# Introduction

Crochet and knitting have always been my first passion, and I have to admit that very often crochet won in my favors. I have been exploring, designing, and constantly learning new techniques for quite a few years now. I owe my love for both of these crafts to my wonderful late Mum, Lucy.

A few years ago I tried Tunisian (or Afghan) crochet for the first time. It was a pattern for a scarf I found in a vintage magazine, and I was wowed. It is a cross between regular crochet and knitting that is totally addictive. It resembles crochet because you work with a hook, but a hook that is longer than the one you would use for standard crochet, and it starts with chains. It also resembles knitting, because you gather all the stitches onto the hook; you do that on forward passes, then work those stitches off the hook on return passes. Unlike in knitting or standard crochet, in Tunisian crochet you only work on the right side of the work, which a lot of people find incredibly useful. The fabric produced with Tunisian crochet is closer to that of a knitted fabric in look, but in feel it is closer to crochet as it is thicker.

Tunisian crochet has been around for a very long time. It is known that Queen Victoria of England favored the craft, and it was even called “Royal Princess Knitting” in her honor. Sadly, by the 1930s Tunisian crochet had lost its popularity. There were still patterns and books published on this craft, but nowhere near as many as on knitting and crochet. In recent times, however, it has seen a huge revival and I could

not be happier. This superb craft deserves a place at the top among the favorites.

I have included a wide variety of stitches in this book, from basic to more complicated, so that there is something for everyone to try. I have used my crochet knowledge to experiment with creating stitches such as popcorns and bobbles, and my knitting knowledge to create the cables and lace.

It is a huge honor to bring to you this wonderful dictionary with 150 of my favorite Tunisian crochet stitches. Each stitch is accompanied by a finished example, written instructions, charts, and step-by-step photographs. I hope that they will inspire your creativity and that you will enjoy trying something new, like adding a new stitch to your work or combining them to create beautiful projects.

## About This Book

The main chapter of this book is the Directory of Stitches (pages 14–155), featuring step-by-step instructions for 150 Tunisian crochet stitches ranging from shells, clusters, and cables to lace, chevrons, and edgings. If you are new to Tunisian crochet or need to brush up your crochet skills at any point, at the back of the book you will find the Tunisian Crochet Skills chapter (pages 156–173). There you will find information on Tunisian crochet basics, from choosing yarn and holding the hook to working stitches and variations.

### KEY FACTS

**Foundation chain and multiple:** Tunisian crochet always starts with a foundation chain. Use the multiple provided at the beginning of the pattern to calculate how many chains to make in your foundation chain (see here).

**Basic stitches:** All of the stitch patterns use Tunisian simple stitch, so practice this first (here). Other key basic stitches are Tunisian knit, purl, full, double, and slip stitch. These are explained in the basic stitches section at the beginning of the directory (pages 16–27); if you need a reminder thereafter, see here.

**Special stitches:** Advanced or special stitches are explained with clear written instructions near the beginning of each pattern. These are also used to help make some patterns shorter or easier to follow and memorize.

**Step and chart numbers:** The step numbers in the patterns correspond to the numbers on the charts. Each row of Tunisian

crochet consists of a forward pass and a return pass (see here). All odd numbers are forward passes; all even numbers are return passes.

**Final step:** The final step of each pattern indicates which steps to repeat to continue the pattern.

The 150 Tunisian crochet stitches that make up the stitch directory, with written instructions and charts, will help you master a wide range of Tunisian crochet skills. Organized into nine families of stitches and clearly numbered, you can dip in and out of the directory or work your way through a particular section to develop your skills in that area.

Stitches are divided into stitch families and clearly numbered.

Swatches shown at approximately actual size provide a great visual for how the finished stitch will look.

Symbol charts in the color of the swatch provide a visual map for working the stitch. Symbols indicate the different stitches and how they are placed in relation to each other. A list of symbols can be found on pages 170-173. Charts represent the right side of the work. Forward passes are numbered at the right and read from right to left. Return passes are numbered at the left and read from left to right.

Charts indicate the section that forms the repeat of the pattern, and always include at least one full pattern repeat.

Guidelines for the length of foundation chain required are listed. See page 163 for more on this.

Special stitch instructions are provided near the beginning of each pattern when they are needed.

Written step-by-step instructions guide you through the creation of the stitch. Make sure that you begin with the correct number of foundation chains and follow the instructions exactly. The terminology of crochet can be confusing at first. A list of abbreviations is given on page 170 at the back of the book.

Different colored yarns are allocated a letter in patterns that use more than one color.

At the beginning of each forward pass, the loop on the hook counts as the first stitch, so don't work into the stitch immediately below it (unless you want to increase). The end stitch is always worked the same and is treated separately in the patterns. See page 164 for more information on the first and last stitches.

Asterisks \* within the instructions indicate a point from which instructions are repeated. For example, "rep from \* to end" means you should repeat the instructions after the \* across the whole pass as far as the end stitch. Where instructions given after the \* do not fit exactly, the instruction will reflect this. For example, "1 Tss in next st, 1 Tks in next 3 sts; rep from \* to end, ending last rep with 1 Tks in next 2 sts" means repeat the instructions after the \* but on the last repeat work 1 Tks in next 2 sts instead of next 3 sts.

The charts for some stitches are broken down to help you locate the specific part of the chart that relates to the instructions in that step or steps. Previous steps are shown in gray so you can see how the chart and the stitch build up.

Step-by-step photographs show you how the stitch progresses and what your work should look like at certain points.

The final instruction in each stitch indicates which steps should be repeated to continue building the pattern.





# 1 Directory of Stitches

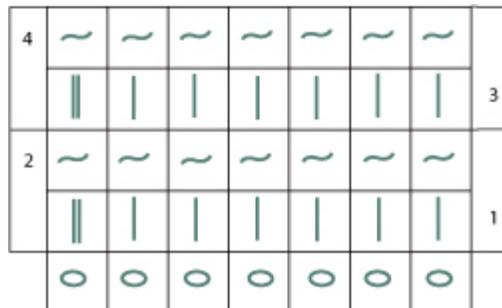
Dive into the directory of 150 Tunisian crochet stitches and learn how to build a sturdy and hard-wearing fabric from basic Tunisian stitches, create a multicolored pattern of waves and chevrons, make a beautiful and delicate lace fabric, or embellish your pieces with clusters, bobbles, or cables. The directory is divided into nine families of stitches to help you to easily find the perfect one to suit your project. Whether you dip in and out or work your way through a complete section to really master one technique, get ready to make some stunning Tunisian crochet creations.



# 1 Tunisian Simple Stitch



This stitch is the basis for all Tunisian crochet patterns. It creates a beautiful fabric with fair drape, and is perfect for accessories, garments, and homewares. It has a tendency to curl; using a hook larger than recommended for the yarn will help.

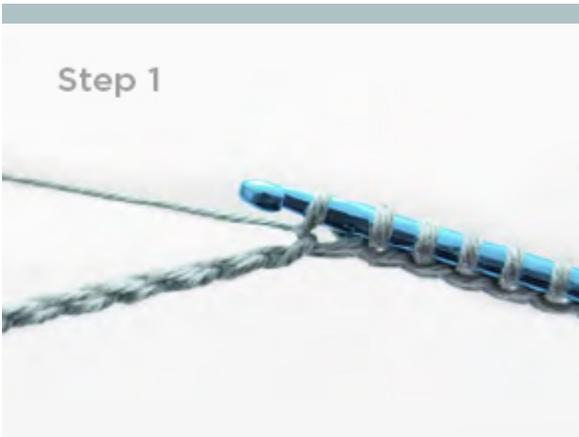


## KEY FACTS

**Foundation row:** All Tunisian stitch patterns start with the same foundation row as Tunisian simple stitch (steps 1–2), unless

specified otherwise.

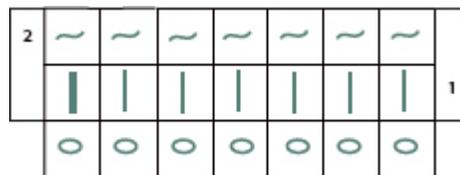
**Working the end stitch:** After the foundation row, work the end stitch of each row by inserting the hook under both the front and back vertical bars of the stitch at the edge of the fabric. The patterns treat the end stitch separately; work 1 Tss in the end stitch unless specified otherwise.



**Multiple** Any number of sts.

**Special stitch** Tss (Tunisian simple stitch): Insert hook from right to left under front vertical bar of st (or into bump at back of ch when working into foundation ch), yo and pull through.

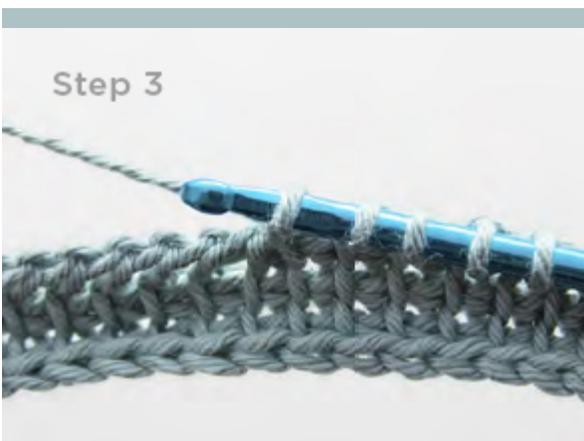
**Step 1** (forward pass) 1 Tss in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch to end.





**Step 2** (return pass) Yo and pull through 1 loop on hook, \*yo and pull through 2 loops; rep from \* until 1 loop left on hook.

**Note** Steps 1 and 2 are your foundational row. You will come back to this when doing other stitches. In addition, step 2 is the standard return pass for all rows of Tunisian crochet unless a different instruction is provided in the pattern.



**Step 3** Loop on hook counts as 1st st, so skip 1st vertical bar, 1 Tss in each st to end, work end st.

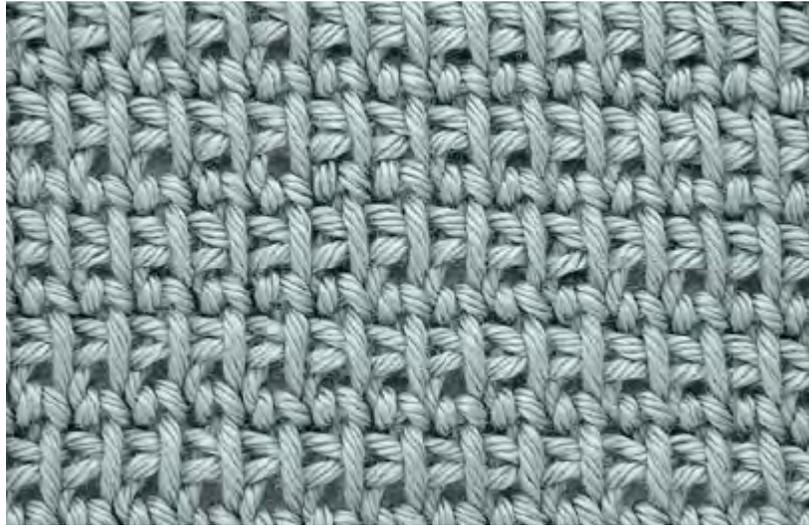

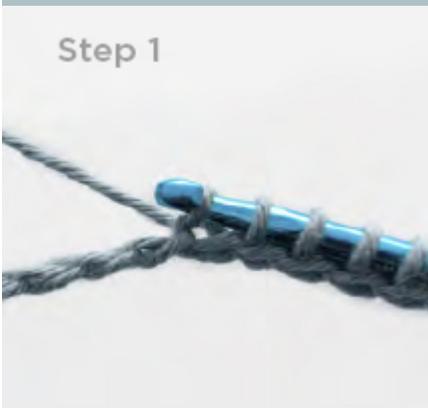

## 2 Extended Simple Stitch



A variation of Tunisian simple stitch with the addition of a chain, this pattern creates a beautiful fabric with fair drape and an airy feel. It is perfect for accessories and garments.

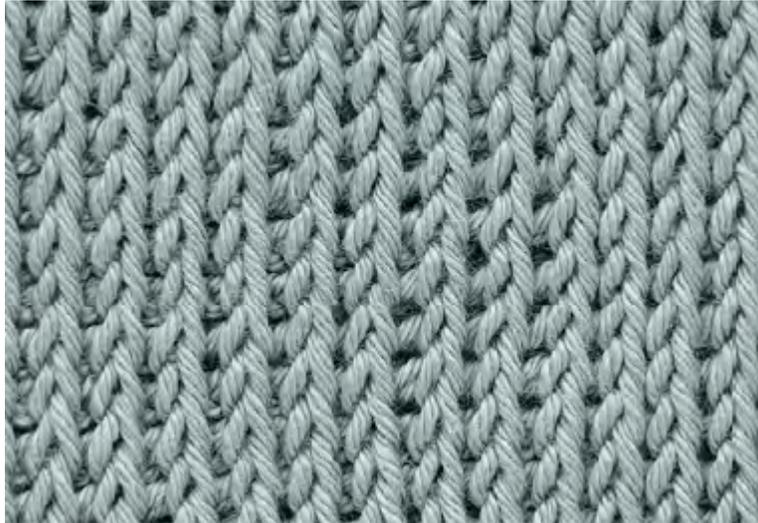


**Multiple** Any number of sts.

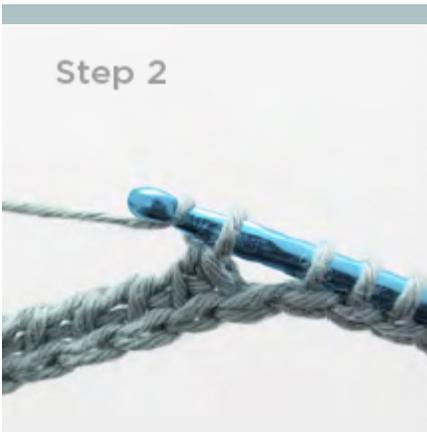
**Special stitch** ETss (extended Tunisian simple stitch): Insert hook from right to left under front vertical bar of st, yo and pull through,



### 3 Knit Stitch



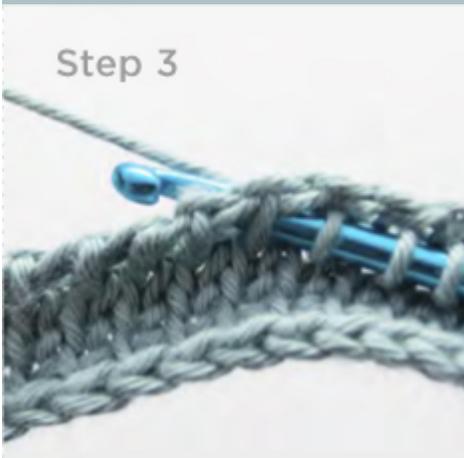
This looks like knitted stockinette, but creates a more dense and sturdy fabric. It curls a lot and requires blocking; using a hook larger than recommended for the yarn will help. It is a great stitch to use for garments, accessories, and in combination with other Tunisian stitches.



**Multiple** Any number of sts.

**Special stitch** Tks (Tunisian knit stitch): Insert hook from front to back through center of st between vertical bars, yo and pull through.

**Steps 1–2** Work foundation row (see here).



**Step 3** Skip 1st vertical bar, 1 Tks in each st to end, work end st.

**Step 4** Rep step 2.

**Step 5** Rep steps 3–4.

## 4 Purl Stitch



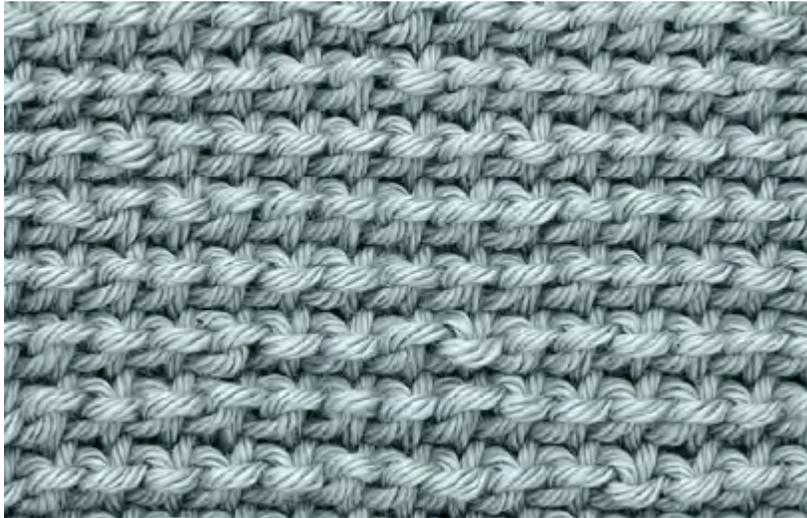
This stitch closely resembles purl stitch in knitting. It produces fabric with good drape and full of texture, perfect for accessories such as scarves and shawls. The fabric is also hard-wearing, making it ideal for homewares like blankets and pillows.



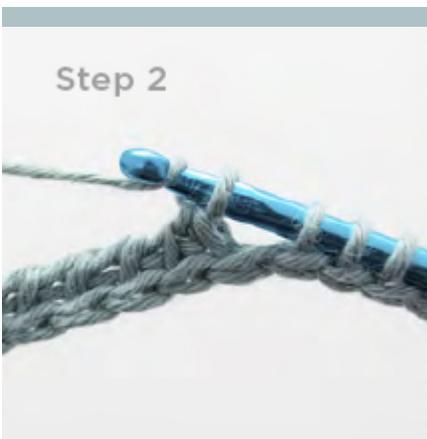
**Multiple** Any number of sts.



## 5 Reverse Stitch



This stitch looks similar to Tunisian purl stitch. Likewise, the hard-wearing fabric is full of texture, has good drape, and is suitable for accessories and homewares.



**Multiple** Any number of sts.

**Special stitch** Trs (Tunisian reverse stitch): With yarn and hook at back, insert hook from right to left under back vertical bar of st, yo



## 6 Rib Stitch



Alternating columns of Tunisian knit and purl stitches create a fabric that looks like knitted rib, and is likewise perfect for cuffs on garments and edgings. Try different combinations of this stitch, such as 1 x 1 or 3 x 3 rib.



**Multiple** 4 sts + 2.



## 7 Seed Stitch



This pattern of alternating Tunisian knit and purl stitches creates an interesting fabric that is perfect for garments, accessories, and homewares. It is identical to seed stitch in knitting.

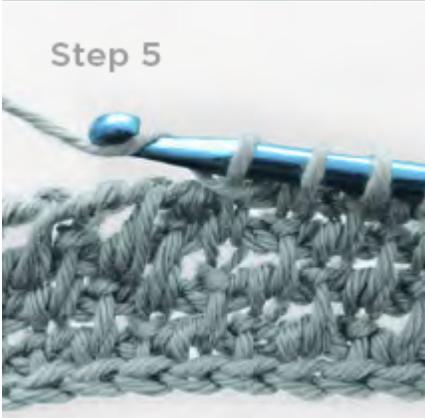

**Special stitches** As left.

**Steps 1–2** Work foundation row (see here).

**Step 3** Skip 1st vertical bar, \*1 Tks in next st, 1 Tps in next st; rep from \* to end, work end st.

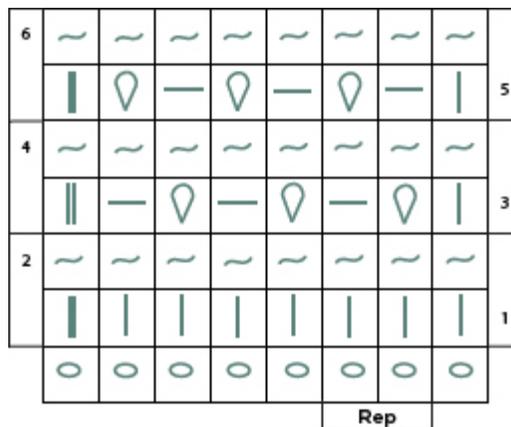

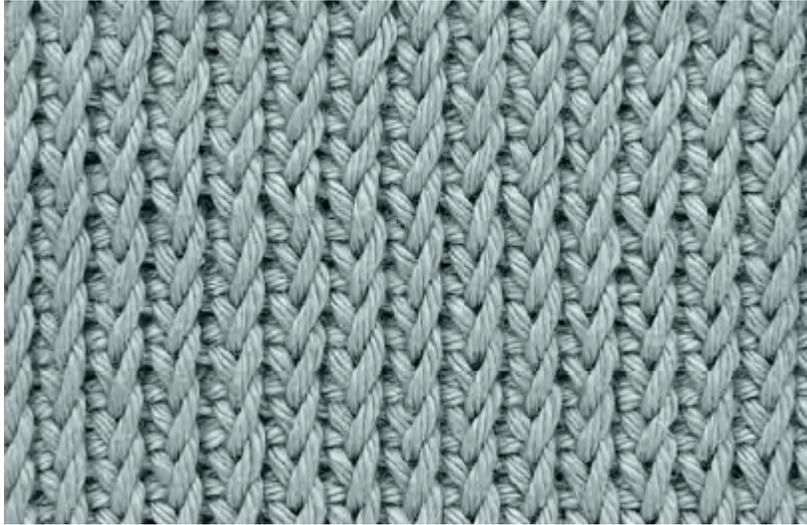

## 8 Twisted Knit Stitch



This dense stitch creates a fabric with very little drape. It has a lovely texture and works well for sturdy homewares, such as baskets and pillows. It curls a lot and requires blocking. Using a larger hook will provide more drape to the fabric.



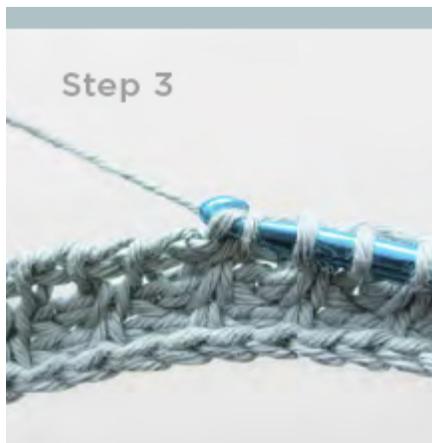

## 9 Mock Rib Stitch



This stitch gives the illusion of 1 x 1 rib. It is a combination of Tunisian simple stitch and twisted simple stitch. It creates fabric that is quite dense, but has good drape.

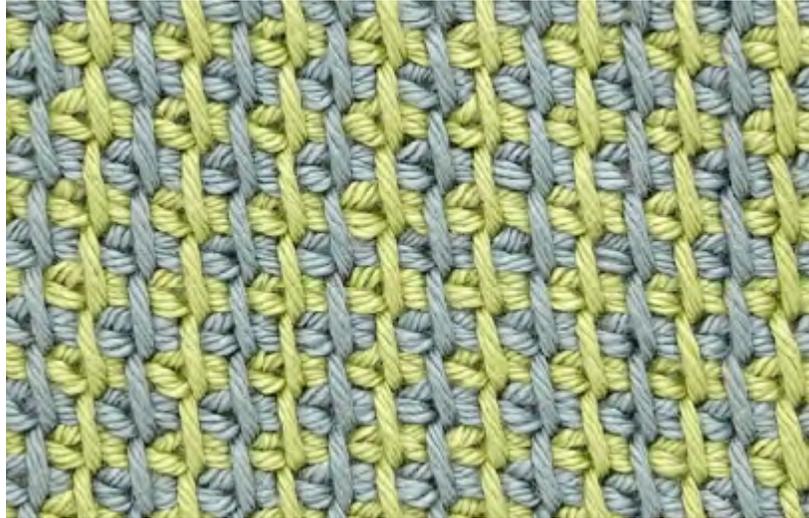

**Special stitch** TwTss (twisted Tunisian simple stitch): Using tip of hook, grasp vertical bar of st and twist hook up to right, yo and



## 10 Running Stitch



A combination of Tunisian simple and slip stitches, this pattern creates a dense fabric with little drape, so using a hook at least two sizes larger is recommended. The stitch looks beautiful in single or multiple colors, and is perfect for homewares. Change color on the return pass when two loops are left on the hook; finish off the pass with the new color. Carry the unused yarn up the side of the work and use it when needed.

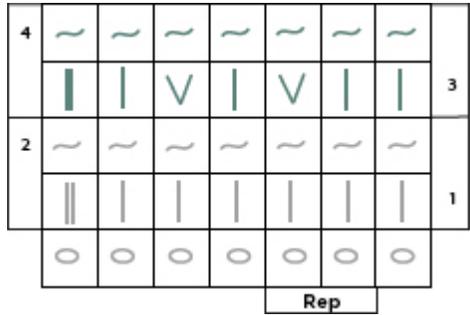

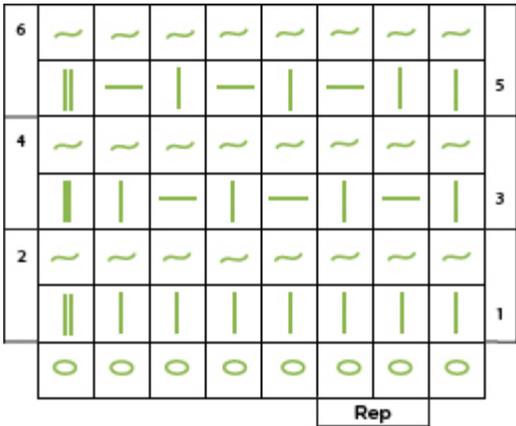

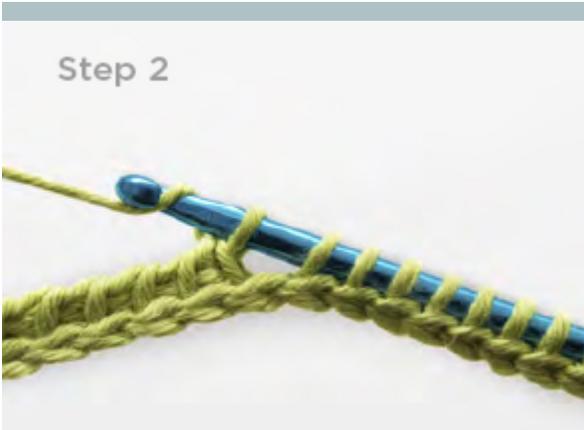


# 11 Honeycomb Stitch



This beautiful stitch produces a fabric full of interesting texture. It is created by alternating Tunisian purl and simple stitches. The fabric has good drape and is perfect for garments and accessories.



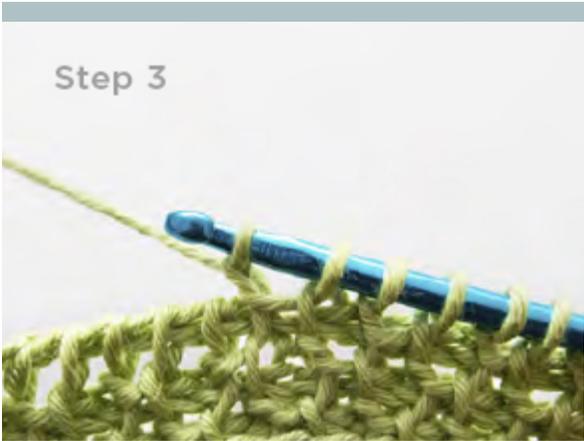
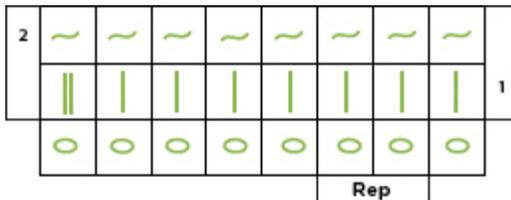

## 12 Flecked Stitch



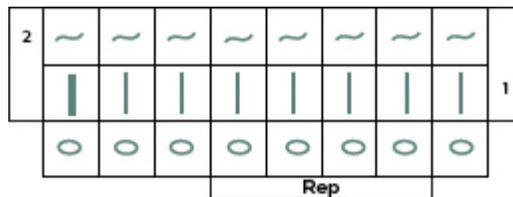
This pattern creates a dense fabric with little drape. It is produced using Tunisian simple and slip stitches to create the fleck effect. Because of the tightness of the stitch, it is perfect for homewares such as pillows and wall hangings. To give the fabric more movement, use a hook two sizes larger than recommended for the yarn. Change color on the return pass when two loops are left on the hook; finish off the pass with the new color. Carry the unused yarn up the side of the work and use it when needed.



**Multiple** 4 sts + 4.

**Special stitch** Tslst (Tunisian slip stitch): Insert hook from right to left under front vertical bar of st, leave bar on hook without working it.

**Steps 1–2** Using A, work foundation row (see here).



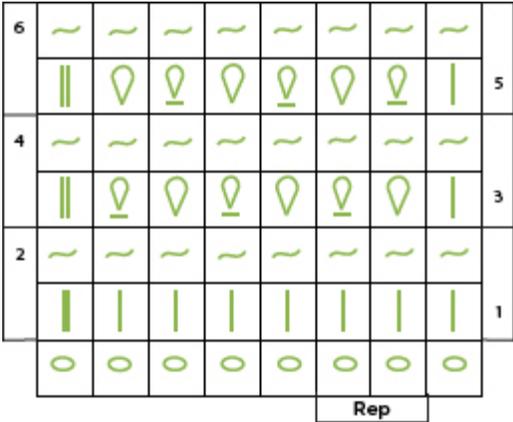




# 13 Net Stitch



Although similar to Tunisian seed stitch, this pattern produces a fabric with more drape. It is perfect for making garments and accessories. The pattern is constructed from a combination of Tunisian knit stitch and knit stitch purled.





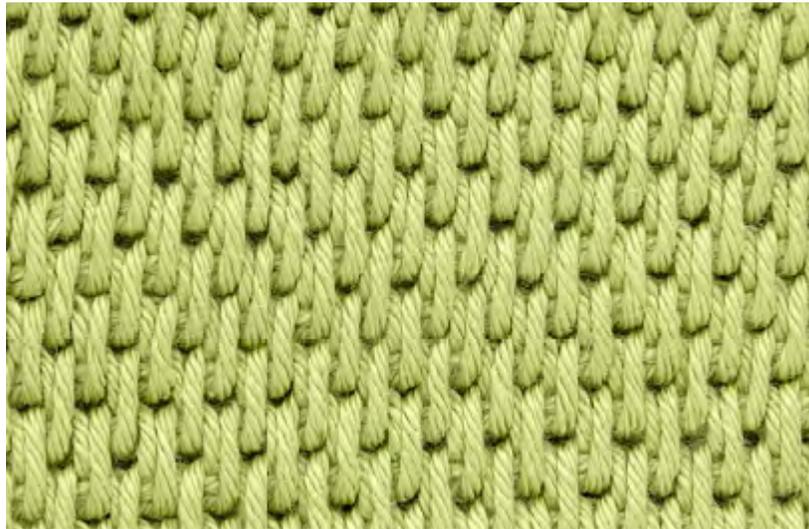








## 15 Full Stitch



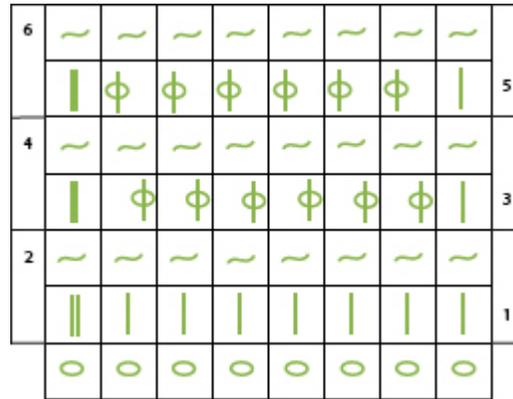
Also known as mesh or goblin stitch, this gorgeous fabric has good drape, but it curls a lot and requires good blocking. It is worked in the spaces between the vertical bars. Check the number of stitches after each forward pass to help you keep the pattern correct and the edges straight.



**Multiple** Any number of sts.

**Special stitch** Tfs (Tunisian full stitch): Insert hook from front to back in sp between sts, yo and pull through.

**Steps 1–2** Work foundation row (see here).



**Step 3** Skip 1st vertical bar, 1 Tfs in sp between 1st and 2nd sts, 1 Tfs in each sp to last sp, skip last sp, work end st.

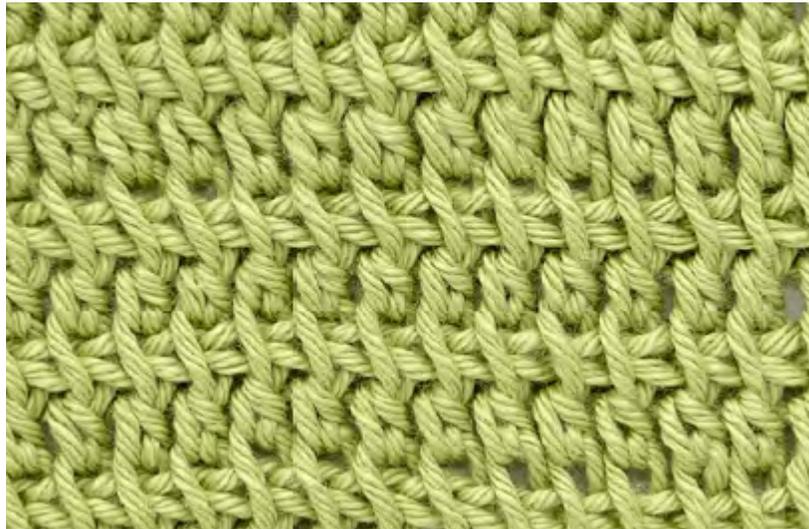

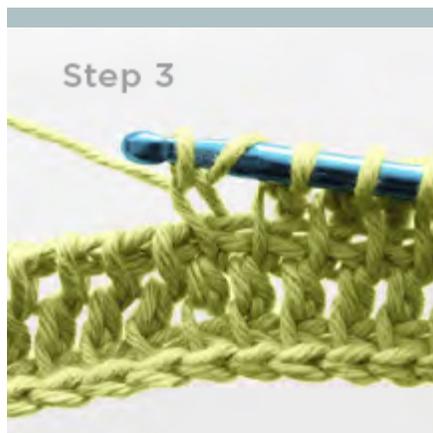

## 16 Double Stitch



This lovely, loose stitch produces a drapey and airy fabric that is perfect for accessories such as shawls and scarves. It is created by wrapping the yarn over the hook before inserting the hook under the first vertical bar.



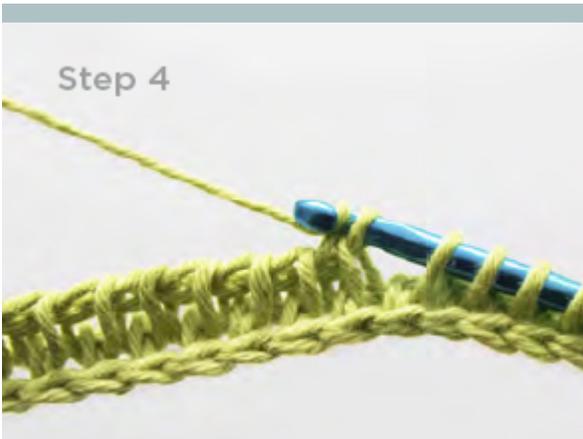
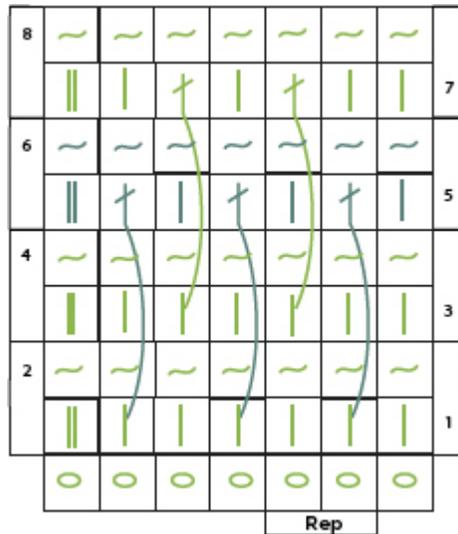

## 17 Field Stitch



Beautifully textured, this stitch produces a fabric with wonderful drape that is perfect for making garments and accessories. Change color on the return pass when two loops are left on the hook; finish off the pass with the new color. Carry the unused yarn up the side of the work and use it when needed.

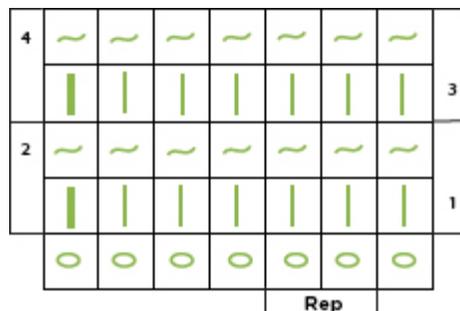


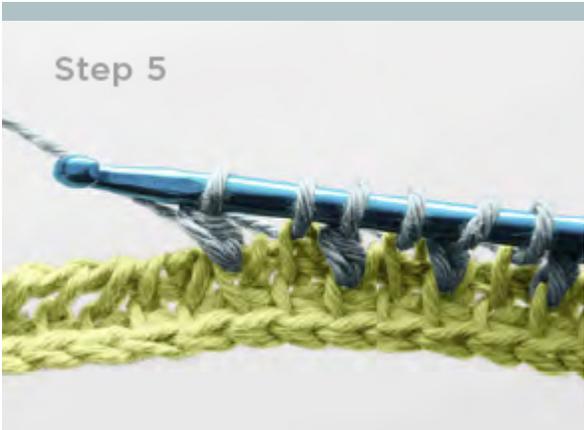

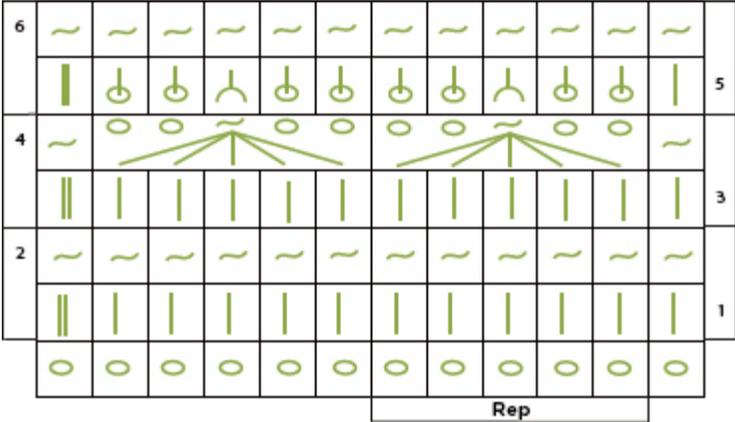


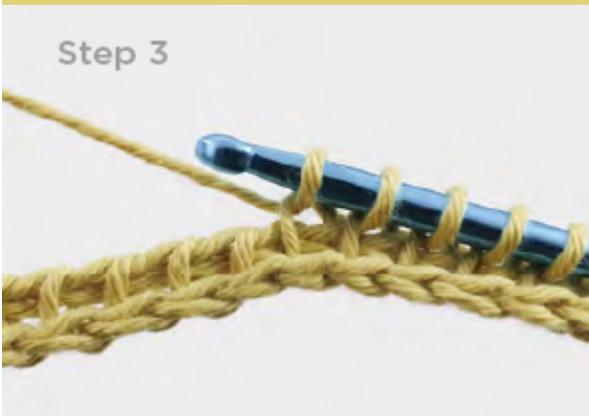


# 18 Shell Stitch



This lovely shell stitch with beautiful drape is perfect for lacy garments and accessories. The shells are worked on the return pass. When counting stitches off the hook when creating shells, the loop on the hook counts as 1.

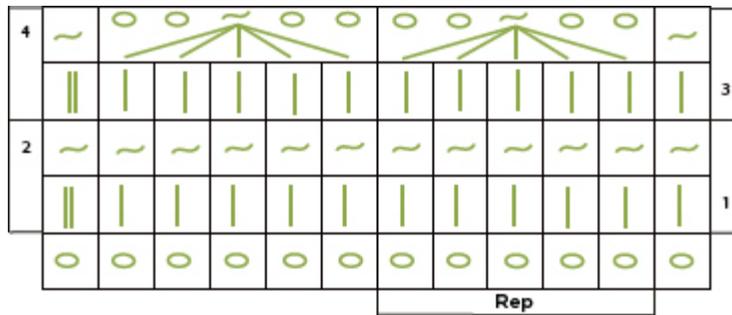

**Steps 1–2** Work foundation row (see here).

**Step 3** Skip 1st vertical bar, 1 Tss in each st to end, work end st.



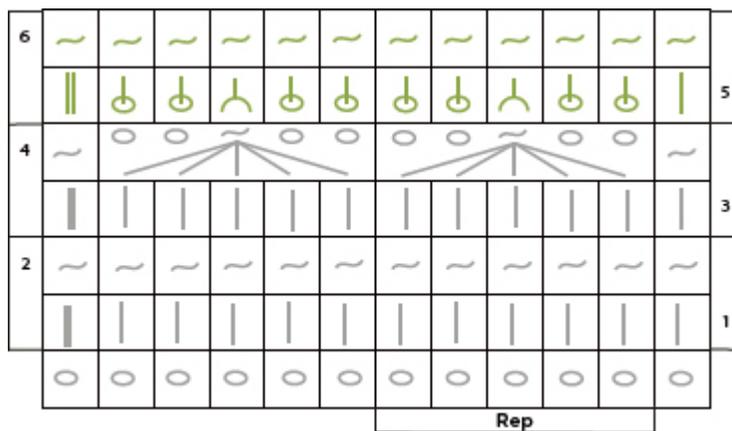

## 19 Simple Shell



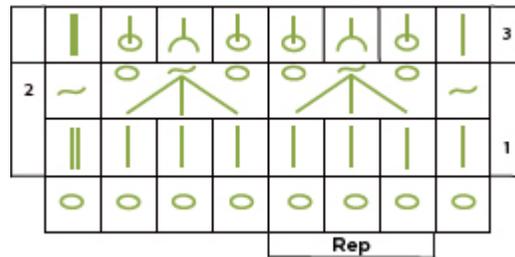
Small shells create a fabric with good drape and a lacy feel. The shells are worked on the return pass. When counting stitches off the hook when creating shells, the loop on the hook counts as 1.



**Multiple** 3 sts + 2.

**Step 1** 1 Tss in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch to end.

**Step 2** Yo and pull through 1 loop on hook, \*ch 1, yo and pull through 4 loops (shell made), ch 1; rep from \* until 2 loops left on hook, yo and pull through 2 loops.



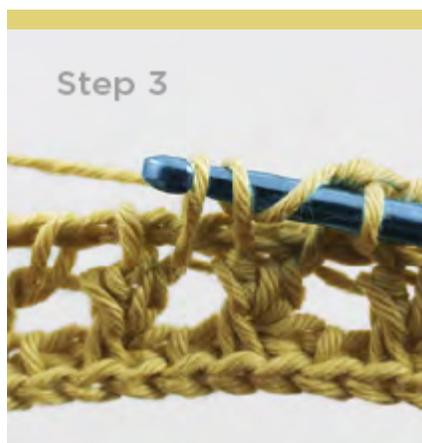
**Step 3** Skip 1st vertical bar, 1 Tss in each ch and top of shell to end, work end st.

**Step 4** Rep steps 2–3, ending with step 2.

## 20 Simple Fan



This simple stitch creates a lacy and open fabric with plenty of drape. The pattern is created by working two Tunisian double crochets into two Tunisian simple stitches at the same time.



**Multiple** 2 sts + 3.

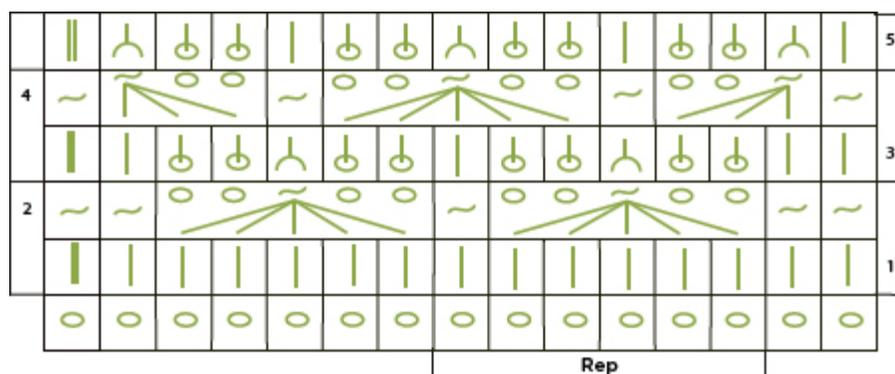

## 21 Lace Shell I



An elegant stitch with lots of drape, this pattern looks lovely in lacy yarns. The shells are placed in between lower shells on every return pass. When counting stitches off the hook when creating shells, the loop on the hook counts as 1.

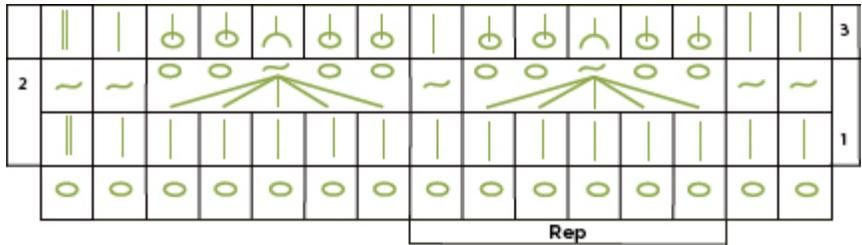




**Multiple** 6 sts + 3.

**Step 1** 1 Tss in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch to end.

**Step 2** Yo and pull through 1 loop on hook, \*yo and pull through 2 loops, ch 2, yo and pull through 6 loops (shell made), ch 2; rep from \* until 3 loops left on hook, [yo and pull through 2 loops] twice.



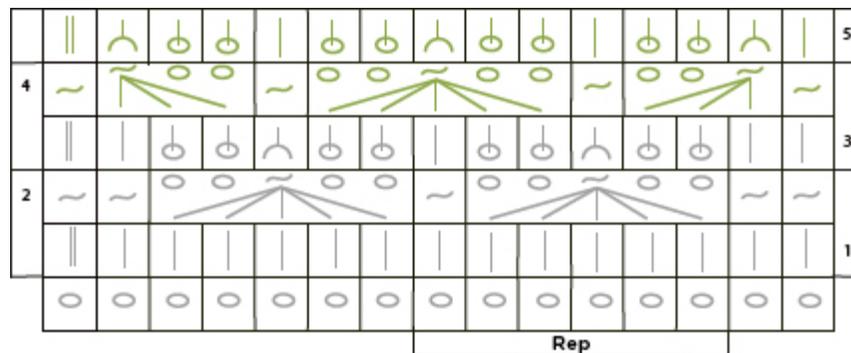

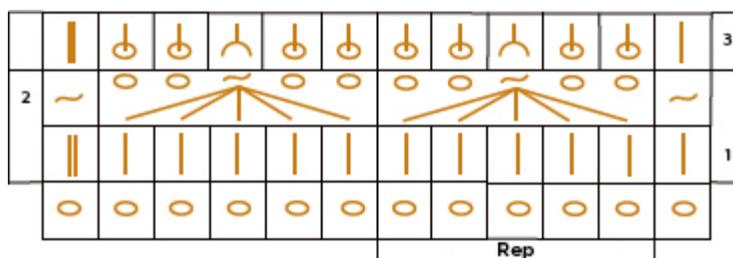

## 22 Lace Shell II



Producing an airy fabric with very good drape, this stitch is perfect for summer accessories. The shells are worked on the return pass. When counting stitches off the hook when creating shells, the loop on the hook counts as 1.

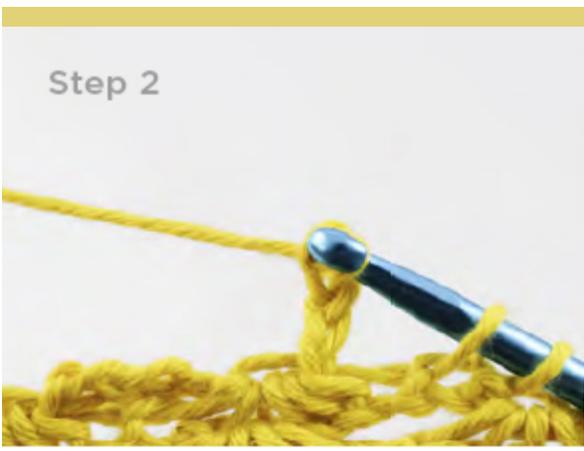
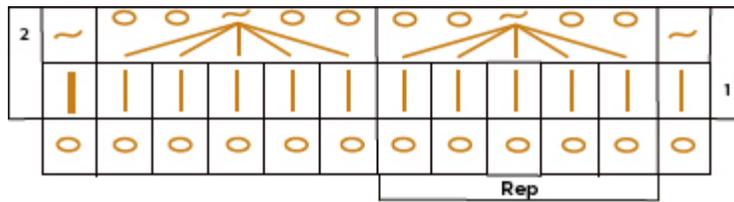

## 23 Scallop Lace



This pretty stitch looks wonderful worked in two colors or just one. The fabric has good drape and a light feel, perfect for lacy garments and accessories. When counting stitches off the hook when creating shells, the loop on the hook counts as 1. Change color on the return pass when two loops are left on the hook; finish off the pass with the new color.



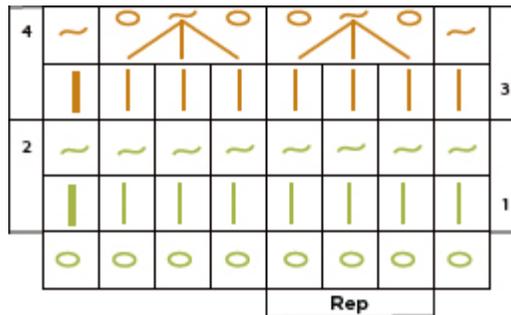


**Multiple** 3 sts + 2.

**Steps 1–2** Using A, work foundation row (see here).

**Step 3** Using B, skip 1st vertical bar, \*1 Tss in each st to end, work end st.

**Step 4** Using B, yo and pull through 1 loop on hook, \*ch 1, yo and pull through 4 loops (shell made), ch 1; rep from \* until 2 loops left on hook, yo and pull through 2 loops.



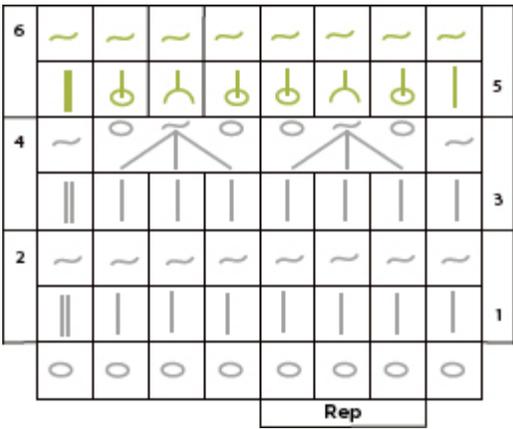

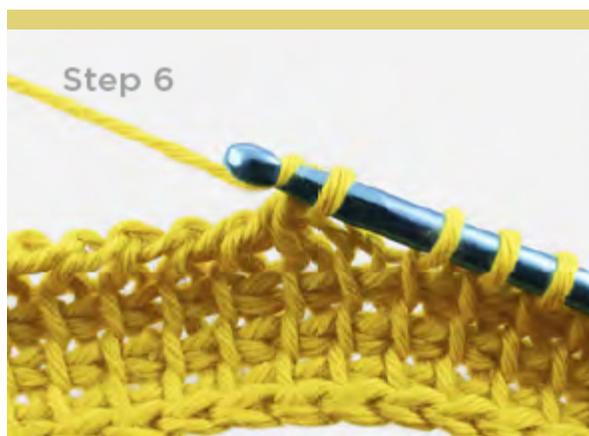

## 24 Fine Weave Stitch

When the next Tss is worked, the contrast yarn will be trapped. Do the same when carrying the contrast yarn between puffs across a row, otherwise the work will pucker. ## 49 Star Stitch



This gorgeous stitch looks best in smooth yarns, and will look wonderful as a panel on a cardigan. Creating the star requires some concentration at first, but the finished effect is very rewarding. The stars are set on a background of Tunisian simple stitch, producing a fabric with fair drape. They are made by working a decrease followed immediately by an increase to return to the original number of stitches. The stars result in the fabric pulling in, causing some tightness.



**Multiple** 9 sts + 4.

**Special stitch** Tss5tog Star (Tunisian simple stitch 5 together star): Insert hook under next 5 front vertical bars at same time, yo and pull through, [yo, insert hook through same 5 bars, yo and pull through] twice (5 new loops on hook).

**Steps 1–2** Work foundation row (see here).

**Step 3** Skip 1st vertical bar, 1 Tss in each st to end, work end st.

**Steps 4, 6, 8, 10, 12** Rep step 2.

**Step 5** Rep step 3.

**Step 7** Skip 1st vertical bar, 1 Tss in next 3 sts, \*Tss5tog Star, 1 Tss in next 4 sts; rep from \* to end, ending last rep with 1 Tss in next 3 sts, work end st.

## 50 Staggered Stars



Stars placed close together on a background of Tunisian purl and simple stitch result in a fabric full of texture and interest. once more in next st 3 rows below; using A, yo and pull through 3 loops on hook; skip Tss directly below center st of Claw and continue as directed.

## 135 Shell Wave



A stunning stitch that is equally beautiful in one or multiple colors, the deep waves are created by working rows of increases and decreases interrupted by rows of Tunisian purl stitch. Treat the yarn overs as a stitch and work into them as for Tps in the usual way on the purl rows.



**Multiple** 18 sts + 3.

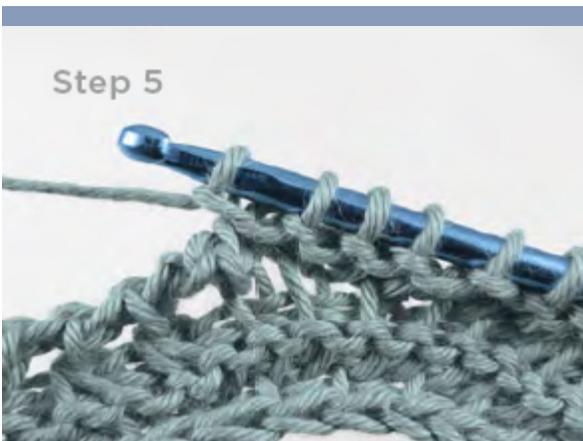
**Special stitch** Tss2tog (Tunisian simple stitch 2 together): Insert hook under next 2 front vertical bars at same time, yo and pull through.

**Steps 1–2** Work foundation row (see here).



**Step 3** Skip 1st vertical bar, \*1 Tss in next st, [Tss2tog] 3 times, [yo, 1 Tss in next st] 5 times, yo, [Tss2tog] 3 times; rep from \* to last st, 1 Tss in next st, work end st.

**Step 4** Rep step 2.

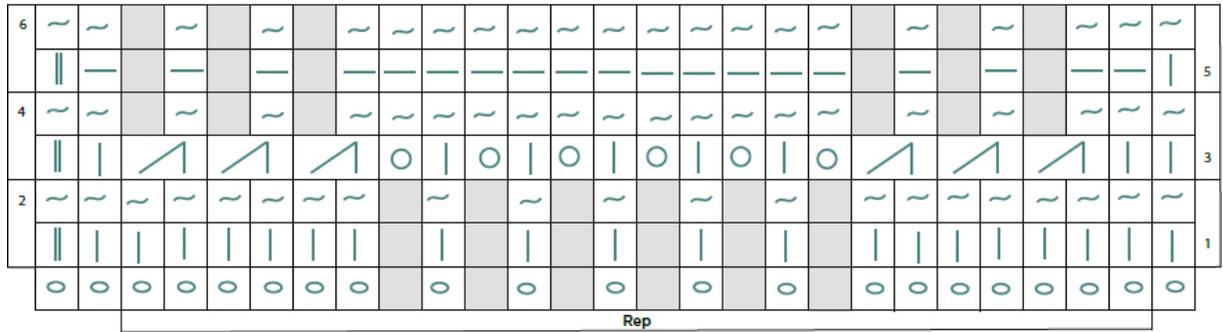

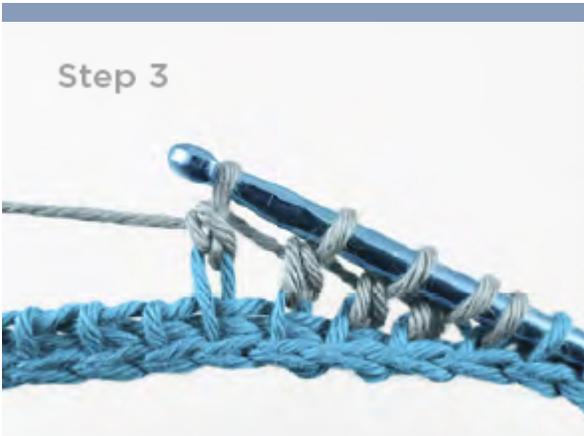


## 136 Honeycomb Wave



This classic wave stitch creates a striking pattern that lends itself perfectly to blankets and homewares. Change color on the return pass when two loops are left on the hook; finish off the pass with the new color. Carry the unused yarn up the side of the work and use it when needed.

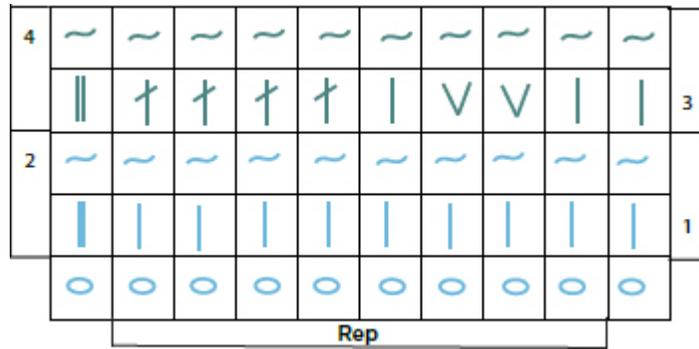

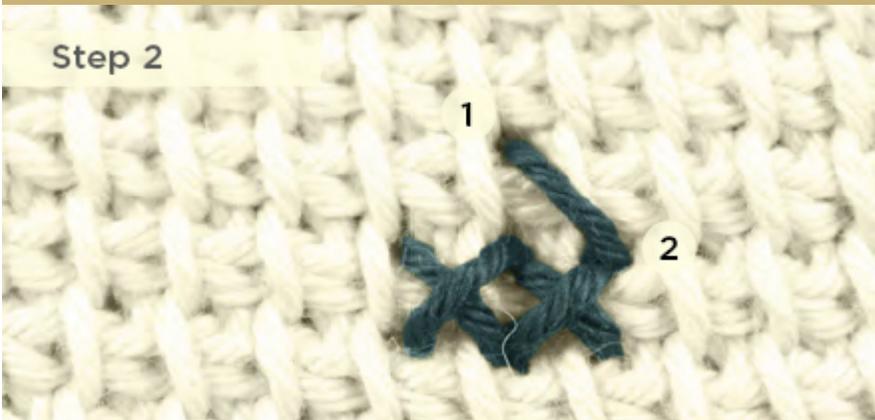

## 137 Cross Stitch

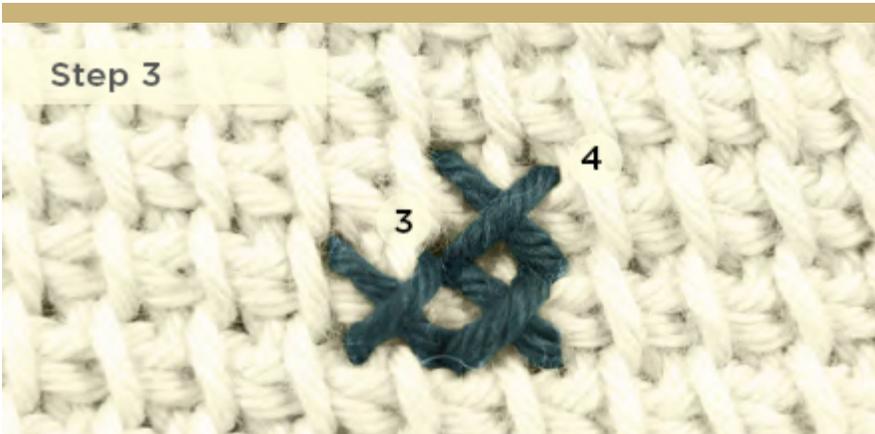


Tunisian simple stitch creates the perfect grid for cross stitch. You can use any cross stitch chart to embroider on your work. Use the same or slightly thicker yarn to cross stitch onto your background. You will need a tapestry needle.



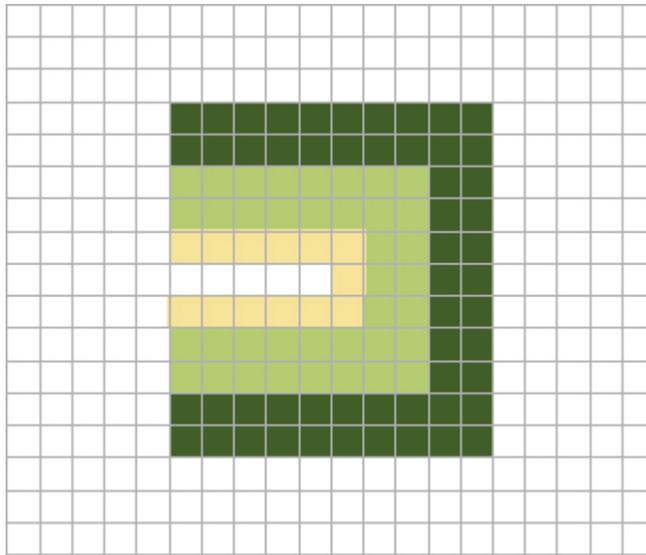
**Step 1** Thread tapestry needle with chosen color and secure the thread with a small stitch at the back of the work, leaving a tail to weave in at the end of the project.

**Step 2** Bring needle through to front of work just above top left corner of horizontal bar of stitch (point 1) and pull yarn through. Take needle over and across to bottom right corner of vertical bar of stitch (point 2) and pull yarn through to back of work.



**Step 3** Bring needle up just below bottom left corner of horizontal bar of stitch (point 3) and pull yarn through to front of work. Take needle over and across to top right corner of vertical bar of stitch (point 4) and pull yarn through to back of work to complete one cross stitch.

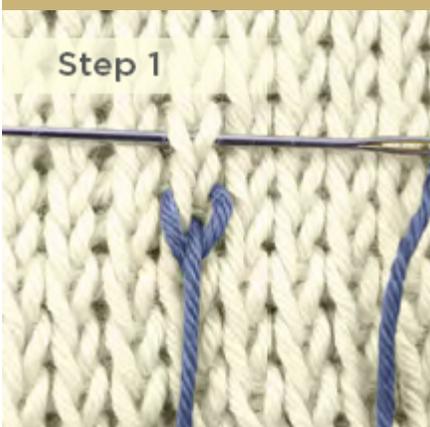
**Step 4** Rep steps 2–3 to work each cross stitch.



## 138 Duplicate Stitch



Also known as Swiss darning, this is a great way to embellish your crochet. It only works on Tunisian knit stitch, which creates the perfect V shape for duplicate stitch. Use the same or slightly thicker yarn than the one used for the base of the project. You will need a tapestry needle.



**Step 1** Thread tapestry needle and insert from back to front of work at base of stitch (point of V). Then insert needle from right to left under two legs of V-shaped stitch above and pull yarn through.



**Step 2** Insert needle back into same place as starting point of duplicate stitch (point of V) and pull yarn through.

**Step 3** Rep steps 1–2 to work each duplicate stitch.

## 139 Surface Slip Stitch



This stitch is perfect for adding interest to plain Tunisian crochet fabric, and works well in straight or curved lines. The stitches are formed by working slip stitches from front to back of the work.



**Step 1** Insert hook in desired stitch from front to back of work, yo and pull through to front. Insert hook in next stitch to back of work,

yo and pull through (2 loops on hook).



**Step 2** Pull 2nd loop through 1st loop on hook.

**Step 3** Rep steps 1–2 to work each surface slip stitch.

## 140 Surface Slip Stitch over Mesh



Working surface slip stitch over Tunisian crochet mesh gives you the opportunity to play with yarns of different textures and weight. This embellishment would look beautiful on a wrap. The Tunisian mesh pattern on here has been used as the base for surface slip stitch here.

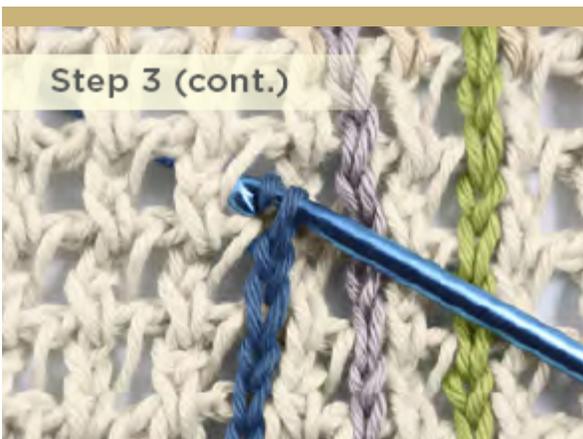


**Step 1** Join yarn to starting row of work with slip stitch, keeping yarn at back of work.

**Step 2** Insert hook from front to back in next st, yo and pull through (2 loops on hook).



**Step 3** Pull 2nd loop through 1st loop on hook. Ch 1, insert hook over next row of mesh to back of work, yo and pull through work and loop on hook.

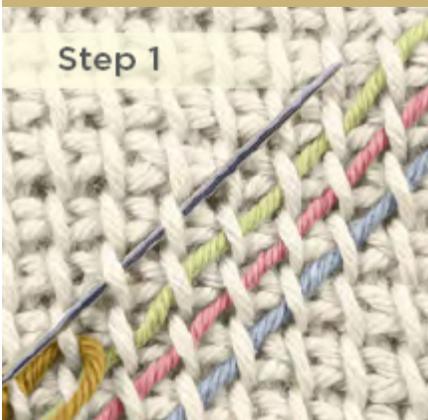


**Step 4** Rep steps 2–3 to work each surface slip stitch.

## 141 Weaving



Weaving is a beautiful way to embellish Tunisian simple stitch. Not only does it create interesting pieces, but it also stiffens and strengthens the fabric. There is no limit with weaving; you can weave in any direction and with any yarn. You will need a tapestry needle.



**Step 1** Thread tapestry needle and pull through to front of work. Insert needle under vertical bars of stitches in whichever direction you choose.



**Step 2** Pull yarn through the stitches. When weaving is complete, secure yarn at back.

**Step 3** Rep steps 1–2 for each section of weaving in same color.

## 142 Beaded Stitch



Beads are a beautiful way to add an extra dimension to your work. Beads look stunning on Tunisian simple stitch or added to Tunisian lace.



**Preparation** Before starting to crochet, thread beads onto yarn. To do this, thread a fine sewing needle (one that will easily pass through the beads) with sewing thread. Knot ends of thread to

form a loop, then pass end of yarn through this loop. Thread a bead onto sewing needle and gently slide it onto the yarn. Continue in this way until required numbers of beads are on the yarn.



**Step 1** Slide a bead up the yarn close to the work, yo, insert hook in next stitch as for Tss, yo and pull through, slide bead to front of work.

**Step 2** Pull loop through yarn over.

**Step 3** Rep steps 1–2 to work each beaded stitch.

## 143 V Stitch Edging

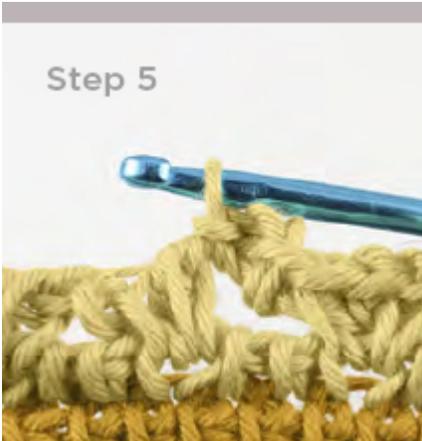


Suitable for many types of projects, this edging works up very quickly. Finish with standard crochet slip stitch, inserting the hook as for Tss.

**Special stitches** Double V st: Inserting hook as for Tks, work [1 Tdc, yo, 1 Tdc] in same st.

Picot: [1 sl st, ch 3, 1 sl st] in next ch-sp.





**Step 5** Skip 1st vertical bar, 1 sl st in next 3 sts, \*Picot, 1 sl st in next 3 sts; rep from \* to end, 1 sl st in end st.

## 144 Wave Edging



This classic wave stitch creates a striking edge that lends itself perfectly to blankets and other homewares. Change color on the return pass when two loops are left on the hook; finish off the pass with the new color. Finish with standard crochet slip stitch, inserting the hook as for Tss.



**Multiple** 8 sts + 2.

**Steps 1–2** Using A, work foundation row (see here).

**Step 3** Using A, skip 1st vertical bar, \*1 Tss in next st, 1 Tslst in next 2 sts, 1 Tss in next st, 1 Tdc in next 4 sts; rep from \* to end, work end st.

**Step 4** Using A, rep step 2.

**Step 5** Using B, skip 1st vertical bar, \*1 Tdc in next 4 sts, 1 Tss in next st, 1 Tslst in next 2 sts, 1 Tss in next st; rep from \* to end, work end st.



**Step 6** Using B, rep step 2.

**Step 7** Using B, skip 1st vertical bar, 1 Tss in each st to end, work end st.

**Step 8** Using B, rep step 2, then work 1 sl st in each st to end.

## 145 Fan Edging



This bold edging works well on delicate projects. It is also useful for household items such as pillows and dishcloths. Finish with standard crochet slip stitch, inserting the hook as for Tss.

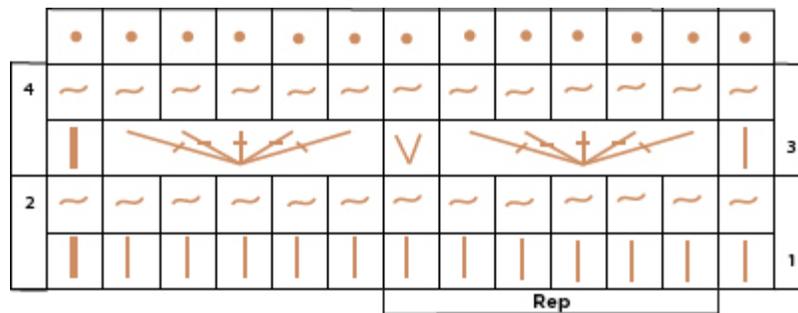


**Multiple** 6 sts + 1.

**Special stitch Fan:** Inserting hook as for Tks, work 5 Tdc in same st.

**Steps 1–2** Work foundation row (see here).

**Step 3** Skip 1st vertical bar, skip next 2 sts, Fan in next st, skip next 2 sts, \*1 Tslst in next st, skip next 2 sts, Fan in next st, skip next 2 sts; rep from \* to end, work end st.



**Step 4** Rep step 2, then work 1 sl st in each st to end.

## 146 Picot Edging



Cute and playful, this sweet edging is created by picots worked along the edge with slip stitches. The edging will add charm to any project. Finish with standard crochet slip stitch, inserting the hook as for Tss.



**Multiple** 3 sts + 2.

**Special stitch Picot:** Ch 3, 1 sl st in next st.

**Steps 1–2** Work foundation row (see here).



**Step 3** Skip 1st vertical bar, \*1 sl st in next st, Picot; rep from \* to end, 1 sl st in end st.

## 147 Striped Edging



This edging is simple but the change of colors gives it an interesting look. The edging curls and requires steaming when finished. Change color by working the first chain of the return pass with the new color. Finish with standard crochet slip stitch, inserting the hook as for Tss.

**Steps 1–2** Using A for step 1 and B for step 2, work foundation row (see here).

**Step 3** Using B, skip 1st vertical bar, 1 Tss in each st to end, work end st.

**Step 4** Using C, rep step 2.

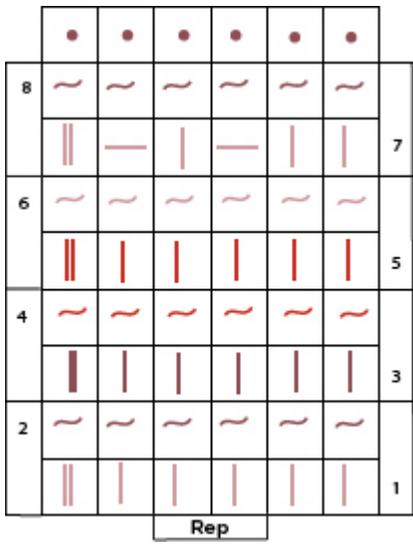

## 148 Puff Edging



This playful edging is perfect for heavier weight projects such as blankets, and would look just as charming in one color. It needs to be steam blocked. Refer to the stitch introduction on here for guidance on changing colors to work the puffs. Finish with standard crochet slip stitch, inserting the hook as for Tss.



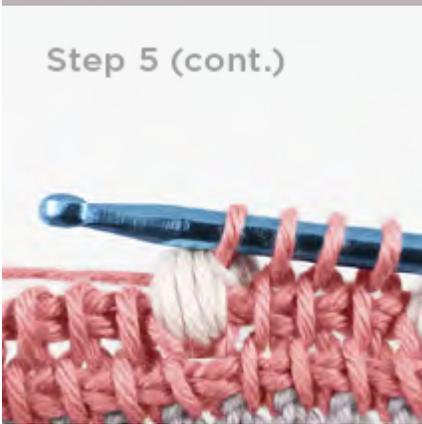

**Special stitch** Puff— hdc5tog (half double crochet 5 together):

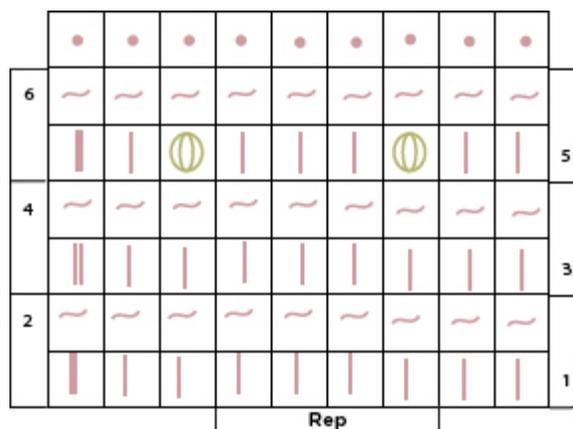

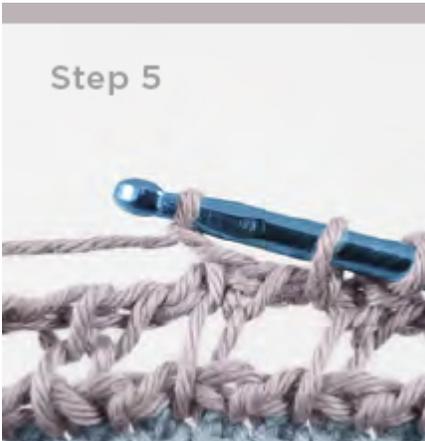

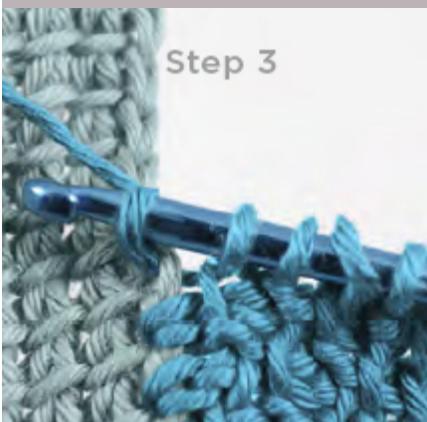

## 150 Seed Edging



This great edging is worked sideways and joined to the edge of the project as you go. Seed stitch prevents the edge from curling and gives the project some texture. The edging works on any of number of stitches. Finish with standard crochet slip stitch, inserting the hook as for Tss.



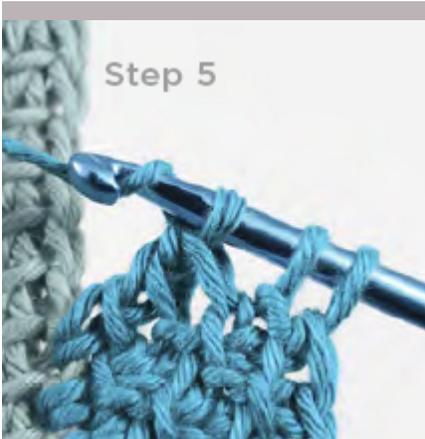
**Multiple 2 sts + 1.**

**Steps 1–2** Join yarn to 1st st on edge of project with sl st, ch 5 (or required multiple), then work foundation row (see here).

**Step 3** Skip 1st vertical bar, \*1 Tps in next st, 1 Tss in next st; rep from \* to end, 1 sl st in next st on edge of project.

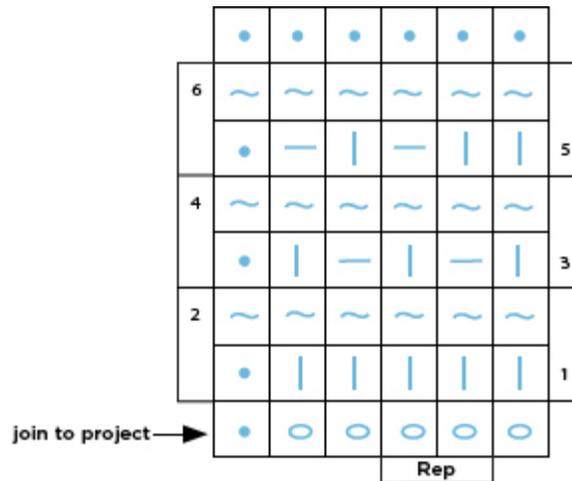

## 2 Tunisian Crochet Skills

From learning about Tunisian hooks to stitch variations and finishing techniques, this chapter walks you through the essentials of Tunisian crocheting. Basic stitches and useful techniques are covered with step-by-step instructions and illustrated with clear line drawings, so you can develop your skills and become a confident Tunisian crocheter.



# Yarn

With such an amazing variety of yarns on the market, we are truly spoiled for choice. They come in a kaleidoscope of colors and a wide range of weights, and they are all suitable for Tunisian crochet.



## **YARN WEIGHT**

Yarn weight refers to the thickness of the yarn; the ball band provides this information. It also gives you a recommendation of the size of knitting needles or crochet hook to use with the specific yarn. Tunisian crochet produces denser fabric because of the structure of the stitches, so it is recommended to always go 1 or 2 sizes up in hook size.

**Lace/superfine:** Very fine yarns used mostly for delicate openwork.

**Sport:** Fine yarns used for most types of work, producing a lightweight fabric. This weight in wool with nylon is perfect for making socks.

**Light worsted/DK (double knitting):** The most commonly used weight of yarn producing medium-weight garments, light worsted and DK are suitable for most types of Tunisian crochet, from plain to lace or textured.

**Worsted/aran:** Both slightly thicker than light worsted, worsted is lighter than aran, but both weights can be used for a large number of projects.

**Bulky:** Works up fast and is used for a range of projects, including hats, scarves, and garments. It produces a heavy-weight fabric with great stitch definition.

**Super bulky:** Perfect for supersized cuddly designs, it works up superfast and is perfect for hats, scarves, and cozy garments.

**YARN FIBER**

Yarns are made of many natural fibers such as alpaca and wool, or manmade fibers such as acrylic and nylon, all of which come in a range of thicknesses.

**1. Wool**

This very warm fiber is the most popular for crochet and knitting. It comes from the fleece of sheep, and different breeds have different names of wool. Merino wool is one of those types that comes from merino sheep, as is Shetland and Botany. Wool yarns are easy to crochet with and have wonderful bounce.

**2. Cotton**

This fiber comes in different grades of softness, with Egyptian cotton being the softest. Cotton is a very kind fiber on the skin and suits a lot

of people with skin allergies. Cotton shows off stitch definition beautifully, but it can be heavy and less elastic than wool. However, it does have superb drape.

### **3. Mixed yarns**

There is a vast array of mixed yarns on the market. They are made by plying different fibers together to produce different textures and weights. They can be natural fibers mixed with synthetic, such as wool and nylon, producing great sock yarn, or all natural, such as mohair and silk or wool and cotton.

### **4. Novelty yarns**

These yarns are mostly spun from manmade fibers and are made of several plies twisted together. They are perfect for a variety of plain projects that will showcase the yarn.

### **5. Manmade fibers**

Synthetic fibers are made from crudes and intermediates, including petroleum, coal, limestone, and water. The most common fiber is acrylic, which mimics natural fibers such as wool. Because they are manmade or semi-manmade, they are cheaper and longer, making them more budget-friendly.

### **6. Bamboo and soya yarns**

These are environmentally friendly yarns. Bamboo is made from the center of the bamboo stalk; it is a soft yarn with very good drape. Soya yarns are made from soya plant; they are incredibly soft and can often mimic silk yarns.



# Equipment

Very little equipment is necessary for Tunisian crochet. All you really need is a hook to get started, although items such as pins and sharp scissors are useful accessories.

## **HOOKS**

Tunisian crochet hooks, also known as Afghan hooks, are similar to standard crochet hooks but with one difference: they are a lot longer as you need to gather all the stitches on the hook on forward passes. Hooks come in many different types and sizes. They are usually made from steel aluminum (suitable for most fibers), plastic, wood, or bamboo (lightweight and easy on the hands). Some crocheters choose a hook depending on which fiber they want to work with, so that it is easy on the hands. My personal preference is a wooden hook.

### **1. Rigid hook**

This is a long hook up to 14in (35cm) in length and comes with a stopper at the end. These are the most commonly available Tunisian crochet hooks. They are not suitable for large projects as the stitches gathering on the hook can make them very heavy to hold.

### **2. Flexible hook**

These have a flexible cable attached to a crochet hook. The hook is usually the length of a standard crochet hook, and the cables come in different lengths. Some have the cable permanently fixed to the hook, while others are interchangeable, so that the cable length can be adjusted to suit the project or attached to different-sized hooks.

Interchangeable hooks are becoming a lot more popular among Tunisian crocheters as they are very flexible. The hook comes with a fastening device at the end for attaching the cable. This can be a screw-in or a clip-in, depending on the manufacturer.

**3. Double-ended hook** These are often used for working in the round, and come in lengths up to 14in (35cm). Do not confuse these with standard double-ended crochet hooks, which usually have different sizes on each end and are not designed for Tunisian crochet.

**4. Standard crochet hook** If you are making a small project, a standard smooth hook will do just fine. Make sure it does not have a handle (such as a comfort grip), and put a stopper at the end to stop the stitches from slipping off. A knitting needle point protector works great as a stopper.



## ACCESSORIES

### 5. Pins

Choose rust-resistant pins with large heads for pinning out your work when blocking.

### 6. Scissors

Sharp scissors are a must for any crocheter. Small, sharp embroidery scissors are best for snipping yarn.

### **7. Stitch markers**

These can be slipped onto a particular stitch or row and aid in counting. When working in the round, they can be placed to denote the beginning and end of the round.

### **8. Tape measure**

This is essential for checking gauge and the length or width of a project. Retractable tape measures are most useful as they fit neatly into your project bag.

### **9. Cable needle**

Needles for working cable patterns come in different styles and sizes. Cranked cable needles are very useful as the slipped stitches sit neatly in the crank of the needle and do not move. Straight cable needles are a good choice as well, but the stitches can slip off them when working on the cable twist.

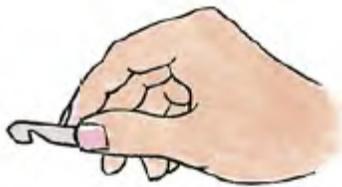
### **10. Tapestry needle**

Blunt-ended needles are essential for weaving in ends and sewing up projects. Make sure the eye is large enough to thread the yarn through.

# Getting Started

## HOLDING THE HOOK

Most people find it more comfortable to hold a Tunisian crochet hook like a knife. This way you will have the most control over the hook, allowing for better grip and more room for the gathering stitches. Also, it will give you better movement on return passes. Grasp the hook between the thumb and index finger of the right hand, as if holding a knife, with the hook facing downward.



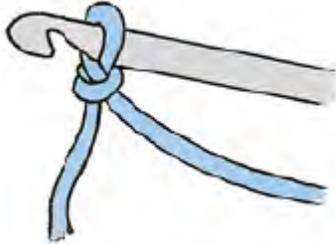
## MAKING A SLIP KNOT

To begin any crochet, you need to make a slip knot on the hook. The slip knot needs to be movable, so don't pull it too tight. Leave a tail long enough for weaving in; 6in (15cm) should suffice.



## Step 1

Lay the tail end of the yarn over the ball end, creating a loop. Insert the hook through the loop, grab the working yarn with it, and pull it through to make a loop on the hook.

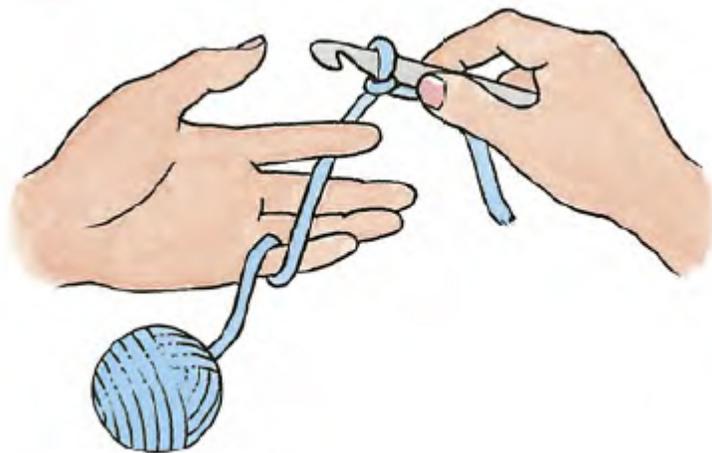


## Step 2

Tighten the loop by tugging on the ball end and tail end at the same time. So that the slip knot fits snugly on the hook, pull on the tail end gently. Make sure you don't pull too tight; the loop on the hook needs to move freely.

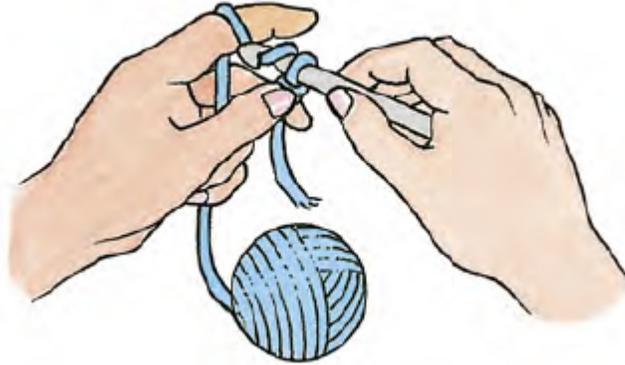
## HOLDING THE YARN

The left hand (if you are right-handed) controls the yarn. It is important to maintain an even tension on the yarn.



## Step 1

Wind the yarn around your pinky finger and place the working yarn over your index finger. Alternatively, hold the tension by locking the yarn between your pinky and ring finger, and place the working yarn over the index finger.



## Step 2

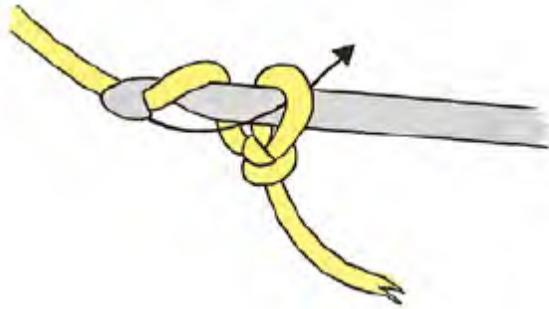
To make a stitch, use the hand holding the hook to maneuver it to wrap the yarn over the hook. Then with thumb and middle finger of your left hand, hold onto the tail to keep the work still and open as you pull the yarn through the loop on the hook.

### LEFT-HANDED

If you are left-handed, hold the hook in your left hand and the yarn in your right hand, mirroring the instructions above.

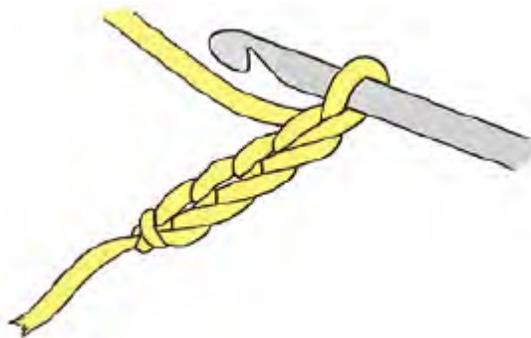
### FOUNDATION CHAIN

Tunisian crochet always begins with a foundation chain. This is a row of crochet chains that the Tunisian stitches will be worked into. Chains that form part of a stitch pattern are worked in the same way.



### Step 1

Making sure that the tip of the hook faces downward (this helps the hook to slide through the loop easily), wrap the yarn over the hook in a counterclockwise direction. Pull the wrapped loop through the slip knot loop on the hook to make one chain.



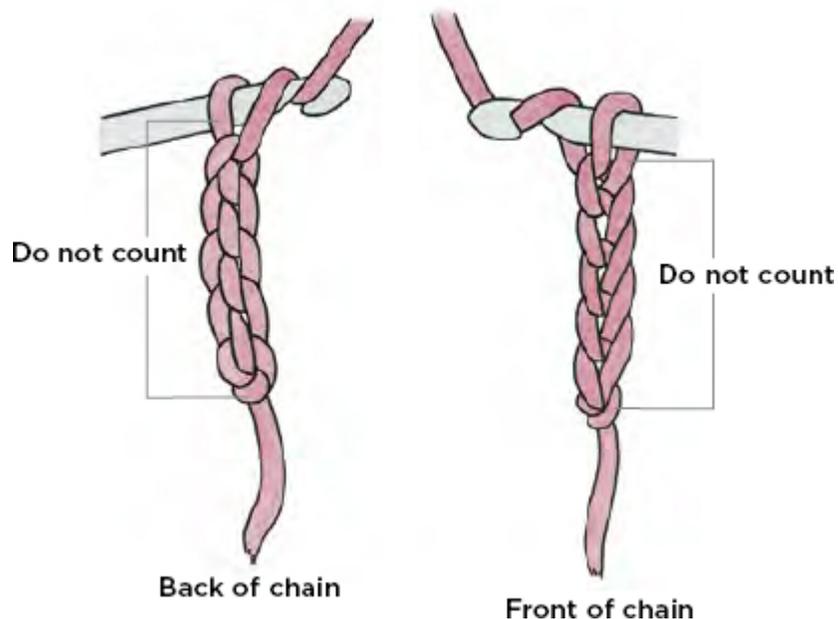
### Step 2

Continue until you have made the desired number of chains.

## UNDERSTANDING MULTIPLES

When making the foundation chain, it is important that you make the correct number of chain stitches for the pattern you are going to work. This number is given as a multiple before the instructions for each stitch. The multiple consists of the number of stitches required for each pattern repeat, plus any extra stitches needed to balance the pattern. For example, 'Multiple 4 sts + 3' means any number that divides by 4, with 3 more added, such as  $8 + 3$  (a total of 11) or  $44 + 3$  (a total of 47).

The front of the foundation chain looks like a series of Vs or little hearts, while the back of the chain forms a distinctive bump of yarn behind each V. Count each V-shaped loop on the front of the chain as one chain stitch, but do not count the slip knot or the loop that is on the hook. You can also turn the chain over and count the stitches on the back if you find that easier.



## THE IMPORTANCE OF GAUGE

Gauge is the number of stitches (or pattern repeats) and rows (or rounds) to a given measurement, usually 1, 2, or 4in (2.5, 5, or 10cm). For your work to be the correct size, the gauge specified in the pattern must be matched as closely as possible.

Gauge not only depends on hook and yarn, but also on personal technique. Just because a pattern recommends a certain hook size does not necessarily mean that your gauge will be the same, which is why it is vital to always make a swatch and measure the gauge before you start your project, especially if it is a garment.

### Measuring gauge

Work a piece of Tunisian crochet larger than 4 x 4in (10 x 10cm), usually around 6 x 6in (15 x 15cm). This will give you enough space to correctly count the stitches and rows.

Lay the swatch on a flat surface, using a tape measure and pins to mark out the desired size over which the gauge needs to be measured. Count exactly how many stitches and rows are within this square.

If you have more stitches or rows, this means you are a tight crocheter, so increase your hook size. If you have fewer stitches or rows, this means you are a loose crocheter, so go down a hook size.

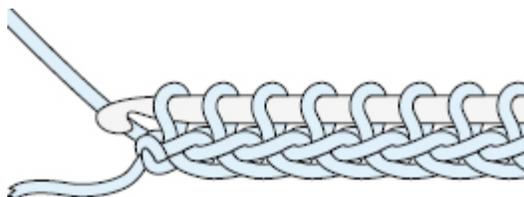
## FOUNDATION ROW

After making a foundation chain of the required length, you will work a foundation row consisting of a forward and return pass. All foundation rows are worked the same as Tunisian simple stitch unless instructed otherwise. You can work the forward pass into either the front or back of the chain; the back has been used in this book.

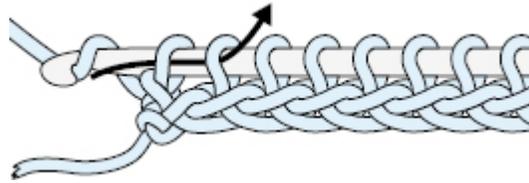


### Forward pass

Starting in the second chain from the hook, roll the chain toward you and insert the hook into the back bump. Yarn over and pull through (2 loops on hook).



Continue inserting the hook into each chain and pulling up a loop until you reach the end of the foundation chain.



### **Return pass**

Do not turn the work. Yarn over and pull through one loop on hook (this forms a locking chain). Then \*yo and pull through 2 loops on hook.



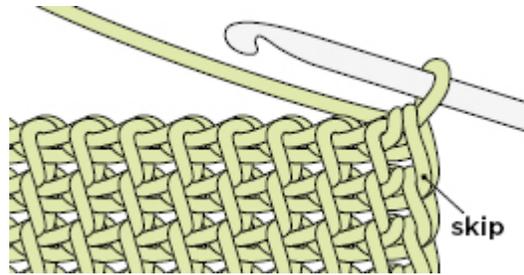
Repeat from \* until one loop is left on the hook. Use this method for all return passes on all rows unless the pattern specifies otherwise.

## **FORWARD AND RETURN PASSES**

Each row of Tunisian crochet is made up of a forward pass and then a return pass. Note that you do not turn the work in Tunisian crochet; both forward and return passes are worked with the right side of the work facing you.

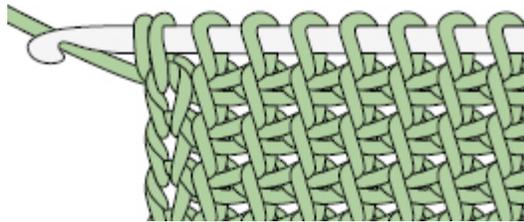
On the forward pass, worked from right to left, all the loops that are made are kept on the hook. These loops form the vertical bars of the stitch (see below). On the return pass, worked from left to right, the loops are worked off the hook in turn, leaving a single loop on the hook at the end of the pass. The return pass creates the chains that form the horizontal bars of the stitches.

## **FIRST AND LAST STITCHES**



### **Skip first stitch**

The loop left on the hook at the end of each return pass counts as the first stitch of the next forward pass, which means you should skip the first vertical bar on each subsequent forward pass. The patterns indicate this with the instruction “skip first vertical bar.”

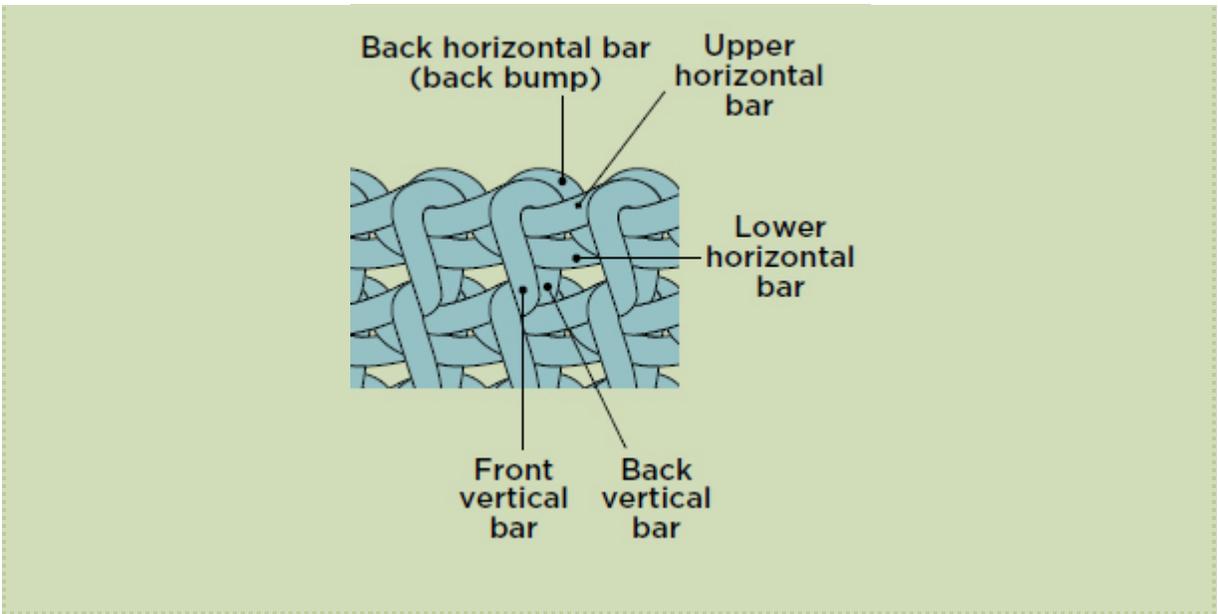


### **Work end stitch**

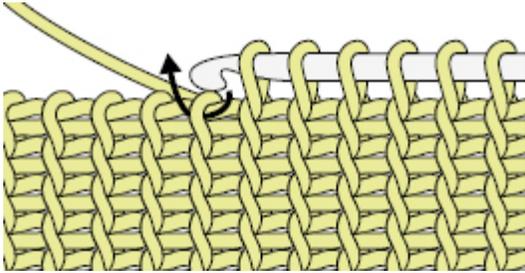
The end stitch on the forward pass is always worked by inserting the hook under the front vertical bar at the edge of the fabric and the back vertical bar that lies directly behind it (2 bars on hook). Work a Tunisian simple stitch in the end stitch (yarn over and pull through) unless the pattern instructs otherwise.

## **ANATOMY OF A TUNISIAN STITCH**

The key to Tunisian stitches lies in where you insert the hook, so it is important to be able to identify the different bars of the stitch.



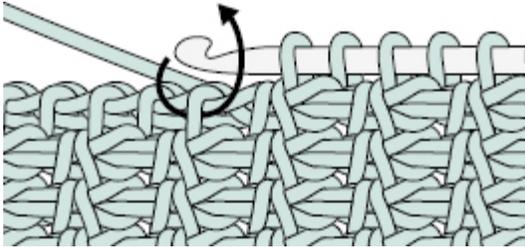
**BASIC STITCHES AND VARIATIONS**



**Tunisian simple stitch**

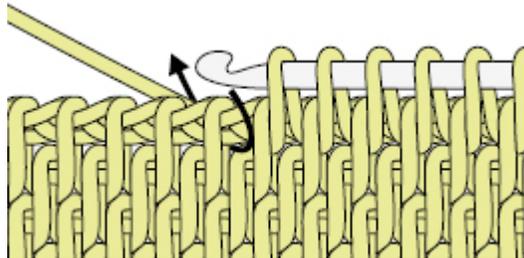
Insert hook from right to left under front vertical bar of stitch, yo and pull through.

**Return pass (for all basic sts)** Yo and pull through 1 loop on hook, \*yo and pull through 2 loops; rep from \* until 1 loop left on hook.



### **Twisted simple stitch**

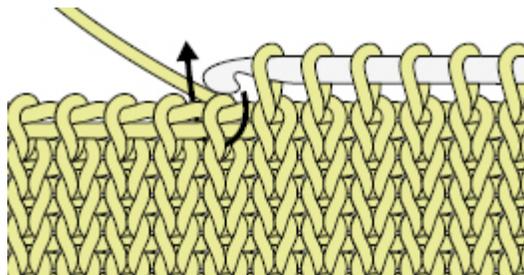
Using tip of hook, grasp next vertical bar, twist hook up to right, yo and pull through. This example shows twisted simple stitches alternated with regular simple stitches.



### **Tunisian full stitch**

Insert hook from front to back through center of stitch between front and back vertical bars, yo and pull through.

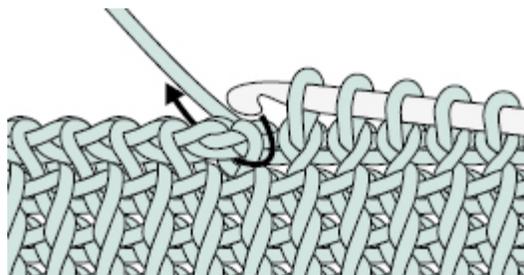
To work a different stitch “as for Tfs,” insert the hook as above.



### **Tunisian knit stitch**

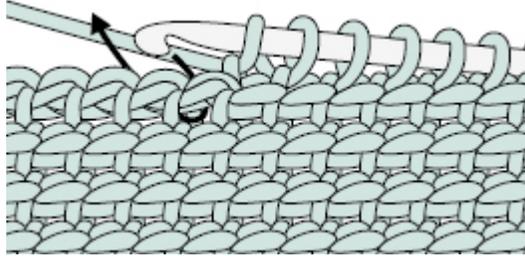
Insert hook from front to back in space between stitches (or in chain space or other indicated space), yo and pull through.

To work a different stitch “as for Tks,” insert the hook as above.



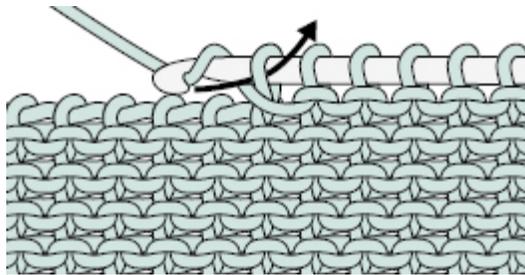
### **Twisted knit stitch**

Using tip of hook, pull front vertical bar to right until you see back vertical bar, insert hook from front to back through center of stitch between vertical bars, yo and pull through.



### **Tunisian reverse stitch**

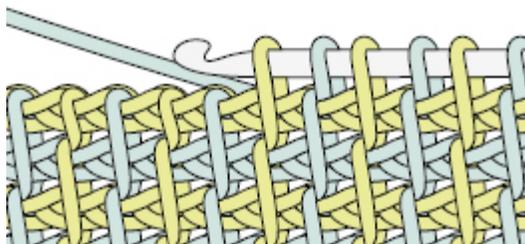
With yarn and hook at back, insert hook from right to left under back vertical bar of stitch, yo and pull through.



### **Tunisian purl stitch**

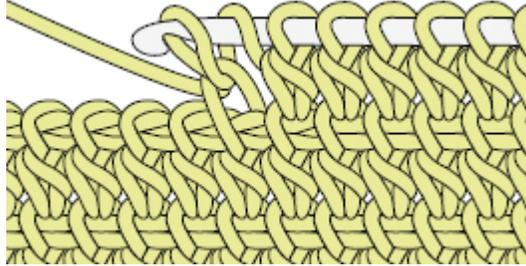
Bring yarn to front, insert hook from right to left under front vertical bar of stitch, take yarn across front of stitch to back of work, yo and pull through.

To work a different stitch “as for Tps,” move the yarn and insert the hook as above.



### **Tunisian slip stitch**

Insert hook from right to left under front vertical bar of stitch and leave bar on hook without working it. This example shows slip stitches alternated with simple stitches.

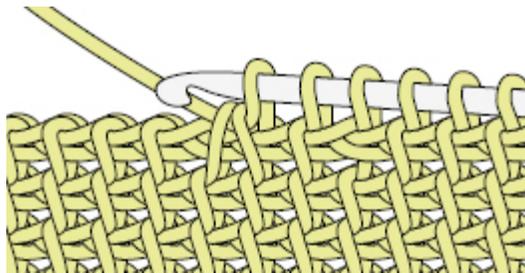


### **Tunisian double crochet**

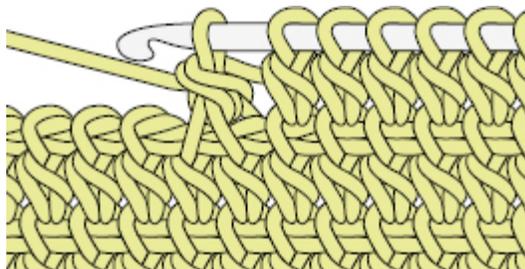
Yo and insert hook as for simple stitch (unless specified otherwise). Yo and pull through, yo and pull through 2 loops on hook only. Ch 1 at beginning of row to give the correct height for the stitch and work a double into the end stitch. Other standard crochet stitches can be worked using the same principle.

# Special Stitches and Techniques

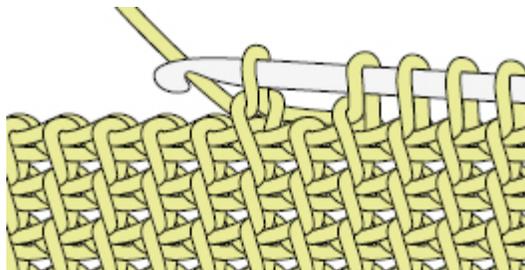
## DECREASES



**Work stitches together (Tss2tog)** The best method is to work two (or more) stitches together. In Tunisian simple stitch: insert hook under 2 (or more) vertical bars at same time, yo and pull through.



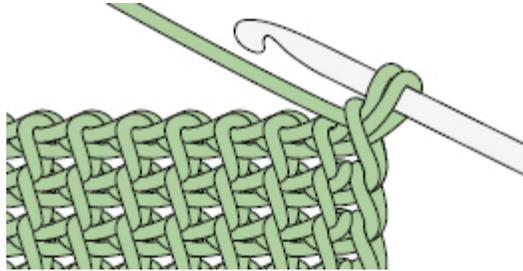
**Work stitches together (Tdc2tog)** To work two (or more) Tunisian doubles together: yo, insert hook under 2 front vertical bars at same time, yo and pull through, yo and pull through 2 loops.



## Skip a stitch

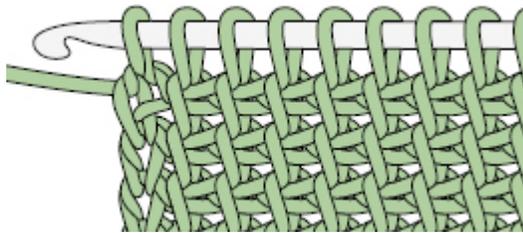
This is a simple way to decrease, but note that it creates a visible space.

## INCREASES



## At right edge

Work one stitch into the first vertical bar (the one that is usually skipped).



## At left edge

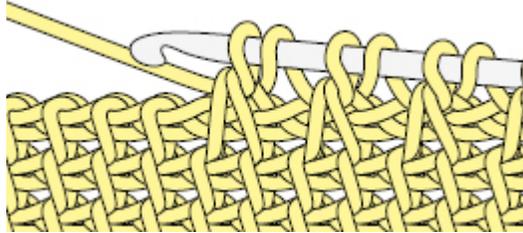
Make one extra stitch by inserting the hook under the last upper and back horizontal bars before the end stitch, yo and pull through.



## Anywhere in a row

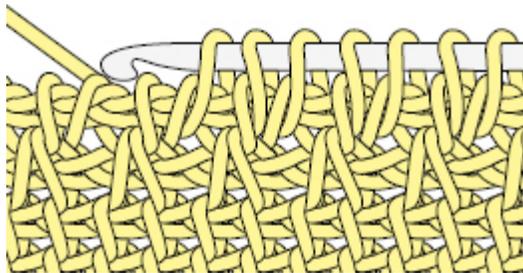
This increase is worked as for Tunisian full stitch: insert hook in space between stitches, yo and pull through.

## LACEWORK AND YARN OVERS



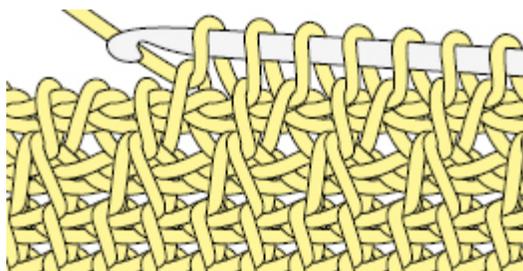
### Step 1

Wrap the yarn over the hook and work the next stitch. The yarn over creates an eyelet and counts as a stitch. Here, it is followed by a decrease (Tss2tog) to keep the stitch count correct.



### Step 2

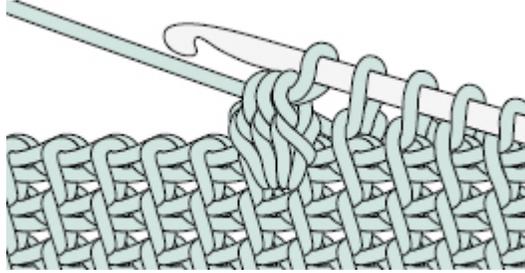
On the next forward pass, fill the yarn over space by inserting the hook into the space and work as for Tunisian full stitch.



### Step 3

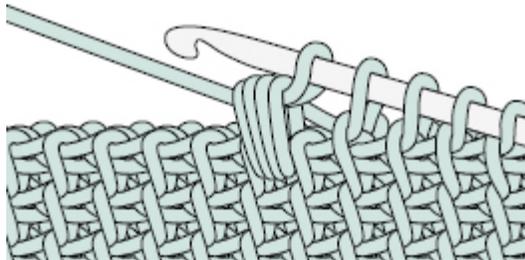
Alternatively, insert the hook under the front leg of the yarn over and work as for Tunisian simple stitch.

## CLUSTERS



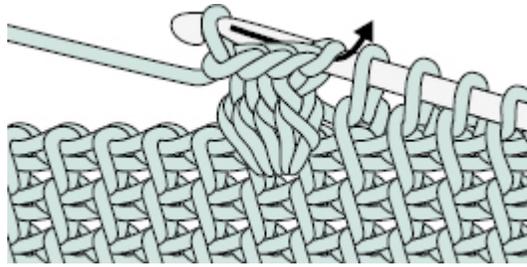
### **Bobble**

This is a type of cluster formed by working several Tunisian double crochet (or longer) stitches together in one stitch. Make sure you pop the finished cluster to the front of the work. To make a 3 Tdc bobble: [yo, insert hook as instructed, yo and pull through, yo and pull through 2 loops] 3 times, yo and pull through all 3 loops on hook.



### **Puff**

A puff is normally a group of three or more half double crochets worked in one stitch, which are then joined together at the top. To make a puff: \*yo, insert hook as instructed, yo and pull through; rep from \* as many times as required, then yo and pull through all created loops. Often ch 1 is worked to lock the puff.

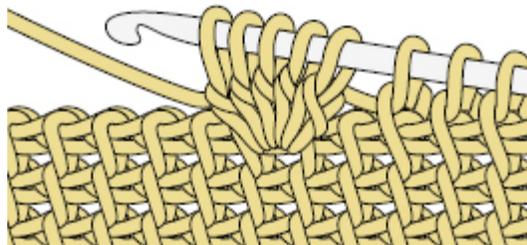


## Popcorn

A popcorn is a group of doubles worked in one stitch, then the top of the first stitch is joined to the last to make the popcorn. To make a 4 Tdc popcorn: [yo, insert hook as instructed, yo and pull through, yo and pull through 2 loops, [yo, insert hook in same st, yo and pull through, (yo and pull through 2 loops) twice] 3 times. Slip last loop off hook, insert hook in top of first stitch made, catch empty loop and pull through, ch 1 to lock the popcorn.

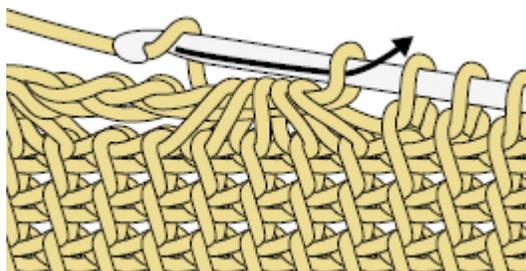
## FANS AND SHELLS

These decorative stitches are made in the same way as increases and decreases, but they are offset with added chains or skipped stitches to always keep the correct number of stitches.



## Fans

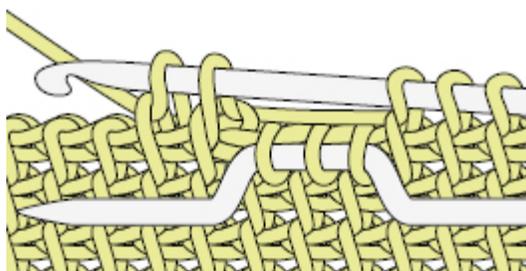
These are created on forward passes, and are usually Tunisian double crochet (or longer) stitches. To make a 5 Tdc fan: skip 2 sts, [yo, insert hook as instructed, yo and pull through, yo and pull through 2 loops] 5 times, skip next 2 sts.



## Shells

Shells are mostly created on return passes. Make enough chains before and after the shell to keep the correct number of stitches. To make a 5 stitch shell on the return pass: \*ch 2, yo and pull through 6 loops, ch 2. Note that the working loop (the loop at the end of the hook) counts as 1, plus the 5 stitches that will form the shell. On the next forward pass, work into the horizontal loop at the top of the shell.

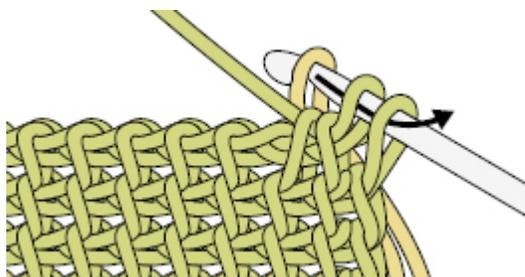
## CABLES



Cables are created by slipping a number of stitches onto a cable needle and placing them at the front or back of the work; work the next stitches on the main fabric, then work the stitches from the cable needle, creating twists.

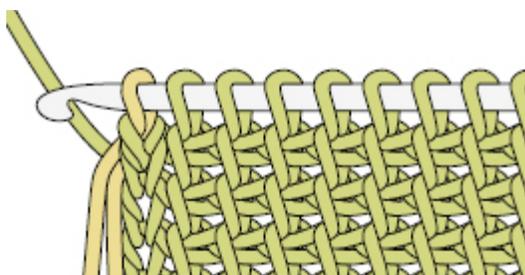
Cables might look complicated, but once you get started you will realize it is a simple technique to master. In this book most of the cables are worked in Tunisian simple stitch on a background of Tunisian purl stitch, which makes the cables more prominent.

## JOINING YARN AND CHANGING COLORS



### **At end of return pass**

When you have two loops left on the hook, wrap the new yarn over the hook and finish off the return pass with the new yarn.



### **At end of forward pass**

Finish off the forward pass with the old yarn and then work the first “yo and pull through” of the return pass with the new yarn.

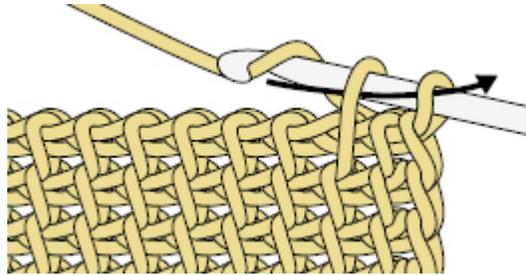
## **CARRYING YARNS**

When working in short stripes, do not cut the yarn at the end of every stripe. Instead, carry it up the side of the work and use it when necessary. This is faster and leaves fewer ends to weave in. The yarn you are carrying has to be on the same side on every change.

## **BINDING OFF**

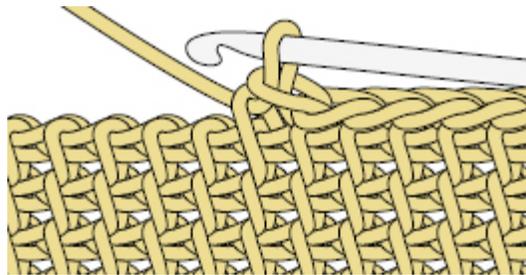
This gives the work a neat edge, although it is not always necessary. Some shawl patterns end the project after the final return pass to give a stretchier edge. To bind off, you will work a standard crochet

slip stitch. This example is shown on Tunisian simple stitch, but you should cast off by inserting the hook as per the stitch type.



### **Step 1**

Skip first vertical bar, then insert hook in next vertical bar, yo and pull through stitch and loop on hook.

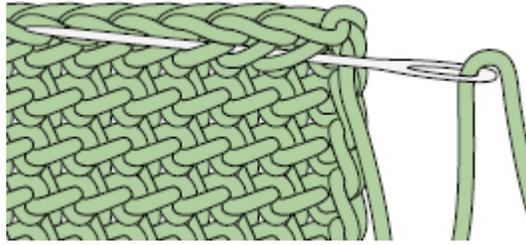


### **Step 2**

Repeat until all stitches have been worked. You will finish with one loop on the hook, ready to fasten off.

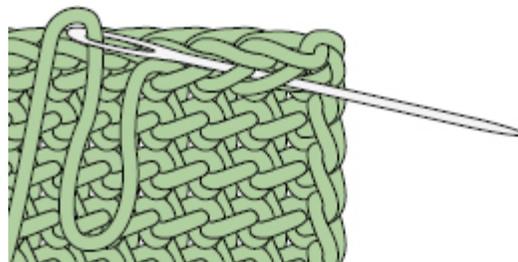
## **FASTENING OFF AND WEAVING IN**

To fasten off the yarn securely, work one chain, then cut the yarn leaving a tail approximately 6in (15cm) long for weaving in. Pull the tail through the loop and tighten. Weave in tails on the wrong side of the work.



### **Step 1**

Thread the tail through a tapestry needle and take the needle through several stitches (three should suffice).



### **Step 2**

Then work back on yourself, omitting the last stitch and making sure the yarn is trapped between stitches.

## **BLOCKING**

The term blocking describes a process of wetting, laying, and drying the project. It is a vital step in Tunisian crochet to open up the pattern and showcase it to its full potential. It also helps the pieces to keep their shape.

### **Steam blocking**

Pin the piece to the desired size on a towel or ironing board and steam it with an iron, being very careful not to touch the fabric. Hover the iron slowly over the item, making sure the steam penetrates the fibers. Allow to dry naturally. Be careful when steam blocking acrylic items, as too much heat from the iron can permanently damage the fibers in the yarn. Steam block cables with the wrong side facing upward or you will flatten the cables.

## **Wet blocking**

This method is perfect for shawls, as it opens up the lace sections beautifully. Soak the item in lukewarm water with a drop of wool wash, squeeze out the water (do not wring the item), and place the project on a dry towel. Roll it in the towel and pat the excess moisture out. Pin the item on a towel or blocking mat to the size required. Allow to dry naturally.

## **Spray blocking**

This is the mildest form of wet blocking and works for all fibers. Right side up, pin the crochet to shape on a padded surface. Fill a spray bottle with cool tap water and spritz a fine, even mist over the piece. Use your hands to gently pat the moisture into the project. Allow to dry naturally.

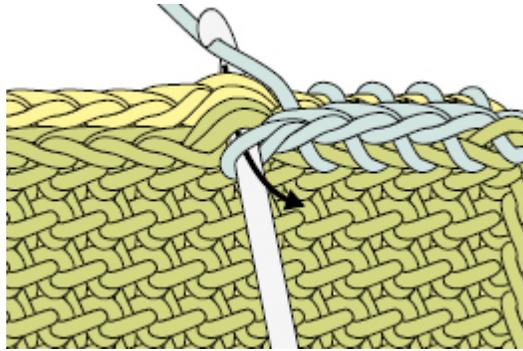
## **DEALING WITH THE CURL**

Tunisian crochet is significantly thicker than standard crochet or knitting. In lots of stitches the thickness lies at the back of the work, resulting in the fabric being heavier at the back and curling at the front. Tunisian stitches such as knit stitch will curl more than others; purl stitch on the other hand produces a fabric with no curl at all.

Blocking helps a lot with taming the curl, but also try using a bigger hook, which will make the stitches looser.

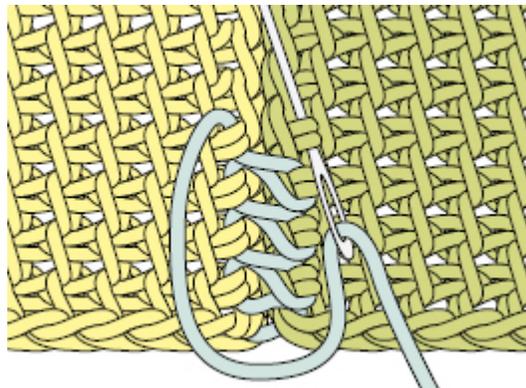
You can always crochet a small border to stop the edges from curling as well; also try to keep the foundation chains fairly loose.

## **SEAMS**



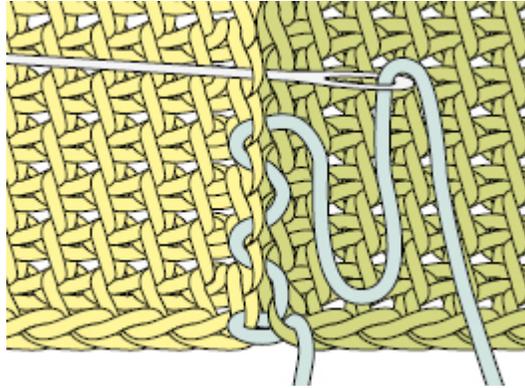
### **Slip stitch**

Holding the pieces to be joined with right sides together, insert the hook into the stitches of both pieces. Yo and pull through both stitches, ch 1; this locks the pieces together. Insert hook under edge stitches of both pieces, yo and pull through stitches and loop on hook. You can work the seam in single crochet in the same way.



### **Mattress stitch—method 1**

Place pieces side by side, right sides uppermost, and thread the yarn through a tapestry needle. Insert needle through corner of one piece, then through corner of the other. Insert needle under horizontal bars of stitch closest to the edge. Mirror this on the other piece. Continue in pairs, working each stitch on each side.



### **Mattress stitch—method 2**

This is the same as method 1, but this time work into the edge stitches. On one piece, insert needle from front to back into first stitch and then from back to front into center of next stitch. Mirror this on the other piece. Continue in pairs, working each stitch on each side.

# Symbols and Abbreviations

These are the abbreviations and symbols used in this book. There is no worldwide standard, so you may find different abbreviations and symbols in other publications. Always read the list provided with the pattern you are using before starting a project. Note that American crochet terms are used throughout this book.

## INCREASES, DECREASES, WRAPPED, AND CROSSED STITCHES

Increases and decreases are used to create decorative stitches and for shaping. Combined with yarn overs, they form the basis of many lace, wave, and chevron patterns. Yarn overs also create the central space in V stitches, and can be used to wrap other stitches for texture and pattern. Crossed stitches (working stitches out of order rather than consecutively) also create decorative relief effects.

### CLUSTERS AND CABLES

Clusters are decorative stitches gathered at the top or at both top and bottom, and are used to make interesting effects such as bobbles, puffs, and popcorns. Star stitches are made by gathering a group of stitches (a decrease) and then immediately increasing in the same stitches to form a star. Cables are a beautiful way of adding texture and interest to any pattern.
