

# PetiteKnit

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## NOVICE CARDIGAN MINI – CHUNKY EDITION

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<b>Sizes:</b>	1-2 (2-3) 3-4 (4-5) 5-6 years
<b>Bust circumference:</b>	65 (68) 72 (74) 76 cm [25½ (26¾) 28¼ (29¼) 30 inches]
<b>Length:</b>	37 (39) 40 (42) 44 cm [14½ (15¼) 15¾ (16½) 17¼ inches] measured mid back
<b>Gauge:</b>	14 stitches x 21 rows = 10 x 10 cm [4 x 4 inches] in stockinette stitch on 7 mm [no US equivalent] needles.
<b>Needles:</b>	Circular needles: 6 mm [US10] and 7 mm [no US equivalent] / 80 cm [32 inches]. Double Pointed Needles: 6 and 7 mm [US10 and no US equivalent]
<b>Materials:</b>	150 (150) 150 (150) 150 g Kos from Sandnes Yarn (50 g = 150 m) <b>held together with</b> 50 (50) 50 (50) 50-75 g Tynn Silk Mohair from Sandnes Yarn (25 g = 212 m) <i>Note: Two strands of yarn are held together throughout (one strand of the thick yarn and one strand of silk mohair) The given yardage is the total yardage needed.</i> 6 buttons (ø = 15 - 18 mm)

## **Before casting on**

Read the pattern through before starting. Don't be overwhelmed by all the instructions, you'll deal with each of them one at a time. Throughout the pattern the numbers correspond to the sizes 1-2 (2-3) 3-4 (4-5) 5-6 years.

At [www.petiteknit.com](http://www.petiteknit.com) you can find a small selection of videos showing some of the most used techniques. If there is one technique that isn't shown and that you have trouble figuring out, you can probably find a helpful video on YouTube that will guide you.

## **About gauge**

The Novice Cardigan Mini – Chunky Edition is knit with a gauge of 14 stitches per 10 cm [4 inches] in stockinette stitch. That means that you should have 14 stitches when measuring 10 cm [4 inches] in your knitted fabric. If there are more stitches per 10 cm [4 inches], your cardigan will end up smaller than the stated measurements. If there are fewer stitches per 10 cm [4 inches], your cardigan will be larger.

This is why it is always recommended to knit a gauge swatch before casting on (knit a gauge swatch by casting on 25 stitches and knitting approximately 12 cm [4¾ inches] of stockinette stitch). Wash and dry your swatch as you would your final garment, as soaking and drying (also known as blocking) may vary the final measurements of your gauge swatch.

If you have more than 14 stitches per 10 cm [4 inches], you should try switching to a needle that is 0.5 or 1 mm larger. If you have fewer stitches, you should try switching to a needle that is 0.5 or 1 mm smaller. Choose the needle size that gives you correct gauge, as this is the only way to ensure that the final measurements of your garment are the same than the ones stated in the pattern. Use a needle size 0.5 mm smaller for the ribbing or when indicated.

## PATTERN

The Novice Cardigan Mini – Chunky Edition is worked from the top down. This means that you begin by working the ribbed neck edge, then you work the yoke, then the body and finally the sleeves. The cardigan is worked in stockinette stitch, while the edges are worked in rib. The Novice Cardigan Mini – Chunky Edition has a round yoke, which is shaped by working 4 sets of increases evenly distributed along the yoke.

### About Increases

Making an increase means creating a new stitch. An increase is worked as follows:

Insert the left needle under the strand of yarn that runs between the stitches from back to front, lift the strand onto the left needle and knit it (see video on [www.petiteknit.com](http://www.petiteknit.com)). This is an increase also known as M1R or make one right.

### Yoke

Cast on 31 (31) 33 (35) 35 stitches on the 6 mm [US10] / 80 cm [32 inches] circular needles with your preferred cast-on method.

Row 1 (wrong side): \*Knit 1 stitch, purl 1 stitch\*, repeat from \* to \* to the last stitch on the needle, knit 1 stitch.

Row 2 (right side): \*Purl 1 stitch, knit 1 stitch\*, repeat from \* to \* to the last stitch on the needle, purl 1 stitch.

Repeat Rows 1 and 2 until the neck edge measures 3 cm [1¼ inches].

End on a Row 1 (i.e., on a wrong side row), so the next row is a row from the right side.

Change to the 7 mm [no US equivalent] / 80 cm [32 inches] circular needles by knitting the stitches onto the new needle.

Purl across 1 row. The next row is a right side row.

Work increases on the next row as follows (see video on [www.petiteknit.com](http://www.petiteknit.com)):

\*Knit 1 stitch. Work an increase\*.

Repeat from \* to \* until there are 3 stitches left on the needle, knit 3 stitches.

There are now 59 (59) 63 (67) 67 stitches on the needles.

Work back and forth in stockinette stitch (meaning you work knit stitches on right side rows and work purl stitches on wrong side rows) until the stockinette stitch section measures 2 cm [ $\frac{3}{4}$  inches], ending with a wrong side (purl) row.

Work increases on the next row (which is a right side row) as follows:

\*Knit 2 stitches. Work an increase\*.

Repeat from \* to \* until there are 3 stitches left on the needle, knit 3 stitches.

There are now 87 (87) 93 (99) 99 stitches on the needles.

Work back and forth in stockinette stitch until the entire stockinette stitch section measures 6 cm [ $2\frac{1}{4}$  inches], ending with a wrong side (purl) row.

Work increases on the next row (which is a right side row) as follows:

\*Knit 3 stitches. Work an increase\*.

Repeat from \* to \* until there are 3 stitches left on the needle, knit 3 stitches.

There are now 115 (115) 123 (131) 131 stitches on the needles.

Work back and forth in stockinette stitch until the entire stockinette stitch section measures 10 cm [4 inches], ending with a wrong side (purl) row.

Work increases on the next row (which is a right side row) as follows:

\*Knit 4 stitches. Work an increase\*.

Repeat from \* to \* until there are 3 stitches left on the needle, knit 3 stitches.

There are now 143 (143) 153 (163) 163 stitches on the needles.

Work back and forth in stockinette stitch until the entire stockinette stitch section measures 15 (15) 16 (17) 18 cm [6 (6)  $6\frac{1}{4}$  ( $6\frac{3}{4}$ ) 7 inches], ending with a wrong side (purl) row.

You have now completed the yoke.

## **Body**

The body is worked back and forth on 7 mm [no US equivalent] / 80 cm [32 inches] circular needles. The stitches of the yoke are now divided for the sleeves and the body. You will let the stitches for the sleeves rest by placing them on hold on stitch holders or lengths of leftover yarn, so you can continue working only on the stitches for the body. You will also cast on new stitches for the underarms. All of this will be done on the next row (which is a right side row) as follows:

Knit 19 (19) 21 (22) 22 stitches (left front), put the next 32 (31) 33 (36) 35 stitches on hold (left sleeve), cast on 4 (5) 5 (4) 5 stitches using the backward loop method, knit 41 (43) 45 (47) 49 stitches (back), put the next 32 (31) 33 (36) 35 stitches on hold (right sleeve), cast on 4 (5) 5 (4) 5 stitches using the backward loop method, knit 19 (19) 21 (22) 22 stitches (right front) (see video on [www.petiteknit.com](http://www.petiteknit.com)).

There are now 87 (91) 97 (99) 103 stitches on the needles for the body.

Work back and forth in stockinette stitch (knit across right side rows and purl across wrong side rows) until the cardigan measures a total of 31 (33) 34 (36) 38 cm [12¼ (13) 13½ (14¼) 15 inches] (measured from the cast-on edge at the neck) or to the desired length – try it on along the way on the child, but keep in mind that the required yardage may increase if you decide to make it longer.

Change to a 6 mm [US10] / 80 cm [32 inches] circular needle and work 6 cm [2¼ inches] back and forth in rib (knit 1 stitch, purl 1 stitch).

Bind off the stitches in established rib pattern from the right side (see video on [www.petiteknit.com](http://www.petiteknit.com)).

## **Sleeves**

The sleeves are worked one at a time. Slip the 32 (31) 33 (36) 35 resting stitches for one sleeve onto 7 mm [no US equivalent] double pointed needles or 7 mm [no US equivalent] / 80 cm [32 inches] circular needles if you are using the *Magic Loop* technique.

The sleeves are worked in the round as a tube. When dividing the stitches for body and sleeves, you cast on stitches at the underarm – you will create new stitches in the same way here. Instead of casting on new stitches, you can also choose to pick up and knit stitches in the new stitches you already cast on for the body (see video on [www.petiteknit.com](http://www.petiteknit.com)). The sleeve is worked as follows:

Knit across all of the sleeve stitches on the needle. Pick up and knit or cast on with the backward loop method 4 (5) 5 (4) 5 stitches in the 4 (5) 5 (4) 5 stitches you cast on at the underarm for the body (see video on [www.petiteknit.com](http://www.petiteknit.com)).

There are now 36 (36) 38 (40) 40 stitches on the needles for the sleeve. Place a stitch marker in the middle of the new stitches at the underarm to mark the beginning of the round.

Work in the round in stockinette stitch until the sleeve measures 19 (22) 25 (27) 28 cm [7½ (8¾) 9¾ (10¾) 11 inches] from the underarm.

Now the number of stitches needs to be reduced before the rib at the cuff is worked. Change to 6 mm [US10] needles and reduce the number of stitches as follows:

\*Knit 1, knit 2 stitches together\*.

Repeat from \* to \* until there are 0 (0) 2 (4) 4 stitches left on the needle, knit 0 (0) 2 (4) 4 stitches. There are now 24 (24) 26 (28) 28 stitches on the needles.

Work 4 cm [1½ inches] in the round in rib (knit 1 stitch, purl 1 stitch). Bind off the stitches in established rib pattern, not too tightly.

Work the second sleeve the same way as the first.

### **Front Plackets**

The front plackets are worked from stitches that are picked up and knitted from the right side along the front edges of the cardigan. Right side facing, pick up and knit approx. 4 stitches for every 5 rows all along the front edges, one edge at a time (see video on [www.petiteknit.com](http://www.petiteknit.com)).

Right Front Placket (with buttonholes):

Pick up and knit 69 (69) 79 (79) 79 stitches along the right front edge with a 6 mm [US10] / 80 cm [32 inches] circular needle. *Note: The given number of stitches is indicative. You can choose to pick up and knit 5 stitches more or 5 stitches less and have a stitch more or less between each buttonhole.*

Work 2 rows back and forth in rib (knit 1 stitch, purl 1 stitch).

Work buttonholes on the 3th row (which is a wrong side row) as follows:

Work 3 stitches in rib, knit 2 stitches together, work a yarn over.

\*Knit 10 (10) 12 (12) 12 stitches in rib, knit 2 stitches together, work a yarn over\*.

Repeat from \* to \* until there are 4 stitches left on the needle, work 4 stitches in rib. There are now a total of 6 buttonholes.

Work 2 rows back and forth in rib (knit 1 stitch, purl 1 stitch). Bind off the stitches in the established rib pattern on the next row (which is a right side row).

Left Front Placket (without buttonholes):

Pick up and knit the same number of stitches along the left front edge as for the right front placket. Work 5 rows back and forth in rib (knit 1 stitch, purl 1 stitch). Bind off the stitches in established rib pattern on the 6th row (which is a right side row).

## Finishing

Sew on 6 buttons along the left front placket across from the buttonholes on the right front placket.

Weave in all ends.
