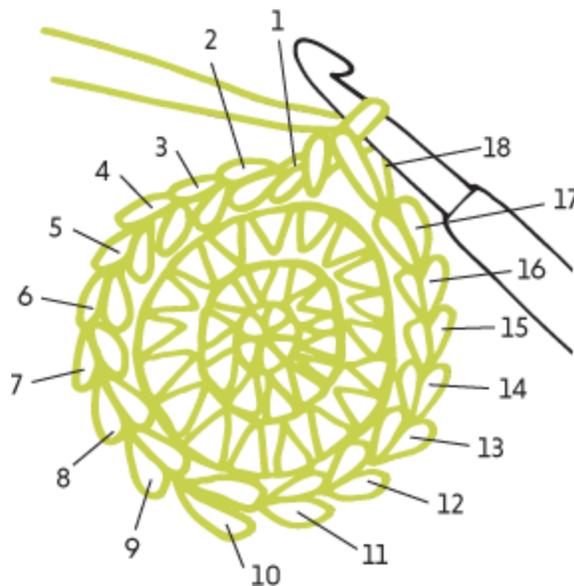
COUNTING A CHAIN

When you crochet a chain and then work back down it, you will often miss the stitch closest to the hook in order to turn. For example, you might chain ten stitches in order to double crochet nine stitches back down the chain.



COUNTING THE STITCHES IN A ROUND

The majority of the time your crochet piece will grow from a set number of stitches in a closed ring (usually six). The piece you are making grows because you are increasing the number of stitches by sometimes working two double crochet into the same stitch as instructed.



READING A PATTERN AND ABBREVIATIONS



RND: ROUND

A round is a complete rotation in a spiral back to where you started. In this style of crochet you DO NOT slip stitch at the end of a round to make a circle, but instead continue directly on to the next round in a spiral.

DC: DOUBLE CROCHET

Dc5 means to double crochet one stitch into each of the next five stitches.

STS: STITCHES

The number in brackets at the end of a line indicates the number of stitches in that round once it has been completed.

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12 sts)

Rnd 2 (dc1, dc2 into next st) 6 times (18)

Rnd 3 (dc2, dc2 into next st) 6 times (24)

Rnd 4 (dc3, dc2 into next st) 6 times (30)

Rnd 5 (dc4, dc2 into next st) 6 times (36)

Rnd 6 (dc5, dc2 into next st) 6 times (42)

Rnd 7 (dc6, dc2 into next st) 6 times (48)

Rnds 8-10 dc (3 rnds)

6 TIMES

repeat what comes directly before this instruction within the brackets the number of times stated.

3 RNDs

work one double crochet stitch into every stitch in the round for three full rounds.

Additional abbreviations

ch: chain

dc2tog: double crochet two stitches together (to turn two stitches into one and decrease a round count by one stitch)

sl st: slip stitch

BASICS OF SPIRAL CROCHET



When working the style of crochet used in this book to create a solid fabric and 3D shapes, you generally start from a closed ring and work the double crochet stitch in one direction in a non-stop spiral. The pattern on [here](#) forms a pretty standard increase for this style of crochet by adding six stitches evenly into every round. The piece becomes 3D once you stop adding six stitches into a round.

RIGHT SIDE (RS) AND WRONG SIDE (WS)

If you are new to this style of crochet, you do need to be aware that there is a right side (RS) and wrong side (WS) to the fabric; the wrong side forms the inside of the shape. If you are right-handed and crocheting with the RS facing outwards, you will be moving in an anti-clockwise direction around the edge of the circle of fabric (left-handed people will be moving clockwise). It is very easy to have learned to crochet holding the WS facing outwards (I did it myself); this will mean that your resulting piece is inside out when you come to stuff and finish it. With some parts this will not be a problem, as you can simply flip them before stuffing and sewing up. However, with the parts containing smaller rounds, such as tails, this will be impossible, so it is best to adjust your hold to ensure you are crocheting into the right

side of the fabric, with this on the outside of the 3D shape. On the right side of the fabric you will see the rounds horizontally on the piece. On the wrong side you can see vertical furrows spiralling up the piece.

STUFFING USING BACK OF HOOK

The majority of 3D shapes you are crocheting will need stuffing, and this can be done at the end unless otherwise stated. Using TOFT pure wool produces a fabric that is forgiving and supple, and this combines really well with light-handed stuffing to create animals that feel soft to the touch rather than dense or stiff. You want to show off the shaping within the piece, not overstuff it until the shape is lost and the stuffing shows through the stitches. My advice would be that less is better.

Follow the pattern opposite to practise your double crochet stitches before starting your first animal. Once you feel more familiar with the stitch on this bigger piece, it will be easier to work the smaller rounds required in many of the minis.



SNAKE



TAIL/BODY/HEAD

Begin by dc4 into ring

Rnds 1–6 dc (6 rnds)

Rnd 7 dc2 into next st, dc3 (5 sts)

Rnds 8–13 dc (6 rnds)

Rnd 14 dc2 into next st, dc4 (6)

Rnds 15–20 dc (6 rnds)

Rnd 21 dc2 into next st, dc5 (7)

Rnds 22–27 dc (6 rnds)

Rnd 28 dc2 into next st, dc6 (8)

Rnds 29–38 dc (10 rnds)

Rnd 39 dc2 into next st, dc7 (9)

Rnds 40–49 dc (10 rnds)

Rnd 50 dc2 into next st, dc8 (10)

Rnds 51–60 dc (10 rnds)

Rnd 61 dc2 into next st, dc9 (11)

Rnds 62–71 dc (10 rnds)

Rnd 72 dc2 into next st, dc10 (12)

Rnds 73–130 dc (58 rnds)

Rnd 131 (dc2tog, dc4) twice (10)

Rnd 132 dc

Rnd 133 (dc2 into next st) 6 times, dc4 (16)

Rnd 134 (dc1, dc2 into next st) 6 times, dc4 (22)

Rnds 135–137 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 138 dc3, (dc2tog) 8 times, dc3 (14)

Rnds 139–141 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 142 (dc2tog) 7 times (7)

Finish by sewing eyes into place with Black yarn.

Great for practising your double crochet tension as you go around and around, but also a relaxing make for an advanced crocheter just looking to lose themselves in the rhythm of making the stitches and seeing their work grow quickly.

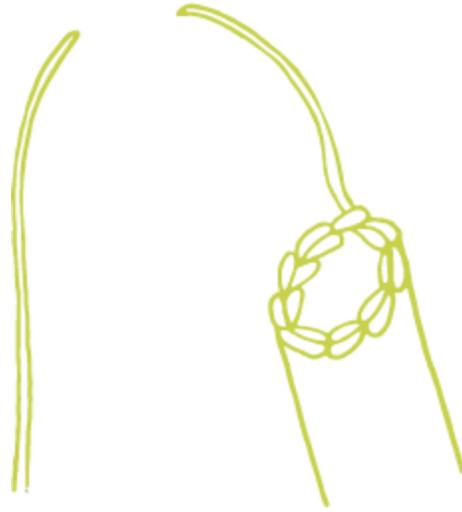
It can be quite fiddly to start from such a small piece and see your stitches. If you are having difficulty, consider working around a paper straw.



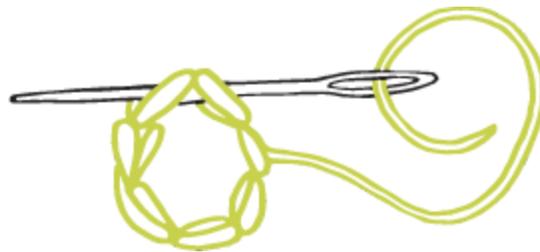




GATHERING STITCHES



- 1 Fasten off the last stitch of the round.



- 2 Thread the end of the yarn onto a sewing needle and sew a running stitch through all the remaining stitches of the round.



- 3 Pull tightly to gather and close the stitches, then fasten off into the fabric around a stitch.

SEWING ON EYES/NOSTRILS

1. Secure the yarn to the fabric at the top of the desired eye (or nostril) position.
2. Sew down through the fabric around one stitch.
3. Move through the inside of the piece and repeat for the second eye (or nostril). Secure and trim the ends.

If using safety eyes, don't forget to add them before gathering your stitches but after stuffing. The character of your animal is dictated by the position of the ears, nose and most importantly the eyes. A face with larger eyes will look younger and more cute, ears sewn low down the sides of the head will look sleepy, and adding a nose or two very simple nostrils can suddenly add the finishing touch.

BODY

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12 sts)

Rnd 2 (dc1, dc2 into next st) 6 times (18)

Rnd 3 (dc2, dc2 into next st) 6 times (24)

Rnds 4–8 dc (5 rnds)

Rnd 9 dc9, (dc2tog) 3 times, dc9 (21)

Rnd 10 (dc5, dc2tog) 3 times (18)

Rnds 11–13 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 14 (dc4, dc2tog) 3 times (15)

Rnd 15 (dc3, dc2tog) 3 times (12)

Rnd 16 (dc2tog) 6 times (6)

HEAD

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12)

Rnd 2 (dc1, dc2 into next st) 6 times (18)

Rnd 3 (dc2, dc2 into next st) 6 times (24)

Rnds 4–6 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 7 (dc1, dc2tog) 3 times, dc15 (21)

Rnd 8 dc

Rnd 9 (dc2tog) 3 times, dc15 (18)

Rnd 10 (dc4, dc2tog) 3 times (15)

Rnd 11 (dc3, dc2tog) 3 times (12)

Rnd 12 (dc2, dc2tog) 3 times (9)

Rnds 13–19 dc (7 rnds)

Rnd 20 (dc1, dc2tog) 3 times (6)

LEGS (make four)

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12)

Rnds 2–3 dc (2 rnds)

Rnd 4 (dc1, dc2tog) 4 times (8)

Rnds 5–12 dc (8 rnds)

Stuff end and sew flat across top to close.

EARS (make two)

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12)

Rnd 2 (dc1, dc2 into next st) 6 times (18)

Rnd 3 (dc2, dc2 into next st) 6 times (24)

Rnd 4 (dc3, dc2 into next st) 6 times (30)

Fold in half RS out and dc through both edges to join.

TAIL

Create CHAIN TAIL (see [here](#)): sl st into tail position, ch6 then work three ch5 loops onto the end.

Finish by sewing eyes into place with Black yarn.

Great for learning to sew parts onto others.

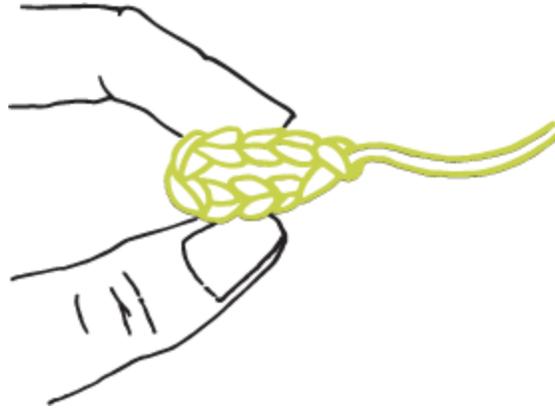
The majority of the animals share a body and leg shape. The parts of the animals are arranged largest first, which is the recommended order of making for a beginner.



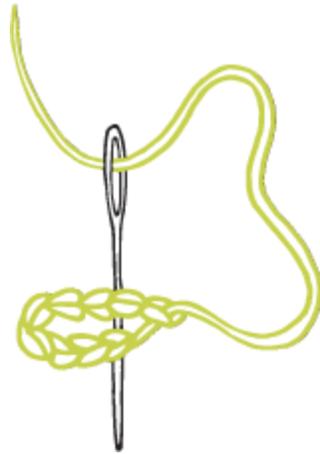




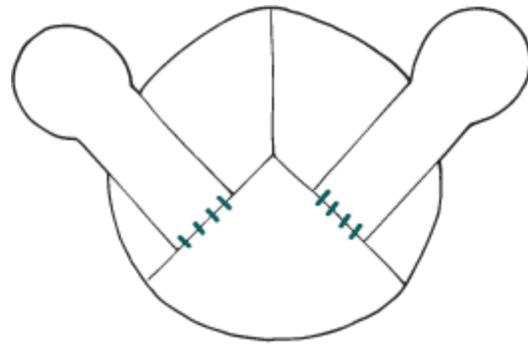
OVERSEWING A LEG



- 1 Flatten the top of the leg between finger and thumb, aligning the stitches neatly.



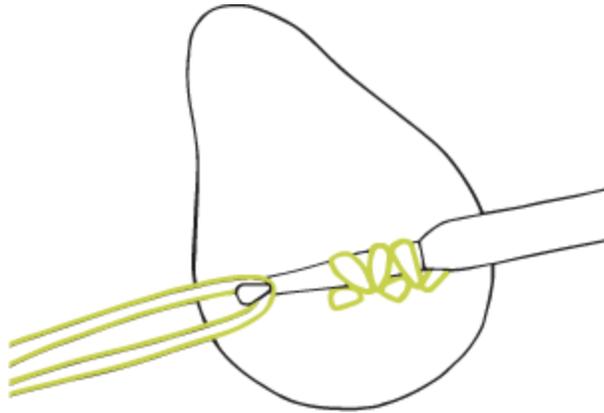
- 2 Sew through pairs of stitches along the edge to close the top of the leg flat.



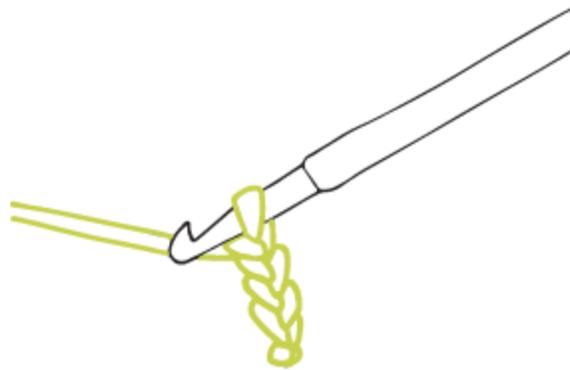
Back leg position

3 Oversee the leg into position.

CHAIN TAIL



- 1 Insert the hook through the fabric around a stitch and yarn over with two strands of yarn held together.



- 2 Chain the number of stitches stated in the pattern, holding all four strands together.



- 3 Finish the tail by working loops of single-strand chains onto the end with the number of stitches stated in the pattern.

ORDER OF SEWING

1. Sew the head onto the body with two stitches between the top of the body and under the head (all heads start from the back and work forwards). Once lined up with the tummy, oversew around these stitches in a small circle between the two parts to secure.
2. Sew the front legs to the top of the body.
3. Sew the back legs to the bottom of the body in the position shown.
4. Sew on the ears, and any other features.
5. Add the eyes and nose or nostrils if specified.

HIPPO



BODY

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12 sts)

Rnd 2 (dc1, dc2 into next st) 6 times (18)

Rnd 3 (dc2, dc2 into next st) 6 times (24)

Rnds 4–8 dc (5 rnds)

Rnd 9 dc9, (dc2tog) 3 times, dc9 (21)

Rnd 10 (dc5, dc2tog) 3 times (18)

Rnds 11–13 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 14 (dc4, dc2tog) 3 times (15)

Rnd 15 (dc3, dc2tog) 3 times (12)

Rnd 16 (dc2tog) 6 times (6)

HEAD

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12)

Rnd 2 (dc1, dc2 into next st) 6 times (18)

Rnds 3–5 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 6 (dc4, dc2tog) 3 times (15)

Rnd 7 dc

Rnd 8 (dc4, dc2 into next st) 3 times (18)

Rnd 9 (dc2, dc2 into next st) 6 times (24)

Rnds 10–11 dc (2 rnds)

Rnd 12 (dc2tog) 12 times (12)

Rnd 13 (dc2, dc2tog) 3 times (9)

LEGS (make four)

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12)

Rnds 2–3 dc (2 rnds)

Rnd 4 (dc1, dc2tog) 4 times (8)

Rnds 5–12 dc (8 rnds)

Stuff end and sew flat across top to close.

EARS (make two)

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnds 1–2 dc (2 rnds)

Do not stuff.

NOSTRILS (make two)

Once stuffed and sewn up, dc twice around one stitch to create a nostril.

TAIL

Work one ch5 SLIP STITCH CHAIN (see [here](#)) into tail position.

Finish by sewing eyes into place with Black yarn.

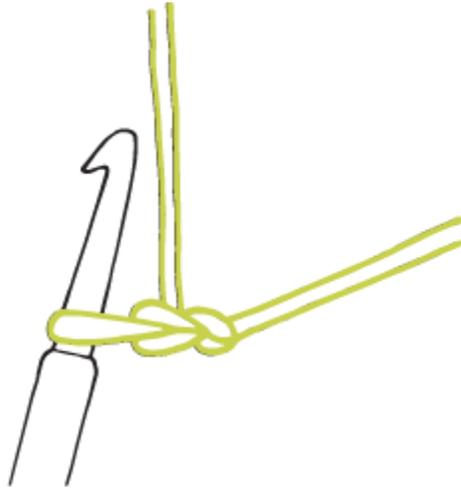
Great for mastering small fiddly parts and sewing them into position neatly.

You will learn to add slip stitch chains directly onto this piece, which is faster and more secure than making them separately and sewing them into position.

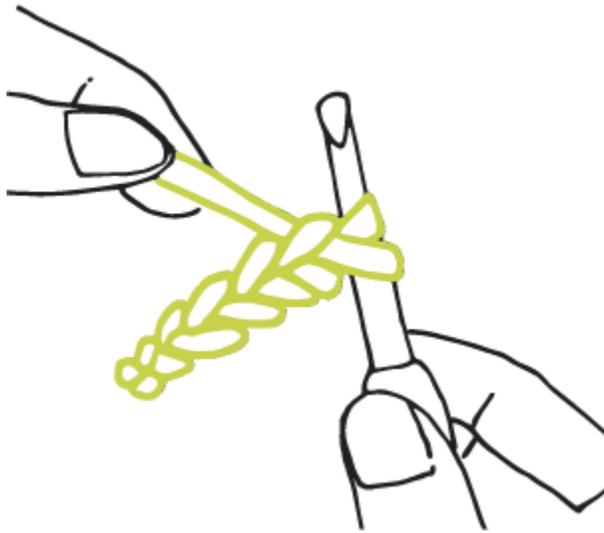




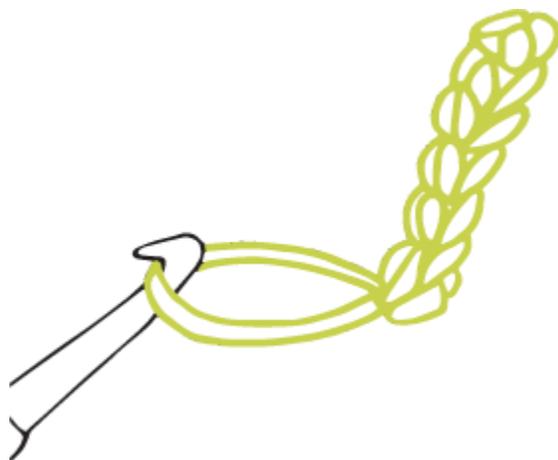
SLIP STITCH CHAINS



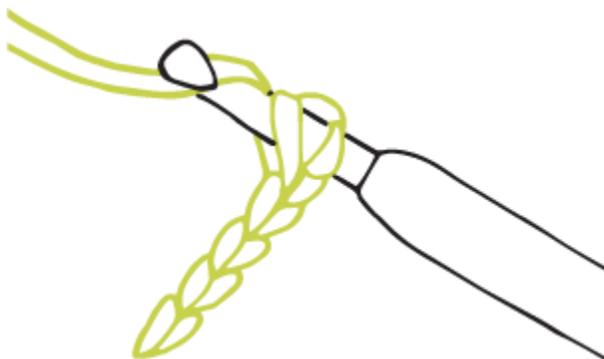
- 1 Insert the hook through the fabric at the desired position, yarn over and pull through the fabric.



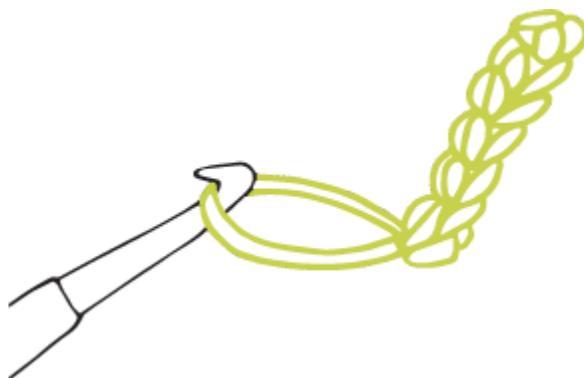
- 2 Chain the number of stitches stated in the pattern.



- 3 Working back down the chain, insert the hook into the next stitch.



- 4 Yarn over and pull through the stitch and the loop on the hook (one slip stitch made).



- 5 Continue slip stitching down the chain, ending with just one loop on the hook.



6 Sew in ends.

Use pins to hold pieces in place if you find it easier, such as the ears, and for marking the nostril positions.

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12 sts)

Rnd 2 (dc1, dc2 into next st) 6 times (18)

Rnd 3 (dc2, dc2 into next st) 6 times (24)

Rnds 4–8 dc (5 rnds)

Rnd 9 dc9, (dc2tog) 3 times, dc9 (21)

Rnd 10 (dc5, dc2tog) 3 times (18)

Rnds 11–13 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 14 (dc4, dc2tog) 3 times (15)

Rnd 15 (dc3, dc2tog) 3 times (12)

Rnd 16 (dc2tog) 6 times (6)

HEAD

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12)

Rnd 2 (dc1, dc2 into next st) 6 times (18)

Rnd 3 (dc2, dc2 into next st) 6 times (24)

Rnds 4–6 dc (3 rnds)

- 3 Attach the chain to the fabric with a slip stitch approximately two stitches or two rounds away from the start of the chain. Repeat until the required area is covered.

SEWING A TRIANGLE NOSE

1. Secure the yarn to the fabric at the top left corner of the desired nose position.
2. Sew down into the centre of the closing round and then up to the top right corner of the nose.
3. Fill in the triangle with stitches, always sewing in the same direction for the neatest finish. Secure and trim the ends.

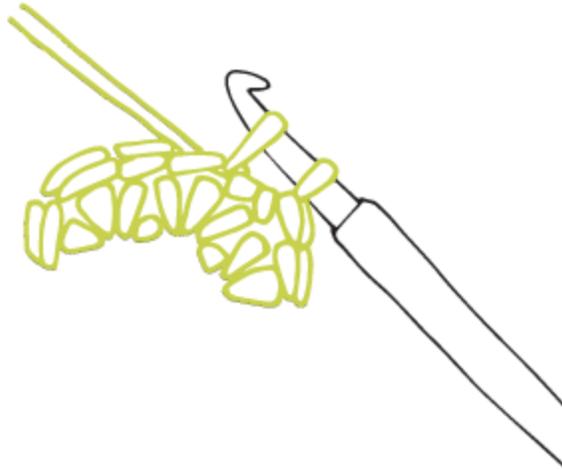

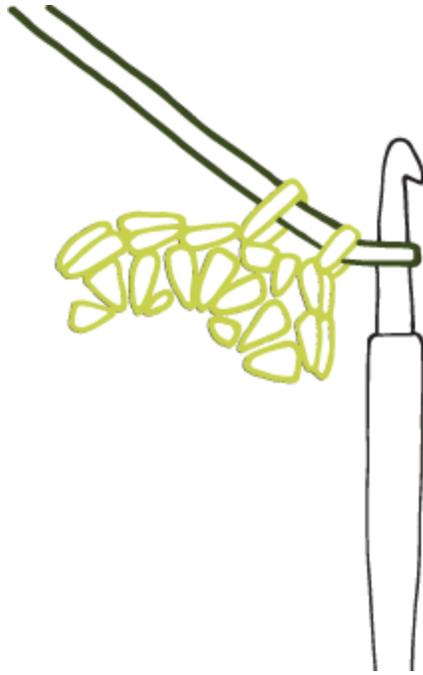




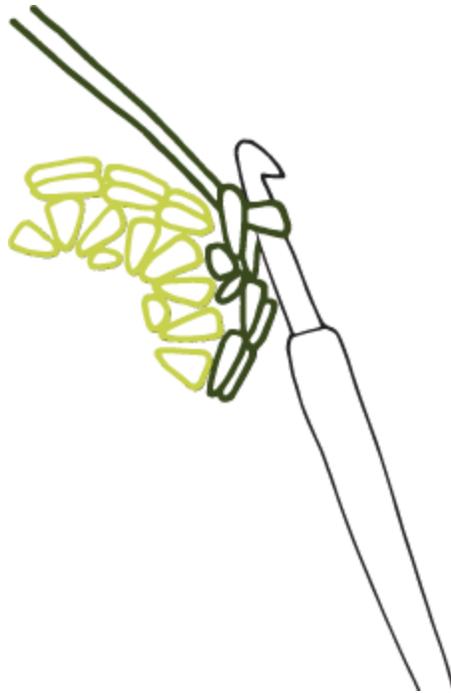
THE NEXT STEP: CHANGING COLOUR



- 1 Insert the hook through the next stitch, yarn over and pull through the stitch (two loops on hook).



- 2 Yarn over with the new colour and complete the double crochet stitch with this new yarn.



- 3 Continue with this new yarn, leaving the original yarn at the back of the work. Cut the original yarn if this is a one-off colour change, or run it along the back of the fabric if returning to it later.

You work this colour change at the end of the stitch BEFORE the first stitch in the new colour.

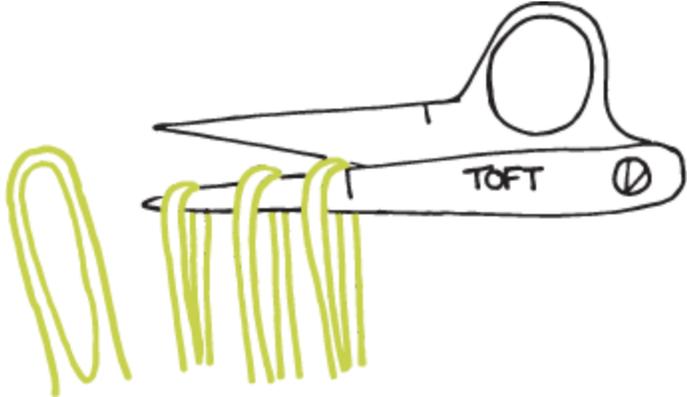
- 2 Hold the loop on your thumb and complete the double crochet stitch.



- 3 Moving your thumb forwards and releasing the loop to position it on the right side of the fabric, work the next stitch to secure the loop in place. Work frequency as directed in the pattern.

EARS (make two)

Working in Camel

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc1, dc2 into next st) 3 times (9)

Rnds 2–3 dc (2 rnds)

Do not stuff.

MUZZLE

Working in Camel

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12)

Rnds 2–3 dc (2 rnds)

EYES (make two)

Working in Camel

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2, dc2 into next st) twice (8)

Do not stuff.

Finish by sewing eyes and nostrils into place with Black
yarn.



JUNGLE

These apes are made using the orangutan pattern, but some have loops everywhere and others none at all.

Working in Chestnut

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12 sts)

Rnd 2 (dc1, dc2 into next st) 6 times (18)

Rnd 3 (dc2, dc2 into next st) 6 times (24)

Rnds 4–8 dc (5 rnds)

Rnd 9 dc9, (dc2tog) 3 times, dc9 (21)

Rnd 10 (dc5, dc2tog) 3 times (18)

Rnds 11–13 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 14 (dc4, dc2tog) 3 times (15)

Rnd 15 (dc3, dc2tog) 3 times (12)

Rnd 16 (dc2tog) 6 times (6)

HEAD

Working in Fudge

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12)

Rnd 2 (dc1, dc2 into next st) 6 times (18)

Rnd 3 (dc2, dc2 into next st) 6 times (24)

Rnds 4–6 dc (3 rnds)

Work 1cm LOOP STITCH (see [here](#)) as instructed

Rnd 7 dc12 Fudge, dc4 loop, dc4, dc4 loop Cream

Rnd 8 (dc1, dc2tog) 4 times Fudge, dc4 loop, dc4, dc4 loop
Cream (20)

Rnd 9 (dc2tog) 4 times Fudge, (dc1, dc2tog) 4 times Cocoa
(12)

Continue in Cream

Rnds 10–11 dc (2 rnds)

Rnd 12 (dc1, dc2tog) 4 times (8)

LEGS (make four)

Working in Cocoa

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc2 into next st) 6 times (12)

Rnds 2–3 dc (2 rnds)

Rnd 4 (dc1, dc2tog) 4 times (8)

Rnds 5–12 dc (8 rnds)

Stuff end and sew flat across top to close.

EARS (make two)

Working in Cream

Work 1cm loop stitch every 2nd st

Begin by dc6 into ring

Rnd 1 (dc1, dc2 into next st) 3 times (9)

Rnds 2–4 dc (2 rnds)

Rnd 5 (dc2tog) 4 times, dc1 (5)

Do not stuff.

TAIL

Work 1 rnd Camel, 1 rnd Fudge with 1cm loop stitch every
2nd st throughout

Ch5 and sl st to join into a circle

Rnds 1–14 dc (14 rnds)

Do not stuff.

EYEBROWS

Work two 4cm KNOT LENGTHS (see [here](#)) above eye
position and trim to even length

Finish by cutting loops and sewing eyes and an upside-down
TRIANGLE NOSE (see [here](#)) into place with Black yarn.



CROCODILE



TAIL/BODY/HEAD

Begin by dc5 into ring

Rnds 1–3 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 4 dc2 into next st, dc4 (6 sts)

Rnds 5–7 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 8 (dc2 into next st, dc2) twice (8)

Rnds 9–11 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 12 (dc2 into next st, dc3) twice (10)

Rnds 13–17 dc (5 rnds)

Rnd 18 (dc2 into next st, dc4) twice (12)

Rnds 19–21 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 22 (dc2 into next st, dc3) 3 times (15)

Rnds 23–25 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 26 (dc2 into next st, dc4) 3 times (18)

Rnds 27–31 dc (5 rnds)

Rnd 32 dc2 into next st, dc7, (dc2 into next st) twice, dc7,
dc2 into next st (22)

Rnds 33–40 dc (8 rnds)

Rnd 41 dc2tog, dc7, (dc2tog) twice, dc7, dc2tog (18)

Rnd 42 dc

Rnd 43 dc2tog, dc5, (dc2tog) twice, dc5, dc2tog (14)

Rnds 44–46 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 47 dc1, (dc2 into next st) 7 times, dc6 (21)

Rnd 48 (dc2 into next st, dc2) 5 times, dc6 (26)

Rnds 49–51 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 52 dc3, (dc2tog) 10 times, dc3 (16)

Rnds 53–54 dc (2 rnds)

Next, dc4, then ch4 and sl st halfway across to the other side of rnd to form two 12-st rnds (8 from rnd, 4 on chain)

Work 12 sts for bottom jaw as follows:

Rnds 1–3 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 4 dc2tog, dc10 (11)

Rnd 5 dc2tog, dc9 (10)

Rnd 6 dc2tog, dc8 (9)

Rnds 7–9 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 10 (dc1, dc2tog) 3 times (6)

Rejoin and work 12 sts for top jaw as follows:

Rnds 1–3 dc (3 rnds)

Rnd 4 dc2tog, dc10 (11)

Rnd 5 dc2tog, dc9 (10)

Rnd 6 dc2tog, dc8 (9)

Rnds 7–10 dc (4 rnds)

Rnd 11 (dc1, dc2tog) 3 times (6)

LEGS (make four)

Ch8 and sl st to join into circle

Rnds 1–6 dc (6 rnds)

Next, dc across edge to close, turn and work back along edge to form toes (ch4, dc3 back down ch, sl st1 along

edge) 4 times

FRILL

Working from tip of tail up centre of back, repeat the following:

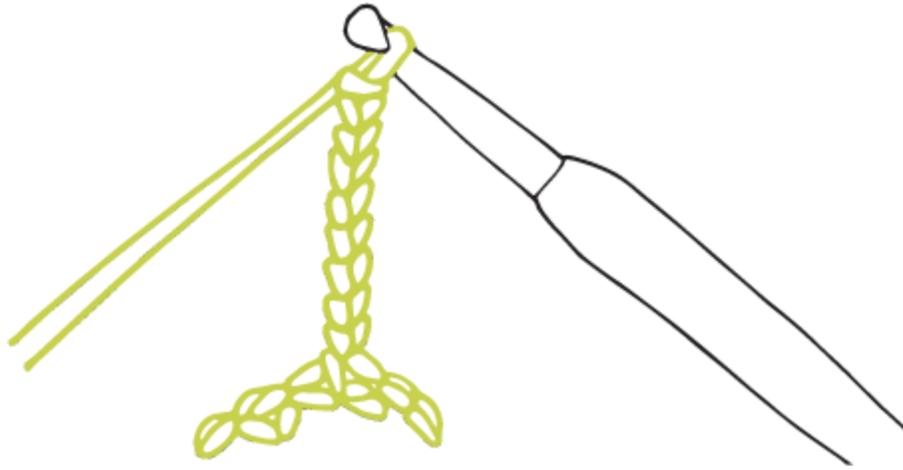
(dc1, htr1, tr2 into same st, dc1, sl st1)

Finish by sewing eyes into place with Black yarn and two lines of running stitches in Cream yarn for teeth.

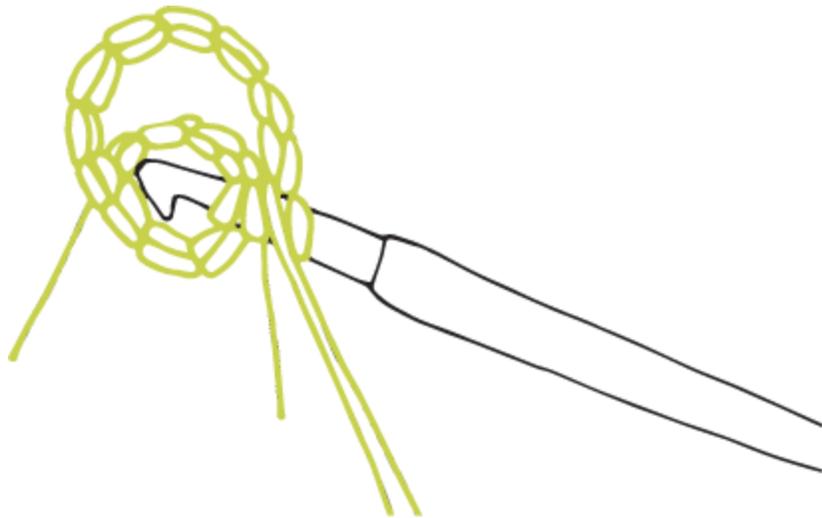




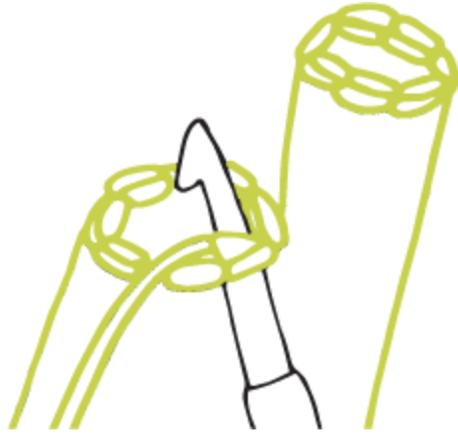
USING A CHAIN TO SPLIT THE ROUND



- 1 Chain the specified number of stitches from your current stitch.



- 2 Insert the hook from the right side of the fabric through the middle stitch on the other side of the round and slip stitch to join.



- 3 Now work one side of the chain and the stitches on half the original round to form a new round. Once you have completed the instruction for this side, rejoin the yarn and work into the other side to create a T-shape with the stitches worked outwards on either side of the central chain.

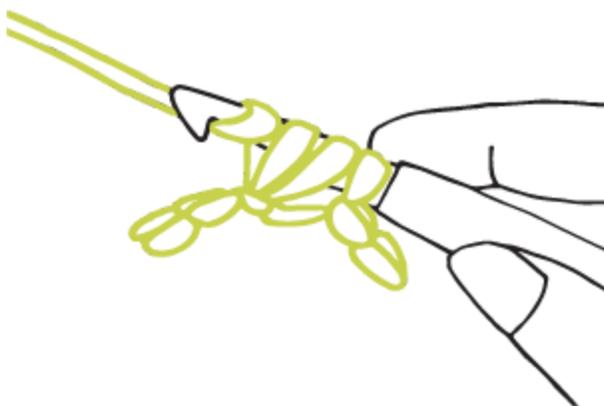
HALF TREBLE CROCHET STITCH (HTR)



- 1 Yarn over and insert the hook into the next stitch.

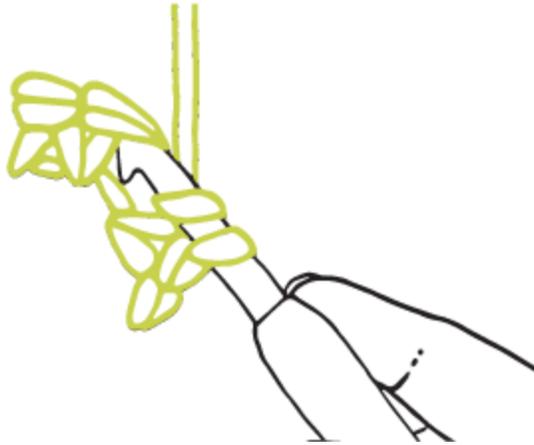


- 2 Yarn over and pull through the stitch (three loops on hook).



- 3 Yarn over and pull through all three loops on the hook (one half treble crochet stitch made).

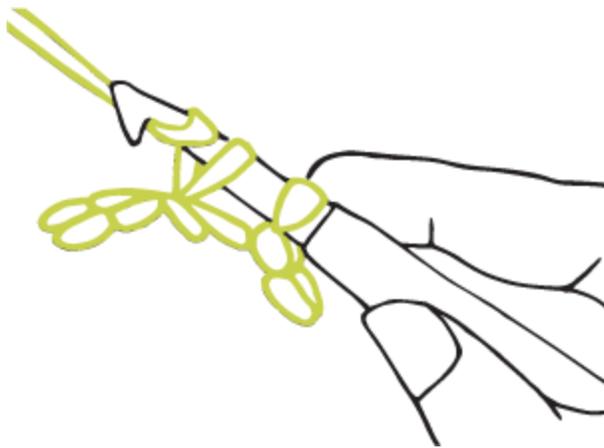
TREBLE CROCHET STITCH (TR)



- 1 Yarn over and insert the hook into the next stitch.



- 2 Yarn over and pull through the stitch (three loops on hook), then yarn over again and pull through the first two loops on the hook (two loops on hook).



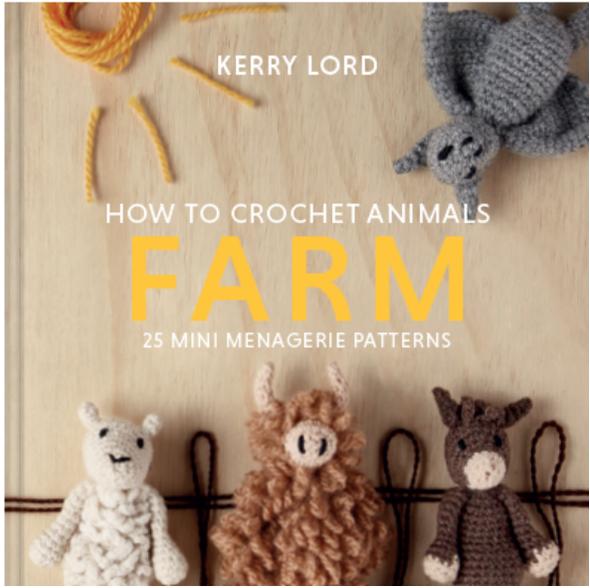
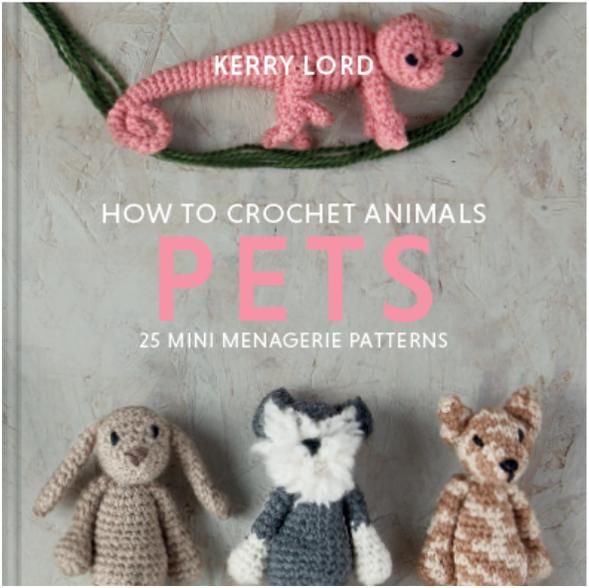
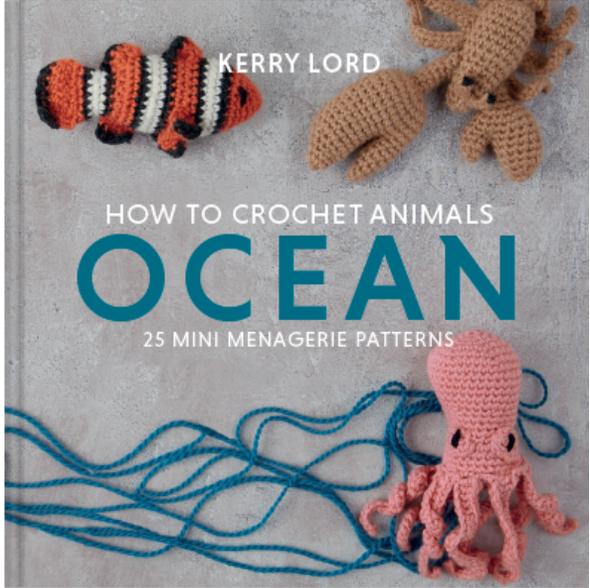
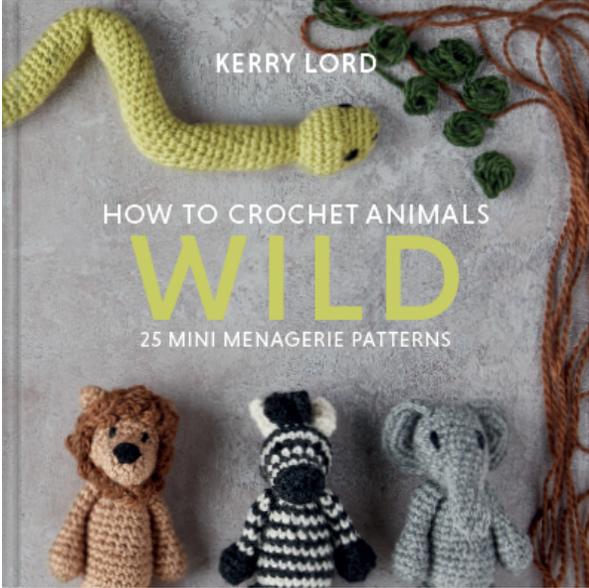
- 3 Yarn over again and pull through the remaining two loops on the hook (one treble crochet stitch made).
