DIFFICULTY
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DESCRIPTION

The Una Tee is worked from the bottom up in stockinette stitch. The edges are created with a folded hem. The work begins with the body in the round. The stitches are then divided to knit the front and back separately, back and forth. The rounded neckline and sloped shoulders are shaped with a Sloped Bind-Off technique. Following this, the shoulders are sewn together. Stitches are then picked up and knitted to work the neckline in the round, which is then folded and sewn in place. In the end, stitches are picked up along the armholes, to work the sleeves in the round.

The pattern includes detailed instructions on beginning the knitting from the middle of the body with a Provisional Cast-on. This feature allows you to continue the work at the end, adjusting the garment length to match your fit preference.

SIZES

1(XS-S) / **2**(M-L) / **3**(L-XL)

SIZE GUIDE

The Una Tee has an oversized, cropped fit and is designed to have approx. 10-20 cm [4-8 in] of positive ease. This means the garment's measurements will be approx. 10-20 cm [4-8 in] larger than your actual bust circumference. The sizes **1** (XS-S)/**2** (M-L)/**3** (L-XL) are designed to fit a bust circumference of 80-90/90-100/100-110 cm [31½-35½/35½-39½/39½-43¼ in].

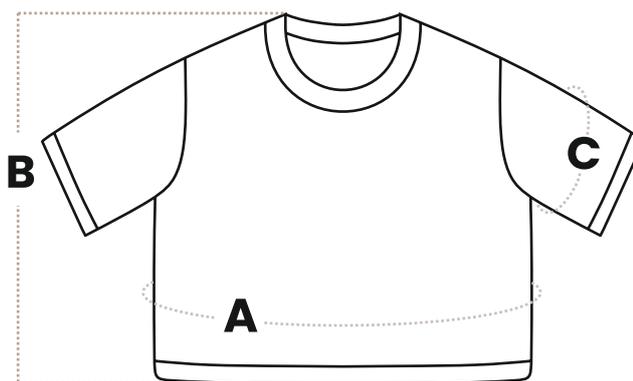
Before you begin, measure yourself to determine the right size. For example, if your bust circumference is 90 cm [35½ in], you should knit a size M. If you are between sizes, choose the size based on how loose you prefer the sweater to fit. Using the diagram with the finished garment measurements can be a helpful reference when deciding which size to select.

GAUGE**After washing and blocking:**

23 sts x 33 rows = 10 x 10cm [4 x 4 in] in stockinette stitch on 4 mm [US 6] needles.

Please make sure to knit a swatch. Ensure that your swatch gauge matches the given one. If you cannot achieve the required gauge using the suggested needles, adjust your needle size to reach the correct gauge.

NEEDLES

Circular needles:

3 mm [US 2½] 40, and 80 or 100, and optional 50 cm [16, and 32 or 40, and optional 20 in]

3,5 mm [US 4] 40 or 50 cm [16 or 20 in]

4 mm [US 6] 40, and 80 or 100 cm [16, and 32 or 40 in]

200-225/225-250/250-275 g Cashmere Classic by Cardiff Cashmere 25 g = 112 m [122 yds] **or** Cashmere Premium by Lang Yarns 25 g = 115 m [126 yds] **or** Cashmere by Mondial 25 g = 115 m [126 yds].

Suggested 2 (worked with two strands held together):

200/200/250 g Sunday by Sandnes Garn 50 g = 235 m [257 yds] or Merino by Knitting for Olive 50 g = 250 m [273 yds] **held together with** 100/125/125 g Tynn Silk Mohair by Sandnes Garn 25 g = 212 m [232 yds] **or** Silk Mohair by Isager Yarn 25 g = 212 m [232 yds] **or** Pearl Mohair by Majo Garn 25 g = 210m [230 yds] **or** Tilia by Filcolana 25 g = 210m [230 yds] **or** Silkhair by Lana Grossa 25 g = 210m [230 yds]

ABBREVIATIONS

BOR – Beginning Of Round

RS/WS – Right Side/Wrong Side

st/sts – Stitch(es)

About twisted decreases:

KSLIKWP: Knit one stitch. Then slip the next stitch knit-wise onto the right needle, keeping the yarn in the back. Move these two stitches back to the left needle. Then, pass the slipped stitch over the stitch you just knit. Finally, slip the knitted stitch back onto the right needle.

SLIPWKP: Slip one stitch purl-wise onto the right needle, keeping the yarn in the back. Then knit the next stitch. Finally, pass the slipped stitch over the stitch you just knit.

PSLBP: Purl one stitch. Then move the purled stitch back to the left needle, keeping the yarn in front. Next, pass the second stitch on the left needle over the stitch you just purl. Finally, slip the purled stitch back onto the right needle.

About Sloped Bind-off:

When using the Sloped Bind-Off technique, control the tension with which you bind off your stitches. Be extremely cautious to avoid binding off too tightly. A too-tight bind-off could result in a constricted, distorted edge, throwing off the shape of your garment and significantly reducing its elasticity and comfort. Maintain a balanced bind-off tension. Your bind-off edge should be loose enough to maintain the intended shape and flexibility of the garment, yet secure enough to hold the stitches firmly in place.

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BOTTOM HEM

Tip: If you're unsure about the final length of your garment, starting your knitting with a **Provisional Cast-On** can be helpful. It allows for length adjustments at the end of your project. Begin by casting on a total of 234/252/270 sts using **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles, with your preferred Provisional Cast-On method. Then, work approximately half the suggested body length in stockinette stitch. Once all other sections are completed, you can continue knitting from top to bottom until the garment fits your desired length.

BOTTOM HEM

The folded hem is worked in the round on **3 mm [US 2½] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles.

Step 1. Cast on 234/252/270 sts on **3 mm [US 2½] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles using the Long-Tail Cast-On method and two strands held together throughout the process - one strand is the main yarn, and the other is a waste yarn in a contrasting color, which will help you see the stitches on the WS.

Break the CC waste yarn and join knitting in the round with a bow-knot. Place a stitch marker to indicate BOR.

Step 2. Knit in the round in stockinette stitch for 18 rounds or approx. 5 cm [2 in].

Step 3. Join the edges by knitting the sts together as follows:

Slip the first stitch knit-wise from the LH needle to the RH needle, then pick up the first cast-on arch to the LH needle, inserting the needle from front to back. Return slipped st to LH needle and knit 2 together through the back loop. Slip the next stitch knit-wise from the LH needle to the RH needle, then pick up the next cast-on arch to the LH needle. Return slipped st to LH needle and knit 2 together through the back loop. Repeat these steps to the end of the round.

Remove the contrast color yarn.

You have 234/252/270 sts on the needles.

Switch to circular needles **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** and work in the round in stockinette stitch until the body part measures 28/29/30 cm [11/11½/11¾ in] from the folded edge.

Now, divide the body into front and back as follows:

Place the first 8/10/11 stitches after the BOR marker on hold, then the next 109/116/124 stitches, and another 8/10/11 stitches.

You have 109/116/124 stitches of the back on the needles, 8/10/11 stitches on hold for the left armhole, 109/116/124 stitches on hold for the front, and 8/10/11 stitches on hold for the right armhole.

Now the back and front are worked separately to form the armholes.

BACK

Back is worked back and forth in stockinette stitch using **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles.

Turn your work on WS and purl 109/116/124 sts.

You have 109/116/124 sts on the needles and worked 1 row.

Now work with **twisted decreases** for the armholes as follows:

Row 1 (RSR): 5K, **KSLIKWP**, knit to last 7 sts, **SLIPWKP**, 5K. (2 sts have been decreased).

Row 2 (WSR): purl across.

Row 3 (RSR): knit across.

Row 4 (WSR): purl across.

Work rows 1–4 a total of 5/6/7 times.

Finish with the WS row.

Now you have 99/104/110 sts on the needles and worked 21/25/29 rows.

Work the following 40/42/44 rows in stockinette stitch as follows:

RSR: knit across.

WSR: purl across.

Finish with a WS row.

Now you have 99/104/110 sts on the needles and worked 61/67/73 rows.

Next, divide the back into two shoulders by binding off the stitches for the neckline as follows:

RSR: Work 45/47/50K and place them on hold, then bind off the following 9/10/10 sts and knit across.

Do not break the yarn to start working the left shoulder from here.

You have 45/47/50 sts of the left shoulder on the needles and 45/47/50 sts on hold for the right shoulder.

Now the shoulders are worked separately.

LEFT SHOULDER OF BACK

Beginning with the WS row, work in the **Sloped Bind-Off technique** to shape the shoulder and neckline as follows:

Row 1 (WSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 2 (RSR): BO 6/6/7 sts, knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.

Row 3 (WSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 4 (RSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.

Row 5 (WSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 6 (RSR): BO 3/3/3 sts, knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.

Row 7 (WSR): BO 4/4/5 sts, purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

- Row 8 (RSR):** BO 2/2/2 sts, knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.
Row 9 (WSR): BO 4/4/5 sts, purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.
Row 10 (RSR): BO 1/1/1 sts, knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.
Row 11 (WSR): BO 4/5/5 sts, purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.
Row 12 (RSR): BO 1/1/1 sts, knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.
Row 13 (WSR): BO the remaining 4/5/5 sts and break the yarn.

RIGHT SHOULDER OF BACK

Transfer your right shoulder sts on hold to the needles.

Beginning with the RS row, join the yarn and work in the **Sloped Bind-Off technique** to shape the shoulder and neckline as follows:

- Row 1 (RSR):** BO 4/4/4 sts, knit across, then pick up and knit one extra stitch in the bind-off edge to make the **step invisible**. (There are now 42/44/47 sts on the needles).
Row 2 (WSR): BO 7/7/8 sts, purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.
Row 3 (RSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.
Row 4 (WSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.
Row 5 (RSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.
Row 6 (WSR): BO 3/3/3 sts, purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.
Row 7 (RSR): BO 4/4/5 sts, knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.
Row 8 (WSR): BO 2/2/2 sts, purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.
Row 9 (RSR): BO 4/4/5 sts, knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.
Row 10 (WSR): BO 1/1/1 sts, purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.
Row 11 (RSR): BO 4/5/5 sts, knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.
Row 12 (WSR): BO 1/1/1 sts, purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.
Row 13 (RSR): BO the remaining 4/5/5 sts and break the yarn.

FRONT

The front is worked back and forth in stockinette stitch using **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles.

Transfer your front sts on hold to the needles.

Beginning with the WS row, join the yarn and work 109/116/124P.

You have 109/116/124 sts on the needles and worked 1 row.

Now work with **twisted decreases** for the armholes as follows:

- Row 1 (RSR):** 5K, **KSLIKWP**, knit to last 7 sts, **SLIPWKP**, 5K. (2 sts have been decreased).
Row 2 (WSR): purl across.
Row 3 (RSR): knit across.
Row 4 (WSR): purl across.

Work rows 1-4 a total of 5/6/7 times.

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**SLOPED

Finish with the WS row.

Now you have 99/104/110 sts on the needles and worked 21/25/29 rows.

Work the following 6/8/10 rows in stockinette stitch as follows:

RSR: knit across

WSR: purl across.

Finish with the WS row.

Now you have 99/104/110 sts on the needles and worked 27/33/39 rows.

Now divide the front into two shoulders by binding off the stitches for the neckline as follows:

RSR: Work 47/49/52K and place them on hold, then bind off the following 5/6/6 sts and knit across.

Do not break the yarn to start working the right shoulder from here.

You have 47/49/52 sts for the right shoulder on the needles and 47/49/52 sts on hold for the left shoulder.

Now the shoulders are worked separately.

RIGHT SHOULDER OF FRONT

Beginning with the WS row, work in the **Sloped Bind-Off technique** to shape the neckline as follows:

Row 1 (WSR): purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 2 (RSR): BO 5/5/5 sts, knit across.

Row 3 (WSR): purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 4 (RSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, knit across.

Row 5 (WSR): purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 6 (RSR): BO 3/3/3 sts, knit across.

Row 7 (WSR): purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 8 (RSR): BO 2/2/3 sts, knit across.

Row 9 (WSR): purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 10 (RSR): BO 2/2/2 sts, knit across.

Row 11 (WSR): purl across.

Now you have 31/33/35 sts on the needles and worked 11/11/11 rows.

Now work with **twisted decreases** for the neckline as follows:

Row 1 (RSR): 5K, **KSLIKWP**, knit across. (1 st has been decreased).

Row 2 (WSR): purl across.

Row 3 (RSR): knit across.

Row 4 (WSR): purl across.

Work rows 1-4 a total of 5/5/5 times.

Finish with the WS row.

Now you have 26/28/30 sts on the needles and worked 31/31/31 rows.

Work the following 3 rows in stockinette stitch as follows:

RSR: knit across

WSR: purl across.

Finish with the RS row.

You have 26/28/30 sts on the needles and worked 34/34/34 rows.

Now work in the **Sloped Bind-Off technique** to shape the shoulder, while at the same time working **increases** for the neckline as follows:

Row 1 (WSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, purl across.

Row 2 (RSR): 2K, **MIL**, knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.

Row 3 (WSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, purl across.

Row 4 (RSR): knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.

Row 5 (WSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, purl across.

Row 6 (RSR): 2K, **MIL**, knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.

Row 7 (WSR): BO 4/4/5 sts, purl across.

Row 8 (RSR): knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.

Row 9 (WSR): BO 4/4/5 sts, purl across.

Row 10 (RSR): knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.

Row 11 (WSR): BO 4/5/5 sts, purl across.

Row 12 (RSR): knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.

Row 13 (WSR): BO the remaining 4/5/5 sts and break the yarn with a 30–40 cm [12–16 in] tail for shoulder sewing.

LEFT SHOULDER OF FRONT

Transfer your left shoulder sts on hold to the needles.

Beginning with the RS row, join the yarn and work in the **Sloped Bind-Off technique** to shape the neckline as follows:

Row 1 (RSR): knit across, then pick up and knit one extra stitch in the bind-off edge to make the **step invisible**. (There are now 48/50/53 sts on the needles).

Row 2 (WSR): BO 6/6/6 sts, purl across.

Row 3 (RSR): knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.

Row 4 (WSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, purl across.

Row 5 (RSR): knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.

Row 6 (WSR): BO 3/3/3 sts, purl across.

Row 7 (RSR): knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.

Row 8 (WSR): BO 2/2/3 sts, purl across.

Row 9 (RSR): knit to last st, SLIPW wyib.

Row 10 (WSR): BO 2/2/2 sts, purl across.

Row 11 (RSR): knit across.

Now you have 31/33/35 sts on the needles and worked 11/11/11 rows.

Now work with **twisted decreases** for the neckline as follows:

Row 1 (WSR): 5P, **PSLBP**, purl across. (1 st has been decreased).

Row 2 (RSR): knit across.

Row 3 (WSR): purl across.

Row 4 (RSR): knit across.

Work rows 1–4 a total of 5/5/5 times.

Finish with the RS row.

Now you have 26/28/30 sts on the needles and worked 31/31/31 rows.

Work the following 3 rows in stockinette stitch as follows:

RSR: knit across

WSR: purl across.

Finish with the WS row.

Now you have 26/28/30 sts on the needles and worked 34/34/34 rows.

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SLOPED BIND-OFF

Now work in the **Sloped Bind-Off technique** to shape the shoulder, while at the same time working **increases** for the neckline as follows:

Row 1 (RSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, knit across.

Row 2 (WSR): 2P, **MIPL**, purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 3 (RSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, knit across.

Row 4 (WSR): purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 5 (RSR): BO 4/4/4 sts, knit across.

Row 6 (WSR): 2P, **MIPL**, knit to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 7 (RSR): BO 4/4/5 sts, knit across.

Row 8 (WSR): purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 9 (RSR): BO 4/4/5 sts, knit across.

Row 10 (WSR): purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 11 (RSR): BO 4/5/5 sts, knit across.

Row 12 (WSR): purl to last st, SLIPW wyif.

Row 13 (RSR): BO the remaining 4/5/5 sts and break the yarn with a 30–40 cm [12 – 16 in] tail for shoulder sewing.

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INCREASES ON A PURL ROW

Now **sew the shoulders** with the RS facing. Start from the neckline and work towards the armhole, inserting the needle into the stitch under the bind-off edge.

NECKLINE

The neckline is worked in the round in stockinette stitch using **3 mm and 3.5 mm [US 2½ and US 4] 40 or 50 cm [16 or 20 in]** circular needles.

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SHOULDER SEAM

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NECKLINE STABILIZATION

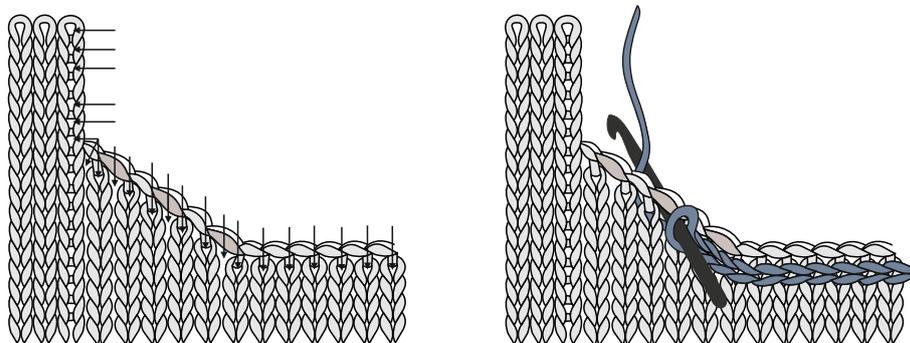
Stabilize the neckline with crocheted slip stitches using a **3 mm [US D-3]** crochet hook and two strands held together throughout the process – one strand is the main yarn, and the other is a smooth yarn in a contrasting color, which will help you see the stitches on the WS.

Start from the right shoulder seam with the RS facing work approx. 156/158/162 crocheted slip stitches along the neckline (not too tightly), while at the same time, wrapping the contrast color yarn around the main after each worked slip stitch.

This is equivalent to a crochet 3 slip stitches for every 4 rows on a vertical parts, 1 slip st for each st on a sloped parts, and additionally 1 sl. st in a space in between the “sloped steps”. (See the picture below).

Note: The total amount of stitches should be the same on each side. It means you have the same number of crocheted slip stitches on RS and picked-up stitches on the contrast color yarn on WS.

Break the yarn and pull the tail on WS. Place a stitch marker before the first sl st to indicate BOR.



Join the yarn with the RS facing and pick up and knit stitches along the chain of crocheted slip stitches on **3.5 mm [US 4] 40 or 50 cm [16-20 in]** circular needles, inserting the needle in each crocheted slip stitch.

Move the BOR marker onto the needles.

Now you have the same number of stitches on the needles as you do on the contrast color yarn.

Next, work as follows:

Step 1. Work in the round in stockinette stitch for 5 rounds.

Step 2. Switch to circular needles **3 mm [US 2½] 40 or 50 cm [16 or 20 in]** and work 4 more rounds.

Step 3. Now, to make **the resilient folded edge** bind off all stitches using elastic thread. This means you will set the main yarn aside, take a thin elastic thread, and bind off all the stitches using only this thread. Keep the main yarn to continue working the neckline from this point.

Work as follows:

Take an elastic thread and knit 2 sts. Then, insert your LH needle into the front of the stitch you knitted first, and pull it over the second stitch and off the RH needle. One stitch has now been bound off. Slip back just worked st to the LH needle with yarn in back and knit it once

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RESILIENT FOLDED EDGE

more (now, tbl). Then knit the next stitch, using the LH needle to pull the previous stitch over the new one and off the needle. Slip back just worked st to the LH needle with yarn in back and knit it once more (tbl). And so on. Repeat these 2 last steps to the end of the round. Finally, break the elastic thread and fix the tail. As a result, the bind-off edge will have twice the number of stitches you bound off.

Note: Use a thin transparent elastic thread (or similar color as the garment). Control the tension as you bind off stitches. Be careful not to bind off too tightly or loosely. Maintain a balanced tension throughout the bind-off process. The final bind-off edge should be approximately the same size as before you bound it off.

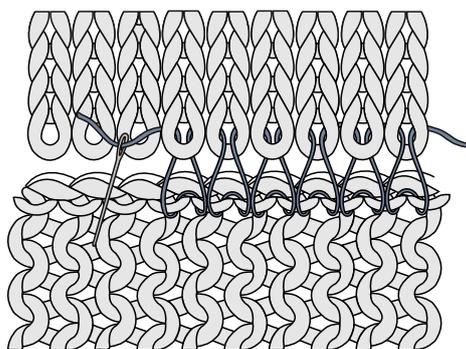
Step 4. Next, starting from where you left the main yarn, pick up and knit all of the bind-off stitches on **3 mm [US 2½] 40 or 50 cm [16 or 20 in]** circular needles. Place BOR marker.

You have the same number of sts on the needles as before BO.

Step 5. Work for 3 rounds.

Step 6. Then, switch to circular needles **3.5 mm [US 4] 40 or 50 cm [16 or 20 in]**, and work 4 more rounds.

Break the yarn with the tail 3.5 times longer than the circumference of the neckline edge.



Fold the neckline in half to WS and **sew the rib stitches to the stitches on CC yarn** using a tapestry needle. Not too tightly.

Note: make sure that you line up each stitch of rib with the correct stitch on CC yarn so that your neckline doesn't twist.

Remove the contrast color yarn.

SLEEVES

The sleeves are worked in the round in stockinette stitch using **4 mm [US 6] 40 cm [16 in]** circular needles. Folded hems are worked on **3 mm [US 2½] 40 cm [16 in]** circular needles.

Tip: Using **additional yarn for the cast-on** can help create a seamless connection between the sleeve and the body. Once the sleeve is knitted, the joining point can be made invisible by pulling on the ends of the cast-on yarn. For this technique, ensure you use an additional yarn that is smooth, exceptionally strong, thinner than your main yarn, and of a similar color.

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FOLDED NECKLINE ATTACHING

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CO WITH ADDITIONAL YARN

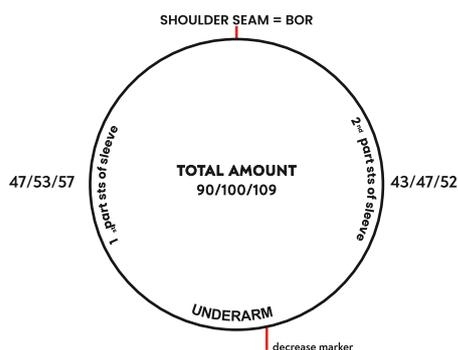
Join the yarn with the RS facing and pick up and knit a total of 90/100/109 sts on **on 4mm [US 6] 40 cm [16 in]** circular needles along the armhole as follows:

Beginning at the left of the live sts of the underarm, pick up and knit 82/90/98 sts along the armhole edge. This is equivalent to picking up and knitting 2 sts for every 3 rows. Then, unzip 8/10/11 live underarm sts and knit them.

Cut the yarn.

Place stitch markers: one marker at the center of the shoulder = BOR, and another marker after 2/2/3th live underarm st to indicate the start to decrease.

You have 90/100/109 sts on the needles: 47/53/57 before the BOR marker, and 43/47/52 after the BOR marker.



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GERMAN SHORT ROWS

Work in the **German Short Rows** technique to shape the sleeve.

“**Turn**” means you turn your work and create a double stitch of turns.

“**Work sts after the last turn**” means you work the created double stitch from the previous row and then work the following number of sts.

Slip the first 47/53/57 sts PW to the right-hand needle without knitting them.

Now, work as follows:

Row 1 (RSR): Beginning at the BOR marker, join the main yarn with the RS facing and knit 7 sts. Turn.

Row 2 (WSR): 7P after the Central marker. Turn.

Row 3 (RSR): 6K after the last turn. Turn.

Row 4 (WSR): 6P after the last turn. Turn.

Row 5 (RSR): 5K after the last turn. Turn.

Row 6 (WSR): 5P after the last turn. Turn.

Row 7 (RSR): 4K after the last turn. Turn.

Row 8 (WSR): 4P after the last turn. Turn.

Row 9 (RSR): 3K after the last turn. Turn.

Row 10 (WSR): 3P after the last turn. Turn.

Row 11 (RSR): 2K after the last turn. Turn.

Row 12 (WSR): 2P after the last turn. Turn.

Repeat rows 11–12 an additional 7/9/11 times.

Finish with the WS row.

You have worked 26/30/34 short rows.

The short rows are now complete.

**TWISTED
DECREASES**

on 4mm [US 6] 40 cm [16 in] circular needles along the armhole as follows:

Beginning at the left of the live sts of the underarm, pick up and knit 82/90/98 sts along the armhole edge. This is equivalent to picking up and knitting 2 sts for every 3 rows. Then, unzip 8/10/11 live underarm sts and knit them.

Now join knitting in the round as follows:

Knit all sts before the last turn, then knit the first double stitch as normal, work 8/10/11K, then knit the next double stitch through the back loop and knit all sts to the BOR marker.

Work in the round in stockinette stitch, while at the same time, working **twisted decreases** every 6th round a total of 5/6/6 times.

Decrease rounds are worked as follows: KSLIKWP before the decrease marker, 4/4/5K, **SLIPWKP**. (2 sts have been decreased).

You have 80/88/97 sts on the needles, after all, decrease rounds have been worked.

Next, work 6 more rounds.

Try on the garment and check the sleeve length before working the hem.

Folded hem:

Switch to **3 mm [US 2½] 40 cm [16 in]** circular needles and knit 18 rounds.

Then, fold the edge inward, and **sew the live stitches** on your needles to purl arches with the WS facing using the tapestry needle as follows:

On the WS of your work, locate the first stitch to insert the needle into: count up 18 upward arches between the knitting needles. Insert the needle from bottom to top into the downward arch on the fabric to the right of the last counted arch, and pull the yarn through. Place a sm directly into this arch (this will make it easier to finish the sewing later). Then, insert the needle into the next downward arch from top to bottom and pull the yarn through. Next, insert the needle purl-wise into the first stitch on your LH needle, pull the yarn through, and slip this stitch off the knitting needle.

After this, go back to the fabric. Insert the needle from the bottom to the top into the same downward arch where it was last inserted, and pull the yarn through. Next, insert the needle from top to bottom into the next downward arch, and pull the yarn through.

Go back to the knitting needles and insert the needle knit-wise into the same stitch that was last slipped off. Then, insert it purl-wise into the next stitch (first) on your LH needle. Pull the yarn through and slip this stitch off the knitting needle.

Repeat these steps until you sew on all stitches.

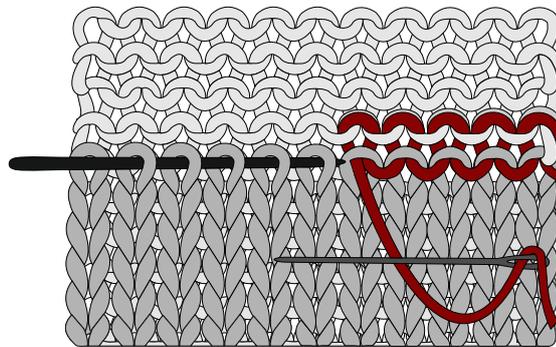
NOTE: Keep your tension loose as you sew the hem. Be sure to sew evenly.

Finish: When the last st was slipped off from the knitting needle, insert the needle from the bottom to the top into the same downward arch where it was last inserted, and pull the yarn through. Next, insert the needle from top to bottom into the marked arch, and pull the yarn through.

Work the second sleeve the same way.

BODY

(If using provisional cast-on)

Unzip the stitches and transfer them on **4 mm [US 6] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** circular needles.

Place a stitch marker to indicate BOR.

Join the yarn with the RS facing and work in the round in stockinette stitch until the garment measures approx. 49/52/55 cm [19¼/20½/21¾ in] from the highest point of the shoulder – or to the length you prefer.

Note: extending the length of the garment in your knitting may require additional yarn.

Try on and check the garment length before you begin working the hem.

Switch to circular needles **3 mm [US 2½] 80 or 100 cm [32 or 40 in]** and work 18 rounds.

Then, fold the edge inward, and **sew the live stitches** on your needles to purl arches with the WS facing using the tapestry the same way as at sleeves.

FINISHING

Weave in all ends. Wash and block your garment.
