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Introduction

Welcome to *Japanese Wonder Crochet!* Whether you're a new crocheter or an expert, you'll find in this book a range of techniques to play with, and some fun small projects for practice. The book was originally published in Japan, so you'll see that instructions and patterns use a lot of graphics and illustrations, with less text than you may be used to.

Most of the stitch patterns are shown entirely in symbols. Many of the symbols will be familiar to the experienced crocheter, because Japanese crochet symbols have largely become the international standard. They're all described in this book, in any case, including some variations.

The book has three sections:

- Fifteen varied crochet techniques, introduced with photo tutorials, symbol charts and "Point Lessons."
- Patterns for small items using these techniques; there's at least one project per technique.
- Crochet basics in a section at the back. If your crochet skills are a little rusty, or you need a refresher on symbols, start here. There's also information about joining, seaming and making cords.

Throughout this translation, we've used American crochet terminology. Abbreviations that are used throughout are defined in the crochet basics section. Hook sizes are specified in US, metric and Japanese sizes.

Point Lessons

The first section of the book introduces fifteen crochet techniques. For each technique, there's a photo, a chart and a "Point Lesson," or photo tutorial. The Point Lessons are key to working the stitch patterns. Even if you're familiar with crochet symbols, be sure to read through the Point Lessons because they contain helpful hints and tips. The photos and written steps will guide you through the symbol chart and answer questions that you may have. Work the stitch pattern as described in the Point Lesson before beginning a project.

Pattern conventions

A typical Japanese crochet pattern conveys most of the necessary information in graphics. Before you begin, read over all the pieces. There are *schematics* (line drawings of the item), *stitch charts*, and *illustrations* of finishing steps. Minimal text accompanies each of these parts. You'll see a summary of the construction at the beginning of the pattern, but be sure to read everything over before beginning. Important instructions are often found near the

appropriate section of the schematics or charts. All parts of the pattern work together to convey the information you need to make the item.

- *Schematics* are line drawings of the item. They include stitch and row counts, finished measurements, and other instructions. Study the schematic carefully to be sure you understand the construction. Measurements are given in both centimeters and inches.
- *Symbol charts*: Pay close attention to all the markings on the symbol charts. Watch for row numbers, arrows showing the direction of rows, standing or turning chains as transitions between rows, and other hints that will help you complete the pattern.
- *Line drawings* illustrate finishing details: where to sew seams, where to attach buttons or handles, and how to position an edging, for instance.

There can be some idiosyncrasies in the symbol charts. If there's a gap or "ditch" across a chart, you should continue as established. In addition, you may see that row numbering starts over when a new section/stitch pattern begins.

Some patterns include variations to a standard symbol. These are explained in the Point Lessons. For instance, Rib Crochet uses a "normal" sc symbol but it's printed in bold to signal that it's executed slightly differently; Herringbone Crochet uses a "normal" (slightly elongated) sc symbol with a slash across it.

Yarn substitution

Each pattern tells you the original Japanese yarn that was used in the item photographed. We've included an estimate of the yards/meters needed for the project.

Most likely, you'll be substituting a different yarn. On page 50, you'll find a table containing information about the original yarns: weight, fiber content, and so on.

To make an appropriate yarn substitution:

- (a) Check the weight of the original yarn. All but one of these are in the Ravelry database, where you will find photos of the yarns.
- (b) Check the fiber content. You'll probably want a yarn with a similar fiber content so your project looks like the one photographed.
- (c) Work a gauge swatch with your selected yarn to ensure that you can match the specified stitch and row gauge for the pattern. The swatch is the most important step in making an effective substitution.

Wonder Crochet Patterns

For this collection, we chose crochet stitch patterns that seem mysteriously complex, but they're actually easy to work. The methods of picking up and combining stitches are fresh and exciting. Using these stitches will take your own designs to a new level. We've included Point Lessons for each technique, where they may be hard to understand from the symbols alone.

- ※ The yarns and colors of the swatches shown may differ from the projects.
- ※ To make the Point Lessons easy to follow, the stitch counts as shown may differ from the projects. When you begin a project, please refer to the pattern itself for stitch and row counts.

Crocheted Puff Entrelac Stitch

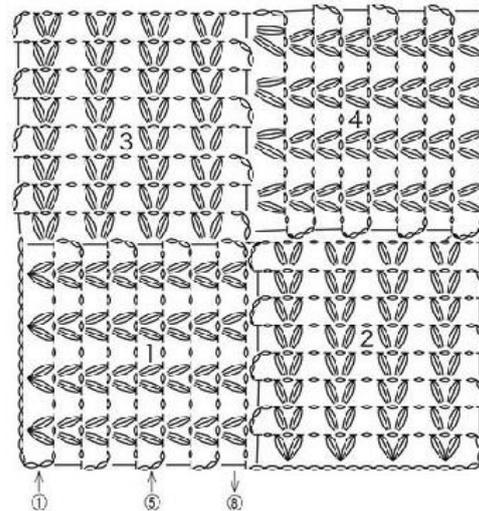
Half double crochet puff stitches that look like the catkins of a hazel or pussy willow. Be sure to join the stitches at each side as shown in the chart, so that the blocks will be square.

Maple Leaf Stitch

The two-row pattern makes shapes that look like maple leaves.

The plump round leaves are a variation on puff stitch.

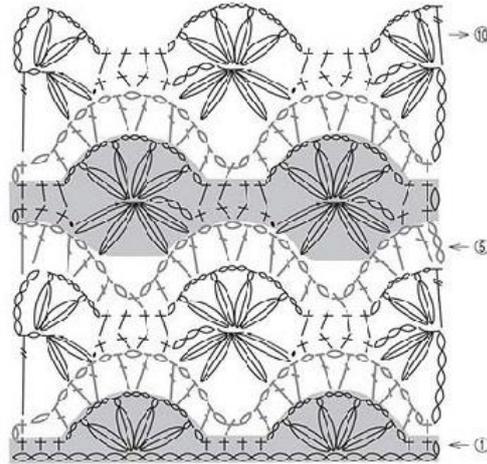
The row of openwork between the leaves creates a light and airy feeling.

Crocheted Aran Stitch

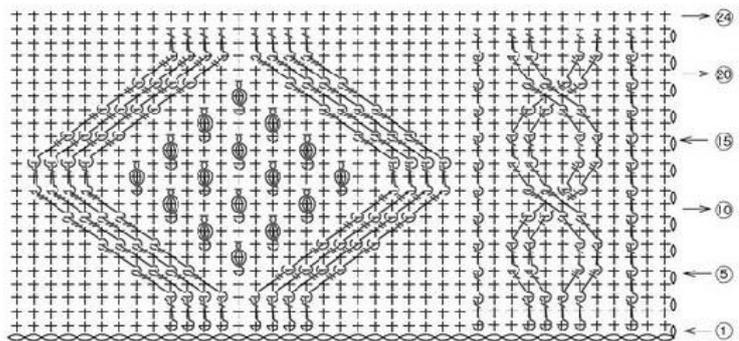
Aran patterns with post stitches make diamonds and cables, arranged with plenty of bobbles. The sharpness of the pattern comes from the three-dimensionality and size of the stitches.

A. Zipper Pouch

Created with a natural white yarn

A simple pouch worked straight as a rectangle. The fabric makes a grid pattern, and the aligned puff stitches form a pretty texture. Easily completed in one color.

Woven Shell Stitch

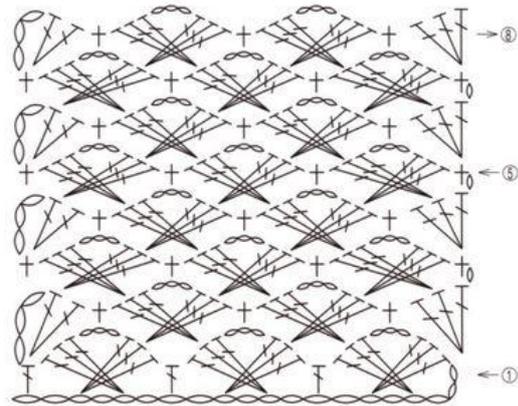
Long crossed dc stitches make a basketweave pattern. As you make the crosses, you wrap the previous dcs to create a puff-like texture.

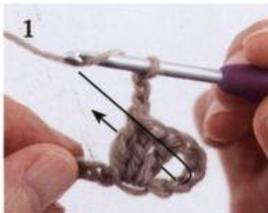

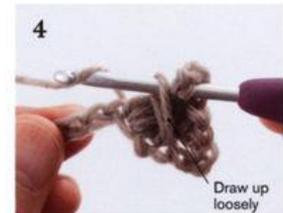
1 Following the chart, make the base chains. Work 3 dc in a shell shape, then ch 3.



2 Next, yarn over hook, bring the hook into the back loop of the base chain 2 ch from the shell, then around behind the shell as shown by the arrow in step 1.



3 Yarn over hook, draw up a loop, wrapping the shell made in step 1.



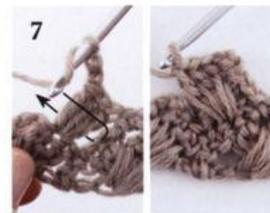
4 Again yarn over hook and dc. The trick is to keep the loop in step 3 very loose. If the stitches aren't stretched, they make a plump and pretty pattern.



5 Same as step 2, make 3 dc in all (crossing over the shell). Skip 1 ch, then make 1 more dc.



6 Follow the chart to the end of the row. Row 1 completed.



7 Follow the chart for row 2. For the 3 dc crossing, insert hook in the top of the second dc of the shell in the previous row.



8 Row 2 completed.

6. Tippet

Wavy edged pattern

Crossed double crochet stitches, with increases and decreases, make a gentle curve in this short cape. The stitch pattern creates a wavy edge.

Diamond Waffle Stitch

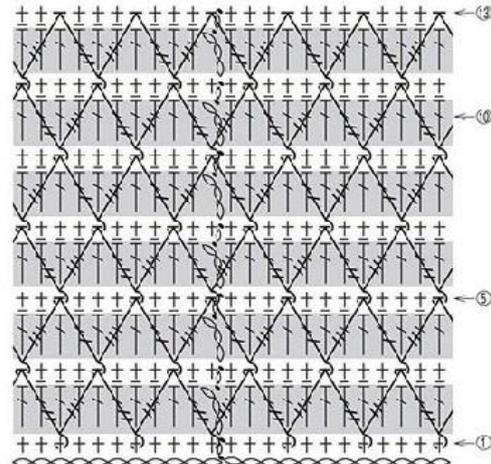
The special quality of this pattern is its waffle-shaped texture.
Clusters of triple crochet post stitches on the right side form diagonal crossings.
If worked in two colors, the pattern stands out even more.

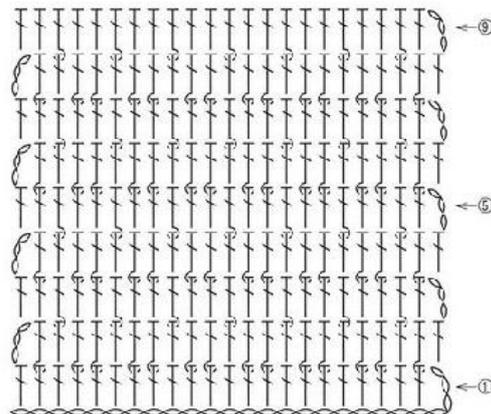

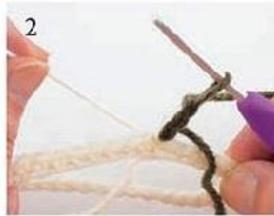

Work the first round in sc with color A. On round 2, change to color B and make 3 standing chs.



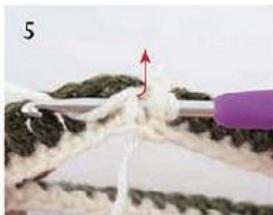

Work an incomplete tr: yarn over hook twice, insert hook around the top of the last 2 tr cluster 2 rounds below, in the direction of the arrow. Work a tr, drawing yarn through 3 loops on last step.

Continue in the same way, following the chart until you reach the end.

H. Handbag

Stylish, with an impressive presence

A three-dimensional diamond lattice pattern, using a light and a dark color to make it stand out. To keep the pattern continuous, the bag is worked in the round without shaping.

Simple rectangle purse

A useful gusseted pouch in Waffle Stitch. The thick pattern stitch is sturdy and cushions the contents.

Bavarian Crochet

This stitch pattern makes a square motif. You crochet into the back loop on the last round to create a three-dimensional outline.

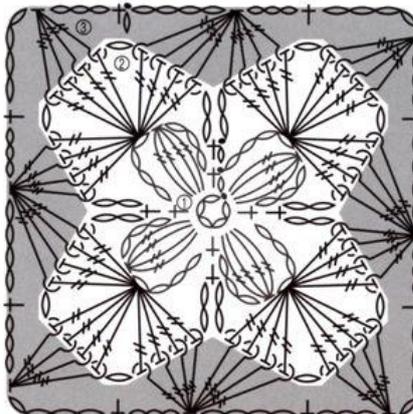
4 tr make each group. In the final round, when you work 8 sts together, the chain sts stabilize the edge.

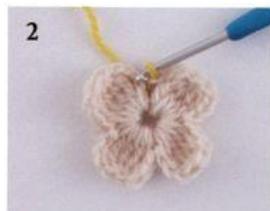

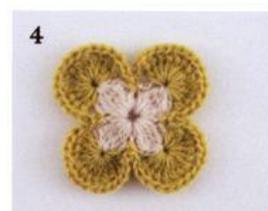

2 Continuing, ch 3, sc. Repeat the 4 tr cluster 3 times. On the last, ch 3, then change color to join the end to the beginning.



3 On round 2, sc 1, ch 2, then work 4 tr into the chain next to the cluster from step 1. Ch 1, 4 tr in same chain as previous 4 tr, ch 1, 4 tr in same chain as previous 8 tr.



4 In the same way, continue following the chart to the end of the round and change color.



5 For round 3, attach the new color as shown on chart (into the ch between the first and second 4 tr shells) and continue following the chart. Work the tr clusters as back post sts; 4 tr clusters at corners, and 8 tr clusters mid-round.



6 8 back post tr cluster.



7 Ch 1 to stabilize the top of the cluster.



8 Follow the chart to the end of the pattern.

Scale Crochet

This fine scaly pattern is made with ch and sl sts. You will always work in the same direction with RS facing you; when making an item, use the back side as the front.

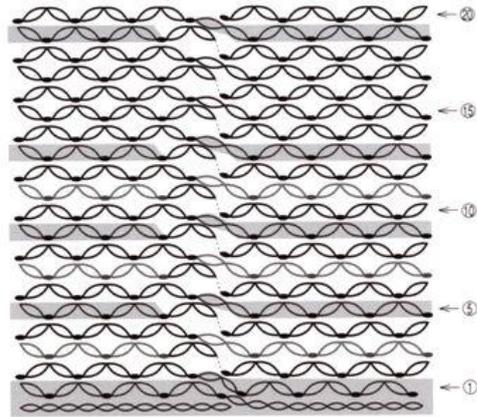

6 At end of round, with color C, sl st, then ch 1, ch 1 in color B, sl st under the previous ch.

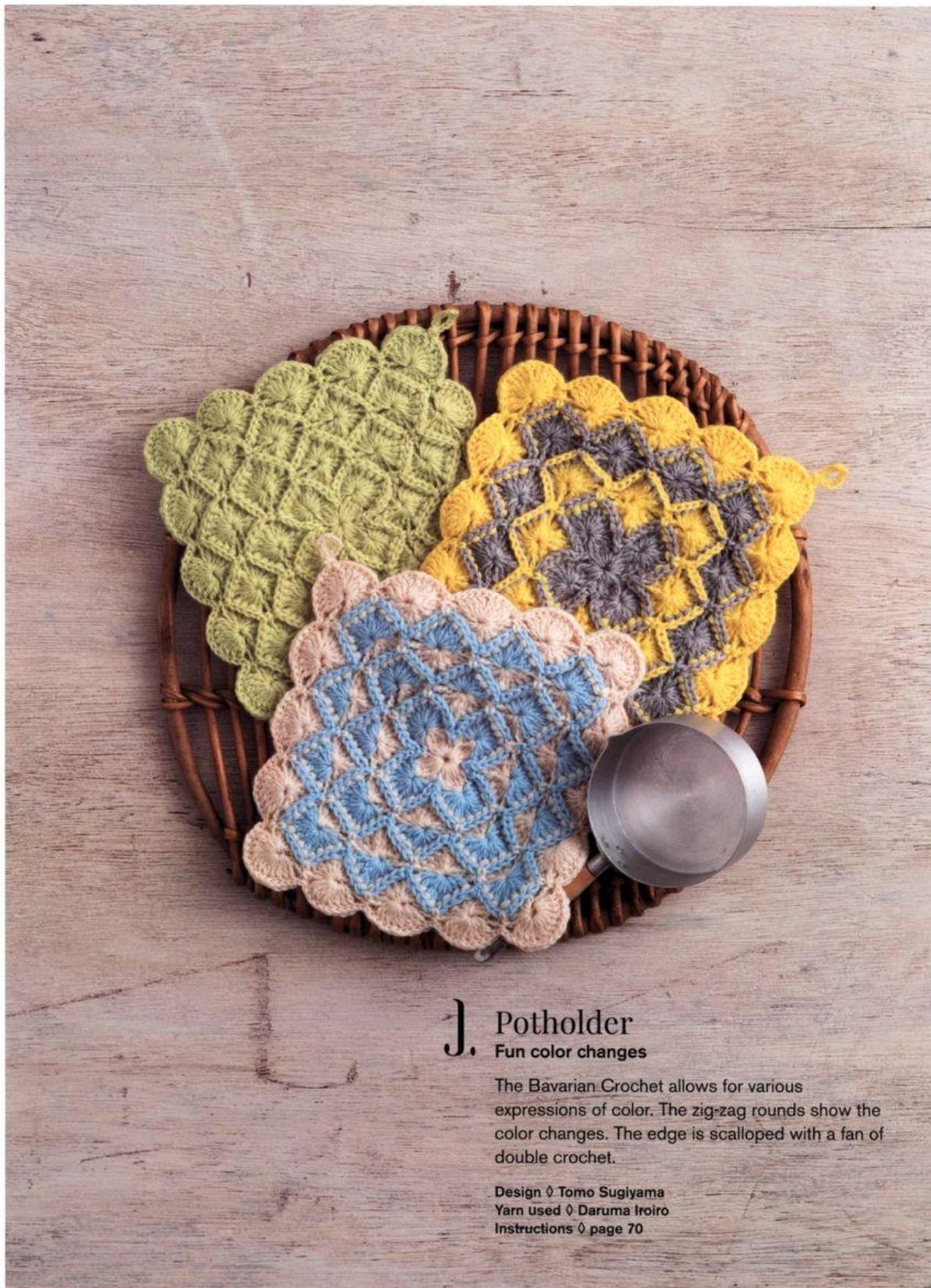


7 Continue, changing color as in rounds 2 and 3, following the chart.

For the projects in this book, use the back side of the work as the RS of the item.



Step 7 shows the back side of the work. Change colors carefully, so you don't create a gap.

Fun color changes

The Bavarian Crochet allows for various expressions of color. The zig-zag rounds show the color changes. The edge is scalloped with a fan of double crochet.

The bag is made in one piece, like an enlarged version of the potholder. The edge finishing and handles are the only addition. This is a fun design to make.

White stripes for an accent

Scale Crochet is perfect for a mitten worked in the round. Three colors and white stripes rhythmically repeat. The cuff is worked in crochet ribbing.

Combination of super bulky yarns

Rib Crochet

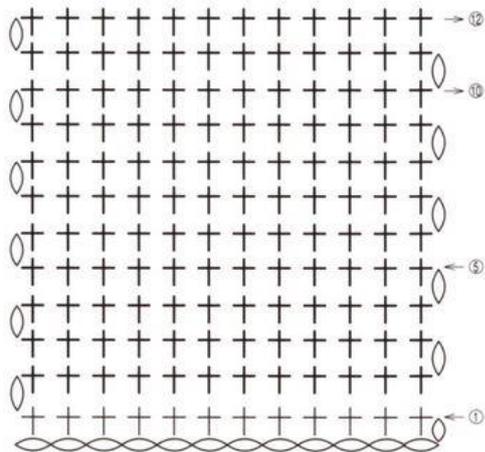
At first glance, Rib Crochet looks like knitted 1 x 1 ribbing. It's made entirely with sc.
 The key thing is that after row 2, pay attention to position of the yarn.

Herringbone Crochet

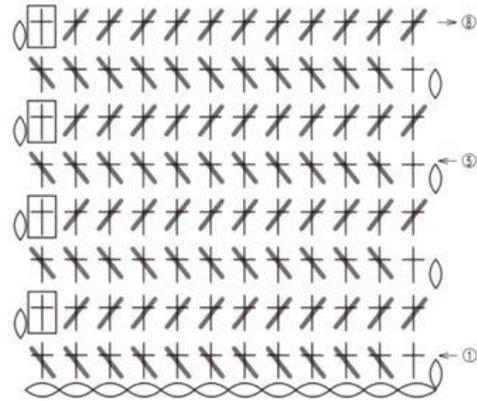
Herringbone Crochet is characterized by a sideways "V" shape, formed by sts made in alternating directions. It takes 2 rows to complete one pattern. The thickness of this stitch is caused by scooping up the previous stitch.

An arrangement of Herringbone Crochet. When working in the round, you'll only see the right side, and work in a circular shape. ※ See the notes on the chart for pattern Q, Market Bag.

Knitting the base (Worked in the round and seen only from the right side).

※ Because you're working Herringbone Crochet from the right side, the "V" shape will not be formed.

- 1 Make a circular cast on (p. 100) and work 8 sc into it, then pull the loop closed. Sl st the last st to the first.

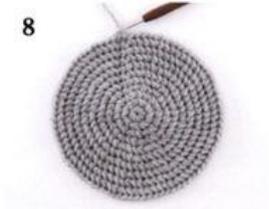

※ When working in the round, the position of the last sl st is not easy to find on the WS rounds, so the markers will help.

P. Clutch Bag

Classic bag worked straight

Worked in a rectangle, then seamed at the sides. The string closure is added last. The three-dimensional feel of the Herringbone stitch is neatly shown in a bulky yarn.

The sharp look of two colors

A simple bag in a trapezoid shape with two contrasting colors. A fairly thick fabric still gives an airy impression.

Crocodile Stitch

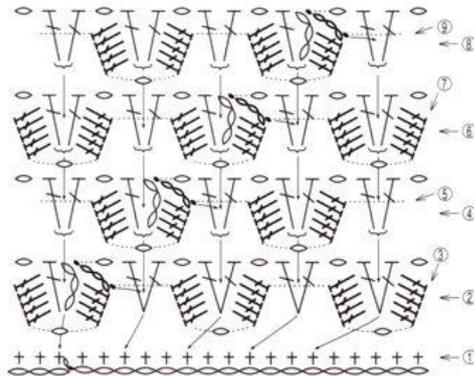
A three-dimensional "frill" type stitch made with double crochet. Two rows make one "frill." On the next row, the pattern shifts over by half a repeat to create more volume.

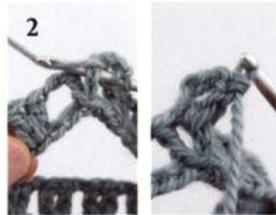

1 Round 1 is sc. On round 2, work 2 dc, ch 1 in every 3rd sc following the chart. Begin round 3 with 3 standing chs.



2 Yarn over hook, then, from the front, insert hook as shown under the leg of the first dc. Work a dc. In this way, the back of the dc becomes the front of the crocheted fabric.



3 In the same way, work 3 more dc from top to bottom around the leg of the same dc (5 dc total, including the standing ch).



4 Ch 1. In the same way, work 5 dc, from bottom to top, around the leg of the next dc. One "frill" completed. After the first frill, work 5 dc onto each leg of the dc.



5 Continue following the chart, placing the frills as shown on every other pair of dc. When completed, match the first frill (from the 3 standing chs) and the end of the last frill, and join with a sl st.



6 Completed join. Round 3 complete.



7 Round 4: insert hook into the center of the 2dc pair below (of round 2), then continue as round 2.



8 Round 5 is worked the same as round 3. Repeat these rounds.



R. Purse
Gradient color play

Lots of frills on a drawstring purse worked in the round. The color changes make the crocheting fun.

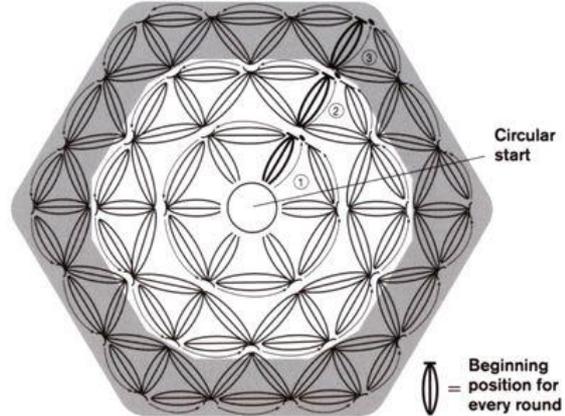
The type of crochet called "Lif" in Turkish tradition was used to make towels. It creates a flower-like pattern with alternating 2-hdc and 3-hdc puffs. There are 2-stitch and 3-stitch versions of the Lif.

- ② Cut out the lining pieces, adding a ⅜ in (1 cm) seam allowance. Place the lining pieces RS together and sew the seam, leaving the top open as shown.
- ④ Insert the lining into the bag, WS together. Turn the top seam allowance to the inside and sew in place.
- ⑤ Turn the last row of the bag body to the inside. Sew the clasp to the body and the lining.
- ⑥ Attach the metal rings to the clasp.
- ⑦ Attach the handles to the metal rings, folding the ends back and sewing in place.
