

## *Little Cotton Rabbits alternative shoes supplement*



### *Materials:*

- 4ply weight yarn for the coloured part of the shoe  
Yarn A
- 4ply weight yarn for the white part of the shoe  
Yarn B
- 4ply weight yarn for the sole part of the shoe  
Yarn C
- DK, Worsted or light Aran yarn for the leg (the same yarn as you are using for the rest of the animal)

### *Notions:*

- Knitting needles:  
A pair each of 2.5mm and 3mm needles
- Tapestry needle

### *Gauge:*



7 stitches x 10 rows to 1 inch

These shoe options are knitted into the toy and are not removable. Included are a pair of bunny slippers and trainers either of which can be substituted for the feet included in any of the boy or girl animal patterns. I'm going to give you two options for making the trainers. Option A is easier as there is less in the way of picking up stitches and sewing up. I usually use Option B as I prefer the finished look (especially the ridge between the sole of the shoe and the main part of the shoe) but they will both work so pick whichever you prefer. There are also elements that are interchangeable so you can pick and choose elements to combine from the table below:

	<i>Option A</i>	<i>Option B</i>
ridge at top of sole	worked as a purl ridge	worked by casting off and then picking up stitches
top of shoe	worked across the whole row	worked in 3 separate sections
laces	laces that are tied	decorative laces

Both options involve working in intarsia as the toe cap of the sneaker is in a different colour. This means you will need to intertwine the strands from each colour section in order to prevent holes from developing. ### *Yarn suggestions:*

In each pattern the shoe part is knitted on 2.5mm needles with 4ply/fingering weight yarn. I prefer to knit these in 4ply cotton/cotton mix yarns. I particularly like DMC Natura and Drops Safran as they knit up nicely and have a good range of colours. Patons 4ply cotton also comes in a wide range of colours but is thinner, so you might need to check your gauge. It may also be worth looking on [ravelry](http://www.ravelry.com) to see what yarns others are using and recommending.

### *Abbreviations:*

**KLL : KNIT LEFT LOOP.** Increase 1 stitch by knitting into the stitch that is 2 below the one you have just knitted... insert tip of left needle into the stitch from behind and bring the loop onto the left needle. Insert the tip of the right needle into the back loop and knit, so making an extra stitch. This is the most invisible increasing method I've found so far but if you prefer you can substitute M1L (Make 1 left).

**M1A : MAKE 1 AWAY.** Make a loop with the working yarn so the tail is pointing backwards/away from you

**SSK (SLIP, SLIP, KNIT) :** Slip a stitch (as if to knit it) to the right-hand needle, slip a second stitch in the same way, slip both stitches together back to the left-hand needle and knit together through the back loops.

**K2TOG :** Knit 2 stitches together

**P2TOG :** Purl 2 stitches together

**P2TOG TBL:** Purl 2 stitches together through the back loops

And please note that when the pattern mentions cast on, I use a cable cast on.

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## Option A: easier trainers:

Before starting cut two lengths 2m (2.2yds) of **Yarn A** for the intarsia sections.

Starting at the underside of the shoe, use **Yarn C** and 2.5mm needles to cast on 14 stitches, leaving a tail of 7 inches for seaming with later

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| <p><b>row 1:</b> (wrong side) Purl</p> <p><b>row 2:</b> K2, (KLL, K1) 4 times, K3, (KLL, K1) 4 times, K1 (22 stitches)</p> <p><b>row 3:</b> Purl</p> <p><b>row 4:</b> K3, (KLL, K1) 6 times, K5, (KLL, K1) 6 times, K2 (34 stitches)</p> <p><b>row 5:</b> Purl and at the end of the row cut Yarn C from the ball</p> <p><b>row 6:</b> Change to Yarn B and Knit</p> <p><b>row 7:</b> Knit and at the end of the row cut Yarn B from the ball</p> <p><b>row 8:</b> K12 in the first length of Yarn A, rejoin Yarn B and K10 (for the toecap), join the second length of Yarn A and K12 (34 stitches)</p> | <p><b>row 9:</b> P12, P10, P12</p> <p><b>row 10:</b> K12, K10, K12</p> <p><b>rows 11-16:</b> Repeat rows 9 &amp; 10 three times more, cut Yarn B from the work. The <b>Yarn A</b> strands are no longer needed but leave the tail ends un-trimmed ready for sewing up with later</p> <p><b>row 17:</b> Re-join Yarn B, P12, P2tog, P6, P2togtb, P12 (32 stitches)</p> <p><b>row 18:</b> K12, SSK, K4, K2tog, K12 (30 stitches)</p> <p><b>row 19:</b> Cast off tightly in Purl</p> <p>Cut the work from the ball and put the main part of the shoe aside for now while you make the tongue.</p> |
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### Tongue:

**Note:** rows 11-14 contain a little shaping at the start which will give the top of the tongue a rounded edge.

Using 2.5mm needles and **Yarn A** cast on 6 stitches, leaving a tail of 7 inches for sewing up later.

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Now you will need to pick up the stitches to form the shaft of the leg. Note that we will be picking up and knitting into the topmost purl bumps from the back of the last row of **Yarn A** rather than stitches at the very top edge of the shoe (fig 2). This will give a nice edge to the top of the shoe.

Use the main yarn for your chosen animal and 3mm needles (for row 1 you can use a smaller sized needle if you find it easier for picking up and knitting the stitches but remember to swap to the 3mm needle for the rest of the leg shaft).

- row 1:** (right side) Leaving a 7 inch tail for seaming with later pick up and Knit into the first 5 pink purl bumps from the far right side of the shoe (ignore the remaining 7 stitches on the right side). Continue by casting on 4 stitches (I use the thumb method M1A but as this will be hidden you can substitute your favourite). Ignore the first 7 pink purl bumps on the left side and pick up and knit into the last 5 of them (the last stitch will be at the very edge of the work). Be sure to keep your tension as tight as possible across the gaps. (14 stitches) (fig. 3)

**rows 2-16:** Beginning and ending with a Purl row, work 15 rows in stocking stitch (alternate Knit and Purl rows)

- row 17:** Cast off in Knit

Cut the work from the ball leaving a tail of around 6 inches for sewing the leg to the body with later.

Make a second leg in exactly the same way.

To finish, thread the needle with the cast on tail of the tongue and attach the left side of the tongue to the left side of the shoe by sewing alternately through the topmost set of pink purl bumps on the inside of the shoe (fig 4) and the 'bars' between the first 2 stitches of the tongue. Use the cast off tail end from the tongue to close the right-hand side in the same way, working down towards the toe (fig. 5). Turn the work inside out and continue using this tail end to close the gap between the bottom of the tongue and the shoe (fig. 6). Sew the tongue to the bottom of the leg shaft across the gap of 4 cast on stitches (fig. 7) leaving the rounded top part of the tongue above the seam. Tie off all ends inside the shoe to secure them and weave in then trim the ends.

Use mattress stitch to start closing the back seam of the shoe with the cast on tail from the bottom of the shoe. Leave a small gap at the top of the shoe to make stuffing the foot easier. Re-thread the tapestry needle with a spare length of Yarn C and use it to gather up the loops in the bottom of the foot (fig. 8), I've used red thread here just to illustrate. Tie both ends tightly inside the shoe to fully close the bottom shoe seam.

Now stuff the foot firmly. Take your time to get the shape that you want (*figs. 9 & 10*), adding small amounts of stuffing at a time. Don't be afraid to pull it out and start again if you're not happy with the shape, I often do. Once you are happy, close the back seam of the shoe entirely and tie ends together before poking inside. Now is the best time to add the laces.

On this shoe we're making laces which can be tied. Before starting I find it easiest to mark the 5 points for the laces with pins (*fig. 11*).

Thread the needle with an 18 inch length of contrasting coloured yarn and sew through the shoe from the top marker on the left side and out of the shoe on the right-hand side at the second marker, leaving a tail of around 6 inches behind to tie the bow with later.

Take the yarn over the top of the shoe to make a loop and sew through the shoe from marker 3 on the left to marker 4 on the right. Take the yarn over the top of the shoe again to make a second loop and sew through the shoe from marker 5 on the left to marker 5 on the right. Now you will have two diagonal laces on the top of the shoe (*fig. 12*).

Work in a zig-zag back up to the top finishing on the topmost right-hand side marker and you now have 2 crossed laces on the top of the shoe (*fig. 13*). Tie both lace tail ends together in a bow and trim the ends if they are too long (*fig. 14*).

To finish the leg, thread the tapestry needle with the long end from the bottom of the leg section and use this to close the seam up the back of the leg using mattress stitch. Leave a gap at the top to make stuffing the leg easier. Stuff the leg lightly. If you want your toy to sit nicely then don't stuff the top 1cm of the leg. Finish closing the seam and tie the two ends together at the top, poking all other ends inside the leg.

Make a second leg the same and join both legs to the body by following the instructions in the main animal pattern that you are using.

## Option B: trainers:

Before starting cut two lengths 2m (2.2yds) of **Yarn A** for the intarsia sections (all **Yarn B** and **Yarn C** parts can be knitted directly from the ball). Starting at the underside of the shoe, use **Yarn C** and 2.5mm needles to cast on 14 stitches, leaving a tail of 7 inches for seaming with later

**row 1:** (wrong side) Purl  
**row 2:** K2, (KLL, K1) 4 times, K3, (KLL, K1) 4 times, K1 (22 stitches)  
**row 3:** Purl  
**row 4:** K3, (KLL, K1) 6 times, K5, (KLL, K1) 6 times, K2 (34 stitches)  
**row 5:** Purl  
**row 6:** Change to **Yarn B** and Knit  
**row 7:** Cast off in Purl and cut the work from the balls of **Yarn B** and **Yarn C**. That is the sole of the shoe finished (fig. 1)

**row 8:** Pick up and K12 in the first length of **Yarn A**, Note that you are picking up and knitting into the topmost purl bumps from the back of the cast off row (fig. 2)

rejoin **Yarn B** and pick up and K10 which will form the toecap, join the second length of **Yarn A** to pick up and K12 (34 stitches)

**row 9:** P12, P10, P12  
**row 10:** K12, K10, K12  
**rows 11-14:** repeat rows 9 & 10 twice more  
**row 15:** P12, P10, P12  
**row 16:** K12, SSK, K6, K2tog, K12 (32 stitches)  
**row 17:** P12, P2tog, P4, P2tog tbl, P12 (30 stitches)

Don't trim the **Yarn A** tails as they are needed for sewing up with later. Cut **Yarn B** from the ball leaving 10 inches to work the cast off row of the toe cap later. That is the main part of the shoe finished. The topmost part is worked in 3 separate sections:

### Right upper:

**row 18A:** With right side facing rejoin **Yarn B** and K12. Turn, leaving remaining stitches on the needle and work on these 12 stitches only  
**row 19A:** P12  
**row 20A:** Cast off 12 in Knit

### Toe cap:

**row 18B:** With right side facing, use the **Yarn B** tail from this section to Slip1, K1, pass slipped stitch over to cast off, Knit the next 2 stitches casting them off as you go, K2tog and cast off. Pull the end through the last stitch on the needle to secure

### Left upper:

**row 18C:** With right side facing rejoin **Yarn B** and K12  
**row 19C:** P12  
**row 20C:** Cast off 12 in Knit

Cut the work from the ball and thread the cast off tail end of the toe cap to through to the wrong side of the work, neatening the cast off as you do so (fig. 3). That is the main part of the shoe finished.

### To make the tongue:

With right side facing, use 2.5mm needles and **Yarn A** to pick up and knit 6 stitches from the back of the toe cap cast off edge (fig. 5) leaving a tail of 7 inches for sewing up later

**rows 2-10:** Starting and ending with a Purl row work 9 rows in stocking stitch (alternate Knit and Purl rows)  
**row 11:** Slip 1, K5

**row 12:** Slip 1, P5  
**row 13:** Slip 1, K5  
**row 14:** Cast off in Purl but make sure you slip the very first stitch instead of working it

Now you will need to pick up the stitches to form the shaft of the leg (*fig. 7 and fig. 8*). Using the main yarn for your chosen animal and 3mm needles (for row 1 you can use a smaller sized needle if you find it easier for picking up and knitting the stitches but remember to swap to the 3mm needle for the rest of the leg shaft). Please note that we will be picking up the topmost purl bumps from the back of the last row of **Yarn A** rather than stitches at the very top edge of the shoe (*fig. 7*)

**row 1:** (right side) Leaving a 7 inch tail for seaming with later pick up and Knit into the first 5 blue purl bumps from the far right side of the shoe (ignore the remaining 7 stitches on the right side). Continue by casting on 4 stitches (I use the thumb method M1A but as this will be hidden you can substitute your favourite). Ignore the first 7 blue purl bumps on the left side and pick up and Knit the last 5 of them (the last stitch will be at the very edge of the work). Be sure to keep your tension as tight as possible across the gaps. (14 stitches)

**rows 2-16:** Beginning and ending with a Purl row, work 15 rows in stocking stitch (alternate knit and purl rows)

**row 17:** Cast off in Knit

Cut the work from the ball leaving a tail of around 6 inches for sewing the leg to the body with later. Make a second leg in exactly the same way.

### *To make up:*

Use a **Yarn A** tail to attach the left side of the tongue to the left side of the shoe by sewing alternately through the topmost set of blue purl bumps on the inside of the shoe and the 'bars between the first 2 stitches of the front-side of the tongue (*fig. 9*). Use the cast on tail end from the tongue to sew the right side closed in the same way (*fig. 10*). Sew the tongue to the bottom of the leg shaft across the gap of 4 cast on stitches (*fig. 11*) leaving the rounded top part of the tongue above the seam. Thread the needle with the cast off tail from the right white upper and sew it in place to the top of the toe cap (*fig. 12*) repeat with the left white upper.

Tie off all ends inside the shoe to secure them and weave in then trim the ends.

Use mattress stitch to start closing the back seam of the shoe with the cast on tail from the bottom of the shoe. Leave a small gap at the top of the shoe to make stuffing the foot easier.

Re-thread the tapestry needle with a spare length of **Yarn C** and use it to gather up the loops in the bottom of the shoe. Tie both ends tightly inside the shoe to fully close the bottom shoe seam (*see fig. 8 on page 4 for a picture, where red thread is used to show this step and fig. 13 on page 8 for the finished seam*)

Now stuff the foot firmly. Take your time to get the shape that you want (*figs. 14 & 15*), adding small amounts of stuffing at a time. Don't be afraid to pull it out and start again if you're not happy with the shape, I often do. Once you are happy, close the back seam of the shoe entirely and tie ends together before poking inside. Now is the best time to add the laces.

On this shoe we're making decorative laces which are formed by horizontal lines across the top of the foot. Thread the needle with a 10 inch length of contrasting coloured yarn and beginning from the open back seam of the leg thread this through to the start point for the first lace just above the toe cap on the left side. Thread the needle back into the shoe on the right-hand side and back out of the shoe on the left side a little above the first lace (*fig. 16*) so making the first horizontal stitch across the top of the foot. Continue making the laces in this way (I usually make 4) and once you reach the top of the foot thread the needle back through to the start point and the back of the leg (*fig. 17*). Tie both lace tail ends together and trim before poking the ends inside the leg cavity.

To finish the leg, thread the tapestry needle with the long end from the bottom of the leg section and use this to close the seam up the back of the leg using mattress stitch. Leave a gap at the top to make stuffing the leg easier. Stuff the leg lightly. If you want your toy to sit nicely then don't stuff the top 1cm of the leg. Finish closing the seam and tie the two ends together at the top, poking all other ends inside the leg. Make a second leg the same (*fig. 18*) and join both legs to the body by following the instructions in the main animal pattern that you are using.

## Bunny Slippers:

To make the bunny slippers you'll need 4ply yarn in your chosen slipper colour approx. (20m/22yds) **Yarn A**, some white yarn for the bunny heads (less than 5m/5.5yds), some scraps of pink and black yarn to embroider the faces, toy stuffing and the same yarn that your animal is made from to complete the legs.

Starting at the underside of the slipper, use **Yarn A** and 2.5mm needles to cast on 14 stitches, leaving a tail of 6 inches for seaming with later

<b>row 1:</b> (wrong side) Purl	<b>row 13:</b> P12, P2tog, K6, P2tog tbl, P12 (32 stitches)
<b>row 2:</b> K2, (KLL, K1) 4 times, K3, (KLL, K1) 4 times, K1 (22 stitches)	<b>row 14:</b> K12, SSK, K4, K2tog, K12 (30 stitches)
<b>row 3:</b> Purl	<b>row 15:</b> P12 casting them off as you go (at this point you should have 1 stitch on your right needle and 18 stitches still to work on the left needle)
<b>row 4:</b> K3, (KLL, K1) 6 times, K5, (KLL, K1) 6 times, K2 (34 stitches)	Slip the last stitch worked back to the left hand needle and P2tog tbl, P5, Purl the remaining 12 stitches casting off as you go.
<b>rows 5 –12:</b> Beginning with a Purl row and ending with a Knit row, work 8 rows in stocking stitch (alternate Purl and Knit rows)	

Cut the work from the ball and turn the work so the right side is facing. Now you will need to work on the 6 remaining stitches to form the tongue part of the slipper. Use 2.5mm needles and re-join **Yarn A**, leaving a tail of 6 inches for seaming with later.

<b>row 1:</b> (right side) Knit	<b>row 5:</b> Slip 1, K5
<b>row 2:</b> Purl	<b>row 6:</b> Slip 1, P5
<b>row 3:</b> Knit	<b>row 7:</b> Cast off in Knit but make sure that you slip the very first stitch instead of working it
<b>row 4:</b> Slip 1, P5	

Cut the yarn from the ball leaving a long tail of 8 inches for sewing up the foot with later. That is the slipper part of the foot done (*fig. 1*). Now you need to work the top of the foot. Using the same yarn as for your animal and 3mm needles cast on 6 stitches leaving a tail of 7 inches for sewing up with later.

**row 1:** (wrong side) Knit  
**rows 2-8:** Beginning ending with a Purl row, work 7 rows in stocking stitch

Cut the yarn from the ball leaving a long tail of 8 inches for sewing up with later and keep these 6 stitches held on the left hand needle. Now you will need to pick up more stitches to form the shaft of the leg.

Please note that you'll be knitting into the purl bumps from the back of the cast off row (*fig. 2*) rather than the stitches from the top of the cast off.

**row 1:** (right side) Leaving a tail of 7 inches for seaming with later, use the animal coloured yarn to pick up and Knit the first 5 purl bumps from the far right side of the shoe cast off edge (*fig. 2*). Ignore the remaining 7 cast off stitches on the right side and continue by knitting across the 6 stitches from the top of the foot. Ignore the first 7 cast off stitches on the left side and pick up and Knit the last 5 purl bumps (the last stitch will be at the very edge of the work). Be sure to keep your tension as tight as possible across the gaps. (16 stitches, *fig. 3*)

**row 2:** P4, P2tog, P4, P2tog tbl, P4 (14 stitches)

**rows 3 –16:** Beginning with a Knit row and ending with a Purl, work 14 rows in stocking stitch

**row 17:** Cast off in Knit

Cut the work from the ball leaving a tail of around 6 inches for sewing the leg to the body with later.

Thread the needle with the cast on tail from the bottom of the animal foot section and begin to close the left hand opening between the top of the foot and the side of the slipper by sewing alternately through 1 purl bump from the back of the slipper cast off row and one bar between the edge stitches of the foot section (fig. 4) Once the left hand side is joined pull lightly on the yarn to gather the stitches in a little which will help shape the foot. Re-thread the needle with the cast off tail from the animal foot section and use this to join the right hand side in the same way (fig. 5).

Now attach the tongue of the slipper. Thread the needle with the cast on end from the tongue and attach the right side of the tongue to the side of the slipper by sewing alternately through the outside loop of the slipper side and the bars between the first 2 stitches of the tongue (fig. 6). Use the cast off end from the tongue to sew the left side closed in the same way. Turn the work inside out and sew the bottom of the foot section to the bottom of the tongue (fig. 7) Thread all ends inside the foot and tie off securely before trimming. Start to close the back seam of the slipper by threading a tapestry needle with the cast on tail from the bottom edge and using mattress stitch. Leave a small gap at the top to make stuffing the foot easier.

Re-thread the tapestry needle with a spare length of **Yarn A** and use it to gather up the loops in the bottom of the slipper (fig. 8) I've used red thread here just to illustrate. Tie both ends tightly inside the slipper to fully gather and close the bottom seam. Now stuff the foot firmly. Take your time to get the shape that you want, adding small amounts of stuffing at a time. Don't be afraid to pull it out and start again if you're not happy with the shape, I often do. Once you are happy, close the back seam of the slipper entirely and tie ends together before poking inside.

You can leave the slipper at this point (fig. 9) but if you prefer it with the bunny head it's best to attach that now as it's easier to tie off all of the ends securely before the leg seam is closed. To make the bunny head:

Using 4ply white yarn and 2.5mm needles, cast on 3 stitches leaving a tail of 6 inches for seaming with later.

**row 1:** (wrong side) Purl

**row 2:** (K1, M1A) twice, K1 (5 stitches)

**row 3:** Purl

**row 4:** (K1, M1A) 4 times, K1 (9 stitches)

**row 5:** Purl

**row 6:** Knit

**row 7:** Purl


**row 8:** (SSK) twice, K1, (K2tog) twice (5 stitches)

**row 9:** Purl

**row 8:** SSK, K1, K2tog (3 stitches)

**row 10:** Purl

Cut the work from the ball leaving a tail of around 8 inches for sewing up with, thread the tail end through the remaining 3 stitches and pull up tight to cast off (*fig. A*). Continue using this thread to sew a running stitch around the edge of the shape so that you can gather it into a ball later, don't trim the ends yet. Now it's time to work the face.



First it's best to place a scrap of felt or fabric on the inside of the work behind the place you plan to embroider the face, this stops the stitches from disappearing back inside the work. Using pink yarn embroider a small nose in centre of face - I use a horizontal stitch. Knot the yarn at the back of the work and trim ends off. Now add the eyes with the black yarn, I use a vertical stitch for each. Again knot the thread at the back of the work and tie ends securely trimming off excess (*figs. B & C*). Place a small ball of stuffing behind face and pull the tail end that you've sewn around the edge to gather the head into a little ball (*fig. D*). Tie the tail ends together to secure but don't trim them yet.

To make the ears simply cable cast on 5 stitches and then cast them off again. Cut the work from the ball and tie the tail ends together to secure. Make a second ear the same. Now thread the needle with the longer tail end from one ear and sew it to the top of the head, tie the ear tail ends together to secure. Repeat with the second ear (*fig. F*). Sew all the tail ends through to the back of the head and leave them hanging for now. Make a second head the same. Use the longest end from the bottom of the bunny head to sew the head to the top of the slipper (*fig. 10*) and then thread all other ends inside the slipper and tie off before trimming.

To finish the leg, thread the tapestry needle with the long end from the bottom of the leg section and use this to close the seam up the back of the leg using mattress stitch. Leave a gap at the top to make stuffing the leg easier. Stuff the leg lightly. If you want your toy to sit nicely then don't stuff the top 1cm of the leg. Finish closing the seam and tie the two ends together at the top, poking all other ends inside the leg. Make a second leg the same (*fig. 11*).

Join the legs to the body by following the instructions in the animal pattern that you have.
