NEEDLES & NOTIONS

80 cm circular needle size 3.5 mm / US 4 or in the size mentioned for the sample, 3 stitch markers

Sample 1 The First

150 cm /60 inches length,

28 cm / 11 inches wide

Gauge 24 sts x 28 rows

Needle size 3.5 mm / US4

Merida by LAMANA fingering

50% Wool, 25% Silk, 25% Nylon

200 meters / 50 grams

2 balls col. Seidengrau

35 sts end of Part 1

Sample 2 Sunshine

140 cm /55 inches length,

26 cm / 10 inches wide

Gauge 25 sts x 31 rows

Needle size 3.25 mm / US3

Linea by Walk Collection Fingering

50% Alpaca, 25% Silk, 25% Linen

400 meters / 100 grams

1 skein col. Orange Punch

37 sts end of Part 1

Sample 3/4 Heart

150 cm /60 inches length,

35 cm / 11 inches wide

Gauge 23 sts x 26 rows

Needle size 3.0 mm / US2

Classic by Cardiff Cashmere DK

100% Cashmere goat

112 meters / 25 grams

4 balls col 517 Hermes /

35 sts end of Part 1

Sample 4 Glitter

146 cm /57,5 inches length,

33 cm / 13 inches wide

Gauge 24 sts x 32 rows

Needle size 3.0 mm / US2

Cashmere lux by Casa Grande

50% Wool, 25% Silk, 25% Nylon

125 meters / 50 grams

4 balls col. 21.002

40 sts end of Part 1

Sample 5 Spring

180 cm /71 inches length,

45 cm / 17 inches wide

Gauge 23 sts x 27 rows

Needle size 3.25 mm / US_3

Fingering weight by Kokon

100 % Merino

320 meters /100 grams

2 skein col. GUAVE 1723

55 sts end of Part 1

Sample 6 Tweedy

150 cm /60 inches length,

35 cm / 11 inches wide

Gauge 23 sts x 26 rows

Needle size 3.0 mm / US2

Classic by Cardiff Cashmere DK

100% Cashmere goat

112 meters / 25 grams

4 balls col 301 Nordic /

35 sts end of Part

ABBREVIATIONS

brk (brioche knit) Knit the next stitch together with its corresponding YO from the row below.

bef before

CO cast on

decr. decrease

incr. increase

k knit

k2tog knit 2 sts together knit wise

k2togtbl knit 2 sts together knit wise through the back loop

k3tog slip one stitch, knit 2 sts together through the back loop, and lift the lifted stitch over it.

M marker

p purl

pM / pEM place marker or edge marker

p2tog purl 2 sts together purl wise

rM / rEM remove marker or edge marker

Repeat always start with "*" and end with ";

RS right side

sM / sEM slip marker or edge marker

slp1 slip one st purlwise with yarn in front

sl1yo Bring the working yarn under the right needle to the front of the work. Slip the next stitch purlwise, then bring the working yarn over the right needle to the back of the work. This slipped stitch with a YO on top of it is considered one and will be worked as a brk on the next row.


slkyok (incr. 2 sts) lift the stitch off the needle and pull it over the needle, knit a stitch, let the right stitch slip off the needle, yarn over and knit a stitch through the left stitch. [Click here for a Video.](#)

st(s) stitch(es)

yo yarn over

yobf yarn over from back to front

WS wrong side



Sample 1 total length 150 cm / 59 inches. The parts measures as followed:

Part 1 and 2 each 25 cm / 9,8 inches, Part 3, 4 and 5 together 50 cm / 19,6 inches, Part 6 and 7 each 25 cm / 9,8 inches

INSTRUCTION

The Lille Kolding is knitted from one side to the other. The Lille is bordered by an I-cord edge that extends over the first and last 3 stitches and is separated by edge markers (EM).

The Lille becomes longer and automatically wider when more rows are knitted in part 1. However, this also increases the yarn consumption. The samples mentioned above and the many test projects on Ravelry provide a guide to yarn consumption.

For all those who would like to knit 100% of their yarn, in the middle section (Part 4) there is the option of adding rows or omitting Part 4.

Part 1

Beginning in stockinette stitch and increase every second row.

CO 2 sts

Row 1 (WS) p2

Row 2 (RS incr. 4 sts) slkyok, slkyok

Row 3 (WS incr. 1 st) k1, slp1 k1, yobf, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 4 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, k1, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 5 (WS incr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, pEM, yobf, p1, pEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 6 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, k to 3 sts bef end, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1,

Row 7 (WS incr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, yobf, p to 3 sts bef end, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Repeat row 6 + 7 until you have 35 sts between the edge stitches.

At this point you decide how long and wide you want your Lille Kolding to be. Each further repetition of the two rows creates more stitches. On page 2, the number of stitches between the markers at the end of part 1 is given for each sample.

Part 2

From stockinette stitch to rib pattern with eyelets, increases every second row

Row 1 (RS incr. 1 st) k1, slp1 k1, sEM, yo, k to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 2 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, p to yo, k1, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1,

Row 3 (RS incr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, p1, k1, yo, pM, k to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 4 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, p to M, sM, k1, p1, k1, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 5 (RS incr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, p1, *k1, p1; to M, rM, k1, yo, pM, k to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 6 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, p to M, sM, k1, *p1, k1; to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Repeat row 5 +6 until you have one stitch left before the I-cord edge.

Next row (RS incr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, p1, *k1, p1; to M, rM, k1, yo, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Last row (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, k1, *p1, k1; to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Part 3

From ribbed pattern to brioche

Row 1 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, sl1yo, k1, pM, p1, *k1, p1; to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 2 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, k1, *p1, k1; to M, sM, sl1yo, brk, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 3 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, *sl1yo, brk; to M, rM, sl1yo, k1, pM, p1, *k1, p1; to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 4 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, k1, *p1, k1; to M, sM, *sl1yo, brk; to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Repeat row 3 +4 until you have 3 st between M and EM.

Row 5 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, *sl1yo, brk; to M, rM, sl1yo, k1, pM, p1, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 6 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, k1, sM, *sl1yo, brk; to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 7 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, *sl1yo, brk; to M, rM, sl1yo, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Part 4

Centre of the scarf, brioche

You should still have half of the yarn in the centre of the cloth.

Row 8 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, brk, *sl1yo, brk; to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 9 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, sl1yo, *brk, sl1yo; to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Part 5

From brioche back to the ribbed pattern

Row 1 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, brk, sl1yo, pM, brk, *sl1yo, brk; to EM, sEM slp1, k1, slp1

Row 2 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, sl1yo, *brk, sl1yo; to M, sM, brk, p1, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 3 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, *k1, p1; to M, rM, brk, sl1yo, pM, brk, *sl1yo, brk; to EM, sEM slp1, k1, slp1

Row 4 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, sl1yo, *brk, sl1yo; to M, sM, brk, p1, *k1, p1; to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Repeat row 3 + 4 until you have 3 sts between M and EM in WS and end with WS.

Row 5 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, sl1yo, brk, sl1yo, sM, brk, p1, *k1, p1; to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 6 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, *k1, p1; to M, rM, brk, sl1yo, brk, sEM slp1, k1, slp1

Row 7 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, sl1yo, brk, p1, *k1, p1; to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 8 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, *k1, p1; to 1 st bef EM, brk, sEM slp1, k1, slp1

Part 6

From rib pattern back to stockinette stitch with eyelets, decreases every second row

Row 1 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, *p1, k1; to 3 sts bef EM, k2tog, yo, slp1, rEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 2 (WS decr. 2 st) k1, slp1, k2tog, pEM, p2tog, p1, k1, pM, *p1, k1; to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 3 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, *p1, k1; to M, sM, k2tog, yo, k to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 4 (WS decr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, p to yo, p2tog, rM, p1, k1, pM, *p1, k1; to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Repeat row 3 + 4 until you have 2sts between EM and M in RS and end with RS.

Row 5 (WS decr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, p to yo, p2tog, rM, p1, k1, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 6 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, k2tog, yo, k to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 7 (WS decr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, p to yo, p2tog, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Part 7

End, decrease in stockinette stitch in every second row, decreases every second row

Row 1 (RS decr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, k to 2 sts bef EM, k2togtbl, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 2 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, p to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Repeat row 1 + 2 until you have 2sts between EM and EM in WS.

Row 3 (RS decr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, k2togtbl, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 4 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, rEM, p1, rEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 5 (RS decr. 4 sts) k2tog, k3tog, k2tog,

Instead of binding off, cut the thread and pull it through the 3 remaining stitch necks and sew the thread.

Finish

Weave in all ends. Block to measurements.

Wear with pride!



Same But Different – Smallest (80/11 oder 102/13)

The SBD version is a small neck flatterer and so that it fits well it has a slightly longer part 1 and 7. All other parts are knitted in the same way as the main pattern.

**Sample 7 The little pink one**

120 cm / 47 inches length, 18 cm / 8 inches wide

Gauge 25 sts x 28 rows

Needle size 3.25 mm / US 3

Organic soft Merino by Kaos Yarns Fingering

100% Merino

225 meters / 50 grams

1 skein col Charismatic

25 sts end of Part 1

Sample 8 The little blue one

100 cm / 40 inches length, 16 cm / 6 inches wide

Gauge 25 sts x 28 rows

Needle size 3.25 mm / US 3

Como Cashmere by Lamana Yarns Fingering

70 % Merino, 30 % Cashmere goat

120 meters / 50 grams

1,4 skeins col 36 Taubenblau

20 sts end of Part 1

Part 1

Beginning in stockinette stitch

CO 2 sts

Row 1 (WS) p2

Row 2 (RS incr. 4 sts) slkyok, slkyok

Row 3 (WS incr. 1 st) k1, slp1 k1, yobf, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 4 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, k1, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 5 (WS incr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, pEM, yobf, p1, pEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 6 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, k to 3 sts bef end, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1,

Row 7 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, p to 3 sts bef end, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 8 (RS) work row 6

Row 9 (WS incr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, yobf, p to 3 sts bef end, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 10 (RS) work row 6

Row 11 (WS) work row 7.

Repeat row 6 to 11 until you have 20 / 25 sts between the edge stitches. End with WS row.

Part 7

End and decrease in stockinette stitch

Row 1 (RS decr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, k to 2 sts bef EM, k2togtbl, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 2 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, p to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 3 (RS) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, k to EM, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 4 (WS) work Row 2

Row 5 (RS decr. 1 st) work Row 1

Row 6 (WS) work Row 2

Row 7 (RS) work Row 5

Row 8 (WS) work Row 2

Repeat row 3 to 8 until you have 2sts between EM and EM in WS.

Row 9 (RS decr. 1 st) k1, slp1, k1, sEM, k2togtbl, sEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 10 (WS) k1, slp1, k1, rEM, p1, rEM, slp1, k1, slp1

Row 11 (RS decr. 4 sts) k2tog, k3tog, k2tog,

Instead of binding off, cut the thread and pull it through the 3 remaining stitch necks and sew the thread.
