



Evelyn's mozaic bag 2021


My "Still playing with patterns" bag is crocheted in the mozaic overlay technique worked in the round.
The size is approx. 40 x 14,5 cm and 36 cm high.

This pattern is mainly about the crocheted part. I will also tell you how I gave the bag a little more sturdiness and how I finished it. But how you want to do that yourself is of course up to you.

What do you need:

x Yarn:

For this project I have chosen a 8/4 cotton in four different colors: (left over from my "Playing with Patterns" interlocking crochet blanket)




My swatch 10x10cm: 25 stitches x 28 rows

- x a 2,5 mm hook
- x a standard supermarket shopping bag
- x fabric for the lining

2. Transition to the sides

For this I used a stitch that ensures that the first round of the sides starts to “stand up”.
Looks like this:



The point is that you don't just work the back loop of the stitch, but work another loop from the back of the stitch too. This actually causes the stitch to tilt, to stand up. If you find it easier, you can take the back loop and then find and pick up the extra loop at the back, but you do the same if you go behind the front loop and then go through the stitch (then you don't have to constantly look at the back...).

Then crochet in the round according to the pattern.

Part 1: The bottom




 Corners: 2 chains

Total 25 + 2x7 = 39 stitches

7 stitches

24 + 1 = 25 stitches

7 stitches




row 0 : 3x24 + 1 = 73 chains


3 repeats of 24 stitches

Total 3x24 + 1 + 2x19 = 111 stitches

12 + 7 = 19 stitches



The interior

To give the bag more sturdiness so that it retains its shape well, I made a standard shopping bag to size.



The standard shopping bag made to size with lots of ductape.




I then secured everything with coarse stitches in crucial places, such as the bamboo piece and the corners.

For the lining I used an aqua colored fabric that I had lying around and made a side pocket in it. I left the bottom seam open. I did this so I could put all the parts together.

- I first attached the lining by hand to the inside of the inner edge.
- I put the made to size shopping bag between the 2 layers in such a way that the pieces of bamboo lie at the openings.
- Now I've sewn the pieces together. Straight through the shopping bag and the inner edge.
- I covered the bottom plate of the shopping bag with the same fabric and is now laying loose at the bottom of the bag
- "the body" of the bag is done.

The handles



I didn't want the bag to be carried on the crochet stitches (it just stretches everything). That's why I "built in" those pieces of bamboo.

- For the handles I used the cut handles of the shopping bag and lengthened them slightly (with the same material). But you can also use something else for this.
- I have crocheted two "covers" (in the round) with the pattern on the left.
- Put the handles through the covers. And fix them firmly around the pieces of bamboo.
- Finally, close the seams nicely.
- The bag is done! 😊




Extra little zipper bag

I still had some yarn left over, so I made a matching little zipper bag. I took bits out of the pattern and put them together. This too is crocheted in the round. Later I added the lining and zipper.

- Dove gray (dark main color) approx. 65 grams 220 meters
- Ash gray (accentcolor) approx. 20 grams 65 meters
- sand (accentcolor) approx. 20 grams 65 meters
- Aqua (accentcolor) approx. 20 grams 65 meters

This is the pattern I used:



Round 1: You work both sides of the chain to get your first round.
