

#latesummerdreamsweater

Sensommerdrøm genseren (Late summer dream sweater) should have a positive ease of approx. 10-15 cm. The sizes S (M) L (XL) 2XL (3XL) 4XL correspond to chest measurements of approximately 90 (95) 100 (110) 115 (120) 130 cm.

Measure yourself before you start knitting. Choose the size that will fit you the best. This tee is knitted in fisherman's rib on body and sleeves and stockinet stitch on the yoke.

It has a loose fitting with wide sleeves and raglan decrease. It is a somewhat short model for a nice fit.

Sizes	S (M) L (XL) 2XL (3XL) 4XL
Bust width	104 (110) 116 (121) 127 (133) 140 cm
Length	52 (54) 56 (58) 60 (62) 64 cm from top of rib on front piece
Sleeves	44 (45) 45 (46) 46 (47) 47 cm from cast on edge to armhole
Needles	6 mm circular needle: 80 cm and 40 cm + 5 mm circular needle: 40 cm
Gauge	On needle 6 mm: 14 stitches on fisherman's rib and 14,5 stitches on stockinet stich = 10 cm On needle 6 mm: 27 rounds on fisherman's rib and 20 rounds on stockinet stich = 10 cm
Material	Garnhimmelen brushed mohair, 50 g = ca 155 m 300 (300) 300 (350) 350 (350) 400 g Ingenua mohair can be used as substitute yarn. Drops alpaca, 50 g = ca 167 m 250 (300) 300 (300) 350 (350) 350 g

READ THE KNITTING PATTERN BEFORE YOU START KNITTING

Prior to knitting, it is recommended to knit a swatch and determine which needle size to use to produce the correct gauge. If you are a tight knitter, you may have to go up a needle size, if you knit loosely, you may have to go down a needle size.

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BODY

Cast on 146 (154) 162 (170) 178 (186) 194 stitches with 1 strand of brushed mohair and 1 strand of alpaca held together using a 6 mm circular needle 80 cm. Knit fisherman's rib (you knit stockinet stitches instead of purl stitches) until you cast off for the armhole. Knit as follows:

Round 1: knit through the round

Round 2: knit 1 stitch in the stitch below, purl 1 stitch.

These 2 rounds are repeated.

Place a stitch marker at the beginning of the round and after 73 (77) 81 (85) 89 (93) 97 stitches. Knit until work measures 33 (34) 35 (36) 37 (38) 39 cm or as long you want it (remember that you may need more yarn), let round 2 be the last round.

DECREASE FOR ARMHOLES: Knit 1 round where you cast off 8 (8) 8 (8) 8 (8) 8 stitches on each side for armholes - 4 (4) 4 (4) 4 (4) 4 stitches before and 4 (4) 4 (4) 4 (4) 4 stitches after stitch marker. Let the work rest while you knit the sleeves.

SLEEVES

Narrow sleeve opening: Cast on 28 (30) 30 (32) 32 (34) 34 stitches on 6 mm needles. See picture 1. If you choose the narrow sleeve opening, you can choose to use double-pointed needles or the Magic Loop technique for the first few rounds. You can find many tutorials on this technique on YouTube.

Knit 1 round in stockinette stitch, increasing evenly throughout the round to 46 (48) 48 (50) 50 (52) 52 stitches by knitting 2 stitches into 1. This will give you sleeves like in picture 1. You can see how to do this in the video here:

Wide sleeve opening: If you choose the wide sleeve opening, you can use a small 6 mm circular needle, 40 cm. Cast on 46 (48) 48 (50) 50 (52) 52 stitches and knit as you did for the body. This will give you a wide sleeve opening, similar to the sleeve itself. See picture 2.

Place a stitch marker at the beginning of the round.

Knit fisherman's rib until the sleeve measures 44 (45) 45 (46) 46 (47) 47 cm, making sure to end on round 2.

BINDING OFF FOR ARMHOLE:

Knit one round while binding off 8 (8) 8 (8) 8 (8) 8 stitches for the armhole - 4 (4) 4 (4) 4 (4) 4 stitches before and 4 (4) 4 (4) 4 (4) 4 stitches after the stitch marker. Knit 1 more sleeve.

ALL STITCHES ON NEEDLE

Now you will knit stockinette stitch for the remainder of the work. Knit 1 round while transferring the sleeve stitches onto the same circular needle as for the body. Begin by transferring the stitches from the first sleeve onto the right needle, then place a marker (PM). This is the beginning of the round (BOR). You will knit over this sleeve at the end of the round. Knit across the frontpiece/backpiece until you get to the next armhole, PM. Transfer the stitches of the next sleeve onto the left needle. Knit across these stitches, PM. Knit across other half of the body, PM. When you have knitted across the second sleeve, you are back

at the beginning of the round and have 206 (218) 226 (238) 246 (258) 266 stitches on the needle: 65 (69) 73 (77) 81 (85) 89 stitches over each front/back piece and 38 (40) 40 (42) 42 (44) 44 stitches over the sleeves. You have placed a stitch marker at each transition. Knit 5 rounds for all sizes before beginning on raglan decreases.

RAGLAN DECREASE

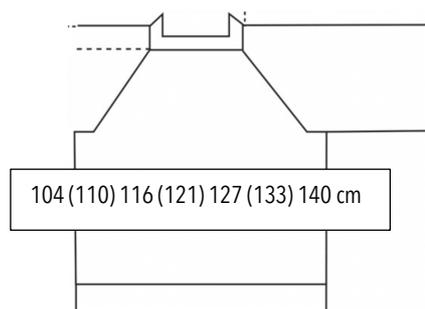
Decrease before the marker: Stop 3 stitches before the stitch marker, knit 1 stitch, slip it back to the left needle, lift the second stitch on the left needle over the outer stitch, and slip the stitch back to the right needle. Tighten the stitch slightly so that it does not become loose. Knit 1 stitch.

Decrease after the marker: Knit 1 stitch, slip 2 stitches as follows: Slip 1 stitch to the right needle as if to knit, then slip the next stitch in the same manner. Use the left needle to transfer both stitches back to the left needle. Knit them together through the back loops. Tighten the stitch slightly so that it does not become loose.

Perform the raglan decreases every other round, for a total of 16 (17) 18 (19) 20 (21) 22 times. You should now have 78 (82) 82 (86) 86 (90) 90 stitches on the needle.

Next round after the last raglan decrease: Bind off 4 (5) 4 (5) 5 (6) 5 stitches evenly across the front and back pieces = 70 (72) 74 (76) 76 (78) 80 stitches on the needle, distributed as follows: 29 (30) 33 (34) 36 (37) 40 stitches across each front/back piece and 6 (6) 4 (4) 2 (2) 0 stitches across both sleeves. Now begin the neckline.



NECKLINE

Switch to 5 mm needle 40 cm and knit a ribbed edge for 6 (6) 6 (6) 6 (6) 6 cm with 1 knit twisted and 1 purl. You can also knit the ribbed edge as long as you want if you have enough yarn left.

Cast off as follows:

Slip the first stitch to the right needle without knitting it. Knit the next stitch and lift the first (unworked) stitch over the stitch you just knitted, leaving only one stitch on the right needle. Gently pull the stitch to ensure the cast-off edge is not too tight. Knit the next stitch and carry on as before lifting the stitch on right needle over the stitch just worked. Continue to bind off in this manner, maintaining an even tension for a neat edge. When you have no more stitches left, pull the yarn through the last stitch.

FINISHING: Sew in loose ends and under the arms.
