SNOWFLAKE



Snowflake

Four variants of knitted snowflakes that can decorate windows, trees or the Christmas table.

Worked in the round on circular needles or four double-pointed needles.

First, stitches are cast on with circle cast-on and then knitting continues according to the chart and description.

Each variant is then knitted according to its chart.

The snowflakes are blocked at the end. For this, you can use a printout of the template on page 6. You can choose to stiffen the snowflakes as shown in the video.



You can knit in exactly the yarn you want. The size will depend on the yarn choice. You can therefore choose to knit in one of the material suggestions, or just use them as inspiration.

Note that the stated yarn quantities and measurements are guidelines.

Suggestion #1

Variants:

1 (2) 3 (4)

Measurement:

Diameter: Appr. 4 (10) 10 (14)cm

Suggested needles:

Circular needle or four double pointed needles: 2,5mm

Suggested materials:

- Marisa, Lang Yarns (210m/50g)
- Shiny, Krea Deluxe (95m/25g)
- Shimmery, Kit Couture (100m/25g)

Yarn consumption:

Appr. 0,5 (2) 2 (4)g

Suggestion #2

Variants:

1 (2) 3 (4)

Measurement:

Diameter: Appr. 7 (15) 15 (21)cm

Suggested needles:

Circular needle or four double pointed needles: 4mm

Suggested materials:

- Snefnug, CaMaRose (110m/50g)
- Isager Soft, Isager (125m/50g)
- Fivel, Rauma (100m/50g)

Yarn consumption:

Appr. 2 (8) 8 (15)g


Variant 1

Consists of one element that is repeated 6 times. Each repeat is worked over 2 of the 12sts in the circle.

The element starts at the arrow:

-  Cast on 3sts
-  Bind off 2sts
-  Cast on 3sts
-  Bind off 3sts
-  Cast on 2sts
-  Bind off 5sts (3 in the element and 2 in the circle)



After the last element, there is only 1 stitch remaining to bind off in the circle. Then break the yarn and pull it through the last stitch on the needle. Weave in the end to close the circle.



Variant 2

Consists of 2 elements, which are repeated alternately A and B. Each repeat is worked over 4 of the 24sts in the circle.



After the last element, there is only 1 stitch remaining to bind off in the circle. Then break the yarn and pull it through the last stitch on the needle. Weave in the end to close the circle.



Variant 3

Consists of 2 elements, which are repeated alternately A and B. Each repeat is worked over 6 of the 36sts in the circle.



After the last element, there are only 2sts remaining to bind off in the circle. Then break the yarn and pull it through the last stitch on the needle. Weave in the end to close the circle.



Variant 4

Consists of 2 elements, which are repeated alternately A and B. Each repeat is worked over 6 of the 36sts in the circle.

After the last element, there are only 2sts remaining to bind off in the circle. Then break the yarn and pull it through the last stitch on the needle. Weave in the end to close the circle.




Blocking template

Finally, you can use this template to block your Snowflake. Print out the page and place it in a plastic sleeve. Wash your Snowflake and optionally stiffen it with craft glue or wood glue mixed with water.
